## THE MANAGEMENT



MURCHISON/SCHRAMM

The year 1973 marks the 14th season for the Dallas Cowboys and their 14th season under the direction of Board Chairman Clint W. Murchison Jr. and President-General Manager Texas E. Schramm.

Murchison was awarded the expansion franchise in January of 1960. He named Schramm as General Manager, Tom Landry as Head Coach and Gil Brandt to direct the scouting operation. The Cowboys introduced a new era in Dallas sports whose high-water mark thus far was the World Championship earned at Super Bowl VI.

Schramm controls the day-to-day operations of the club. He was named President in 1966, retaining the title of General Manager.

Working closely with Schramm are Brandt, now Vice President for Personnel Development, and Al Ward, Vice President for Administration. Ward joined the Cowboys as Public Relations Director in 1966 and became assistant general manager the next year. Both Brandt and Ward were named vice presidents following the 1970 season.

Schramm holds a BA degree in Journalism from the University of Texas, acquired between 1939 and 1947 with time out for a four-year hitch in the Air Transport Command where he made Captain.

While still in school, Schramm was a member of the sports staff of the Austin American Statesman and later was sports editor of that paper.

In 1947 he joined the Los Angeles Rams as publicity director, and in a 10-year career there rose to general manager.

Schramm left the Rams in 1957 to join CBS as Assistant Director of Sports and was there until coming to the Cowboys.

One of Schramm's major assets has been his ability as a sound judge of men. For instance, he brought Pete Rozelle into pro football as publicity man for the Rams.

Aside from the development of the Cowboys, Schramm's foremost achievements have been his work with scouting systems, both with the Rams and Cowboys, and the merger of the AFL and NFL.

Schramm and Lamar Hunt, owner of the Kansas City Chiefs, were the driving forces in the merger.

## THE COACH



What a difference a decade makes. There was a time when Tom Landry and his Dallas Cowboys would have been able to gaze with pride on a 10-4 record and a trip to the NFL playoffs.

Those exact results in 1972, however, generated nothing so much as a determination to do better next time. The Cowboys have reached the point where nothing short of winning the Super Bowl will do.

"Going after a goal sometimes seems more important than the goal itself," said Landry, after a thorough analysis of the '72 campaign. "It's the struggle, the challenge.

"There was something missing on our football team last year. I believe it was caused by the fact we won the Super Bowl the year before and were a little bit satisfied, which is natural for most people.

"This club has got to reshape itself," Landry asserted. "It's got to become a team again and get together again. Our work is ahead of us."

### CORNER TURNED IN '65

Landry is not a man who fears a tough assignment. He and the Cowboys came to Dallas together in 1960 and promptly posted a record of 0-11-1. There was room for improvement.

By 1965 the record improved to 7-7. In 1966 it was 10-3-1 and the Cowboys qualified for the playoffs for the first time. They've been there ever since, a record seven consecutive appearances. Landry's totals, beginning with that pivotal 1966 season, are 73 victories, 23 losses and two ties.

"The excitement and challenges you have every day make a man enjoy this game," says Landry. "You're going to have disappointments and it's rewarding to overcome them."

In line with that philosophy, Landry in the spring of 1973 had the look of a man who couldn't wait to get started on a new project.

"I'm looking forward more to this year than last year," he admitted. "It's going to be more of a challenge."

Dick Nolan, the San Francisco 49ers coach who was Landry's teammate on the New York Giants and an assistant of his at Dallas, remembers the way Landry approached a challenge in his playing days.

"As a defensive back," Nolan says, "he wasn't that fast. You'd look at him and think you could beat him.

"But you'd get there and you'd end up fighting for your doggone life. He could knock your head off."

"Coach Landry will never be a loser," says Cowboys tight end Billy Truax, "simply because he refuses to lose. He's a solid individual, like the Rock of Gibraltar."

### 100 WINS IN SIGHT

Despite those frustrating early seasons when a less determined man would have thrown in the towel, Landry ranked No. 10 on the list of the NFL's all-time winningest coaches heading into the 1973 season. He was fifth among active coaches, and needed only two wins to reach the 100-victory mark.

"I can remember times when Tom would tell me this or that would happen," says the 49ers' Nolan. "To me, it might not be logical at the time. But nine times out of 10 it would happen. Sometimes it was almost, well, spooky."

Tom was born in Mission, Tex., on Sept. 11, 1924. He was an All-Regional fullback at Mission High before enrolling at the University of Texas.

After one semester at Texas, Landry went into the Air Corps and flew 30 B-17 missions over Germany with the Eighth Air Force.

Following his discharge as a 1st Lieutenant in November of 1945, Tom returned to Texas where he earned All-Southwest Conference honors as a junior and co-captained the Longhorns as a senior. Those Texas teams defeated Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl.

### SPARKED GIANTS DEFENSE

Landry joined the old New York Yankees of the All-America Conference in 1949, moving to the Giants in 1950. He was a mainstay in the Giants' defensive backfield through 1955, the last two years as player-coach. He was All-Pro in 1954.

Retiring as a player following the 1955 season, Tom was the Giants' defensive coach through 1959. Giants Head Coach Jim Lee Howell called him "the best defensive coach in the business."

Tom, who received his industrial engineering degree from the University of Houston in 1952, lives in Dallas. He and his wife Alicia have three children — Tom Jr., 23 (a University of Texas law student); Kitty, 20, and Lisa, 15.

Tom devotes much of his spare time to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and is the current president of the National FCA. He also is serving as 1973 State American Cancer Society chairman.

Last May, Landry was granted the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters by California Lutheran College.

### ERMAL ALLEN Special Assistant

Allen is the "inside man" on the Dallas coaching staff, heading the Cowboys' Research and Development Department in its study and evaluation of all players and teams in the NFL.

Ermal quarterbacked the University of Kentucky from 1939 through 1941 and played on the Fort Benning and Army All-Star teams during World War II. After the war he spent one year in the old All-America Conference as a Cleveland Browns defensive back in 1947.

Allen returned to his alma mater in 1948 and remained there as an assistant coach for 14 years under Paul Bryant ('48-'53) and Blanton Collier ('54-'61). He joined the Cowboys in 1962 and, along with Offensive Coordinator Jim Myers, is a senior member of Tom Landry's staff.

Ermal, born on Christmas Day, 1920, is the best golfer in the Cowboys organization. He is a two-time Kentucky Amateur champion, defeating Bobby Nichols in 1955 and Frank Beard in 1958.

Ermal and his wife Allie have a son, two daughters and two grandchildren.

### MIKE DITKA Receivers

Ditka joined the Cowboys staff last winter, announcing his retirement as a player after 12 years in the NFL, the last four of them with Dallas.

Everybody's All-America at the University of Pittsburgh, Mike became the prototype of the modern tight end after the Chicago Bears drafted him No. 1 in 1961. His career totals show 427 receptions for 5,913 yards and 43 touchdowns. No tight end has topped those records.

The Aliquippa, Pa., native (10/18/39) always was noted for his aggressiveness on the field, and he admits that attitude will carry over into his coaching. "I'll probably coach about like I played," Ditka said. "I don't know any other way. You have to work hard, and I think I can do that."

Mike and his wife Marge have three sons and a daughter.

## **ED HUGHES**

### **Offensive Backfield**

When Tom Landry named Hughes offensive backfield coach last spring, it marked a reunion for the two. Landry coached Hughes from 1956 through 1958 when Ed played cornerback for the New York Giants.

Hughes is the most experienced pro coach on Landry's staff. He was with the Dallas Texans (1960-62), the Denver Broncos (1963), the Washington Redskins (1964-67) and the San Francisco 49ers (1968-70) before becoming head coach of the Houston Oilers for the 1971 season. He was with the St. Louis Cardinals in '72.

Ed played offensive and defensive halfback at Tulsa and was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1954. He spent two seasons with the Rams before moving to the Giants.

A native of Buffalo, N. Y. (10/23/27), Ed and his wife Nancy have four daughters and a son.

## **JIM MYERS**

### **Offensive Coordinator**

Jim is in his 12th season with the Cowboys, joining Tom Landry's staff in 1962 after head coaching stints at Iowa State and Texas A&M.

Concentrating on the offensive line, Myers' tutelage has paid off in All-Pro recognition for tackles Rayfield Wright and Ralph Neely and guards John Niland and Blaine Nye. Center Dave Manders, the other veteran member of the Cowboys' forward wall, has played in the Pro Bowl.

Myers is a native of Madison, W. Va. (11/12/21), who was a standout lineman at Tennessee in 1941-42 and at Duke in the Marine V-12 program in 1943.

Jim was an assistant coach at Wofford College, Vanderbilt and UCLA before becoming a head coach. He and his wife Carolyn have three daughters and four grandchildren.

## **GENE STALLINGS**

### **Defensive Backfield**

Stallings is in his second season with the Cowboys after seven years as head coach at Texas A&M.

Gene is a Paris, Tex., native (3/2/35) and was an All-Southwest Conference end at Texas A&M under Paul Bryant. He was a tri-captain on Bryant's undefeated 1956 team.

After one season as student assistant at A&M, Gene moved with Bryant to Alabama and was assistant head coach there when the chance came to return to his alma mater in 1965.

Gene and his wife Ruth Ann have four daughters and a son.

**ERNIE STAUTNER**  
**Defensive Coordinator**

Since Ernie joined the Dallas staff in 1966, the Cowboys have led their league or conference in rushing defense six out of seven years. The "Doomsday Defense" began to assert itself almost from the day Stautner arrived on the scene.

A star defensive tackle with the Pittsburgh Steelers for 15 years, despite being "only" 6-0 and 235 pounds, Ernie was voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame immediately upon becoming eligible in 1970. He played in nine Pro Bowl games.

Ernie is a native of Calm, Bavaria (4/2/25), who grew up in Albany, N. Y. After serving in the Marine Corps from 1943 through 1946 he was a football star at Boston College.

Ernie and his wife Helen have a son and two daughters.

**JERRY TUBBS**  
**Linebackers**

Jerry is the only "original" Cowboy still with the organization. He came to the club in 1960 as a middle linebacker and played in Dallas for eight years before joining the coaching staff in 1968.

Born in Breckenridge, Tex., on Jan. 23, 1935, Jerry was an All-America center-linebacker for the 1954-56 Oklahoma teams that never lost a game. He received the Walter Camp Award as the nation's outstanding player in '56.

Jerry was the No. 1 draft choice of the Chicago Cardinals in 1957 and also played for the San Francisco 49ers before settling in Dallas in '60.

Jerry and his wife Marlene have a son and a daughter.

**DICK MANSPERGER**  
**Player Personnel Director**

Mansperger is in his third season as director of the Cowboys' far-flung scouting operations and in his eighth year with the club.

Dick, 40, graduated from Arizona State in 1958. He played for Dan Devine, now coach of the Green Bay Packers. Mansperger was head coach for two years at Palo Verde Junior College in Blythe, Calif., moving on to assistant coaching jobs at West Texas, Arizona State, UCLA and Iowa.

He joined the Cowboys as a scout in 1966.

## **ALVIN ROY** **Strength Coach**

Roy joined the staff last spring after earlier stints with the San Diego Chargers and Kansas City Chiefs. He supervised the Cowboys' off-season conditioning program and will continue to work with the club throughout the regular season.

Alvin has trained or managed several weightlifting teams in international competition, including the American team which won the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki.

A native of Baton Rouge, La., Roy owns a health studio there.

## **DON COCHREN** **Trainer**

Don is in his ninth season with the Cowboys, joining the club in 1965 after experience in college, military and Canadian football training.

A graduate of Purdue, Don earned his physical therapy certificate at Pennsylvania. The 41-year-old Cochren spent two years as trainer at Case Institute in Cleveland, four years with the Toronto Argonauts and two years as a physical therapy officer in the Air Force.

Don and his wife Imogene have three daughters and two sons.

## **KEN LOCKER** **Assistant Trainer**

Ken is in his first season as assistant trainer after serving from 1969 through 1972 in the North Texas State University athletic department.

Ken, 21, was an assistant trainer at North Texas and also put in some time as interim head trainer when the Eagles' Skip Cox left to become Baylor's trainer.

## **BUCK BUCHANAN** **Equipment Manager**

Buchanan joined the Cowboys last spring after 20 years in the Air Force, with most of that time spent supervising and maintaining military athletic programs.

For the past four years, SMSgt. Buchanan was Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of Athletics and Programs at the U. S. Air Force Academy Prep School in Colorado Springs. He was awarded the Bronze Star for his performance during a 1968-69 tour of duty in Thailand.

Buck, 40, and his wife Geraldine have a son and a daughter.

**PRO:** John played in all 14 games as a rookie, seeing most of his action on special teams. "He's aggressive," says Linebackers Coach Jerry Tubbs, "a great competitor." "This will be a key year for Babinecz," says Tom Landry. "We hope he'll blossom into the kind of player we think he can be."

**COLLEGE:** John was a three-year letterman at Villanova.

**PERSONAL:** John and his wife Valerie live in Dallas, where he continued the work with handicapped children he began in Philadelphia. He's a regular visitor to William B. HT: 6-1 • WT: 190 • BORN: 3/3/51 • (FA FOR '72)

**PRO:** Barnes was the lone free agent to make the squad in 1972, and he showed signs that he might follow in the footsteps of other non-draftees who have contributed to the Cowboys cause over the years. "He's fundamentally sound," says Tom Landry. "He has good reactions and good foot action and this would indicate he might be a player. We have confidence in him."

**COLLEGE:** Benny played for Stanford's two Rose Bowl winners, starting 24 consecutive games for the Indians under current Denver Broncos Coach John Ralston. He was a free safety in college, earning All-Coast honors.

**PERSONAL:** A native of Lufkin, Tex., Benny and his wife Joyce returned to Stanford during the off-season where he completed work on his degree in history and assisted in spring football practice.

**PRO:** Bateman's rookie year was something of a disappointment as he averaged just 38.2 yards a punt. A sprained ankle in the second game of the season slowed his progress, however, and Tom Landry remained optimistic about Marv's future. "He has fine potential," said Landry, "the potential to lead the league. His average was poor last year, but few of his punts were returned and he did a good job in effective field position."

**COLLEGE:** Marv led the nation in punting in both 1970 and 1971, averaging 48.1 as a Utah senior.

**PERSONAL:** Marv married the former Sharman Weed during the off-season. He's a native of Salt Lake City.

**PRO:** The 1972 season was the most frustrating of Cole's pro career, both from a team and personal standpoint. He suffered a knee injury in the fourth game of the year, against Pittsburgh, and didn't return to the starting lineup until game No. 12, at St. Louis. "It's a terribly long season when you're not contributing anything," says Larry. "I had never sat on the bench in my life and I don't want to again. I want to be out there." The Cowboys want him out there, too. Says Tom Landry, "Larry Cole is just a real consistent performer, solid as a rock. He does things well every game and constantly gives us great effort." Cole came to the Cowboys as a 16th-round draft choice in 1968 and suddenly found himself in the starting lineup when Willie Townes was injured. Except for last season's injury-enforced idleness, Larry has been there ever since. While noted for his steady play, Cole has scored three touchdowns — all against the Washington Redskins. "He's probably the most underrated defensive lineman in the game," says Redskins guard John Wilbur.

**COLLEGE:** Larry was spotted by the Cowboys at the University of Hawaii, where he transferred after first attending the Air Force Academy. Perhaps encouraged by their success with Cole, the Cowboys drafted two more Hawaii players (Golden Richards and John Conley) in 1973.



**PERSONAL:** Larry, his wife Linda and their children, Michael Anthony (11/3/70) and Christina (3/18/73), live in the Dallas suburb of Bedford where he has a commercial real estate business, Nekom, Inc. Larry barely lost in the race for a Bedford City Council post last spring. He is a native of Granite Falls, Minn.

By the time Jack recovered from that, Roger Staubach had been activated and Concannon spent the rest of the year on the future list. In evaluating the 1973 quarterback situation, Tom Landry said, "In the past we thought Jack was a good quarterback. If he can regain the edge he once had, he could become a factor in our plans."

**COLLEGE:** Jack was a strong runner as well as passer at Boston College before being drafted No. 2 by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1964.

PRO: One of the Cowboys' toughest losses in 1972 was a 24-20 setback at Washington in the sixth game of the season, spearheaded by the Redskins' great running back Larry Brown. Afterwards, Tom Landry said: "The only difference between Dave Edwards and Larry Brown was that Dave didn't have the ball under his arm. If he had, he might have won the game for us. Dave was the best football player on the field." Linebackers Coach Jerry Tubbs says, "The thing about Dave is that I don't remember his playing a bad game in a big game. He's a winner." After the Washington game Tubbs tried to explain just how well Edwards had played. "The way I grade it," said Jerry, "if a linebacker gets a plus-3 or 4 he's had an above-average game. If he gets a zero, he's done an adequate job. Dave got a plus-9, better than any linebacker I've ever had." Edwards, the Cowboys' strongside linebacker, spends much of his workday battling opposing tight ends and seldom can be found in the spotlight. "Since I've never been in it, I don't miss it," Dave says. "I get along pretty well the way I am."

COLLEGE: Dave was an All-Southeastern Conference end at Auburn, but no pro team drafted him and he became one of the first of the Cowboys' free agent "finds."

PERSONAL: Dave was born in Columbia, Ala., grew up in Abbeville, Ala., and now lives in Dallas. He and his wife Gail have two sons, Chris (4/11/69) and Michael (10/6/70). Dave is proprietor of a new restaurant-lounge in north Dallas called The Handlebar.

"This is the year Fitzgerald could make a serious challenge for a starting assignment," said Tom Landry in a pre-season look at the team. "He'll be challenging Manders." Fitzgerald spent a year on the Cowboys' taxi squad after being drafted fourth in 1970. Hard work, including diligence in the Dallas off-season conditioning program, has put him in a position to bid for a spot on the offensive line Landry calls "the equal of any in football."

**COLLEGE:** Fitzgerald played tackle at Boston College, an alma mater he shares with Defensive Coordinator Ernie Stautner, running back Bill Thomas and quarterback Jack Concannon.

**PRO:** Fritsch set Dallas records for field goals (21) and longest field goal (54 yards) in 1972, but Tom Landry is convinced the stocky Austrian has his best days ahead. "Before he's through," says Landry, "Fritsch will rank with the best kickers in the league. He has power and accuracy and he's a competitor. He's been in pro sports a long time and conducts himself like a pro. He doesn't let the misses bother him." The highlight of Toni's year came in the Divisional Playoff at San Francisco when his tricky, right-foot-behind-left-foot onside kick set up the winning touchdown. He says, "Every time I am on the field I say, 'I am the best.' You cannot make every kick, but you must believe you can. If you don't think so, better you should stay home." In 16 NFL regular season games (two in 1971 before an injury sidelined him, and all 14 last year), Fritsch is 38-for-38 on extra points and 15-for-15 on field goals from the 30-yard line and closer.

**PERSONAL:** Toni starred on the Austrian National and Rapid soccer teams for eight years before a Cowboy scouting delegation signed him in Vienna in the spring of 1971. That summer, he kicked in the first American football game he had seen. Toni, his wife Sonja

and their children Hans (9/11/65) and Melissa Alexandra (6/15/72) live in Dallas. He makes frequent trips to Europe to purchase antiques for his importing and auctioning business.

**PRO:** Garrison had his best all-around year in 1972, totaling 1,174 yards rushing and receiving and scoring 10 touchdowns. He's the Cowboys' No. 3 all-time rusher (behind Don Perkins and Calvin Hill) and their No. 8 all-time receiver. Walt had his normal quota of injuries in '72, but as usual they didn't keep him out of the lineup. One was a 16-stitch cut in a finger received while pursuing his favorite hobby, whittling. "Walt's the kind of a guy who never shows up on the injury report," says Tom Landry, "no matter how bad he's hurting." Garrison played in his first Pro Bowl in January, just a few days after suffering a gash in his face while bulldogging a steer. Garrison underplays his toughness with a wry sense of country humor that keeps the Cowboys loose. Examples? After a deep leg bruise in '71: "Let's see, if I was standing on a map of the United States, facing Canada, then it would be on the north side of my east leg." Recalling the 1966 College All-Star Game: "The Packers beat us like a borrowed mule." After a tiring practice: "I'm so low I could crawl under a snakes' belly with a top hat on." Describing a touchdown pass play: "The linebacker was supposed to cover me but slipped down. It ain't hard for me to outrun a guy on the ground."

**COLLEGE:** A two-time All-Big Eight choice at Oklahoma State, Walt played in the East-West, Senior Bowl and College All-Star games. Part of his bonus for signing with the Cowboys was a horse trailer.

**PERSONAL:** Walt rides the professional rodeo circuit in the off-season, bulldogging steers. "Me being a football player doesn't mean a thing to rodeo people," he says. "Rodeo people only want to know what steer you've drawn, or what time you're riding. It's the only sport with no doctor, no trainer, no lawyer. You put your money up and that's it." Walt, his wife Pam and son Phillip Martin (6/5/69) live in Dallas. He's a native of Lewisville, Tex.

## Cornell Green • 34

**PRO:** With the retirement last spring of George Andrie and Chuck Howley, Green became No. 2 in seniority among the Cowboys. Only Bob Lilly, whose career began in 1961, has been around longer than Cornell. And like Lilly, Green has never missed a game, playing in 154 in a row through his first 11 seasons. Cornell's story serves as an inspiration to young players coming into the league without a mountain of press clippings. He was a basketball player at Utah State, and the Cowboys signed him as a free agent with no assurance that he had football ability. Within five seasons, Green was an All-Pro cornerback. In 1970 he switched to strong safety and played in the last two Pro Bowls at that position. "Cornell is solid at strong safety," says Tom Landry. "He has a little age on him, but at that particular position it is more know-how and experience than anything else. He can continue to play the position well." Green intercepted two passes in 1972 to run his career total to 32, second only to Mel Renfro in Dallas history.

**COLLEGE:** Cornell averaged more than 20 points a game in his three varsity seasons at Utah State and was an All-American as a sophomore in 1960. He was a three-time All-Skyline Conference selection.

**PERSONAL:** Cornell was born in Oklahoma City and raised in Richmond, Calif., where he was an all-star football fullback and basketball player in high school. For the past three years he spent the off-season working in the Cowboys' scouting department. One of his four brothers, Pumpsie, was a major league baseball player. Cornell, his wife Betty and their sons Randy (9/11/62) and Ronnie (3/7/67) live in Dallas.

"I aim at something on the other end of the field," says Cliff, "like a flag or a red cushion in the end zone seats, and set my course for it. Of course, the blocking is the main thing. If I don't get it, I'm easy raw meat." Says Landry, "He just plays at one speed, and that's full speed."

**COLLEGE:** Cliff played football at little Ouachita (WASH-etaw) Baptist College in Arkadelphia, Ark., and was overlooked in the 1970 collegiate draft. The Cowboys saw him in two game films and signed him as a free agent.



**PERSONAL:** A native of Fayetteville, Ark., Cliff and his wife Linda make their home in Dallas. He was one of several NFL players to make a State Department-sponsored tour of military bases and hospitals in Thailand following the 1972 season.

**PRO:** Hayes had never experienced anything like it as an athlete. The 1972 season is one he would just as soon forget. For the first time in his pro career, Bob caught no touchdown passes.

In seven previous seasons he had caught fewer than 10 only twice. "Bobby had his best training camp ever for us last year," says Tom Landry. "But toward the latter part he pulled a muscle and it continued to bother him for a few weeks. I think he lost his confidence after he dropped a couple of deep passes, and he just never did recover." Alternating with Ron Sellers, Hayes caught only 15 passes all year, by far the lowest total of his career. Landry is confident that Hayes, the Cowboys' all-time leading receiver, punt returner and scorer, will bounce back. "Hayes has been a great asset to us in the past and I don't think there's any question he'll be back," the coach said. "He was in a slump, but he'll come back and play well for us."

**COLLEGE:** Bob was a running back at Florida A&M, but gained his greatest fame with his track exploits. He ran the 100 in 9.1, a record that's never been beaten, and won two gold medals in the 1964 Olympics at Tokyo.

**PERSONAL:** Bob set out to prove, following the 1972 season, that he had lost none of his speed. Running in special 40-yard match races on the pro track circuit, he won 15 of 16 against other NFL speedsters. Included was a 4.3 clocking when he nipped Mel Gray of the Cardinals in St. Louis. His lone loss was to Cliff Branch of the Oakland Raiders when he ran a 4.8 the day after a heavy weightlifting session in Dallas. He was consistently in the 4.4-4.5 range. Bob and his wife Altamease live in Dallas with their daughter Adrienne LaRori (12/31/68). Bob was born in Jacksonville, Fla., and is associated with Consolidated Wig Corporation in Dallas.

## Calvin Hill • 35

**RUNNING BACK • YALE • 5th YEAR**  
**HT: 6-4 • WT: 227 • BORN: 1/2/47 • (D-1 FOR '69)**

**PRO:** Ever since Hill was named 1969 Rookie of the Year, Dallas fans wondered what he could accomplish if he had a full season free of injury. They found out in 1972 when Calvin became the

Cowboys' first 1,000-yard rusher, gaining 1,036 yards on a record 245 carries. He also led the team in receiving, with 43 catches, totaled nine touchdowns and threw a 55-yard touchdown pass. "I'm less prone to run over people now," says the big Ivy Leaguer. "If I can get around them, I don't try to run over them any more." As a result, Calvin for the first time was able to play all 14 games and the statistics speak for themselves. "I don't see any reason why Calvin shouldn't gain 1,000 yards again," said Tom Landry. "He's the key to our future as far as the running back situation is concerned." Despite a series of injuries that cut his playing time in half in 1970 and 1971 (and caused him to miss the last three games of his rookie season), Hill ranks as the Cowboys' No. 2 all-time rusher. Calvin turning the corner is an awesome sight. "He's so big and fast," says Landry, "sometimes it looks like he's stopped and he'll fall another four or five yards."

**COLLEGE:** Calvin accounted for more than 2,600 yards total offense at Yale as his three varsity teams had records of 4-5, 8-1 and 8-0-1. In track, he had a long jump of 25-1½ and a triple jump of 51-5¼.

**PERSONAL:** Calvin is 1973 National Sports Chairman for the National Association for Retarded Children and spent much of the off-season in work for that cause. Calvin, his schoolteacher wife Janet and son Grant Henry (10/5/72) live in Dallas. Grant Henry was born the week of the Pittsburgh game, and Calvin celebrated with a touchdown run, a 55-yard scoring pass and 108 yards rushing in a 17-13 Dallas victory.

"I don't think Lee Roy has ever played better for us," said Tom Landry after the season. "He gave leadership and he was outstanding." Jordan makes up for his lack of great size with the experience of 10 years in the NFL and an extremely aggressive style of play. "I'm not a mean player," he says. "I like to think I'm aggressive. If I take a fair shot at a man it reflects my dedication. I try to hit him as hard as I can because he would do the same to me. That's what this game is about — hitting."

**COLLEGE:** Named the nation's outstanding lineman his senior year at Alabama, Lee Roy capped his All-America season by making 31 tackles against Oklahoma in the 1963 Orange Bowl. "If he stays in bounds," said Paul Bryant, "Lee Roy will get him."

**PRO:** Here is an excerpt from Blackie Sherrod's column in the Nov. 12, 1972, edition of the Dallas Times Herald. "Portrait of a Pro: Two plays remaining in Cowboy-Cardinal game. Cowboys had victory sacked. Gary Cuozzo rolled out, futile pass, meaningless play, yet Dallas defender charged through, pursued, made desperate diving tackle from behind as if it were game-deciding moment. Hurt knee on play, limped to sidelines, bent over in pain, hands on knees. Number on back: 74." Lilly played hurt throughout the '72 season, but he played. He ran his consecutive game streak to 168. "Bob Lilly, if he's on the field, is better than most," said Tom Landry. "When he's healthy, he's better than anybody." Said Lilly, reviewing the leg and back miseries that haunted him all season, "It was a struggle just to stay alive in there. The thing that really bothered me is that I felt I'd let down my teammates." Bob spent the off-season regaining his health, and looked ready to make his 13th NFL campaign a big one. "What hell he creates," says St. Louis tackle Bob Reynolds. "He forces the running back to go the other way. He may not make the tackle, but he makes the play." Guard Tom Luken of Philadelphia, after meeting Lilly in his first pro game, said: "I learned more today than in nine years of high school and college football. He's everything they say he is." Landry sums it up. "There won't be another Bob Lilly in my time. You're observing a man who will become a legend."

**COLLEGE:** Bob was an All-American and two-time All-Southwest Conference selection at Texas Christian. He was the first player drafted by the Cowboys, since they did not participate in the 1960 college selections.

**PERSONAL:** Bob and his wife Ann live in Dallas, where he is active in several businesses including Bob Lilly's Other Place, a new club near Love Field. Bob was born in Throckmorton, Tex., and lived there until his family moved to Pendleton, Ore., for his senior year in high school. He was an Oregon All-Stater in football and basketball. Bob's children are Bob Jr. (7/19/62), Katharine (4/22/64) and Christienne (7/21/65).

**PRO:** In 1972, Morton once again came through when the Cowboys needed him desperately. Roger Staubach's shoulder injury early in the pre-season thrust Craig back into the spotlight and he responded like a pro. His 185 completions broke Don Meredith's club record. "Craig played better than he ever had for us," said Tom Landry. "He's a more mature quarterback than he's ever been. He knows what he wants to do and he does it. Without Morton we would not have been close to the playoffs. We would have been completely out of contention." For the second time in three years, Craig was voted Most Popular Cowboy by the fans. And for the first time since early in the 1969 campaign his passing arm, which underwent surgery following the '69 and '70 seasons, was as strong as it was when the Cowboys drafted him back in 1965. "Here's a guy who sat on the bench and patiently waited for his chance," said Dale Hackbart of the St. Louis Cardinals. "He didn't cut down the system nor Roger. That's one of the reasons he was able to step in and run the club when Roger got hurt." As the Cowboys prepared for the 1973 season, Morton and Staubach again were battling for the starting job.

**COLLEGE:** Craig was an All-America quarterback at California in 1964, playing in the same backfield with major league baseball player Mike Epstein. Morton turned down a baseball bonus offer to join the Cowboys.

**PERSONAL:** Bachelor Craig lives in Dallas where he is a partner in Wellington's, a restaurant-lounge. He was raised in Campbell, Calif., earning All-State honors in high school football, basketball and baseball.

"Training camp was a painful experience for him last year, coming off that broken leg, but he stayed in there and got the job done." Says Neely, "I'm still not as good at left tackle as I was on the right side, but I'm approaching that level. I think I'll achieve it."

**COLLEGE:** Ralph twice was an All-American at Oklahoma and a three-year letterman.

**PERSONAL:** Ralph was born in Little Rock, Ark., but grew up in Farmington, N. M., where he starred as a high school football and basketball player. "Nobody can actually reach that 100 per cent," John says, "but you have to shoot for it. The more you try the more you'll achieve." In his prime at 29, Niland's achievements already make up an impressive list. He even scored a touchdown in 1972, recovering a Dallas fumble in the end zone against Philadelphia. "My job is to hit the guy across the line on every play and drive him back as far as I can," John says. "It's that simple."

**COLLEGE:** John was a fullback as a sophomore at Iowa, then moved to guard where he was an All-American as a senior. He played in the East-West and Hula Bowl games as well as the 1966 College All-Star game. John was university weightlifting champion at Iowa.

**PERSONAL:** John was born in Quincy, Mass., and grew up in Amityville, N. Y. He and his wife Iree live in Dallas where he is active in a number of business ventures. John contributes money he

When the Cowboys were preparing to play Pittsburgh last year, Blaine was asked about facing Joe Greene. "I have one great advantage," said Nye. "He's never heard of me." Yes, was the reply, but didn't Blaine enjoy the challenge of going against one of the best? "Not me," he said. "I'd rather block a dog any day." Be that as it may, Nye has established himself as one of the better guards in the NFL. "He's a solid football player," says Tom Landry. "He's very important to our success."

**COLLEGE:** After playing offense his sophomore year at Stanford, Blaine was moved to the defensive line for his junior and senior seasons.

**PERSONAL:** Blaine, his wife Annabelle and their children Melissa Madeline (2/6/68) and Blaine (12/21/69) live in Menlo Park, Calif., during the off-season. 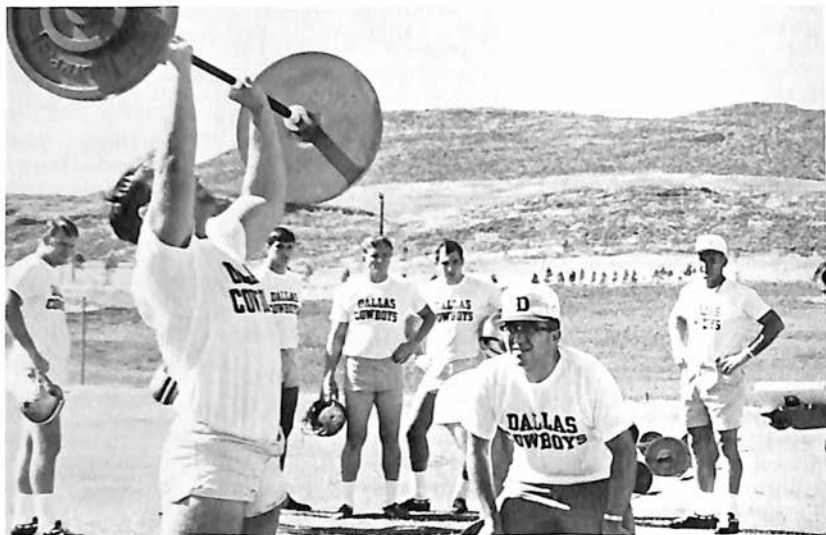
to know that he's arrived when the other teams start ganging up on him. "Baltimore double-teamed him nine times last year," says Stautner, recalling a 21-0 Dallas victory. "He had four traps and nine unassisted tackles. It's pretty tough to get two All-Pros from the same defensive line, but Jethro is very deserving." Few predicted that kind of success for Pugh when he was drafted 11th in 1965. "Who — Or What — Is Jethro Pugh?" headlined one Dallas newspaper. After eight years, the word is beginning to get out. "He's probably the best or next-best left tackle in the league along with Joe Greene of Pittsburgh," says the Washington Redskins' John Wilbur. "Pugh is just a great athlete who can do everything." Says Tom Landry, "Jethro pretty much held our line together last season."

**COLLEGE:** It took a while for Pugh to gain recognition in college, too. He enrolled at Elizabeth City State without a scholarship. He ended up as a two-time All-Conference tackle and was named his team's Most Valuable Lineman as a senior.

**PERSONAL:** Jethro, his wife Beverly and children, Jethro III (10/20/68) and Jethrolyn Jo (3/3/71) live in Dallas where he is associated with the Pepsi-Cola Co. in public relations. Jethro joined teammates Rayfield Wright and Pat Toomay on a tour of Far East military bases, hospitals and schools last May.

# Mel Renfro • 20

**CORNERBACK • OREGON • 10th YEAR**  
**HT: 6-0 • WT: 190 • BORN: 12/30/41 • (D-2 FOR '64)**



**PRO:** Until an old ankle injury started acting up late in the 1972 season, Renfro was playing his position so well he had comparatively little to do. Through the first 10 games, just 36 passes were thrown in Mel's right cornerback area. Six were complete. "When you have Mel Renfro at one cornerback," says Tom Landry, "the other cornerback can expect to be attacked." The ankle slowed Mel somewhat late in the year, but he still performed well enough to play in his ninth Pro Bowl in as many NFL seasons. (Four times he's been All-Pro, three of them at free safety and once at cornerback since making the switch in 1970.) Surgery for removal of bone chips repaired the ankle during the off-season, and Renfro was ready to go full speed in '73. "Mel is absolutely the best," says Cowboys left cornerback Charlie Waters. "He's the guy we all look up to. He's what we'd like to be." Renfro is the Cowboys' all-time interception leader, with 40, their all-time kickoff return leader, with 85 returns for a 26.4 average, and holds the club record for most interceptions in a season, 10 in 1969. He was Most Valuable Player in the 1971 Pro Bowl. "If you keep your confidence," says Mel, "mixed with just the right amount of fear to keep you on edge, you'll come out a winner in the end."

**COLLEGE:** Mel was one of the great athletes in Oregon history. He was an All-American halfback who played in the 1964 College All-Star game, and was a trackman who had bests of 9.6 in the 100, 13.8 in the high hurdles and 25-11 $\frac{3}{4}$  in the long jump.

**PERSONAL:** Mel was born in Houston, grew up in Portland and now lives near there in Wood Village, Ore. He and his wife Pat have three children — Mel Jr. (1/25/64), Tony (3/29/65) and Cindy (3/14/68). Mel operates "Mel Renfro's Bicycle City" in Portland.

PRO: Staubach apparently had it all going his way in 1972. Then, in the third pre-season game, he collided with middle linebacker Marlin McKeever of the Los Angeles Rams. Result: A separated right shoulder. "What made him try to run over that guy is what will bring him back," predicted Tom Landry. By the fifth regular season game — nine weeks after the injury — Staubach was reactivated. By that time, however, Craig Morton was entrenched as the No. 1 quarterback. Roger saw limited duty the rest of the season, appearing in four games as a reliever. On Dec. 23, the Cowboys met San Francisco in the first round of the playoffs and were trailing, 28-13, when Landry called on Staubach late in the third quarter. The Cowboys won, 30-28, on two Staubach touchdown passes in the final minute-and-a-half. "Roger has a way of turning things around," said Landry. "Leadership radiates from him," said Lee Roy Jordan. The next week, things weren't so happy. Washington defeated Dallas, 26-3, in the NFC Championship Game. Staubach was the starter and played the entire game. "I'm going to devote the next year to making up for that one," he vowed. First, said Landry, Roger would have to regain his first string role. Staubach and Morton went to training camp all even.

COLLEGE: Staubach set lofty standards at Navy, winning the Heisman Trophy and the Maxwell Award as a junior. He also lettered in basketball and baseball, and captained the 1965 College All-Star squad.

PERSONAL: After graduating from the Naval Academy, Roger spent four years in the service including one year as a port officer in Vietnam. A native of Cincinnati, he lives in Dallas with his wife Marianne and their daughters Jennifer (6/21/66), Michelle (5/23/68) and Stephanie Marie (6/25/69). Staubach is associated with the Henry S. Miller Co. (real estate) in Dallas and is a member of the national advisory staff of Aurora Plastics. He is 1973 State Easter Seal chairman, a member of the Governor's Drug Advisory Council and is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

**COLLEGE:** Waters caught 68 passes for 1,165 yards at Clemson. His favorite story about Tigers Coach Frank Howard concerns a time when four varsity quarterbacks were injured and Howard approached a lowly substitute. "Son," said the coach, "do you believe in magic?" "I guess so, sir," was the reply. "Well, then," said Howard, "Poof! You're our No. 1 quarterback."

**PERSONAL:** Charlie lives in Dallas. He was an eight-letter athlete (football, baseball and basketball) in high school at North Augusta, S. C.

**PRO:** For the second year in a row, Rayfield in 1972 was named All-Pro and played in the Pro Bowl. He was voted the NFC's Outstanding Offensive Lineman by the players. He was Captain of the Dallas offense and consistently lived up to Offensive Coordinator Jim Myers' evaluation: "If there's an offensive tackle in the league as good, I don't know about him." Now that the honors are pouring in, people sometimes forget that it took the Cowboys three years to find a spot for Wright. After being drafted seventh in 1967, he was shifted from tackle to tight end to defensive end and back to tackle. Then, in 1970, Tom Landry moved All-Pro Ralph Neely to left tackle and installed Rayfield at right tackle. The position became his property. "Rayfield has gone out of sight," says Neely. "There's nobody can touch him, and I've studied all the offensive tackles in our time." Says Landry, "I think Rayfield has established himself as one of the top tackles in our game. He feels confident in his position and he would have to rate with anyone you might mention." Confidence is a Wright trademark. "I feel I'm one of the top tackles," says the Big Cat. "I'm not trying to brag, I just have a lot of confidence in myself. I want people to notice me as one of the best." Rayfield credits some advice from his mother for helping him through those uncertain early years. "Don't be impatient and don't be discouraged," she told her son. "If you prove that you can handle the job, you'll get it."

**COLLEGE:** Wright lettered in football, basketball and track at Fort Valley State in Georgia, earning All-Conference honors in football and basketball. His athletic ability enabled him to play several positions on the football field, including defensive back. He ran a 50 flat 440.

**PERSONAL:** Rayfield, his wife Andrea and son LaRay Adrian (3/25/72) live in Dallas. He was born in Griffin, Ga. "I became an Eagle Scout and had 21 merit badges," Rayfield recalls. "I'm proud of that." Rayfield was one of three Cowboys, along with Jethro Pugh and Pat Toomay, to tour Far East military bases, hospitals and schools last May.

"Martin has all the physical and mental tools you look for," says Tom Landry. "If a player like this hits, you've got one who will help you for 10 years."

Scrivener was described by Cowboys Vice President Gil Brandt as "a good athlete who could play for us." "He has an excellent chance to make the club," said the scouting report. "He was the outstanding defensive back on the field in the Blue-Gray game."

Hr: 6-6 • Wt: 251 • Born: 6/14/51 • D-5 for '73

Bruce is the older brother of UCLA basketball star Bill Walton, and Cowboys coaches feel the football-playing brother has the size and athletic ability to play in the NFL. "Walton has good quickness, agility, balance and body control," says Cowboys Scout Red Hickey.

**BOB LEYEN** • **Guard** • **Yale**  
Ht: 6-4 • Wt: 256 • Born: 9/29/51 • D-6 for '73

The Cowboys are hoping Leyen will become as big a success as Dallas' last draft choice from Yale — Calvin Hill. "He will hit," says Red Hickey. "He's tough and he'll pay the price to win. Also, he's very smart and can learn." Leyen is a Tennessee native whose father is a doctor. Bob was a pre-med psychology major with a B average, and also was a judo letterman at Yale.

**RODRIGO BARNES** • **Linebacker** • **Rice**  
Ht: 6-1 • Wt: 215 • Born: 2/10/50 • D-7 for '73

"This man is a warrior," said Tom Landry. "He may not have many friends after a couple of weeks in camp because he'll be knocking everybody down." Barnes' speed (4.75 in the 40) and aggressiveness encouraged the Cowboys to draft him despite a knee injury that slowed him in 1972. He was the first linebacker selected by Dallas in this year's draft.

**DAN WERNER** • **Quarterback** • **Michigan State**  
Ht: 6-4 • Wt: 195 • Born: 3/7/50 • D-8 for '73

Werner entered the first game of his sophomore year midway in the second quarter, completed 16 of 35 passes for a school record of 314 yards, and was seldom heard from again. Injuries and the Spartans' switch to the Wishbone-T midway in the 1971 season combined to limit Werner to a backup role. "I like him because of his size and his rifle arm," said the Cowboys' Gil Brandt. "He'll remind you of the way Craig Morton looked when he came out of college. This guy is a prospect."

White has 4.6 speed in the 40-yard dash. "Speed and quick feet are his major assets," read the scouting reports. "He has the ability to cover man-to-man." "He's OK now and we think he's a good prospect."

Scout Charlie Mackey worked Smith out at UCLA the first day of the draft. Asked what John did when he threw the ball to him, Mackey said: "He caught it." Smith had been introduced to football as a defensive back and flanker at Fremont High School in Los Angeles.

Larry Schreiber scored three more San Francisco touchdowns, and when Dallas took over on its 45 with 2:02 remaining, the score was 49ers 28, Cowboys 16.

In the space of one minute and 10 seconds Roger Staubach threw touchdown passes to Billy Parks and Ron Sellers. The most remarkable pressure comeback in Dallas history gave the Cowboys the victory, 30-28, and they were headed for the NFC finals at Washington.

# Historical Highlights

## 1960

**NFL FRANCHISE**—Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during their first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28).

**COWBOYS STOCKED**—A player pool was set up in a league meeting at L.A., with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

**TRAINING STARTS**—Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at Pacific U., in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

**FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME**—The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 10-16 pre-season game to San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

**FIRST HOME GAME**—In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club pre-season game, the Cowboys led the World Champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 71-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19).

**FIRST VICTORY**—In a pre-season game at Louisville, Ky., the Cowboys beat New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes of 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith). (August 27).

**FIRST LEAGUE GAME**—In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth period Steeler rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

**STREAK SNAPPED**—Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

## 1961

**TRAINING STARTS**—Rookies launch training at new campsite—St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

**FIRST LEAGUE WIN**—Scoring ten points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 (Sept. 17).

## 1962

**TRAINING STARTS**—Team begins training at new campsite—Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13).

**PENALTY HISTORY**—For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were detected holding in the end zone on a 99-TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

**100-YARD FIRSTS**—Cowboys Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth quarter TD's in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).



## 1963

**SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY**—The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

**CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE**—The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

**HOWTON SETS RECORD**—Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's all-time receiving mark with a 14-yard catch against Washington (there). Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

## 1964

**LANDRY CONTRACT**—With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a ten-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

## 1965

**FIRST SELLOUT**—An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

## 1966

**PLAYOFF BOWL**—After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15).

**MERGER**—Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys GM Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, merging the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

**SCHRAMM ELEVATED**—Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

**NEELY CASE SOLVED**—Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth place picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17).

**THE CHAMPIONSHIP**—The Cowboys won their first championship, capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

**TEXAS STADIUM**—On Dec. 23, owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000.

**SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP**—Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

## 1968

**WIN CAPITOL**—For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on December 21st. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

## 1969

**TEXAS STADIUM** — Ground was broken for Texas Stadium in suburban Irving on January 25, and on June 29 Bert Rose was named general manager of the stadium.

**ORIGINALS RETIRE** — An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

**REPEAT CAPITOL WINS** — Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl.

## 1970

**FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS** — The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

**FIRST NFC TITLE** — The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11-year history on Jan. 3 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

## 1971

**TEXAS STADIUM** — The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving, Tex., home with a 44-21 victory over the New England Patriots on October 24. Duane Thomas scored the first touchdown in the new stadium, a 56-yard run just two minutes and 16 seconds after the opening kickoff. Attendance was 65,708.

**SIX STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS** — The Cowboys won their last seven games to finish 11-3, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the sixth year in a row. They defeated Minnesota, 20-12, in the opening round.

**SECOND NFC TITLE** — For the second consecutive year, the Cowboys met the San Francisco 49ers in the National Conference showdown. This time Dallas won, 14-3, to qualify for its second straight Super Bowl.

**FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP** — The Cowboys downed the Miami Dolphins, 24-3, to win Super Bowl VI in New Orleans on Jan. 16. It was the 10th victory in a row for Dallas as Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

## 1972

**FIRST 1,000-YARD BACK** — Calvin Hill became the first Dallas player to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 111 on Dec. 9 against the Washington Redskins in Texas Stadium. Hill wound up with 1,036 yards for the season on a record 245 carries.

**SEVEN STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS** — The Cowboys qualified for the NFL playoffs a record seventh consecutive year, their 10-4 record earning them the National Conference Wild Card berth. Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns in the last 1½ minutes to give the Cowboys a 30-28 victory at San Francisco in the first round. Then, at Washington on New Year's Eve, Dallas was foiled in its bid for a third straight NFC title when the Redskins won, 26-3.
