

The same front office lineup that began with the Dallas Cowboys in 1960 has moved the club successfully into its third decade.

Under the direction of Chairman of the Board Clint W. Murchison Jr., President and General Manager Tex Schramm, Vice President for Personnel Development Gil Brandt and Coach Tom Landry, the Dallas Cowboys have developed into a model of consistency that is a reflection of the team's stability in the front office.

The Cowboys' management has steered the club through 16 straight winning seasons, 15 trips to the playoffs, five Super Bowl appearances and two world championships.

Schramm oversees the day-to-day operation of the Cowboys. In 1966 he was named president of the team, but also retained his position as general manager.

A journalism graduate of the University of Texas, Schramm joined the Los Angeles Rams as publicity director in 1947 after two years as a sports writer and sports editor at the Austin American-Statesman. In a 10-year career with the Rams he rose from publicity director, to assistant to the president, to general manager.

Schramm left the Rams in 1957 to join CBS as assistant director of sports. He put together the first network telecast of the Olympics, but following those Winter Games of 1960 in Squaw Valley, Calif., Schramm returned to pro football when he was hired by Clint Murchison to run the new Dallas NFL franchise.

In the spring of 1977 Schramm received an honorary degree (Doctor of Humane Letters) from California Lutheran College. After the Cowboys won the Super Bowl at the end of that season Schramm was named NFL Executive of the Year by the Sporting News, and in 1978 he received the Bert Bell Award for outstanding executive leadership in the NFL.

Brandt directs the Cowboys' scouting operation and supervises the signing of all players. A Milwaukee native and graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Brandt was a baby photographer and parttime scout for the Rams under Schramm when his flair for discovering talent led to his being hired by the Cowboys.

THE COACH



Tom Landry is the architect of one of the most unique success stories in National Football League history. While many coaches have developed great teams, which rise and fall like the tide, not many have crafted a sustained series of championship-caliber clubs the way Tom Landry has.

Landry's leadership has driven the Cowboys through the barriers that send most NFL clubs through cycles of ups and downs. By virtue of his vast football knowledge, attention to detail and overwhelming confidence in his system, Landry has kept the Cowboys strong for nearly two decades.

Starting as a 35-year-old rookie head coach with an expansion team in 1960, Landry suffered through five straight losing seasons before finishing 7-7 in 1965. The club's record through the first six years was a dismal 25-53-4.

But beginning with a 10-3-1 mark in 1966, the Cowboys' ledger reads 171-59-2, making Dallas the NFL's winningest team over the past 16 years. The Cowboys own more wins than any NFL team since 1960 (196-112-6 plus 18-13 in the playoffs) and since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger (129-47 plus 18-13 in the playoffs). The Cowboys also had the NFL's best record of the 1970s (105-39, 119-46 including playoffs).

Landry has directed the Cowboys through an NFL-record 16 straight winning seasons, including 15 trips to the playoffs for appearances in a league-record 31 playoff games. Landry's teams have won 12 division championships and five NFC Championships for a record five Super Bowl trips. The Cowboys have advanced to nine of 12 NFC Championship Games since the game was instituted in 1970. And the Cowboys won world championships with victories in Super Bowls VI and XII.

The dean of NFL coaches in his 23rd season, Landry ranked third on the list of all-time winningest NFL coaches with a 196-112-6 regularseason record after 1981. He trailed only George Halas (320 victories) and Curly Lambeau (231).

Recognized as one of football's greatest technical innovators, Lan-

dry believes the most important quality he must convey to his players is leadership.

"What they see in me, hopefully, is that I'm always in control of the situation," Landry says. "And they're confident it will work out the way it should. That's leadership in a strong way. Players look at the coach first. If he doesn't appear confident, or looks defeated, then all of a sudden they are defeated. That's the one thing I hope they see in me — that I am in control of the situation and I am confident things will work out."

What does Landry enjoy most from his work?

"Watching young players develop," he explains. "That's why you're in this business — to work with young players, see their enthusiasm, see them achieve and reach their potential. It gives you a good feeling."

Wrote former Cowboys quarterback Roger Staubach in his autobiography, "In composite I remember him as a towering figure. To me he was, is and always will be special — a man apart from other men. What made him so, beyond his brilliant technical grasp of football, were two bedrock Landry characteristics: enormous self-discipline and consistency. Landry is the rock against which we all lean, often without realizing it, at some point during our careers."

Thomas Wade Landry was born in Mission, Texas, on Sept. 11, 1924. He was an All-Regional fullback at Mission High School before enrolling at the University of Texas. Following one semester he joined the Air Corps and flew 30 B-17 missions with the Eighth Air Force in World War II.

In November 1945 he was discharged as a first lieutenant and returned to Texas where he became a star fullback and defensive back, earning All-Southwest Conforence honors as a junior and co-captaining the Longhorns as a senior. With Landry's help Texas beat Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl.

Landry played for the New York Yankees of the All-America Conference in 1949 before joining the NFL's New York Giants the next year. He was a mainstay in the Giants' defensive secondary through 1955, the last two years as a player-coach. He earned All-Pro honors in 1954.

Retiring as a player following the 1955 season, Tom was the Giants' defensive coach through 1959. Giants Head Coach Jim Lee Howell called him "the best defensive coach in the business."

Coach Landry and wife Alicia, whom he met at Texas, have three children — Tom, Jr., an attorney and oilman; Kitty and Lisa. Kitty presented Tom with his first grandchild — Ryan Edward Phillips — on June 26, 1980.

Landry is an inspirational leader for many outside football because of his principles and achievements. Tom devotes much of his spare time to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and serves on the Board of Trustees of the National FCA.

In 1981 the NFL Alumni Association presented Landry with its highest honor, the Order of the Leather Helmet, for distinguished service to football. Also last year he was named the man of the year by Football News.

Tom received the 1980 Vince Lombardi Dedication Award from the Wisconsin Chapter of the Pro Football Writers Association. Also in

1980, California Lutheran College, site of the Cowboys' training camp, established the Landry Medal, which is awarded annually to a person who has distinguished himself in his chosen profession and serves as an inspiration to American youth.

Landry earned a degree in business at Texas and one in industrial engineering from the University of Houston. He holds honorary degrees from California Lutheran College (Doctor of Humane Letters), John Brown University (Doctor of Humanities), Southwest Baptist College (Doctor of Laws) and Indiana Central University (Doctor of Laws). In 1978 he was inducted into the Texas Sports Hall of Fame.

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THE COACHING STAFF



Jim Myers Assistant Head Coach • Offensive Line

Under the guidance of Jim Myers, the Cowboys' offensive line consistently ranks as one of the best in the NFL. Myers has developed All-Pro and Pro Bowl players Ralph Neely, John Niland, Rayfield Wright, Blaine Nye and current stars Herbert Scott and Pat Donovan.

One of Myers' specialties is converting college defensive linemen into top offensive linemen, including Nye, Donovan, John Fitzgerald and Kurt Petersen.


Myers joined the Cowboys in 1962 following head coaching stints at Iowa State and Texas A&M. In 1977 Tom Landry turned over some of his duties to his long-time aide, naming Jim to the newly created post of assistant head coach. Myers has the longest tenure on the Cowboys' assistant coaching staff, 21 years.

A native of Madison, W. Va. (11/12/21), Myers was an outstanding lineman at the University of Tennessee in 1941-42 and at Duke in the Marine Corps V-12 program in 1943.

Prior to becoming a head coach, Myers served as an assistant at Wofford College, Vanderbilt and UCLA. In 1978 he received the Distinguished American Award from the East Tennessee Chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame.

Jim serves on the Board of Directors of the Dallas chapters of the Boys Clubs of America, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Southwest Allied Youth.

Jim and wife Carolyn have three daughters — Susan, Kathy and Carol — and seven grandchildren.



Ermal Allen Research and Development

Recognized as one of the foremost authorities on the NFL, Ermal Allen, in his 21st season with the Cowboys, is in charge of studying and evaluating all players and teams in the league. His reports provide the basis for the formulation of the Cowboys' weekly game plans.

Allen coached the Cowboys' offensive back-

field from 1962-69 following 14 years as an assistant coach at his alma mater, the University of Kentucky. Ermal served under Paul "Bear" Bryant from 1948-53 and under Blanton Collier from 1954-61.

Ermal was a quarterback at Kentucky from 1939-41. He also was a member of the Fort Benning and Army all-star football teams during World War II and he played one season at defensive back with the Cleveland Browns in the All-America Conference in 1947.

Ermal, who was born Christmas Day, 1920, in Kylesford, Tenn., is a scratch golfer who twice won the Kentucky Amateur championship, beating Bobby Nichols in 1955 and Frank Beard in 1958.

Ermal and wife Allie have three children — Ken, Ann and Amy — and seven grandchildren.

Neill Armstrong Research and Development

Neill Armstrong brings 27 years of coaching experience, including 10 years as a head coach, to the Cowboys' Research and Development Department, where he works with Ermal Allen in scouting all teams and players in the NFL.

Armstrong joined the Cowboys this year after four seasons as head coach of the Chicago Bears,

where he compiled a 30-34 record. Neill directed the Bears to the playoffs in 1979 with a 10-6 finish. Before joining the Bears, he was an assistant coach with the Minnesota Vikings for nine years, seven as defensive coordinator.

Armstrong led the Edmonton Eskimos to the Canadian Football League playoffs three times during his six-year reign as head coach from 1964-69. Neill began his professional coaching career as an assistant with the Houston Oilers in 1962-63 following seven years (1955-61) as an assistant at his alma mater, Oklahoma State.

A native of Tishomingo, Okla. (3/9/26), Armstrong was an All-America receiver at Oklahoma State (then Oklahoma A&M) from 1943-46. He was the Philadelphia Eagles' No. 1 draft choice in 1947. He played for two NFL championship teams in five seasons (1947-51) with the Eagles. He played for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in 1951-53-54.

Neill and wife Jane have three children — Neill Jr., David and Gail — and two grandchildren.







Al Lavan Running Backs

Following eight years of coaching experience in the college and pro ranks, Al Lavan became running backs coach of the Cowboys in 1980. Last season the Cowboys were the NFL's second-best rushing team, including Tony Dorsett's team-record 1,646 yards.

Lavan coached running backs at Stanford in 1979 after two years at Georgia Tech handling receivers and running backs. He directed defensive backs and special teams for the Atlanta Falcons in 1975 and '76.

Lavan began his coaching career in 1972 as receivers coach at his alma mater, Colorado State. He moved to Louisville to coach defensive backs in 1973 before being named receivers coach at Iowa State in 1974. The next season he returned to the Falcons as a coach.

A native of Pierce, Fla. (9/13/46), Lavan was a defensive back and place kicker at Colorado State and was drafted in the eighth round by Philadelphia in 1968. He played defensive back for the Eagles in 1968, then for Atlanta in 1969 and '70.

Al and wife Bessie have three children — Travis, Douglas and Maeleeke.



Alan Lowry Special Teams

The newest member of Tom Landry's staff is Alan Lowry, who was named special teams coach this year after five seasons as defensive backfield coach at his alma mater, the University of Texas.

Lowry is one of the few players in Southwest Conference history to earn All-Conference honors

both as an offensive and defensive star. He was a defensive back at Texas in 1970 and '71 when the Longhorns won a national and two conference championships. Lowry was All-SWC in 1971.

In 1972 Lowry was switched to quarterback and earned conference honors again in leading Texas to a 10-2 season, including a come-frombehind victory over Alabama in the Cotton Bowl.

After receiving his degree in physical education, Lowry served as an assistant coach at Virginia Tech in 1974. He joined the Wyoming staff under Fred Akers in 1975, but resigned that post in the summer of 1976.

Lowry worked for the Cowboys' scouting department in the fall of 1976 before joining Akers' staff at Texas in December 1976.

Lowry is a native of Irving, Texas (11/21/50). His wife's name is Donna.

John Mackovic Quarterbacks

With the departure this year of Coach Mike Ditka to the Chicago Bears, Tom Landry has turned over added responsibility in the Cowboys' passing attack to quarterbacks coach John Mackovic.

Mackovic left the head coaching post at Wake Forest University to join the Cowboys in 1981.

John was named Coach of the Year by the Sporting News, Walter Camp Football Foundation and Atlantic Coast Conference in 1979 after directing Wake Forest to a surprising 8-3 record, a spot in the national rankings for the first time in the school's history and an invitation to the Tangerine Bowl. Mackovic coached the Deacons for three seasons (1978-80) and was known for his wide-open, multiple offensive attack.

Prior to Wake Forest, Mackovic served as an assistant coach at Army, San Jose State, Arizona and Purdue. He was offensive coordinator at Arizona and Purdue.

A native of Barberton, Ohio (10/1/43), Mackovic was an Academic All-ACC selection as a quarterback at Wake Forest in 1964.

John and wife Arlene have two children — Aimee and John III.

Dick Nolan Receivers

Veteran NFL coach Dick Nolan rejoined the Cowboys' staff and old friend Tom Landry this year as receivers coach.

Nolan was a player-coach for the Cowboys in 1962 and the team's defensive coach from 1963-67. Nolan and Landry were defensive back team-


mates with the New York Giants in 1954 and '55 when Tom was a player-coach. Nolan also played under Landry in 1956, '57 and '59 when Tom was New York's full-time defensive coach. Nolan played for the Chicago Cardinals in 1958 before returning to the Giants for the next three seasons.

Nolan left the Cowboys to become head coach of the San Francisco 49ers from 1968-75. His teams won the NFC West championship in 1970, '71 and '72. He was NFC coach of the year in 1970.

Nolan joined New Orleans as linebackers coach in 1977 and was head coach of the Saints from 1978-80. Dick was the defensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers in 1981.

Born in Pittsburgh, Pa., and raised in White Plains, N.Y., Nolan was a two-way star football player at the University of Maryland from 1951-53. He played offensive and defensive halfback on Maryland's 1953 national championship team.

Dick and wife Ann have six children — Richard Jr., Nancy, Michael, Kelly, Lisa and Jimmy.







Gene Stallings Defensive Backfield

Working with two free agent rookies, a safetyturned-cornerback and a hobbled 11-year veteran, Gene Stallings performed a masterful coaching job in 1981, turning the Cowboys' defensive secondary from a suspected weakness into a strength. Last year the Cowboys led the NFL with a team-record

37 interceptions and were the most effective pass defense in the league, based on the quarterback rating formula against the Cowboys.

Stallings joined the Cowboys in 1972 following seven years (1965-71) as head coach of his alma mater, Texas A&M. He has presided over the development of two All-Pro safeties, Cliff Harris and Charlie Waters, and Pro Bowl cornerback Everson Walls. The Cowboys intercepted 64 passes the past two seasons, more than any other NFL team.

Gene was an All-Southwest Conference receiver at A&M under Bear Bryant and a tri-captain on Bryant's undefeated 1956 Aggie team. Stallings served one year as a student-assistant coach at A&M before moving with Bryant to Alabama as an assistant. He remained there until returning to A&M as head coach in 1965.

Gene, a native of Paris, Texas (3/2/35), and wife Ruth Ann have five children — Anna Lee, Laurie, John Mark, Jacklyn and Martha Kate.



Ernie Stautner Defensive Coordinator • Defensive Line

Under the direction of Pro Football Hall of Famer Ernie Stautner, the Cowboys consistently field excellent defenses and All-Pro defensive linemen like Bob Lilly, George Andrie, Harvey Martin, Randy White, Ed Jones and John Dutton.

The Cowboys' famed "Doomsday Defense" began to emerge shortly after Stautner's arrival as defensive line coach in 1966. Ernie also helped fashion "Doomsday II," which carried Dallas to its second Super Bowl title in 1977.

Ernie was an All-Pro defensive end and tackle with the Pittsburgh Steelers where he played for 15 years (1951-65) despite being relatively small at 6-0, 235 pounds. A veteran of nine Pro Bowls, he was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1969, his first year of eligibility.

Ernie was born in Cham, Bavaria (4/20/27), but grew up in Albany, N.Y. Following a World War II Marine Corps hitch (1943-46), he enrolled at Boston College where he developed into a two-way star lineman.

Ernie's wife's name is Pat. He has three children — Joe, Terri and Carol.

Jerry Tubbs Linebackers

Jerry Tubbs, the only original Cowboys player still with the organization, came to the Cowboys in the 1960 expansion draft from the San Francisco 49ers.

Jerry was the Cowboys' first starting middle linebacker and he's one of only three in club his-

tory. As a coach he helped develop his two successors at the critical middle linebacker spot, Lee Roy Jordan and Bob Breunig.

Tubbs played with the Cowboys for eight seasons (1961-67), serving as player-coach the last two. He was the Cowboys' first All-Pro and Pro-Bowl linebacker (1962) who was known as one of the most aggressive players in the game.

Jerry has coached four Pro Bowl linebackers in Dallas — Jordan, Breunig, Chuck Howley and Thomas Henderson.

Born in Breckenridge, Texas (1/23/35), Jerry was an All-America center-linebacker for Bud Wilkinson's unbeaten Oklahoma teams from 1954-56. Tubbs was the Walter Camp Award winner in 1956 as the nation's outstanding player.

He was drafted No. 1 by the Chicago Cardinals in 1957 and also played for the 49ers before coming to Dallas.

Jerry and wife Marlene have two children — Alan and Kayla.

Bob Ward Conditioning

Dr. Bob Ward has Cowboys players enthusiastically participating in his innovative conditioning programs, which include running, weightlifting, flexibility training and diet.

Ward directs the Cowboys' voluntary offseason conditioning program, working with computer print-

outs to devise individual programs for each player. Bob also supplies each player with an individual weightlifting program during the season.

Ward was track coach for 11 years at Fullerton College in California before joining the Cowboys in 1975.

A graduate of Whitworth College in Spokane, Wash., Ward received his master's degree in physical education from the University of Washington and his doctorate from Indiana University. He also has been trained extensively in the martial arts and has taught Cowboys players various martial arts techniques that can be used in football.

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Benny Barnes ★ 31

SAFETY • STANFORD • 11th YEAR HT: 6-1 • WT: 203 • BORN: 3/3/51 • FA FOR '72

PRO: After a decade's wait, valuable Benny Barnes has returned to the position he has always wanted to play. A safety in college, Barnes has played cornerback most of his career, first as a

backup and for almost five years, 1976-80, as a starter. Now, with the arrival of young talent at cornerback plus the retirement of Charlie Waters, Barnes is a fulltime safety. He entered training camp as the leading candidate to replace Waters as the starting strong safety. In 1981, as a third-down specialist and backup safety, Benny contributed his second career touchdown, a 72-yard fumble return at San Francisco (10/11). A free agent find after being overlooked in the draft, Barnes spent his first four seasons as a backup corner before winning a starting job in 1976. Benny still is a top special teams performer, particularly on punt coverage, and in 1977 he won the Cowboys' special teams player of the year award with Jay Saldi. His strong suit is his man-to-man coverage. "He reads cuts as well as anybody," defensive backfield coach Gene Stallings says. "He can anticipate a man's moves. He's the kind of player who's always thinking, always a step ahead of the other fellow." The burden of Benny's fine career has been an injured right foot, which has required surgery three times -after he broke it in '74 (12/7 against Cleveland), after the '77 season to eliminate bone spurs and after the '79 season to fuse a joint. He was sidelined for the first five games of the '80 season by an emergency appendectomy, performed in Washington the morning

of the season opener (9/8). Despite the sore foot, Barnes led the Cowboys in interceptions in '78 and enjoyed an outstanding '79 season, sharing the team lead in interceptions and fumble recoveries. One of the fumble recoveries resulted in Barnes' first NFL touchdown, a 33-yard return for what turned out to be the winning score at Minnesota (10/7). Benny shares the NFL record for most safeties in a season with two ('73). GAMES: 1972 (14), 1973 (14), 1974 (13), 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (14), 1979 (15), 1980 (11), 1981 (16). Total — 139.

COLLEGE: Barnes was an All-Pacific Coast free safety in 1971 after intercepting seven passes, including three in a game against Washington. He started 24 consecutive games for Stanford and played on two Rose Bowl winners.

PERSONAL: A native of Lufkin, Texas, Benny Jewell Barnes and wife Joyce have three sons — David (1/20/72), Damon (8/8/74) and Deon (4/23/78). Larry Bethea ★ 76

DEFENSIVE TACKLE • MICHIGAN STATE • 5th YEAR HT: 6-5 • WT: 249 • BORN: 7/21/56 • D-1 FOR '78

PRO: With the Cowboys' starting defensive linemen each sporting All-Pro credentials, Larry Bethea's role has been to provide quality depth. During the steamy early games of September last



season he spelled left tackle John Dutton on passing downs. Larry got both his quarterback traps last season in the home opener against St. Louis (9/13). Bethea played most of the Detroit game (11/15) when Dutton was hobbled by a bruised thigh. When Dutton's thigh flared up again, preventing him from playing in the NFC Championship Game (1/10), Bethea held his own in his first start since 1979. There's never been much question about Bethea's physical attributes. The 28th player selected in the 1978 draft, Bethea is big, strong, fast and intelligent. "It's our philosophy to try and draft a player who has a chance to be great," Gil Brandt says. "Nobody can tell me Bethea couldn't be as good as anybody in the league. Sometimes it just takes longer for these big guys to develop." Larry spent his first two seasons trying to settle into one position. As a rookie he filled in at right end on short-yardage plays when Harvey Martin was having leg problems. The biggest play of his career came in the '78 NFC title game when he was credited with stopping Rams runner Jim Jodat on a fourth-and-one at the Dallas 14 to preserve a 7-0 Cowboys lead in the third quarter. After preparing to fight for the left tackle spot vacated by Jethro Pugh's retirement.

BETHEA, Cont.

Bethea opened '79 training camp as the starting left defensive end in the wake of Ed Jones' unexpected departure for boxing. Inexperience proved Larry's undoing, however, and he was moved back to a reserve tackle role. He started two games at right tackle late in the season when Randy White was hobbled by a sore foot, meaning Larry has played all four line positions in addition to his special teams work. Bethea's career season highs in tackles is 28 and in sacks is four. Both came in '79. GAMES: 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (11), 1981 (16). Total — 59.

COLLEGE: In 1977 Bethea became the first lineman since Illinois' Dick Butkus in 1963 to be named Big Ten most valuable player. Larry was voted to three All-America teams, twice made All-Big Ten and was voted the Spartans' MVP his senior year. He lettered four years, playing tight end as a freshman.

PERSONAL: Larry Bethea (beh-THAY-uh) has a degree in urban development and has worked for the Dallas Black Chamber of Commerce. He also enjoys working with handicapped children. Larry and wife Gloria are from Newport News, Va.

Bob Breunig 🛧 53



LINEBACKER • ARIZONA STATE • 8th YEAR HT: 6-2 • WT: 223 • BORN: 7/4/53 • D-3 FOR '75

PRO: Bob Breunig is only the third starting middle linebacker in Cowboys history. Like his predecessors, Lee Roy Jordan and Jerry Tubbs, Breunig has been honored by selection to the Pro Bowl.

In 1977 Bob succeeded Jordan, who had taken over for Tubbs in 1966. Breunig was converted from strongside linebacker to the middle following Jordan's retirement. Tom Landry called Breunig's transition "remarkable" and one of the reasons we were able to win our second Super Bowl." Breunig led the team in tackles in each of the past five seasons, with 130 in '77, 135 in '78, a club-record 167 in '79, 129 in '80 and 114 in '81. A defensive co-captain the past two years, Breunig was voted by his peers to the NFC Pro Bowl squad in 1979 and '80. He was the NFC's starting middle linebacker in 1980. "Bob's biggest contribution is his leadership," says linebackers coach Tubbs. "He han-dles so many audibles when we have to make changes in the defense. And you seldom catch him out of position. He does a great job getting prepared every week. He's steady and that's what we're looking for out of that position." Breunig relays defensive signals from defensive coordinator Ernie Stautner, but Bob's also responsible for calling audibles. Breunig's top game came in 1980 against the Giants (10/5) when he had 14 tackles, a quarterback trap and an interception to earn the Oak Farms Cowboys MVP award. Bob has not missed a game

since his rookie year. He started 92 straight games from 1976-81. GAMES: 1975 (10), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total — 102.

COLLEGE: Breunig capped an outstanding career at Arizona State by earning All-America honors in 1974 after leading the Sun Devils in tackles and fumble recoveries. A three-time All-Western Athletic Conference selection, he recovered 10 fumbles and intercepted six passes in his career.

PRO: The nature of the game demands that a successful football team be well stocked with quality reserves, people who can take over and play well when a front-line player is injured. Guy

Brown has filled that role especially well the past two seasons for the Cowboys. Now, with the retirement of D.D. Lewis, Guy has his best chance yet to win a starting job. Brown started two playoff games in 1980 at strongside linebacker after Mike Hegman dislocated an elbow in the NFC Wild Card Game. When Hegman fractured his arm in the 1981 opener. Brown started the next six games. In both situations, linebackers coach Jerry Tubbs said, "Guy came through with flying colors." The team's tallest and, along with Anthony Dickerson, fastest (4.6 in 40) linebacker, Brown has been plagued by injuries that have prevented him from challenging for a starting job. "He stayed healthy last year in training camp and performed better than he ever has," Tubbs said. "I think he got the confidence he needed. What Guy Brown did was make up his mind to play." Lewis' retirement elevated Brown to starting weakside linebacker entering training camp this season, "Guy brings experience, size and good physical reaction," Tom Landry says. "He could very easily be a starting linebacker. He has all the physical qualities." His first career interception was a one-hander at the end of the New England game last year (9/21). GAMES: 1977 (14), 1978 (15), 1979 (15), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 76.

COLLEGE: Brown earned All-Southwest Conference honors in his senior year as a "stand-up" defensive end. Injuries also hampered Guy at Houston where he began as a tight end.

PERSONAL: Guy Brown III is the oldest son in a family of 10 children from Palestine, Texas, which held Guy Brown Recognition Day in 1981. Guy Brown Associates, his newly formed business, markets Halon, a fire extinguisher, among other projects. Guy also has worked in the advertising business. He is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Sports World Ministries and the Special Olympics for the handicapped. 

the Cowboys, who hold great expectations for this free agent find. "We had a lot of hope for Dextor at strong safety until he developed the ankle problem in camp," Tom Landry says. "He has about as much potential as anybody in the defensive secondary. He has great instincts, a great feel for things back there." With the retirement of veteran strong safety Charlie Waters, Clinkscale entered training camp this season hoping to challenge Benny Barnes for the job. Clinkscale played regularly his rookie year on passing downs, helping fill the void at safety left by Cliff Harris' retirement and an injury to Randy Hughes. Dextor contributed two quarterback traps, nine pass breakups and a fumble recovery. He intercepted a pass against Los Angeles in the playoffs (12/28). Soft-spoken Dextor didn't give much thought to playing pro football while in college. He says he signed with the Cowboys because it was his favorite team. GAMES: 1980 (16), 1981 (inj.).

COLLEGE: Clinkscale was a 1979 first-team Black College All-America and a three-time All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference pick at South Carolina State. He also was chosen for the 1980 Black College All-Star Game. Dextor played both free and strong safety.

PERSONAL: A native of Greenville, S.C., Frederick Dextor Clinkscale has three brothers who also received college football scholarships. Dextor has a degree in business administration. Last offseason he made radio and TV public service announcements for the Greenville County schools on the importance of education. He also spoke at a number of schools on education.

Jim Cooper ★ 61

PRO: You can't ask for more than what starting right tackle Jim Cooper quietly has given the Cowboys the past two seasons — consistently solid work plus some outstanding performances in key



games. Ironically, Cooper almost got away from the Cowboys. He was among the last players released in '77 training camp, but he was recalled before the first game because of a knee injury to former tackle Jim Eidson. Versatile enough to play any offensive line position, Cooper backed up the guard spot his rookie year and started two games at center in '78. He started the first 11 games of '79 at right tackle before inexperience caught up with him and Rayfield Wright took over the position. Coop took undisputed possession of the right tackle job in 1980 and prompted Tom Landry to call him "one of our underrated players" by season's end. Jim did an outstanding job in the playoffs, especially against Atlanta (1/4), winning a game ball from the coaches. Although overshadowed by Pro Bowl offensive linemen Herb Scott and Pat Donovan, Cooper turned in another fine effort in '81. His top game came in a big victory at Philadelphia (11/1) in front of his hometown fans when he earned the Oak Farms MVP award and a coaches' game ball. He filled in at center in the second half against St. Louis (9/13) after Robert Shaw injured a knee. "Cooper is the one guy we have who is flexible enough to play anywhere in the offensive line," offensive line coach Jim Myers says. "He's got good movement, good size and he's smart. I call him the five Cs. Consistent, confident, competitive, calm and collected." GAMES: 1977 (14), 1978 (14), 1979 (15), 1980 (15), 1981 (16). Total - 74.

COLLEGE: Cooper started for three years at Temple under Wayne Hardin, Roger Staubach's coach at Navy. Jim played in the offensive and defensive line before settling at offensive tackle.

PERSONAL: Philadelphia natives James Albert Cooper and wife Mary, a nurse, live in Richardson, Texas, with their son, James Ryan (6/6/79). For his first three offseasons Jim returned to Philadelphia to work in his father's business selling reconditioned steel drums.

PRO: After two years of eager anticipation, Cowboys followers saw Doug Cosbie emerge last season as a solid contributor. He nearly won the starting tight end position in training camp,

then wound up sharing it most of the season with Billy Joe DuPree as a play messenger. Although six teammates caught more passes, none caught more touchdown passes, Cosbie and Butch Johnson tying for the club lead with five. Four of those touchdowns came at key moments of second-half comeback victories (Miami. at Philadelphia, Buffalo, Washington) and the other gave Dallas a fourth-quarter lead eventually squandered in a loss at the Giants. Cosbie also caught a 21-yard touchdown pass to send the Cowboys ahead of San Francisco 27-21 in the fourth quarter of the NFC Championship Game (1/10). Like most outstanding players, Cosbie seems most visible in clutch situations. Here's how a Dallas newspaper aptly described Cosbie last year: "He is the consummate Cowboy - the diplomat, the hard worker, the willing learner, the unknown collegiate with the unlimited talent, the draft find." Doug was the fourth tight end taken in the draft behind Kellen Winslow (San Diego), Dan Ross (Cincinnati) and Ronnie Lee (Miami). He was selected with a choice obtained from Seattle for Bill Gregory. Doug was used sparingly at tight end his first two seasons. but was an important special teams man. He blocked a field goal against St. Louis in '79 (10/21) and recovered a fumble on a kickoff to set up a touchdown in a 1980 victory at Oakland (12/7). GAMES: 1979 (16), 1980 (16), 1981 (16), Total - 48.

COLLEGE: Cosbie caught 120 passes for 1,721 yards and 10 touchdowns in four years at Santa Clara, three as a starter. In his senior year he served as a team captain and was voted the club's

Anthony was named the Cowboys' special teams player of the year the past two seasons, and last year he served as special teams captain. It's been an unlikely ascent for Dickerson, who did not even play football in 1979. Dickerson left SMU after his junior year in '77 and signed with Calgary of the Canadian Football League. The Stampeders released him after 10 games in '78. Dickerson moved to Los Angeles and worked as a handyman at the Burbank Airport. Then he returned to his native Texas and was taking business courses at the University of Houston when the Cowboys offered him a contract. Anthony intercepted two passes against San Francisco his rookie year (10/12) and caused two fumbles on special teams versus Seattle (11/27) that led to two touchdowns. He tied Aaron Mitchell for the 1980 team lead in forced fumbles with three. In the playoffs he recovered a fumble at Atlanta (1/4) and intercepted a pass at Philadelphia (1/11). Last year Dickerson's four quarterback sacks topped all non-linemen. His firsthalf fumble recovery was a key play in the Cowboys' division title clinching victory over Philadelphia (12/13). "He made giant strides last year," linebackers coach Jerry Tubbs said. "He's got the great natural ability, but he started to study more. He is determined to be a good, solid player." Former Cowboys assistant Mike Ditka. now head coach of the Chicago Bears, called Dickerson "the best athlete on the football team." GAMES: 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 32.

COLLEGE: Dickerson received Junior College All-America honors at linebacker for Henderson J.C. in Athens, Texas, in 1976. He transferred to SMU in Dallas and was named a co-captain after '77 spring practice. Although he played just one season for the Mustangs, former SMU Coach Ron Meyer, now head coach of the New England Patriots, said, "I haven't been around that long but Dickerson was the greatest linebacker I have ever coached."

PERSONAL: Anthony Charles Dickerson was a high school All-America halfback and linebacker at Pearland, Texas, High School, outside Houston. Anthony was raised on a truck farm in Pearland in a family with five older sisters. A licensed florist, Dickerson is co-owner of a flower shop in Plano, Texas, called "Real Flowers and Care." He also is a spokesman for the Dallas Chamber of Commerce summer jobs program for teenagers.

PRO: Pat Donovan has reached the taken-forgranted stage of his career. You don't hear much about him, unless someone is discussing the NFL's outstanding offensive linemen or wants to talk

with one of the Cowboys' most articulate players. And it's just taken for granted he'll be named to the Pro Bowl, which he's been the past three seasons, "He's just a lot quicker and faster, a better overall athlete, than most offensive linemen," says Tom Landry. Like former Cowboys Pro Bowl guard Blaine Nye, Donovan was a defensive lineman at Stanford who made the switch to offense as a rookie. Pat was selected with a draft choice obtained from Houston for former running back-wide receiver Mike Montgomery. A backup tackle his first two seasons. Donovan took over at right tackle in 1977 when Rayfield Wright suffered a knee injury. In Donovan's first season as a starter Dallas won the Super Bowl. In '78 Pat moved to his present left tackle spot to replace his mentor, Ralph Neely, who retired. Donovan emerged that season as a first-rate tackle, despite being slowed midway through the year by a fractured wrist. Against Green Bay (11/12) he became the first offensive lineman since John Fitzgerald in 1975 to win the Oak Farms Cowboys MVP award. In '79 Donovan received firstteam All-NFC honors from United Press International, Pro Football Weekly and the Sporting News. He also became the first Cowboys offensive lineman to be voted a Pro Bowl starter since Ravfield Wright in '74. Donovan again was named to the Pro Bowl as a backup and to UPI's first-team All-NFC squad in '80. Against St. Louis (11/16) he received his second career Oak Farms MVP award. In '81 Pat was voted a Pro Bowl starter, second team All-Pro by the Associated Press and the Newspaper Enterprise Association, and second-team All-NFC by UPI. He earned his third Oak Farms MVP award for his outstanding iob against All-Pro defensive end Lee Roy Selmon in the playoff victory over Tampa Bay (1/2). PRO: The already storied career of Tony Dorsett reached new heights in 1981 when he broke his own team rushing record by 321 yards, became the Cowboys' all-time leading rusher and



earned All-Pro status for the first time. Primed for his best year ever following an intense offseason conditioning program, Dorsett sped to 1,646 yards, second in the NFL to 1,674 by New Orleans' George Rogers. Tony also broke team records with 342 carries and nine 100vard games. The Cowboys improved their record in Dorsett's career 100vard games to 28-1. Tony became the first NFL player to rush for more than 1,000 yards in each of his first five seasons, marking the 11th consecutive year, counting high school and college, in which he reached 1,000 yards. Only NFL record-holder Jim Brown with 6,463 vards and Chicago's Walter Payton with 6,926 yards gained more than Dorsett's 6.270 yards in their first five NFL seasons. Dorsett entered 1982 as the 15th all time leading rusher in NFL history. "Tony is the epitome of an artist," Brown says. "There is no small back in football who can touch him. He's the fastest runner in the league without a doubt and he has great moves to go along with the speed. He has very strong legs for someone of his build, his acceleration is probably unequaled by anyone in the game today and he has great balance." Dorsett was named a team co-captain by Tom Landry in 1981 and he was voted to the Pro Bowl by his peers for the second time. UPI, the Washington Touchdown Club and the Kansas City Committee of 101 each named Dorsett 1981 NFC player of the year. After five seasons Dorsett owned the Cowboys' top three season rushing performances, top seven single-game rushing efforts and three longest runs. The second player selected in the '77 draft following a trade with Seattle, Dorsett as a rookie set team records for TDs rushing in a season (12). longest run from scrimmage (84) and most yards in a game (206) en route to consensus rookie of the year honors. In 1978 Tony broke the club rushing record and won his first Pro Bowl berth. He set a Cowboys record in '79 with four straight 100-yard games. In the '80 NFC Wild Card Game against Los Angeles (12/28) Dorsett set a Cowboys playoff record with 160 yards rushing. Tony added another 177 yards in two playoff games last season to raise his career playoff total to 1,000 yards in 12 games, second in NFL playoff history to Franco Harris' 1,488 yards in 17 games. GAMES: 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (14), 1980 (15), 1981 (16). Total - 75.

COLLEGE: Dorsett crowned a brilliant collegiate career by winning the 1976 Heisman Trophy as the nation's outstanding player. Dorsett rushed for an NCAA career-record 6,082 yards and 58 TDs and led Pitt to the 1976 national championship with a 12-0 record. He broke or tied 14 NCAA records, was a four-time All-America and the first

player in NCAA history with four 1,000-yard seasons and three 1.500vard seasons.

PERSONAL: Anthony Drew Dorsett is a member of the National Easter Seals Sports Council, served as 1980 chairman of the American Heart Association's Jump-Rope-a-Thon fund raising program, has promoted the United Way, United Negro College Fund and the Dallas Civic Opera, and last year founded the Tony Dorsett/Pro-Line Celebrity Tennis Tournament for the benefit of Dallas' Bishop College. In a 1979 Gallup Youth Survey of American teenagers' favorite sports personalities, Tony finished second to teammate Roger Staubach. Last year Dorsett was named the best dressed man in sports by the Custom Tailor's Guild of New York. He is a partner in Harah, a Dallas-based personal computer manufacturer. Tony was raised in Aliquippa, Pa., in a family of seven children. He lives in Wylie, Texas. Tony has a son, Anthony Drew Dorsett, Jr. (9/14/73).

PRO: From the early days of training camp last year it was apparent *this* rookie free agent had something special. Michael Downs made tackles all over the field. He also knocked down passes

and he intercepted them. His surprise showing cushioned the loss to injuries of safeties Randy Hughes and Dextor Clinkscale. And it enabled the Cowboys to move Dennis Thurman from free safety to cornerback and insert young Mr. Downs himself into the starting lineup for the season opener, 11 years after a rookie free agent named Cliff Harris began his illustrious career as the Cowboys' starting free safety. Like Harris, Downs proved no training camp fluke. In helping Dallas lead the NFL and set a team record for interceptions, he picked off seven passes, which tied for seventh best in the league. He broke up 11 passes, recovered one fumble, led the team in solo tackles with 72 and finished second in total tackles with 110. His 13 solo stops and 15 total tackles against Chicago (11/26) both were club season highs. Michael also intercepted a pass against Tampa Bay in the playoffs (1/2). "Downs' ability to step in at free safety as a free agent rookie and play as well as he did in a position that demands a lot of knowledge was a real key to our season," Tom Landry said. Like fellow rookie starting defensive back Everson Walls, Downs was raised in Dallas and was a longtime fan of the Cowboys. Although his speed and intelligence was obvious to pro scouts, a pinched nerve in Downs' neck his senior year at Rice hampered his play and gave him a reputation for not being aggressive. "He had that reputation but he was very aggressive for us right from the start," defensive backfield coach Gene Stallings says. "He's one of those guys who tries his dead-level best to do everything you ask him. He's got good range, good size and for a tall guy he can backpedal well." He missed the second game last year with a pulled hamstring. GAMES - 1981 (15).

COLLEGE: A three-year starter at free safety, Downs intercepted nine passes in his career at Rice, including three in one game (TCU) in 1978. He was a senior co-captain.

PERSONAL: Dallas native Michael Lynn Downs attended South Oak Cliff High School, the same school which produced teammate Harvey Martin and Wayne Morris and Tim Collier of the St. Louis Cardinals. Downs earned undergraduate degrees from Rice in business, political science and physical education. In the offseason he worked in marketing for the Dr Pepper Co. of Dallas. He and Everson Walls also opened a store, Downs and Walls Athletic Apparel, in Oak Cliff. Michael and wife Vanessa live in Dallas.

PRO: During his decade with the Cowboys, dependable Billy Joe DuPree has established himself as the premiere tight end in club history and one of the most durable performers ever to wear

the silver and blue. After fighting off the training camp challenge of Doug Cosbie last year, DuPree extended his ironman streaks to 134 consecutive games played and 92 straight starts at tight end. He also was Dallas' leading playoff receiver with six catches for 37 yards. BJ did not miss a game his first nine seasons. He started every game from 1976-81. His consecutive games played streak is third best in Cowboys history to Bob Lilly's 196 and Cornell Green's 168. The team's fourth all-time leading receiver entering the 1982 season, DuPree was voted to the Pro Bowl in 1976, '77 and '78. "He has all the attributes you want in a tight end," Tom Landry says. "He's big, fast, makes the big play and blocks well. He's been a great team player for many years and he still can perform well." A starter since his rookie year, although injuries, including a broken finger, reduced his playing time in '75, DuPree set a club record for receptions by a tight end in '76 with 42. NFL seasons, the former Baltimore Colts' All-Pro was switched to left tackle in 1980, his second season in Dallas. Dutton spent that season learning his new position while sharing it with starter Larry Cole. With Cole's retirement after the season, Dutton took sole possession of the position last year. He turned in a fine performance, which improved as the year went on. He finished sixth on the team in tackles with 81, had 41/2 quarterback sacks and five batted-down passes, "John came along very well last year at tackle, and it was one of the keys to our defensive improvement," Tom Landry says. Dutton's absence from the NFC Championship Game in San Francisco because of a bruised thigh was considered a major blow to the Cowboys' chances. The Cowboys obtained Dutton from Baltimore on the Oct. 9, 1979 trading deadline to help plug a hole left by the retirements of Ed Jones and Jethro Pugh. Dallas gave up its first and second-round 1980 draft choices to acquire the three-time Pro Bowl selection. A right end at Baltimore, John was moved to left end in '79 to replace Jones. Dutton moved to tackle a year later when Too Tall returned. John contributed 31/2 quarterback traps in his first two seasons in

PRO: Prepared to deliver his best season yet after an outstanding training camp, starting left linebacker Mike Hegman had his 1981 season short-circuited by a broken bone in his right fore-



arm, suffered in the season opener at Washington (9/6). Mike missed the next five games after playing in 77 straight, but he returned to start the final nine and the two playoff games. He recovered a fumble to set up the Cowboys' first TD in the NFC title game (1/10). "He was really starting to come into his own when he was hurt," Tom Landry said. Linebackers coach Jerry Tubbs said Hegman demonstrated Pro Bowl potential in training camp. "Mike's the kind of player who doesn't make many mistakes and he's got great football instincts, good anticipation," Tubbs says. "And the fact he has good hands and can catch the ball means it's got to be a plus to have him on the field." The most visible evidence of those instincts came in Super Bowl XIII when he swiped the ball from Pittsburgh QB Terry Bradshaw and raced 37 yards for a second quarter touchdown, his first official NFL TD. Hegman had scored on a 66-yard interception return against Denver earlier that year, 1978, in preseason. Mike started three games at strongside linebacker for injured Thomas Henderson in '78 and alternated on the weakside (right) with D.D. Lewis for three others. He shared the team lead in fumble recoveries with two, had two QB traps and forced two others. Hegman was thrust into a starting role for the final four games of 1979 after Thomas Henderson was released. In the '79 divisional playoff loss to Los Angeles (12/30), Hegman led the Cowboys in tackles with nine and tipped Vince Ferragamo's pass that Billy Waddy caught for the 50-yard winning TD with two minutes left. Hegman won the starting strongside linebacker job outright in '80 training camp and played "extremely well all season," according to Landry. Highlights included a recovered fumble in the end zone for a touchdown at Philadelphia (10/19) and two intercepted passes against Seattle (11/27). He finished fifth in tackles with a career-high

85 and had three quarterback sacks. Against the Rams in the NFC Wild Card Game (12/28), bad luck struck again as Hegman suffered a dislocated left elbow which knocked him out of the next two playoff games. GAMES: 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16), 1981 (11). Total — 87.

PRO: "Tony Hill is our big play man," Tom Landry says. "He has that ability to make the key play. He threatens the defense more than the other receivers we have because he has the excellent

burst of speed to get under a ball that's deep. He's a very explosive player, the type who can turn a short play into a big play in a hurry." Despite a slow start in '81 due to injuries, Hill tied Ron Springs for the club lead in receptions and for the fourth straight season led the team in receiving yardage. Tony caught only eight balls through the first six games after missing all of preseason with hamstring and groin injuries. He caught 38 passes in the final 10 games, including three 100-yard games, to become the fifth leading receiver in Cowboys history. In four seasons as a starter the two-time Pro Bowl selection ('78, '79) has caught 17 passes of 40 yards or longer and more touchdown passes (28) than any other Dallas receiver. Hill and Bob Hayes (1965-66) are the only Cowboys receivers to compile back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons. In '82 Tony could become the first Dallas receiver with three 1.000-yard seasons, a feat he missed last year by just 47 yards.

and only the fourth to reach 4,000 yards in a career. Hill has had three game-winning catches that have enabled him to perform his "Wings of Victory" TD celebration with added gusto. In '79 his 22-yard quick screen with two minutes left beat Chicago (9/16) and an eightyarder with 39 seconds remaining clinched the NFC East title for Dallas in a dramatic comeback victory over Washington (12/16). His 28-vard scoring catch with 45 seconds left lifted the Cowboys over St. Louis in 1980 (11/2). "Confidence oozes from the guy," teammate Pat Donovan says. "And the great thing about it is that he can back it up with the big catch." Hill was obtained with a draft pick acquired from Philadelphia in '75 for former All-Pro guard John Niland. GAMES: 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total --- 78.

COLLEGE: Hill broke all of former 49ers All-Pro Gene Washington's receiving records at Stanford. Tony caught 140 passes in four years for 2,225 yards and 18 touchdowns, including 55 catches for 916 yards in 1975. He played quarterback in high school.

PERSONAL: Leroy Anthony Hill, Jr., serves as honorary chairman of the Dallas chapter of the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation. In 1981 he started the Tony Hill Sports Camp for underprivileged children in his Long Beach, Calif., hometown, In 1978 Long Beach honored Tony as its athlete of the year. Tony has a degree from Stanford in political science.

Gary Hogeboom ★ 14

PRO: Although he has yet to throw a pass in regular season, Gary Hogeboom shows all the promise of becoming a top NFL quarterback. Tom Landry thinks the third-year veteran is ready to

become a factor in the Cowboys' quarterback picture. "Gary has reached the point now where he's going to start to emerge," Landry says. "I think there's a possibility he'll challenge Danny White this year along with Glenn Carano. That doesn't mean he's going to take over the position. It just means he has the capabilities that if something happens to your first quarterback, he can step in and be a first-string quarterback." Gary slipped into two games in 1980 on special teams. He saw his first preseason action at quarterback last vear, completing 7-of-14 passes for 78 yards and one touchdown, an 18-yard strike to Doug Donley against Houston (8/29). Hogeboom appeared at quarterback in regular season for the first time at Baltimore last year (12/6), handing off three times at the end of the game. With Hogeboom and Carano backing up White, Landry believes the Cowboys are in good shape at quarterback, "probably as good as anybody in the league," he says. "Gary may be the strongest and quickest deliverer we have. He delivers the ball extremely quickly and this is a great asset, along with his size. He has a good feel for throwing the ball and he appears to be tough mentally." Hogeboom won the roster spot vacated by Roger Staubach, who retired following the '79 season, Hogeboom emerged as the No. 3 quarterback in 1980 training camp from a group of six rookies former offensive coordinator Dan Reeves called "probably the best group we've had since I've been here." GAMES: 1980 (2), 1981 (1). Total - 3.

COLLEGE: Hogeboom led Central Michigan to its first conference championship in 1979 when he was named Mid-American Conference player of the year. He guided Central to a 19-2-1 record in two years as a starter and of his 28 career starts Central won 24. He passed for 3,088 career yards (208-of-395, 53 percent) and 19 touchdowns, and he rushed for 957 yards and 16 TDs. He set the school career total offense record of 4,045 yards.

PERSONAL: Grand Rapids, Mich., native Gary Keith Hogeboom (HOAG-ih-boom) lives in Dallas with his wife Kristi. Gary, who holds his Michigan real estate license, works in the offseason for Invequest, a Dallas investment corporation. He has helped promote the Special Olympics and the American Heart Association and he coaches a women's softball team comprised of a number of Cowboys wives.

Butch Johnson ★ 86

WIDE RECEIVER CAL-RIVERSIDE Th YEAR HT: 6-1 WT: 180 BORN: 5/28/54 D-3C FOR '76

PRO: It inspires no joy in opposing defenses, knowing the Cowboys' corps of receivers includes Drew Pearson, Tony Hill AND Butch Johnson. A supreme competitor who prides himself on making



the clutch receptions, Johnson turned in his best season in 1981, with career highs in catches, yards and touchdowns. Butch started the first six games for Hill, who was injured. Appropriately, Johnson's five touchdown catches, which co-led the team with Doug Cosbie, were significant plays in five victories. Of course, each score was followed by his newly developed "California Quake" TD dance. He made two other receptions of note, a 47-yard fourth-quarter catch to set up the final touchdown in the division title clinching 21-10 win over Philadelphia (12/13) and a diving one-handed catch of a 20-yard pass to set up Dallas' first score in the NFC Championship Game at San Francisco (1/10). "Butch makes the tough plays in tough situations," Danny White says. "He always has, and he always will." In 1980 Johnson caught a 35-yard touchdown pass that sent Dallas ahead of Los Angeles 27-13 late in the third quarter of the NFC Wild Card victory (12/28). Although he missed the first five games of '79. Butch contributed to two victories with clutch receptions. His diving 19-yard third-down catch sparked a late fourth-quarter rally at the New York Giants (11/4) and in a playoff-clinching victory at Philadelphia (12/8) Butch alertly snared a deflected 17-yard pass for the winning TD in the fourth period. Johnson broke into the lineup as a play messenger with Golden Richards in '77. Against San Francisco that season (12/12) he made a remarkable one-handed TD grab, then capped the season with a spectacular TD catch in Super Bowl XII, a diving 45-yarder to send Dallas ahead of Denver 20-3 in the third quarter. He scored his second Super Bowl TD the next year against Pittsburgh on a fouryard pass late in the game. Johnson led the team in kickoff and punt returns his first three seasons. As a rookie he tied an NFL record with nine punt runbacks against Buffalo (11/15/76). His club season records for punt return yardage and most punts returned were broken in '80 by James Jones. GAMES: 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (11), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 87.

COLLEGE: Johnson led the nation in receiving in 1975 with 67 catches for 1,027 yards in just eight games, earning All-America honors and his team's MVP award. He caught 139 passes in his career, 17 for touchdowns. He also was a pole vaulter on the Cal-Riverside track team.

PRO: The football career of Ed "Too Tall" Jones took off in 1981 and landed where most thought it would after the Cowboys made him the first pick in the 1974 NFL draft. Following a

season in which his play equaled his towering potential, Too Tall was named to the Pro Bowl and to an official All-Pro team (Newspaper Enterprise Association) for the first time. The Dallas media voted Jones the Cowboys' defensive MVP in seven of 13 victories. He knocked down

10 passes, had eight quarterback sacks, equaled a career-high with 83 tackles (tied for fourth on the team) and led the club in fumble recoveries with three for the second straight year. He also blocked an extra point attempt which set up a 10-9 victory over Chicago (11/26). "He's doing things now we always hoped he would do," defensive line coach Ernie Stautner said. The year Jones spent as a professional boxer in 1979 made a positive contribution to his football career, which he resumed on July 8, 1980. "He's quicker, faster and stronger than before he left," Stautner says. "But the major difference I see is his determination. He's more intense now." Too Tall's 1980 season was every bit as fine as last year's, including a career-high 11 pass deflections and seven guarterback traps. He had a career high 12 OB traps in 1978. Too Tall seems to rise to his most awesome heights in the playoffs, especially in '77 and '78 when the Cowboys went to the Super Bowl. Jones had 23 tackles, two QB traps, two batted-down passes and two forced fumbles in the '77 playoffs, 19 tackles, two sacks and a fumble recovery in the '78 playoffs, including a team-leading seven tackles in Super Bowl XIII. In the NFC Divisional Playoff Game victory over Tampa Bay last season (1/2)Jones batted down one pass and intercepted another. The Cowbovs obtained the rights to draft Jones in '74 from Houston for Tody Smith and Billy Parks. The Cowboys also got Danny White with a draft choice from that deal. Too Tall started his career at weakside defensive end concentrating on the pass rush and made the All-Rookie team. In his second season he swapped positions with Harvey Martin and became the left end focusing on stopping the run. Jones did not miss a game in his first seven seasons. GAMES: 1974 (14), 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (DNP), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 104.

COLLEGE: Jones was a two-time All-America at Tennessee State where he also played two seasons of basketball. A college teammate dubbed him "Too Tall." Jones did not begin playing football until his senior year of high school.

PERSONAL: Edward Lee Jones, a native of Jackson, Tenn., is a partner in Dallas-based Imperial Investors, Inc., with Butch Johnson, Preston Pearson and Benny Barnes. PRO: James Jones brings a full arsenal to the running back position. He is what they call in the business "a complete player." He runs, blocks and catches the ball with proficiency. Coach Tom

Landry even has toyed with the idea of using Jones at fullback. Although he's not especially big, he's got the blocking and receiving ability Landry's looking for at that position. Meanwhile, Jones backs up the Cowboys' all time leading rusher, tailback Tony Dorsett, although their styles are quite different. If Dorsett is a smooth disco dancer, Jones is your basic rock and roll runner, bouncing and twisting through tacklers. Last season he averaged 5.3 yards per carry, tops on the team among running backs. His 59-yard touchdown run at Baltimore (12/6) was the Cowboys' second longest run from scrimmage last season. In the playoffs Jones was the team's second leading pass receiver with five catches for 32 yards. In his rookie season James made a sparkling debut when he picked up 45 yards on 10 carries in a season-opening victory at Washington (9/8) with Dorsett sidelined periodically by leg cramps. But it was as a kick returner that he made his biggest contribution all year. Jones set club season records for punt returns (54) and punt return yardage (548), breaking Butch Johnson's previous marks. James' 10.1-yard punt return average was the Cowboys' highest since Johnson's 10.9 in 1976 and it ranked fifth best in the NFL and fourth in the NFC. Jones' 22.5-yard kickoff return average was the club's best since Johnson's 24.4 in 1977 and it ranked sixth in the NFC. Against the Redskins (11/23) he had a season-high 52-yard punt return to set up a touchdown in a 14-10 victory. Against Los Angeles in the NFC Wild Card Game (12/28) he had 153 yards in kick returns, including a dazzling 43-yard punt return in the first quarter that got the Cowboys rolling. Jones did not return punts in college, but volunteered for the job in training camp in an effort to assure his spot on the team. An early-season groin injury hampered Jones' kick returning last year, GAMES: 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 32.

COLLEGE: Jones missed the final seven games of his senior year with a knee injury after leading Mississippi State in rushing his junior season with 687 yards (5.3 per carry). In his career James rushed for 1,416 yards (5.4 average) and 14 touchdowns, caught 29 passes for 274 yards and three touchdowns, completed 3-of-6 passes for 72 yards and two touchdowns and returned 24 kickoffs for a 21.3-yard average and one TD. He was Academic All-SEC as a junior.

PERSONAL: James Jones, Jr., is a native of Starkville, Miss. He studied physical education at Mississippi State and hopes to become a football coach. James is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

PRO: Angelo King fits the mold of the smaller, quicker linebacker needed to cope with today's pass-oriented NFL offenses. King showed potential in training camp but was released in late August



at the roster cutdown to 50. Fortunately for King, Mike Hegman fractured his arm in the season opener at Washington, opening the door for Angelo's recall. Angelo was a solid special teams performer, including a fumble recovery on a punt that set up the Cowboys' go-ahead touchdown in the third quarter at New England (9/21). His performance was strong enough that when Hegman returned, King stayed. Although he didn't receive much chance at linebacker during games, King's teammates and coaches are enthusiastic about his ability. Tom Landry considered him a candidate to succeed weakside linebacker D.D. Lewis along with Guy Brown, Anthony Dickerson and Bill Roe. "Angelo King might not impress you that much when you first look at him," Landry says. "The only thing that impresses you is the results. He makes plays. He moves off blocks well. He's in good position to make plays. He'll build on that ability. He may become like a Dave Edwards (Cowboys linebacker 1963-75) type of player, someone who can do the job for you over and over again, a solid performer." King and Cowboys

safety Dextor Clinkscale were teammates for three years at South Carolina State, GAMES: 1981 (15).

COLLEGE: King became a starting linebacker at South Carolina State midway through his freshman year, 1977. He went on to become second-team All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference in 1978, first-team All-MEAC in 1979 and '80, plus a Black All-America and honorable mention Little All-America in 1980. King blocked six punts in his career, two in '78 and a school-record four in '79. He played in the 1981 Black All-Star Game.

PRO: The sight of Harvey Martin swooping into the backfield from his right end position has been a fearsome sight for NFL quarterbacks for a decade. Martin has led or co-led the Cowboys in

quarterback traps every year he's been with the club, nine straight seasons, averaging 12.7 per year for a total of 114 (from '73.'81 9-10-10-15-23-16-9-12-10). A defensive co-captain from 1977-80, Harvey is a fiery competitor and the emotional leader of the defense. "Harvey is the guy who gets the front four going," says cornerback Dennis Thurman. "He's the leader, the catalyst. When he's going good, those linemen are unstoppable." Martin is a four-time Pro Bowl choice (1976-79) and a unanimous All-Pro in 1977. He was named the Cowboys' Oak Farms defensive MVP after getting two sacks in a key victory over Los Angeles last year (10/18). He led the club last season with four forced fumbles and he sparked the outstanding defensive showing in the shutout playoff victory over Tampa Bay (1/2) with a trap, two batted-down passes and constant pressure on the quarterback. He also had two traps in the NFC Championship Game (1/10). Said Philadelphia tackle Stan Walters, "I rank Harvey the best defensive end I met in 1981. He plays the run better than he ever did. He plays within the flex defense. And he can still be a dominating pass rusher." In 1980 Martin tied his single-game career high of three OB traps against St. Louis (11/2) and he had four traps in the playoffs. He



Harvey is active in the American Heart Association, the Easter Seals and the Parkland Hospital Blood Bank.

PRO: The Cowboys' starting fullback from 1974-80 and the club's fourth all-time leading rusher, Robert Newhouse yielded his starting berth to youthful Ron Springs last year. Unlike others

who've been put in that position, however. Newhouse accepted his new role without a fuss. He was a solid special teams contributor all season and when called on in short-yardage situations at Philadelphia (11/1) he responded with 24 yards on six carries, including a six-yard gain on a third-and-one in the winning touchdown drive. "He's the type of player every coach likes to have," Tom Landry says, "You call on him and he responds." In 1980, when it seemed he was about to become the Cowboys' fullback of the past, 'House regained his starting job from Springs a month into the season and finished as the team's second leading rusher. A stress fracture of the lower left leg suffered in the season opener slowed Newhouse in 1979 after a broken bone in his right leg marred his '78 season. Robert was enjoying one of his best years in '78 when the injury struck him down in game 12 against New Orleans (11/19). His streak of playing in 96 straight games was broken, but 'House still led the team in rushing TDs with eight and total TDs scored with 10. In a key victory over Green Bay (11/2), he played the equivalent of a perfect game, receiving the highest grades ever by a Dallas running back in the coaches' film review. Newhouse has had five career 100-yard games, most recently in the 1979 opener at St. Louis (9/2) when he gained 108 yards. He led the Cowboys in rushing in the 1975 Super Bowl season with a career-best 930 yards. 'House has played well in many key games, his most memorable moment coming in Super Bowl XII when he tossed a 29-yard touchdown pass to Golden Richards to seal the victory over Denver (1/15/ 78). "There isn't a more hard-nosed back in pro ball than Robert Newhouse," says Tony Dorsett. Robert was drafted in 1972 with a secondround pick obtained from New England for Halver Hagen and Honor Jackson. GAMES: 1972 (14), 1973 (14), 1974 (14), 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (13), 1979 (14), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 143.

COLLEGE: Newhouse set school records for yards rushing in a season (1,757) and carries (297) in 1971 en route to becoming Houston's all-time leading rusher with 2,961 yards. He averaged 6.4 yards per carry and scored 19 touchdowns in his career. Four times he rushed for more than 200 yards in a game, including 245 against Mississipi State in 1969.

PERSONAL: Robert Fulton Newhouse and wife Nancy are both from the east Texas town of Hallsville. Newhouse Enterprises, Inc., includes the All-Brand Pump Company and a petroleum products divi-

PRO: A severe hamstring pull on the first day of training camp last year subverted the 1981 hopes of Timmy Newsome, who was considered a candidate for the starting fullback job entering

the season. A diamond in the rough plucked from one of the nation's smaller colleges (enrollment 2,200). Newsome is bigger than most previous Cowboys fullbacks and he's exceptionally strong, pound-forpound the strongest man on the team, according to conditioning coach Bob Ward. Timmy can bench-press 410 pounds. He also has a knack for slipping tackles. Although Newsome played in 15 games last year, he missed virtually all of training camp because of the leg injury and was never a factor at fullback, contributing mostly on special teams. Timmy began slowly in training camp as a rookie, too, and didn't see much action during the '80 season. As the year went on, however, he continued to impress his coaches in practice with his all-around skills. He did catch three passes and score two touchdowns on one-yard runs in a victory over San Diego (10/26). He also had a few long runs, a 23-yarder against Seattle (11/27) plus a 19-yarder and 15-yarder in the playoffs against Los Angeles (12/28). Newsome is a good blocker and fine receiver, even though he didn't have much opportunity to catch passes in college, GAMES: 1980 (16), 1981 (15). Total - 31.

COLLEGE: Newsome was a two-time NAIA first-team All-America and was voted 1979 player of the year by the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) coaches. In his four-year career at Winston-Salem State, Newsome rushed for 3,843 yards (6.1 per carry) (Continued on next page)

PRO: Armed with a resounding dedication to the old fashioned work ethic, Kurt Petersen responded beyond expectations as an emergency starter last year, only his second season at a new



position, offensive guard. A defensive lineman in college, Petersen spent his rookie year making the difficult position switch, trying to duplicate the success of Pat Donovan, John Fitzgerald and Blaine Nye, college defensive linemen who became top offensive linemen for the Cowboys. The learning process was expected to continue last season, but a knee injury to center Robert Shaw in the second game caused the Cowboys to move right guard Tom Rafferty to center and Petersen into a starting role at right guard. Kurt started 14 of 16 games and proved a key factor in the Cowboys' 1981 season. "We normally don't expect someone to be able to move from defense to offense so quickly," says offensive line coach Jim Myers. "Pete is way ahead of schedule. I consider the quarterback and the offensive linemen the two areas where experience is crucial. But Pete made up for it and here is the reason: Pete has been dedicated, he has worked." Called "the Cowboys' blue-ribbon workhorse" by a Dallas newspaper, Petersen combines size, quickness and intelligence with unusual strength, second on the team to awesome Randy White. "As a rookie he was lost," Tom Rafferty says. "But you could tell he was going to be a player. And when you consider he had never played offense before, the guy has made quite a transition." Says Tom Landry, "Petersen has to learn some things yet to become a dominant player, but he has that opportunity." GAMES: 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 32.

COLLEGE: A linebacker his junior year, Petersen was moved to defensive tackle his senior season to give Missouri more inside quickness. A senior co-captain, Kurt tied for the team lead in fumble recoveries with four.

Drew Pearson ★ 88

WIDE RECEIVER • TULSA • 10th YEAR HT: 6-0 • WT: 190 • BORN: 1/12/51 • FA FOR '73

PRO: In his decade with the Cowboys Drew Pearson has proceeded from undrafted free agent rookie to all-time leading receiver, from unknown to legend. Named to the All-Decade Team of the

1970s by the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1980, Pearson has earned a reputation as one of the top clutch receivers in football history. His most memorable catches form a list of some of the great moments in Cowboys history - an 83-yard fourth-quarter touchdown reception to beat the Rams in the 1973 playoffs; a 50-yard scoring catch in the closing seconds to beat Washington on Thanksgiving Day 1974; the 50-yard "Hail Mary" touchdown reception in the final 20 seconds to beat Minnesota in the '75 playoffs; two touchdown catches in the final 3:40 at Atlanta in the '80 playoffs, the second with 42 seconds left to rally the Cowboys past the Falcons 30-27. Drew became the Cowboys' all-time leading receiver in 1980 when he passed Bob Hayes' mark of 365 catches. Drew entered his 10th season needing 400 yards to catch Haves' team leadership in all-time receiving yardage with 7,295 yards. "The thing you can't do is look inside a player and find out how really competitive he is and how he will react in situations where you really need him," Gil Brandt says. "These things take time to find out. and they're the things Drew Pearson is all about." Drew was named All-Pro and to the Pro Bowl in 1974, '76 and '77. He led NFC pass catchers in '76 with 58 receptions and he holds club records for catching passes in 58 consecutive games between 1974-78 and in each of the past 18 playoff games (every one he's been in). Drew entered '82 with a streak of catches in 34 straight games. In 1979 Drew and Tony Hill became the first pair of NFC (or old NFL) receivers to each catch 1,000 yards worth of passes in a season. Pearson, who's missed only one game (12/8/79 at Philadelphia) because of injury, became a starter midway through his rookie year due to an injury to Otto Stowe. Drew served as an offensive co-captain in 1977 and '78. Six of his 18 career 100-yard games have been against Washington. "You're always glad you've got somebody like Drew around when you play in big games," Tom Landry says. "He's agile, he runs precise patterns and he's got great hands." GAMES: 1973 (14), 1974 (14), 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (15), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 133.

COLLEGE: Pearson caught a team-leading 33 passes for a runoriented, 4-7 Tulsa team in 1972 and received the university president's award as the team's "best spirited and most unselfish member." Drew succeeded Joe Theismann as quarterback at South River, N.J., High School but was converted to flanker at Tulsa.

PERSONAL: Drew Pearson, voted the Cowboys' NFL Man of the Year by fans in 1980, is a national spokesman for the Distilled Spirits

Council which battles teenage alcohol abuse. Drew has a local radio show during the season, has worked as an analyst on telecasts of Southwest Conference basketball games and has done sports reporting for a Dallas TV station. Drew founded the Cowboys players' offseason basketball team and is married to the daughter of former Harlem Globetrotters star Marques Haynes. Drew and Marsha Pearson have two daughters — Tori Nichole (7/23/74) and Britni Ja'Nae (8/6/79).

PRO: Tom Rafferty's athletic versatility paid big dividends last season when the Cowboys lost both their centers to knee injuries. After John Fitzgerald went down during preseason and Rob-

ert Shaw in the second regular-season game, Rafferty became the center after four years as the starting right guard. Yet the offense continued to flourish. "He played very well," Tom Landry said. "By the end of the season he was a consistent performer. We're fortunate to have a guy like him." Now Rafferty provides outstanding depth at guard and center, a proven starter at each position. Tom also snaps the ball on punts, field goals and extra points. Usually it takes a few years to break in an offensive lineman because of the complexity of the position. But Rafferty, whose soft-spoken manner belies his intense competitiveness, won a starting job his second season, replacing retired All-Pro right guard Blaine Nye in 1977. Rafferty wound up playing two games at center that season for injured Fitzgerald, a precursor of the 1981 season. In 1978 Rafferty and Burton Lawless shared the right guard position as play messengers. Tom won the job outright in '79 and played consistently well, particularly in the running game. His top effort came in a crucial playoff-clinching victory at Philadelphia (12/8), after which he was voted the Oak Farms Cowboys MVP by the media. Rafferty shared his second career game MVP award with Fitzgerald in 1980 for the Cowboys' season-opening victory at Washington (9/8). "His consistency and intensity are his two best traits." offensive line coach Jim Myers says. "He knows his job well and has a desire to excel. He's a tremendous competitor." COLLEGE: A four-year starting guard at Penn State, Rafferty earned All-America honors from Football News and the Football Writers Association in 1975. The Cowboys considered him the top pulling guard in the '76 draft.

PERSONAL: Thomas Michael Rafferty was born in Syracuse and raised in Manlius, N.Y., where he became a high school All-America in lacrosse in addition to starring in football and basketball. PRO: The consensus of opinion holds that Howard Richards is a star in waiting, an offensive lineman of great potential who soon will become a fixture in the lineup. "Like Kurt Petersen, Rich-



ards has all the qualities to be a top offensive lineman," Tom Landry says. "He's got speed, size and quickness. If he develops, he's going to challenge people in front of him." The 25th player selected in the 1981 draft, Richards contributed to making the offensive line the area of greatest depth for the Cowboys last year. An offensive tackle in college, Richards is quick enough to also play guard, the Cowboys believe. "The big question right now is where does he play?" explains Landry. "Since we have lots of people at guard, I think he'll probably work at tackle more than guard for now." Richards played special teams his rookie year while learning the complicated offensive line position. "He's very flexible both mentally and physically," offensive line coach Jim Myers says. "What's striking about him is his size, mobility and intelligence. He should have a solid career." Richards played at Missouri with current teammates Kurt Petersen and Ron Fellows: GAMES: 1981 (16).

COLLEGE: Richards started 40 consecutive games at right tackle for Missouri and capped his career by earning consensus All-Big Eight and second-team All-America honors in 1980. He was a finalist for the 1980 Lombardi Award, which goes to the nation's top collegiate lineman. good size and he's very intense, very competitive. He'll fight for a job." Roe did not see action in 1981 after a sprained ankle in training camp sent him to the injured reserve list. He made his presence felt in practice, however. "He was great in practice," linebackers coach Jerry Tubbs said. "He covered every running back that came out of the backfield. He messed up the offense every time they came his way. His forte is intensity." Roe used that quality to make a big impression on special teams his rookie year of 1980. He received a game ball from the coaches for his special teams work against Green Bay (9/28). Roe had an interception, which he returned 31 yards, in 1980 preseason against Los Angeles (8/16). "You didn't hear too much about Roe his rookie year, but he did a great job," Landry said. "He was great at covering punts and kickoffs, a very aggressive player. He has a pretty good nose for the football." Bill was the Cowboys' first 1980 draft choice since the first-round and second-round picks were traded to Baltimore in 1979 for John Dutton. Roe was chosen with one of two picks obtained in 1978 from the Chicago Bears for wide receiver Golden Richards. GAMES: 1980 (16), 1981 (inj.).

COLLEGE: A late-blooming star at Colorado because of a junior year knee injury, Roe led the Big Eight in tackles in 1979 when he became the first player in conference history to win defensive player of the week honors two weeks in a row. One of his team-leading three interceptions that year was a 69-yard TD return against Nebraska. Bill was a two-year starter at inside linebacker. He won Colorado's heavyweight boxing championship in '78.

PERSONAL: Born in South Bend, Ind., William Oliver Roe II was raised in Markham, III. He earned 10 letters in football, basketball, track and baseball at Thornwood High School in South Holland, III. Bill has a daughter, Wendy (12/17/79).

PRO: When your offensive attack employs multiple formations, motion and deception, you need versatile players at the skill positions who can perform a variety of functions. That's what

makes Jay Saldi so valuable to the Cowboys. "He's very important to our team in that he handles so many special situations and the game of football today is special situations," Tom Landry says. "The fact he fits in so well in so many situations makes him a very valuable performer." Saldi started five games and split time nearly equally last year with the other two tight ends, Billy Joe DuPree and Doug Cosbie. Jay was the third tight end on many short-yardage plays, or the fourth wide receiver on third-and-long, or the man-in-motion on

special formation plays. He runs excellent pass routes and possesses a dependable pair of hands. Jay served as a play messenger in 1980 when he established personal highs in catches and vards. His biggest play was a nifty 37-yard over-the-shoulder catch to the three to set up the go-ahead touchdown in the NFC Wild Card playoff victory over Los Angeles (12/28). Saldi missed the final 11 games of the 1978 season with a broken right forearm, but returned in '79 to give the Cowboys fine depth at tight end. Jay had the distinction of catching Roger Staubach's last touchdown pass, a two-yarder that sent Dallas ahead in the fourth quarter of its '79 playoff loss to Los Angeles (12/30). A free agent longshot in '76, Saldi first made his mark as a rugged special teams performer. Landry called him the team's most improved player after '77 training camp and named Jay special teams captain, a post he held until his '78 injury against St. Louis (9/24). Saldi scored three touchdowns in '77, two by air and one by sliding eight yards on his back with a fumbled Giants punt (he's scored one other TD against the Giants). PRO: The Cowboys' most honored active offensive lineman is quiet, unassuming Herbert Scott, who lets his All-Pro performance on the field speak for itself. Rising from the obscurity of being

a 13th-round draft pick from little Virginia Union. Scott made the team in 1975 as one of the "Dirty Dozen" rookies who helped lead the Cowboys into Super Bowl X. The following year he won the regular left guard position, spending the second half of the season as a play messenger with Burton Lawless. And since 1978 Herb's been collecting a host of honors. He was named first-team All-NFC the past four vears (1978-81) by United Press International, and by the Sporting News in 1979. He was chosen by his peers to play in the Pro Bowl the past three years (1979-81). In 1980 he became the Cowboys' first All. Pro offensive lineman since Rayfield Wright in '75 when he was named first-team All-NFL by the Associated Press and the Newspaper Enterprise Association. Herb achieved All-Pro status again in '81, according to AP the Sporting News and NEA (second team). Known to teammates as "Pooch." Scott is considered the Cowboys' best open field blocker, consistently ranks at or near the top as a pass blocker and is seldom penalized. His balmy demeanor hides an aggressive football personality. Or as teammate Pat Donovan puts it, "Beneath that gentle exterior lies a heart of ice." Says Tony Dorsett, "When Herb goes after a guy, the next thing you see are feet in the air. You just let him get out front and wait until he takes his man out, which you know he's going to do. Having a guy like that working in front of you makes it hard not to gain yardage " Herb missed four starts and half of two other games in 1977 with a hamstring injury. GAMES: 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (11), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16), 1981 (16), Total - 103.

COLLEGE: Scott was a three-time All-Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association selection at Virginia Union. He played guard, tackle and even caught one pass as a tight end. He also was a top shot putter for the track team. In May 1982 Herb was inducted into the CIAA Hall of Fame.

PERSONAL: Herbert Carnell Scott, Jr., works in the offseason for A.L. Williams & Associates, a Dallas financial planning firm. Earlier in his career he taught high school math and science in the offseason in his native Virginia Beach, Va. Last February "Herbert Scott Day" was held in Richmond, Va., home of Virginia Union. Herb's hobby is gospel singing. He is the lead baritone in Dallas' Believer's Tabernacle. Herb's wife Gayle is a counselor at Southwestern Medical School. Herb, Gayle and son Ryan Carnell (11/24/80) live in Lucas, Texas.

Rafael Septien ★ 1

KICKER • SOUTHWEST LOUISIANA • 6th YEAR HT: 5-9 • WT: 174 • BORN: 12/12/53 • FA FOR '78

PRO: Consistency has been his trademark, so when opportunity called last year Rafael Septien responded with one of the finest seasons ever by an NFL kicker and an all-out assault on the



Cowboys' record book. In tying Detroit's Ed Murray for the NFL scoring championship, Septien set team records with 121 points, 27 field goals and nine consecutive field goals. He tied another club record twice with four field goals in a game, against Washington (9/6) and New England (9/21), and became the Cowboys' all-time career field goal leader with 73. He converted 22 of his first 24 attempts and finished with a 77.1 percentage, second best in club history. His 68.2 career field goal percentage is tops in Cowboys history. The Mexican-born sidewinder converted 20-of-21 chances inside the 40 to raise his career mark in that range to a phenominal 73-of-84 (86.9 percent). He added three field goals in three attempts in the playoffs to improve his career playoff record to 10-of-11, including the past eight in a row. "I have never seen a kicker so good for so long as he was last year," Tom Landry said. "He had an outstanding year. We just want to keep him happy." Rafael collected a host of postseason honors, including his first trip to the Pro Bowl, All-Pro recognition from Associated Press, the Pro Football Writers Association and the Sporting News, All-NFC honors from United Press International, and Pro Football Weekly's Golden Toe Award as the NFL's top kicker in 1981. Septien entered the '82 season needing 53 points to break Bob Hayes' team record of 456 career points. Drafted by New Orleans in the 10th round in '77, Septien was released during training camp and signed by Los Angeles. A consensus all rookie selection and the NFC's fourth-leading scorer in '77, Septien was beaten out in '78 by Frank Corral and released by the Rams after the final preseason game. The Cowboys immediately signed him (8/30) to replace Efren Herrera, who had been traded to Seattle. The biggest moment of his first Cowboys season came at St. Louis (10/15) when he kicked a 47-yarder into the wind 3:28 into overtime for a 24-21 victory. Rafael was the NFC's third-leading scorer in '79 when he won two games with dramatic kicks. a 22-yarder off the left upright with 1:16 left to beat St. Louis 22-21 (9/2) and a 22-yarder with three seconds remaining to top the Giants 16-14 (11/4). He was the NFC's fifth-leading scorer in '80, including a club-record 59 extra points. GAMES: 1977 (14-L.A.), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 79 (14-L.A.).

COLLEGE: Septien received All-Southland Conference honors his final two seasons at Southwest Louisiana. He kicked nine field goals of more than 50 yards, including a 50-yarder on his first attempt. His long was 57 yards against Lamar in '74.

PERSONAL: Jose Rafael Septien Michel (rah-fay-EL sep-tee-EN),

"He's a great competitor. He's strong and he's got a lot of quickness about him." Said offensive line coach Jim Myers before the injury, "He could make All-Pro." After

a slow start his rookie year, Shaw reported to '80 training camp 20 pounds heavier and with a ton of resolve. Without doubt he was the most improved player in camp. "He improved his size and strength, and he has great mental characteristics with his desire and aggressiveness," Jim Myers said. Injuries to veteran starter John Fitzgerald later in the season opened the way for Shaw, who started five games in '80, including the three playoff games. Following the NFC Wild Card playoff victory over Los Angeles (12/28), in which Shaw earned a coaches' game ball, Tom Landry said, "Shaw played as fine a game as I've seen a lineman play for us. He did a great job on Hacksaw Reynolds." Shaw was the first center ever drafted in the first round by the Cowboys and the first offensive lineman drafted No. 1 since guard John Niland in 1966. As a rookie he played on special teams and started one game at center, against Houston (11/22) when Fitzgerald was injured. GAMES: 1979 (16), 1980 (14), 1981 (3). Total — 33.

COLLEGE: Considered Tennessee's fiercest tackler in 1980, Spradlin led the Volunteers in total tackles that season with 125. He was second on the squad in 1979 with 102. Spradlin improved steadily after winning a starting outside linebacker spot late in his sophomore season. He was named AP's defensive player of the week in 1980 for his 12-tackle performance against Vanderbilt.

PRO: For the past two years Ron Springs has won the starting fullback job with a solid training camp performance. The difference in 1981 was Springs held the position all season and was

a major contributor. He combined for 984 yards rushing and receiving scored a team-high 12 touchdowns and tied Tony Hill for the club lead in receptions with 46, one short of Preston Pearson's Cowboys record for a running back. Ron's 11 receptions at New England (9/21) was a team record for running backs. He combined for more than 100 yards rushing and receiving in three games, New England (134), Miami (10/25, 102) and Washington (11/22, 107). He caught a 32-yard touchdown pass late in the fourth quarter for the winning score in the dramatic 28-27 comeback victory over the Dolphins. "Ron's a tough, hard-nosed, slashing-type runner," Tom Landry says. "He has a knack for hitting the hole and is a strong, powerful runner. He has good speed and catches the ball well." Springs sparkled as a rookie after being only the 167th player chosen in the 1979 draft. He filled in exceptionally well for Tony Dorsett at tailback in three victories when Dorsett was ailing. In the season opener at St. Louis (9/2) Ron threw a 30-yard fourth-quarter touchdown pass to Tony Hill on his first NFL attempt. Springs took over for Dorsett late in the first half at Philadelphia (12/8) and rushed for 49 yards in the second half as the Cowboys clinched a playoff berth. Then in the dramatic comeback victory over Washington (12/16) that won the NFC East championship Springs rushed for 79 yards and one TD, and caught six passes for 58 yards, including a 26-yard TD late in the fourth quarter. Springs added 10 pounds and was shifted to fullback in 1980. He won the starting job in training camp from Robert Newhouse but twisted an ankle in the third game against Tampa Bay (9/21) and didn't regain the position from Newhouse until the following season. Ron led the team in kickoff returns in '79. GAMES: 1979 (16), 1980 (15), 1981 (16). Total - 47.

With Jones on a one-year sabbatical, Thornton finished second to Martin in quarterback traps as a rookie with six, rushing from Too Tall's strong (or left) end position. Thornton's top effort came against Chicago (9/16) when he had two QB traps, batted down a pass and blocked an extra point attempt. Two weeks later against Cincinnati (9/30) Thornton intercepted a pass caused by Martin's pressure on QB Jack Thompson. The return of Jones to left end in 1980 reduced Thornton's role, but he came up with three QB traps plus the only one of L.A.'s Vince Ferragamo in the NFC Wild Card Game (12/28). Thornton did not have any traps last season. GAMES: 1979 (16), 1980 (13), 1981 (12). Total — 41.

COLLEGE: Thornton led the Big Ten in quarterback traps in 1977 with 10, but was moved to a backup role his senior year when Illinois went with a youth movement. PRO: For a guy once considered too small and too slow to be worth a high draft choice, Dennis Thurman shouldn't be doing what he's doing, which is performing like an All-Pro. But Dennis Thurman

has defied the odds all his life. A reserve cornerback his first two seasons, Thurman in 1980 became the starting free safety, his position in college, following Cliff Harris' retirement and an injury to Randy Hughes. Last season Dennis was moved to right cornerback and he turned in one of the finest seasons ever by a Cowboys defensive back with nine interceptions, third highest season total in team history and tied for third best in the NFL in 1981. He was named second-team All-NFC by UPI. "The biggest surprise other than Everson Walls last year

was Dennis Thurman." Tom Landry says, "Nobody expected him to play as well as he did after moving over from free safety. But Dennis was beat very little and made a lot of big plays." Thurman tied a club record with three interceptions in the victory over Philadelphia (12/13) which clinched the NFC East championship. He picked off two in a one-point victory over Miami (10/25) and his 96-yard interception return, second longest in Cowboys history, to the four was a key play in the season-opening triumph at Washington (9/6). Dennis also had two interceptions in the playoff victory over Tampa Bay (1/2) to raise his career playoff total to three (one against L.A. in '79). Thurman's 187 yards in interception returns last year was second best in team history to Cornell Green's 211 in 1963. After only four seasons Dennis already was No. 9 on the Cowboys' all-time interception list and his 19.8 yards per return was second highest average in club history to Mike Gaechter's 20.0. Thurman's top moment in 1980, when he co-led the team in interceptions with Charlie Waters with five and finished second to Bob Breunig in tackles with a career-high 101, was his 78-yard interception return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter of a narrow victory at St. Louis (11/2). Dennis excelled on special teams his rookie year, including recovery of an on-sides kick that led to Dallas' final TD in Super Bowl XIII. He was voted the team's top special teams performer in the '78 playoffs by the media. He served as special teams captain in 1980. Thurman is a confident and intelligent performer who was ready to assume the leadership role in the defensive secondary vacated by Waters' retirement this year. GAMES: 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total — 64.

COLLEGE: Thurman led the nation in interception return yardage in 1976 with 180 yards on eight steals. He had 13 career interceptions, six pass breakups, seven fumble recoveries and was a two-time consensus All-America safety.

PERSONAL: Dennis Lee Thurman was a football, basketball and baseball star at Santa Monica High School in his native Los Angeles. He was recruited by major league baseball teams and college basketball programs before accepting a college football scholarship. He obtained his degree from USC in journalism.

PRO: If someone made up this story, it would be called preposterous. The local kid, raised two miles from the Cowboys' practice field, is tabbed a step slow to play NFL cornerback even though he

he signs as a free agent with his hometown Cowboys. He intercepts three passes, recovers a fumble and scores a touchdown with a blocked punt in preseason to win a roster spot. He continues to intercept passes and earns the starting left cornerback position by the fifth game. He finished with a team-record and NFL-leading 11 interceptions, breaking Mel Renfro's club mark and becoming the first rookie since Detroit's Lem Barney in 1967 to lead the NFL. He steals two more passes and recovers a fumble in the NFC Championship Game (1/10). He becomes only the sixth free agent rookie to make the Pro Bowl (1/31) where, naturally, he picks off two passes. This story, believe it or not, is true, the story of Everson "Cubby" Walls. "He was our biggest surprise last year and he can only get better," Tom Landry says. "He's got a great knack for intercepting the ball. He's got a great ability to play the ball, which is what a defensive back has to have." Because of his knack for defending the pass, Walls' tackling ability is often overlooked. He was second to free safety Michael Downs in solo tackles last year with 65 and fourth in overall tackles with 83. "He has a strong positive mental attitude," says Dennis Thurman. "No matter what happens, he doesn't give up. There has to be a positiveness inside that burns for him to excel. He also has ice water in his veins." Walls was named to the Pro Football Writers Association and United Press International all-rookie teams, GAMES: 1981 (16).

COLLEGE: Walls led the nation in 1980 with a Grambling-record 11 interceptions for 140 yards in 11 games. He was named first-team All-Southwestern Athletic Conference. In his junior year he picked off four passes for 91 yards and one touchdown.

PERSONAL: Dallas native Everson Collins Walls was a football, basketball and track star for Richardson Berkner High School. He earned a degree in accounting from Grambling. Danny White ★ 11

PRO: How far has Danny White's career progressed? It's reached the point where Danny White is known as the Cowboys' quarterback and Roger Staubach is known as a sportscaster and

Rolaids salesman. That state of affairs has been only two years in the making. In 1980 White proved he could keep the Cowboys winning despite the retirement of Staubach. In 1981 Danny estab-lished himself as one of the NFL's best quarterbacks. He led the NFC in passing much of the season before finishing second to San Francisco's Joe Montana. He improved his rating from 80.8 in 1980 to 87.5 while reducing his interceptions from a club-record-tying 25 to 13. And he led the Cowboys to the NFC Championship Game for the second straight year. "Danny's an excellent quarterback." Tom Landry says. "His knowledge of the game is unsurpassed by any quarterback we've had. He has such great poise and such a solid grasp of what's going on out there, the kind of thing you can't teach. He has a great feel for the game. He's just a winner." In two seasons as a starter, White has directed a powerful offense that has contributed to consecutive 12-4 seasons. Danny's 28 touchdown passes in 1980 broke Staubach's 1979 team record by one. White's 59.6 percent completion rate in '80 was third best in club history. He has directed three dramatic comeback victories in two seasons. In 1980 he tossed a 28-yard fourth-down TD pass to Tony Hill with 45 seconds left to beat St. Louis 27-24 (11/2). and in the playoffs he threw two TD passes to Drew Pearson, the winner with 42 seconds remaining, to overcome Atlanta 30-27 (1/4). Last year White completed two touchdown passes in the final four minutes to rally Dallas to a 28-27 triumph over Miami (10/25). Although he's 570 attempts from qualifying, Danny's 81.5 career rating would place him fifth in the NFL's all-time passer ratings. Drafted in 1974 with a choice obtained from Houston for Tody Smith and Billy Parks (the same trade which yielded Ed Jones), White joined the Cowboys in 1976 after two years with the World Football League's Memphis Southmen. He completed 183-of-350 passes (52.3 percent) for 2,635 yards and 21 touchdowns for Memphis. Danny has been the Cowboys' punter since 1976. GAMES: 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (16), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 92.

COLLEGE: White set seven NCAA passing records in leading ASU to a three-year record of 32-4. Also a fine runner, he finished second in the nation in total offense in 1973. Danny played the infield for ASU's outstanding baseball team and was drafted by four major league teams — Cleveland, New York Mets, Oakland and Houston. Both Danny and his father, Wilford "Whizzer" White, a former ASU All-America half-back who played for the Chicago Bears in 1951 and '52, are in the Arizona State Sports Hall of Fame.

PERSONAL: Wilford Daniel White is a native of Mesa, Ariz., a suburb of Phoenix. Danny has worked in the oil and gas and real estate businesses and is now a partner in White & Wheeler Enterprises, which is involved in management training programs and other investments. Danny is chairman of the March of Dimes Superwalk and the Danny White/Boy Scouts of America Celebrity Golf Tournament in Dallas. He was named a 1982 Dallas Father of the Year. Among Danny's hobbies is playing the piano, for which he took lessons for eight years as a child. Danny, wife Jo Lynn and their three children — Ryan (4/26/73), Geoffrey (1/4/76) and Heather (9/3/78) — live in Wylie, Texas.

DEFENSIVE TACKLE MARYLAND Sth YEAR HT: 6-4 WT: 260 BORN: 1/15/53 D-1A FOR '75

PRO: Bob Lilly, the first home-grown Cowboy voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, was known as "Mr. Cowboy" during his All-Pro career at right defensive tackle. It might be appropriate

to start calling Randy White "Mr. Cowboy, Jr.," for White, now at the height of his own All-Pro career at right defensive tackle, is destined to join Lilly in the Hall of Fame. "Randy White is the premiere defensive tackle in the business," says Tom Landry, who does not use superlatives frequently. "He's got such great intensity and competitiveness. We've never had a player and I've never seen a player, other than probably Ernie Stautner, who could match Randy's intensity from game to game. When Randy White lines up on you, he doesn't care whether you're All-Pro or whether you're a rookie. You're going to get the same treatment. That makes him unique in this game." The Cowboys' strongest player (he can bench-press 480 pounds), the one dubbed "Manster" (half man, half monster) by former teammate Charlie Waters, White immediately became one of the NFL's top defensive players in 1977 upon taking over the starting right tackle position following two seasons as a backup middle linebacker. Despite being consistently double-teamed, Randy has been named All-Pro the past four seasons (1978-81) and to the Pro Bowl the past five (1977-81). In 1977 Randy capped his first season as a starter with an outstanding performance in Super Bowl XII, earning the game's co-MVP award with Harvey Martin. In '78 White succeeded Martin as the Seagram's Seven Crowns of Sport defensive lineman of the year and also was voted NFC defensive player of the year by United Press International and the Kansas City Committee of 101. In '81 Randy was named International Harvestor lineman of the year. "His performances range anywhere from spectacular to spectacular," Landry says. "The guy is phenomenal. He just doesn't have any bad games." Adds Philadelphia guard Petey Perot, "The thing about Randy is his quickness. He's got huge upper body strength, but it's his quickness that beats you." White tied Martin for the club lead in OB traps in '78 with a career high 16. He had 12 traps in '77, five in '79, including a career-best three in a game against St. Louis (10/21), 61/2 in '80 and 81/2 in '81. Randy got his first career interception in last season's NFC Championship Game against San Francisco (1/10). GAMES: 1975 (14), 1976 (14), 1977 (14), 1978 (16), 1979 (15), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total - 105.

COLLEGE: A consensus All-America at defensive end in 1974, White won the Outland Trophy and Vince Lombardi Award as college football's top lineman that year. He was the second player selected in the 1975 draft with a choice obtained from the New York Giants for Craig Morton.

PERSONAL: Randy Lee White lives in Dallas but also owns a 22acre farm in Landenberg, Pa., near his hometown of Wilmington, Del. Randy enjoys hunting and fishing in his spare time. He and wife Vicci, a model, have a daughter, Jordan Leigh (5/6/79). Randy received the 1980 Field Scovell Award for athletic excellence from the Dallas All-Sports Association. He is an active supporter of the Association of Blind Athletes and the United Way.

PRO: When injuries and retirements created a shortage in the defensive secondary two years ago, the Cowboys asked Steve Wilson, one of their better athletes, to play cornerback. Without complaint,

Steve moved to defense and contributed more than could have been expected, considering his lack of experience at the position. Now, with the development of young defensive backs like Everson Walls, Michael Downs and Ron Fellows plus the first-round drafting of cornerback Rod Hill, Wilson has been moved back to wideout this year. "Steve's a fine athlete who has good fundamentals and is very coachable," Tom Landry says. "We appreciate the effort he made for us on defense, but now we're going to let him go back to wide receiver because he surely was a good prospect there." Wilson nearly got away from the Cowboys in 1979 after signing as a free agent wide receiver. He was released near the end of training camp, but was recalled when Butch Johnson broke a finger in the final preseason game. Steve led the Cowboys in punt returns that year and also excelled on the other special teams. In 1980 he started 11 games at left cornerback while receiving on-the-job training. Steve intercepted four passes plus two in the playoffs and he led the team in passes defensed with 41. In the second half of a victory at Green Bay (9/28) Wilson made a key tackle on fourth-and-one deep in Dallas territory, then set up the Cowboys' final TD with a diving interception. His two interceptions in a key victory over San Diego (10/26) earned him co-MVP honors with Danny White. Last year Wilson started the first four games at left corner before the amazing Everson Walls took over. Steve intercepted a pass in the season-opening triumph at Washington (9/6) and

another against Chicago (11/26). GAMES: 1979 (16), 1980 (16), 1981 (16). Total — 48.

COLLEGE: Wilson finished his four-year Howard career as the Washington, D.C., school's all-time leading receiver and kick returner. Steve caught 94 passes for 1,339 yards and 12 TDs, all Howard records. He earned All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference honors in 1978.

PERSONAL: Steven Anthony Wilson, born in Los Angeles and raised in Durham, N.C., is the son of "Touchdown" Tommy Wilson, a two-time Pro Bowl running back with the Rams (1956-61). In 1956 Tom Wilson rushed for 223 yards against Green Bay, the Rams' singlegame record until '71. He also played for the Browns and Vikings. Steve, who has a degree in marketing, works in the offseason for Ryder Truck Rental in Dallas. Steve and wife Cathy live in Richardson, Texas.


PRO: Nobody could have liked Steve Wright's chances of winning a spot with the Dallas Cowboys last summer. Wright was a free agent rookie offensive tackle candidate. The Cowboys already were

abundantly stocked with veteran offensive linemen, plus their No. 1 and No. 3 draft choices were offensive linemen. But the Cowboys always try to find room for good football players and Steve Wright showed the long-range potential of a keeper. He's an excellent all-around athlete with good size and mobility. Wright contributed on special teams in 16 games while learning the offensive tackle position. GAMES: 1981 (16).

COLLEGE: Wright played offensive tackle his first three years at Northern Iowa before moving to tight end his senior season. He caught eight passes for 73 yards and one touchdown.

PERSONAL: Stephen Hough Wright is a native of Wayzata, Minn. He starred in football, basketball, track and hockey at Wayzata High School. Steve was a high school All-America in the shot put and discus.

Cornerback-Kick Returner Kentucky State ROD HILL Wt: 185 Ht: 6-0 Born: 3/4/59 D-1

The Cowboys made a little-known speedster from little Kentucky State (enrollment 2,300) their top selection in the 1982 draft. Rod Hill. the first defensive back chosen in the draft, brings a wealth of athletic ability to an area of the team Coach Tom Landry was hoping to strengthen.

'He'll need some time to develop because he comes from a small school and didn't play against the top competition, but he has the qualities that in the long run could make him a great player." Landry said. "He's big enough, intelligent, a good athlete and he can fly. He was by far the most impressive looking guy left in the draft."

The 25th player selected overall and the first Kentucky State player ever taken in the first round, Hill was a nationally ranked kick return specialist at Kentucky State in addition to intercepting eight passes for 213 yards and a touchdown in his career. His career punt return average was a school-record 23.6 yards (50 for 1,182 yards).

A native of Detroit (Martin Luther King High School), Hill began his college career as a wide receiver at the University of Iowa. He transferred to Kentucky State in Frankfort after one semester. He remained a receiver for his first season there before switching to cornerback in his sophomore year.

Following the switch in 1979, Hill became an immediate sensation for the Thorobreds. He intercepted a team-leading five passes for 115 vards and led the NAIA (second in NCAA Division II) in punt returns with a 21.7-yard average on 25 returns. In a victory over Morris Brown he returned a punt 77 yards for a touchdown and intercepted two passes, one for a 57-yard score. He returned a punt 87 yards for a touchdown that season in a loss to Central State.

In 1980 Hill intercepted a team-leading two passes for 72 yards and led the NCAA Division II and the NAIA in punt returns with an astounding 31.8-yard average on 18 returns. Last year he missed three games at mid-season with a sprained ankle but finished third among NCAA Division II kickoff returners with a 30.1-yard average on nine returns. He also intercepted one pass for 26 yards.

Hill was an NAIA Honorable Mention All-America in 1979, an NAIA second team All-America and AP honorable mention Little All-America in 1980, and a Sporting News honorable mention All-America in 1981. He also played in the Olympia Gold Bowl all-star game in San Diego

following last season. Hill was only the second defensive back ever drafted in the first round by Dallas (Aaron Kyle in 1976).

Hill comes from a Detroit family of seven children. He has four sisters and two brothers. Rod majored in business administration with a minor in computer science.

JEFF ROHRER Linebacker Yale Ht: 6-3 Wt: 224 Born: 12/23/57 D-2

The Cowboys wasted little time in springing another surprise on draft day when they chose Yale linebacker Jeff Rohrer in the second round. Rohrer was the highest NFL draft choice from Yale since 1969 when the Cowboys made halfback Calvin Hill a stunning first-round selection.

The mystery behind Rohrer lay in his running speed, which was measured by NFL scouts in the spring of 1981 at a less-than-spectacular 4.9 seconds for 40 yards. But following a post-season recommendation by the Yale coaching staff, the Cowboys timed Rohrer repeatedly at an impressive 4.6 or less.

The other ingredients of a top pro linebacker already were there. Exceptionally aggressive and intelligent, Rohrer was selected in 1981 to the Coaches All-lvy League and the Coaches All-New England first teams after leading lvy co-champ Yale in tackles with a school-record 136 stops (71 solo, 65 assists). He had two 20-tackle games, four tackles for losses, one sack, one interception and two fumbles caused.

Rohrer finished as Yale's second leading tackler in 1980 with 110 stops (54 solos, 56 assists) and was well on his way to breaking the school tackle record and earning All-lvy honors when he broke an ankle and missed the final three games. Rohrer compiled three straight 20tackle games before the injury, had eight tackles for losses, two sacks and two fumbles caused in helping the Bulldogs toward the lvy League title. The injury was partly responsible for Rohrer's time in the 40 a few months later.

Rohrer played inside linebacker at Yale but was moved to the outside by the Cowboys. Rohrer was a backup defensive end in 1978, his sophomore year. He did not attend school in 1979.

"We had Jeff rated extremely high," Gil Brandt said. "We think he's an excellent football player. He's got excellent potential. He's everything you want in a linebacker — smart, strong, a competitor and he's got speed. There's no question in our mind about his speed."

Rohrer was a National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Scholar Athlete at Mira Costa High School in his native Manhattan Beach, Calif. He majored in administrative sciences at Yale.

JIM ELIOPULOS • Linebacker • Wyoming HT: 6-2 • WT: 229 • BORN: 4/18/59 • D-3

After playing several different positions, including tight end, Jim Eliopulos found a home at linebacker in his junior year. A year later, this gifted and dedicated athlete earned first team All-Western Athletic Conference and AP honorable mention All-America honors.

A transfer from Westminster College in Salt Lake City, Eliopulos

caused two fumbles, intercepted two passes, sacked opposing quarterbacks four times and made 83 tackles during his fine junior season.

In 1981 Eliopulos led the Cowboys with 84 tackles, had 10 quarterback sacks, two interceptions and three fumble recoveries. His best game came against Colorado State when he had 10 tackles, an interception, and six sacks for 54 yards in losses, earning Eliopulos WAC player of the week honors.

"Eliopulos is in the same mold as Rohrer in that he's got excellent raw potential as an outside linebacker," Gil Brandt said. "He's an outstanding all-around athlete who's only played linebacker for two years." Eliopulos was named Wyoming's high school athlete of the year

Eliopulos was named Wyoming's high school athlete of the year as a senior after starring in football, basketball, baseball and track at Cheyenne Central. His college major was physical education.

BRIAN CARPENTER • Cornerback • Michigan Ht: 5-10 • Wt: 166 • Born: 11/27/60 • D-4A

Brian Carpenter was considered Michigan's best man-to-man pass defender the past two seasons when he was a starting cornerback. He had six career interceptions, but all came at opportune moments, including one at Michigan's eight-yard line during the Wolverines' 1981 Rose Bowl victory over Washington.

Carpenter shared the club lead in interceptions in 1980 with five, including two in a victory over Indiana. Two others came inside Michigan's 10-yard line. He was an honorable mention All-Big 10 selection after the season.

In 1981 Carpenter missed three games with an ankle injury but still earned second team All-Big 10 honors and was chosen for the East-West and Olympia Gold Bowl all-star games. His one interception last year came against Ohio State.

Carpenter, who also returned 16 punts for a 7.7-yard average in his career, was a four-year letterman who played on two Big 10 championship teams (1978, '80) and started in the Rose and Bluebonnet Bowls.

A native of Flint, Mich., Carpenter was enrolled in Michigan's School of Education.

MONTY HUNTER • Safety • Salem College (W. Va.) Ht: 6-0 • Wt: 201 • Born: 1/21/59 • D-4B

A dominant player at tiny Salem College (enrollment 1,000), strong safety candidate Monty Hunter intercepted a school-record 19 passes in four years as a starting cornerback.

In 1981 Hunter earned All-West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference and honorable mention Little All-America honors after leading Salem in interceptions with five and finishing second in tackles with 76. He also returned a kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown against West Virginia Wesleyan.

In 1980 Hunter intercepted a club-leading seven passes and was named second team All-WVIAC. "He was the best player and athlete in the conference the past two years," Salem Coach Larry Blackstone said. "He's a super physical specimen. He's very strong and he's an aggressive hitter." Hunter was a running back at Dover High School in Dover, Ohio. He studied industrial technology and industrial safety at Salem.

PHIL POZDERAC Tackle Notre Dame Ht: 6-8 Wt: 260 Born: 12/19/59 D-5

Phil Pozderac was chosen by his teammates as Notre Dame's offensive most valuable player in 1981. Pozderac started 23 consecutive games at right tackle as a junior and senior.

Pozderac won AP honorable mention All-America honors last year and he drew favorable notices in the 1982 East-West Shrine Game and the Japan Bowl. He also was selected to play in the Olympia Gold Bowl in San Diego.

Already regarded as an expert straight-ahead blocker, Pozderac served his apprenticeship as a freshman and sophomore behind All-America Tim Foley. Pozderac filled out to his present size after entering Notre Dame carrying only 220 pounds on his 6-8 frame.

Pozderac starred in football and basketball at Garfield Heights, Ohio, High School. He was born in Cleveland. Phil majored in finance in Notre Dame's College of Business Administration.

KEN HAMMOND • Guard • Vanderbilt

Ht: 6-4 • Wt: 270 • Born: 12/7/59 • D-6A

When Vanderbilt needed crucial short yardage the past two seasons, the play usually was designed to take advantage of Ken Hammond's powerful one-on-one blocking skills.

A second team All-Southeastern Conference and honorable mention All-America choice by AP after his junior season, Hammond was a consensus All-SEC choice and honorable mention All-America pick in 1981 despite missing the first two games with a stress fracture in his right foot. He played in the East-West Shrine, Blue-Gray and Senior Bowl all-star games following the season.

Hammond played defensive tackle his freshman year, making 30 tackles and recovering two fumbles. He switched to offensive guard his sophomore year and immediately earned a starting position. As a junior he finished second to Georgia's Nat Hudson for the SEC's Jacobs Blocking Trophy. Ken can play guard or tackle.

The Valley Head, Ala., native earned all-area, all-state and honorable mention high school All-America honors his senior year at Valley Head High. He majored in history.

CHARLES DAUM • Defensive Lineman • Cal Poly-SLO Ht: 6-6 • Wt: 241 • Born: 11/3/59 • D-6B

Reversing their normal practice, the Cowboys switched Charles Daum from offensive tackle to defensive lineman because of his quickness and aggressive temperament.

Daum, a two-year starter, was the only California Collegiate Athletic Association player selected to the American Football Coaches Association Kodak College Division All-America first team last year.

Charles and brother Mike, Miami's 1981 seventh-round draft choice

who later signed with Washington, anchored the offensive line for Cal-Poly-SLO's 1980 NCAA Division II national championship team.

Born in Kenosha, Wisc., and raised in Twentynine Palms, Calif., Daum was a two-way lineman at Twentynine Palms High School where he also lettered in basketball and track. Charles was a speech communications major. An avid guitar player, Daum and two college teammates comprised a band called "The PhIgms."

BILL PURIFOY • Defensive Lineman • Tulsa Ht: 6-7 • Wt: 249 • Born: 11/15/59 • D-7

Bill Purifoy used his exceptional size and mobility to fashion a fine career at Tulsa, capping it with appearances in the 1982 Blue-Gray Game and Senior Bowl. He had two pass deflections in the Blue-Gray Game.

A three-year starter, Purifoy took the 1980 school year off and returned to his hometown of Pittsburgh, Pa., to work as a fireman. Last season he assumed a leadership role on the Tulsa football squad after being named a co-captain. Bill had his best game against Kansas with nine tackles, three quarterback traps and a blocked punt. In a 1979 game against Louisville he made 15 tackles, including 11 solo stops. He played both defensive tackle and end.

Purifoy transferred to Tulsa from New Mexico Military Academy. He studied criminal justice. He was an all-conference and all-state lineman at Steel Valley High School in Pittsburgh.

GEORGE PEOPLES • Fullback • Auburn Ht: 6-0 • Wt: 211 • Born: 8/25/61 • D-8A

George Peoples' outstanding blocking ability made him a valuable asset last season when Auburn went to the wishbone offense under new coach Pat Dye.

A two-year starter, Peoples rushed for 442 yards on 104 carries (4.2-yard average) in 1981, including a 63-yard touchdown run against Alabama on national television. Peoples capped his career with an appearance in the Senior Bowl.

Peoples was Auburn's second-leading ground gainer in 1980 with 443 yards on 96 carries (5.6 average). He rushed for 1,085 yards and three touchdowns on 239 carries in his career. Peoples comes from a program rich in recent running back tradition. He followed current NFL runners George Andrews (Atlanta), Joe Cribbs (Buffalo) and James Brooks (San Diego) at Auburn.

George was an education major. He is from Tampa, Fla., where he attended C. Leon Knight High School.

DWIGHT SULLIVAN • Fullback • North Carolina State Ht: 6-0 • Wt: 205 • Born: 4/24/59 • D-8B

After missing most of the 1980 season with an ankle injury and receiving an extra year of eligibility, Dwight Sullivan assumed a different role last season in North Carolina State's new "I" running attack — that of blocking back.

Sullivan, in addition to rushing for 334 yards on 56 carries (6.0 average), helped clear the way for freshman sensation Joe McIntosh, who led the Atlantic Coast Conference in rushing with 1,190 yards. In 1979, operating out of the veer, Sullivan led Wolfpack rushers with 665 yards and six touchdowns on 150 carries (4.4 average). He caught 10 passes for 51 yards. Dwight also ran track at N.C. State.

The Durham, N.C., native (Hillside High School) majored in speech and communications.

JOE GARY • Defensive Lineman • UCLA Ht: 6-5 • Wt: 273 • Born: 5/13/59 • D-9


Joe Gary, a 1981 fifth-year senior who was red-shirted in 1977 to gain experience, shared starting duties the past three seasons, mostly at defensive tackle. He possesses the size, strength and quickness that attracts the attention of pro scouts.

Gary intercepted a pass in a victory over Ohio State his junior year. He made three tackles and picked off a pass in the final minutes of a win over Arizona State last year. In his career he had 11 tackles for losses and five quarterback sacks.

Gary was a two-way football star at Washington High School in his hometown of Los Angeles. He also starred in track, winning the 1977 city shot put title and the 1976 discus crown. He studied history at UCLA.

TODD ECKERSONTackleNorth Carolina StateHt: 6-4Wt: 263Born: 1/24/60D-10

An explosive, powerful blocker who plays with exceptional enthusiasm, Todd Eckerson won a starting tackle berth his sophomore season.



Midway through the season, however, he broke his leg and was sidelined for the year.

Eckerson returned to top form by the middle of his junior year. Cowboys scouts were impressed with his athletic ability, especially his quickness. "He's the kind of player who can dominate you on the line of scrimmage," says Dick Kupec, N.C. State's offensive line coach.

Eckerson was a football, wrestling and track standout at North Valley Regional High School in Old Tappan, N.J. He majored in recreation resources administration.

GEORGE THOMPSON • Wide Receiver • Albany State (Georgia) Ht: 6-3 • Wt: 209 • Born: 3/12/59 • D-11A

George Thompson caught 60 passes for 885 yards and four touchdowns in three seasons at Albany State. His best year was in 1981 when he caught 30 balls for 480 yards, including a 76-yard touchdown reception.

Thompson was a two-time All-Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference selection. He led Albany State in receiving last year and also in his sophomore year when he caught 25 passes for 327 yards and three touchdowns. Thompson's size enabled him to play some tight end and wingback.

Thompson's hometown is St. Petersburg, Fla., where he attended Dixie Hollins High School. He was a health and physical education major.

MICHAEL WHITING • Fullback • Florida State Ht: 6-1 • Wt: 210 • Born: 1/11/60 • D-11B

Considered an underrated player throughout his college career, Michael Whiting was a consistently fine rusher, receiver and blocker for the Seminoles the past three seasons.

Whiting finished his career with 1,485 yards and 12 touchdowns rushing on 355 carries (4.1-yard average) plus 74 receptions for 575 yards and two touchdowns.

A two-year starter at fullback, Whiting gained 461 yards on 111 carries and caught 29 passes for 211 yards in 1981. He rushed for 500 yards on 133 carries and caught 25 passes for 203 yards his junior year. He had two career 100-yard rushing games plus a 90-yard effort versus Ohio State.

Whiting is a native of Largo, Fla., where he attended Largo High School.

RICH BURTNESS • Offensive Lineman • Montana Ht: 6-4 • Wt: 257 • Born: 6/25/60 • D-12

A versatile athlete, Rich Burtness played fullback, tight end and offensive tackle at Montana before settling at offensive guard his senior year when he won a starting berth.

Burtness lettered in football, basketball and track at Anacortes High School in Anacortes, Wash. His major was general studies.

Other Cowboys With NFL Experience

- MIKE BARKER, a 6-3, 266-pound defensive tackle (12/3/59), was the New York Giants' 10th-round draft choice last year after a fine career at Grambling. Barker was first-team AP Little All-America, a Football Coaches All-America choice and Sheridan defensive player of the year in 1981. He had 10 QB traps as a junior and 14¹/₂ his senior year.
- **STEVE DURHAM,** a 6-5, 260-pound defensive end (10/11/58) from Clemson, was drafted in the sixth round by the Seattle Seahawks in 1981. He was a first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference pick as a junior and capped his career with appearances in the Blue-Gray and Hula Bowl all-star games. He had 18 career QB traps.
- **DON SMEREK** is a 6-7, 256-pound defensive tackle (12/20/57) who made the Cowboys' active roster last year but suffered a knee injury in the second game and spent the rest of the season on injured reserve. Smerek signed with the Cowboys in 1980 as a free agent rookie from the University of Nevada-Reno, but spent the season on injured reserve with fractured ribs. Smerek was named All-Big Sky at defensive tackle his senior year at Nevada-Reno.
- **RON SPEARS,** a 6-6, 252-pound defensive end (11/23/59) signed with the Cowboys last year as a free agent rookie out of San Diego State where he played outside linebacker. Spears made an impressive showing in training camp but injured a foot and spent the season on injured reserve. He became a starting linebacker at San Diego State late in his junior year after transferring from East Los Angeles Junior College.
- NORM WELLS is a 6-5, 261-pound guard (9/8/57) and the Cowboys' 1980 12th-round draft choice out of Northwestern. Wells suffered a knee injury in the third game of 1980 and missed the rest of the season. The injury also kept him on injured reserve all last year. Wells played defensive tackle at Northwestern.
- **BRAD WRIGHT**, a 6-2, 209-pound quarterback (5/15/59), was a fourthround draft choice of the Miami Dolphins in 1981 after producing 39 touchdowns and 4,204 yards of total offense in 22 games of an injury-marred career at the University of New Mexico. In his career he completed 237 passes in 464 attempts (51.1 percent) for 3,364 yards and 20 touchdowns, and he rushed for 840 yards on 305 carries and scored 19 TDs. He is a native of Midland, Texas.



### **NFC Divisional Playoff**

DALLAS, Jan. 2 — Led by their best defensive showing of the season, the NFC East champion Cowboys advanced to their ninth NFC Championship Game in 12 years by blanking NFC Central champ Tampa Bay 38-0 at Texas Stadium.

The margin of victory tied an NFC Divisional playoff record set by the Cowboys with their 52-14 win over Cleveland in 1967. It was Dallas' first shutout victory since a 28-0 rout of Los Angeles for the 1978 NFC title game.

The Cowboys' defense dominated the contest, sacking Bucs' quarterback Doug Williams four times and intercepting four of his passes, two by Dennis Thurman.

Tony Dorsett rushed for 86 yards on 16 carries and caught four passes for 48 yards. Danny White completed 15-of-26 passes for 143 yards, including a nine-yard touchdown pass to Tony Hill in the first quarter.

Dallas led 10-0 at the half, then broke open the game with three touchdowns in the third quarter on a one-yard run by Ron Springs and five-yard runs by Tony Dorsett and James Jones.

The Cowboys outgained Tampa Bay 345 yards to 222 and ran 73 plays to the Bucs' 55. The victory ran the Cowboys' Texas Stadium winning streak to 18.

### NFC Championship Game

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 10 - For the second year in a row the Cowboys saw their quest for a record sixth Super Bowl berth stopped one victory shy of the goal. And this time the ending was especially frustrating, San Francisco capturing the conference title with a touchdown in the last minute of play.

The Cowboys had taken a 27-21 lead with 10:41 remaining on Danny White's 21-yard scoring pass to Doug Cosbie. Following Everson Walls' second interception and a 26-yard drive. White's punt pinned the 49ers to their 11-yard-line with 4:54 left.

But quarterback Joe Montana continued the unlikely story of the 1981 49ers by driving his team 89 yards in 13 plays to take the lead. The touchdown came on third down from the Dallas six, Montana rolling to his right and lofting a pass in the back of the end zone for a leaping Dwight Clark with 51 seconds to go.

With their final opportunity, the Cowboys moved to the 49ers 44 on White's 31-yard pass to Drew Pearson. But on the next play White's fumble caused by Lawrence Pillers was recovered by Jim Stuckey, ending Dallas' comeback bid.

The lead changed hands six times. The Cowboys came up with six San Francisco turnovers, including two interceptions and a fumble recovery by Walls, but were outgained 393 vards to 250.

# **Historical Highlights**

# 1960

NFL FRANCHISE --- Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during the first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28).

COWBOYS STOCKED — A player pool was set up in a league meeting at L.A., with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13). TRAINING STARTS — Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at Pacific U.,

in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME - The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 10-16 pre-season game to San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME — In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club preseason game, the Cowboys led the world champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 62-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19).

FIRST VICTORY - In a preseason game at Louisville, Ky., the Cowboys beat New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes of 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith) (August 27).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME - In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth-period Steeler rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED --- Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

### 1961

TRAINING STARTS - Rookies launch training at new campsite - St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN - Scoring ten points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 (Sept. 17).

### 1962

TRAINING STARTS - Team begins training at new campsite - Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13),

PENALTY HISTORY --- For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were detected holding in the end zone on a 99 TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

100-YARD FIRSTS — Cowboys Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth-quarter TDs in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).

**SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY** — The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

**CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE** — The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

**HOWTON SETS RECORD** — Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's all-time receiving mark with a 14-yard catch against Washington (there). Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

#### 1964

**LANDRY CONTRACT** — With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a ten-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

#### 1965

**FIRST SELLOUT** — An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

#### 1966

**PLAYOFF BOWL** — After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15).

**MERGER** — Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys GM Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, merging the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

SCHRAMM ELEVATED — Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

**NEELY CASE SOLVED** — Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth place picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17). **THE CHAMPIONSHIP** — The Cowboys won their first championship, capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

#### 1967

**TEXAS STADIUM** — On Dec. 23, owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000.

SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP — Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

#### 1968

**WIN CAPITOL** — For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on December 21st. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.



#### 1969

**TEXAS STADIUM** — Ground was broken for Texas Stadium in suburban Irving on January 25, and on June 29 Bert Rose was named general manager of the stadium.

**ORIGINALS RETIRE** — An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

**REPEAT CAPITOL WINS** — Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl.

1970

FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

**FIRST NFC TITLE** — The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11-year history on Jan. 3 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

#### 1971

**TEXAS STADIUM** — The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving, Tex., home with a 44-21 victory over the New England Patriots on October 24. Duane Thomas scored the first touchdown in the new stadium, a 56-yard run just two minutes and 16 seconds after the opening kickoff. Attendance was 65,708.

SIX STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last seven games to finish 11-3, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the sixth year in a row. They defeated Minnesota, 20-12, in the opening round.

SECOND NFC TITLE — For the second consecutive year, the Cowboys met the San Francisco 49ers in the National Conference showdown. This time Dallas won, 14-3, to qualify for its second straight Super Bowl. FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys downed the Miami Dolphins, 24-3, to win Super Bowl VI in New Orleans on Jan. 16. It was the 10th victory in a row for Dallas as Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

# 1972

**FIRST 1,000-YARD BACK** — Calvin Hill became the first Dallas player to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 111 on Dec. 9 against the Washington Redskins in Texas Stadium. Hill wound up with 1,036 yards for the season on a record 245 carries.

SEVEN STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys qualified for the NFL playoffs a record seventh consecutive year, their 10-4 record earning them the National Conference Wild Card berth. Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns in the last  $1\frac{1}{2}$  minutes to give the Cowboys a 30-28 victory at San Francisco in the first round. Then, at Washington on New Year's Eve, Dallas was foiled in its bid for a third straight NFL title when the Redskins won, 26-3.

#### 1973

**100 VICTORIES** — The Cowboys and Coach Tom Landry recorded their 100th victory with a 40-3 Texas Stadium win over the New Orleans Saints on Sept. 24. Landry, the only head coach the Cowboys have had, ended the season with a career mark of 108-80-6 to rank ninth on the list of the NFL's all-time winningest coaches.

**EIGHT STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS** — The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division title with a 10-4 record and broke their own NFL record by reaching the playoffs for the eighth year in a row. Dallas defeated Western Division champion Los Angeles in the first round, 27-16, but fell to Central Division winner Minnesota in the NFC Championship Game, 27-10.

### 1974

**FIRST TOP DRAFT CHOICE** — For the first time in their history, the Cowboys had the very first choice in the NFL college draft. The No. 1 pick came to Dallas from Houston in exchange for Tody Smith and Billy Parks. The Cowboys selected Ed "Too Tall" Jones, a 6-9, 260-pound defensive end from Tennessee State.

**PLAYOFFS MISSED** — The Cowboys' record-breaking string of eight straight years in the NFL playoffs was broken when the club's 8-6 record failed to qualify.

# 1975

LILLY HONORED — "Mr. Cowboy" was honored on Bob Lilly Day at Texas Stadium at halftime of the Philadelphia game on Nov. 23. It was the first such recognition ever given to a Dallas player. Lilly never missed a game in 14 years with the Cowboys, earning All-Pro honors seven times at defensive tackle before retiring prior to the '75 season.

**TEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS** — The Cowboys' 10-4 record earned them the NFC Wild Card berth in the playoffs. The composite record over 10 straight winning seasons was 101-37-2.

THIRD NFC TITLE — After shocking Minnesota in the first round, 17-14 on Roger Staubach's 50-yard "Hail Mary" pass to Drew Pearson, the

Cowboys traveled to Los Angeles for the NFC showdown. Staubach threw four touchdown passes, three to Preston Pearson, and Dallas won, 37-7. Pittsburgh won Super Bowl X on Jan. 18 in Miami, 21-17.

#### 1976

MEREDITH, PERKINS HONORED — Former Cowboys greats Don Meredith and Don Perkins joined Bob Lilly in the "Ring of Honor" at Texas Stadium during halftime ceremonies at the New York Giants game on Nov. 7.

**ELEVEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS** — The Cowboys won the NFC Eastern Division title with their 11-3 record, giving them their 11th straight winning season and 10th playoff berth in that period. A 14-12 first round loss to Los Angeles — the first time Dallas had lost in the first round under the current playoff setup — ended the season.

## 1977

**HOWLEY HONORED** — Former All-Pro linebacker Chuck Howley, a Cowboy from 1961 through 1973, became the fourth member of the Ring of Honor. Howley was honored during ceremonies at halftime of the Detroit Lions game on Oct. 30.

**TWELVE STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS** — Getting off to an 8-0 start, their best ever, the Cowboys rolled to a 12-2 record, the championship of the NFC East, and their 12th consecutive winning season. They opened their 11th visit to the playoffs in those 12 years with a 37-7 first-round victory over the Chicago Bears at Texas Stadium.

**FOURTH NFC TITLE** — Dallas crushed the Minnesota Vikings at Texas Stadium, 23-6, for National Conference crown No. 4 and the right to meet the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XII.

SECOND WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys stopped the Denver Broncos, 27-10, to win Super Bowl XII in New Orleans on January 15, 1978. In the process, Dallas tied Minnesota for most Super Bowl appearances (four) and Green Bay, Miami and Pittsburgh for most Super Bowl victories (two). Defensive linemen Harvey Martin and Randy White were named co-Most Valuable Players in the game.

## 1978

THIRTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — After a mediocre 6-4 start, the Cowboys won six straight games to finish the expanded regular season with a 12-4 record and their 10th division crown. It marked the Cowboys' 13th consecutive winning season and 12th trip to the playoffs in that span. Dallas rallied to beat Atlanta 27-20 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium, sending the Cowboys to their seventh NFC championship game in the past nine years.

FIFTH NFC TITLE — Dallas shut out the Rams in Los Angeles 28-0 in the National Conference title game to advance to the Super Bowl a record fifth time, including three of the last four. In the first Super Bowl rematch, Pittsburgh edged the Cowboys 35-31 for the NFL championship on Jan. 21 in Miami's Orange Bowl.

### 1979

**TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY** — The Cowboys celebrated their 20th anniversary season at halftime of the St. Louis Cardinals game at Texas

Stadium on Oct. 21. Stars from each of those 20 seasons plus Coach Tom Landry were introduced during the halftime ceremonies.

**FOURTH STRAIGHT NFC EAST TITLE** — Rallying from a mid-season slump, the Cowboys won their final three games to finish with an 11-5 record, their 11th division championship, including the past four NFC East titles, and 14th consecutive winning season. The Cowboys made their 13th trip to the playoffs in those 14 years, but were eliminated by Los Angeles 21-19 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium.

### 1980

**STAUBACH RETIRES** — At a press conference at Texas Stadium on March 31, quarterback Roger Staubach announced his retirement after 11 record-breaking years with the Cowboys. Staubach held all major Cowboys passing records and was the all-time leading NFL passer.

LILLY ENTERS HALL OF FAME — Bob Lilly, a seven-time All-Pro defensive tackle in his 14-year career with the Cowboys from 1961-74, became the first Cowboys-only player to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Enshrined along with Lilly on Aug. 2 at Canton, Ohio, were Herb Adderley, who played for the Cowboys from 1970-72, Jim Otto and Deacon Jones.

FIFTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — Behind new starting quarterback Danny White, the Cowboys rolled to their 15th consecutive winning season with a surprising 12-4 record, tied for best in the league with Philadelphia and Atlanta. The Cowboys lost the NFC East title to Philadelphia on a tie-breaker, but entered the playoffs for the 14th time in 15 years, this time as a wild card team. The Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game and rallied past the Falcons at Atlanta 30-27 to advance to the NFC Championship Game at Philadelphia. But the Cowboys lost 20-7 in their bid for a sixth Super Bowl appearance.

LANDRY'S 200th VICTORY — Tom Landry joined George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only coaches with 200 NFL victories when the Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 on Dec. 28 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game, raising Landry's record to 200-119-6, counting regular season and playoff games.

# 1981

**RENFRO HONORED** — Former All-Pro defensive back Mel Renfro, the Cowboys' all-time leading pass interceptor, became the fifth member of the Cowboys' Ring of Honor. Renfro, who played for Dallas from 1964 through 1977, was honored during halftime ceremonies of the Cowboys-Miami Dolphins game at Texas Stadium Oct. 25.

**TWELFTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP** — The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division Championship, their 12th division title since 1966, with a 12-4 record and tied Oakland's NFL mark of 16 consecutive winning seasons. Entering the playoffs for the 15th time in that span, the Cowboys advanced to the NFC Championship Game for the ninth time in 12 years by routing Tampa Bay 38-0 at Texas Stadium. But for the second year in a row Dallas lost the conference title game. San Francisco scored a last-minute touchdown at Candlestick Park to edge the Cowboys 28-27 for a berth in Super Bowl XVI.

# THE SIDELINES

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Dallas Coubous Cheerleaders

Although the Cowboys have had sideline cheerleaders since their first season, the current phenomenon of the Cowboys Cheerleaders did not begin its rise until about 1975.

The Cowboys saw the opportunity to develop a new form of entertainment for football fans and a decision was made to increase the size of the cheerleading squad by holding open auditions in the spring of 1976. About 250 women came to Texas Stadium that year. The number of applicants annually now exceeds 2,000.

In capturing the imaginations of people everywhere, the multitalented Cheerleaders have made numerous national television appearances, including two highly rated made-for-TV movies about the squad and two special "Love Boat" episodes. The Cheerleaders also have appeared at many charity events and state fairs around the nation.

The Cowboys Cheerleaders also are popular around the world. The squad made its first overseas tour in December 1978, a wellreceived 10-day visit to Japan. Since 1979 the Cheerleaders have made six very successful tours of United States military bases in Korea, West Germany, Greece, Turkey, the Philippines and the Indian Ocean for the United Services Organization (USO) and the Department of Defense.
