The same front office lineup that began with the Dallas Cowboys in 1960 has moved the club successfully into its third decade.

Under the direction of Chairman of the Board Clint W. Murchison Jr., President and General Manager Tex Schramm, Vice President for Personnel Development Gil Brandt and Coach Tom Landry, the Dallas Cowboys have developed into a model of consistency that is a reflection of the team's stability in the front office.

The Cowboys' management has steered the club through 15 straight winning seasons, 14 trips to the playoffs, five Super Bowl appearances and two world championships.

Schramm oversees the day-to-day operation of the Cowboys. In 1966 he was named president of the team, but also retained his position as general manager.

A journalism graduate of the University of Texas, Schramm joined the Los Angeles Rams as publicity director in 1947 after two years as a sports writer and sports editor at the Austin American-Statesman. In a 10-year career with the Rams he rose from publicity director, to assistant to the president, to general manager.

Schramm left the Rams in 1957 to join CBS as assistant director of sports. He put together the first network telecast of the Olympics, but following those Winter Games of 1960 in Squaw Valley, Calif., Schramm returned to pro football when he was hired by Clint Murchison to run the new Dallas NFL franchise.

In the spring of 1977 Schramm received an honorary degree (Doctor of Humane Letters) from California Lutheran College. After the Cowboys won the Super Bowl at the end of that season Schramm was named NFL Executive of the Year by the Sporting News, and in 1978 he received the Bert Bell Award for outstanding executive leader-ship in the NFL.

Brandt directs the Cowboys' scouting operation and supervises the signing of all players. A Milwaukee native and graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Brandt was a baby photographer and parttime scout for the Rams under Schramm when his flair for discovering talent led to his being hired by the Cowboys.

## THE COACH



Tom Landry's place in football history needed no further embellishment following two decades as head coach of the Dallas Cowboys. Yet his already lofty stature grew by another leap in 1980 when he began his third coaching decade by leading a supposedly rebuilding team to the brink of the Super Bowl.

With new quarterback Danny White and a rebuilt defense, Landry took the Cowboys further than anyone expected. Predicted to finish out of the playoffs and with about a .500 record, the Cowboys tied for the NFL's best record at 12-4 and, for the eighth time in 11 years, reached the NFC Championship Game.

"The most enjoyable thing about coaching is seeing young players develop the way they did in 1980," Landry says. "I love the challenge of rebuilding more than anything else."

Once again, Landry displayed the leadership qualities that have made him a model of consistent success for 15 years. For Cowboys fans it brought back memories of 1975 when Landry took a team to the Super Bowl that had 12 rookies and was coming off an 8-6 record in 1974.

"Leadership is a matter of having people look at you and gain confidence, seeing how you react," he explains. "If you're in control, they're in control."

Being in control of a situation is something you can count on from Tom Landry.

Despite the overall success of the 1980 season, however, the lingering memory was losing the game that would have sent the Cowboys to their sixth Super Bowl. But the foundation of Landry's success has been built on the drive to overcome the disappointment of losing.

Starting as a 35-year-old rookie head coach with an expansion team in 1960, Landry and the Cowboys suffered through five straight losing seasons before finishing 7-7 in 1965. The club's record through the first six years was a dismal 25-53-4.

But Landry believed in his system and the Cowboys believed in Landry. They turned out to be beliefs well taken.

Beginning with a 10-3-1 mark in 1966, the Cowboys' ledger reads 159-55-2, the NFL's best record over the past 15 years. The Cowboys also own the NFL's best record of the 1970's (105-39, 119-46 including playoffs) and currently hold the league's top record since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger (117-43, 133-51 including playoffs).

Since 1966 Landry has guided the Cowboys through 15 straight winning seasons, including 14 trips to the playoffs, 11 division championships and a record five Super Bowl appearances. The Cowboys won world championships with victories in Super Bowls VI and XII.

The dean of NFL coaches in his 22nd season, Landry ranked third on the list of the league's all-time winningest coaches with a 184-108-6 regular-season record after the '80 season. He trailed only George Halas (320 victories) and Curly Lambeau (231). Counting playoff games, Landry recorded his 200th victory in the 1980 NFL Wild Card Game when the Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13.

Recognized as one of football's great technical innovators, Landry also has become an inspirational leader for many because of his principles and achievements.

"In composite I remember him as a towering figure," wrote former Cowboys quarterback Roger Staubach. "To me he was, is and always will be special — a man apart from other men. What made him so, beyond his brilliant technical grasp of football, were two bedrock Landry characteristics: enormous self-discipline and consistency. Landry is the rock against which we all lean, often without realizing it, at some point during our careers."

Thomas Wade Landry was born in Mission, Texas, on Sept. 11, 1924. He was an All-Regional fullback at Mission High School before enrolling at the University of Texas. Following one semester he joined the Air Corps and flew 30 B-17 missions with the Eighth Air Force in World War II.

In November 1945 he was discharged as a first lieutenant and returned to Texas where he became a star fullback and defensive back, earning All-Southwest Conference honors as a junior and co-captaining the Longhorns as a senior. With Landry's help Texas beat Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl.

Landry played for the New York Yankees of the All-America Conference in 1949 before joining the NFL's New York Giants the next year. He was a mainstay in the Giants' defensive secondary through 1955, the last two years as a player-coach. He earned All-Pro honors in 1954.

Retiring as a player following the 1955 season, Tom was the Giants' defensive coach through 1959. Giants Head Coach Jim Lee Howell called him "the best defensive coach in the business."

Coach Landry and wife Alicia, whom he met at Texas, have three children — Tom, Jr., an attorney and oilman; Kitty and Lisa. Kitty presented Tom with his first grandchild — Ryan Edward Phillips — on June 26, 1980.

Tom devotes much of his spare time to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and serves on the Board of Trustees of the National FCA. In 1981 the NFL Alumni Association presented Landry with its highest honor, the Order of the Leather Helmet, for distinguished service to football.

He received the 1980 Vince Lombardi Dedication Award from the Wisconsin Chapter of the Pro Football Writers Association. Also in 1980, California Lutheran College, site of the Cowboys' training camp, established the Landry Medal, to be awarded annually to a person who has distinguished himself in his chosen profession and serves as an inspiration to American youth.

Landry earned a degree in business at Texas and one in industrial engineering from the University of Houston. He holds honorary degrees from California Lutheran College (Doctor of Humane Letters), John Brown University (Doctor of Humanities), Southwest Baptist College (Doctor of Laws) and Indiana Central University (Doctor of Laws). In 1978 he was inducted into the Texas Sports Hall of Fame.

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## THE COACHING STAFF

### Jim Myers Assistant Head Coach • Offensive Line

Following head coaching stints at Iowa State and Texas A&M, Jim Myers joined the Cowboys in 1962 as offensive line coach. He has the longest tenure on the Cowboys' assistant coaching staff, 20 years.



In 1977 Tom Landry turned over some of his

duties to his long-time aide, naming Myers to the newly created position of assistant head coach. Under his guidance, the Cowboys' offensive line has produced All-Pros and Pro Bowl players Ralph Neely, John Niland, Rayfield Wright, Blaine Nye and current stars Herbert Scott and Pat Donovan.


A native of Madison, W.Va. (11/12/21), Myers was an outstanding lineman at the University of Tennessee in 1941-42 and at Duke in the Marine Corps V-12 program in 1943.

Prior to becoming a head coach, Myers served as an assistant at Wofford College, Vanderbilt and UCLA. In 1978 he received the Distinguished American Award from the East Tennessee Chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame.

Jim serves on the Board of Directors of the Dallas chapters of the Boys Clubs of America, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Southwest Allied Youth.

Jim and wife Carolyn have three daughters — Susan, Kathy and Carol — and seven grandchildren.





## Ermal Allen Research and Development

Recognized as one of the foremost authorities on the NFL, Ermal Allen, in his 20th season with the Cowboys, is in charge of studying and evaluating all players and teams in the league. His reports provide the basis for the formulation of the Cowboys' weekly game plans.

A quarterback at the University of Kentucky from 1939-41 and a member of the Fort Benning and Army All-Star teams during World War II, Allen played one season at defensive back with the Cleveland Browns in the All-America Conference in 1947.

Returning to Kentucky in 1948, Ermal was an assistant coach for 14 years under Paul 'Bear'' Bryant ('48-'53) and Blanton Collier ('54-'61). Allen was the Cowboys' offensive backfield coach from 1962-69.

Ermal, who was born Christmas Day, 1920, in Kylesford, Tenn., is a scratch golfer who twice won the Kentucky Amateur championship, beating Bobby Nichols in 1955 and Frank Beard in 1958.

Ermal and wife Allie have three children — Ken, Ann and Amy — and seven grandchildren.



### Mike Ditka Receivers • Special Teams

Mike Ditka joined the Cowboys' coaching staff in 1973 after a distinguished 12-year playing career in which he became recognized as the prototype of an NFL tight end. In addition to handling the Cowboys' special teams, Ditka has coached Pro Bowl performers at each receiver position —

wideouts Drew Pearson and Tony Hill plus tight end Billy Joe DuPree.

A four-time All-Pro tight end with the Chicago Bears, Ditka played his last four years with the Cowboys, including appearances in Super Bowls V and VI. Mike scored the final touchdown in Super Bowl VI, the Cowboys' first world championship, on a pass from Roger Staubach.

Ditka caught 427 passes for 5,913 yards and 43 touchdowns in his career, which included a stint with the Philadelphia Eagles. In 1964 Mike set an NFL record for tight ends by catching 75 passes for Chicago. The mark was broken in 1980 by San Diego's Kellen Winslow.

A native of Aliquippa, Pa. (10/18/39), Mike was a concensus All-America at the University of Pittsburgh and the Bears' No. 1 draft choice in 1961.

Mike has four children — Michael, Mark, Megan and Matt. His wife's name is Diana.

### AI Lavan Running Backs

After eight years of assistant coaching experience in the college and pro ranks, Al Lavan became running backs coach for the Cowboys in 1980.

Lavan coached running backs at Stanford in 1979 after two years at Georgia Tech in which he

handled receivers and running backs. He directed defensive backs and special teams for the Atlanta Falcons in '75 and '76.

Lavan began his coaching career in 1972 at his alma mater, Colorado State, as receivers coach. He moved to Louisville to coach defensive backs in '73 before being named receivers coach at Iowa State in 1974. The next season he returned to the Falcons as a coach.

A native of Pierce, Fla. (9/13/46), Lavan was a defensive back and place kicker at Colorado State and was drafted in the eighth round by Philadelphia in 1968. He played defensive back for the Eagles in '68, then for Atlanta in '69 and '70.

Al and wife Bessie have three children - Travis, Douglas and Maeleeke.

### John Mackovic Quarterbacks

The newest member of Tom Landry's staff is John Mackovic, who left the head coaching post at Wake Forest University to become quarterbacks coach of the Cowboys.

Mackovic became head coach at Wake Forest in 1978 and installed a wide-open, multiple offen-

sive attack, emphasizing the passing game. After a 1-10 finish in '78, he surprised the nation in '79 by directing the Deacons to an 8-3 regular season record and a spot in the national rankings for the first time in the school's history. He was named Coach of the Year by the Sporting News, Walter Camp Football Foundation and Atlantic Coast Conference.

Prior to Wake Forest, Mackovic served as an assistant coach at Army, San Jose State, Arizona and Purdue. He was offensive coordinator at Arizona and at Purdue.

A native of Barberton, Ohio (10/1/43), Mackovic was an Academic All-ACC selection as a quarterback at Wake Forest in 1964.

John and wife Arlene have two children — Aimee (3/7/75) and John III (7/3/77).







## Gene Stallings Defensive Backfield

Gene Stallings joined the Cowboys as defensive backfield coach in 1972 following seven years (1965-71) as head coach at his alma mater, Texas A&M.

Stallings has presided over the development of two All-Pro safeties, Cliff Harris and Charlie

Waters, and in 1980 the Cowboys' mostly young and inexperienced secondary helped the team nearly set a club record for interceptions with 27.

Gene was an All-Southwest Conference offensive end at A&M under Bear Bryant and was a tri-captain on Bryant's unbeaten 1956 Aggie team. Stallings served one year as a student-assistant coach at A&M before moving with Bryant to Alabama as an assistant. He remained there until returning to A&M as head coach in 1965.

The Paris, Texas, native (3/2/35) is an outstanding public speaker who stays very busy in that capacity, mainly during the offseason.

Gene and wife Ruth Ann have five children — Anna Lee, Laurie, John Mark, Jacklyn and Martha Kate.



### Ernie Stautner Defensive Coordinator • Defensive Line

Under Pro Football Hall of Famer Ernie Stautner, the Cowboys consistently field top-notch defenses and All-Pro defensive linemen such as Bob Lilly, George Andrie, Harvey Martin and Randy White.

The Cowboys' famed "Doomsday Defense" began to emerge shortly after Stautner's arrival as defensive line coach in 1966. Ernie also helped fashion "Doomsday II," which carried Dallas to its second Super Bowl title in 1977.

Ernie was an All-Pro defensive end and tackle for the Pittsburgh Steelers where he played for 15 years (1951-65) despite being relatively small at 6-0, 235 pounds. A veteran of nine Pro Bowls, he was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1969, his first year of eligibility.

Ernie was born in Cham, Bavaria (4/20/27), but grew up in Albany, N.Y. Following a World War II Marine Corps hitch (1943-46), he enrolled at Boston College where he developed into a two-way star lineman.

Ernie's wife's name is Pat. He has three children — Joe, Terri and Carol.

### Jerry Tubbs Linebackers

The only original Cowboys player still with the organization, Jerry Tubbs came to the Cowboys in the 1960 expansion draft from the San Francisco 49ers. Jerry played middle linebacker for eight years in Dallas. He was the Cowboys' first All-Pro linebacker in 1962 and the team's first Pro Bowl linebacker the next season.



Born in Breckenridge, Texas (1/23/35), Jerry was an All-America center-linebacker for Bud Wilkinson's unbeaten Oklahoma teams from 1954-56. Tubbs was the Walter Camp Award winner in 1956 as the nation's outstanding player. He was drafted No. 1 by the Chicago Cardinals in 1957 and also played for the 49ers before coming to Dallas.

Jerry and wife Marlene have two children - Alan and Kayla.

## Bob Ward Conditioning

Dr. Bob Ward has Cowboys players enthusiastically participating in his conditioning programs, which include running, weight lifting, flexibility training and diet. He directs the Cowboys' voluntary off-season program, working with computer printouts to devise individual programs for each player.



Bob was track coach for 11 years at Fullerton College in California before joining the Cowboys in 1975.

A graduate of Whitworth College in Spokane, Wash., Ward received his master's degree in physical education from the University of Washington and his doctorate from Indiana University. He also has been trained extensively in the martial arts.

A native of Huntington Park, Calif. (7/4/33), Bob and wife Joyce have two children — Shannon and Erin.

### DON COCHREN, Trainer

Don Cochren came to the Cowboys in 1965 after experience in college, military and Canadian Football League training.

A graduate of Purdue, Cochren earned his physical therapy certificate at Pennsylvania. He was trainer at Case Institute, now Case-Western Reserve, in Cleveland for two years, with the Toronto Argonauts of the CFL for four years, and he spent a year at the University of New Hampshire before coming to Dallas. He also served as a physical therapy officer in the Air Force for two years.

Cochren was one of 28 trainers selected from colleges and professional ranks to serve the United States team at the 1980 Winter Olympics in Lake Placid, N.Y.

A native of Princeton, Ind. (2/6/32), Don and wife Jan have four children — Jeff, Scott, Wendy and Chris.

#### **KEN LOCKER, Assistant Trainer**

Following four years as assistant trainer and interim head trainer at North Texas State, Ken Locker came to the Cowboys in 1973 as assistant trainer.

Locker received his master's degree in physical education from Texas Woman's University. He served two years as trainer for World Championship Tennis, making the men's tour in 1975 and '76.

Ken is a native of Seminole, Texas (7/23/51). His wife's name is Pam.

#### BUCK BUCHANAN, Equipment Manager

William T. "Buck" Buchanan joined the Cowboys in 1973 after supervising athletic programs in the Air Force for 20 years.

PRO: Adversity struck Benny Barnes again in 1980. Hounded by injury throughout his fine career, Barnes was sidelined for the first five

games by an appendectomy, performed in Washington the morning of the season opener (9/8). In a way, Benny says, the operation turned out to be a blessing since it gave him a chance to further rest his chronically sore right foot, which underwent a joint fusion opera-tion in January '80. The foot also had surgery in '74 when he broke it (12/7 against Cleveland) and after the '77 season to eliminate bone spurs. Barnes started six games at left corner in '80 and had one interception, in a victory over San Diego (10/26). In '81 Tom Landry planned to play Barnes more at safety, the position he played in college. Despite his foot ailment, Barnes led the Cowboys in interceptions in '78 and enjoyed an outstanding '79 season, sharing the team lead in interceptions and fumble recoveries. One of the fumble recoveries resulted in Benny's first NFL touchdown, a 33-yard return for what turned out to be the winning score at Minnesota (10/7). He received his first Oak Farms Cowboys MVP award for holding Pittsburgh's Lynn Swann to one reception for five yards in six tries (10/28). He also received the MVP award for the '79 playoff game against Los Angeles in which he had two key pass deflections. A free agent find after being overlooked in the draft, Barnes spent his first four seasons as a backup cornerback and safety before winning a starting job in '76. Benny still is a top special teams performer, particularly on punt coverage, and in '77 he won the Cowboys' special teams player of the vear award with Jay Saldi. Barnes' strong suit is his man-to-man coverage. "He reads cuts as well as anybody," secondary coach Gene Stallings says. "He can anticipate a man's moves. He's the kind of player who's always thinking, always a step ahead of the other fellow." He shares the NFL record for most safeties in a season with two (1973). GAMES: 1972 (14), 1973 (14), 1974 (13), 1975 (14), 1976 (14), (1977 (14), 1978 (14), 1979 (15), 1980 (11). Total - 123.

**COLLEGE:** Barnes was named All-Pacific Coast at free safety in '71 after intercepting seven passes, including three in a game against Washington. He started 24 consecutive games for Stanford and played on two Rose Bowl winners.

**PERSONAL:** A native of Lufkin, Texas, Benny Jewell Barnes and wife Joyce have three sons — David (1/20/72), Damon (8/8/74) and Deon (4/23/78). In the offseason Benny works in the commercial lending and credit departments for Dallas' Oak Cliff Bank. He is also treasurer of Imperial Investors in partnership with Butch Johnson, Ed Jones, Billy Joe DuPree and Preston Pearson.

## Larry Bethea ★ 76

#### DEFENSIVE TACKLE • MICHIGAN STATE • 4th YEAR HT: 6-5 • WT: 254 • BORN: 7/21/56 • D-1 FOR '78

**PRO:** There's never been much question about Larry Bethea's physical attributes. The 28th player selected in the 1978 draft, Bethea is big, strong

and fast. He matured into a quality reserve last season, his best as a pro. Although cracking the Cowboys' outstanding defensive line is no easy task right now, Bethea, with his infectuous enthusiasm, has made some definite contributions. For example, his fine 1980 training camp allowed Dallas to trade veteran defensive lineman Dave Stalls to Tampa Bay for two draft choices. "Larry Bethea probably had a lot to do with the enthusiasm of the defensive line last year," D. D. Lewis says. "He made everyone work a little harder because he had an excellent camp and preseason." Bethea spent his first two seasons trying to settle into one position. He opened '79 training camp as the starting left defensive end in the wake of Ed Jones' unexpected departure, after preparing to fight for the left tackle spot vacated by Jethro Pugh's retirement. Inexperience proved his undoing, however, and Larry was moved back to a reserve tackle role. He started two games late in the season when Randy White was hobbled by a sore foot. Bethea had a quarterback trap in each of those games, finishing the year with four. In his rookie year Larry filled in at right end on shortvardage plays when Harvey Martin was having leg problems, meaning

Bethea has played all four line positions in addition to his special teams work. His biggest play came in the '78 NFC title game when he was credited with stopping Rams runner Jim Jodat on a fourth-and-one at the Dallas 14 to preserve a 7-0 Cowboys lead in the third quarter. GAMES: 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (11). Total — 43.

**COLLEGE:** In 1977 Bethea became the first lineman since Illinois' Dick Butkus in '63 to be named the Big Ten's most valuable player. Larry was voted to three All-America teams, twice made All-Big Ten and was voted the Spartans' MVP his senior year. He lettered four years, playing tight end as a freshman.

**PERSONAL:** Larry Bethea (beh-THAY-uh) works in the off-season as a Dallas sales representative for Tulsa-based Heritage Medical Company, a medical firm specializing in sports medicine. Larry has a degree in urban development and has worked for the Dallas Black Chamber of Commerce. He also enjoys working with handicapped children. Larry and wife Gloria are from Newport News, Va.

## Bob Breunig ★ 53



**PRO:** By a vote of his peers Bob Breunig was named the NFC's top middle linebacker last year, capping perhaps his finest season. It marked

his second straight Pro Bowl appearance and first as a starter. "Bob's better than I've ever seen him," Tom Landry says. "He has better recognition and is more decisive in what he's doing. It all comes from experience on the job. For instance, he's getting back into the pass defense much better than he's ever done before." Breunig had a career-high three interceptions last year, including a victory-preserving fourth-quarter pickoff versus St. Louis (11/16). Bob was voted the Oak Farms Cowboys MVP in Dallas' triumph over the Giants last year (10/5) for his 14 tackles, a quarterback trap and an interception. His 16 tackles against Washington (11/23) was a 1980 team high. A 1980 defensive co-captain, Bob has led the team in combined tackles in each of the past four seasons, with 130 in '77, 135 in '78, a teamrecord 167 in '79 and 129 in '80. "He's exactly the kind of player you need as a middle linebacker in the 'flex," says Danny White, Breunig's teammate at Arizona State and with the Cowboys. "He's always where he's supposed to be, and he's consistent and dependable." Breunig is only the third starting middle linebacker in Cowboys history, and all three have been Pro Bowl selections. In 1977 Bob succeeded Lee Roy Jordan, who had taken over for Jerry Tubbs in 1966. Breunig was converted from strongside linebacker to the middle spot in '77 following Jordan's retirement. Tom Landry termed Breunig's

transition "remarkable" and "one of the reasons we were able to win our second Super Bowl." Breunig relays the defensive signals from defensive coordinator Ernie Stautner, but he's also responsible for calling audibles if a formation needs to be changed. "His intelligence and intensity are his biggest attributes," says Tubbs, now Cowboys linebackers coach. "He's an excellent leader." GAMES: 1975 (10), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16). Total — 86.

**COLLEGE:** Breunig won All-America honors after leading Arizona State in tackles and fumble recoveries at middle linebacker in 1974. A three-time All-Western Athletic Conference selection, he recovered 10 fumbles and intercepted six passes in his career.

**PERSONAL:** A Phoenix native, Robert Paul Breunig (BREW-nig) works for the Holloway-Staubach real estate company in Dallas in the offseason. He is active with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and the Happy Hill Children's Home in Glen Rose, Texas. Bob's wife Mary compiled the first two editions of the Cowboys' Wives' Cookbook and Family Album, proceeds of which went to Happy Hill. During the season Bob has a daily radio show on KRLD in Dallas. He and Mary have two sons, Robert Jr. (11/11/78) and Barton (12/17/80).

## Guy Brown ★ 59

**PRO:** Guy Brown responded to the challenge last season when called upon in a pressure situation for the first time in his career. Although highly



regarded for his all-around athletic ability, Brown has been plagued by injuries that have prevented him from winning a starting job. But Brown started and played well at strongside linebacker against Atlanta and Philadelphia in the playoffs last year after Mike Hegman dislocated an elbow in the NFC Wild Card Game. They were only the second and third career starts for Brown, who opened against the Giants in '79. "Moving into the lineup in the playoffs after not seeing that much action all year is a difficult situation for anyone," linebackers coach Jerry Tubbs said. "I'd have to say Guy came through with flying colors."

#### BROWN, Cont.

Brown is the tallest and, along with Anthony Dickerson, fastest (4.6 in 40) Cowboys linebacker. He has performed exceptionally well on special teams and also has played regularly in short-yardage situations. Last year he caused a fumble on a kickoff at Oakland that was recovered by Doug Cosbie, setting up a TD in the Cowboys' 19-13 victory. "Guy Brown has the experience and can step in and play pretty well, like he did in the playoffs last year," Tom Landry says. "He could very easily be a starting linebacker. He has all the physical qualities." GAMES: 1977 (14), 1978 (15), 1979 (15), 1980 (16). Total — 60.

**COLLEGE:** Brown earned All-Southwest Conference honors in his senior year as a "stand-up" defensive end. Injuries hampered his career at Houston where he began as a tight end.

**PERSONAL:** Guy Brown III is the oldest son in a family of 10 children from Palestine, Texas, which held Guy Brown Recognition Day in June. In the off-season Guy works as a sales representative for Daco, Inc., a Dallas-Fort Worth advertising firm. Guy is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and has been active with Special Olympics for the handicapped. Guy and wife Jacqueline have two daughters, Christa (7/30/79) and Tiffany (1/31/81).

## Glenn Carano ★ 18

**PRO:** It's easy for Tom Landry to remain confident about his quarterback situation when his No. 2 passer is Glenn Carano. "I don't know of

any team that has better depth at quarterback than the Cowboys," Landry says, "Glenn continues to improve nicely. He shows an excellent arm and has a good grasp of what's going on. He has the type of ability that will make him a starter someday." Carano moved into the No. 2 spot behind Danny White last year after Roger Staubach retired. Glenn threw his first regular season completion last Thanksgiving Day against Seattle, a 12-yard touchdown strike to Billy Joe DuPree. He added a 17-yard TD pass to Butch Johnson in a mop-up role at Los Angeles (12/15) when he completed 4-of-10 passes for 57 yards. "I think my passing ability has improved every year," Glenn says, "but I think it improved last year moreso because of the increased practice." Carano underwent surgery on his right (throwing) wrist in January to remove bone chips that were bothering him from an old basketball injury. The third quarterback taken in the '77 draft after Steve Pisarkiewicz and Tommy Kramer, Carano was chosen by Dallas in the second round with a choice from Seattle for wide receiver Duke Fergerson. Carano earned the No. 3 job by beating out Steve DeBerg, who subsequently became San Francisco's starter. In pre-

"Jim plays extremely well and plays consistently well week in and week out." Cooper was among the last players cut in '77 training camp after showing promise at tackle. He returned home to Philadelphia and was considering offers from other NFL teams when Cowboys personnel director Gil Brandt called. A decision had been made for tackle Jim Eidson to undergo knee surgery and Cooper was invited back. Cooper backed up the guard position his rookie year and started two games at center in '78 after learning the "shotgun" snap in training camp. In '79 he started the first 11 games at right tackle while Rayfield Wright struggled with a leg injury. With Wright's retirement in '80, Cooper took over undisputed possession of the job. He did an outstanding job in the playoffs, especially against Atlanta (1/4), winning a game ball from the coaches. "Cooper is the one guy we have who is flexible enough to play anywhere in the offensive line," offensive line coach Jim Myers says. "He's got good movement, size and he's smart. I thought center was his best position. The most amazing thing is he seems comfortable wherever we put him. I call him the five Cs. Consistent, confident, competitive, calm and collected." GAMES: 1977 (14), 1978 (14), 1979 (15), 1980 (15). Total - 58.

COLLEGE: Cooper started for three years at Temple under Wayne

PRO: Based on his recent past it seemed unlikely that Anthony Dickerson would be in Dallas in 1980 intercepting passes, forcing and recover-

ing fumbles, and causing all kinds of wonderful mayhem on special teams for the Cowboys. Dickerson left SMU after his junior year in '77 and signed with Calgary of the Canadian Football League. The Stampeders released him after 10 games in '78. Dickerson did not play football in '79. He moved to Los Angeles and got a job as a maintenance department stock clerk at the Burbank Airport. Then he returned to his native Texas and was taking business courses at the University of Houston when the Cowboys offered him a free agent contract. With his great speed and athletic ability, Dickerson made an immediate impact. He replaced D.D. Lewis at weakside linebacker in passing situations all season and was named the Cowboys' special teams player of the year by the local media. "Dickerson has such great movement, great speed and good explosion," says Tom Landry. Anthony intercepted two passes against San Francisco (10/12) and caused two fumbles on special teams versus Seattle (11/27) that led to two Dallas touchdowns. He recovered one fumble, broke up six passes and tied Aaron Mitchell for the team lead in forced fumbles with three. In the playoffs Dickerson recovered a fumble at Atlanta (1/4) that set up the Cowboys' first TD, and he intercepted a pass at Philadelphia in the NFC title game (1/11) that killed an Eagles' scoring threat. GAMES: 1980 (16).

COLLEGE: Dickerson received Junior College All-America honors at linebacker for Henderson J.C. in Athens, Texas, in '76. He transferred to SMU in Dallas and was named a co-captain after '77 spring practice. Although he played just one season for the Mustangs, SMU Coach Ron Meyer, a former Cowboys' scout, says, "I haven't been around that long, but Dickerson was the greatest linebacker I have ever coached."

## Pat Donovan 🛧 67

PRO: Steady progress and a consistently high level of play have marked Pat Donovan's rise from converted defensive lineman to Pro Bowl



offensive lineman. Like former Cowboys Pro Bowl guard Blaine Nye, Donovan was a defensive lineman at Stanford who made the switch to offense as a rookie. A backup tackle his first two seasons, Donovan took over at right tackle in '77 when Rayfield Wright suffered a knee injury. In '78 Pat moved in at left tackle to replace his mentor, former All-Pro Ralph Neely, who retired. Donovan emerged that season as a first-rate tackle, although a fractured wrist midway through the year hampered his pass blocking somewhat. Against Green Bay (11/12) he became the first offensive lineman since John Fitzgerald in '75 to win the Oak Farms Cowboys MVP award. In '79 Donovan received first-team All-NFC honors from United Press International, Pro Football Weekly and the Sporting News. He also became the first Cowboys offensive lineman to be voted a Pro Bowl starter since Rayfield Wright in '74. Last season Donovan served as an offensive co-captain and again was named to the Pro Bowl and to UPI's first-team All-NFC squad. Against St. Louis (11/16) he received his second career Oak Farms MVP award. "Our best offensive lineman in recent years has been Pat Donovan at left tackle," Tom Landry says. "He's just a lot quicker and faster, a better athlete, than most linemen." He has very strong legs for someone of his build, his acceleration is probably unequaled by anyone in the game today and he has great balance." He is, without a doubt, the most electrifying runner in Cowboys history. In 1980 Dorsett became the first player in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in each of his first four seasons. It marked the 10th straight year, counting high school and college, in which Dorsett gained more

than 1,000 yards, an unprecedented feat. Tony's 1,185-yard total was second highest in team history to his own 1,325 yards in '78. Dorsett had 183 yards against the Giants (11/9), tying Chicago's Walter Payton for top performance in the NFC in '80. It was also the second best single-game rushing total in club history to Dorsett's 206 yards versus Philadelphia in '77. In the NFC Wild Card Game against Los Angeles Tony set a Cowboys playoff record with 160 yards rushing, breaking Duane Thomas' 1971 mark of 143 against San Francisco. In the nine games leading to the NFC Championship Game Dorsett gained 930 yards on 178 carries, a 5.2-yard average. "Tony was the best I've seen him at the end of last year in the games leading up to the playoffs and in the playoffs themselves," Tom Landry says. Dorsett finished the '80 season as the Cowboys' fourth all-time leading rusher with a good chance to break the 5,000-yard barrier in '81. Tony has 18 career 100-yard games in regular season, including four straight in '79. Both are team records. The Cowboys are 19-1 in Dorsett's 100-yard games, including two playoff victories over the Rams. Tony's 823 yards rushing and eight touchdowns in the

playoffs also are team records. As a rookie Dorsett set team records for TDs rushing in a season (12), longest run from scrimmage (84) and most yards in a game (206) en route to consensus rookie of the year honors. In 1978 Tony broke the club record for rushing yards in a season, caught the NFC's longest scoring pass of the year (91) and earned a starting berth in the Pro Bowl. **COLLEGE:** Dorsett capped a brilliant collegiate career by winning the 1976 Heisman Trophy as the nation's outstanding player. ## Billy Joe DuPree ★ 89

PRO: Billy Joe DuPree is a working man's football player — strong, dependable, unselfish and unheralded — who has quietly gone about

building an impressive array of career achievements. The fourth leading receiver in club history, DuPree has not missed a game since joining the Cowboys in 1973, a streak of 118 straight games through 1980. He started every game from 1976 through 1980, giving him 76 consecutive starts entering the '81 season. An offensive co-captain in 1980, DuPree was No. 11 on the team's all-time touchdown list with 36 entering his ninth season. "Billy Joe is a team player, pure and simple," says receivers coach Mike Ditka, a former All-Pro tight end himself and the man DuPree replaced as the Cowboys' starter. "You'll have to go a long way to find a more unselfish player than BJ." A starter since his playing time in '75, DuPree set a club record for receptions by a tight end in '76 with 42. He also was voted the NFC's starting tight end

in the Pro Bowl that season, an honor he received again in '77 and '78. In '78 his nine TD catches led NFL tight ends and last season he caught 29 passes for the fourth time in eight years. "He has all the attributes you want in a tight end," Tom Landry says. "He's big, fast, makes the big play and blocks well." DuPree has had two 100-yard games, catching six passes for 100 yards against St. Louis in '75 (9/28) and five for 108 yards against New Orleans in '76 (9/19). ## John Dutton ★ 78

**PRO:** Nineteen-eighty was a year of transition for John Dutton, who moved to defensive tackle after playing his first six NFL seasons at defensive

end. It was also a year of rebirth. "I have a renewed feeling about football," Dutton says. "My whole attitude has changed. I feel like a kid again. I'm rejuvenated." With Larry Cole's retirement Dutton entered the '81 season in sole possession of the left tackle spot he shared with Cole last season. "There's no doubt in my mind he'll be a good tackle," defensive line coach Ernie Stautner says. "John has the ability to key well and with his strength I think the tackle spot will be more natural to him than end." In addition to the 52 tackles, 21/2 quarterback traps and two fumble recoveries he contributed last year, Dutton also scored his first NFL touchdown on a 38-yard interception return against New York Giants' QB Scott Brunner (10/5). The Cowboys acquired Dutton from the Baltimore Colts on the Oct. 9, 1979 trading deadline to help plug the hole left by the retirements of Ed Jones and Jethro Pugh. To get the three-time Pro Bowl selection, the Cowboys gave up their first-round and second-round 1980 draft choices. A right end at Baltimore, Dutton was moved to left end in '79 to replace Jones, but with Too Tall's return last year Dutton was moved to tackle. He started the final five games plus the playoff game in '79, finishing with 25 tackles, one QB trap and one forced trap. Chosen by the Colts in the first round of the '74 draft, the fifth pick overall (Too Tall was first), Dutton was named to the UPI, Pro Football Writers and Pro Football Weekly all-rookie teams and finished in a third-place tie for UPI rookie of the year. In '75 he led the Colts in QB traps with a career-high 17, was selected to the Pro Bowl for the first of three straight years and was named to the AP and UPI All-AFC teams. The following season Dutton reached All-Pro status, leading his team in QB traps again with 13 and being named All-Pro by AP and All-AFC by UPI. He was named to the Pro Bowl and UPI's All-AFC team again in '77. GAMES: 1974 (14/Balt.), 1975 (14/

tory. He also possesses a competitive spirit rivaled by few in his profession. "John Fitzgerald has a great attitude, great desire and he's a good leader," offensive line coach Jim Myers explains, "He tries so hard all the time. He may be the toughest we've got." Fitzgerald's experience proved invaluable in last year's season opener when the young Cowboys offense under Danny White took on the Redskins in Washington (9/8). In what Tom Landry termed one of Fitz' best games ever, the veteran center was named Oak Farms Cowboys co-MVP with guard Tom Rafferty as the Cowboys posted a 17-3 upset victory behind a powerful running attack. Injury, which has hampered Fitzgerald in the past, struck later in the season, however, forcing Fitz to miss two games. He underwent shoulder surgery in March. A defensive lineman in college, John spent his rookie year on the taxi squad. He was tried at tackle and guard before settling at center after volunteering to snap for Craig Morton and Roger Staubach at the end of practice one day as a rookie. Fitz took over for Dave Manders as the starting center in 1973. He won his first Oak Farms MVP award in 1975 against Philadelphia (11/23). In '79 he received a coaches game ball for his effort in a victory over the Giants (12/2). Fitz is the senior member of the Cowboys' "Irish Connection," featuring fellow offensive linemen Pat Donovan, Tom Rafferty and Jim Cooper. "We're four Irishmen and a Scott," he says, as in Herb Scott. "There are only two types of people in the world. Those who are Irish and those who wish they were Irish." With starting right tackle Jim Cooper sidelined by a sore knee for the 11th game, Andy did a fine job in his first start since '78 as the Cowboys won at St. Louis (11/2). Released on the last cut of '79 training camp, Frederick returned to the Cowboys when rookie tackle Richard Grimmett injured a knee prior to the regular season opener. Andy started the first five games of the '78 season at right tackle due to Ralph Neely's retirement and the slow rehabilitation of Rayfield Wright's knee. Andy spent most of his rookie season of '77 on the special teams but also played a key backup role. Following injuries to Wright and Jim Eidson plus Blaine Nye's retirement, Pat Donovan and Neely were the only experienced tackles. by Cowboys scouts and coaches, "Mike played extremely well last year in his first full year as our starting strongside linebacker," Tom Landry says. "His performance was encouraging." Following four sea-sons as a special teams performer and backup outside linebacker, Hegman was thrust into a starting role for the final four games of 1979 after Thomas Henderson was dismissed from the squad. Mike won the job outright with a fine 1980 training camp and solidified his grasp by consistently playing well all year. Highlights included a recovered fumble in the end zone for a touchdown at Philadelphia (10/19) and two intercepted passes against Seattle (11/27). He finished fifth on the team in tackles with 85, including 63 solos, and he had three quarterback traps. Against the Rams, in the NFC Wild Card Game, however, he dislocated his left elbow and missed the next two playoff games. "Mike has good football instincts and has a knack for coming up with big plays," linebackers coach Jerry Tubbs notes. "He has the kind of natural reaction to the ball that only a few gifted players are blessed with." The most visible evidence of those instincts came in Super Bowl XIII when he stole the ball from Pittsburgh OB Terry Bradshaw and raced 37 yards for a second-quarter touchdown, his first official NFL TD. Hegman had scored on a 66-yard interception return against Denver earlier that year, 1978, in pre-season. During '78 he started three games when Henderson was injured and alternated with D.D. Lewis at weakside (right) linebacker for three others. He shared the team lead in fumble recoveries with two, had two QB traps and forced two others. In the '79 playoffs against Los Angeles, Mike led the Cowboys in tackles with nine and tipped Vince Ferragamo's pass that Billy Waddy caught for the 50-yard winning TD with two minutes left. GAMES: 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16). Total - 76.

**COLLEGE:** Hegman made Tennessee State's football team as a walk-on after transferring from Alabama A&M. 

PRO: Despite an injured left shoulder that required offseason surgery, Tony Hill in 1980 became the only Cowboys receiver besides Bob

Hayes in '65 and '66 to compile consecutive 1,000-yard seasons. In becoming the Cowboys' eighth all-time leading pass-catcher in just his fourth season, "Thrill" led the team in receiving for the second straight year and in receiving yardage for the third straight season. His receiving yardage was seventh best in the NFL for the second year in a row. In '79 Tony combined with Drew Pearson and Tony Dorsett to make the Cowboys the first NFC (or old NFL) team with two 1,000-yard wide receivers in a season and the first NFL team with two 1,000-yard WRs and a 1,000-yard back in one year. In three seasons as a starter the two-time Pro Bowl selection ('78 and '79) has caught 13 passes of 40 yards or longer. "Tony Hill is one of the best deep receivers in the league," Tom Landry says. "He can really go deep and make a great adjustment on a ball in flight and this makes him a constant threat. He is a very explosive player, the type who can turn a short play into a big play in a hurry because he has excellent running ability and speed." Hill has had three game-winning catches that have enabled him to perform his "Wings of Victory" TD celebration with added gusto. In '79 his 22-yard quick screen with two minutes left beat Chicago (9/16) and an eight-yarder with 39 seconds remaining clinched the NFC East title for Dallas in a dramatic comeback victory over Washington (12/16). His 28-yard scoring catch from Danny White with 45 seconds left lifted the Cowboys over St. Louis (11/2) last year. "Confidence oozes from the guy," teammate Pat Donovan says. "And the great thing about it is that he can back it up with the big catch." Hill was obtained with a draft pick acquired from Philadelphia in '75 for former All-Pro guard John Niland. He delivers the ball extremely quickly and this is a great asset, along with his size. We feel as if he will continue to progress. We're pretty confident he will have a future with us." Meanwhile, Hogeboom has learned to be patient. "I know my role," he says. "I'll have to play the other team's quarterback through the week, and on game day I'm on the sideline with the head-set and the clipboard, jotting down the defenses. The Cowboys like to bring their quarterbacks along slowly through the system." Gary slipped into two games in 1980 on special teams. GAMES: 1980 (2).

**COLLEGE:** Hogeboom was the Mid-American Conference player of the year in 1979 after leading Central Michigan to its first conference championship. 

"The guy's so strong and he's one of our best hitters. He's the type of linebacker who can stop a ball carrier dead in his tracks." Signed as a free agent in 1977, Huther impressed Cowboys coaches with his aggressiveness and intelligence. He excelled on the kicking teams and capped his rookie season by recovering a fumbled punt by Denver in the Cowboys' Super Bowl XII victory. Huther's continued fierce play earned him the club's special teams player of the year award in '78 and '79. One of his biggest plays came in the '78 playoffs against Atlanta when he fell on a fumbled kickoff by the Cowboys in the end zone. It saved a touchdown in a game Dallas had to come from behind to win. In addition to backing up the middle linebacker spot, Huther has played on short-yardage and goal-line defenses. In '79 he made two tackles on a successful goal-line stand against the Giants (12/2). Last year he recovered a fumble against the 49ers (10/12) and he filled in capably in the middle late in the season when a bruised knee forced Breunig to the sidelines for parts of games. After a brief trial at strongside linebacker early in training camp last year, Huther was moved back to his natural middle linebacker position. PRO: The explosion of the passing game in the NFL in recent years has made a strong corps of pass-catchers more vital than ever. Butch

Johnson, teaming with Drew Pearson and Tony Hill, gives the Cowboys as talented a group of wide receivers as any team's. Johnson turned in his best season in 1980, with career highs in catches, yards and touchdowns. Fittingly, he climaxed his season with another of the big plays that have come to be his trademark, a 35-yard TD catch that sent Dallas ahead of Los Angeles 27-13 late in the third quarter of the Cowboys' wild card playoff victory. In '79, although he missed the first five games with a broken little finger, Johnson contributed to two victories with clutch receptions. His diving 19-yard third-down catch sparked a late fourth-quarter rally at the New York Giants (11/4), and, in a playoff-clinching victory at Philadelphia (12/8), Butch alertly snared a deflected 17-yard pass for the winning TD in the fourth period. Johnson broke into the lineup as a play messenger with Golden Richards in '77. Against San Francisco that season (12/12) he made a remarkable one-handed TD grab, then capped the season with a spectacular TD catch in Super Bowl XII, a diving 45-yard reception that sent Dallas ahead of Denver 20-3 in the third quarter. He scored his second Super Bowl TD the next year against Pittsburgh on a fouryard pass late in the game. "I love the big games," Butch says. "That's just the type of player I am. Coach Landry knows that in a playoff game he can put me in and I'll make the catches that will swing the

game for us." Says Landry, "Butch is a proven, talented player. He has come through for us many times in clutch situations." PRO: Ed "Too Tall" Jones returned to the Cowboys in 1980 a mentally rejuvenated and physically improved player. The year he spent as

a professional boxer in 1979 made a definite contribution to the football career he resumed on July 8, 1980. "He's quicker, faster and stronger than he was before he left," says defensive line coach Ernie Stautner. "But the major difference I see is his determination. He's made a decision as far as his future is concerned. He's more intense now." Jones confirms the evaluation. "Physically, boxing was great discipline. I'm in the best shape of my life. I'm also mentally into the game now. I enjoyed the boxing experience. I'd do it again. But it's out of my system now and I'm back to being a Dallas Cowboy, a foctball player. I'm happy and I'm hungry." Enjoying his finest pro season in 1980, Jones had a career-high 11 pass deflections, seven quarterback traps and a team-leading three fumble recoveries. "Many people wondered what Jones could do for us after taking a year off," D.D. Lewis says. "That if he could pick up where he left off he could really help us. Well, he's picked up where he left off and he's gone past that. I think he's All-Pro." The first player selected in the '74 draft with a choice obtained from Houston for Tody Smith and Billy Parks, Too Tall started his career at weakside defensive end concentrating on the pass rush. In his second season he swapped positions with Harvey Martin and became the left end focusing on stopping the run. Too Tall has been at his most awesome in the playoffs, especially in '77 and '78 when the Cowboys went to Super Bowls XII and XIII. Jones had a career-high 12 QB traps in '78. GAMES: 1974 (14), 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1980 (16). Total - 88.

**COLLEGE:** Although he did not begin playing football until his senior year of high school, Jones was a two-time All-America at Tennessee State. He also played two years of college basketball. A college teammate dubbed Jones "Too Tall."

**PERSONAL:** Edward Lee Jones, a native of Jackson, Tenn., is a partner in Dallas-based Imperial Investors, Inc., with Billy Joe DuPree, Butch Johnson, Preston Pearson and Benny Barnes. PRO: James "Yogi" Jones not only set team kick return records in 1980, he also inspired his teammates with his exciting, gritty style. "When

you see somebody like James Jones out there with so much courage on the kick teams, then it just does something to the veteran players." says Danny White. "It gives them a lift." Jones set club season records for punt returns (54) and punt return yardage (548), breaking Butch Johnson's previous marks. Yogi's 10.1-yard punt return average was the Cowboys' highest since Johnson's 10.9 in '76 and it ranked fifth best in the NFL and fourth in the NFC. It also made him the second leading punt returner in team history. Jones' 22.5-yard kickoff return average was the club's best since Johnson's 24.4 in '77 and it ranked sixth in the NFC. A versatile player with fine pass-catching ability. Jones made a sparkling debut as Tony Dorsett's backup when he picked up 45 yards on 10 carries in the season-opening victory at Washington (9/8) with Dorsett sidelined periodically by leg cramps. Later in the year against the Redskins (11/23) Yogi had a seasonhigh 52-yard punt return to set up a TD in a 14-10 victory. Against Los Angeles in the NFC Wild Card Game (12/28) he had 153 yards

in kick returns, including a dazzling 43-yard punt return in the first quarter that got the Cowboys rolling. Jones did not return punts in college, but volunteered for the job in training camp in an effort to assure his spot on the team. "It's incredible what a guy like Jones can add to your specialty teams," special assistant coach Ermal Allen says. Adds Tom Landry, "James Jones is one of the most outstanding punt return men we've had. He showed great courage and did an outstanding job for us. Anytime you end up with plus 10 yards per return, that's excellent." GAMES: 1980 (16).



said Lewis should have been All-Pro and in '78 he said D.D. deserved to be in the Pro Bowl. Making up for his lack of size with aggressiveness and fine football instincts, Lewis was a special teams standout and backup to All-Pro Chuck Howley his first four years (D.D. spent '69 in military service). He has served as punt team snapper and backup punter and in '77 and '78 was a defensive co-captain. Some of D.D.'s top moments have come in the playoffs. The only time he's picked off two passes in one game came in the '75 NFC Championship Game at Los Angeles (1/4/76) when he intercepted two for 20 yards. He was outstanding in the '77 playoffs with an interception against Terry Bradshaw. Lewis' five Super Bowl appearances is a record shared by seven other players, and his 25 playoff game appearances is one behind the NFL record held by former teammate Larry Cole. GAMES: 1968 (14), 1970 (12), 1971 (14), 1972 (12), 1973 (14), 1974 (14), 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (13), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16). Total — 169.

**COLLEGE:** Although a small linebacker at 200 pounds, Lewis earned All-America and Southeastern Conference player of the year honors in '67. He was a two-time All-SEC pick described by one Cowboys scout as "pound-for-pound maybe the best player in the country."

**PERSONAL:** A Knoxville, Tenn., native, Dwight Douglas Lewis was named for a pair of famous World War II generals. D.D. is co-owner and spokesman for Nutri-System, Inc., a medically-supervised weightloss program with 280 centers in 40 states. He is a national spokesman for Boys Clubs of America and in '78 the Knoxville Boys Club established the D.D. Lewis Fund for Needy Children. ## Wade Manning ★ 22

CORNERBACK OHIO STATE 2nd YEAR HT: 5-11 • WT: 190 • BORN: 7/25/55 • FA FOR '79

PRO: Wade Manning spent the 1980 season on injured reserve and missed seven games during

his rookie year of '79, but the Cowboys still hold great expectations for the former Ohio State baseball player. "We had high hopes for Wade Manning last summer," says Tom Landry. "He has great movement and does a lot of things well. But his knee was bothering him. With that corrected, maybe we'll see a different Wade Manning this year. Surely, he has the speed and athletic ability to play the corner." Manning was traded to Buffalo on Sept. 1, 1980, but was returned to Dallas when he failed the Bills' physical. Manning then underwent cartilage surgery on his left knee. Wade signed with the Cowboys in '79 as a free agent after not having played football since he was a 5-1, 135-pound high school safety. Capitalizing on his great speed, he averaged a whopping 14.6 yards on 15 punt returns in preseason, including a 62-yarder against Pittsburgh (8/25) to seal his spot on the team. In the '79 season opener at St. Louis (9/2) Wade raced 47 yards with a kickoff late in the game, allowing the Cowboys to drive for the winning field goal. He hurt his knee the following week at San Francisco and was placed on injured reserve after the fifth game. He was reactivated to replace Thomas Henderson for the 13th game and in a playoff-clinching victory at Philadelphia (12/8) Wade returned a punt 17 yards, the Cowboys' longest of the year, to the Dallas 44 to set up the winning touchdown drive. GAMES: 1979 (9), 1980 (inj.).

COLLEGE: A three-year center field for Ohio State, Manning batted .325 with a team-leading six home runs and a school-record 23 (of 25) stolen bases to earn All-Big Ten honors his senior year. He stole 44 bases in his career. He was drafted by the Cleveland Indians out of Shaker Heights High School and by the Pittsburgh Pirates in '76.

PERSONAL: Wade Ronald Arthur Manning was born in Meadville, Pa., but was raised in Shaker Heights, Ohio. During the offseason he works for Dallas-based Petro West Oil & Gas Management Company. Wade also is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He and wife Emma Jean live in Dallas. Wade has a son, Jason Wade Manning (10/27/78).

## Harvey Martin ★ 79



#### DEFENSIVE END • EAST TEXAS STATE • 9th YEAR HT: 6-5 • WT: 250 • BORN: 11/16/50 • D-3 FOR '73

PRO: The sight of Harvey Martin swooping into the backfield from his right end position has been a fearsome sight for NFL quarterbacks for nearly a decade. Martin has led or co-led the Cowboys in quarterback traps every year he's been with the club, eight straight seasons, averaging 13 per year for a total of 104 (from '73.'80, 9.10.10.15.23.16-9.12). A defensive co-captain from '77.'80, Harvey is a fiery competitor and the emotional leader of the Cowboys' defense. "He's the spark plug on our team," teammate Bob Breunig says. "He lifts everyone." Martin is a four-time Pro Bowl selection ('76-'79) who also was a unanimous All-Pro choice in 77. Says Philadelphia tackle Stan Walters, "From the consistency standpoint, Martin is the best. He plays a very disciplined kind of game and on passing situations he goes at it, thinking he's going to get the sack every time." Harvey tied his singlegame career high of three QB traps last year against St. Louis (11/2). He also had four traps in the playoffs. In '79 he developed an inside pass rush to complement his feared outside speed rush, which opponents were concentrating on taking away. Although he didn't miss a game in '78, leg and shoulder injuries hampered Martin throughout the season, in which he tied Randy White for the team lead in QB traps with 16. He had a big game in the NFC title game at Los Angeles (1/7/79) with a team-leading seven tackles, a QB trap and a fumble recovery. Harvey's '77 season was one of the best ever by an NFL defensive player - 85 tackles, a league-leading 23 traps, two fumble recoveries in the NFC title game, co-MVP with Randy White in the Super Bowl, consensus All-Pro honors and NFL defensive player of the year. Harvey shares with former teammate Cliff Harris the NFL career playoff record of four fumble recoveries. PRO: Taking over as the starting right cornerback in 1980, Aaron Mitchell gave the Cowboys an intensely aggressive defender who came up

with a number of big plays. Showing marked improvement from his rookie year, Mitchell co-led the team in forced fumbles with Anthony Dickerson with three, and he was a big contributor in two of the Cowboys' biggest victories. He had two touchdown-saving pass breakups and a diving fourth-quarter end zone interception to preserve a victory at Oakland (12/7) and earn his first Oak Farms MVP award. Mitchell had the biggest defensive play of the Cowboys' NFC Wild Card Game victory over the Rams (12/28), a third-quarter interception that set up the clinching TD. Aaron also had a diving end zone interception in the NFC Championship Game at Philadelphia (1/11) and a 56-yard interception return at the Giants (11/2). "He's a hard-nosed, tough defensive football player," Tom Landry says. "He has good speed and it doesn't bother him to get beat, which is really the knack of a good defensive back. He keeps competing." Aaron played regularly on passing downs as a rookie. With Benny Barnes sidelined by a sore foot against Cincinnati (9/30), Mitchell made his only start and returned his only interception of the year 36 yards to the Bengals 12 to set up Dallas' clinching TD. PRO: "He's the type of player every coach likes to have," Tom Landry says. "You call on him and he responds." Robert Newhouse has re-

sponded to every manner of challenge for nearly a decade with the Cowboys. In 1980, when it seemed he was about to become the Cowboys' fullback of the past, 'House regained his starting job from Ron Springs a month into the season and never relinquished it. In doing so he finished as the club's second-leading rusher and moved his distinguished career total within 362 yards of the 5,000-yard mark. The third leading ground gainer in team history entering the '81 season, Newhouse would join Don Perkins (6,217) and Calvin Hill (5,009) in the Cowboys' exclusive 5,000-yard club. 'There isn't a more hard-nosed back in pro ball than Robert Newhouse," says Tony Dorsett. A stress fracture of the lower left leg suffered in the season opener slowed Newhouse in '79 after a broken bone in his right leg marred his '78 season. Robert was enjoying one of his best years in '78 when the injury struck him down in game 12 against New Orleans (11/19). His streak of playing in 96 straight games was broken when he missed the next three. Still, 'House led the team in rushing TDs with eight and total TDs scored with 10, and in a key victory over Green Bay (11/12) he played the equivalent of a perfect game, receiving the highest grades ever by a Dallas running back in the coaches' film review. Newhouse has had five career 100-yard games, most recently in the '79 season opener at St. Louis (9/2) when he gained 108 yards. A starter since '74, he has performed well in key games, such as Super Bowl XII when he tossed a 29-yard TD pass to Golden Richards to seal the victory over Denver. anyone expected. "Timmy Newsome shows a lot of promise," Tom Landry says. "He's going to be able to push people ahead of him.

We still must determine who is the best of our fullbacks. The position will be open to Newhouse. Springs and Newsome going into camp. I think one of them needs to emerge as the unquestioned starter." Although he began slowly in training camp and didn't see much action during the season, Newsome impressed his coaches in practice with his all-around skills. He did catch three passes and score two touchdowns on one-yard runs in a victory over San Diego (10/26). He also had a few long runs, a 23-yarder against Seattle (11/27) plus a 19-yarder and 15-yarder in the playoffs against Los Angeles (12/28). Newsome is a good blocker and good receiver, even though he didn't have much opportunity to catch passes in college. He is bigger than most previous Cowboys fullbacks and he is exceptionally strong. In his four-year career at Winston-Salem State. Newsome rushed for 3,843 yards (6.1 per carry) and 38 touchdowns. He was the CIAA's leading rusher and scorer in 1977, '78 and '79.

## Drew Pearson 🛧 88

# WIDE RECEIVER • TULSA • 9th YEAR HT: 6-0 • WT: 183 • BORN: 1/12/51 • FA FOR '73

PRO: In 1980 Drew Pearson added dramatically to the already storied achievements of his unlikely career. This former free agent, who was passed over by all 26 NFL teams in the 1973 draft, became the Cowboys' all-time leading receiver on Nov. 16 when he made his 366th reception to pass Bob Hayes. Then in the playoffs against Atlanta (1/4) he caught two touchdown passes in the final 3:40, the second with 42 seconds left, to rally the Cowboys past the Falcons 30-27. That clutch Drew Pearson performance joined three others that rank among the most memorable in club history - an 83-yard fourthquarter TD reception to beat the Rams in the '73 playoffs; a 50-yard scoring catch in the closing seconds to beat Washington on Thanksgiving Day 1974; and the 50-yard "Hail Mary" in the final 20 seconds that beat Minnesota in the '75 playoffs. "The thing you can't do is look inside a player and find out how really competitive he is and how he will react in situations where you really need him," Gil Brandt says. "These things take time to find out, and they're the things Drew Pearson is all about." Although not particularly big or fast, Drew has been spectacular often and consistent always. He has been selected to the All-Pro and Pro Bowl teams three times, in 1974, '76 and '77. Last year he was named to the All-Decade Team of the 1970s by the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Pearson led NFC pass catchers in '76 with 58 receptions and he holds club records for catching passes in 58 consecutive games between '74 and '78 and in each of the past 16 playoff games. In '79 Drew and Tony Hill became the first pair of NFC (or old NFL) receivers to each catch 1,000 yards worth of passes in a season. Drew became a starter midway through his rookie year and has missed only one game (12/8/79 at Philadelphia) in his career. He served as an offensive co-captain in '77 and '78. "We count on Drew so much for the clutch catches because he runs such disciplined routes and can catch all kinds of passes," Tom Landry says. GAMES: 1973 (14), 1974 (14), 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (15), 1980 (16). Total — 117.

**COLLEGE:** Pearson caught a team-leading 33 passes for a runoriented, 4-7 Tulsa team in 1972 and received the university president's award as the team's "best spirited and most unselfish member." Drew succeeded Joe Theismann as quarterback at South River, N.J., High School but was converted to flanker at Tulsa.

**PERSONAL:** Drew Pearson was voted the Cowboys' NFL man of the year by fans in 1980. He is a national spokesman for the Distilled Spirits Council, which battles teenage alcohol abuse, and he serves on President Reagan's non-partisan White House committee

on alcohol and drug abuse. Drew is a partner with Harvey Martin in Smokey's Express barbecue restaurant in Dallas. He also works in the sports department for KDFW-TV, the Dallas CBS affiliate, and has a local radio show during the season. Drew founded the Cowboys players' offseason basketball team and is married to the daughter of former Harlem Globetrotters star Marques Haynes. Drew and Marsha Pearson have two daughters, Tori Nichole (7/23/74) and Britni Ja'Nae (8/6/79).

PRO: Kurt Petersen is trying to duplicate the success of Pat Donovan, John Fitzgerald and Blaine Nye, college defensive linemen who became

top offensive linemen for the Cowboys. According to his coaches, Petersen has all the tools to succeed — size, quickness, strength and intelligence. "Kurt Petersen was one of our best rookies last year as far as physical potential," Tom Landry says. "He made the switch from defense to offensive guard. Although he had some rough edges early, which was expected, he improved enough toward the end of the year that we think he has a chance to be a good player." **PRO:** In an era of growing specialization in football Jay Saldi seems to become a more valuable offensive weapon every year. Serving as a play

messenger with starting tight end Billy Joe DuPree, and with the Cowboys using a double tight end offense more than ever, Saldi by far had his best season in 1980, establishing personal highs in catches and yards. His biggest play was a nifty 37-yard catch to the three to set up the go-ahead touchdown in the NFC Wild Card Game victory over Los Angeles (12/28). "Jay Saldi fits the specialty mold extremely well," Tom Landry explains. "He does a lot of things well and we use him effectively. He's a fine overall football player." Saldi missed the final 11 games of the '78 season with a broken right forearm, but returned in '79 to give the Cowboys excellent depth at tight end. Jay had the distinction of catching Roger Staubach's last touchdown pass, a two-yarder that sent Dallas ahead in the fourth quarter of its '79 playoff loss to Los Angeles (12/30). Says receivers coach Mike Ditka, "Jay runs the best routes around. He's got the unique situation of being something of a combination tight end-wide receiver. A free agent longshot in '76, Saldi first made his mark as a rugged special teams performer. Landry called him the team's most improved player after '77 training camp and named Jay special teams captain, a post he held until his '78 injury against St. Louis (9/24). Saldi scored three touchdowns in '77, two by air and one by sliding eight yards on his back with a fumbled Giants punt. Also in '77 he set up the winning TD (Continued on next page)

being a 13th-round draft pick from Virginia Union, Scott barely made the team in '75, but he won the regular left guard position the following year and has been collecting a host of honors since 1978. Scott was named first-team All-NFC in '78, '79 and '80 by United Press International and by the Sporting News in '79. He was chosen by his peers to play in the Pro Bowl in '79 and '80. Also in 1980 he became the Cowboys' first All-Pro offensive lineman since Rayfield Wright in '75 when he was chosen first-team All-NFL by the Associated Press and the Newspaper Enterprise Association. Known to teammates as "Pooch." Scott is considered the Cowboys' best open field blocker, consistently ranks at or near the top as a pass blocker and is seldom penalized. His balmy demeanor obviously hides an aggressive football personality. Or, as teammate Pat Donovan puts it, "Beneath that gentle exterior lies a heart of ice." Earlier in his career Herbert was bothered by hamstring problems, which cost him four starts and half of two other games in '77. In '76 he spent the second half of the season as a play messenger with Burton Lawless. "Herb has good balance; he adjusts well on cross changes by the defensive linemen; he's consistent; and he can flat strike a blow, especially on the move," says offensive line coach Jim Myers, GAMES: 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (11), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16). Total - 87.

**COLLEGE:** A versatile offensive performer at Virginia Union, Scott played guard, tackle and even caught one pass as a tight end. He also was a top shot putter for the track team.

**PERSONAL:** Herbert Carnell Scott, Jr., works in the offseason for A. L. Williams & Associates, a Dallas financial planning firm. Earlier in his career he taught high school math and science in the offseason in his native Virginia Beach, Va. Herb's hobby is gospel singing. ## Rafael Septien ★ 1

**PRO:** The Cowboys' touchdown-rich offense prevented Rafael Septien from enjoying a big field goal year in 1980, but the Mexican-born side-

winder continued to come through consistently whenever called upon. The third-leading field goal kicker in team history, Septien converted 10-of-11 chances inside the 40 to raise his career mark in that range to 53-of-63 (84 percent), then added three field goals in three tries in the playoffs. He booted a career-long 52-yarder in a victory at Oakland (12/7), and he set a club record by kicking 59 extra points,

breaking Danny Villanueva's 1966 mark of 56. Septien was the NFC's fifth-leading scorer. A fine all-around athlete who recovered two fumbled kickoffs last year. Septien attributes much of his steady improvement to positive thinking courses he has taken. "I've always felt I was a good kicker, but the mind governs much of what you do," he says. "That's probably the area I've improved most in." Rafael was the NFC's third-leading scorer in '79. Twice that season he equaled his career best of three field goals in a game, and both times he won the game with dramatic kicks. He pulled out a 22-21 victory at St. Louis (9/2) with a 22-yarder off the left upright with 1:16 left and his 22-yarder with three seconds remaining beat New York Giants (11/4) 16-14. He also hit 51-yard field goals against San Francisco (9/9) and St. Louis (10/21). Drafted by New Orleans in the 10th round in '77, Septien was released during training camp and signed by Los Angeles. A consensus all-rookie selection and the NFC's fourth-leading scorer in '77, Septien was beaten out in '78 by Frank Corral and released by the Rams after the final preseason game. The Cowboys immediately signed Septien (8/30) to replace Efren Herrera, who had been traded to Seattle. The biggest moment of his first Cowboys season came at St. Louis (10/15) when he kicked a 47-yarder into the wind at 3:28 of overtime for a 24-21 victory. COLLEGE: Septien received All-Southland Conference honors his final two seasons at Southwest Louisiana. He kicked nine field goals of more than 50 yards with a long of 57 against Lamar in '74.

Injuries to veteran starter John Fitzgerald opened the way for Shaw, but the determined young man's performance made him a solid contender to retain the job in '81. Shaw started five games last season, including the three playoff games. Following the NFC Wild Card Game victory over Los Angeles (12/28), in which Shaw earned a coaches' game ball, Tom Landry said, "Shaw played as fine a game as I've seen a lineman play for us." Somewhat undersized as a rookie at about 240 pounds, Shaw reported to '80 training camp 20 pounds heavier and with a ton of resolve. Without doubt he was among the most improved players in camp. "He improved his size and strength, and he has great mental characteristics with his desire and aggressiveness," offensive line coach Jim Myers says. Explains Shaw, "Success is based as much on attitude as strength. There's a saying I always liked. It's to aim for the stars and even if you don't hit them, you'll still land high. Besides, setting high goals only makes you work harder." Shaw was the first center to be named a first-round draft choice by the Cowboys and the first offensive lineman drafted No. 1 since guard John Niland in '66. As a rookie he played on special teams and started one game at center, against Houston (11/22) when Fitzgerald was injured. GAMES: 1979 (16), 1980 (14). Total - 30

**COLLEGE:** A three-year starter who co-captained the Volunteers as a senior, Shaw earned All-Southeastern Conference honors in '77 and '78 and started in both the East-West Shrine and Senior Bowl games. He was named second-team All-America by the Newspaper Enterprise Association in '78.

**PERSONAL:** Born in Tuscaloosa, Ala., Robert Leslie Shaw graduated from Wheeler High School in Georgia where, in addition to becoming state football lineman of the year, he also played basketball and swam competitively. power and excellent pass-catching ability. Following a fine rookie year as Tony Dorsett's backup at tailback, Springs added 10 pounds and was shifted to fullback in 1980. He won the starting job in training camp from veteran Robert Newhouse, but twisted an ankle in the third game against Tampa Bay (9/21), allowing Newhouse to regain the position for the rest of the season. "Ron's a tough, hard-nosed, slashing-type runner," Tom Landry says. "He has a knack for hitting the hole and is a strong, powerful runner. He also has good speed and catches the ball well. I'm anxious to see him compete again at fullback after a full year at the position." Springs had a sparkling rookie year after being only the 167th player chosen in the '79 draft. He filled in exceptionally well at tailback in three victories, including two crucial ones late in the year, when Dorsett was ailing. In the season opener at St. Louis (9/2) Ron threw a 30-yard fourth-quarter touchdown pass to Tony Hill on his first professional attempt. Springs took over for Dorsett late in the first half

COLLEGE: Bruce led the Big 10 in quarterback traps in '77 with 10, but was moved to a backup role in his senior year when Illi-





## Dennis Thurman ★ 32



**PRO:** With the Cowboys looking for an increase in turnovers in 1980, Dennis Thurman's opportunistic brand of defensive backfield play proved to

be exactly what was needed. Compensating for his lack of textbook size with volumes of football savvy, Thurman started the entire season at free safety for injured Randy Hughes and co-led the team in interceptions with Charlie Waters with five, recovered two fumbles and forced two other fumbles. He was second to Bob Breunig in tackles with 101 and his team-leading 114 yards on interception returns was the Cowboys highest total since Waters' 132 in '72. Thurman's biggest moment came in St. Louis (11/2) when he returned an interception 78 yards for a fourth-quarter touchdown in a narrow Cowboys victory. "Thurman plays like a 10-year man," Waters says. "He's got a lot of cool, and he's a ballhawk. He believes the ball is his. He just has this great feel for split-second analysis, that innate knack for being where the ball is." Thurman, who added 10 pounds for the '81 season, made the Cowboys as a long-shot in '78 at cornerback, although the long-term projection for him was at safety, his college position. Dennis excelled on special teams during his rookie year, but he also played more than expected at cornerback because of injuries to Benny Barnes and Mark Washington. PRO: One of the surprises of 1980 training camp was Norm Wells, a 12th-round draft choice who not only made the final 45-man squad but

He also was joining a rich Cowboys tradition of line conversions. Five of the Cowboys' nine offensive linemen on opening day last year had been converted from defense to offense. Besides Wells, they were veterans Pat Donovan, John Fitzgerald and Andy Frederick plus fellow rookie Kurt Petersen. In the third game against Tampa Bay (9/21), however, Wells injured his right knee playing on special teams and spent the rest of the season on injured reserve. He returned for the divisional playoff game at Atlanta (1/4), but hurt the knee again on special teams. He underwent surgery in the offseason. GAMES: 1980 (3).

**COLLEGE:** After suffering a season-ending knee injury in the first game of '78, Wells returned to win the starting right defensive tackle position at Northwestern in '79 with his extra year of eligibility. He had an interception which he returned for 12 yards that season.

**PRO:** In fashioning his esteemed career with the Cowboys Charlie Waters has displayed just about every quality of a great athlete. In 1980,

playing on a damaged right knee. Charlie relied on brains and courage. 'Charlie played amazingly well under the circumstances," Tom Landry says, "I'm not sure how he played with the injuries he had without showing it any more than he did. He played on courage alone and if a guy can do that then you can't ever count him out." After playing in 128 straight games and reaching All-Pro status at strong safety, Waters missed the '79 season due to a torn right knee ligament suffered in preseason at Seattle (8/12). He hurt the same knee again last preseason at Los Angeles (8/16), but played all year with a knee brace. He shared the club lead in interceptions with Dennis Thurman with five, becoming the second all-time leading pass stealer in team history behind Mel Renfro. Three of the interceptions came at key moments of the second half of victories - at Washington (9/8), at home against Tampa Bay (9/21) and at Oakland (12/7). Following a second surgery on the knee on Feb. 4, Charlie decided it was strong enough for him to go to training camp in '81. "I admire athletes who make a comeback, and I want to make a comeback, too," he says. "I want to go out as a champion." A big-game, big-play performer, Waters was a Pro Bowl choice in '76, '77 and '78, and he was voted All-Pro in '77 and '78. He has been superb in the playoffs, including five Super Bowls, and he holds the NFL career playoff record for most interceptions with nine. Waters' three interceptions against Chicago (12/26/77) is an NFC Divisional Playoff Game record, and his three playoff fumble recoveries is one behind the NFL record shared by Harvey Martin and Cliff Harris. Charlie's two interceptions and one fumble recovery sparked Dallas over the Rams in the '78 NFC Championship Game (1/7/79). He became the starting strong safety in '76 after playing both cornerback and safety through his first six seasons. Personable and popular, Charlie won the Oak Farms Favorite Cowboys contest in '78 and '80. GAMES: 1970 (14), 1971 (14), 1972 (14), 1973 (14), 1974 (14), 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (inj.), 1980 (16). Total - 144.

**PRO:** The most critical position change in football takes place at quarterback. Yet rather than precipitate the downfall of the Cowboys, the re-

tirement of Roger Staubach in 1980 merely opened the way for another quarterback with a flair for winning. In Danny White's first season as a starter, the Cowboys in 1980 tied for the NFL's best regular season record, led the league in scoring and set team records for points and touchdowns scored. Individually, White's 28 TD passes broke Staubach's 1979 club record by one. Six weeks into the season White was the NFL's top-rated quarterback before a rash of interceptions dropped him finally to seventh best in the NFC and ninth in the NFL. His 59.6 completion percentage was third best in club history. Danny's 25 interceptions tied Eddie LeBaron's 1960 Cowboys record. but White's career rating elevated him to No. 2 among all-time Cowbovs quarterbacks. Coaches and teammates predict an even brighter future for White, a brilliant student of the game and a natural competitor. "It frightens me to think how good Danny is going to be if he keeps improving like he did last year," says teammate Jay Saldi. "He is a born leader and we believe in him." Adds Charlie Waters, "Don't kid vourself, he's a cutthroat winner. I don't care what the game is, he'll do anything to beat you. He just has so much poise and so much athletic ability. I'd hate to have to play defense against him. He'd frustrate me." White directed two last-minute comeback victories in '80, wasting no time making a Staubach trademark one of his own. Danny tossed a 28-yard fourth-down TD pass to Tony Hill with 45 seconds left to beat St. Louis 27-24 (11/2). In the playoffs he threw two TD passes to Drew Pearson, the winner with 42 seconds remaining, to overcome Atlanta 30-27 (1/4). White joined the Cowboys in '76 after two years with the World Football League's Memphis Southmen in which he completed 183-of-350 passes (52.3 percent) for 2,635 yards and 21 TDs. Danny served as the Cowboys' punter from '76 through '80. GAMES: 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16). Total — 76.

**COLLEGE:** White set seven NCAA passing records in leading ASU to a three-year record of 32-4. Also a fine runner, he finished second in the nation in total offense in '73. Danny also played the infield for ASU's outstanding baseball team and was drafted by four major league teams — Cleveland, New York Mets, Oakland and Houston. Both Danny and his father, Wilford 'Whizzer'' White, a former ASU All-America halfback who played for the Chicago Bears in '51 and '52, are in the Arizona State Sports Hall of Fame.

PERSONAL: Wilford Daniel White is a native of Mesa, Ariz., a suburb of Phoenix. Danny has worked in the oil and gas and real estate businesses in past offseasons. He now owns the Dallas and

Randy White is a "gamemaker." "His performances range anywhere from spectacular to spectacular," Landry says. "The guy is phenomenal. He just doesn't have any bad games. They can slow him down a little but they can't stop him." The Cowboys' strongest player (he can bench-

press 475 pounds), the one dubbed "Manster" (half man, half monster) by Charlie Waters, White immediately became one of the NFL's premier defensive players in 1977 upon taking over the starting right tackle position following two seasons as a backup linebacker. Randy was named All-Pro in '78, '79 and '80. He was voted to the Pro Bowl in '77, '78, '79 and '80. "Randy White is the best defensive lineman in the game today," says St. Louis Coach Jim Hanifan. "He's just awesome. He's a bear and a half. He's got all the strength in the world, and along with that he's got all the quickness and speed." White's aggressive play produced two touchdowns in '80. His hit on Philadelphia's Ron Jaworski (10/19) resulted in a fumble that was recovered in the end zone by Mike Hegman. Against Washington (11/23) Randy's pressure on Mike Kruczek caused Larry Cole's 43-yard interception for another TD. But the one play which epitomized White's relentless style came in the second Philadelphia game (12/21) when he chased down wide receiver Scott Fitzkee from behind after a 49-yard pass play. A strained right foot ligament slowed Randy late in the '79 season and caused him to miss his first game ever, Thanksgiving Day against Houston. In '78 White succeeded Harvey Martin as the Seagram's Seven Crowns of Sport defensive lineman of the year (Randy was second in '80) and was voted NFC defensive player of the year by United Press International and the Kansas City Committee of 101. In '77 Randy capped his first season at defensive tackle with an outstanding performance in Super Bowl XII which earned him the game's co-MVP award with Martin. White tied Martin in '78 for the club lead in QB traps with a career-high 16. Randy had 12 traps in 77, five in '79, including a career best three in a game against St. Louis (10/21), and  $6\frac{1}{2}$  in '80. "If he continues to play the way he has for the past few years," says former teammate Larry Cole, "he'll be a Hall of Famer." GAMES: 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (15), 1980 (16), Total - 89.

COLLEGE: A consensus All-America at defensive end in '74, White won the Outland Trophy and Vince Lombardi Award as college football's top lineman that year. He was the second player selected in the '75 draft with a choice obtained from the New York Giants for Craig Morton.

PERSONAL: Randy Lee White divides his time in the offseason between his home in Dallas and his 22-acre farm in Landenberg, Pa., near his hometown of Wilmington, Del. Randy enjoys hunting and fishing. He and wife Vicki, a model, have a daughter, Jordan Leigh (5/6/79). Randy received the 1980 Field Scovell Award for athletic excellence from the Dallas All-Sports Association.

**PRO.** Trying to switch from wide receiver to cornerback in his second season seemed difficult enough an undertaking for Steve Wilson.

To have started 11 games at left corner and made some big contributions toward the Cowboys' 1980 Super Bowl bid were accomplishments far beyond anyone's expectations. While receiving on-the-job training, Wilson intercepted four passes plus two in the playoffs, and he led the club in passes defensed with 41. In the second half at Green Bay (9/28) Steve made a key tackle on fourth-and-one deep in Dallas territory, then set up the Cowboys' final TD with an interception. His two interceptions in a key victory over San Diego (10/26) earned him co-MVP honors with Danny White. "Although he got burned a few times last year. Steve Wilson has the potential to become a good cornerback," Tom Landry says. "He's got the speed, movement and tackling ability. He's a fine athlete who has good fundamentals and is very coachable." It was Wilson's first year on defense since he was a high school all-state safety in North Carolina in 1974. Steve nearly got away from the Cowboys in '79 after being signed as a free agent wide receiver. He was released near the end of training camp, but when Butch Johnson broke a finger in the final preseason game Wilson was recalled to add backup support at wide receiver. He led the Cowboys in punt returns in '79 and also excelled on the other special teams. GAMES: 1979 (16), 1980 (16). Total - 32.

**COLLEGE:** Wilson finished his four-year Howard career as the Washington, D.C., school's all-time leading receiver and kick returner. Steve caught 94 passes for 1,339 yards and 12 TDs, all Howard records. He earned All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference honors in '78.

**PERSONAL:** Steven Anthony Wilson, born in Los Angeles and raised in Durham, N.C., is the son of "Touchdown" Tommy Wilson, a two-time Pro Bowl running back with the Rams ('56-'61). In '56 Tom Wilson rushed for 223 yards against Green Bay, the Rams' single-game record until '71. He also played for the Browns and Vikings. Steve, who has a degree in marketing, works in the offseason for Ryder Truck Rental in Dallas. Steve and wife Cathy live in Richardson, Texas.

Howard Richards started 40 consecutive games at tackle for Missouri and climaxed his career by earning consensus All-Big Eight and second-team All-America honors. He was also a finalist for the 1980 Lombardi Award, which goes to the nation's top lineman.

"We consider Richards a very solid offensive lineman, a very intelligent tackle who will fit very well into our system," Coach Tom Landry says. "I think he'll start for us eventually, possibly by his second year. He fits into our size mold and his mere size will add something to our line."

Richards began his string of consecutive starts midway through his freshman year. A strong, pro-style pass blocker, Richards' protection helped quarterback Phil Bradley pass for more than 5,000 career yards. Richards' quickness and agility also made him an effective run blocker, both straight ahead and downfield. An offensive co-captain in 1980, Richards earned All-Big Eight honors as a junior and senior and played in the '81 Hula Bowl and '81 Senior Bowl.

"In the Senior Bowl, he played both guard and tackle," Cowboys Scout Red Hickey says. "He's the kind of player who will contribute to this ball club for years to come. His potential is unlimited."

A native of St. Louis (Southwest High School), Richards majored in communications and hopes for a career in radio or television. In high school he played tight end and defensive end on the football team and also played basketball. His uncle is Ernie McMillan, former offensive tackle for the St. Louis Cardinals.

Called "White Lightning" by teammates because of his superior speed, Doug Donley set the Ohio State career record for receiving yards and receiving touchdowns. He led the Buckeyes in receiving in each of the past three seasons.

In four years with the Buckeyes Donley caught 106 passes for 2,252 yards and 16 TDs. His top season came last year when he grabbed 43 passes for a school season-record 887 yards and seven touchdowns. As a junior he caught 37 for a then-school record 800 yards and five TDs. Donley averaged 21.2 yards per reception in his career and was over 20 yards per catch in each of his four seasons.

His longest reception was a 78-yard grab against lowa in 1978.

"He's the caliber athlete who should start for you eventually," Tom Landry says. "In him we get a player with great speed and hands."

Donley came to Ohio State as a running back, but was converted to flanker at the start of his freshman year. He had 12 career rushes for 63 yards at Ohio State, returned 19 punts for 41 yards and five kickoffs for 113 yards.

A 1980 Ohio State co-captain, Donley was a consensus All-Big Ten selection the past two years. He played in the '81 Japan Bowl and '81 Hula Bowl. "He will either replace someone or make them play a lot better," Cowboys Scout Red Hickey says. "This boy is going to open some eyes."

Donley lettered as a sprinter on the Ohio State indoor track team, clocking a 6.1 60 meters.

A native of Cambridge, Ohio, Donley was an All-Ohio halfback at Cambridge High, where he rushed for 2,572 career yards and scored 31 touchdowns. He captained the football and basketball teams and ran a 9.4 100-yard dash for the track team.

# GLEN TITENSORTackleBrigham YoungHt: 6-4Wt: 256Born: 2/21/58D-3

After spending two years at UCLA backing up All-America defensive tackle Manu Tuiasosopo, Glen Titensor transferred to Brigham Young and became a two-time All-Western Athletic Conference choice at defensive end. Regarded as a fine all-around athlete by Cowboys scouts, Titensor (TIGHT-en-sir) was immediately converted to an offensive tackle.

"He's a good athlete," Tom Landry says. "He's one of those players you judge on ability, traits like size and speed, and you hope he will develop."

Titensor sat out the '78 season as a redshirt after transferring to BYU. An intense player with outstanding quickness and a strong pass rush, he was team defensive player of the week five times in '79 and led BYU with 13 quarterback traps and 38 hurried passes in '80. Titensor was named WAC player of the week against North Texas State last year. He played in the '81 East-West Shrine Game. He also was an Associated Press honorable mention All-America the past two years.

The Westminster, Calif., native lettered in football and track at Bolsa Grande High School in Garden Grove, Calif. Glen has spent summers working in his family's termite pest control business.

#### SCOTT PELLUER • Linebacker • Washington State Ht: 6-2 • Wt: 215 • Born: 4/28/59 • D-4A

A four-year starting outside linebacker, Scott Pelluer capped his Washington State career in 1980 by being named a defensive co-captain, leading the team in quarterback traps for the third straight year with a career-high 12, and intercepting two passes. He also participated in the East-West Shrine Game.

Pelluer is a D.D. Lewis-type linebacker, on the small side but very active with good speed. He was a national scholar-athlete finalist and was voted Washington State's most inspirational player by his teammates last year.

Following his senior season, Pelluer transferred to Weber State, where he served as a student assistant football coach in the spring. He hopes to become a high school football coach and math and English teacher. The Bellevue, Wash., native played tight end and linebacker at Interlake High School in Bellevue.

### DERRIE NELSON • Linebacker • Nebraska Ht: 6-1 • Wt: 216 • Born: 2/8/58 • D-4B Derald "Derrie" Nelson joined Nebraska's football team in 1976 as

a walk on from a small high school and developed into one of the top defensive ends in school history.

A three-year starter at the stand-up end position, Nelson capped his career last season by being named AP Big Eight defensive player of the year and first-team All-America by the Football Writers and Football News. He was named second-team All-America by AP, UPI, NEA and College and Pro Football Weekly. He also was chosen to the All-Big Eight team his final two years and participated in the '81 Japan Bowl and '81 Hula Bowl.

An intense player who was elected team co-captain last year, Nelson's all-around athletic ability allowed him to perform a variety of duties for the Cornhuskers' defense, from rushing the passer to stringing out sweeps to dropping into pass coverage.

"He rates very highly as a competitor and he's very aggressive," says Tom Landry.

Nelson's competitive nature runs in the family. The Fairmont, Neb., native's mother Bonnie is a reknowned softball slugger in Fillmore County and his uncle is former major league slugger Bob Cerv, who played 11 years with the New York Yankees and Kansas City A's.

### DANNY SPRADLIN • Linebacker • Tennessee Ht: 6-1 • Wt: 228 • Born: 3/3/59 • D-5

Considered Tennessee's fiercest tackler last season, Danny Spradlin led the Vols in total tackles in 1980 with 125 after finishing second on the squad in 1979 with 102.

Very aggressive, mobile and strong, Spradlin improved steadily after winning a starting outside linebacker spot late in the 1978 season. He blossommed in his senior year, dominating several games and earning AP defensive player of the week honors for his 12-tackle performance against Vanderbilt. He was selected to play in the '81 Blue-Gray Game and '81 Senior Bowl. Spradlin, nicknamed "Spur," is a native of Maryville, Tenn.

### VINCE SKILLINGS • Cornerback • Ohio State Ht: 5-11 • Wt: 183 • Born: 5/3/59 • D-6

Vince Skillings was a three-time All-Big Ten choice, at cornerback in '78 and '80 and at safety in '79. A fine man-to-man defender and sure tackler, Skillings intercepted 13 passes in his three-year career, including a team-leading six for 109 yards and a touchdown in '78. Skillings attended Derry High in his native Brenizer, Penn. He was an All-Pennsylvania running back and defensive back and was a state finalist in the 100, 220 and 440-yard dashes.

#### RON FELLOWS • Cornerback • Missouri Ht: 6-0 • Wt: 173 • Born: 11/7/58 • D-7A Converted from cornerback to wide receiver at Missouri, Ron Fellows was switched back to cornerback by the Cowboys, who hope to capitalize on his speed, jumping ability and good hands.

to capitalize on his speed, jumping ability and good hands. Fellows spent two years at Butler, Kan., Community College before transferring to Missouri. He was moved to offense midway through the '79 season and caught four passes for 44 yards. Last year he led the Tigers with 33 receptions for 586 yards and four touchdowns. He also averaged 19.3 yards rushing on four reverses. He was chosen the Big Eight's player of the week after catching six passes for 99 yards against Iowa State. The former junior college hurdler is a native of South Bend, Ind., but now resides in Kansas City, Kan.

#### KEN MILLER • Cornerback • Eastern Michigan Ht: 6-0 • Wt: 184 • Born: 6/24/58 • D-7B Although he played in only four games last season due to an ankle injury, Ken Miller was rated highly by Cowboys scouts for his speed, agility and open field tackling ability.

Miller was a two-year starter at cornerback who also returned 26 kickoffs for a 20.3-yard average. He intercepted one pass in his career, in 1979. Miller attended Beecher High School in his native Flint, Mich. He was a standout track and football performer at Beecher.

## PAUL PIUROWSKILinebackerFlorida StateHt: 6-3Wt: 232Born: 3/16/59D-8

Paul Piurowski overcame 1978 knee surgery to become a defensive standout for a pair of Florida State teams which won 21 of 24 games. Piurowski became known for playing his best in the most important games.

A four-year letterman, Piurowski finished second on the team in tackles in '79 with 123 and intercepted two passes, including a 29yard return for a TD against Memphis State. In 1980 he recorded 119 tackles and was named AP and Sports Illustrated defensive player of the week after the Seminoles' upset victory over Nebraska. He earned a spot on the AP honorable mention All-America team following the season. The Sarasota, Fla., native, a quarterback and safety in high school, was recruited by Florida State to play in the defensive secondary.

MIKE WILSON • Wide Receiver • Washington State Ht: 6-3 • Wt: 210 • Born: 12/19/58 • D-9 Exceptionally speedy Mike Wilson was rated by the Cowboys a fine deep receiving threat who also catches the ball well in a crowd and is effective running reverses.

Wilson caught 47 passes for 716 yards, a 15.2-yard average,

and six touchdowns in three seasons at Washington State. He also rushed for 176 yards on 11 carries, a 16-yard average, including individual gains of 37, 26, 41, 22 and 23 yards.

Wilson's best season came in 1978 when he caught 31 passes for 451 yards and three touchdowns. He was plagued by a hamstring injury last year and caught only 10 passes for 185 yards. Mike captained the football and basketball teams and was a sprinter on the track team at Carson High in his native Carson, Calif.

PAT GRAHAM • Defensive Tackle • California Ht: 6-3 • Wt: 272 • Born: 4/21/59 • D-10

A starter since the second game of his freshman year, Pat Graham earned All-Pac 10 honors in his junior and senior seasons. The Cowboys were impressed with his quickness, strength and intelligence, and believe he also may be a prospect as an offensive lineman.

Graham rebounded from an injury-plagued 1978 season to have a fine year in '79, which earned him preseason All-America mention for 1980, and he put together another solid year as a senior. His coaches especially liked his play in big games. A native of Palo Alto, Calif., Graham was a schoolboy football star at San Jose's Leland High School.

TIM MORRISON•Tackle-Guard•GeorgiaHt: 6-3•Wt: 260•Born: 12/10/58•D-11

Versatile offensive lineman Tim Morrison helped clear the way in 1980 for freshman rushing sensation Herschel Walker and for Georgia's first national championship.

A dedicated and intelligent player who showed steady improvement during his career, Morrison was a four-year starter at either tackle or guard. He was named a team co-captain prior to his senior year and capped his career by earning consensus first-team All Southeastern Conference honors at guard in 1980.

Morrison is married to the former Leigh Ann Kempton. Born in Boaz, Ala., and raised in Suwanee, Ga., where he was a schoolboy football, basketball and track standout, Tim now resides in Live Oak, Fla.

NATE LUNDY • Wide Receiver • Indiana Ht: 6-0 • Wt: 162 • Born: 10/15/58 • D-12 A late blooming football player because of his participation in

spring track, Nate Lundy became a starting wide receiver midway through his junior year and gave Indiana an instant deep threat.

A speedster with great leaping ability, Lundy averaged a whopping 24.7 yards per catch in three seasons, snaring 37 passes for 914 yards and five touchdowns. He set an NCAA and Big Ten singlegame receiving yardage record last year when he caught five passes for 256 yards against Colorado, including TD receptions of 75, 74 and 43 yards. His best season was last year when he grabbed 19 passes for 459 yards. The Chicago native was a three-time Big Ten champion and Indiana record-holder in the intermediate hurdles.

## NFC Wild Card Game

DALLAS, Dec. 28 - Paced by Tony Dorsett's record-setting 160 vards, the Cowboys gained a team-record 338 yards rushing and Danny White threw for three touchdowns to carry Dallas past the defending NFC champion Rams.

The Cowboys broke a 13-13 halftime tie on White's three secondhalf scoring passes - 10 yards to Dorsett, 35 to Butch Johnson and 11 to Drew Pearson.

Dorsett snapped Duane Thomas' Cowboys playoff rushing record of 143 yards, which Thomas gained against San Francisco in the 1971 NFC Championship Game. The Cowboys' 528 total yards also set a team playoff record, topping the 441 yards gained against the Rams in the '75 NFC title game.

The Cowboys intercepted three Vince Ferragamo passes, including one by Aaron Mitchell in the third quarter that set up White's TD pass to Johnson that sent Dallas ahead 27-13.

The victory avenged a one-sided Monday night loss to the Rams at Anaheim Stadium two weeks earlier and a 1979 playoff loss to the Rams at Texas Stadium.

## **NFC Divisional Playoff**

ATLANTA, Jan. 4 — Two Danny White-to-Drew Pearson touchdown passes in the final 3:40, the second with 42 seconds remaining, rallied the Cowboys from a 27-17 fourth-quarter deficit to a dramatic victory over Atlanta.

The Cowboys trailed throughout most of the game. They were behind 10.0 in the first quarter, 17.10 at the half and 24.10 as the third period closed.

But 1:07 into the final period Dallas completed an 85-yard TD drive on Robert Newhouse's one-yard plunge, cutting the gap to 24-17. After Tim Mazzetti's 34-yard field goal sent Atlanta in front 27-17 with 7:37 left, the Cowboys immediately drove 62 yards for a score, White passing to Drew Pearson for 15, 24 and finally 14 yards for the TD with 3:40 remaining.

The Dallas defense held Atlanta and the Cowboys took possession at their own 30 with 1:48 left. White moved his team on five passes — 20 yards to Butch Johnson, 14 to Preston Pearson, 13 to Tony Dorsett and 23 to Drew Pearson for the game-winning score.

## NFC Championship Game

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 11 — On a cold, windy afternoon at Veterans Stadium the Cowboys failed in their unexpected bid for a record sixth Super Bowl berth, losing to Philadelphia 20-7.

Playing in their eighth NFC Championship Game in 11 years, the Cowboys were foiled by four turnovers and a stingy Philadelphia defense that yielded just 202 yards.

The Cowboys fell behind on the Eagles second offensive play when Wilbert Montgomery raced 42 yards untouched for a touchdown. Dallas evened the score 7.7 six minutes before halftime on a 68-yard drive capped by Tony Dorsett's three-yard run.

The Eagles took advantage of a turnover to grab the lead for good midway through the third quarter on Tony Franklin's 26-yard field goal. The score was set up by Carl Hairston's fumble producing sack of Danny White, with Charlie Johnson recovering the loose ball at the Dallas 11.

On the Cowboys' next series linebacker Jerry Robinson returned Dorsett's fumble 22 yards to the Dallas 38. Six plays later Lerov Harris burst nine yards up the middle to give the Eagles a 17.7 third. quarter lead.

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## Historical Highlights

#### 1960

NFL FRANCHISE — Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during the first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28).

**COWBOYS STOCKED** — A player pool was set up in a league meeting at L.A., with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

**TRAINING STARTS** — Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at Pacific U., in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME — The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 10-16 pre-season game to San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME — In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club preseason game, the Cowboys led the world champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 62-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19).

**FIRST VICTORY** — In a preseason game at Louisville, Ky., the Cowboys beat New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes of 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith) (August 27).

**FIRST LEAGUE GAME** — In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth-period Steeler rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED — Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

**TRAINING STARTS** — Rookies launch training at new campsite — St. <u>Olaf</u> College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN — Scoring ten points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 (Sept. 17).

**PENALTY HISTORY** — For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were detected holding in the end zone on a 99-TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

**100-YARD FIRSTS** — Cowboys Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth-quarter TDs in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14). **SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY** — The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

**CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE** — The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

**HOWTON SETS RECORD** — Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's all-time receiving mark with a 14-yard catch against Washington (there). Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

#### 1964

LANDRY CONTRACT — With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a ten-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

1965

**FIRST SELLOUT** — An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

#### 1966

**PLAYOFF BOWL** — After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15).

**MERGER** — Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys GM Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, merging the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

SCHRAMM ELEVATED — Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

**NEELY CASE SOLVED** — Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth place picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17). **THE CHAMPIONSHIP** — The Cowboys won their first championship, capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

#### 1967

**TEXAS STADIUM** — On Dec. 23, owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000.

SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP — Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

#### 1968

**WIN CAPITOL** — For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on December 21st. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

**TEXAS STADIUM** — Ground was broken for Texas Stadium in suburban Irving on January 25, and on June 29 Bert Rose was named general manager of the stadium.

**ORIGINALS RETIRE** — An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

**REPEAT CAPITOL WINS** — Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl.

#### 1970

**FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS** — The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the play-offs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

**FIRST NFC TITLE** — The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11-year history on Jan. 3 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

#### 1971

**TEXAS STADIUM** — The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving, Tex., home with a 44-21 victory over the New England Patriots on October 24. Duane Thomas scored the first touchdown in the new stadium, a 56-yard run just two minutes and 16 seconds after the opening kickoff. Attendance was 65,708.

SIX STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last seven games to finish 11-3, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the sixth year in a row. They defeated Minnesota, 20-12, in the opening round.

SECOND NFC TITLE — For the second consecutive year, the Cowboys met the San Francisco 49ers in the National Conference showdown. This time Dallas won, 14-3, to qualify for its second straight Super Bowl. FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys downed the Miami Dolphins, 24-3, to win Super Bowl VI in New Orleans on Jan. 16. It was the 10th victory in a row for Dallas as Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

#### 1972

**FIRST 1,000-YARD BACK** — Calvin Hill became the first Dallas player to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 111 on Dec. 9 against the Washington Redskins in Texas Stadium. Hill wound up with 1,036 yards for the season on a record 245 carries.

**SEVEN STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS** — The Cowboys qualified for the NFL playoffs a record seventh consecutive year, their 10-4 record earning them the National Conference Wild Card berth. Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns in the last  $1\frac{1}{2}$  minutes to give the Cowboys a 30-28 victory at San Francisco in the first round. Then, at Washington on New Year's Eve, Dallas was foiled in its bid for a third straight NFL title when the Redskins won, 26-3.

**100 VICTORIES** — The Cowboys and Coach Tom Landry recorded their 100th victory with a 40-3 Texas Stadium win over the New Orleans Saints on Sept. 24. Landry, the only head coach the Cowboys have had, ended the season with a career mark of 108-80-6 to rank ninth on the list of the NFL's all-time winningest coaches.

**EIGHT STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS** — The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division title with a 10-4 record and broke their own NFL record by reaching the playoffs for the eighth year in a row. Dallas defeated Western Division champion Los Angeles in the first round, 27-16, but fell to Central Division winner Minnesota in the NFC Championship Game, 27-10.

#### 1974

**FIRST TOP DRAFT CHOICE** — For the first time in their history, the Cowboys had the very first choice in the NFL college draft. The No. 1 pick came to Dallas from Houston in exchange for Tody Smith and Billy Parks. The Cowboys selected Ed "Too Tall" Jones, a 6-9, 260-pound defensive end from Tennessee State.

**PLAYOFFS MISSED** — The Cowboys' record-breaking string of eight straight years in the NFL playoffs was broken when the club's 8-6 record failed to qualify.

#### 1975

LILLY HONORED — "Mr. Cowboy" was honored on Bob Lilly Day at Texas Stadium at halftime of the Philadelphia game on Nov. 23. It was the first such recognition ever given to a Dallas player. Lilly never missed a game in 14 years with the Cowboys, earning All-Pro honors seven times at defensive tackle before retiring prior to the '75 season.

**TEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS** — The Cowboys' 10-4 record earned them the NFC Wild Card berth in the playoffs. The composite record over 10 straight winning seasons was 101-37-2.

THIRD NFC TITLE — After shocking Minnesota in the first round, 17-14 on Roger Staubach's 50-yard "Hail Mary" pass to Drew Pearson, the Cowboys traveled to Los Angeles for the NFC showdown. Staubach threw four touchdown passes, three to Preston Pearson, and Dallas won, 37-7. Pittsburgh won Super Bowl X on Jan. 18 in Miami, 21-17.

#### 1976

**MEREDITH, PERKINS HONORED** — Former Cowboys greats Don Meredith and Don Perkins joined Bob Lilly in the "Ring of Honor" at Texas Stadium during halftime ceremonies at the New York Giants game on Nov. 7.

**ELEVEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS** — The Cowboys won the NFC Eastern Division title with their 11-3 record, giving them their 11th straight winning season and 10th playoff berth in that period. A 14-12 first round loss to Los Angeles — the first time Dallas had lost in the first round under the current playoff setup — ended the season.

#### 1977

**HOWLEY HONORED** — Former All-Pro linebacker Chuck Howley, a Cowboy from 1961 through 1973, became the fourth member of the Ring of Honor. Howley was honored during ceremonies at halftime of the Detroit Lions game on Oct. 30.

TWELVE STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — Getting off to an 8-0 start, their best ever, the Cowboys rolled to a 12-2 record, the championship of the NFC East, and their 12th consecutive winning season. They opened their 11th visit to the playoffs in those 12 years with a 37-7 first-round victory over the Chicago Bears at Texas Stadium.

FOURTH NFC TITLE — Dallas crushed the Minnesota Vikings at Texas Stadium, 23-6, for National Conference crown No. 4 and the right to meet the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XII.

SECOND WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys stopped the Denver Broncos, 27-10, to win Super Bowl XII in New Orleans on January 15, 1978. In the process, Dallas tied Minnesota for most Super Bowl appearances (four) and Green Bay, Miami and Pittsburgh for most Super Bowl victories (two). Defensive linemen Harvey Martin and Randy White were named co-Most Valuable Players in the game.

#### 1978

THIRTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — After a mediocre 6-4 start, the Cowboys won six straight games to finish the expanded regular season with a 12-4 record and their 10th division crown. It marked the Cowboys' 13th consecutive winning season and 12th trip to the playoffs in that span. Dallas rallied to beat Atlanta 27-20 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium, sending the Cowboys to their seventh NFC championship game in the past nine years.

FIFTH NFC TITLE — Dallas shut out the Rams in Los Angeles 28-0 in the National Conference title game to advance to the Super Bowl a record fifth time, including three of the last four. In the first Super Bowl rematch, Pittsburgh edged the Cowboys 35-31 for the NFL championship on Jan. 21 in Miami's Orange Bowl.

#### 1979

**TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY** — The Cowboys celebrated their 20th anniversary season at halftime of the St. Louis Cardinals game at Texas Stadium on Oct. 21. Stars from each of those 20 seasons plus Coach Tom Landry were introduced during the halftime ceremonies.

FOURTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — Rallying from a midseason slump, the Cowboys won their final three games to finish with an 11-5 record, their 11th division championship, including the past four NFC East titles, and 14th consecutive winning season. The Cowboys made their 13th trip to the playoffs in those 14 years, but were eliminated by Los Angeles 21-19 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium.

#### 1980

**STAUBACH RETIRES** — At a press conference at Texas Stadium on March 31, quarterback Roger Staubach announced his retirement after 11 record-breaking years with the Cowboys. Staubach held all major Cowboys passing records and was the all-time leading NFL passer.

LILLY ENTERS HALL OF FAME — Bob Lilly, a seven-time All-Pro defensive tackle in his 14-year career with the Cowboys from 1961-74, became the first Cowboys-only player to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Enshrined along with Lilly on Aug. 2 at Canton, Ohio, were Herb Adderley, who played for the Cowboys from 1970-72, Jim Otto and Deacon Jones. FIFTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — Behind new starting quarterback Danny White, the Cowboys rolled to their 15th consecutive winning season with a surprising 12-4 record, tied for best in the league with Philadelphia and Atlanta. The Cowboys lost the NFC East title to Philadelphia on a tie-breaker, but entered the playoffs for the 14th time in 15 years, this time as a wild card team. The Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game and rallied past the Falcons at Atlanta 30-27 to advance to the NFC Championship Game at Philadelphia. But the Cowboys lost 20-7 in their bid for a sixth Super Bowl appearance.

LANDRY'S 200th VICTORY — Tom Landry joined George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only coaches with 200 NFL victories when the Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 on Dec. 28 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game, raising Landry's record to 200-119-6, counting regular season and playoff games.

# THE SIDELINES

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Dallas hmis Cheerleaders

Although the Cowboys have had sideline cheerleaders since their first season, the current phenomenon of the Cowboys Cheerleaders did not begin its rise until about 1975.

The Cowboys saw the opportunity to develop a new form of entertainment for football fans and a decision was made to increase the size of the cheerleading squad by holding open auditions in the spring of 1976. About 250 women came to Texas Stadium that year. The number of applicants annually now exceeds 2,000.

In capturing the imaginations of people everywhere, the multitalented Cheerleaders have made numerous national television appearances, including two highly rated made for TV movies about the squad and two special "Love Boat" episodes. The Cheerleaders also have appeared at many charity events and state fairs around the nation.

The Cowboys Cheerleaders also are popular around the world. The squad made its first overseas tour in December 1978, a wellreceived 10-day visit to Japan. Since 1979 the Cheerleaders have made four very successful tours of United States military bases in Korea, West Germany and Greece for the United Services Organization (USO) and the Department of Defense.
