THE MANAGEMENT



MURCHISON/SCHRAMM

Chairman of the Board Clint Murchison Jr. and President-General Manager Texas E. Schramm saw one of their major goals reached in 1970 when the Dallas Cowboys won the National Football Conference championship.

It marked a milestone in the saga of the expansion team brought to life by Murchison and Schramm 12 years ago. From a 0-11-1 record in 1960 to the Super Bowl is a mighty leap, and it was not

accomplished by accident.

Murchison, once a 130-pound halfback at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Schramm, a former sportswriter, are captains of one of the strongest front office teams in the NFL. The lineup was strengthened during the off-season with the elevation of Al Ward and Gil Brandt to newly formed vice presidential positions.

Ward joined the Cowboys as public relations director in 1966 and became assistant general manager the next year. He is vice president

for administration.

Brandt, director of player personnel since the club was formed, is vice president for personnel development. Dick Mansperger of the Cowboys scouting staff was named player personnel director.

Schramm controls the day-to-day operations of the organization. The California native is recognized as one of the most progressive

administrators in professional sports.

Schramm holds a BA degree in Journalism from the University of Texas, acquired between 1939 and 1947 with time-out for a four-year hitch in the Air Transport Command where he made Captain.

While still in school, Schramm was a member of the sports staff

of the Austin American Statesman and later sports editor.

In 1947 he joined the Los Angeles Rams as publicity director, and

in a 10-year career there, rose to general manager.

He left the Rams to join Columbia Broadcasting System as Assistant Director of Sports in 1957 and was there until summoned by Murchison and Bedford Wynne to guide the Cowboys.

One of his major assets is to be a sound judge of men. It was Schramm who brought Pete Rozelle into pro football as publicity

man for the Rams.

Aside from the development of the Cowboys, perhaps his major achievements have been his work with scouting systems, both with the Rams and Cowboys, and the merger of the NFL and AFL.

It was Schramm and Lamar Hunt, owner of the Kansas City

Chiefs, who handled preliminary negotiations for the merger.

THE COACH



Coach Tom Landry and the Dallas Cowboys, together since the club was formed in 1960, enter their 12th season with a new title — National Football Conference champions.

It was a long uphill struggle for the expansion team that didn't win a game in its first season and didn't reach the break-even point

until 1965.

Landry's cool, confident approach and unquestioned coaching genius led to more victories for the Cowboys in the past five seasons (52) than any professional football team other than Oakland (53).

The Landry style never was more evident and effective than in the stretch run of the 1970 season. The Cowboys' record was 5-4 and their chances for making the playoffs appeared non-existent when Tom rallied his forces for a tremendous finish.

Dallas won its last five regular season games to gain the divisional play-offs against Detroit, won that one and defeated San Francisco for the NFC title. Only the narrow Super Bowl loss to Baltimore

marred an otherwise flawless final rush.

Landry earned his coaching spurs with the New York Giants in the 1950's, where as an assistant he played a major role in the development of the concepts that evolved into the Dallas "flex" defense of the 1970's. It is a complicated system of well-defined individual assignments, and combined with the famous Cowboy multiple offense it has made Landry's club one of the most respected in football.

As early as 1962, when they had a 5-8-1 record, the Cowboys were second in the NFL in offense. By 1964, when they again finished 5-8-1, they were second in defense. Despite their slow start in 1970, the Cowboys were solid enough to wind up third in the NFC in total

offense and fourth in total defense. They led the conference in rushing, after finishing first in both rushing and passing the year before.

Landry's career coaching record heading into the 1971 season was 77-69-6. Since the Cowboys turned the corner in 1965 the Landry ledger reads 52-16-2. No coach has done better in that time.

Tom was born in Mission, Texas, in 1924 and became an All-Regional fullback prior to enrolling at the University of Texas.

He was at Texas only one semester before going into the Air Force. He spent the bulk of his service time in England where he flew 30

missions as a B-17 pilot for the Eighth Air Force.

Following his discharge in November of 1945, Tom returned to Texas where he carved out a solid scholastic and football career for the Longhorns. His stay there was marked by some of the strongest teams in Texas' history. He was co-captain his senior year and second team All-Southwest Conference his junior year. Landry was a mainstay on the Longhorn teams which whipped Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl, 27-7, and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl, 41-28.

In 1949 Landry joined the old New York Yankees, playing halfback, both offensively and defensively. When the two leagues merged in 1950, Landry began his long association with the Giants and began

building the solid reputation he holds today.

He was an active player from 1950 through 1953 and player-coach in 1954 and 1955, handling the Giants' defense. As a player, he was a defensive halfback in Steve Owen's famed umbrella pass defense, and he played it well enough to be named to the All-Pro defensive team in 1954. In 1956 he retired as a player and became the full-time

defensive coach.

The Giants enjoyed some of their greatest successes during Landry's stay with them. They lost a playoff to Cleveland in 1950 for the Eastern Division championship. In 1956, Landry's first year as a full-time coach, the Giants won the world championship in a 47-7 rout over the Chicago Bears. They won the division title in 1958 and 1959, after which Giant head coach Jim Lee Howell called Landry "the best defensive coach in the business." During Landry's tenure as full-time defensive coach, the Giants fashioned a 33-14-1 record in regular league play.

Before moving to Dallas, he lived in Houston during the off-season. Landry received an industrial engineering degree from the University

of Houston in 1952 and was employed there as an engineer.

Landry entered his 22nd professional football season this year and the way his contract reads, he'll still be with the Cowboys when he enters his 25th season. On February 5, 1964, Cowboys' owner, Clint Murchison, Jr., announced he had signed Landry to a contract running through the 1974 season. It was the longest contract in the history of pro sports, as well as newsmen could determine.

"It's in line with my philosophy that when you get a good man you want to hold on to him," Murchison explained.

Tom devotes what little non football and family time he has in the

off-season to work with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

At Texas Tom met his wife, Alicia, and they were married in January 1949, four months before he received a bachelor of business administration degree. They have three children, Tom, Jr., Kitty and Lisa. Young Tom is a 1971 Duke graduate and Kitty attends the University of Texas. Lisa is a high school student.

ERMAL ALLEN Special Assistant

Ermal and Jim Myers are the real veterans on Tom Landry's staff. Each came to Dallas in 1962 for the Cowboys' third season. Ermal's computer-like evaluations of players and teams have played a major part in the Dallas success story.

Ermal quarterbacked the Kentucky Wildcats from 1939 through 1941, and was a member of the Fort Benning and Army All-Star teams during World War II. He was a defensive back with the Cleveland Browns in 1947.

Returning to Kentucky, Ermal worked under Bear Bryant from 1948 through 1953 and under Blanton Collier from 1954 through 1961.

The 50-year-old Allen (12-25-20) was an all-around athlete in college, earning three letters each in football, basketball and golf. He won the Southern Amateur in 1938 and was Kentucky State Amateur champion in 1955 and 1958. In '55 Ermal, still one of the best golfers around, defeated Bobby Nichols in the semifinals of the Kentucky Amateur and in '58 he stopped Frank Beard in the finals.

Ermal and his wife Allie are grandparents, thanks to their son Ken, a former Georgia Tech halfback. They have two other children, Mrs. Pat Cunningham and Amy, 16.

BOBBY FRANKLIN Defensive Backfield Coach

Bobby's defensive backfield played a major role in the Cowboys' drive to the 1970 NFC championship. It was quite a feather in the cap of the young coach, who came to the Cowboys in 1968 after only one season of coaching experience at Georgia Tech.

A native of Clarksdale, Miss., (10-5-36) Bobby was a multisport star as a high schooler. He attended Ole Miss, where he quarter-backed Johnny Vaught's teams his final two seasons. The Rebels played in three bowls during Bobby's stay.

He was drafted 11th by the Cleveland Browns in 1960 and was a regular in the secondary for three seasons in a career that lasted through 1966.

JIM MYERS Offensive Line Coach

Jim joined the Cowboys in 1962 from Texas A&M, where he was head coach and athletic director for four years. He was an assistant coach at Wofford College, Vanderbilt and UCLA and head coach at Iowa State before going to Texas A&M.

The 49-year-old Myers (11-12-21) was born in Madison, W. Va., and was a standout lineman at both Tennessee and Duke. He played at Tennessee in 1941 and '42, was an All-Southern Conference guard at Duke in the Marine V-12 program in 1943, and returned to Tennessee for his senior year in 1946. He also served in the Marine Corps and was discharged a captain before his return to Tennessee.

Jim and his wife Carolyn have three daughters and four grand-children. Their daughters are Mrs. Harrison Jones, Mrs. Michael Daly and Carol, who attends North Texas.

DAN REEVES Offensive Backfield Coach (See Page 36)

RAY RENFRO Pass Offense Coach

A six-time All-Pro running back and receiver with the Cleveland Browns, Ray moved to Dallas in 1968 after coaching stints with the Washington Redskins and Detroit Lions.

The personable Whitesboro, Tex., native (11-7-30) was a small college All-American at North Texas State, where he averaged 7.7 yards per carry and was a 9.5 sprinter. He then spent 12 years with the Browns.

Ray and his wife, the former Sandra Clarke of Fort Worth, have three children — Mike, 16; Mark, 14, and Mitch 12. The Renfros live in Fort Worth where Ray has a dry cleaning establishment.

ERNIE STAUTNER Defense Coach

Ernie, whose soft-spoken manner is in contrast to his rough, tough appearance, joined the Cowboys staff in 1966 after a season with the Washington Redskins. Prior to that he put in two years as player-coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

One of the most honored and popular interior linemen of modern times, Ernie was voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1970— immediately after he became eligible. Ernie played 15 years with the Steelers as a 235-pound defensive tackle and appeared in nine Pro Bowl games. He was All-Pro in 1958 and 1959 and, along with former roommate Bobby Layne, is something of a legend in Pittsburgh.

Ernie played four seasons with Boston College after completing a 1943-46 hitch in the Marines. He was born April 2, 1925, in Calm, Bavaria, and grew up in Albany, N.Y.

He and his wife Helen have three children — Joseph Robert, 16; Teresa Anne, 15, and Carol Anne, 10.

JERRY TUBBS Linebacker Coach

Jerry became a full-time Dallas coach in 1968 after serving two seasons as player-coach for the Cowboys. The Breckenridge, Tex., native (1-23-35) spent 11 seasons in the NFL after an outstanding collegiate career at Oklahoma.

Tubbs was a regular for Bud Wilkinson during three seasons that Oklahoma never lost a game. He received the Walter Camp Award as the nation's outstanding player following his senior season in 1956.

Jerry was drafted No. 1 by the Chicago Cardinals, but went to the San Francisco 49ers on waivers a year later. He was one of the 36 original Cowboys and played as a regular for six seasons, earning All-Pro honors in 1962.

Jerry and his wife Marlene have two children — Alan, 13, and Kayla Lynn, 8.

DICK MANSPERGER - Player Personnel Director

Dick moved into his new job during the off-season when Gil Brandt, the Cowboys' Director of Player Personnel since the team was formed, was promoted to Vice President for Personnel Develop-

ment.

Mansperger, 38, has a good background for his new assignment. He joined the Cowboys scouting department for good in 1967 after an earlier one-year stint in Dallas. A 1958 graduate of Arizona State, where he played for Dan Devine, Dick was head coach for two years at Palo Verde Junior College in Blythe, Calif. He followed that with assistant coaching positions at West Texas State, Arizona State, UCLA and Iowa before coming to the Cowboys. While at UCLA, Dick scouted and signed Mel Farr and Gary Beban and at Arizona State he landed Jerry Smith for Coach Frank Kush.

DON COCHREN — Trainer

Don Cochren joined the Cowboys in June 1965 after one year as

head trainer at the University of New Hampshire.

A graduate of Purdue University who gained his physical therapy certificate from Pennsylvania, the 39-year-old Cochren spent two years as trainer at Case Institute in Cleveland and four years as trainer of the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian football league. He also spent two years as a physical therapy officer in the Air Force.

Don and his wife, Imogene, have three children, Diana, 15, Mickey,

13, and David, 12.

LARRY GARDNER — Trainer

When Larry, 32, joined the Cowboys in 1965, it wasn't the first time he'd been in Texas. The McNeese State alum had graduated from the Hermann Hospital School of Physical Therapy at the Texas Medical Center in Houston in 1962.

He spent two years at the University of California, with time out for a six-month tour of duty in the Army, before becoming football

trainer at Stanford University in 1964.

Larry was named secretary of the Professional Football Trainers

Assn., in 1969.

Gardner was born in Lake Charles, La., and attended school in Sulphur, La. He is married to the former Carol Burden. They have one daughter, Mimi Carol, 5, and Matthew James, 3.

JACK ESKRIDGE — Equipment Manager

A basketball player who holds one Kansas University scoring record that even Wilt Chamberlain never bettered, Jack Eskridge has been in most every phase of athletics since graduating from

high school in Independence, Mo.

The 45-year-old Kansas City, Kan., native played pro basketball for two seasons (1949-50) with the Chicago Stags and Indianapolis Jets of the NBA, after playing at Kansas in 1946-47-48. He also coached five years in Iowa and Kansas high schools and five years at Kansas University. He joined the Cowboys their first season. Eskridge's KU basketball record: He scored 30 points in a half.

PRO: Herb came to the Cowboys from Green Bay in exchange for Malcolm Walker and Clancy Williams just a couple of weeks before the 1970 season began. The five-time All-Pro quickly adjusted to the Dallas system, and all of a sudden the defensive backfield became what Tom Landry called "one of our very, very strong points." For years, it had been a problem area for the Cowboys. "Any time you have one cornerback that you don't have confidence in going man-to-man," says Landry, "the whole defense adjusts to it and you get to where you're so conscious of the adjustment that you become ineffective. With Adderley and Mel Renfro at the corners we have no problem like that. I don't think anybody in the league has two better cornerbacks than we do." Herb, one of two players to have participated in three Super Bowls (the other is center Bill Curry, an ex-Packer who played for Baltimore in 1970), intercepted 42 passes in his first 10 NFL seasons. When he returned kickoffs for Green Bay, he did an Adderley-like job — 103 yards for a touchdown in 1962, 98 yards for a touchdown in 1963, a 25.7 average per return in eight years on that job. "Adderley is a class football player," says Fran Tarkenton. "He'd strengthen any team in the league." Herb's exteammate, Bart Starr, is even more positive: "Adderley is the best cornerback who ever played the game." Herb has a very definite idea of what he wants to accomplish on the football field. "Pride in performance," he says, "that's something I've always had. When people leave the stadium I want them to say they've just watched one of the best cornerbacks they've ever seen in their lives."

COLLEGE: An All-Big Ten halfback and tri-captain at Michigan State in 1960, Herb capped his college career with appearances in the East-West Shrine, Hula Bowl, All-American and All-Star games. He was the Packers' No. 1 draft choice in 1961.

PERSONAL: Herb, his wife Barbara and their daughter Toni (2-12-68) live in Philadelphia during the off-season, where Herb often startles callers by answering the phone with "Peace, Love and Hanpiness!" instead of a more conventional greeting. Herb was born in Philadelphia.

ADKINS, MARGENE Ht: 5-10 Wt: 183 Wide Receiver Born: 4-30-47 Henderson J. C. 2nd Year (D-2 for '70)

PRO: A second-year wide receiver whose college career stopped at the juco level, who played in only five games as a rookie and caught no passes would not seem to be the type of player to excite the Cowboys staff. But Margene does. In three seasons of Canadian football with Ottawa he caught 135 passes for 30 touchdowns. Tom Landry thinks he may do the same for Dallas someday. "He could be a great one," says Tom. "He has the physical ability, and it's just a matter of him adjusting to our type of football." Margene startled observers at training camp in 1970 when, on a bet, he leaped straight up and easily grabbed the 10-foot high goalpost crossbar. That may have been an indication of the heights he'll reach with the Cowboys.

COLLEGE: Margene played in the Junior Rose Bowl twice while at Henderson in Athens, Tex. He had a brief stop at Wichita State before moving to Canada.

PERSONAL: A native of Fort Worth, where he was a football and basketball star at Kirkpatrick High School, Margene now makes his home in Dallas with his wife Jeanette.

ALWORTH, LANCE Wide Receiver Arkansas
Ht: 6-0 Wt: 180 Born: 8-3-40 10th Year (D-2 for '62)

PRO: Obtained from San Diego in an off-season trade for Pettis Norman, Tony Liscio and Ron East, Lance adds a new dimension to the Cowboys' passing game. One of the truly great receivers in profootball history, Alworth owns two all-time records — seven consecutive years of 1,000 or more yards in receptions and 96 consecutive games catching at least one pass. He also holds four AFL records and shares two others. Charlie Hennigan, who set pass receiving records of his own with the Houston Oilers, is lavish in his praise of the new Cowboy. "A player comes along once in a lifetime who alone is worth the price of admission," said Hennigan. "That player is Lance Alworth." Lance's acrobatic style thrills the fans, but sometimes it's worried his coaches. "Some guys flinch," Lance shrugs. "Maybe in-

stead of flinching I leap. I feel I'm probably in better shape than people who have their feet on the ground. When I get hit, they're just going to push me forward or turn me end over. People who have their feet on the ground are going to get twisted." Whatever his secret, Lance has made it pay off in one of the most spectacular set of statistics in the NFL book — 493 receptions for 9,584 yards and 81 touchdowns. In addition to his league records, Lance owns every San Diego mark for pass receiving and touchdowns. A member of the all-time AFL All-Star team and a seven-time All-AFL choice, Lance draws this remark from San Diego Coach Sid Gillman: "He is all-time All-Pro in my book, a great athlete and a great competitor." "You look at all the receivers in the 1960s," says Tom Landry, "and you have to rate Alworth the top receiver for that period."

COLLEGE: An All-American tailback at Arkansas, Lance was called by Razorback Coach Frank Broyles "the most fluid athlete I've ever seen." Alworth was a three-time academic All-American who passed up a bonus offer from the New York Yankees to play football at Arkansas. He holds the Razorback freshman sprint records of 9.6 in the 100 and 21.2 in the 220.

PERSONAL: Born in Houston, Lance won 15 letters at Brookhaven, Miss., High School. He and his wife Marilynn make their home in San Diego.

George is big AND quick and, along with running mate Bob Lilly, is part of one of football's most respected twoman wrecking crews. The right side of the Cowboys' defensive line is an area the opposition likes to avoid. A four-time Pro Bowler, George was the East's Most Valuable Lineman in the 1970 edition of that game.

COLLEGE: When Marquette dropped football prior to George's senior season, his hopes for a pro career looked dark. But the Cowboys' files on him were kept up to date, and he was their sixth pick in the 1962 draft.

PERSONAL: George has finished in the money five straight years in the Astrojet Golf Classic at Phoenix, teaming with Ron

Santo of the Chicago Cubs to win the event and \$5,000 in 1970. George, his wife Mary Lou and their four children — George (8-26-64), Michael (10-5-65), Margaret (8-22-69) and Deborah (11-23-70) — live in Dallas where he sells real estate in the off-season.

PRO: Bob has a great future as an offensive lineman, but there's reason to believe he might make it as a comedian, too. A quip of his at Ft. Lauderdale was one of the most repeated one-liners of Super Bowl week. "All these reporters ask the same questions, over and over," Bob complained to teammate John Niland. "What's that?" John inquired. "What's your name," said Bob. On the field, Bob also makes Cowboys coaches smile. "He has all the factors to be a great one," says Scout Red Hickey.

COLLEGE: A three-year regular at Vanderbilt, Bob made the NEA All-American team and generally drew rave notices throughout the Southeastern Conference.

PERSONAL: A native of Falls Church, Va., Bob lettered in football, basketball, track and tennis in high school. A bachelor, he makes his off-season home in Plymouth Meeting, Pa.

BOMER, JOHN Center Memphis State Ht: 6-3 Wt: 230 Born: 6-20-49 1st Year (D-17 for '71)

Coach Billy Murphy considers John "one of the best linemen ever to play at Memphis State, and one of the most consistent blockers we've ever had." John was a unanimous All-Missouri Valley choice as a junior and senior, and played in the post-1970 Blue-Gray and Hula Bowl games.

BONWELL, ERNEST Linebacker Lane College Ht: 6-4 Wt: 225 Born: 7-23-49 1st Year (D-11 for '71)

Ernest is the first Lane College player ever drafted by a professional football team, and the Cowboy staff thinks he has a good chance to succeed as a pro. Ernest was an offensive and defensive tackle as a sophomore and junior, but switched to outside linebacker his senior year. His best game came against Fisk, when he intercepted two passes and was in on 25 tackles — 15 of them unassisted. Ernest competed in football, basketball and swimming at Central High School in Kansas City.

Offensive Tackle BRENNAN, JOHN **Boston College** Ht: 6-21/2 Wt: 260 Born: 8-5-47 1st Year (D-16 for '71)

Big John, an All-New England selection in 1970, was a two-year regular at Boston College. His father, John J. Brennan, starred at guard for the Eagles in 1930 through 1932. John played basketball and baseball, in addition to football, at Christopher Columbus High School in Boston.

CARTER, JOE Grambling Tiaht End Ht: 6-3 Wt: 219 Born: 1-28-48 1st Year (D-4 for '71)

Carter was a somewhat surprising selection as the Cowboys' first draft choice ever from the Grambling football machine. Joe did not become a starter until his senior year and then was used primarily as a blocker, catching 18 passes for 289 yards and one touchdown. The words that best describe Carter, says Player Personnel Director Dick Mansperger, are "raw potential."

CLARK. MIKE Place Kicker Texas A & M Ht: 6-1 Wt: 205 Born: 11-7-40 9th Year (FA for '63)

PRO: Mike's field goals under pressure spelled the difference in some big games for the Cowboys in 1970 - most notably the muddy victory over Cleveland (6-2) and the divisional playoff win over Detroit (5-0). "We put a game situation on each practice kick," says Clark. "Like we'll say, 'OK, only 15 seconds left and we're behind by two points.' I'm sure people will laugh about this, but it's like thinking your way through a golf game. Practice a situation time and time again, and it doesn't seem so large when it actually happens." Mike ranks fourth among active scorers in the NFC, with 634 career points, and stands 18th on the all-time NFL scoring chart. He owns the Dallas season record for field goals, with 20 in 1969.

COLLEGE: Mike had never tried to kick a field goal until he went to Texas A&M. He tried it on the freshman team and after one game had the job. He says he got his chance when the guy who was kicking ahead of him was knocked cold breaking up a wedge.

PERSONAL: Mike's hobby is flying, and he owns a bi-plane he "putters around in." He's also a member of the Confederate Air Force, a group made up mostly of men who flew propeller-driven fighters and bombers in World War II. Mike says one of his biggest thrills came last spring when he flew the only B-24 "Liberator" still in existence. Mike, a native of Marshall, Tex., and his wife Darlena have one son, Michael Kyle (10-13-67).

COLLEGE: Larry enrolled at Air Force, but during the cribbing scandals he failed to turn in a classmate and was forced to leave. He wound up at Hawaii, where Cowboys scouts began to take notice of him.

PERSONAL: Larry is a native of Granite Falls, Minn., also the home of Los Angeles running back Les Josephson. Larry completed his degree in Civil Engineering at the University of Minnesota and now lives in Dallas. He and his wife, the former Linda Kleinert, have one son, Michael Anthony (11-3-70).

Dave, a doubtful starter because of injuries, intercepted two passes in the mud to spark a 6-2 Dallas victory and send the Cowboys winging toward the playoffs. Despite taking a back seat to Chuck Howley and Lee Roy Jordan in the headline department, Dave gives the game that 100 per cent that coaches are always talking about. "The best thing you can say about Edwards is that he's a pro," asserts Ernie Stautner. "He plays hurt and he still does an outstanding job. That's what a pro is."

COLLEGE: An All-Southeastern Conference end at Auburn in 1961, Dave played under Coach Ralph "Shug" Jordan. He has a degree in physical education.

One of Walt's most impressive 1970 performances came against Nolan's 49ers in the NFC title game. He gained 71 yards on 17 carries and caught three passes for another 51 yards and a touchdown, all despite a staggering set of injuries. "Against San Francisco," says Landry, "Garrison played when nobody else would have even tried." During the week before the Super Bowl, Walt was asked how the ankle was coming along. "Fine," he said. "Now I only limp when I walk." Walt's approach to football is just what you would expect it to be: "Sure I like to run, but I'd just as soon get a good block. I remember my high school coach saying it doesn't matter how you get there as long as you get there."

COLLEGE: An all-time star at Oklahoma State, Walt was a two-time All-Big Eight selection while rushing for 730 yards as a junior and 924 as a senior. He played in the East-West and Senior Bowl games and signed with the Cowboys when they included a horse trailer as part of his bonus.

PERSONAL: A native Texan from Lewisville, Walt spends much of his off-season as a working cowboy on his father-in-law's ranch near that north central Texas town. Walt also has done his stint as a rodeo cowboy and experts say he could have been a successful pro in that line of work. Walt is married to the former Pam Phillips of Dallas and they have one son, Phillip Martin (6-5-69).

The switch came when the Cowbovs acquired another All-Pro cornerback, Herb Adderley, from Green Bay. Dallas coaches had little doubt Cornell could make the move successfully, and they were proven right when he became a key part of one of football's best defensive secondaries. "Cornell saved me," says Adderlev. "So many things are done differently here on pass defense, and he gives me the tip. He is a very thoughtful man about this business of playing cornerback." Now the former All-American basketball player has found a home at another position. "I think strong safety is Cornell's position now," says Tom Landry. "He's been a top cornerback for years, and I think he'll play several more years for us at safety." Says Cornell, "I enjoy it. I have somebody to talk to now, the other safety. Used to be when I played cornerback, I only had the wide receiver to talk to. And sometimes he wouldn't talk to me." Cornell came to the Cowboys in 1962 as a free agent with no collegiate football experience. "Basketball was no hindrance," he says now. "You come into the league and everybody has it all to learn anyway, whether they know it or not."

COLLEGE: Skipping collegiate football to concentrate on basketball at Utah State, Cornell averaged more than 20 points a game in his three varsity seasons and was an All-American as a sophomore in 1960. He was a three-time All-Skyline Conference selection.

PERSONAL: Cornell moved his off-season home to Dallas this year, joining the Cowboy front office in scouting and community relations. He became an instant hit on the banquet circuit with his droll one-liners. Asked at a question-and-answer session in Fort Worth if the Cowboys had signed any sleepers, Cornell replied, "If we have, they'd better wake up by July." Cornell was born in Oklahoma City and grew up in Richmond, Calif., where he was an all-star basketball and football player (fullback) in high school. One of his four brothers, Pumpsie, is a former major league baseball player. Cornell is married to the former Betty Jones and they have two sons, Randy (9-11-62) and Ronnie (3-7-67).

An All-Big Ten selection in 1970, Bill caught the Cowboys' attention with a senior season that included 53 solo tackles and 55 assists. "He's big, fast and quick," says Scout Red Hickey of Gregory. "He continued to improve through the season and we think he's a good defensive end prospect." Bill was Wisconsin's captain for two years. He's a native of LeMarque, Tex., and attended Lincoln High there.

GRIFFIN, BILL Offensive Lineman 1st Year (D-7 for '71) Ht: 6-5 Wt: 250 Born: 7-29-48

One of the most impressive physical specimens drafted by the Cowboys, Bill was an All-Carolinas Conference first teamer at tackle. The Dallas staff thinks he also could perform well at guard. Bill, married with one child, threw the shot put and discus for the Catawba track team. He's a native of Edenton, N. C., where he graduated from John A. Holmes High School.

HAGEN. HALVOR Guard-Center Weber State

Ht: 6-5 Wt: 253 Born: 2-4-47 3rd Year (D-3 for '69)

PRO: Halvor moved to offense in 1970 after spending his rookie season on the other side of the line. Cowboys coaches are enthusiastic about the potential of the big, fast native of Oslo, Norway. The problem seems to be finding a spot for him in a veteran lineup that's solid at virtually every position.

COLLEGE: Halvor played one year of junior college football at Shoreline Community in Seattle and two seasons at Weber (pronounced Wee'-ber) State, where his development came at a fantastic rate. From spring practice until the start of his senior year he went from 210 to 240 pounds and maintained his 5.0 speed.

PERSONAL: Halvor has what could be described as exciting hobbies. He owns a private pilot's license and has followed in his father's tracks as a skier. His dad, Gunner, was one of Norway's great skiers. Halvor and his bride of less than a year, Sandy, live in Dallas in the off-season.

HARRIS. CLIFF Safety Ouachita Wt: 184 Born: 11-12-48 2nd Year (FA for '70) Ht: 6-0

PRO: Another free agent find, courtesy of the Cowboys' scouting dragnet, Cliff did himself proud at free safety before a military obligation limited his playing time the last half of the season. Prior to that, however, he made some loud noises in the defensive secondary. He intercepted two passes and recovered a fumble in a 28-10 victory over the Giants; returned a fumble 31 yards in a 13-0 victory over the Falcons, and recovered a fumble in a 45-21 victory over the

Redskins. "At first I told myself at least I got to go to training camp," says Cliff, looking back on his surprising climb to a starting spot. "Then I told myself at least I got to stay around to see the veterans. And then at least I was around for the first pre-season

PRO: "Any team that prepares for the Cowboys," says Detroit Lions Coach Joe Schmidt, "has got to make adjustments for Hayes. He may not catch a lot of balls, but he can catch one and beat you." Therein lies the former Olympic champion's value to the Cowboys. "Our receiving corps is built primarily around Bob," says Tom Landry. "He puts a lot of strain on the defense, forcing them to double or adjust to him. He is the key." In 1970, Bob caught 34 passes — his lowest total as a professional. But they were good for 889 yards (a 26.1 average) and 10 touchdowns. In six seasons he's grabbed 59 touchdown passes and scored five TDs by other methods. He's the Cowboys' all-time leading pass receiver and punt returner. He's tied for sixth, with 12-year veteran Joe Morrison, among the NFC's active scorers, and the five ahead of him are kickers. Bob may be a step slower than he was in college, but a step off 9.1 still isn't bad. "Get me the ball eight or 10 times a game," the Bullet says, "and something will happen."

COLLEGE: Bob mixed football with track at Florida A&M, where he became famous as the "World's Fastest Human." He set world records in the 100-yard and 100-meter dashes, winning the 100 meters in the 1964 Olympics. "What a lot of people don't know is that football was Bobby's first love," says his college coach, Jake Gaither. "I don't think he'd have gone out for track if it meant giving up football." Bob played in the 1965 College All-Star game.

PERSONAL: Bob, born in Jacksonville, Fla., is married to the former Altamease Martin of New Brunswick, N. J. They have one daughter, Adrienne LaRori (12-31-68).

PRO: Injuries and Duane Thomas kept Calvin from repeating his sensational rookie performance, but Tom Landry and his staff aren't at all unhappy with Hill's progress and prospects. A close post-season look at the films revealed that Calvin actually performed better than the coaches had thought. "His first year he was just running," says Landry. "Right now, you can see he's thinking as he runs. It's not as instinctive, maybe not as exciting. But he knows that to be a great team you have to have great execution against the top competition. He is learning how to run with the help of his blockers." Calvin's father gives an insight into what Cowboys fans can expect from his son in the future. "You have to fight for what you get in this world." he says, "and Calvin is a fighter." John Zook, the Atlanta defensive end, describes what it's like to meet up with Hill: "He keeps driving. You have to get fierce with him or he'll tear loose." And no less an authority than Jim Brown is impressed. "Everything that Hill does. I like," says Brown. "He's a great runner and he's going to improve as he learns." Even spending much of the 1970 season on the side-lines, Calvin wound up as the No. 14 rusher in the NFC. He had two outstanding days, rushing for 117 yards against both Philadelphia and Atlanta.

COLLEGE: During Hill's three years at Yale, the team posted 4-5, 8-1 and 8-0-1 records with him accounting for 1,512 yards rushing, 858 catching passes and 298 throwing them. He also played some

HOWLEY, CHUCK West Virginia Linebacker Ht: 6-2 Wt: 225 Born: 6-28-36 13th Year (D-1 for '58)

PRO: The Cowboys' quiet man shows no signs of slowing down, despite a dozen years of NFL warring. Chuck is the Cowboys' "senior citizen," both in terms of age and years in the league, but in 1970 he was their only All-Pro. "Howley seems to be ageless," says Tom Landry. "You would expect him to fall off because of his age, but actually he had one of his best years last season." Howley confirms Landry's evaluation: "From all evidence, I'm having better years now than I did earlier in my career. As long as I can keep up with the rookies and feel I'm doing my job, I'll continue playing." That's good news for the Cowboys, who have come to depend on Chuck's consistent and sometimes spectacular performances. The 1971 Super Bowl's Most Valuable Player assures you that those things don't happen by accident. "Every week I study films, looking for an opportunity to make a big play," Chuck says. "I study circumstances, situations on certain plays and key for them." That careful planning has resulted in 19 career interceptions and 11 fumble recoveries, including a 97-yarder for a touchdown in 1966.

COLLEGE: Chuck was a five-sport letterman at West Virginia, earning monograms in football, wrestling, track, swimming and gymnastics. An All-American center in 1957, he was a three-year All-Southern Conference choice as a guard, center and linebacker. Chuck also was a 10.1 sprinter and the conference one-meter diving champion.

PERSONAL: Chuck was born in Wheeling, W. Va., and grew up in Warwood, W. Va., where he was an All-State fullback. Chuck married the former Nancy Welch in 1958, and they have two children—Scott (8-16-62) and Robin (5-17-66). During the off-season Chuck concentrates on his Dallas dry cleaning center and uniform rental service.

Another top all-around athlete, Honor grabbed 55 passes for 931 yards and five touchdowns in 1970. In only two years at Pacific, following careers at Tamalpios High School in Mill Valley, Calif., and College of Marin, Honor totaled 74 receptions for 1,236 yards and eight touchdowns. He was a 9.5 sprinter on the Pacific track team, and has been timed at 4.6 in the "football 40." Honor is married.

JESSIE, RON Wide Receiver Kansas Ht: 6-0 Wt: 183 Born: 2-4-48 1st Year (D-8 for '71)

"Ron is a big play man," says Tom Landry, "probably one of the best athletes in the draft." A Yuma, Ariz., native who attended Imperial Valley Junior College in California, Ron caught 33 passes for 644 yards and three touchdowns in two seasons at Kansas. He also found time to excel in track, and was the 1969 NCAA Indoor Long Jump Champion with a leap of 25-2½. He's high jumped 6-6 and was timed at 13.8 in the 120 high hurdles. Ron set a Kansas record in 1970 with 494 yards on 21 kickoff returns. He is married.

PRO: Jethro Pugh describes this scene from the Cowboys' 17-10 NFC championship victory over San Francisco: "Lee Roy is yelling at us, 'Somebody's gonna make the big play! Somebody's gonna stop them!" And who does it? Lee Roy himself. He intercepts that pass from Brodie and we move in for a touchdown." Lee Roy, smallest of the NFL's middle linebackers, compensates for his lack of size with one of the most aggressive, competitive natures in football. "Lee Roy gives you 100 per cent," says Tom Landry. "Then he gives you 10 per cent more." Jordan's college coach, Paul "Bear" Bryant of Alabama, puts it this way: "Lee Roy takes it mighty personal when anybody comes at him with a football. I mean downtown, in the backyard or in your living room." An intelligent player as well as an aggressive one, Lee Roy calls defensive signals for the Cowboys and is defensive co-captain along with Cornell Green. But that rip-snorting style of his is what catches the eye. "I've always been aggressive," says Lee Roy. "I want the other team to be aware of me. It bothers their concentration."

COLLEGE: Lee Roy was named the nation's outstanding lineman his senior year at Alabama, capping his All-American season by making 31 tackles against Oklahoma in the 1963 Orange Bowl. Bear Bryant called him the best linebacker he had ever coached. Lee Roy played in the 1963 All-Star game.

PERSONAL: One of seven children, Lee Roy was born in Excel, Ala., where he starred as a high school fullback. He's married to the former Mary "Biddy" Banks of Tuscaloosa. They have two sons, David (12-8-65) and Patrick Lee (5-23-68). Lee Roy lives in Dallas and works in commercial real estate in the off-season.

KADZIEL, RON Linebacker Stanford
Ht: 6-3 Wt: 215 Born: 2-27-49 1st Year (D-5 for '71)

Ron was a second team tight end as a sophomore and junior before the Stanford coaches decided he was too good an athlete to spend so much time on the bench. As a linebacker, Kadziel made 56 tackles and intercepted two passes despite being hampered by a pulled thigh muscle in mid-season. "We took him because of his athletic ability and toughness," said the Cowboys' Red Hickey. Ron was drafted as a catcher by the Minnesota Twins after graduating from Pomona Catholic High School in LaVerne, Calif., but turned down a bonus in favor of a college education.

KINER, STEVE Linebacker Tennessee
Ht: 6-1 Wt: 220 Born: 6-12-47 2nd Year (D-3 for '70)

PRO: Steve quickly brought attention to himself in training camp with his all-out style of play. It carried over into the season, where his aggressive work on the specialty teams caused some collisions the fans are still talking about. He also shows up in some unusual — for a linebacker — statistical categories, For instance, he caught a pass for 14 yards from Dan Reeves on a fake field goal against Minnesota. And he returned three kickoffs for a 16.7 average. He also intercepted a pass and ran it back 28 yards against Houston. Cowboys coaches class him as a genuine "hitter" with a bright future.

COLLEGE: A two-time All-American at Tennessee, Steve was called by Bear Bryant the best Southeastern Conference linebacker since Lee Roy Jordan. He once made 12 tackles and intercepted two passes playing with a broken wrist.

PERSONAL: Steve played quarterback and linebacker at Hillsborough High in Tampa, Fla.

KINER'S COWBOYS RECORDS

LEWIS, D. D. Linebacker Mississippi State
Ht: 6-1 Wt: 225 Born: 10-16-45 3rd Year (D-6 for '68)

PRO: D. D. spent all of the 1969 season either in the service or on the military reserve list, but he was philosophical about it. "It's not so bad," he said. "I'll be back in time for the Super Bowl." Sure enough, No. 50 was an integral part of the Cowboys' drive to the 1970 NFC title. Fifteen pounds heavier than when he first joined the club, D. D. has earned a reputation as a rugged, aggressive player with a good shot at eventually becoming a fixture at linebacker.

COLLEGE: A three-year regular at Mississippi State, D. D. was a two-time All-Southeastern Conference choice and Defensive Player of the Year in the conference as a senior. He also was an NEA All-American his senior year. He played in the Senior Bowl, Blue-Gray and College All-Star games.

PERSONAL: One of 14 children, D. D. grew up in Knoxville, Tenn. He and his wife Margaret have one daughter, Christi (10-17-69). The family moved to Dallas during the past off-season.

LILLY, BOB Defensive Tackle Texas Christian Ht: 6-5 Wt: 260 Born: 7-26-39 11th Year (D-1 for '61)

PRO: Most of it has been written about Bob since the Cowboys made him their very first draft choice. But, perhaps his philosophy of playing defensive tackle is best summed up in this statement he made about the opposition last year: "They belong back at their end of the field, not this end." Lilly has devoted 10 years, six of them All-Pro, to that idea. "I'll tell you," says Giants center Greg Larson, "every time we play the Cowboys I get more convinced that Bob Lilly is the best in the league." Almost always double-teamed, often tripleteamed, Lilly still manages to get through frequently enough to remind everyone that he's still around. And while the offensive line is busy with Bob, the rest of the Cowboys defensive line is left with fairer matchups. "Bob seems to get better and better," says Tom Landry. "He has more know-how than he has ever had before, but it is his enthusiasm for playing which is the most encouraging factor." Says Bob, "Your moves or nothing else are going to work until you run over a few people first. You've got to stomp your guys into the ground a few times to get their respect. Then, the moves may work." Bob has talked about retirement in the past, but now the enthusiasm Landry mentioned seems to have really taken hold. "I may play 10 more years," says Lilly. "I feel great." Landry, adding it all up, says, "A man like this comes along once in a lifetime. He is something even a little bit more than great. Nobody is better than Lilly."

COLLEGE: An All-American tackle at TCU, Bob also was a twotime All-Southwest Conference choice and played in the 1961 All-Star game. Abe Martin said Bob was the best tackle he ever coached. Bob's nickname at TCU, where the school colors are Purple and White, was the "Purple Cloud."

PERSONAL: Born in Throckmorton, Tex., Bob lived there until his family moved to Pendleton, Ore., for his senior year in high school. At Pendleton, Bob made All-State teams in both football and basketball. Bob is married to the former Katharine "Kitsy" Waltman of Fort Worth. The Lillys have three children — Bob Jr. (7-19-62), Katharine (4-22-64) and Christienne (7-21-65). Immediately after the 1971 Super Bowl Bob left his Dallas home to join other NFL players on a tour of service hospitals in the Far East.

He'll leave some cracked heads." Steve caught 40 passes for 696 yards and six touchdowns as a senior flanker after spending two years at tight end. His career totals were 79 receptions for 1,247 yards and seven touchdowns.

PRO: The graffiti on the wall of a Dallas restaurant reads, "Dave Manders' job is a snap." Dave might argue that point. A free agent in 1962, he became discouraged and left training camp. For the next two seasons he played semi-pro football in Grand Rapids, Mich., and Toledo, Ohio, for as little as \$37.50 a game and a maximum of \$100. The day after Thanksgiving, 1963, Dave called the Cowboys' Gil Brandt. "It had been a year-and-a-half since I had talked to him," says Manders, "but he said to come to camp the next summer." Dave did just that, made the 1964 team, was a starter in 1965 and played in the Pro Bowl after the 1966 season. Then, misfortune struck. Dave injured a knee in a pre-season game and missed all of the 1967 campaign. He was backup man to Malcolm Walker in 1968 and 1969, and returned to his starting position last season after Walker was traded. "When we're trying to tell if a player is really putting out," says Ermal Allen, "we compare him with Manders. We know Manders is always giving 100 per cent."

COLLEGE: A teammate of Herb Adderley at Michigan State, Dave was a two-way performer who made honorable mention All-

American as a senior.

PERSONAL: Dave, a native of Milwaukee, was a schoolboy star at Kinsford, Mich. He's married to the former Betty Ashenbrenner and the couple has three children — Mark (10-18-62), Mike (6-18-65) and Catherine Elizabeth (10-3-69). The Manders live in Dallas, where Dave is a radio account executive in the off-season.

MITCHELL, BUDDY Offensive Tackle Mississippi
Ht: 6-5 Wt: 232 Born: 9-10-49 1st Year (D-4 for '71)

In Mitchell, the Cowboys feel they drafted a player who could help them at several positions. "He's very quick and has very good speed," says Red Hickey. "He's the type kid who could play tackle, guard or center." Buddy, from Columbus, Miss., played in the American Bowl at Tampa, Florida.

PRO: Dallas fans voted Craig Morton their "Favorite Cowboy" in 1970 and he was rewarded with a vacation trip to Acapulco. Craig's teammates also let it be known they appreciated his efforts. "We watched him all week in practice and he could hardly walk," said Bob Lilly after a 1970 victory. "But he didn't miss a practice or a meeting. Finally we realized he was going to play. That showed me something." And yet, despite the votes of confidence from fans and teammates and the Cowboys' success, it was a difficult year for the former California All-American. It began with surgery on his right shoulder and ended with surgery on his right elbow. In between came heaping portions of that familiar pro football diet — playing with pain. "The arm feels fantastic," said Morton early in the summer. "The important thing is the shoulder — I feel like I have back the strong arm I once had. And with a bad arm I don't think I had too bad a year." Indeed he didn't. Despite the injury-enforced limits on his effectiveness, Craig wound up No. 5 among all NFL passers and No. 4 among NFC quarterbacks. And he led the Cowboys to the NFC title. "When you draft a quarterback," said Dallas scout Red Hickey after the Cowboys made Morton their first selection in the 1965 draft, "the only question that matters is, 'Can this guy take us to the championship? Is he a championship quarterback?' The answer to Morton is ves."

COLLEGE: An All-American quarterback at California in 1964, Morton was a three-year regular for the Bears under coaches Marv Levy and Ray Willsey. As a senior, he hit 185 of 308 passes for 2,121 yards and 13 touchdowns to rank second to Tulsa's Jerry Rhome, an ex-Cowboy, in NCAA passing. Craig turned down a big baseball bonus to play pro football, and participated in the 1965 All-Star game.

PERSONAL: Craig was raised in Campbell, Calif., where he was an All-State high school player in football, basketball and baseball. He was offered major college scholarships in all three sports. A bachelor. Craig makes his year-around home in Dallas.

PRO: A four-time All-Pro at right tackle, Ralph suddenly found himself faced with learning two new positions in 1970 training camp. First, it was right guard. Then it was left tackle, and that's where he stayed through the season. The moves were designed to find a permanent place for Rayfield Wright, who moved into Ralph's old spot and performed well. Neely, as the Cowboys expected, also performed well. "It's like writing right-handed all your life and then starting to write left-handed," Ralph said of the switch. "But it's fine with me wherever I play as long as we keep winning." Bob Lilly pays tribute to Neely with these words: "Ralph is the only player I've seen who was never a rookie. He moved right in and did the job." That remark must have been pleasing to Ralph, who says: "The greatest thrill in football is Tuesday morning when we review the game films and the head coach says, 'Neely, you did a good job.' Some tackles are weightlifting fanatics. I'm a fanatic on technique. I want to be perfect."

COLLEGE: A two-time All-American at Oklahoma, Ralph lettered three years and started all 20 games as a junior and senior.

PERSONAL: Ralph was born in Little Rock, Ark., but was raised in Farmington, N.M., where he played tackle in football and center in basketball. Ralph and his wife Diane have a son, Dale (12-31-66), and a daughter, Dedra Ann (6-23-69). The Neelys live in Dallas in the off-season, where Ralph is active in oil and real estate investments.

COLLEGE: A three-year regular for Coach Jerry Burns at Iowa, John made All-American in his second year of playing guard after working at fullback as a sophomore. He played in the East-West and Hula bowls and the College All-Star game. John also was the university weightlifting champ at Iowa.

PERSONAL: John was born in Quincy, Mass., and grew up in Amityville, L. I. He now contributes the money he makes from off-season speaking engagements to a scholarship fund that benefits college students from Amityville and other towns. "My parents were good to me but we didn't have much," says John. "The scholarships are just a little monetary way of doing what I can." Of his busy personal appearance schedule, John says: "I wish a Sam Huff or a Rosey Brown had talked to me when I was young. Athletes have no idea how important they are as heroes. I want young people to put out 100 per cent; to accept challenges; to try to be the best; to think, to have hope, courage and pride." John and his wife, the former Iree Van Cleve of Little Rock, Ark., make their home in Dallas where John is active in the public relations field.

NYE, BLAINE Guard Stanford
Ht: 6-4 Wt: 251 Born: 3-29-46 4th Year (D-5 for '68)

PRO: Blaine made rapid progress in 1970, and was right in the middle of things when the Cowboys shuffled their offensive line early in the season looking for the right combination. The final result found Nye firmly entrenched at right guard. He spent the last two years of his collegiate career playing defense, and this probably slowed his development as an offensive player. "After a couple of weeks of my rookie year I think they were about ready to ship me out," says Blaine. "But they kept me around and I got my feet on the ground and stuck."

COLLEGE: Blaine was an offensive lineman as a sophomore, but four days before the season opened his junior year he moved to defense and immediately won a job. His size and speed made the Cowboys figure he was a good bet to make it as a pro. PERSONAL: A physics major, Blaine has a Masters Degree in that field from the University of Washington. Blaine, his wife Annabelle and their two children, Melissa Madeline (2-6-68) and Blaine (12-21-69) make their off-season home in Menlo Park, Calif.

PUGH, JETHRO Defensive Tackle Elizabeth City State Ht: 6-6 Wt: 260 Born: 7-3-44 7th Year (D-11 for '65)

PRO: Ray Schoenke, the veteran Washington Redskins offensive lineman, says: "You can influence Lilly out of the hole. It will take two or three men to get him out of there, but you can do it. That leaves man-to-man blocking on Pugh, though, and he kills you. He is just too tough now for one man to handle." Jethro has come a long way from the days of the 1965 college draft. After the Cowboys took him on the 11th round, a Dallas newspaper headline read: "Who—Or What— Is Jethro Pugh?" Most football fans, and all NFL quarterbacks, know by now. Len Dawson received his introduction to Jethro in the Cowboys' 1970 victory over Dawson's Kansas City Chiefs. Pugh was named AP Defensive Player of the Week for a performance that included four quarterback traps and 11 unassisted tackles. Jethro has at least one personal goal ahead of him—scoring a touchdown. "Every defensive lineman we have (Lilly, Cole, Andrie) has scored a touchdown except me. Each time they score I'm right there waiting for a pitchout, but nobody will throw it to me."

COLLEGE: Jethro went to Elizabeth City State without a scholarship, but earned one after his freshman season and was an all-conference tackle for two years. He also was his team's Most Valuable Lineman his senior season.

PERSONAL: Jethro is a native of Windsor, N. C., where he was a high school football star. He and his wife, the former Beverly Etter of Dallas, have one son, Jethro III (10-20-68), and a daughter, Jethrolyn Jo (3-3-71). Pugh is active in Dallas community affairs, serving as vice president of the Black Knight Youth Foundation, a group of adults who devote much of their spare time to working with teen-agers. Jethro also is 1971 chairman of The Arthritis Foundation's North Texas Victory Team.

PUGH'S COWBOYS RECORDS

REEVES, DAN Running Back South Carolina Ht: 6-1 Wt: 200 Born: 1-19-44 7th Year (FA for '65)

PRO: The things Dan Reeves does to help the Cowboys often can't be found in the statistical summaries. Example: Against Kansas City last season, a play called for Reeves to take the handoff. As the team broke from the huddle, Dan said to Duane Thomas, "Let's switch places and you take it. I have a feeling it might work." Thomas burst into the open past a surprised Craig Morton, and raced 47 yards for a touchdown. Dan himself, filling in for the injured Calvin Hill, found time to carry 16 times for 56 yards and catch two

passes for another 16. "Reeves will perform like that every time you put him in there," said Tom Landry afterwards, "no matter how little he's been playing before." Bad knees, along with the emergence of youngsters like Thomas and Hill, have limited Dan's playing time in recent years. He's had four knee operations. "They're perfect now," he says. "Nothing left in there to go wrong." Dan is in his second season of doubling as offensive backfield coach, and the NFL's youngest coach is getting the job done. "You think you're pretty smart after a few years in the league as a player," says Dan. "But you get into the coaching end and you realize how much work is involved in learning the game. Coaches do most of the work, get little credit, and are like quarterbacks — they get all the blame."

COLLEGE: Dan was a second team All-ACC choice in 1962 and 1964 as South Carolina's quarterback under Coach Marvin Bass. He set 10 school records and threw for 348 yards against Big Eight champion Nebraska in 1964.

PERSONAL: A native of Rome, Ga., Dan grew up in Andersonville, Ga. He married Pamela Ann White in 1964, and the Reeves have three children — Dana (9-21-65), Lee (11-4-67) and Laura (9-19-70).

RENFRO, MEL Cornerback Oregon
Ht: 6-0 Wt: 190 Born: 12-30-41 8th Year (D-2 for '64)

PRO: Seven years in the NFL, seven visits to the Pro Bowl, three times an All-Pro — that's the Mel Renfro story in short form. The versatile former All-American halfback continues to make giant contributions to the Cowboys cause wherever he's called upon to help. Last season Mel moved to cornerback from free safety, teaming with the newly acquired Herb Adderley to make Dallas as strong at the corners as any team in the league. He capped his year by being named Most Valuable Player in the Pro Bowl, streaking 82 and 56 yards to score on punt returns. "I'm an ex-runner from Oregon," Mel

laughed after that performance. "You give me some daylight and I'm going to dance a little." Renfro is the Cowboys' all-time interception leader, with 35, including a 90-yard scoring dash. He has a 100-yard kickoff return to his credit, and is second only to Bob Hayes as a Cowboy punt returner. He saw some action on offense in 1966, and responded with a 6.5 rushing average and a 16.3 average per reception. "If you keep your confidence — mixed with just the right amount of fear to keep you on edge," says Mel, "then you'll come out a winner in the end." His theory continues to pay off. As for playing cornerback, Renfro has this to say: "It keeps you very healthy because you're not in on a lot of contact. If you're a good free safety, you'll be sore most of the season. I don't get as much action at cornerback. They seem to be running the other way."

COLLEGE: One of Oregon's all-time great athletes, Mel was an All-American at halfback and a trackman with bests of 9.6 in the 100, 13.8 in the high hurdles and 25-11% in the long jump. He played in the 1964 All-Star game.

PERSONAL: Mel was born in Houston, but grew up in Portland, Ore., where he was a legendary schoolboy athlete. He was an All-State halfback and a versatile trackman who set state records in the hurdles and the long jump. Mel is married to the former Patricia Burch of Portland. The couple has two boys, Mel Jr. (1-25-64) and Tony (3-29-65), and a girl, Cindy (3-14-68). The Renfros live near the Cowboys' Thousand Oaks, Calif., training camp in the off-season.

Sam, described by Cowboys Scout Red Hickey as "a tremendously strong, tough runner," accomplished two feats in 1970 that will have Dallas fans keeping an eye on him from the start. He broke a pair of New Mexico records set by ex-Cowboys great Don Perkins. Scarber scored 13 touchdowns for 78 points, both figures bettering Perkins' 11-year-oid school marks. Sam led the Western Athletic Conference in rushing with 961 yards, and was the fullback on the All-WAC team.

SMITH, TODY Defensive End Southern California
Ht: 6-5 Wt: 250 Born: 12-24-48 1st Year (D-1 for '71)

Tody Smith, the first defensive lineman since Bob Lilly to be drafted No. 1 by the Cowboys, might not have come to Dallas at all if he had not been hurt early in his senior year at Southern Cal. The younger brother of the Baltimore Colts' Bubba Smith sprained an ankle in the Trojans' second 1970 game and saw action in only four contests all season. Some scouts apparently were leery of his ability to bounce back, and Tody was available when the Cowboys took the 25th pick of the first round. "If he'd had a good senior year," said Tom Landry, "we wouldn't have had a chance for him." An extremely mobile big man, Tody was the fastest runner on the USC squad excluding wide receivers and running backs. A native Texan whose nickname stems from a boyhood tag of "El Toro", Tody played high school football for his dad, W. R. Smith, at Charlton-Pollard in Beaumont.

STAUBACH, ROGER Quarterback Navy Ht: 6-3 Wt: 197 Born: 2-5-42 3rd Year (D-10, future, for '64)

PRO: "Roger potentially is a championship quarterback," says Tom Landry. "He possesses all the qualities." After four years in the Navy and two years backing up Craig Morton, Staubach appeared ready this summer to launch a strong bid for the No. 1 spot. "I feel that Roger will make his first real challenge to the quarterback position," said Landry. "I think his knowledge going into his third year will have increased sufficiently that he will make a major challenge." Roger started four games in his first two years with the Cowboys. Dallas won three of them and in the fourth he was taken out in the second quarter of a loss. "I know I'm going to make it as a quarterback," says Roger. "I want to prove it." The 1963 Heisman Trophy winner has a flamboyant style on the field that belies his quiet civilian nature. "You block and then just lie there," says Walt Garrison of Roger's hair-raising scrambles. "He'll be back sooner or later."

COLLEGE: Roger must be rated as one of the outstanding collegiate players of all time, and certainly as great a figure as ever played for Navy. He won the Heisman Trophy as a junior and set Naval Academy football records that still stand. He hit 67.3 per cent of his passes as a sophomore and his career total was 63.6. He av-

eraged 9.9 yards per attempt in 1962 and 9.2 the following year. His career record for total offense was 4,253 yards. Among other honors, he was named AP and UPI Back of the Year, won the Maxwell Trophy, etc. In addition, he lettered in basketball and was a regular in baseball, hitting .420 one season as a center fielder. Roger captained the All-Star squad at Chicago in 1965.

PERSONAL: Roger's four-hitch in the Navy, ending in 1969, included one year in Vietnam and most of the rest at Pensacola where he was able to play for the base team. He attended Purcell High in Cincinnati, but wasn't a quarterback until his senior season. He was twice All-City in basketball and once each in football and baseball. Roger is married to the former Marianne Hoobler and they have three daughters — Jennifer (6-21-66), Michelle (5-23-68) and Stephanie Marie (6-25-69). Roger deals in Dallas commercial real estate in the off-season.

Stincic backs up Lee Roy Jordan in the middle, and contributed greatly to the Cowboys' 1970 success by playing well enough to let the lightish Lee Roy take it comparatively easy during the pre-season schedule.

COLLEGE: An All-Big Ten selection his last two years at Michigan, Tom was captain his senior year. His leadership qualities were recognized earlier when, as a freshman defensive end, he received an award given annually for that trait.

PERSONAL: Tom grew up in Cleveland, where he attended John Marshall High.

THOMAS, DUANE Running Back West Texas State
Ht: 6-1 Wt: 220 Born: 6-21-47 2nd Year (D-1 for '70)

PRO: When the Cowboys drafted Duane No. 1 for 1970, some eyebrows were raised around the league. After all, didn't Dallas already have Calvin Hill, the best young running back of 1969?

Right, but when Calvin was hurt early in the "70 campaign, there was Duane Thomas ready to step in. And when Calvin was ready to return, he couldn't get his job back. "For Duane to take over Hill's job," said Gil Brandt, "it's like someone beating out Babe Ruth." Thomas wound up as the Cowboys' leading rusher, Pro Football Guide's Rookie of the Year and NFC Offensive Rookie of the Year according to AP and Pro Football Weekly. "He didn't always know where the holes were," says Tom Landry of the strapping youngster with 4.6 speed, "but wherever he went, he made one. He's the best we've had as far as hitting all types of plays and being able to break." Mercury Morris, Duane's teammate at West Texas State, is outspoken in his evaluation of Duane: "I feel this guy has the potential to be another Jim Brown and Gale Sayers combined." Duane suffered a couple of early season setbacks that might have caused a lesser player to lose confidence. Once, he appeared free for a 100-yard kickoff return, only to toss the ball out of bounds as he switched hands. But Duane kept after it and the results speak for themselves. "I try to concentrate on just what I'm doing right then when I'm running," he says. "I don't worry about what I should have done the previous play."

COLLEGE: In three years at West Texas, Duane rushed for 2,378

yards and a 6.0 average.

PERSONAL: Duane attended Dallas Lincoln High School, where he was a standout track athlete (hurdles and sprints) in addition to his football exploits.

THOMAS' COWBOYS RECORDS

THOMAS, ISAAC Defensive Back Bishop College
Ht: 6-2 Wt: 191 Born: 11-4-47 1st Year (D-2 for '71)

"We rate Isaac Thomas the best cornerback in the draft," said Tom Landry of the relatively unknown speedster from Dallas' Bishop College. Isaac, a native of Hot Springs, Ark., faces a formidable task in trying to crack the Cowboys starting lineup. Already established at the corners are veteran All-Pros Mel Renfro and Herb Adderley. "I feel I can make this team," Thomas says. "I have confidence in myself. It can't hurt you to set high goals." Isaac, who has 4.6 speed in the 40, intercepted four passes in 1970, two for touchdowns, and recovered three fumbles. He was named to the NAIA All-District 8 team. He will be tried at wide receiver.

TOOMAY, PAT Defensive End Vanderbilt Ht: 6-5 Wt: 244 Born: 5-17-48 2nd Year (D-6 for '70)

PRO: One of the things the Cowboys coaching staff told Toomay at rookie orientation in 1970 was that he needed to gain weight. His 230 pounds weren't enough to handle defensive end. Pat reported to training camp a few months later at 244 and became what Tom Landry called a "pleasant surprise" who did a fine job in several relief stints. "I study what the offensive linemen do," says Pat, "but

I try not to remember who they are. My gosh, you come into training camp and face Ralph Neely, you have to forget you're playing against Neely or pack up and go home. It'll scare you to death."

COLLEGE: Pat was a three-year letterman for Coach Bill Pace at Vanderbilt and a teammate of Bob Asher, the Cowboys' No. 2 draft choice in 1970. He played in the Blue-Gray game.

PERSONAL: Pat was a high school All-American as a quarter-back at Thomas Edison H. S. in Alexandria, Va., but had to give up that position when he went to college. "I had two problems," he says. "I couldn't throw long, and I couldn't throw short."

TUCKER, WENDELL Wide Receiver

South Carolina State 5th Year (FA for '66)

PRO: The Cowboys remember their new teammate, Wendell Tucker, well. In the first game of the 1969 pre-season he caught six passes for 145 yards as his Los Angeles Rams defeated Dallas, 24-17. Until that time he had been a little-used reserve. "There's no way you can learn this game without playing it," says Wendell, "and you gain your greatest experience when you play against the best. That Cowboy game gave me confidence that I could do the job." Wendell went on to catch 38 passes and score seven touchdowns in 1969. His totals fell off last season, and the Cowboys acquired him along with Billy Truax in the Lance Rentzel trade. Tom Landry calls Tucker "a great deep threat, very explosive and a very dangerous receiver." He was signed by the Rams as a free agent in 1967 after a year on the Kansas City Chiefs' taxi squad.

COLLEGE: Wendell lettered four years in football and track at South Carolina State, interrupting his college career in 1963 to spend two years in military service.

PERSONAL: Born in Philadelphia, Wendell lives in Los Angeles in the off-season and is active in youth work in minority areas.

PRO: Consistency was Billy's forte in his seven seasons with the Los Angeles Rams, and the Cowboys are counting on more of the same from the big LSU graduate. In the five seasons beginning with 1966, Billy caught — in order — 29, 37, 35, 37 and 36 passes. "Billy Truax is one of the best tight ends in football," says Rams quarterback Roman Gabriel. "He is a superb blocker, has the best hands ever and is a clutch player." "He just doesn't drop the ball," says exteammate Jack Pardee. "Not even in practice." That kind of talk pleases the Cowboys, who gave up top wide receiver Lance Rentzel to get Truax and Wendell Tucker from the Rams last spring. Billy originally was drafted by the Cleveland Browns, but was traded to the Rams after a brief tryout as a defensive end and linebacker.

COLLEGE: Billy was an All-Southeastern Conference performer at LSU, beginning his varsity career as a 17-year-old sophomore. The Bayou Bengals played in the Orange, Cotton and Bluebonnet bowls during his tenure at Baton Rouge, and Billy went on to play in the post-season Senior and All-American bowls. He was team captain his senior year.

PERSONAL: Billy was born in Gulfport, Miss., and was a foursport athlete at Holy Cross High School in New Orleans. He and his wife, Nancy, have three children — Kimberly (5-26-65), Rick (8-9-67) and Christopher (4-2-69).

He was a second team All-WAC choice. Rodney was an All-State basketball and football player at Central High in Pueblo, Colo.

WASHINGTON, MARK Ht: 5-11 Wt: 183 Born: 12-28-47 Morgan State 2nd Year (D-13 for '70)

PRO: Mark's big moment in 1970 came against the Washington Redskins in the first of five straight Cowboys victories en route to the Eastern Division title. He took a kickoff at the goalline, dropped it, bobbled it along the ground, finally picked it up and raced 100 yards for a touchdown. The rest of his season wasn't as spectacular, but Mark showed enough promise to make Tom Landry and his staff

very optimistic about the hard-working little guy's future as a cornerback. "There's a park in Baltimore where a lot of the Colts work out during the off-season," says Mark. "I get to cover some of their best receivers. I call it my own personal training camp."

COLLEGE: Mark was co-captain of Morgan State's football team his senior year and intercepted six passes to run his four-year total

to 15.

PERSONAL: Mark and his wife Linda make their off-season home in Baltimore. He's a native of Chicago.

WATERS, CHARLIE Safety Clemson
Ht: 6-1 Wt: 193 Born: 9-10-48 2nd Year (D-3 for '70)

PRO: Cowboys Scout Red Hickey was one of the men in "Draft Central" in Dallas when the third round of the 1970 player selections came up. Hickey pointed to the name of Charlie Waters, a Clemson receiver, and said to Tom Landry: "Tom, I'd take this boy and tell him to start backpedaling. He's a good athlete and he can play defense." Hickey was 100 per cent right, of course. Waters wound up as the Cowboys' starting free safety and his five interceptions led the team. During Super Bowl week, Charlie gave away his age with a remark he made to a writer. "I've been telling Lee Roy Jordan to call at least one safety blitz," the rookie said. "Johnny Unitas has always been my hero, and I figure this way I might get to meet him."

COLLEGE: A quarterback-turned-pass receiver at Clemson, Charlie became the school's No. 3 all-time pass catcher in just 15 games at the position. He grabbed 68 for 1,165 yards.

PERSONAL: Charlie and his bride of less than a year, Mary Ann, live in Central, S.C., in the off-season. He was an eight-letterman in football, baseball and basketball in high school at North Augusta, S.C.

"In this game you don't

get many opportunities," says Claxton. "There just isn't time for them to mess with a guy who can't produce when the opportunity, no matter how small, presents itself. I prepare for every game just like I was going to start."

COLLEGE: Claxton was a tremendous inside runner for Oregon, rushing for 525 yards as a senior in just six games.

PERSONAL: Claxton grew up in Portland, Ore., where he was an All-Stater in football and basketball. A bachelor, he makes his off-season home in Los Angeles.

"One day a long time ago Jack Eskridge, our equipment manager, gave me a tip," says Ron. "He said Sam Baker used to say that anybody could kick with the wind, but that it was a real pro who learned how to kick against it. Ever since then, I have practiced every day only against the wind."

COLLEGE: Widby was the NCAA punting champion as a senior at Tennessee, averaging 43.8, and was an All-American basketball player.

PERSONAL: With the possible exception of Coach Ermal Allen, Ron holds one distinction among the Cowboys family — he is the best golfer. Ron plays to a two handicap and is considering a professional career as a teaching pro. He also played pro basketball, with New Orleans of the ABA in 1967 after he played football in the minors for Oklahoma City. Ron and his wife Joan have two sons, Ronald Scott (11-5-68) and Michael Craig (5-20-71).

WRIGHT, RAYFIELD Tackle Fort Valley State (Ga.)
Ht: 6-6 Wt: 255 Born: 8-23-45 5th Year (D-7 for '67)

PRO: At long last, Rayfield has found a home in the Cowboys lineup. It should mean nothing but bad news for opponents in years to come. Shortly before 1970 training camp, Tom Landry announced that the right tackle spot belonged to Wright. This came after three years of moving Rayfield in and out of offensive tackle, tight end and even defensive end. It also meant that four-time All-Pro Ralph Neely had to switch to left tackle. But the moves paid off, and the Cowboys' offensive line — already one of the best in the business—became even stronger. "I love blocking, love the contact," says Rayfield. "There's a lot of satisfaction in knowing that you're moving your man out of there. Biggest of all is to put my man on the ground— I'm on top of him and the ballcarrier is 10-15 yards downfield." The Cowboys decided they had to find a spot for Wright after his performance against the Rams' Deacon Jones in a 1969 game that Neely missed with an injury. Before the game, someone was telling Rayfield what he would be facing in the great Los Angeles defensive end. "The Deacon," he was told, "is big and strong and mean." "Well," said Rayfield, "so am I."

COLLEGE: From Fort Valley State in Georgia, "Big Tom" was an All-Conference football and basketball player as well as a track man. One of his most impressive track performances was a 50 flat 440.

PERSONAL: Born in Griffin, Ga., Rayfield now makes his home in Dallas. He is married to the former Andrea Joyce Lampkin.

Historical Highlights

1960

NFL FRANCHISE—Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during their first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28). COWBOYS STOCKED—A player pool was set up in a league meeting at L.A., with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

TRAINING STARTS-Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at

Pacific U., in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME—The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 10-16 pre-season game to

San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME—In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club pre-season game, the Cowboys led the World Champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 71-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19). FIRST VICTORY—In a pre-season game at Louisville, Ky., the Cowboys beat New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes of 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith). (August 27).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME—In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth period Steeler

rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED—Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

1961

TRAINING STARTS — Rookies launch training at new campsite—St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN — Scoring ten points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 (Sept. 17).

1962

TRAINING STARTS—Team begins training at new campsite—Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13).

PENALTY HISTORY — For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were detected holding in the end zone on a 99-TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

100-YARD FIRSTS — Cowboys Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth quarter TD's in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia

in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).

1963

SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY—The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE — The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

HOWTON SETS RECORD — Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's alltime receiving mark with a 14-yard catch against Washington (there). Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

ANOTHER HOWTON MARK — Howton breaks another Hutson mark by catching his 490th NFL pass, against NY in Yankee Stadium (Oct. 20). Howton went on to stretch his career total to 503 for 8,459 yards during 1963, then retired.

1964

LANDRY CONTRACT — With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a ten-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

1965

NEELY AWARDED TO COWBOYS—A U.S. District Court Judge ruled the contract of Oklahoma tackle Ralph Neely with Houston invalid. Neely had signed with Houston before the Gator Bowl game; Dallas signed Neely on Jan. 1 (June 22).

FIRST SELLOUT — An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

1966

PLAYOFF BOWL — After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15). NEELY DECISION REVERSED — U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver reverses District Court decision, awards tackle Ralph Neely to Houston (May 18).

MERGER — Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys GM Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, resulting in merger of the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

SCHRAMM ELEVATED — Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

NEELY CASE SOLVED — Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth place picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17).

THE CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys won their first championship,

capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

1967

TEXAS STADIUM — On Dec. 23, owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000. SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP — Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

1968

TEXAS STADIUM - On December 26th, the Tecon Corporation bid of \$17,964,000.00 was accepted by the Irving City Council and it

was full speed ahead.

WIN CAPITOL - For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on December 21st. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

1969

TEXAS STADIUM - On June 29th, Bert Rose was named general

manager of Texas Stadium.

ORIGINALS RETIRE - An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp. all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

REPEAT CAPITOL WINS - Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl. Dallas lost the

Playoff Bowl game in Miami to Los Angeles, 31-0.

1970

TEXAS STADIUM - Work continued on Texas Stadium, with the 65,000-seat "open-air" domed structure to be ready for the 1971

season.

FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS - The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

FIRST NFC TITLE - The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11-year history on Jan. 3 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super

Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

TEXAS STADIUM - The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving home.
