THE MANAGEMENT



MURCHISON/SCHRAMM

The year 1974 marks the 15th season for the Dallas Cowboys and their 15th season under the direction of Board Chairman Clint W. Murchison Jr. and President-General Manager Texas E. Schramm.

Murchison was awarded the expansion franchise in January of 1960. He named Schramm as General Manager, Tom Landry as Head Coach and Gil Brandt to direct the scouting operation. The Cowboys introduced a new era in Dallas sports whose high-water mark thus far was the World Championship earned at Super Bowl VI.

Schramm controls the day-to-day operations of the club. He was named President in 1966, retaining the title of General Manager.

Working closely with Schramm are Brandt, Vice President for Personnel Development, and Al Ward, Vice President for Administration. Ward joined the Cowboys as Public Relations Director in 1966 and became assistant general manager the next year. Both Brandt and Ward were named vice presidents following the 1970 season.

Schramm holds a BA degree in Journalism from the University of Texas, acquired between 1939 and 1947 with time out for a four-year hitch in the Air Transport Command where he made Captain.

While still in school, Schramm was a member of the sports staff of the Austin American Statesman and later was sports editor of that paper.


In 1947 he joined the Los Angeles Rams as publicity director, and in a 10-year career there rose to general manager.

Schramm left the Rams in 1957 to join CBS as Assistant Director of Sports and was there until coming to the Cowboys.

One of Schramm's major assets has been his ability as a sound judge of men. For instance, he brought Pete Rozelle into pro football as publicity man for the Rams.

Aside from the development of the Cowboys, Schramm's foremost achievements have been his work with scouting systems, both with the Rams and Cowboys, and the merger of the AFL and NFL.

Schramm and Lamar Hunt, owner of the Kansas City Chiefs, were the driving forces in the merger.



THE COACH

Imagine San Francisco without the Golden Gate Bridge, New Orleans without Bourbon Street, Philadelphia without the Liberty Bell.

Do that, and you can imagine the Dallas Cowboys without Tom

Landry.

Landry came to Dallas with the franchise in 1960. He was on the sidelines in his familiar fedora when the team went an entire season without winning a game. He was there when the Cowboys lost on the ice at Green Bay. He was there when they won the Super Bowl, and he is there today.

The man's record becomes more impressive by the year. Heading into the 1974 season Landry's Cowboys had won 108 games, lost 80 and tied six. Only nine other coaches in the history of professional

football had won as many as 100 games.

And, the Cowboys didn't have a winning season until 1966. Beginning with that campaign the Landry-Dallas record is 83-27-2, best in the NFL.

Eight straight playoff appearances (1966-1973) constitute a record never equalled. Six straight years of 10 or more victories ('68-'73), likewise.

Through it all, Tom Landry has been there. When he and the team

posted win No. 100 last year, Tom was asked about it.

"When you think back, really, what you're saying is that you've been able to have longevity in professional football," he said. "This is an accomplishment in itself.

"In our field it's very hard for head coaches to go from ex-head

coach to head coach like baseball or even college football.

"There seems to be a stigma that goes with non-success. A lot of

good head coaching potential is destroyed in poor situations. They

couldn't display their talents and never came back again.

"So this, to me, is the significance of the 100 victories. That I've been able to stay as head man that long. I've been fortunate in work-

ing for good management."

The words were modest, but sincere. Landry is proud of his "flex" defense and multiple offense, of course, but he's probably proudest of the fact that he will be able to leave his mark on the game in a way anyone can understand - winning.

And winning, of course, is what Tom Landry is all about. Here are

a few things he has to say on the subject:

"The world doesn't stop when you lose. You must think about the good things that have happened to you. You must look ahead. The only way a person can really become strong is to have setbacks."

And:

"I don't believe in winning at all cost, if that means cheating or doing things that are bad. But if you think winning is not too important, then you are not willing to pay the price to win."

And, finally:

"This game is played with the heart. You don't have to drink or swear or hit people in the face when they're not looking, but you do have to be tough to win.

"When you take on the Cowboy team today, you won't find them

too easy. They'll hit you."

And when they do, Tom Landry will be there.

Tom was born in Mission, Tex., on Sept. 11, 1924. He was an All-Regional fullback at Mission High before enrolling at the University of Texas.

After one semester at Texas, Landry went into the Air Corps and flew 30 B-17 missions over Germany with the Eighth Air Force.

Following his discharge as a 1st Lieutenant in November of 1945, Tom returned to Texas where he earned All-Southwest Conference honors as a junior and co-captained the Longhorns as a senior. Those Texas teams defeated Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl.

Landry joined the old New York Yankees of the All-America Conference in 1949, moving to the Giants in 1950. He was a mainstay in the Giants' defensive backfield through 1955, the last two years as

player-coach. He was All-Pro in 1954.

Retiring as a player following the 1955 season, Tom was the Giants' defensive coach through 1959. Giants Head Coach Jim Lee Howell called him "the best defensive coach in the business."

Tom and his wife Alicia, whom he met at Texas, have three chil-

dren — Tom Jr., 24; Kitty, 21, and Lisa, 16.

Tom devotes much of his spare time to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and is serving as chairman of the Board of Trustees of the National FCA. He also has served as chairman of the State American Cancer Society, and is area chairman for the All-American Roundup of the Boy Scouts of America.

The coach has received honorary degrees from California Lutheran College (Doctor of Humane Letters), John Brown University (Doctor of Humanities) and Southwest Baptist College (Doctor of Laws).

ERMAL ALLEN, Special Assistant

Allen is the "inside man" on the Dallas coaching staff, heading the Cowboys' Research and Development Department in its study and evaluation of all players and teams in the NFL.

Ermal quarterbacked the University of Kentucky from 1939 through 1941 and played on the Fort Benning and Army All-Star teams during World War II. After the war he spent one year in the old All-America Conference as a Cleveland Browns defensive back in 1947.

Allen returned to his alma mater in 1948 and remained there as an assistant coach for 14 years under Paul Bryant ('48-'53) and Blanton Collier ('54-'61). He joined the Cowboys in 1962 and, along with Offensive Coordinator Jim Myers, is a senior member of Tom Landry's staff.

Ermal, born on Christmas Day, 1920, is the best golfer in the Cowboys organization. He is a two-time Kentucky Amateur champion, defeating Bobby Nichols in 1955 and Frank Beard in 1958.

Ermal and his wife Allie have a son, two daughters and five grandchildren.

MIKE DITKA, Receivers

Ditka joined the Cowboys staff in 1973 after 12 years in the NFL, the last four of them with Dallas.

Everybody's All-America at the University of Pittsburgh, Mike became the prototype of the modern tight end after the Chicago Bears drafted him No. 1 in 1961. His career totals show 427 receptions for 5,913 yards and 43 touchdowns.

The Aliquippa, Pa., native (10/18/39) always was noted for his aggressiveness on the field, and he admits that attitude carries over into his coaching.

Mike has three sons and a daughter.

ED HUGHES, Offensive Backfield

When Tom Landry named Hughes offensive backfield coach in 1973, it marked a reunion for the two. Landry coached Hughes from 1956 through 1958 when Ed played cornerback for the New York Giants.

Hughes is the most experienced pro coach on Landry's staff. He was with the Dallas Texans (1960-62), the Denver Broncos (1963), the Washington Redskins (1964-67) and the San Francisco 49ers (1968-70) before becoming head coach of the Houston Oilers for the 1971 season. He was with the St. Louis Cardinals in '72.

Ed played offensive and defensive halfback at Tulsa and was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1954. He spent two seasons with the Rams before moving to the Giants.

A native of Buffalo, N. Y. (10/23/27), Ed and his wife Nancy have four daughters and a son.

JIM MYERS, Offensive Coordinator

Jim is in his 13th season with the Cowboys, joining Tom Landry's staff in 1962 after head coaching stints at Iowa State and Texas A&M.

Concentrating on the offensive line, Myers' tutelage has paid off in All-Pro recognition for tackles Rayfield Wright and Ralph Neely and guards John Niland and Blaine Nye. Center Dave Manders, the other veteran member of the Cowboys' forward wall, has played in the Pro Bowl.

Myers is a native of Madison, W. Va. (11/12/21), who was a standout lineman at Tennessee in 1941-42 and at Duke in the Marine V-12 program in 1943.

Jim was an assistant coach at Wofford College, Vanderbilt and UCLA before becoming a head coach. He and his wife Carolyn have three daughters and four grandchildren.

DAN REEVES, Special Teams

After a year in private business in Dallas, Dan returns to the organization where he was a talented and popular mainstay for eight years.

Reeves was a Cowboy running back for seven seasons (1965-71) and, despite a series of knee injuries, rose to the fifth spot among all-time Dallas rushing leaders. He was a player-coach in '70 and '71 and coached the offensive backfield in 1972.

Dan is a native of Rome, Ga., (1/19/44) who quarterbacked South Carolina for three years. He signed with the Cowboys as a free agent in 1965.

Dan and his wife Pam have two daughters and a son.

ALVIN ROY, Strength Coach

Alvin joined the staff in 1973 after earlier stints with the San Diego Chargers and Kansas City Chiefs. The Cowboys feel it is no coincidence that while following Roy's conditioning program they outscored opponents 201-92 in the second half and 122-59 in the fourth quarter in 1973.

Alvin trained or managed several weightlifting teams in international competition, including the American team which won the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki.

A native of Baton Rouge, La., (4/20/20), Roy owns a health studio there and has had 2 TV shows on an NBC outlet for 14 years. He has two daughters, Astrid and Jo Ann.

GENE STALLINGS, Defensive Backfield

Gene returns to full-time duty as defensive backfield coach in '74 after doubling as coach of the special teams for the last half of the '73 season. His work with the special teams was credited with giving the Cowboys the boost they needed to reach the playoffs.

Stallings, in his third year with the club, is a Paris, Tex., native (3/2/35) who spent seven years as head coach at Texas A&M.

He was an All-Southwest Conference end at A&M under Paul Bryant and was a tri-captain on Bryant's undefeated 1956 team. After one season as student assistant at A&M, Gene moved with Bryant to Alabama and was assistant head coach there when the chance came to return to his alma mater in 1965.

Gene and his wife Ruth Ann have four daughters and a son.

ERNIE STAUTNER. Defensive Coordinator

Since Ernie joined the Dallas staff in 1966, the Cowboys have led their league or conference in rushing defense six out of eight years. The "Doomsday Defense" began to assert itself almost from the day Stautner arrived on the scene.

A star defensive tackle with the Pittsburgh Steelers for 15 years, despite being "only" 6-0 and 235 pounds, Ernie was voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame immediately upon becoming eligible in 1970. He played in nine Pro Bowl games.

Ernie is a native of Calm, Bavaria (4/2/25), who grew up in Albany, N. Y. After serving in the Marine Corps from 1943 through 1946 he was a football star at Boston College.

Ernie and his wife Helen have a son and two daughters.

JERRY TUBBS, Linebackers

Jerry is the only "original" Cowboy player still with the organization. He came to the club in 1960 as a middle linebacker and played in Dallas for eight years before joining the coaching staff in 1968.

Born in Breckenridge, Tex., on Jan. 23, 1935, Jerry was an All-

America center-linebacker for the 1954-56 Oklahoma teams that never lost a game. He received the Walter Camp Award as the nation's outstanding player in '56.

Jerry was the No. 1 draft choice of the Chicago Cardinals in 1957 and also played for the San Francisco 49ers before settling in Dallas in '60.

Jerry and his wife Marlene have a son and a daughter.

DICK MANSPERGER, Player Personnel Director

Mansperger is in his fourth season as director of the Cowboys' far-flung scouting operations and in his ninth year with the club.

Dick, 41, graduated from Arizona State in 1958. He played for Dan Devine, now coach of the Green Bay Packers. Mansperger was head coach for two years at Palo Verde Junior College in Blythe, Calif., moving on to assistant coaching jobs at West Texas, Arizona State, UCLA and Iowa.

He joined the Cowboys as a scout in 1966.

DON COCHREN. Trainer

Don is in his tenth season with the Cowboys, joining the club in 1965 after experience in college, military and Canadian football training.

A graduate of Purdue, Don earned his physical therapy certificate at Pennsylvania. The 42-year-old Cochren spent two years as trainer at Case Institute in Cleveland, four years with the Toronto Argonauts and two years as a physical therapy officer in the Air Force.

Don and his wife Imogene have three daughters and two sons.

KEN LOCKER, Assistant Trainer

Ken is in his second season as assistant trainer after serving from 1969 through 1972 in the North Texas State University athletic department.


Ken, 22, was an assistant trainer at North Texas and also put in some time as interim head trainer when the Eagles' Skip Cox left to become Baylor's trainer. During the past off-season he was athletic trainer at Texas Women's University in Denton.

BUCK BUCHANAN, Equipment Manager

Buchanan joined the Cowboys in 1973 after 20 years in the Air Force, with most of that time spent supervising and maintaining military athletic programs.

For four years, SMSgt. Buchanan was Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of Athletics and Programs at the U.S. Air Force Academy Prep School in Colorado Springs. He was awarded the Bronze Star for his performance during a 1968-69 tour of duty in Thailand.

Buck, 41, and his wife Geraldine have a son and daughter.

PRO: Arneson played in 12 games in 1973, most of them on the special teams as he saw little action on offense because of the veteran Cowboys line. As with all rookies in that situation,

1974 was to be a critical year for Jim. He aided his own cause by gaining 14 pounds, to 250, with diligent work in the club's weight training program.

COLLEGE: Jim was an All-Conference selection at Arizona, where his older brother Mark, now with the St. Louis Cardinals, was an All-America linebacker.

PERSONAL: A native of Iowa City, Iowa, Jim and his wife Terry live in Dallas.

PRO: Babinecz backed up both Dave Edwards and D. D. Lewis at the outside linebacker spots in '73, and again performed well on the special teams. A broken hand suffered just before

the pre-season schedule opened hampered John's development early in the year at a time when coaches felt he was making rapid progress. "John's aggressive," says Linebackers Coach Jerry Tubbs, "a great competitor."

COLLEGE: A middle linebacker at Villanova, Babinecz lettered three years at the Philadelphia school.

If you don't, every time you go in a coffee shop, every time you go in a store, every time you go outside, people ask you, 'What happened?' The only thing that's satisfactory is to win. That's just cold facts." Edwards seemed an unlikely prospect to become a standout in the NFL when he joined the Cowboys as a free agent receiver in 1962. He didn't make the club that year, but found his spot at linebacker in 1963. By the middle '60s, when the Cowboys started to win, Edwards had moved in at strongside linebacker and no one has been able to move him out. Teammates say Dave has perhaps the strongest arms and hands on the team, giving him an edge over most opposing tight ends at the line of scrimmage. He also has that typical characteristic of an outstanding pro, the ability to "play hurt." When Edwards had an ankle injury that limited his practice time one week last season, Tom Landry shrugged, "You don't worry about Dave much. He just about has to have a broken leg before he'll miss a game." Edwards, of course, played.

COLLEGE: Dave was an All-Southeastern Conference end for Coach Shug Jordan at Auburn.



Garrison cracked his collarbone last year and missed the last game of the season. The next week, as the playoffs opened, he was back in the lineup. He pinched some nerves in his neck during the pre-season and had headaches so severe he couldn't sleep. Robert Newhouse moved into the starting fullback position and performed so well it was the sixth game of the season before Walt could get his job back. Garrison still rushed for 440 yards, second on the team, and was third in receiving with 26 catches. Despite his lack of size and breakaway speed, Garrison averaged 4.4 yards a carry through his first eight years in the league. He is a fine pass receiver who led the team in that category in 1971 when the Cowboys went on to win the Super Bowl.

COLLEGE: A two-time All-Big Eight choice at Oklahoma State, Walt says he crossed the Red River from Lewisville, Tex., "because OSU was the only one to offer me a scholarship. 

me more than any strong safety in the league. He has size, strength and savvy." Green has been picking up that type of compliment for 13 years now, ever since he came to the Cowboys as a free agent basketball player from Utah State. That was in 1962. Heading into the 1974 season Cornell had been in all 168 games the Cowboys had played since he joined the squad. He turned 34 last February, but age seems to be having no effect on the big, smart veteran. "Nobody seems worried about my age except you newspaper guys," Cornell needled a group of sportswriter friends. "The team's not worried about my age, I'm not worried about it, so why should you all worry about it? It's not me getting any older. It's you guys who are getting older." That brand of positive thinking enabled Green to become an All-Pro cornerback in only his fifth season of football. "I've never been beaten," he once told a reporter. "Never?" was the incredulous reply, "Well, maybe once or twice," admitted Cornell, "But I talk myself out of it before I get off the field." In 1970 Green switched to strong safety and twice has played in the Pro Bowl at that position.

COLLEGE: Cornell averaged more than 20 points a game in his three varsity basketball seasons at Utah State. He was an All-American as a sophomore in 1960 and was a three-time All-Skyline Conference selection.

PERSONAL: Cornell was born in Oklahoma City and grew up in Richmond, Calif., where he was an all-star football fullback and basketball player in high school. For the past four years he spent the off-season working in the Cowboys' scouting department. One of Cornell's four brothers, Pumpsie, was a major league baseball player. 

PRO: The greatest touchdown producer in Cowboys history got back on the board in 1973, and while it wasn't one of Hayes' better years it served notice that he's still a force to be reckoned

with. "There's no one who can make a defense commit itself as much as Hayes can," says Spider Lockhart of the New York Giants. "He can explode and make things happen," says Roger Staubach. "As long as Bobby is in the lineup the other team has to make adjustments it doesn't normally make." Hayes' greatest asset, of course, is his blazing speed. He's shown on the pro track circuit over the past two off-seasons that the speed is still there. "I can still get deep," says Bob, "zone defenses or no zone defenses. I'm still the same Bobby Hayes." Bob is the Cowboys' all-time leader in scoring (75 touchdowns), receiving (358 catches for 7,177 yards) and punt returns, although he hasn't run back kicks for the past several seasons.

COLLEGE: Drafted as a "future" in 1963, Bob didn't join the Cowboys until 1965 because of the '64 Olympics. He won two gold medals at Tokyo that year. In football for Coach Jake Gaither at Florida A&M, Bob was a running back who Gaither said "wouldn't have gone out for track if it meant giving up football." Bob's 9.1 in the 100 wasn't bettered until Ivory Crockett did it in 9.0 earlier this year.

PERSONAL: Bob, his wife Altamease and daughter Adrienne LaRori (12/31/68) live in Dallas where Bob is chief executive officer with Apollo Airlines flying Texas and Oklahoma.

PRO: Heading into his final season with the Cowboys (he moves to the World Football League in 1975), Calvin ranked second behind Don Perkins on the list of all-time Cowboys rushing



kins on the list of all-time Cowboys rushing leaders. Hill put 1,000-yard seasons back-to-back — 1,036 yards in '72, 1,142 in '73 — and prior to that feat no Cowboy had ever rushed for as many as 1,000 yards in one season. He made All-Pro for the second time and for the second year in a row led the team in receiving. "I've learned how to read my blocks better," says Calvin, discussing his emergence as a premier runner. "I became more aware of my blockers. I realized there were certain things I could do behind certain blockers. And I guess you could say I became a little more conservative. Things like jumping just came natural to me, but I had to cut that out. It got me into trouble." Calvin is so big and fast and presents such an inviting target to tacklers that he takes quite a pounding every Sunday. "He takes more punishment than anyone," says fellow running back Robert Newhouse. "Sometimes it takes a few days for the soreness to wear off," admits Hill, "but then I'm ready to go again." Still, except for a freak elbow injury late in the divisional playoff game against Los Angeles last year, no one was able to knock Calvin out of the lineup in the past two seasons.

COLLEGE: Calvin accounted for more than 2,600 yards total offense at Yale as his three varsity teams had records of 4-5, 8-1 and 8-0-1. In track, he had a long jump of 25-1½ and a triple jump of 51-5¼.

PERSONAL: For the past two years Calvin served as National Sports Chairman for the National Association of Retarded Children. Calvin, his wife Janet and son Grant Henry (10/5/72) live in Dallas.

PRO: Jordan, improving with age, had his finest season in 1973 and was named All-Pro middle linebacker. Against Philadelphia he was in on 21 tackles and Tom Landry said it was "prob-

ably the best day any linebacker ever had for the Cowboys." The next week, against Cincinnati, Lee Roy intercepted three passes in the first quarter to put the Bengals in a hole from which they could not emerge. "He has range and experience," said Cincy quarterback Ken Anderson. "He just seems to get to the right place at the right time." Says Jordan, "I've been around all these years. I should have learned something. I should be able to get to the right place at the right time quicker." On the first play of the playoff game against Los Angeles he intercepted a pass to get the Cowboys off to another fast start. "My mental outlook is good," said Lee Roy, looking ahead to his 12th pro season. "My mind is right and says go make tackles." Cowboys Special Assistant Ermal Allen points out, "In addition to his tackling and pass defense (Jordan led the team in interceptions in '73), Lee Roy calls our defensive audibles. Plus, he's a heckuva leader. That's another thing that figures when you're talking about the top middle linebackers." Teammate Cliff Harris: "Lee Roy pulls things together. He just does a super job out there." Jordan sums it up this way: "To me a football game is like a day off. I grew up picking cotton on my daddy's farm and nobody asked for your autograph or put your name in the paper for that."

COLLEGE: Everybody's All-American at Alabama, Lee Roy was named the nation's outstanding lineman his senior year. "If he stays in bounds," said Coach Paul Bryant, "Lee Roy will get him."

PERSONAL: Lee Roy, a native of Excel, Ala., lives in Dallas with his wife Biddy and sons David (12/8/65), Patrick Lee (5/23/68) and Christopher (5/5/73). Lee Roy is associated with the real estate firm of Claude R. McClennahan, Inc., in Dallas.



of people. He finally missed a game last year, a leg injury forcing him out of the NFC Championship against Minnesota. Bob didn't like that, and by June 1, 1974, an off-season conditioning program had him weighing a svelte 253 pounds and looking ahead with gusto to his 14th pro season. "Bob Lilly will come back, work hard, and he will still be one of the top defensive tackles in football," said Tom Landry. "Lilly is so quick and smart," says Bob Griese of the Dolphins, "he's almost impossible to fool. He is not enormous but he is strong enough so that there isn't any use arguing with him if he gets hold of your jersey. You just fall whichever way Lilly wants." Says Lilly, "My feeling is we shouldn't let them move the ball no matter where they get it, in our end of the field or their end of it." Quickness always has been Bob's most impressive attribute, and over the years he's added a few refinements. "I like to create some doubt in the man I'm playing against," says Lilly. "If he's not sure what I'm going to do, he can't block me." Landry, who has seen Lilly in every game across the years, adds the final word: "There won't be another Bob Lilly in my time. You're observing a man who will become a legend."

COLLEGE: Bob was an All-American and two-time All-Southwest Conference choice at Texas Christian. The Cowboys, who did not participate in the 1960 college selections, made him their first draft choice in 1961.

PERSONAL: Bob and his wife Ann live in Dallas where he is active in several businesses including a nightspot called Bob Lilly's Other Place. "He has proven he has starting capabilities," says Offensive Backfield Coach Ed Hughes. "Those bigger guys on defense have a difficult time getting underneath to get their shoulders in on a tackle, and you just can't arm-tackle him. He's too strong." Says Bob Matheson of the Dolphins, "I hit him high one time and I did a complete somersault. It was like riding a bucking bronco." Buck Buchanan of the Chiefs: "He's a helluva football player. Yet he's an All-Pro player." Says Niland, "I suppose if I used my hands I might be more effective. But why take a chance on getting a penalty? The number of times I've been penalized for holding I can count on one hand." Niland does, however, use his head as a pretty effective weapon. "I break my helmets and get a lot of cuts in the forehead and on the nose," he says, "but the butt block is the most effective block for me. Through weightlifting I've built my neck up to 20 inches and I like to take advantage of that."

COLLEGE: A fullback as a sophomore at Iowa, John moved to guard the next season and was an All-American when the Cowboys drafted him in the first round after his senior campaign.

PERSONAL: John was born in Quincy, Mass., and grew up in Amityville, N. Y. He and his wife Iree live in Dallas, where John is active in a number of business ventures. He has a well-established scholarship fund for deserving students, and last June sponsored the John Niland Celebrity Golf Tournament in Dallas with proceeds going to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.



Pugh's big moment in '73 came when he scooped up a fumble against the Cincinnati Bengals and rumbled 35 yards before running out of gas at the Bengal 7. "Pugh may have to work a little on his speed this week," said Landry, "but he showed great open-field running ability." Jethro led the team in fumble recoveries, with four.

COLLEGE: Jethro enrolled at Elizabeth City State without a scholarship, but ended up as a two-time All-Conference tackle and was named his team's Most Valuable Lineman as a senior. He was only 20 years old when the Cowboys drafted him on the 11th round

in 1965.



MVP in '71). Defensive Backfield Coach Gene Stallings spells out perfectly the way the Cowboys regard Mel. "There couldn't possibly be a better cornerback in football week in and week out. You see what he does on passes, though not very much because they don't throw at him. But watch him force a running play. He's like a cutting horse in there, darting in and out. He's so quick. I've never seen anything like him on films or anywhere else." Renfro intercepted two passes in '73 to run his career total to 42, best in Cowboys history. And yet those figures are misleading, because Mel just doesn't get that much business at his right cornerback position. "I stay away from Renfro," says Rams quarterback John Hadl. "I don't like fooling with him. He's the best in the league." Says Tom Landry, "When you have Mel Renfro at one cornerback, the other cornerback can expect to be attacked."

COLLEGE: Mel was one of the great athletes in Oregon history. He was an All-America halfback and a trackman with bests of 9.6 in the 100, 13.8 in the high hurdles and 25-11% in the long jump.

"He can make a positive play out of one that starts out like a loser," says the Dolphins' Bob Griese. "You talk to him for awhile and you have to be impressed with his outlook on life and football. 

PRO: Wright enjoyed his third straight All-Pro season in '73, played in the Pro Bowl for the third straight year and generally continued to distinguish himself as perhaps the best offensive



tackle in the game. "I think Rayfield is pretty much a composite of an All-Pro tackle," says the Vikings' Carl Eller. "He has size, strength and quickness. The big thing in Rayfield's favor is that he has a lot of range. He moves better than most tackles. He is difficult to play against." Tom Landry says, "There's nobody in the league who could replace him for us. I wouldn't take any tackle over Rayfield." Wright came to the Cowboys in 1967 and played tackle, tight end and defensive end before finally moving in at right tackle in 1970. That was no easy feat, because the regular at right tackle was four-time All-Pro Ralph Neely. Ralph moved to the left side to create the tackle setup of the past four seasons. Wright, nicknamed "Big Cat," had a touchdown reception in 1968 while playing tight end and last year lined up as an eligible receiver in several goalline situations. "I'd like to get a couple more touchdowns," he says. "That would be nice for a tackle." Mainly, though, Rayfield is interested in doing the best job possible at his normal spot. "I feel I'm one of the top tackles," he says. "I'm not trying to brag, I just have a lot of confidence in myself. I want people to notice me as one of the best."

COLLEGE: Wright lettered in football, basketball and track at Fort Valley State in Georgia, earning All-Conference honors in football and basketball. He played several positions in football, including even defensive back for a time. In track, he ran a 50 flat 440.

PERSONAL: Rayfield, his wife Andrea and son LaRay Adrian (3/25/72) live in Dallas. He grew up in Griffin, Ga., where he became an Eagle Scout and earned 21 merit badges.

JONES

ED JONES Defensive End Tennessee State Ht: 6-8 Wt: 260 Born: 2/23/51 D-1A for '74

Nicknamed "Too Tall" by a college teammate. Jones was the first player chosen in the '74 player selections, marking the first time the Cowboys ever had the No. 1 pick in the draft. "Ed has unlimited potential," said Tom Landry. "I think he can be as great as any lineman we have had. He has the potential of a Bob Lilly. He has to prove he can do it, of course, but the potential is there." The All-American's speed (4.75 in the 40), size and agility had Cowboys coaches seeing him as a figure who can dominate a game. John Merritt, Ed's coach at Tennessee State, says, "It got so people we played against wouldn't try to throw to the side of the field he was playing on."

CHARLEY YOUNG . Running Back • North Carolina State Wt: 215 Born: 10/13/52 D-1B for '74

Young was the Cowboys' second first-round choice, the 22nd player chosen, and is considered a prospect at both fullback and halfback. "He is another of our 'potential' picks," said Landry. "He alternated with other running backs at North Carolina State, but he is powerful, he has 4.6 speed and he has the potential to be a strong pro runner." Young rushed for 1,657 yards in his three-year varsity career and scored 17 touchdowns. He averaged nearly six yards a carry. Young was a high school star at Enloe High School in Raleigh, across town from N. C. State.

CAL PETERSON Linebacker UCLA Ht: 6-3 Wt: 218 Born: 10/6/52 D-3 for '74

Peterson played the "loose" defensive end position at UCLA, and the Cowboys expected him to have no problem converting to linebacker. "He has good speed, 4.8 in the 40, and he is a terrific competitor," said Cowboys scout Red Hickey. "Peterson is the reckless type, a big play maker. He could develop into an outstanding linebacker." Peterson, listed at 218 pounds, was expected to play at 225 or 230 in the pros.

KEN HUTCHERSON . Linebacker . Livingston, Ala., State Ht: 6-1 Wt: 214 Born: 7/14/52 D-4A for '74

Cowboys scouts say Hutcherson probably would have gone higher in the draft if he were a bit bigger. As it is, said Red Hickey, "He has speed and toughness. I think he'll be heard from. He would make a good, tough specialty team man this year." Hutcherson was an NAIA All-American, twice was named to the Gulf South Conference all-league team and was Gulf South Defensive Player of the Year as a junior. A team co-captain, he led Livingston with 86 tackles and 67 assists in '73.

ANDY ANDRADE • Running Back-Def. Back • Northern Mich. Ht: 5-11 • Wt: 193 • Born: 6/14/51 • D-4B for '74

Andrade rushed for 1,511 yards in his college career, despite playing most of his senior season with a fractured collarbone. His speed (4.5-4.6 in the 40) had the Cowboys thinking about trying him at cornerback and as a kick returner as well as at running back. He had an 84-yard kickoff return for a touchdown at Northern Michigan.

RAYMOND NESTER • Linebacker • Michigan State Ht: 6-2 • Wt: 224 • Born: 4/25/52 • D-7 for '74

Nester called defensive signals for Michigan State in 1973 and led the team with 54 unassisted tackles and 75 assists. He had five unassisted tackles, 14 assists and returned an intercepted pass for a touchdown in the Spartans' 14-10 loss at Notre Dame. Nester, a three-year starter for the Spartans, was named AP National Lineman of the Week for his performance against Notre Dame.

MIKE HOLT • Defensive Back • Michigan State Ht: 5-11 • Wt: 176 • Born: 1/26/52 • D-8 for '74

A running back at Michigan State the past two seasons, Holt was to be tried at cornerback and as a kick returner with the Cowboys. He was a defensive back as a sophomore and as a senior returned a kickoff 95 yards to score against UCLA. Co-captain of the Spartans' football team, Holt also starred in track as a member of MSU's record-setting mile relay team.

BILL DULIN • Tackle • Johnson C. Smith Ht: 6-6 • Wt: 244 • Born: 9/22/52 • D-9 for '74

Dulin was a tight end in college, but the Cowboys were to take a look at him at tackle. He has size and speed, and proved his agility by playing college basketball. Cowboys fans remember another J. C. Smith graduate, tight end Pettis Norman, now with the San Diego Chargers.

DENNIS MORGAN • Defensive Back • Western Illinois Ht: 5-11 • Wt: 203 • Born: 6/26/52 • D-10 for '74

Another fast, smallish running back who was to be tried in the defensive backfield and on kick returns. Morgan averaged more than 30 yards per kickoff return as a junior and nearly 20 yards a punt return as a senior. Morgan was an honorable mention NAIA All-American, rushing for 1,254 yards in his college career and averaging 4.7 yards a carry.

HARVEY McGEE • Wide Receiver • Southern Mississippi

Excellent size and speed (4.6 in the 40). McGee caught 47 passes for 617 yards and three touchdowns at Southern Mississippi and played in last winter's Senior Bowl Game at Mobile, Alabama. A 9.8 sprinter in track, McGee transferred to Southern Mississippi after first attending Arizona Western Junior College.

KEITH BOBO • Quarterback • Southern Methodist Ht: 6-3 • Wt: 196 • Born: 4/10/51 • D-12 for '74

A strong-armed passer and a tough competitor, Bobo had a 13-5-1 record as a starting quarterback at SMU despite knee and shoulder injuries. He made the switch from a pro-style offense to the Wishbone his senior year and responded with 11 touchdowns rushing and four passing despite missing three games (all losses) with a shoulder separation. Bobo played tight end and running back as a sophomore, switching to quarterback the following spring. "He is a leader," said the scouting report.

FRED LIMA • Kicker • Colorado Ht: 5-9 • Wt: 202 • Born: 11/17/51 • D-13 for '74

Lima led the nation in kick scoring as a junior, booting 15 of 34 field goals (including a Big Eight record 57-yarder) and 35 of 36 extra points. In '73 he was 6 of 11 on field goals with a 48-yarder and 24 of 26 on extra points. He kicked barefooted in college. A native of Chile but a graduate of Hollywood, Calif., High School, Lima has had bit parts in several movies including "The Godfather," "Save the Tiger" and "Conquest of the Planet of the Apes."

DOUG RICHARDS • Defensive Back • Brigham Young Ht: 6-4 • Wt: 185 • Born: 8/16/52 • D-14 for '74

Richards was the leading scorer on the Brigham Young basketball team last year. His size and athletic ability convinced the Cowboys to gamble on him. Doug is the brother of Golden Richards, the wide receiver and kick returner drafted in the second round by Dallas in 1973.

BRUCE CRAFT • Defensive Tackle • Geneva, Pa. Ht: 6-4 • Wt: 232 • Born: 9/23/50 • D-15 for '74

Craft was Geneva's Most Valuable Player and Defensive Player of the Year in '73 and a tri-captain of the club. He was a late bloomer, coming to Geneva after spending his first year out of high school working in the steel mills.

GENE KILLIAN • **Tackle** • **Tennessee** Ht: 6-4 • Wt: 225 • Born: 9/22/52 • D-16 for '74

Killian was one of the question marks of the Cowboys' 1974 draft, but only because of a knee injury which shelved him for the bulk of his senior season. The Volunteer staff felt Killian was on the brink of greatness when he was injured. Cowboys scouts were impressed by Killian's quickness and agility. He was a shotputter on the Tennessee track team.

Historical Highlights

1960

NFL FRANCHISE—Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during their first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28). COWBOYS STOCKED—A player pool was set up in a league meeting at L.A., with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

TRAINING STARTS-Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at

Pacific U., in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME—The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 10-16 pre-season game to

San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME—In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club pre-season game, the Cowboys led the World Champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 71-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19). FIRST VICTORY—In a pre-season game at Louisville, Ky., the Cowboys beat New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes of 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith). (August 27).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME—In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth period Steeler

rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED—Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

1961

TRAINING STARTS - Rookies launch training at new campsite-

St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN — Scoring ten points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 (Sept. 17).

1962

TRAINING STARTS — Team begins training at new campsite —

Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13).

PENALTY HISTORY — For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were detected holding in the end zone on a 99-TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

100-YARD FIRSTS — Cowboys Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth quarter TD's in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).

1963

SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY — The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8). CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE — The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12). HOWTON SETS RECORD — Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's all-time receiving mark with a 14-yard catch against Washington (there). Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

1964

LANDRY CONTRACT — With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a ten-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

1965

FIRST SELLOUT — An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

1966

PLAYOFF BOWL — After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15). MERGER — Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys GM Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, merging the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8). SCHRAMM ELEVATED — Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the

title of Chairman of the Board.

NEELY CASE SOLVED — Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth place picks in the 1967

draft (Nov. 17).

THE CHAMPIONSHIP - The Cowboys won their first championship,

capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

1967

TEXAS STADIUM — On Dec. 23, owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000. SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP — Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

1968

WIN CAPITOL — For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on December 21st. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

1969

TEXAS STADIUM — Ground was broken for Texas Stadium in suburban Irving on January 25, and on June 29 Bert Rose was named

general manager of the stadium.

ORIGINALS RETIRE — An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

REPEAT CAPITOL WINS — Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the

Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl.

1970

FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

FIRST NFC TITLE—The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11-year history on Jan. 3 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

1971

TEXAS STADIUM — The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving, Tex., home with a 44-21 victory over the New England Patriots on October 24. Duane Thomas scored the first touchdown in the new stadium, a 56-yard run just two minutes and 16 seconds after the opening kickoff. Attendance was 65,708. SIX STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last seven

games to finish 11-3, claim the Eastern Division championship and

make the playoffs for the sixth year in a row. They defeated Minne-

sota, 20-12, in the opening round.

SECOND NFC TITLE — For the second consecutive year, the Cowboys met the San Francisco 49ers in the National Conference showdown. This time Dallas won, 14-3, to qualify for its second straight Super Bowl.

FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys downed the Miami Dolphins, 24-3, to win Super Bowl VI in New Orleans on Jan. 16. It was the 10th victory in a row for Dallas as Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

1972

FIRST 1,000-YARD BACK — Calvin Hill became the first Dallas player to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 111 on Dec. 9 against the Washington Redskins in Texas Stadium. Hill wound up with

1,036 yards for the season on a record 245 carries.

SEVEN STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys qualified for the NFL playoffs a record seventh consecutive year, their 10-4 record earning them the National Conference Wild Card berth. Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns in the last 1½ minutes to give the Cowboys a 30-28 victory at San Francisco in the first round. Then, at Washington on New Year's Eve, Dallas was foiled in its bid for a third straight NFC title when the Redskins won, 26-3.

1973

100 VICTORIES — The Cowboys and Coach Tom Landry recorded their 100th victory with a 40-3 Texas Stadium win over the New Orleans Saints on Sept. 24. Landry, the only head coach the Cowboys have had, ended the season with a career mark of 108-80-6 to rank

ninth on the list of the NFL's all-time winningest coaches.

EIGHT STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division title and broke their own NFL record by reaching the playoffs for the eighth year in a row. Dallas defeated Western Division champion Los Angeles in the first round, 27-16, but fell to Central Division winner Minnesota in the NFC Championship Game, 27-10.
