






WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2001

- ★ The Cowboys improving their NFL-best, opening-day record of 30-10-1 (.744). Dallas holds the NFL record for consecutive wins in opening games with 17 straight from 1965-81.
- ★ The Cowboys improving their NFC-best 65-43 (.602) record against AFC foes in games against Denver, Oakland, San Diego and Seattle.
- ★ The Cowboys increasing their club-record 88-game (regular-season and playoffs) sellout streak at Texas Stadium.
- ★ The Cowboys improving their 92-23 record when Emmitt Smith carries 20-or-more times. Dallas is also 60-17 in games when Smith rushes for 100-yards-or-more (marks include both regular season and postseason).
- ★ The Cowboys extending their club record for consecutive games (regular season and post-season) without allowing a kickoff return for a touchdown. Entering 2001, the Cowboys current streak is 136 games (Oct. 3, 1993).
- ★ The Cowboys establishing a club record for consecutive point after touchdowns (kicking). Entering 2001, the Cowboys have connected on 141 consecutive PATs. The club record is 162 straight set from 1969-73. Dallas last had a missed PAT on Oct. 27, 1996 at Miami.
- ★ Dexter Coakley recording the 600th tackle of his career. Coakley enters his fifth NFL season with 538 career tackles.
- ★ Joey Galloway recording the 300th reception and 5,000th receiving yard of his career. Entering the 2001 season, Galloway has 287 receptions for 4,519 yards in his career.
- ★ Jackie Harris recording his 400th career reception. Harris currently has 378 career catches.
- ★ Raghib Ismail recording the 5,000th receiving yard of his career. Entering the 2001 season, Ismail has 4,461 receiving yards in his career.
- ★ Emmitt Smith extending his NFL record for career rushing touchdowns. Smith currently has 145 rushing touchdowns.
- ★ Emmitt Smith scoring the 1,000th point of his career. Smith currently has 938 career points, 62 points shy of the 1,000-point plateau. He would become the 29th player in NFL history to score 1,000 points.
- Emmitt Smith moving past Barry Sanders into second place on the NFL's all-time rushing chart. Smith, currently in third place with 15,166 yards, trails Sanders (15,269 yards) by 103 yards. With 1,561 yards rushing in 2001, Smith can pass Walter Payton (16,726) to become the NFL's all-time leading rusher.
- ★ Emmitt Smith becoming the first player in NFL history to rush for 1,000-yards in 11-straight seasons.
- ★ Emmitt Smith continuing to move up the NFL's all-time list for combined net yards. Smith enters 2001 in sixth place on that list with 17,973 career yards. He can move past Herschel Walker (18,168 yards) and Barry Sanders (18,308) with 336 yards.
- ★ George Teague recording the 500th and 600th tackle of his career. Teague enters the 2001 season with 499 career stops.
- ★ Jason Tucker entering the club's all-time kickoff return list. Tucker currently has 73 kickoff returns, two shy of the 75 necessary to qualify for the career rankings. With a current career average of 23.5 yards-per-return, Tucker would enter the club's record book with the fourth highest return average in club history.
- ★ Darren Woodson moving into second place on the club's all-time tackle chart. Woodson currently stands third on that list with 1,047 career stops, trailing Randy White (1,104 tackles) by 57 tackles. Lee Roy Jordan holds the club record with 1,236 career tackles.







Jerry Jones

Owner and General Manager



In one of the most dramatic eras of ownership in professional sports, Jerry Jones' stewardship of the Dallas Cowboys has brought rapid success and unprecedented results to one of the world's most visible sports enti-

Highlighted by Super Bowl victories following the 1992, 1993 and 1995 seasons, Jones became the first owner in NFL history to guide his team to three league championships in his first seven years of ownership.

In addition, the Dallas Cowboys of the 1990s maintained a championship level of excellence throughout the decade by winning a league-high six division titles, earning four NFC Championship Game appearances and claiming the ultimate prize three times. Dallas also became the first team in NFL history to win three Super Bowls in four seasons.

All of this has been accomplished since Jones' 1989 purchase of the team – at a period of time when the proud franchise was struggling through its most difficult era in club history. For the first time since 1964, the Cowboys had posted losing seasons for three consecutive years, and the club had closed the 1988 and 1989 seasons with the worst record in the NFL.

In the ensuing years of Jones' ownership, fans of the Dallas Cowboys witnessed what might have been the most impressive and visible turnaround in the history of professional sports. A team that closed the 1980s with a pair of seasons that netted just four wins would go on to win more division titles and league championships than any other franchise in the 1990s.

Jones' immediate vision in 1989 was to put a championship team on the field, while also restoring the pride of a fan following that spans the nation and reaches all corners of the world. In a matter of months, that vision became reality. By January of 1993, the Cowboys earned a Super Bowl championship for the first time in 15 seasons, and the following year, the Cowboys became the fifth team to win back-to-back Super Bowl crowns.

In 1995, the Dallas Cowboys became the first NFL franchise to win three Super Bowls in a four year period of time, while tying the NFL record for the most Super Bowl victories by an organization with five. In 1996, the club claimed its fifth straight division title, a feat that had never been accomplished by any NFC Eastern Division team. After a one-year absence from postseason play in 1997, the Cowboys regained the NFC East crown in 1998 and finished the decade with a playoff appearance in 1999 – the team's eighth postseason trip in nine years.

Along the way, Jones has established himself as one of the NFL's most influential and active owners. His "hands on" leadership ability has played a major role in the resurgence of the Cowboys, and his contributions to the National Football League have been prominent and productive:

- ★ In the last 22 years, 22 different owners have entered the National Football League. Of that group, only Jerry Jones has guided his franchise to more than two Super Bowl championships. Moreover, Jones joins Art Rooney, Jack Kent Cooke, Al Davis and Eddie DeBartolo as the only men to own NFL franchises that have won at least three Super Bowls under their guidance.
- ★ The fan following and interest in the current era of the Cowboys has reached unprecedented levels in the national and international spotlight. In the 1990s, the Cowboys compiled an NFL record by playing in front of 160 straight sold out stadiums (home and away). In addition, Dallas' three most recent Super Bowl appearances represent the three most watched television programs in history and the club is annually one of the league's top merchandise sellers.
- ★ As a member of the league's Broadcasting Committee, Jones was a key player in the agreement that introduced the FOX Network to the NFL as the rights holder for the NFC television package in 1993. In addition, he was a prominent voice in the most recent NFL television agreement that set the standard for all of professional sports in terms of network television partnerships.
- ★ The results of an ESPN poll released on May 31, 2000 revealed that the Cowboys were the nation's favorite professional team in any sport. For the past seven consecutive years, the Cowboys have been named the most popular NFL team in research compiled by Harris Polls.



- ★ With his appointment to the NFL's prestigious Competition Committee in May of 1992, Jones became the first owner to serve in that capacity since the late Paul Brown. He has since moved to the Executive Committee of the NFL's Management Council as well as the NFL's Committee on NFL Properties. After being rotated off of the Competition Committee in the middle of the last decade, Jones recently served a second term from 1998 to 2000.
- Jones was one of nine NFL owners who were named to The Sporting News list of the 100 Most Powerful People in Sports of the Century, Jones (ranked #78) joined George Halas (14), Lamar Hunt (17), Paul Brown (19), Al Davis (31), George Preston Marshall (61), Wellington Mara (73), Art Rooney (81) and Sonny Werblin (96) on the list. In addition, Jones has consistently been rated among the Top 20 in The Sporting News annual tabulation of the Most Powerful People in Sports throughout the past decade.
- ★ In May of 1997, Financial World magazine recognized Jones as the owner of the most valuable sports team in all of professional athletics. The Cowboys carried the "most valuable franchise" tag from 1993-97. The publication has not determined team values in the past four years. In September of 1999, Fortune ranked the Cowboys as the NFL's most valuable franchise.
- * In November of 1994, Jones was selected as the Master Entrepreneur of the Year by Ernst and Young and Inc. magazine. In December of 1994, he was named one of America's 10 Most Interesting People in a nationally televised Barbara Walters special on ABC.
- ★ During the club's run to the 1992 World Championship, the Cowboys set a team record for most wins in a regular season (13) and most overall wins (16). Following the 1995 season, the Cowboys appeared in a NFL-record eighth Super Bowl. The Cowboys are now the only team in the NFL that has won multiple Super Bowl titles in two separate decades.
- ★ After the inaugural 1-15 season in 1989, Jones was the NFL's most aggressive executive in the area of Plan B free agency, signing 16 Plan B players. Three of those players went on to start in Super Bowl XXVII, and tight end Jay Novacek was selected to five Pro Bowls.

Jerral Wayne Jones was born on Oct. 13, 1942 in Los Angeles. He learned his business style from his father, J.W. "Pat" Jones, a successful entrepreneur first in supermarkets, then in insurance,

Pat Jones moved his family to North Little Rock, AR, soon after Jerry was born. After starring as a running back at North Little Rock High School, Jerry received a scholarship to play football at the University of Arkansas. He was a starting guard and co-captain of the 1964 team that went 11-0, defeated Nebraska in the Cotton Bowl and captured the national championship.

Upon graduating with a M.B.A. from Arkansas in 1965, Jerry joined his father's insurance company.

Modern Security Life in Springfield, Mo., as executive vice president.

Jones entered the oil and gas exploration business in Oklahoma in 1970 and soon became a phenomenal success. His oil and gas concern now has offices in Fort Smith, AR, and Calgary, Canada.

One of a very small number of NFL owners who actually earned a significant level of success as a football player. Jones is currently living his dream of engineering the fortunes of a NFL franchise. A man of varied interests who will not rest on yesterday's achievements, he is a dedicated businessman and family man - sharing a passion for both worlds.

Jerry is also involved in numerous civic and charitable causes. As very strong supporters of The Salvation Army, Jerry and wife Gene were presented the Army's Partner of the Year Award in 1997 on behalf of the Cowboys organization. In each of the last eight years, Gene and Jerry Jones, along with the Dallas Cowboys, have served as hosts and underwritten the costs, for the Super Lunch, a fundraising event for The Salvation Army Irving Corps Community Center and its special projects. This annual event has raised nearly \$1 million since its inception, including \$200,000 in 2000.

The Gene and Jerry Jones Family Center for Children opened in November of 1998 in conjunction with the Salvation Army. The center offers affordable childcare for low-income families and was made pos-

sible by gifts from the Jones family and the Cowboys that exceeded \$1.2 million.

For the past four seasons, the Jones family has dedicated the Cowboys annual Thanksgiving Day halftime show as a national showcase to kickoff the Salvation Army's annual Kettle Drive. The nationally televised event has created a new holiday tradition, while helping to increase donations to The Salvation Army's annual fund raising efforts by several millions of dollars. Reba McEntire, Randy Travis, Clint Black, Jessica Simpson and Billy Gilman have provided the entertainment for the last four holiday extravagan-

For their efforts in this area, the Joneses received the Evangeline Booth Award in 1999, one of the Army's highest national community service awards and have been selected for membership into the prestigious Salvation Army William Booth Society. Gene and Jerry were named to the Salvation Army's National Advisory Board in April of 1998.

This past spring, the Joneses were awarded the Chairman's Award by The Boys and Girls Clubs of America. This award is given to recognize individuals who made a positive difference in people's lives particularly in the lives of children. The Chairman's Dinner, chaired by daughter, Charlotte Anderson, raised \$1.9 million for The Boys and Girls Clubs.

Gene and Jerry Jones are also very active supporters of the Library of Congress. As members of the Library's James Madison Council, Gene and Jerry provided a major gift to the Library to provide for the

complete restoration of the Thomas Jefferson Library. The gift was made as a kickoff to the Library of Congress' bicentennial celebration.

In their continuing desire to enhance education and support young people in the community, the Jones family served as underwriting sponsor for The Dallas Cowboys/Gene and Jerry Jones Family – Dallas Morning News All-State Scholar-Athlete Team. The program honors and provides scholarships for 12 college-bound, student-athletes from across the State of Texas who have distinguished themselves through academic and athletic excellence.

The Jones family is also very actively involved with several other community-related organizations, including the Children's Medical Center of Dallas, the National Board for The Boys and Girls Clubs of America, the Kent Waldrep Paralysis Foundation and The Rise School of Dallas.

Jerry and wife Gene, a former Arkansas beauty pageant winner whom he met while both attended the University of Arkansas, live in Dallas. They have three children, Stephen, Charlotte and Jerry, Jr., and seven grandchildren.

Stephen (6/21/64) is a graduate of the University of Arkansas and serves as the Cowboys' Chief Operating Officer/Executive Vice President/Director of Player Personnel. Charlotte (7/26/66) is a Stanford graduate and serves as the Cowboys Vice President/Director of Charlites and Special Events. Jerry Jr. (9/27/69), a graduate of Georgetown University who earned his law degree from Southern Methodist University, is the Cowboys' Vice President/Director of Marketing/Legal/Internet.

Chronology Since Jerry Jones' Purchase of the Dallas Cowboys:

February 25, 1989 – Jones purchases the Dallas Cowboys and the lease to manage Texas Stadium Corp. from H.R. "Bum" Bright. Jerry Jones names Jimmy Johnson as the new head coach.

April 20, 1989 – Jones completes negotiations on Troy Aikman's contract—a six-year deal that is completed four days before Aikman is the top overall selection in the 1989 NFL Draft.

October 12, 1989 – Herschel Walker is traded to Minnesota for five players, six conditional draft choices and a 1992 first round draft choice. Current players who actually came to Dallas as a result of the trade include Emmitt Smith and Darren Woodson.

August 10, 1990 - The Cowboys' first-ever in-state training camp concludes at St. Edward's University in Austin. Over 100,000 fans attend workouts, while more than 400 media credentials are issued in the three-plus weeks of work. Austin officials estimate the camp brought an additional \$3.2 million of income into the Austin area.

September 5, 1990 – The Cowboys trade Steve Walsh to the New Orleans Saints for a first and third round draft choice in 1991 and a conditional second round pick in 1992.

April 19, 1991 – A deal is made to bring the first overall selection in the 1991 NFL Draft to Dallas in exchange for a first and second round selection and three veteran players. Dallas selected Outland Trophy winner Russell Maryland with the top pick.

April 21-22, 1991 – In an unprecedented action among NFL clubs, the Cowboys sign their top three draft choices on draft day. The team also drafts a club record 17 players.

July 16, 1991 – The Cowboys open training camp in Austin with all 17 of their draft choices under contract. Dallas concludes its second training camp at St. Edward's University, with over 75,000 fans attending the Cowboys' practices.

November 24, 1991 – The Cowboys end the Washington Redskins' 1991 undefeated streak at 11 games with a 24-21 victory at RFK Stadium.

December 15, 1991 – Dallas defeats Philadelphia, 25-13, at Veterans Stadium to secure a wild card playoff spot. The victory marks the team's first trip to the playoffs since the 1985 club went 10-6 and won the NFC Eastern Division title.

December 22, 1991 – Dallas closes the 1991 season with a 31-27 win over Atlanta, marking the team's best record (11-5) since 1983.

January 5, 1992 – Dallas defeats Chicago by a 17-13 score in an opening round playoff game at Soldier Field. The victory marks the Cowboys' first playoff win since 1982, and the first playoff win on the road since 1980.

May 1, 1992 – Jerry Jones is appointed to the NFL's Competition Committee by Commissioner Paul Tagliabue. Jones becomes the first owner to serve on the prestigious committee since the death of Cincinnati's Paul Brown.

December 21, 1992 – Before a national television audience on ABC's Monday Night Football, the Cowboys defeat the Atlanta Falcons (41-17) at the Georgia Dome to claim the NFC Eastern Division Championship. The victory marks the Cowboys' first divisional title since 1985. It is the 14th divisional title in club history.

December 23, 1992 – Six players from the Cowboys offense are selected to play in the Pro Bowl. The six players establish a Dallas Cowboys' record for most offensive players selected to the Pro Bowl.

December 27, 1992 – Dallas defeats Chicago by a 27-14 score at Texas Stadium. The victory is the 13th of the year for Dallas, establishing a new club record for victories in a season. Emmitt Smith finishes the season with 1,713 rushing yards, enabling him to become the first player to win back-to-back NFL rushing titles since Eric Dickerson (1983-84).

December, 1992 – The Cowboys set a new team record for road attendance by averaging 72,523 fans-per-road game in 1992. The team also played before a sold-out stadium in all 16 regular season games.

January 10, 1993 – In their first home playoff game since 1983, Dallas hands NFC East rival Philadelphia a 34-10 defeat in a NFC Divisional Playoff Game.



January 17, 1993 – In their first NFC Championship Game since 1982, the Cowboys defeat the San Francisco 49ers by a 30-20 score at Candlestick Park. The victory sends Dallas to Super Bowl XXVII in Pasadena, marking the Cowboys first Super Bowl trip since 1978.

January 31, 1993 – While making a NFL record sixth Super Bowl appearance, the Cowboys defeat Buffalo 52-17 in Super Bowl XXVII at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena. The victory enables the Cowboys to become the only franchise in NFL history to win more than one Super Bowl under two different owners. Troy Aikman was named the game's MVP after throwing four touchdown passes. The Super Bowl crowd of 98,374 becomes the largest crowd to ever witness a Cowboys game. The game was witnessed by

133.4 million television viewers, making Super Bowl XXVII the most watched event in television history March 5, 1993 – The Super Bowl Champion Dallas Cowboys become the first athletic team to visit the White House under President Bill Clinton's administration. The Cowboys team visit to the White House is the first in club history.

December 28, 1993 – An NFC record 11 Dallas players are selected to the Pro Bowl. That group includes a club record eight offensive selections (seven Pro Bowl starters).

January 2, 1994 – The Cowboys defeat the N.Y. Giants 16-13 in overtime at the Meadowlands. The victory clinches the Cowboys' second straight NFC East title and the 15th division crown in club history.
January 2, 1994 – Emmitt Smith finishes the season with 1,486 yards to earn his third straight NFL

rushing crown. He becomes just the fourth man in NFL history to win three consecutive rushing titles. **January 23, 1994** – Dallas defeats San Francisco 38-21 in the NFC Championship Game at Texas. Stadium. The victory gives the Cowboys a NFL-record seventh conference championship in the first conference title game to be played at Texas Stadium since Jan. 1, 1978 (a 23-6 win over Minnesota).

January 30, 1994 - Dallas becomes one of just three NFL teams to win four Super Bowls by defeating Buffalo (30-13) in Super Bowl XXVIII. The game, played at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, featured two rushing touchdowns by Super Bowl MVP Emmitt Smith. Dallas raised its NFL record number of Super Bowl appearances to seven.

March 30, 1994 – Barry Switzer is named the new head coach of the Dallas Cowboys – and the third head coach in team history. Switzer replaces Jimmy Johnson, who stepped down as the Cowboys' head coach the previous day.

December, 1994 - For the second straight season, the Cowboys send a club and NFC record 11 players to the Pro Bowl.

January, 1995 – The Cowboys set a Texas Stadium record for home attendance with an average crowd of 64,579 in 1994, the first time Dallas has averaged over 64,000 fans-per-game at Texas Stadium. The previous record was 63,943 set in 1981.

January 15, 1995 – The Cowboys play in their third NFC Championship Game of the decade. The Cowboys are the only NFL team to play in multiple conference championship games in each decade of the team's existence.

December 24, 1995 – Dallas wraps up its fourth straight NFC Eastern Division title – a feat that no other NFC East team had accomplished other than the Cowboys teams from 1976 to 1979.

December 25, 1995 – Emmitt Smith closes the season with a team record 1,773 rushing yards and a NFL record 25 rushing touchdowns. Smith led the NFL in rushing for the fourth time in five years, becoming just the fifth player in NFL history to win at least four rushing titles.

ing just the fifth player in NFL history to win at least four rushing titles.

December, 1995 – Ten Cowboys are selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad. Since 1993, Dallas has earned 32 Pro Bowl selections – the most ever by one team over a three-year period of time.

January 14, 1996 – The Cowboys win a NFL record eighth conference championship game by defeating the Green Bay Packers 38-27 at Texas Stadium. The victory marked the Cowboys third NFC title in four years.

January 28, 1996 – Dallas becomes the first team in NFL history to win three Super Bowls in a fouryear period by defeating the Pittsburgh Steelers 27-17 in Super Bowl XXX at Sun Devil Stadium in Tempe, AZ. The game is witnessed by 138.4 million television viewers, making Super Bowl XXX the most watched event in television history. The victory enables Dallas to earn its fifth Super Bowl title – joining the San Francisco 49ers as the only NFL franchises to win five Super Bowls. The Cowboys have now appeared in a NFL record eight Super Bowls. Dallas also became the first NFL franchise to win Super Bowls with three different head coaches.

December 15, 1996 – The Cowboys clinch a fifth straight division title with a 12-6 win over the New England Patriots at Texas Stadium. The championship enables the Cowboys to become the first team in NFL history to win five straight NFC Eastern Division crowns.

January 5, 1997 – Dallas closes the postseason with a divisional playoff loss at Carolina. The loss marks the first time since the 1991 season that the Cowboys were unable to reach the NFC title game.

December, 1997 – The Cowboys close the 1997 season with a 6-10 record, marking the team's first non-playoff season since 1990.

February 12, 1998 – Jerry Jones names Chan Gailey as the fourth head coach in the history of the Dallas Cowboys franchise. Gailey, who had previously served as the Pittsburgh Steelers offensive coordinator, replaces Barry Switzer, who resigned from his position on January 9th.

July 15, 1998 - The Cowboys open training camp at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, TX. Attendance figures for the four-week camp exceed 100,000.

November 8, 1998 - With 163 yards on 29 carries in a 16-6 win over the New York Giants, Emmitt Smith becomes the Dallas Cowboys all-time leading rusher. Smith's performance against New York pushes him past Tony Dorsett (12,036) and into the Cowboys top spot.

December 20, 1998 - After a one-year absence from postseason play, the Cowboys clinch their six NFC Eastern Division title in the last seven years with a 13-9 win over Philadelphia at Texas Stadium. The 1998 division crown is the 19th division championship (15th NFC East title) in the club's 39-year history.

December 27, 1998 - After scoring a first-half touchdown on a one-yard run against the Redskins at Texas Stadium, Emmitt Smith becomes the NFL's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns, moving ahead of Marcus Allen (123). Smith would later add a 26-yard touchdown run in the second quarter to bring his league record total to 125 rushing touchdowns by season's end. The Cowboys closed the year with a 23-7 victory over Washington and a 10-6 record, marking the 23rd season in which Dallas recorded at least 10 wins-a NFL record. The win over the Redskins also enabled Dallas to become the first team in the history of the NFC East to post an 8-0 record in division play.

December 24, 1999 – The Dallas Cowboys NFL-record of consecutive games in front of sold out stadiums comes to an end in a Christmas Eve game against the New Orleans Saints in the Louisiana Superdome. The streak, which included home and away games, came to a halt after 160 games. It began on Dec. 23, 1990 at Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium and included 79 straight sell-outs at Texas Stadium

(including playoffs) and 81 straight sell-outs on the road (including playoffs).

January 2, 2000 – The Cowboys close the century as the NFL's most successful team in the decade of the 1990s. From 1990 to 1999, Dallas qualified for the playoffs eight times, won six division titles, made four trips to the conference championship game and won three Super Bowls. The 1999 season ends with an 8-8 regular season record and a wild card playoff loss at Minnesota on Jan. 9, 2000.

January 26, 2000 – Jerry Jones names Cowboys defensive coordinator Dave Campo as the fifth head coach in franchise history. Campo spent the previous 11 seasons as an assistant coach in Dallas

and was the defensive coordinator for the 1995 team that won Super Bowl XXX.

JERRY JONES MINORITY COACHING FELLOWSHIP

The Jerry Jones Minority Coaching Fellowship was established 12 years ago to give minority college football coaches an intensive working experience on the NFL level. The purpose of this fellowship is to create an experience that will enable an individual coach to understand all dimensions of coaching with the Dallas Cowboys, from working with players in the classroom and on the field, to studying techniques and strategies with the other coaches, to handling administrative duties.

Beginning with training camp, the fellowship coaches are Dallas Cowboys coaches until responsibilities at their respective institutions begin. The coaches are housed at the Cowboys' training facilities and take part in every aspect of the football program, including on-field coaching, staff meeting participation and daily evaluation of current and prospective NFL players. During their stay with the Cowboys, each fellowship coach develops an understanding of the role of an NFL coach, of how to organize and formulate practice plans and game plans and of player evaluations.

"The fellowship coaches are an important part of our team during training camp," says Cowboys owner Jerry Jones. "We want them not only to learn, but to help us during this crucial time of preparing our team for the season. We believe this experience with the Cowboys will help minority coaches develop the background and contacts to move more rapidly into the NFL."

Stephen Jones

Chief Operating Officer Executive Vice President Director of Player Personnel



With 12 years of NFL experience under his belt, Stephen Jones has earned the reputation of being one of the brightest young executives in all of professional sports.

Named a Cowboys Vice President in February of 1989, Jones coordinates the Cowboys' entire player personnel department. He oversees the negotiation of all player contracts, management of the salary cap, the operation of Texas Stadium and a wide range of other club related duties.

Recognized as Owner Jerry Jones' right hand man, Stephen Jones has played an integral role in the team's rise from a 1-15 record in 1989 to three Super Bowl victories and six NFC East titles in the last nine seasons.

In the ever-evolving role of the salary cap in the current collective bargaining agreement, Jones' performance in managing the Cowboys player payroll has

played a prominent role in the team's ability to compete at the NFL's highest level.

Jones' involvement in shaping the Dallas roster under the salary cap was critical in allowing the Cowboys to maintain one of the NFL's most talented core group of players throughout the decade of the 1990s.

In the months leading up to the 2000 season, Jones played a key role in the Cowboys aggressive approach to free agency. He was instrumental in negotiating a long-term contract that allowed Dallas to trade for wide receiver Joey Galloway. In addition, he oversaw the signings of TE Jackie Harris, QB Randall Cunningham, LBs Joe Bowden and Barron Wortham and CB Ryan McNeil, each of whom played a major role during the 2000 season for the Cowboys.

In 1999, his hard work helped Dallas land wide receiver Raghib "Rocket" Ismail, who went on to lead the team with 80 receptions, and center Mark Stepnoski. These moves helped the Cowboys earn their

eighth playoff appearance in the 1990s.

During a historic two-year period, Jones was involved in signing five Cowboys stars who were considered among the best players in the league at their respective positions. Between September of 1993 and September of 1995, Jones helped orchestrate contract agreements for running back Emmitt Smith, quarterback Troy Aikman, fullback Daryl Johnston, wide receiver Michael Irvin and cornerback Deion Sanders.

In the summer of 1992, Stephen Jones was the key figure in the negotiation and signing of 13 veteran contracts – enabling the Cowboys to start the season with a complete roster en route to their run to

the Super Bowl XXVII title.

In April of 1991, Jones was part of a Dallas college draft effort that saw the Cowboys select 17 players – all of whom were under contract prior to the start of training camp. In addition, 14 of the 17 players drafted by Dallas went on to earn roster spots in the NFL.

Entering his 12th year as a NFL executive, Jones has enjoyed a life-long association with the game of football. A four-year letterman as a linebacker and special teams stand-out at the University of Arkansas, Jones was a starter for the Razorbacks in the Orange Bowl Classic following the 1986 season.

Prior to attending the University of Arkansas, Jones was an all-state quarterback and a three-year starter at Catholic High School in Little Rock, AR.


He graduated from Arkansas in 1988 with a degree in chemical engineering and went to work in the oil and gas business for JMC Exploration as an engineer.

On Feb. 25, 1989, Jerry Jones purchased the Dallas Cowboys and installed Stephen into a key front office position as one of three vice presidents with the club.

Jones is actively involved with the Young Presidents Organization. He serves on the board of directors for the Kent Waldrep National Paralysis Foundation, the G.T.E./ S.M.U. Athletic Forum and the Episcopal School of Dallas. Jones is also a member of the Boy Scouts of America executive board.



Dave Campo

Head Coach



As one of the NFL's most highly regarded defensive minds, Dave Campo earned his spot at the top of the Dallas Cowboys organization through hard work and perseverance.

On Jan. 26, 2000, Jerry Jones selected Campo as the fifth head coach in Dallas Cowboys history. In his 11 seasons as an assistant coach in the NFL (1989-1999), Campo served on Cowboys teams that appeared in three Super Bowls, four NFC Championship Games and won six division titles. With his hiring. Campo joined a select group of four NFL head coaches who have been a part of three or more Super Bowl titles in their coaching career. That group includes George Seifert

(five times), Mike Shanahan (three) and Mike Holmgren (three).

As the franchise's head coach, he is charged with restoring the team to its place among the NFL's elite after an inaugural, injury plagued 2000 season in which the Cowboys record fell to 5-11. The Cowboys lost 11 opening-day starters for a combined total of 70 games, including nine who suffered season-ending injuries. Although the 2000 season evolved into a year of transition and development, the new head coach required, and received, a maximum effort from his players throughout the season. Ultimately, the team's fate was determined by five losses that were decided by a combined total of 19 points.

Enthusiasm, determination and an ability to motivate have long been trademarks of Campo's coaching style, and his first year results as a head coach have only strengthened his resolve to take the

Cowboys back to the top.

In four of the five years that Campo directed the Dallas defense, the Cowboys finished the year ranked among the NFL's top 10 units, including two top three finishes. The 1999 defense ranked ninth in the NFL (third in the NFC) in total yards and allowed one touchdown or less in nine of the 16 regular season games. The Cowboys defense held opponents to 13 points or less in nine of the team's 16 games in 1999, tying the second most in club history. The 1978 Cowboys defense held 10 opponents to 13 pointsor-less, while the 1998 and 1968 clubs held nine opponents to 13 points-or-less. Dallas closed the 1999 season ranked fifth in the NFL in points allowed per game, surrendering 17.3 points-per-outing. Only four defensive units permitted fewer offensive touchdowns than the 25 surrendered by the Dallas defense in 1999 and only St. Louis (4) surrendered fewer rushing touchdowns than the six allowed by the Cowboys. The 24 interceptions recorded by Dallas in 1999 marked just the second time in the last 13 years the team topped the 20 interception barrier, and it was the highest interception total for a Dallas team since 1985. Following the 1999 season, linebacker Dexter Coakley and cornerback Deion Sanders were named to the NFC Pro Bowl squad

The 1998 unit permitted fewer opponents' trips inside the 20-yard line (31) than any other team in the league, and the Dallas defense finished fifth in the NFL in third down conversion defense (32.9%). Following the divisional championship season of 1998, defensive tackle Leon Lett, cornerback Deion

Sanders and safety Darren Woodson were named to the Pro Bowl.

In 1997, Campo's group ranked second in overall defense in the NFL (allowing 282.3 yards-pergame), while leading the entire league in pass defense (157.6). Those numbers were even more impressive considering the fact that key players such as Lett, Sanders, Woodson and Chad Hennings missed a combined total of 23 starts. Sanders and Woodson earned Pro Bowl honors as prominent players in the

NFL's best secondary.

In 1996, Campo's defense helped guide the Cowboys to a 10-6 finish and an unprecedented fifth straight NFC Eastern Division crown. During the '96 regular season, the Dallas defense was ranked first in the NFL for 11-of-16 weeks before closing the year ranked third (273.9 yards-per-game). The Cowboys pass defense finished the year second in the NFL, permitting just 175.4 yards-per-game, while the Dallas rushing defense was 10th (98.5 yards-per-game). Dallas also ranked third in the NFL in limiting opponents to just 16.3 first downs-per-game. The Cowboys defense surrendered just 20 touchdowns (second best in the NFL), and, in four games, the Dallas defense kept its opponent out of the end zone. Three of Dallas' defensive starters, Sanders, Woodson and Tony Tolbert were named to the NFC Pro Bowl squad following the season.

In 1995, Campo directed the fortunes of the World Champion Dallas defense, which finished the season ranked third in the NFL in touchdowns permitted with 32. Dallas also closed the year ranked third in the NFL in fewest points allowed with an average of 18.2 points-per-game. Only seven NFL teams had more interceptions than the 19 registered by Dallas, and the Cowboys returned four of those interceptions for touchdowns, tying the team record. With defensive stars such as Sanders, Kevin Smith, Charles Haley and Russell Maryland missing a combined 37 starts, the Cowboys still managed to finish the season ranked ninth in the NFL (fourth in the NFC) in total defense, allowing 315.3 yards-per-game. Dallas HEAD COACH DAVE CAMPO

was 16th in the NFL in rushing defense (110.8) and eighth in pass defense (204.5).

Campo was elevated to the position of defensive coordinator on Jan. 24, 1995. Prior to becoming Dallas' third defensive coordinator since 1992, Campo directed the efforts of a secondary that had grown into one of the team's deepest and most productive units.

In 1994, while helping the Cowboys to the top defensive ranking in the NFL, the Dallas defensive backfield enjoyed its most productive season in several years. While leading the NFL in total defense (269.6 yards-per-game), the Cowboys were also ranked first in the NFL in pass defense (172 yards-per-game). All-Pro strong safety Woodson became the first Dallas defensive back to earn a starting Pro Bowl berth since Everson Walls (1985). Dallas finished the year tied for fourth in the NFL in interceptions with 22 – a figure that represented the most interceptions by a Cowboys club since 1987. In addition, Woodson led the team in interceptions with five – marking the fourth straight year that a different Cowboys defensive back had captured the individual interception lead.

In 1993, while directing the secondary of the Super Bowl XXVIII Champion Cowboys, Campo's group was led by cornerback Kevin Smith, who intercepted more passes (six) than any Dallas player since the 1986 season. Also in '93, strong safety Thomas Everett became the first Dallas defensive back in seven

seasons to be selected to appear in the Pro Bowl.

Campo was hired by Dallas in 1989 after spending two years at the University of Miami as the secondary coach. At Miami, he helped the Hurricanes to a two-year record of 23-1 and a national title in 1987, while fine tuning the talents of the best defensive back in school history. Safety Bennie Blades was the

1987 Jim Thorpe Award winner (honoring the best collegiate defensive back) before being selected with the third pick in the NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions. Eight of Campo's Miami charges went on to sign NFL contracts.

Prior to joining Miami, Campo spent three seasons (1984-86) as part of a staff that turned Syracuse into a nation-

al championship contender.


Campo began his career at his alma mater, Central Connecticut State, where he spent the 1971-72 seasons. He then moved to the University of Albany (1973). Bridgeport (1974), the University of Pittsburgh (1975), Washington State (1976), Boise State (1977-79), Oregon State (1980), Weber State (1981-82) and Iowa State (1983).

In addition to starring at defensive back in college, David Cross Campo (7/18/47) twice earned All-East honors at shortstop at Central Connecticut State. He attended Robert E. Fitch High

School in Groton, CT.

Prior to training camp, July 21, 2001, Campo and the coaching staff participated in the club's fourth annual coaches clinic. The one-day complimentary clinic was offered to 600 area middle school, youth and Salvation Army agency football coaches. He also hosted a Saturday outing for a group of mentally challenged adults at the Valley Ranch training facility, complete with a player autograph session, performance by Rowdy, the Cowboys' mascot, and a tour of the Cowboys training facility.

He and wife Kay have six children – Angie, Eric, Becky, Tommy, Shelbie and Michael





Special Teams/Tight Ends

Florida State NFL: 12th Year * Cowboys: 12th Year



When Joe Avezzano took over the Cowboys special teams in 1990, he established a high expectation level for his units, and those units have met or exceeded demands year after year. Since his arrival, the Cowboys' special teams units have consistently finished near the top of NFL rankings in all four major kicking game categories – punt return average, kickoff return average, punt coverage and kickoff coverage. In the process, Dallas has

also established a well-deserved reputation for making big plays. Since 1990, Avezzano's units have been responsible for 20 blocked kicks and 15 combined touchdowns on punt and kickoff returns – 12 scores on punt returns alone. The Cowboys consistency, big plays and an ability to positively affect the outcome of games on special teams has not gone without notice. In his 11 seasons in Dallas, Avezzano has been named the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year three times (1991, 1993, 1998) based on a vote of the NFL's special teams coaches. Avezzano is the only three-time winner of the award. In 2001, Avezzano takes over the responsibility of coaching Dallas' tight ends, and he will try to establish with this group the same level of production he expects from his special teams units.

Despite numerous injuries that caused personnel changes throughout 2000, Dallas was one of only nine teams to finish the year ranked in the top 19 of all four major kicking game categories. In addition, the Cowboys, after ranking in the top two in opponent's average drive start following kickoffs the past three seasons, tied for third in the NFL in that category last fall. Avezzano integrated a new return man, Wane McGarity, into the punt return unit, and he responded by returning two punts for touchdowns to tie the club record for punt returns for touchdowns in a season while finishing third in the NFC with an 11.8 yard average. Rookie punter Micah Knorr finished fourth in the NFC and established a club rookie record by averaging 42.8 yards-per-punt. Knorr also finished fifth in the NFC with a 35.8 net punting average.

After leading the NFL in opponent's average drive start following kickoffs in both 1997 and 1998, the Cowboys finish 1999 ranked second in the league. Despite numerous injuries to return men during the season, Dallas finished fifth in the league in kickoff returns (23.7 yard average) and sixth in punt returns (10.7 yard average). First-year return man Jason Tucker, who didn't even record his first career kickoff return until midseason, came on to finish the year ranked second in the NFL with a 27.9 yard average – the fifth best total in club history. Avezzano was also successful in integrating Flozell Adams into the field goal rush unit mid-way through the 1999 campaign, and Adams responded by blocking two field goals in November.

Dallas closed out the 1998 season as one of only two teams in the NFL to be ranked in the top 12 in all four major kicking game categories, a feat that helped Avezzano win his third Special Teams Coach of the Year award. Avezzano's units led the league in kickoff coverage for the second straight season (18.5 yards-per-opponent's return), while finishing third in punt coverage (6.2), fourth in punt return average (12.6) and 12th in kickoff return average (23.4). Deion Sanders led the league in punt return average (15.6) while returning two punts for touchdowns.

In 1997, the Cowboys led the NFL in kickoff coverage (18.0 yards-per-opponent's return), while ranking fourth in kickoff return average (24.1), 11th in punt return average (10.9) and 13th in punt coverage (9.1). First-year kicker Richie Cunningham, who earned All-Pro honors from the Associated Press, finished the season second in the NFL in scoring.

In 1996, Herschel Walker sparked Dallas with five kickoff returns of 49 yards-or-more to rank second in the NFL in kickoff return average (28.9). As a unit, the Dallas kickoff return team ranked fourth in the NFL, while the Cowboys punt coverage finished eighth and kickoff coverage placed seventh. Jim Schwantz finished the year with 32 kicking game tackles and became the first Cowboy since Bill Bates (1984) to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a special teams player.

On the road to a Super Bowl XXX title in 1995, the Cowboys ranked fourth in the NFL in punt return average with an 11.1 yards-per-return mark, while also finishing seventh in the NFL in kickoff coverage, limiting opponents to 19.5 yards-per-kickoff return.

In 1994, the Cowboy's led the NFL in team kickoff return average, and Kevin Williams became the first Cowboy to return a kickoff and a punt for a touchdown in the same season.

In the Super Bowl XXVIII season of 1993, the Cowboys were the only team in the NFL to finish the regular season with a Top 10 ranking in all four major kicking game categories, helping Avezzano earn Special Team Coach of the Year honors for the second time.

Avezzano won his first NFL Special Teams Coach of the Year award in 1991 when the Cowboys led the NFL in points scored on special teams with 20 and in kickoff return average with a 21.7 mark. Also, for the first time in the same season in team history, Dallas placed a player in the top three in the league in both punt and kickoff return averages.

Before coming to Dallas, Avezzano coached the offensive line at Texas A&M for four seasons (1985-88), during which time the Aggies won three Southwest Conference titles and two Cotton Bowls. During his tenure at Texas A&M, he groomed six All-Southwest Conference picks, including All-Americas Richmond Webb and Doug Williams. Four of his charges were selected in the NFL Draft, three of those (Webb, Williams and Jerry Fontenot) in the first three rounds.

JOE AVEZZANO

COACHING STAFF

Avezzano took on the duties of offensive coordinator in 1988 when sophomore running back Darrin Lewis finished second in the nation in rushing to earn All-America honors. Before joining the Aggies, Avezzano spent five seasons as head coach at Oregon State (1980-84). From 1977-79, he served as offensive coordinator at Tennessee, and he was the offensive line coach at Pittsburgh (1973-76), helping the '76 Panthers to the national title.

Avezzano began his coaching career at Washington High School in Massillon, OH, in 1967. He then coached at Florida State (1968) before moving on to Iowa State (1969-72).

Born in Yonkers, NY (11/17/43), Avezzano grew up in Miami where he played football at Jackson High School. After starring at guard for Florida State, Avezzano was drafted by the Boston Patriots, Joe and wife Diann have a son, Anthony.

Avezzano is very active in support of the Special Olympics, both on the local and national levels. For the last nine years. he has served as the host to a special fundraising event, including the last three years in which he has hosted a Christmas season concert. Through his efforts, Joe has helped raise over \$1.1 million for Texas Special Olympics during his 11 years with the Cowboys.



3 NFL ranking as the team's secondary coach in 2000. In only his fourth season as a coach, he made the transition from active player to assistant coach during the team's 1998 training camp, working with both the secondary and special teams. In 2001, he continues in both roles, working with secondary coach Clancy Pendergast to continue the Cowboys tradition of fielding top-notch pass defenses and helping Joe Avezzano prepare Dallas' special teams units.

Despite having to integrate four new cornerbacks into the secondary and juggle starting safeties due to late season injuries, Bates, in his first year overseeing the secondary, helped the Cowboys defense finish the season with the third best pass defense in the NFL. Dallas closed the year surrendering only 168.3 passing yards-per-game while holding 10 opponents to 200 passing yards-or-less, including five to 126 yards-or-less. The Cowboys, who extended their streak of consecutive games without allowing a 300-yard passer to 17 (including playoffs), were one of only three teams (Tennessee, Kansas City) to not allow a 300yard passer during the 2000 season. Darren Woodson, despite missing the final five games of the season with a fractured forearm, finished third on the team with 123 tackles, Ryan McNeil posted a career-high 101 stops, while Phillippi Sparks led the team with five interceptions.

Bates' impact at the coaching level paid immediate dividends for the Dallas special teams. After leading the NFL in opponent's average drive start following kickoffs in 1998, the Cowboys continued their excellence in this area in 1999, finishing the year ranked second in the league. Also in 1998, the Cowboys were one of only two NFL teams to be ranked in the top 12 of all four major kicking categories. Bates' input on defense was instrumental as Dallas recorded 24 interceptions in 1999 - the most by a Cowboys club since 1985

One of the NFL's true success stories, Bates' distinguished career (1983-97) was characterized by persistence and an ability to overcome the odds. Starting in 1983 when he made the team as a long-shot rookie free agent, he became a visible figure on the field with his ferocious special teams play. His production as a special teams standout helped propel the NFL into adding a spot on the Pro Bowl teams for special teams coverage players.

A three-year starter at safety (1986-88), Bates was named the Cowboys special teams captain in 1990 a title he held proudly through the three Super Bowl seasons of the '90s. He finished his career with 701 tackles, and he shares the club record for years of service (15) with Mark Tuinei and Ed Jones. Bates also played in 217 regular season games, a figure that is second only to Jones (224) in club annals.

A tremendous competitor right up until his retirement as an active player, Bates topped the 20-tackle barrier on special teams in seven of his final 10 seasons. The 1997 season - his final year as a player also marked the seventh time in the previous nine seasons that he finished either first or second on the team in special teams tackles.



As a safety, and later as a middle linebacker in nickel packages, Bates collected 14 career interceptions, including a fourth quarter theft in Chicago in the 1991 NFC Wild Card Game that helped nail down the Cowboys first playoff victory in nine years. Bates was the first NFL player selected to the Pro Bowl based on special teams coverage ability, representing the NFC in that capacity in 1984.

Bates was a four-year starting safety at the University of Tennessee. He intercepted nine passes and recovered six fumbles in his career and was named second-team All-Southeastern Conference his junior

and senior seasons.

William Frederick Bates was born and raised in Knoxville, TN, where he starred in football, basketball and as a sprinter on the track team at Farragut High School. He was all-state in football and basketball. A 1985 NFL Man of the Year finalist, Bill supports the United Way, the Boys Clubs, the Special Olympics, the March of Dimes and other non-profit organizations. The Bill Bates Foundation was established in 1996 to aid various Metroplex charities. He serves as honorary chairman of the annual Wednesday's Child golf tournament benefiting Dallas-area orphans and of the Keystone Academy golf tournament for the learning disabled. Bill is also active in Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

He and wife Denise live in Dallas. Annually, Denise and Bill serve as course instructors for the Dallas Cowboys Football 101 and 201 for Ladies, which benefits local charities. Bill was named the winner of the Bob Lilly Award in 1990, 1991, 1993 and 1994. The Bill Bates Cowboy Ranch, north of Dallas, has been the setting for Cowboys pep rallies that drew thousands of fans during the Cowboys past playoff trips. The Bates Ranch is also a popular site for several corporate and private outings within the Dallas community. The Bates family includes triplets Graham William, Brianna Gail and Hunter James (5/24/89), Tanner Forest (2/18/91) and Dillon Timothy (7/5/95).

Wes Chandler

Receivers Florida NFL: 2nd Year * Cowboys: 2nd Year

In his first year as the Cowboys' wide receivers coach, Wes Chandler was quickly forced to call on his 11 seasons of NFL playing experience and seven years of NFL Europe coaching experience to help salvage the Dallas passing game. Expected to oversee a receiving corps headed by Raghib Ismail and Joey Galloway, his coaching ability was put to the test when Galloway suffered a season-ending knee injury in the season opener. Eight

weeks later, Ismail suffered the same fate, going down for the season with a similar knee injury.

To the rescue came James McKnight and Wane McGarity, who blossomed under Chandler's tutelage and the newfound playing time. McKnight led the team with career-highs in receptions (52) and receiving yards (926), good for 11th in the NFC. His 17.8 yards-per-catch average was the fourth best in the NFL. McGarity became a dependable third down receiver, finishing with 25 receptions for 250 yards.

Chandler came to Dallas after seven years coaching in NFL Europe, including a stint as head coach of the Berlin Thunder in 1999. He was the offensive coordinator for the Frankfurt Galaxy in 1998 after spending three years (1995-97) with the Rhein Fire. He made his professional coaching debut with the Orlando Thunder (1991-92) of NFL Europe before spending two seasons (1994-95) as the receivers coach at the University of Central Florida. Chandler helped lead three NFL Europe teams to the World Bowl –

Orlando Thunder (1992), Rhein Fire (1997) and Frankfurt Galaxy (1998).

Chandler retired from the NFL during the 1988 season after an 11-year playing career. At the time of his retirement, he ranked 12th in NFL history in receiving yards (8,966) and 13th in receptions (559). He earned four Pro Bowl selections in his career, including three while playing for the San Diego Chargers (1981-87) under Don Coryell and Ernie Zampese. In the strike-shortened season of 1982 – his first full season in San Diego – he caught 49 passes for 1,032 yards (21.1 avg.) and nine touchdowns in eight games. He averaged an NFL record 129.0 receiving yards-per-game that season. During that record setting season, Chandler set, and still owns, the Chargers single game receiving yardage record with 260 yards on 10 receptions against Cincinnati on Dec. 20, 1982. He began his career with the New Orleans Saints (1978-81), who drafted Chandler with the third overall selection in the 1978 NFL Draft. Chandler was leading the NFL in receiving when the Saints traded him to the Chargers during the 1981 season.

After retiring from the NFL, Chandler spent three years (1989-91) as the head football coach/athletic director for Father Lopez High School in Daytona Beach, FL. In 1993, he worked at the Wes Chandler Youth

Foundation, which he founded in 1982 in Daytona Beach.

Chandler was a three-year starter for the University of Florida, where he was a consensus All-America and was voted Florida Amateur Athlete-of-the-Year in 1977. He was also an Academic All-America selection as a junior and senior. He finished his collegiate career with 1,994 receiving yards and 22 touchdowns. He lettered in football, basketball, basketball and track at New Smyrna Beach, FL, High School.

WES CHANDLER COACHING STAFF

Wesley Sandy Chandler earned his bachelor's degree in speech pathology from Florida. He was the founder of a men's service group, "Board of Distinction," in New Orleans, His Wes Chandler Youth Foundation, now part of the Boys and Girls Clubs, has helped such Florida youth as Vince Carter of the NBA's Toronto Raptors. He has a son, Lamar Saxton.

George Edwards

Linebackers Duke NFL: 4th Year * Cowboys: 4th Year



In three seasons as an NFL coach, George Edwards has established himself as a sound teacher, producing excellent results with a young group of linebackers.

Under the leadership of Edwards, Dallas saw two of its young linebackers post career-high tackle totals in 2000. The blossoming of strongside linebacker Darren Hambrick, who led the team with a career-high 154

tackles in just his second season as a starter, was the biggest surprise. Hambrick recorded the highest tackle total by a Dallas linebacker since Robert Jones recorded 162 stops in 1994. Runner-up on the tackle chart was weakside linebacker Dexter Coakley with a career-high 144 tackles. Because of injuries, Edwards shuffled Dat Nguyen and Barron Wortham in and out of the lineup at middle linebacker all season, and the duo combined for 156 tackles, including 10 behind the line of scrimmage.

In 1999, Coakley was selected to the Pro Bowl, becoming the first Dallas linebacker since Ken Norton Jr. in 1993 to earn that distinction. Coakley finished the year second on the team with 131 tackles, while leading the Cowboys with four interceptions. Randall Godfrey led Dallas in tackles with 143 stops. The season also began the emergence of first-year starter Hambrick, who started 12 games at strongside linebacker and finished the year with 62 tackles.

In his rookie season as an NFL coach, Edwards saw all three of his starters top the 100-tackle plateau and finish second, third and fourth on the team in tackles. Second-year starters Coakley and Godfrey continued their development, with each posting 100-plus tackle seasons for the second consecutive year.

Edwards spent the 1997 season as the defensive line coach at the University of Georgia, where the Buildogs went 10-2, including a win over Wisconsin in the Outback Bowl, and finished the season ranked 10th in the final Associated Press poll. Along the way, the Georgia defense helped shut out Mississippi State 47-0, marking the first SEC shutout for the Dawgs since 1982.

In 1996, Edwards was the inside linebackers coach at Duke, his alma mater. He joined the Blue Devils after four seasons at Appalachian State University, where he coached outside linebackers in 1992-93 before taking over responsibility for all linebackers in 1994-95. While at Appalachian State, he coached Coakley, a two-time Division I-AA National Defensive Player of the Year and an all-rookie selection as a third-round draft choice of the Cowboys in 1997.

During his four-year tenure at ASU, Edwards coached two All-America and five All-Southern Conference award winning linebackers. The Mountaineers posted a 32-17 record, including a 12-1 mark in 1995, and gualified for postseason play three times during his stint in Boone, NC.

Edwards began his coaching career working with linebackers as a graduate assistant under Steve Spurrier at the University of Florida in 1991-92. In his two seasons at Florida, the Gators were 19-4, capturing the Southeastern Conference title and a spot in the Sugar Bowl following the 1991 season.

A 1989 Duke graduate, Edwards earned four letters as a linebacker with the Blue Devils. He led the team with 116 tackles in his senior season, a year the Blue Devils tied for the Atlantic Coast Conference crown and made an appearance in the All-American Bowl. Named the most valuable linebacker in 1989, Edwards was an honorable mention All-ACC selection as a senior under Spurrier. He also served two seasons as special teams captain.

A native of Siler City, NC, Edwards was a three-time all-conference and all-county choice at Jordan-Matthews High School, and he was also an academic All-America pick as a senior. Edwards graduated from Duke with a political science degree and did post-graduate study at Florida. George and wife Jami live in Coppell, TX, with their son, B.J. (1/25/00).

Steve Hoffman

Kickers/Quality Control

Dickinson College

NFL: 13th Year * Cowboys: 13th Year



Since joining the Cowboys in 1989, Steve Hoffman has undertaken the unenviable task of identifying and developing young kickers and punters. His challenges over the past 12 years have been highly visible, and his impressive results have allowed him to develop an outstanding reputation around the NFL.

around the NFL.

Hoffman has successfully recruited five rookie or first-year free agent

kickers to Dallas. All five – Ken Willis, Lin Elliott, Chris Boniol, Richie Cunningham and Tim Seder – kicked at least 18 field goals in their first NFL season. Using five different placekickers over the past eight years, the Cowboys have connected on 238-of-292 field goal attempts for a success rate of 81.5% – including playoffs and two Super Bowls.

Hoffman has also brought three rookie free agent punters to Dallas – John Jett, Toby Gowin and Micah Knorr. Hoffman helped develop Jett into a four-year veteran who performed on two Super Bowl Championship clubs and Gowin into one of the league's top young punters and kickoff specialists. Over the past eight seasons, these two and Knorr combined to average 42.4 yards-per-punt – including postseason

The 2000 season represented another challenge for Hoffman, as he introduced a rookie kicker and punter to the rigors of the National Football League. Both flourished in their first professional season, with Knorr establishing a club rookie record with a gross punting average of 42.8 yards-per-punt. Doubling as the Cowboys kickoff specialist, Knorr finished eighth in the NFL with 10 touchbacks, but had the second highest percentage of touchbacks (17.5% – 10-0f-57) in the league. Seder connected on his first seven and 13 of his first 14 field goal attempts to open his professional career. He finished his first season by setting a club record for field goals made in a season by a rookie, hitting 25-of-33. His 75.8% accuracy rate marked the second highest percentage for a rookie in club history, just missing the club mark of 75.9% (Chris Boniol – 1994).

Hoffman's expertise in developing battle-ready kicking specialists was no more evident than in 1997, when he introduced Cunningham and Gowin to the pressures of performing in the NFL. Cunningham responded to the challenge by hitting 34 of his first 37 career field goal attempts, including a mid-season streak of 18 straight successful attempts. After finishing the 1997 season as the NFL's second leading scorer with 126 points, Cunningham was named All-Pro by the Associated Press and *The Sporting News*.

Gowin, who doubled as the Cowboys punter and kickoff man, turned in a season-long average of 41.8 yards, and his net average of 35.4 was second best among all NFL rookie punters. His kickoffs averaged 66.6 yards and he registered 12 touchbacks. Gowin capped his best season in Dallas in 1999 by averaging 43.2 yards-per-attempt (seventh in the NFL) before leaving for New Orleans via free agency.

Both Boniol and Jett departed the Cowboys following the 1996 season after very productive careers in Dallas. Boniol nailed his last 27 straight field goal attempts in 1996, after hitting his last 25 in a row in 1995. He closed his three-year Cowboys career by hitting on 81-of-93 field goals (87.1%), while Jett crafted a four-year average of 41.9 yards-per-punt.

As a rookie in 1994, Boniol hit on 22-of-29 field goal attempts (75.9%) to set a team record for field goal percentage by a rookie. In 1995, Boniol hit on 27 of his 28 field goal attempts (a team record 96.4% and the second best mark in NFL history at the time), and he also scored 127 points to establish a club-record for points by a kicker.

In 1993, Hoffman introduced free agent punter John Jett to the NFL. The newcomer responded by finishing the year ranked third in the NFL in net punting average (37.7).

Hoffman discovered a pair of rookie free agent placekickers in 1990 and 1992, and each went on to establish Dallas records for scoring by a rookie. In 1990, Ken Willis set the mark with 90 points, and in 1992, rookie Lin Elliott shattered that standard by scoring 119 points.

After joining the Cowboys as kicking coach in 1989, Hoffman added quality control duties in 1990. He currently coordinates computer scouting of Cowboys future opponents, while providing internal analysis of the Cowboys own tendencies and productivity.

From 1985-87, Hoffman oversaw kickers at the University of Miami, where one of his charges was Jeff Feagles, an 11-year pro who punted for Seattle last season. Hoffman also was a top instructor for Ray Pelfrey's kicking camps, where his students included Barry Helton, who booted for the L.A. Rams, and Brian Hansen, the Saints' all-time leading punter.

Hoffman spent two springs in Italy as offensive coordinator of the Bellusco Seahawks (1987) and Rho Blacknights (1988). In the fall of 1988, he coached at Sunset High School in Miami.


In 1983, Hoffman punted for the Washington Federals of the USFL. He also went to training camp with the Redskins in 1981 and 1983, Seattle in 1984 and New Orleans in 1985.

Born in Camden, NJ (9/8/58), Hoffman starred in baseball and football at York Suburban High School in York, PA. He earned All-Mid-Atlantic Conference honors at Dickinson College, where he played quarter-




back, running back and wide receiver while handling the punting duties. Hoffman earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in economics from Dickinson and a Master of Science in sports administration from St. Thomas (FL). He met his wife, Raffaella, while coaching in Italy, they now reside in Coppell, TX, with their daughter, Micaela (10/18/95), and son, Lucas (5/29/97).

Hudson Houck





In his eight years in Dallas, Hudson Houck has molded the Cowboys offensive line into one of the top units in league history. During his tenure, the Cowboys have surrendered just 203 sacks (1.6 per game) while guiding the offense to top eight rankings in total offense four times. Dallas is one of only three teams in the NFL to have allowed fewer than 40 sacks in each of the last eight years and the only team to have surrendered fewer

than 20 sacks multiple times (three). Prior to Houck's arrival in Dallas, the Cowboys had allowed fewer than 30 sacks in a season only once in franchise history. Dallas has accomplished that feat six times during Houck's tenure. The 203 sacks allowed from 1993-00 are the fewest in the NFL – Miami is second with 225. The Dallas line has led the NFC in fewest sacks allowed in five of Houck's seven seasons. During his 17-year NFL career, his lines have helped running backs produce six NFL rushing titles and 16 1,000-yard rushing seasons. In addition, Dallas is the only team in the NFL to have produced a 1,000-yard rushier in each of the last seven seasons.

While with Dallas, six different offensive linemen have landed in the Pro Bowl at least two times each: Larry Allen (six appearances), Nate Newton (five), Erik Williams (four), Ray Donaldson (two), Mark Stepnoski (two) and Mark Tuinei (two). In all, six linemen have made 21 trips to the Pro Bowl in the last eight years, a total matched by no other NFL team.

During the 2000 season, Houck's offensive line allowed just 35 sacks in 480 pass plays, and six times during the season an opponent was limited to one or fewer sacks. Led by Larry Allen, who earned his sixth consecutive Pro Bowl selection, this unit opened the holes that allowed Emmitt Smith to rush for 1,203 yards and nine touchdowns. It was the 10th consecutive season Smith had topped the 1,000-yard barrier, tying the NFL record.

In 1999, Houck returned only one starting lineman to the position he played in 1998 (Williams – right tackle). Despite this positional overhaul, the Cowboys finished the year second in the NFL in fewest sacks allowed (24) and third in fewest yards lost by sack (151). This group allowed Smith to rush for over 1,000 yards (1,397 yards) for the ninth consecutive year. Following the season, Allen earned his fifth Pro Bowl selection at his third different position (right guard – 1995-97, left tackle – 1998 and left guard – 1999), while Williams earned his fourth trip to Hawaii.

In 1998, Houck moved Allen from right guard to left tackle, changed starting centers at mid-season and relied on rookie Flozell Adams, a second round draft pick, at right guard for most of the year. Despite these changes, Dallas led the NFL in fewest sacks allowed with 19 — tying the second lowest figure in club history. With this protection, Troy Aikman threw a career-low five interceptions, and Smith rushed for over 1,000 yards (1,332). Allen and Newton each earned a trip to the Pro Bowl following the season, allowing Allen to become just the third player in league history to be selected to the Pro Bowl at more than one offensive line position during his career (selected at guard from 1995-97).

In 1997 Smith topped the 1,000 yard rushing mark, and for the third straight year, Aikman was healthy and able to start all season. Following the season, Allen and Williams each made their third appearance in the Pro Bowl.

Houck's 1996 squad equaled the feat of the 1995 group by sending a club-record four members to the Pro Bowl. Allen, Donaldson, Newton and Williams represented Dallas in Hawaii, and along with Tuinei, allowed just 19 sacks on the year, fewest in the NFL and one shy of the club record that group established in 1995 with 18 sacks allowed.

The 1995 squad first established a club record when four members, Allen, Donaldson, Newton and Tuinei, were selected to the Pro Bowl. The line established a club record by allowing just 18 sacks, the second fewest allowed in the NFL in 1995. Also in 1995, Houck's line led Smith to his fourth NFL rushing title in five years, a NFL record 25 rushing touchdowns and a club record 1,773 yards rushing.

The pass protection marks set by the 1994 squad were done despite losing All-Pro tackle Williams to injury seven games into the season. Houck placed a rookie Allen, a second-round draft choice, in Williams' spot at right tackle. Allen went on to start 10 games for Dallas and earned consensus All-Rookie honors. The line once again led the NFC in fewest sacks allowed (fourth in the NFL) at 20.



During his first season in Dallas, the offensive line allowed just 29 sacks, the fewest in the NFC and the third fewest in the NFL. At the same time, Smith grabbed his third straight NFL rushing title – only the fourth player in league history to accomplish that feat – while averaging 5.3 yards-per-carry. The Pro Bowl selection of Newton, Stepnoski and Williams after the season marked the first time in club history that three offensive linemen had represented the team in Hawaii.

Prior to coming to Dallas, Houck spent 1992 coaching the offensive line for the Seattle Seahawks. His group of linemen opened holes that allowed Chris Warren to rush for 4.6 yards-per-carry and 1,017 yards,

just the fifth 1,000-yard rushing season in club history and the first since 1988.

Before joining Seattle, Houck spent nine years coaching the offensive line for the L.A. Rams. From 1983 to 1991, no team sent more offensive linemen to the Pro Bowl than the Rams. In all, five Rams' linemen made twenty-one trips to Hawaii, including Jackie Slater (seven trips) and Doug Smith (six).

The excellence of the offensive line translated into a 1,000-yard rusher in seven of Houck's nine seasons with the Rams, including four NFL rushing titles in the five years from 1983-87. Running the ball wash't the Rams only weapon, as Jim Everett passed for more yards from 1989-91 than any other quarterback in the NFL. Because of the pass protection provided by the offensive line, Everett did not miss a

start from 1988-91.

Houck began a 16-year collaboration with John Robinson in 1976 at his alma mater, the University of Southern California. During his tenure at USC, Houck served as offensive line coach, guiding a group that would open holes for Heisman Trophy winners Charles White and Marcus Allen. While at USC, seven of Houck's offensive linemen went on to achieve All-America status and play in the NFL; Marvin Powell (Jets), Pat Howell (Oilers), Brad Budde (Chiefs), Keith Van Horne (Bears), Roy Foster (Dolphins/49ers), Bruce Matthews (Oilers/Titans) and Don Mosebar (Raiders).

Houck graduated from USC after playing three seasons as a center from 1962-64, including the Trojans' 1962 national championship team. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Crescenta Valley, CA, High School in 1966. He served two years in the United States Army from 1967-68 before returning to Crescenta Valley in 1969. From 1970-71, he served his first stint as an assistant at USC before

moving on to coach the offensive line at Stanford from 1972-75.

Houck, who attended Eagle Rock High School in Los Angeles, CA, is a supporter of The Rise School of Dallas, a nonprofit organization providing educational services to children with Down Syndrome. He and his offensive linemen, in conjunction with The Rise School of Dallas, have participated in the First Downs for Down Syndrome fund raising program. Hudson (1/7/43) has a son, Troy. His wife Elsie has two children, Scott and Holly.

Jim Jeffcoat Defensive Ends

Arizona State
NFL: 4th Year * Cowboys: 4th Year

After spending two years as Dallas' assistant defensive line coach, Jim Jeffcoat took over the responsibility of coaching the Cowboys defensive ends in 2000, and his young charges showed dramatic improvement as the year progressed. Hired as a full-time Dallas assistant in 1998, Jeffcoat often calls upon his 15 years of NFL playing experience to help tutor the Cowboys who now follow in his footsteps as one of the franchise's

most productive and consistent defensive ends.

In Jeffcoat's first year overseeing the defensive ends, his unit accounted for 16.5 of Dallas' 25 sacks in 2000, with second-year end Ebenezer Ekuban leading the way with 6.5. Third-year man Greg Ellis tied for the team lead in tackles behind the line of scrimmage with seven totaling losses of 16 yards while posting a career-high 77 tackles to lead all linemen. Under Jeffcoat's guidance, both players overcame adversity with character and persistence. Ekuban handled the responsibility of starting at an early stage in his career while fighting through injuries, while Ellis was forced to battle back from a severely fractured leg that brought an abrupt end to his 1999 season.

In 1999, Jeffcoat assisted with a Cowboys defensive line that produced three linemen who each totaled over 50 tackles for the year. Chad Hennings led the way with a career-high 92 tackles, while Kavika Pittman added a career-high 74 and Ellis recorded 59 in 13 games. Ellis' team leading 7.5 sacks was the Cowboys highest sack total since Tony Tolbert registered 12.0 in 1996. All totaled, the Dallas defensive line accounted for 28.5 of the team's 35 sacks. Alonzo Spellman led the team in quarterback pressures with 22, while Kavika Pittman added 21 and Ellis 17. Pittman also finished second on the team with 10 passes defensed, the highest total for a Cowboys lineman since Ed "Too Tall" Jones batted down 14 in 1988. First-round draft choice Ekuban saw action in Dallas' defensive end rotation and earned All-Rookie honors from *Pro Football Weekly* and *Football News*.

In 1998, Ellis became the first Dallas Cowboys rookie to start a season at defensive end since Bob Lilly in 1961. Ellis, who topped all defensive linemen with 63 tackles, led four Dallas defensive linemen that finished with more than 50 tackles – Pittman (59), Hennings (55) and Leon Lett (51). It marked the first time since 1990 that four lineman had recorded over 50 tackles in a season. Cowboys ends accounted for 17 of the teams' 34 sacks, with Pittman recording a team-high six and Ellis and Michael Myers contributing three each.

Jeffcoat joined the coaching ranks after finishing his playing career with 102.5 career sacks, 745 tackles and 194 quarterback pressures. Jeffcoat played in 227 games from 1983 to 1997, placing him among the top 40 players all-time in number of games played. He spent the first 12 years of his career with Dallas after being selected in the first round of the 1983 NFL Draft, and he was a member of the Cowboys' teams that won Super Bowls XXVII and XXVIII. Jeffcoat has played for or coached with all five head coaches in

Cowboys history.

During his 12-year stint with the Cowboys, Jeffcoat totaled 698 tackles, 94.5 sacks and 149 quarterback pressures. His best season in Dallas was 1989, when he finished with a career-high 100 tackles, a career-high 42 quarterback pressures, 11.5 sacks and a career-high three fumble recoveries. He registered five seasons with 70-or-more tackles and five seasons with 10-or-more sacks in Dallas. He tied the Cowboys team record for sacks in a game when he registered five sacks at Washington on November 10, 1985.

Jeffcoat was a three-year starter at Arizona State University from 1980-82, where he earned All-PAC 10 and honorable mention All-America honors. He was inducted into the Arizona State Hall of Fame on Oct. 22, 1994 after being named to the all-time Fiesta Bowl team in 1991. Jeffcoat earned All-America

football honors at Matawan, NJ, Regional High School while also lettering in wrestling.


Jeffcoat was awarded the New Jersey Sportswriter's Association Unsung Hero Award for his community service in 1991. At the Cowboys' 2000 training camp, Jeffcoat and his defensive players participated in the club's tackling hunger "Lineman Weigh-In" sponsored by Campbell Soup, donating a total of 21,064 cans of soup to The Salvation Army Irving Corps and Faith Mission Food Bank in Wichita Falls. He earned his bachelor's degree in communications and his Masters in Business Administration from ASU. He and wife Tammy have four children: Jaren (10/1/87), twins, Jackson and Jacqueline (12/26/90), and Jasmine (2/15/99).

Strength and Conditioning





Joe Juraszek (pronounced jer-ASS-ick) joined the Cowboys staff as the strength and conditioning coach in February, 1997 and implemented a hands-on approach that stresses strength development, cardiovascular work, flexibility and speed work. His ability to tailor workout programs to individual player needs based on the player's input and workout history has given him the respect and admiration of the players and the coaching staff.

The rapport Juraszek, along with assistants Bennie Wylie and Tony Ollison, has developed with the players is evident in the number of participants in his offseason conditioning program each spring. The impact of this intensive program can also be seen on the field in the development of and contributions from younger players like Dexter Coakley, Greg Ellis, Flozell Adams, Ebenezer Ekuban, Solomon Page and Izell Reese.

Along with overseeing the strength and conditioning programs for the team, Juraszek also works with the Cowboys medical staff implementing rehabilitation programs for injured players. His work within these rehab programs has allowed players to return to the playing field quickly and, usually, stronger.

Juraszek came to Dallas after serving as the University of Oklahoma strength coach from 1993-96. He joined the Sooners after serving as the strength coach at Texas Tech University from 1987-92. He was a graduate assistant and then a full-time assistant strength coach for Oklahoma from 1981-86.

He attended the University of New Mexico from 1976-81, where he played linebacker and defensive end for the Lobos while earning bachelor's degrees in Physical Education/Health and Economics. He added a master's degree in Economics while serving as a graduate assistant strength coach at Oklahoma.

In January, 2001, Juraszek was a panel member for the "Get & Stay Fit" Family First Town Meeting hosted by WFAA-TV, Dallas' ABC affiliate. He joined Dr. Kenneth Cooper, founder and president of the Cooper Fitness Center and Clinic in Dallas, and Dr. Joel Steinberg, Medical Director of Children's Medical Center of Dallas, in providing advice on exercise training, preventative health tips and the latest facts on dieting.

A native of Chicago, IL (6/8/58), Juraszek and his wife, Camille, have a daughter, Nikki Jo, and a son, J.D.

Andre Patterson **Defensive Tackles** Montana NFL: 5th Year * Cowboys: 2nd Year



Regarded as one of the NFL's finest teachers of defensive line play. Andre Patterson was hired to coach the Cowbovs defensive tackles prior to the start of the 2000 season. His abilities to mold and develop young players will be called upon in the next few years as Dallas builds a defensive interior around youth and new faces.

In his first year on the job, season ending injuries to starting defensive

tackles Chad Hennings and Leon Lett forced Patterson to accelerate the learning and development process for several young players in 2000, and, by season's end, his youngsters were providing solid results. First-year defensive tackle Dimitrius Underwood collected three sacks and nine of his team-high 14 quarterback pressures in the final six games of the year. Second-year man Brandon Noble had a careerhigh 69 tackles and ranked third on the team in quarterback pressures with 10, while third-year man Michael Myers added a career-best 46 tackles.

Before joining the Cowboys, Patterson's three previous years in the NFL were all spent with teams that

advanced to the playoffs - Minnesota (1998 and 1999) and New England (1997).

In two seasons with the Vikings (1998-99), Patterson worked with two of the top pass rushers in NFL history in John Randle (106 career sacks) - who recorded double-figure sack totals in both seasons under Patterson – and Chris Doleman (150.5 career sacks). In 1999, the Vikings defense finished fifth in the NFC in fewest points allowed (335), while Randle led the team in sacks (10). In addition, Duane Clemons finished second on the team with a career-high nine sacks.

In 1998, Patterson led a unit that was a big part of the Vikings defense that shut out opponents in 29of-73 quarters (including playoffs), held the opposition to 296 points (sixth best in the NFL) and had the second best turnover ratio (+14) in the NFL. Randle led the squad in sacks (10.5) and quarterback hurries

(80), while defensive end Derrick Alexander had a career-high 7.5 sacks

Patterson joined the Vikings for the 1998 season after spending the 1997 season as a defensive assistant with the New England Patriots. In his first NFL season, he helped guide the Patriots to a 10-6 record and the AFC Eastern Division title. Patterson spent most of his time working with defensive line coach Ray Hamilton. The Patriots finished the campaign with 45 sacks, the second highest total in team history. Henry Thomas led the defensive line with seven sacks. New England's defense tied for fourth in the NFL in turnover margin (+10) and fifth in the NFL against the run.

Prior to joining the Patriots, Patterson spent three seasons as the head coach at Cal-Poly-San Luis Obispo (1994-96). When he arrived at Cal-Poly, the school had just made the jump from Division II to I-AA. In his first season as a head coach, Patterson led the Mustangs to the American West Conference title with a 7-4 record and earned American West Coach of the Year honors. The following season, the Mustangs finished second in the country in passing yards (344.9 ypg) and total offense (495.9 ypg), second only to Montana, the eventual I-AA national champion. The Mustangs averaged 37.4 points-per-game, sixth in the

country, and placed two players on the All-America team.

Prior to joining the Mustangs, Patterson coached the defensive line at Washington State for two seasons (1992-93) under former Cougars and current Cowboys defensive coordinator Mike Zimmer - his second stint with Zimmer. While with the Cougars, Patterson coached future NFL linemen Chad Eaton and Lewis Bush. The pair helped set a Pac-10 single-season record with 60 sacks in 1992.

In 1990, Patterson joined the staff at Cornell for two seasons as the defensive line coach, In 1990, Cornell claimed the Ivy League title, powered by a defensive unit which ranked second in the conference.

In 1989, Patterson served as the defensive coordinator at Western Washington University. That year, his defense set an NAIA record for limiting an opponent to minus nine yards passing in a game. He first crossed paths with Zimmer in 1988, when Patterson was coaching the defensive line at Weber State and Zimmer was defensive coordinator.

Patterson coached at St. Monica, CA, High School, in 1987-88. In 1983, he accepted a teaching and coaching position at Renton High School in Washington, where he served as the defensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 1983-86.

Patterson began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Montana, in 1982

Patterson played two seasons at Contra Coast Junior College as an offensive lineman before transfer-

ring to Montana in 1981. He played one season at Montana before knee injuries ended his playing career. Andre Patterson was an all-league center and nose guard at Harry Ells High School in Richmond, VA. He earned his Associate of Art degree from Contra Costa Junior College in San Pablo, CA, in 1980. Patterson received his bachelor's degree in secondary education from the University of Montana in 1983. He was a keynote speaker on Academics and Athletics for the National Rainbow Coalition Convention with Reverend Jesse Jackson. Patterson and his defensive line participated in the Chunky NFL Tackling Hunger Lineman Weigh-In. The group weighed-in at 21,064 cans of Campbell's soup which was donated to the Irving Salvation Army and Faith Mission Food Bank in Wichita Falls, TX. Patterson coached the El Cerreto boys baseball team to a second place finish to Cuba in the 1979 Boys Baseball World Series. He and wife Donna have a son, Andre Jr. (5/19/92), and a daughter, Ashmera (8/13/98).

Clancy Pendergast



Secondary **Arizona**

NFL: 7th Year * Cowboys: 6th Year

After four years serving the dual role of defensive assistant/quality control for the Cowboys, Clancy Pendergast oversaw the club's defensive nickel package in 2000. This season, those duties expand as he becomes the club's secondary coach.

Pendergast faced a number of challenges in his first year with the nickel defense. But despite starting five different line-ups and eight differ-

ent players in the secondary over the course of the 2000 season, the Dallas defense finished the year ranked third in the NFL is pass defense. Darren Woodson (123) and Ryan McNeil (101) each topped the 100-tackle plateau, while Phillippi Sparks, who joined the team the week of the season opener, led the team with five interceptions.

In his first four season with Dallas, Pendergast's work as a defensive assistant, helping with the linebackers in particular, was an integral part of the defense's success. During that time, he helped incorporate youngsters Dexter Coakley, Randall Godfrey, Darren Hambrick and Dat Nguyen into the lineup as valuable contributors. Coakley evolved from a rookie third-round draft choice in 1997 to a Pro Bowl selection in 1999. In addition, he has finished in the top three in tackles for the club in each of his four seasons. In 1999, Coakley also led the club with four interceptions -- the most by a Dallas linebacker since Lee Roy Jordan had six in 1975

Pendergast also helped work Darren Hambrick, a 1998 fifth-round draft choice, into the starting lineup at strongside linebacker in 1999, and Hambrick responded with 62 tackles, 2.5 sacks and two interceptions in his first year as a starter.

The play of Dallas' linebackers in 1998 helped the Cowboys improve their run defense from 24th to 12th in the NFL. Coakley led the group with 127 tackles, second on the team, Fred Strickland finished third on the team with 117 stops, and Godfrey totaled 115 tackles to finish fourth.

The Cowboys linebackers also finished 1997 as the team's second, third and fourth leading tacklers. Godfrey led the group with 149 stops. Coakley started all year at weakside linebacker and recorded 136 tackles, the club-record for tackles by a rookie.

In 1996, the Dallas linebackers were led by Fred Strickland, who recorded a team and career-high 153 tackles. Pendergast worked closely with rookie draft pick Godfrey, helping him earn a starting spot

at strongside linebacker by Week 11 against Green Bay (11/18/96).

Pendergast spent the 1995 season with the Houston Oilers as a defensive assistant and quality control coach. He joined the Oilers from Alabama-Birmingham, where he was named the tight ends coach in January of 1995. Prior to his short stint at UAB, Pendergast spent the 1993-94 seasons working with the tight ends and as an advance scout at Oklahoma. In 1992, Pendergast was a defensive assistant at Southern Cal. After earning his bachelor's degree from Arizona (1990), Pendergast worked the 1991 season as a graduate assistant at Mississippi State, helping with the receivers and working as an advance

Pendergast (11/29/67) is a native of Phoenix, AZ.

Jack Reilly

Offensive Coordinator

Long Beach State NFL: 12th Year ★ Cowboys: 3rd Year



Jack Reilly enters his 34th year of coaching and his second stint as an NFL offensive coordinator. Since returning to Dallas as the offensive coordinator in 2000, Reilly has faced the challenging task of directing a unit that has seen transition and change at the quarterback position. That theme will take on a new look in 2001 as Reilly guides Tony Banks at the helm of the offense after Banks signed with the Cowboys as a free agent in the spring.

Reilly previously coached Banks as a rookie (1996) in St. Louis when Reilly was the Rams offensive coordinator (1995-96). Reilly's initial stint on the Cowboys staff was in 1997, when he served as quarter-backs coach under Ernie Zampese.

In 2000, Reilly oversaw an offense that was riddled with injuries at the quarterback and wide receiver positions. Three different quarterbacks started at least two games, working through injury problems that forced starter Troy Aikman to miss five starts and considerable action in three other outings. The Cowboys starting wide receivers missed a combined total of 22 starts due to knee injuries, as Joey Galloway was lost for the year in the season opener and Rocket Ismail was felled in Week Nine.

Despite the injuries that led to continuity problems, Reilly was still able to direct Emmitt Smith to a 10th straight 1,000 yard season (1,203) as the future Hall of Fame back moved to within 103 yards of catching Barry Sanders as the game's second all-time leading rusher. Dallas finished the season ranked 12th in the NFL in rushing with a 122 yard average.

Reilly's guidance of second-year quarterback Anthony Wright enabled the youngster to relieve the injured Aikman and bring home a win over Washington in Week 13. The following week, Wright nearly helped pull off an upset of the eventual NFC Champion N.Y. Giants in a 17-13 defeat.

Prior to his return to Dallas, Reilly served as the New England Patriots quarterbacks coach for two years. In 1999, the Patriots finished 10th in the league in passing offense (227.3 yards-per-game) and quarterback Drew Bledsoe threw for 3,985 yards, the third highest of his career and the second best in the AFC (Manning – 4,135). In 1998, Bledsoe threw for 3,633 yards – the fourth best total of his career – and had a career low 14 interceptions despite missing the final two games of the season due to injury. The Patriots offense boasted the fifth ranked passing offense in the league, averaging 228.8 yards-per-game.

As the Cowboys quarterbacks coach in 1997, he was the first assistant coach in Dallas to work exclusively with the quarterbacks in a non-coordinator's role since the 1989 season. Under Reilly's watchful eye, Aikman threw for the second highest touchdown total of his career (19) while watching his interception ratio drop from 2.8 in 1996 to 2.3 in 1997.

In his two seasons as offensive coordinator for the St. Louis Rams (1995-96), he helped the Rams improve from 21st in the league in total offense in 1994 to 15th in his first season. The Rams offense averaged 327.3 yards-per-game in 1995, including 237.8 passing to finish ninth in the NFL. Under his tutelage, Pro Bowl wide receiver Isaac Bruce recorded the second highest single-season receiving yardage total in NFL history (1,781) in 1995 while finishing second in the league to Jerry Rice (1,848).

Prior to his work with the Rams, Reilly spent the 1994 season as the Los Angeles Raiders running backs coach on Art Shell's staff and was an offensive assistant with San Diego from 1990-93. In his final two seasons in San Diego, he called the plays as the Chargers pass-offense coordinator, and in 1992, the club won 11 of its last 12 regular season games to claim the AFC Western Division title.

Reilly entered the NFL after five years (1985-89) as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Utah, where he guided the development of current NFL quarterback Scott Mitchell. Reilly directed an offense that led the nation with an average of 396 passing yards a game and 547 total yards a game in 1988. Utah ranked second in the nation in passing in 1989 and third in 1987. Mitchell, an All-America selection as a junior, finished his collegiate career with 10 NCAA and five Western Athletic Conference records in addition to virtually every school passing record.


Reilly also coached five years at El Camino College in Inglewood, CA, (1980-84), serving as head coach his final three seasons and posting a 19-10 record. He began his coaching career in 1968 at Beverly Hills High School in Los Angeles. After 12 seasons, including the last five as head coach, Reilly made his move to El Camino.

Born in Boston, MA, Reilly grew up in Southern California. He played quarterback at Culver City High School before moving on to play collegiately at Washington State, Santa Monica College, where he earned junior college All-America honors, and Long Beach State, where he earned Little All-America honors.

Reilly and his wife, Wendy, have a son, Chris, and two daughters Corrie and Katie.

Clarence Shelmon

Running Backs

Houston NFL: 11th Year ★ Cowboys: 4th Year



During his 10-year NFL coaching career, Clarence Shelmon has tutored some of the NFL's elite running backs to record setting performances. In three seasons in Dallas, he has guided the fortunes of the NFL's leading active runner in Emmitt Smith (15,166 career yards – third on the NFL's all-time rushing chart behind Walter Payton – 16,726 and Barry Sanders – 15,269). Under Shelmon's watchful eye, Smith has accumulat-

ed 3,932 rushing yards to move from 11th to third on the NFL's all-time rushing list. In Seattle, where he coached for six years before coming to Dallas, he helped lead former Cowboy Chris Warren to the top of

the Seahawks' all-time rushing list.

Smith and Warren again led Dallas' rushing attack in 2000, with Smith rushing for 1,203 yards, the fourth best total in the NFC. During the season, Smith became only the third player in NFL history to rush for over 15,000 career yards. In the process, he eclipsed the 100-yard barrier six times, marking the eighth time in his 11-year career he has surpassed the 100-yard mark at least six times in a season. Warren finished second on the team with 254 rushing yards while averaging 4.3 yards-per-carry. Shelmon also worked fifth-round draft choice Michael Wiley into the mix as a third-down back, and he rushed for 88 yards while catching 14 passes in limited playing time. Shelmon further developed fullback Robert Thomas, who was playing only his second season at fullback, helping him rush for 51 yards while catching 23 passes.

In 1999, Smith and Warren combined for 1,800 rushing yards, allowing the Cowboys to finish the season ranked sixth in the NFL in rushing offense. Smith's 1,397 yards were the fourth highest total in the NFL, and he tallied nine 100-yard rushing games during the season – the second highest single season total of his career. Along the way, Shelmon molded Thomas into the Cowboys starting fullback after spending the first year of his NFL career as a linebacker. Thomas replaced Daryl Johnston, who was lost for the

year in the season opening game.

Shelmon's first season in Dallas (1998) produced solid results as Smith registered his highest single season rushing total (1,332) since 1995, and Warren compiled a team-leading 4.9 yards-per-carry rushing average. In Week Five at Washington (10/4), the Dallas ground game hit its stride as both Smith (120 yards) and Warren (104) topped the 100-yard rushing barrier, marking the first time a pair of Cowboy backs had eclipsed the century mark in the same game since 1978. The Dallas offense finished the year averaging 125.9 rushing yards-per-game, an improvement of nearly 25 yards-per-game over the previous year's average. Smith continued to add to his brilliant career by surpassing several career milestones, most notably moving into the top spot on the Cowboys all-time rushing list and becoming the NFL's all-time leader in career rushing touchdowns (currently at 145).

Shelmon joined the Cowboys after six seasons working with the Seattle Seahawks' running backs. The Seahawks finished among the NFL's top five rushing teams in four of his last five seasons in Seattle after

taking over the league's 20th ranked running game when he joined the club in 1992.

Shelmon inherited Warren, who had 24 rushing yards in his first two seasons, and helped turn him into a four-time 1,000-yard rusher (1992-95), a streak that was broken in 1996 due to injury. Warren bounced back in 1997 with 847 yards (4.2 yards-per-carry) and became the franchise's all-time leading rusher on the last carry of the season when he gained the 6,706th yard of his career, breaking Curt Warner's club mark of 6,705 career rushing yards. Warren's 1,545 yards and 4.6 yards-per-carry in 1994 led the AFC and set a franchise record. His 15 rushing touchdowns in 1995 also led the AFC and his 1,346 rushing yards that season ranks fourth in Seahawks history for a single-season. His 24 100-yard games is another record.

Shelmon was also responsible for the emergence of Lamar Smith, who was originally a third-round draft choice by Seattle. Smith rushed for 680 yards in 1996 and averaged 4.2 yards-per-carry in 1997 with 392 yards on 91 attempts. At fullback, Shelmon utilized the talents of Mack Strong, who emerged as a starter in 1996 after signing as an undrafted free agent in 1993.

Shelmon entered the NFL in 1991 as the running backs coach with the Los Angeles Rams before moving on to Seattle.

Shelmon made the jump to the NFL from the University of Southern California, where he spent two years (1987-88) as the running backs coach and two years (1989-90) as the run game coordinator. At USC, Shelmon aided in the development of standout running backs Aaron Emanuel, Ricky Ervins and Leroy Holt. In 1989, Shelmon guided Ervins to the Pac-10 rushing title with 1,395 yards to gain All-America honorable mention and All-Pac-10 honors. In 1988, Holt captured All-Pac-10 honors, while in 1987, tail-back Steven Webster ran for 1,109 yards while garnering All-America honorable mention and All-Pac-10 accolades. During Shelmon's tenure, the Trojans made three consecutive Rose Bowl appearances, including a 17-10 victory over Michigan in 1990.

Before joining the Trojans, Shelmon handled the running backs at Arizona from 1984-86. While with the Wildcats, Shelmon helped develop running backs Vance Johnson, who later starred as a wide receiver for the Denver Broncos, and David Adams, who finished his career as the third leading rusher in



Arizona history.

In all, eight of his backs earned All-Pac-10 honors, including two conference rushing champions and one second place finisher, during his seven years in the Pac-10.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Houston from 1975-76. Following a year of coaching at Carroll High School in Corpus Christi, TX, Shelmon spent three seasons at Army (1978-80), where he coached tight ends and running backs. He then moved to Indiana University for three seasons (1981-83) as running backs coach.

Born in Bossier City, LA, on Sept. 17, 1952, he attended Airline High School before moving to the University of Houston, where he was a two-year letterman as a running back. Shelmon graduated with a B.S. degree in Education. He attended Long Island University working towards a Master's Degree in Guidance and Counseling.

Shelmon plays an active role as a board member for the annual Gary "Big Hands" Johnson Drug, Alcohol and Tobacco Awareness Camp in Saginaw, Michigan. In addition, Shelmon and his wife, Nancy, have created a foundation in the memory of his mother, Ruby Shelmon, that annually helps fund the college education of two high school seniors, one from Bossier City and one from the Dallas area.

Clarence's wife, Nancy, lives and works in Los Angeles.

Glenn Smith enters his second season as an offensive assistant after working with the organization's scouting and coaching staffs in a variety of capacities from 1996 to 1999. In addition to his other duties, Smith will assist Joe Avezzano with the tight ends in 2001.

Since 1998, Smith has assisted the Dallas offensive coaches by break-

ing down film during the week and charting plays at practice and on game days. In 1996 and 1997, he spent the majority of his time as an assistant in the Cowboys personnel department. While working under Larry Lacewell, Smith helped evaluate college and pro prospects while assisting with pro timing days at colleges and universities.

Prior to joining the Cowboys, Smith was a member of the coaching staff at Northern Illinois University from 1991 to 1995. While working under head coach Charlie Sadler, Smith served as the Huskies tight ends coach (1995), wide receivers coach (1993-94) and recruiting coordinator (1992-93). In his final two seasons at NIU, the Huskies offense ranked in the top 15 in the nation in rushing offense. In addition to his coaching responsibilities at NIU, Smith also assisted with the team's travel arrangements and various other administrative duties.

A 1986 graduate of the University of Texas, Smith began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Oklahoma from 1988 to 1990. While with the Sooners, he worked under head coaches Barry Switzer and Gary Gibbs with the strength and conditioning program.

Smith is a 1981 graduate of Lanier High School in Austin, TX, where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball. He also spent a summer as a caddle for PGA Tour member Mark Coward.

Wade Wilson returned to Dallas as an assistant coach in 2000, after 19 years as an NFL quarterback – including three years with Dallas (1995-97). Along with his playing experience, Wilson brought a thorough knowledge of offensive coordinator Jack Reilly's system to Dallas.

In 2000, Wilson was forced to call on all his knowledge and experience as he helped prepare four different quarterbacks for action during the sea-

son. It was the first time in club history four different players saw action at quarterback in the same season. Troy Aikman started 11 games but was forced to miss five starts and parts of three other games with injuries. Backup Randall Cunningham relieved Aikman on two occasions and started three other games in his place. Cunningham's start at Washington (9/18) produced a 27-21 win for Dallas and gave Dave Campo his first win as a head coach and Wade Wilson his first as an assistant. Rookie Clint Stoerner saw action in one game early in the year in place of Cunningham before giving way to newcomer Anthony Wright. Wright earned the starting nod in the final two games of the season against the N.Y. Giants (12/17) and Tennessee (12/25).

A former Pro Bowler, Wilson joined the coaching ranks after a 19-year playing career. Only four other players in NFL history have played more seasons than Wilson. He was originally an eighth-round draft choice (210th overall) of the Minnesota Vikings in 1981 and led them to three playoff appearances, including the 1987 NFC Championship Game, during his 11 years with the team. He also spent time with the Atlanta Falcons (1992), New Orleans Saints (1993-94), Dallas Cowboys (1995-97) and Oakland Raiders (1998-99). He served as Aikman's backup on the Cowboys Super Bowl XXX championship team in 1995.

Wilson completed his career with a 75.6 quarterback rating on 1,391-of-2,428 passing for 17,283 yards. His best statistical year was 1988 when he led the NFC with a 91.5 quarterback rating and completed 204-of-332 passes (61.4%) for 2,746 yards, 15 touchdowns and nine interceptions. His 61.4% completion rate led the NFL that season. During his three years in Dallas, Wilson threw for 585 yards, one touchdown and four interceptions on 58-of-96 passing for a 63.9 rating. He earned one start (at Washington, 12/22/96) in his three-year stay in Dallas.

He was a four-year letterman and three-year starter at East Texas State University, where he earned NAIA All-America and Lone Star Conference MVP honors as a senior while leading the conference in passing and total offense. He completed 338-of-668 passes for 4,414 yards and 32 touchdowns during his four years with the Lions. He played high school football at near-by Commerce, TX, High School.

Charles Wade Wilson earned his bachelor's degree in business management from ETSU, and he has his real estate license and his SEC-series seven registration. Wilson has four children; Travis Wade, Hayden, and twins Coleton and Sophie.

Mike Zimmer Defensive Coordinator Illinois State NFL: 8th Year * Cowboys: 8th Year



After helping shape the Cowboys pass defense into one of the NFL's best as secondary coach, Mike Zimmer took over the responsibility of shaping Dallas' entire defense when he was named defensive coordinator on Feb. 1, 2000.

Under Zimmer's guidance, the Cowboys defense showed steady improvement throughout the 2000 season despite having five starters miss

a combined 33 games. As has become the expectation under Zimmer's watch, the Dallas pass defense again finished near the top of league rankings, ranking third in the NFL (second in NFC) by allowing only 168.3 passing yards-per-game. Despite struggles early in the season, Zimmer's troops improved to finish the season ranked 19th in the NFL (ninth in NFC) in total defense, allowing 333.1 yards-per-game.

Prior to being promoted to defensive coordinator, Zimmer spent five years as Dallas' defensive backs

coach and a year as a defensive assistant working with the nickel defense. In six years under Zimmer's watchful eye, the Cowboys pass defense surrendered an average of 190.6 passing yards-per-game, the second lowest figure in the league over that time span (Philadelphia — 187.4). In addition to finishing as one of the top two pass defenses in the league three times in that time frame, Dallas is the only team to have allowed fewer than 176.0 passing yards-per-game over a season three times.

Despite using five different starting lineups in the secondary and losing Kevin Smith, Kevin Mathis and Deion Sanders for a combined 19 games in 1999, Zimmer's defensive backfield helped the Cowboys pass defense finish fourth in the NFC. The unit also tied for sixth in the league with 24 interceptions – 15 from Zimmer's secondary – and returned four for touchdowns, tying the club record (1985, 1995). The Cowboys defense also limited seven opponents to 190 yards or less passing. Sanders earned his fourth consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl, while Darren Woodson finished third on the team with 128 tackles and George Teague set a career-high with 102 tackles – despite missing two games with a neck strain. Charlie Williams started eight games in place of injured comrades and led all corners with 64 tackles and 11 passes defensed.

In 1998, the Cowboys were able to hold eight opponents to 200 yards passing or less, including four to 160 yards or less, despite losing Sanders for over five games, Smith for two games and changing starting free safeties – all in the final six weeks of the season. Sanders led the team with five interceptions totaling 153 return yards to earn his third consecutive Pro Bowl berth, while Woodson earned his fifth straight

Pro Bowl appearance after leading the team with 136 tackles.

The Cowboys finished 1997 at or near the top of several NFL pass defense categories, including fewest completions allowed (253-first), net yards-per-pass play (4.94-third) and yards gained-per-completion (10.74-third). The Cowboys also held five opponents to less than 120 yards passing and 12 to 176 yards or less. Woodson earned a spot on the NFC Pro Bowl squad for the fourth consecutive year, while Sanders earned his sixth career Pro Bowl honor.

In 1996, Smith returned from a ruptured Achilles tendon to tie for the team lead with five interceptions. Woodson earned his third consecutive Pro Bowl berth after finishing with 118 tackles and five interceptions to tie Smith for the team lead. Sanders intercepted two passes, knocked away another nine and recovered a team-high three fumbles to earn his fifth career Pro Bowl selection (first with Dallas).

In his first season as defensive backs coach in 1995, Zimmer lost Smith for the year with a ruptured achilles tendon in the season opener and did not have Sanders' services until Week Nine. Despite the injuries, the secondary surrendered only 204.5 passing yards-per-game, and Dallas returned four interceptions for touchdowns, tying the club record (1985). Following the season, Woodson earned his second career Pro Bowl berth.

As a defensive assistant in 1994, Zimmer worked with the Dallas nickel defense, which helped the secondary finish as the top ranked pass defense in the league (172.0 passing yards-per-game). Woodson, who earned his first Pro Bowl trip, tied for the team lead with five interceptions to lead a defense

that picked off 22 passes during the year.

Before joining the Dallas staff, Zimmer spent five seasons as the defensive coordinator/secondary coach at Washington State. Zimmer's first Cougar defense in 1989 established a school record with 24 interceptions and 48 sacks. In 1992, Washington State allowed opponents to convert only 26.1 percent of their third downs. In 1993, the Cougars finished eighth in the nation in total defense (298 yards-pergame) and second in rushing defense.

Prior to joining the Cougars' staff, Zimmer was an assistant at Weber State College from 1981-88. He was on the same staff with current Cowboys Head Coach Dave Campo during the 1981-82 seasons. Zimmer coached inside linebackers from 1981-84, while adding the duties of defensive coordinator in

1983. From 1985-88, he served as coordinator and oversaw the secondary.

Zimmer began his coaching career as a part-time assistant on defense at the University of Missouri in 1979, coaching, among others, All-Pro cornerbacks Eric Wright (San Francisco 49ers) and Johnnie Poe (New Orleans Saints).

Zimmer was a two-time all-conference quarterback at Lockport, IL, High School in 1972-73, playing for his father Bill, who played football at Bradley and later with the 49ers. Mike also earned all-conference

for his father Bill, who played football at Bradley and later with the 49ers. Mike also earned all-conference honors in wrestling and baseball.

Zimmer went on to play quarterback at Illinois State University in 1974. After redshirting the 1975 sea-

son, he suffered a broken thumb in the spring of 1976 and was moved to linebacker. A neck injury, suffered during the 1976 season, led to surgery and the end of his playing career. He graduated with a Bachelor's degree in physical education in 1979.

Born in Peoria, IL, Mike and wife Vikki have three children, Adam, Marki and Corri.

Larry Lacewell

Director of College and Pro Scouting



Larry Lacewell joined the Cowboys as Director of College Scouting in May of 1992 and has coordinated Dallas' NFL Draft efforts since 1993. He became the Cowboys' Director of College and Pro Scouting in the spring of 1994, adding the responsibility of coordinating the scouting efforts of all per personnel to his college scouting duties. Lacewell now directs the Cowboys personnel evaluation for all college prospects, as well as all personnel with the NFL's 30 other teams and in NFL Europe.

All five of Dallas' draft choices in 2000 made the Cowboys roster, with cornerback Kareem Larrimore and running back Michael Wiley seeing significant playing time. Linebacker Orantes Grant made a sizable contribution on Dallas' special teams units, tying for fourth on the team in special team tackles.

In 1999, seven of the Cowboys eight draft selections earned spots with the club, while six rookies made significant contributions: DE Ebenezer Ekuban, OL Solomon Page, LB Dat Nguyen, WR Wane McGarity, DE Peppi Zellner and TE Mike Lucky. One year later, Page became a full-time starter, Nguyen started five games at middle linebacker and McGarity became one of the NFL's top punt returners.

The Cowboys enjoyed one of their most productive drafts in 1998, as seven of the nine drafted players earned roster spots. The top two picks of 1998, DE Greg Ellis and OT Flozell Adams, combined to start a total of 28 games. Ellis and Adams earned Football Digest All-Rookie honors, and are both considered cornerstones of the Cowboys current defensive and offensive lines. Fellow rookies Michael Myers, Izell Reese and Darren Hambrick made significant contributions as rookies, with Hambrick becoming a full-time starter in 1999 and leading the team in tackles in 2000.

In 1997, all nine of the Cowboys' draft selections made the club. The class was highlighted by Dexter Coakley, who started all 16 games at linebacker, earned All-Rookie recognition and was the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Month for October. Coakley earned his first Pro Bowl selection in 1999, his third year as a professional. Tight end David LaFleur had a strong showing, catching 18 passes for 122 yards as a rookie. LaFleur becme the Cowboys starting tight end in 1998.

In 1996, seven of the nine players Dallas selected in the draft went on to earn a Cowboys roster spot. That class was highlighted by Randall Godfrey, who earned a starting linebacker's position by mid-November on a defensive unit that finished the year third in the NFL.

In Lacewell's first three drafts (1993-95), 20 of the 26 players selected by the Cowboys earned roster spots. The highlight of those classes is offensive lineman Larry Allen, who was drafted in the second round of the 1994 draft. Allen has earned Pro Bowl honors each of the past six years and is considered one of the NFL's finest offensive lineman. Of those 20 players that earned roster spots, five moved into the starting lineup by their third season, including Allen and linebacker Darrin Smith (1993), who earned starting spots as rookies.

Lacewell joined the NFL after a distinguished career in collegiate coaching and athletic administration. Most recently, Lacewell served as defensive coordinator at Tennessee (1990-91). The 1990 Vols captured the SEC Championship and defeated Virginia in the Sugar Bowl. In 1991, Tennessee finished second in the SEC and earned a Fiesta Bowl berth.

As the athletic director and head coach at Arkansas State (1978-89), Lacewell compiled a record of 69-48-4. He was named the Southland Conference's Coach of the Year on three occasions, while the Indians captured two conference titles under his direction.

Lacewell began his coaching career at Alabama in 1959. Following two seasons with the Crimson Tide, he moved on to Arkansas State (1961), Arkansas A&M (1962-63), Kilgore Junior College (1964-65), Oklahoma (1966), Wichita State (1967) and lowa State (1968). Lacewell rejoined the Sooners' staff in 1969 as assistant head coach/defensive coordinator and helped Oklahoma to six Big Eight titles and two national championships in nine years.

A native of Fordyce, AR, Lacewell (2/12/37) attended Fordyce High School and then played halfback at Arkansas A&M from 1955-59. In 1996, Lacewell was inducted into the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame. He and his wife Criss have two sons, Bryant and Logan.

Assistant Director of College Scouting



Tom Ciskowski joined the Cowboys scouting department in 1991, working his first year as a scout administered by the BLESTO Scouting Combine. He became an area scout in 1992, working in the West for six years before moving to scout the Southeast from 1998-2000. In 2001, he was named Assistant Director of College Scouting. From his new position, Ciskowski will see first hand the top college prospects in the land.

Prior to his first stint in Dallas, Garrett served two seasons as a scout for the BLESTO Scouting Combine. He then coached with the N.Y. Giants (1969-73) before returning to Dallas. Garrett was also an assistant with New Orleans (1976-77) and Cleveland (1978-84). After a season as the head coach at Columbia.

he scouted for Buffalo in 1986.

An all-conference fullback at Utah State, Garrett played for Philadelphia (1954), the British Columbia Lions (1955), the N.Y. Giants (1956) and the Ottawa RoughRiders (1957).

He began his coaching career at the Coast Guard Academy in 1958. After one season at Lehigh, Garrett became head coach and athletic director at Susquehanna University, where he compiled a 40-3-1 record and was later inducted into the school's Hall of Fame.

Tommy Hart

Scout



Tommy Hart became the Cowboys West area scout in 1998 after spending two seasons (1996-97) as the club's defensive ends coach.

As Dallas' defensive ends coach, Hart helped the team register 75 sacks during his two seasons, including 12 by Tony Tolbert in 1996.

Hart, who was inducted into the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 1993, was an assistant defensive line coach for the San Francisco 49ers from 1983-91 and a part of three Super Bowl champion teams. Hart's 1985 defensive line helped the 49ers register 60 sacks, the second highest total

in team history. He moved to the 49ers scouting department for the 1992-93 seasons.

Hart, who has spent 29 of the last 33 years in the NFL as a player, assistant coach or scout, finished his playing career in 1980 with the New Orleans Saints after spending two years with the Chicago Bears and 10 years with the San Francisco 49ers. Originally a 10th round draft choice of the 49ers in 1968, he registered a career-high 17 sacks in 1972, and he set a 49ers club record with six sacks in a single game against the Rams in 1976 on his way to All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors. Hart was a two time winner (1972 and 1976) of the Len Eshmont Memorial Award, given annually to the 49ers player who best exemplified the inspirational and courageous play of Len Eshmont.

Hart earned second team NAIA All-America honors as a senior at Morris Brown College after earning all-conference honors for three consecutive years. Hart earned four letters in football as an offensive guard/tackle and defensive tackle and three letters in track as a sprinter/shot putter.

Born in Macon, GA (11/11/44), Tommy and his wife, Cherrie, have four daughters.



Jim Hess

Scout



Jim Hess joined the Cowboys as an area scout for the Midwest in 1997 after 37 years in the coaching ranks, where he compiled a career winning percentage of .610 at all levels of coaching. He spent 22 of the 23 years between 1974-96 as a college head coach at Angelo State (1974-81), Stephen F. Austin (1982-88) and New Mexico State (1990-96) and earned conference coach of the year honors in each of the conferences in which his teams participated. In 1989, he served as athletic director for S.F.A.

Hess led New Mexico State to its first winning season in 14 years with

a 6-5 mark in 1992 and was named the Big West Coach of the Year. He posted a 47-30-2 (.608) record—the highest winning percentage of any coach in school history—at Stephen F. Austin, including five winning seasons and the school's first-ever conference title (1985). At Angelo State, Hess led the Rams to six Top 20 rankings and the 1978 I-AA national title with a 14-0 record. He posted a 65-23-3 (.731) mark—the highest winning percentage in school history—during his time there and remains one of just a handful of men to win more than 100 games at the I-AA level.

ful of men to win more than 100 games at the I-AA level.

A native of Farmersville, TX, Hess is a 1959 graduate of Southeastern Oklahoma, and he earned his master's degree from North Texas State in 1966. He began his coaching career at the high school level at Farmersville (1959). He then coached at McKinney, TX (1961-62), Rockwall, TX (1963-64) – where his team captured the 1963 Class AA state championship – and Kilgore, TX (1965-66) high schools. In 1967, he became an assistant coach at Rice University (1967-70) before returning to the high school ranks as the head coach at Sterling (1971) in Baytown, TX. In 1972, he joined Angelo State as an assistant coach.

Hess has been a guest coach in the CFL and is the director/organizer/owner of the Angelo Football Clinic in San Angelo, TX. The annual summer clinic has grown to over 1,800 visiting high school and college coaches from around the country.

Hess and his wife, Carol, have two daughters and seven grandchildren.



Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach




Tony Ollison joined the Cowboys strength and conditioning department in the spring of 2000. He works closely with strength coach Joe Juraszek implementing player workout programs.

Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach




Bennie Wylie is in his third season as Dallas' assistant strength and conditioning coach. He works closely with strength coach Joe Juraszek implementing player workout programs.

Flozell Adams

Tackle

PRO: In only three seasons in the NFL, Flozell Adams has proven himself to be a quality, dependable offensive lineman. After seeing extensive time at right guard as a rookie, Adams effortlessly made the transition to left tackle, his more natural position, in 1999. With tremendous natural strength and athletic ability, he is rapidly developing into one of the NFL's finest performers at tackle and becoming a fixture on the Dallas line. Adams has great reach and the proper disposition for performing at one of the most difficult positions in professional football. His natural athletic gifts have also made him an imposing figure on the Cowboys field goal defense unit, where he blocked two opponents field goal attempts in 1999. Evidence of Adams' effectiveness in his three seasons along Dallas' offensive line can be seen in Emmitt Smith's rushing production. Over the past three seasons, Smith has rushed for 3,932 yards, the fourth most in the NFL during that time span, and moved into third place on the NFL's career rushing list. Smith has rushed for over 100-yards 20 times in Adams' 44 career starts. Adams was the Cowboys second-round draft choice (38th overall) in 1998, making him the highest offensive lineman drafted by Dallas since the team selected Howard Richards with the 25th pick in 1981.

2000: In his second season as the Cowboys starting left tackle, Adams was part of an offensive line that allowed 35 sacks in 480 pass plays on the season. Only 12 teams surrendered fewer sacks than Dallas. In six games, opponents were held to one sack or less. During Troy Aikman's final 172 pass attempts of the season, the Dallas line allowed him to be sacked only four times - once every 43 attempts. In addition to pass protection, Adams helped Smith (1,203) eclipse the 1,000-yard barrier for the 10th consecutive season, allowing Smith to become only the third person in NFL history to rush for over 15,000 career yards. Adams' work also allowed the Cowboys to average 4.2 rushing yards-per-carry for the year, a mark the club has topped just twice in the past 12 seasons. Only four NFC clubs posted a better yardsper-carry average in 2000. Adams' blocking at Arizona (9/10) helped limit the Cardinals to one sack in 35 pass plays as Randall Cunningham threw for 243 yards and three touchdowns. At Washington (9/18), he was part of an offensive line that helped Dallas rush for 153 yards while allowing only one sack in 24 pass plays. Adams helped lead Smith to his first 100-yard rushing game of the year at Carolina (10/1) when Smith romped for 132 yards on 24 carries (5.5 avg.). In the rematch against Arizona (10/22), the Cowboys rushed for 200 yards, including 112 by Smith, while allowing just one sack. Against Jacksonville (10/29), Smith again eclipsed the 100-yard mark with 102 yards on 24 carries. Adams helped Smith clear the 100yard barrier for the third consecutive week at Philadelphia (11/5) as Dallas rushed for 204 yards against the league's ninth ranked defense entering the game. Adams and the offensive line held Cincinnati (11/12) sackless in 37 pass attempts, and then duplicated the feat by holding Minnesota (11/23) without a sack in 43 pass attempts. The line's work against the Vikings also allowed Smith to rush for 100 yards on 12 carries before leaving the game in the third quarter with a concussion. For the sixth time during the season, Adams and company led Smith past the 100-yard mark against Washington (12/10) as he rushed for 150 yards. Against the Redskins, the Cowboys rushed for 242 yards as a team, marking the most rushing yards by the Dallas offense since recording 271 yards on the ground at Philadelphia on Oct. 31, 1993.

1999: Adams was the only Dallas offensive lineman to start all 16 regular season games, and he provided the production of a seasoned veteran in his first season at left tackle. He was a key part of an offensive line that allowed just 24 sacks in 531 pass plays (one every 22.1 pass plays), the second fewest sacks allowed in the NFL. The Dallas line also allowed one sack or less in nine regular season games, including five of the final six games. In addition, Adams helped Smith to his highest single season rushing total (1,397) since 1995, while enabling the Pro Bowl running back to collect more 100-yard rushing games (nine) than in any other season in his career other than 1995. In his first NFL start at left tackle, at Washington (9/12), he helped lead the way for a Dallas offense that gained 541 total yards, the highest offensive output by Dallas since Sept. 15, 1985 when the team gained 554 yards against Detroit. In addition, Aikman was sacked just one time in 50 pass plays in the overtime win over the Redskins. The following week, the Dallas line led the way for Smith to gain 109 yards in a win over Atlanta (9/20), marking just the third time in 29 games that the Falcon defense had allowed a 100-yard rusher. In the win over Green Bay (11/14), Adams and Co. provided run blocking that helped spring Dallas' ground game to 149 yards on 34 carries (4.4 yards-per-attempt) despite Smith missing the entire game with an injury. On special teams, Adams blocked a Ryan Longwell field goal, marking the first blocked field goal by a Dallas offensive player since Doug Cosbie blocked one against the St. Louis Cardinals on Oct. 21, 1979. Two weeks later in the Thanksgiving Day win over Miami (11/25), Adams blocked a 47-yard field goal attempt by Olindo Mare in the second quarter. That effort tied the club record for blocked field goals in a season (two), as Adams became the 11th player in club history to accomplish that feat and the first since Leon Lett in 1994. In that same Miami game, the Cowboys offensive line permitted just one sack in 30 passing plays




and helped lead Smith to 103 yards rushing against what was the NFL's sixth ranked defense going into the game. Dallas finished the season as the NFL's sixth ranked rushing offense, averaging 128.2 yardsper-game.

1998: Injuries to starting right guard Everett McIver forced Adams into extended work as a rookie. He started 10 games in place of McIver, who suffered serious injuries to both knees. Although inexperienced, and playing a new position, Adams earned All-Rookie recognition and was a key part of a Dallas offensive line that allowed just 19 quarterback sacks - the fewest in the NFL. Adams was marked ready for duty in the Dallas opener against Arizona (9/6), where he was used as a third tight end on short vardage situations. Adams wound up playing the final three quarters of the game at right tackle after starter Erik Williams was ejected. Adams helped the Dallas offense amass 444 total yards (188 rushing) against the Cardinals both totals were the team's highest since 1996. In addition, the offensive line did not allow a sack of Aikman in 32 pass plays. The next three weeks, Adams saw considerable action at tight end as a short yardage blocker, and earned a starting assignment against Oakland (9/27) as the team opened the game in a two-tight end set. After McIver went down with his first knee injury at Washington (10/4), Adams earned his first start at right guard against Carolina (10/11). Against the Panthers, Dallas rolled up 428 yards of total offense while the line allowed just two sacks in 24 pass plays. In his first five starts at right guard, Adams helped Smith rack up four 100-yard rushing games, including a season-high 163 yards on 29 carries (5.6 avg.) against the N.Y. Giants (11/8). In that battle with the Giants, the Dallas offensive line allowed no sacks to a New York defense that led the NFL in sacks during the 1998 season. Adams did not start against Seattle (11/22), but he entered the game when McIver tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee. Adams started the remaining five regular season games at right guard and earned his first postseason experience by starting against Arizona (1/2/99) in the playoff loss at Texas Stadium.

COLLEGE: Adams spent three years in the starting line-up for Michigan State, and during that time, the Spartans went to three straight bowl games for only the second time in school history. They also had a running back top the 1,000-rushing yard mark each season. Adams started the final 28 games of his career at tackle, and in 34 career starts, he helped a Spartan running back reach the 100-yard mark 21 times. As a senior, Adams moved from right tackle to left tackle and picked up All-America honors and was named the Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year by the league's head coaches. As a sophomore in 1995, Adams protected Cowboys quarterback Tony Banks as the Spartan's right tackle. One of four offensive linemen who were semi-finalist for the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award, Adams earned postseason invitations to the East-West Shrine Game and Senior Bowl all-star games. He was a second team All-Big Ten selec-

tion at right tackle following his junior and sophomore seasons.

PERSONAL: A high school All-America and all-state selection as a two-year starter on the offensive line at Proviso West High School in Maywood, IL, Adams also lettered three times in wrestling and four times in track (shot put). He advanced to the state heavyweight wrestling finals as a junior. Adams earned his degree in criminal justice from Michigan State and is a cousin of NBA guard Hersey Hawkins. Since joining the Cowboys, Adams has participated in the offensive line's support of The RISE School in Dallas with the "First Downs for Down Syndrome" project.

PRO: As a member of the NFL's All-Decade team for the 1990's, Larry Allen is widely recognized as one of the NFL's premier offensive linemen and has become one of the most decorated players in Cowboys history. In seven NFL seasons since being drafted out of tiny Sonoma State, he is already a six-time All-Pro selection, five times at guard (1995-97, 1999-00) and one at tackle (1998). With his selection at tackle in 1998, he became just the third player in league history to be selected to the Pro Bowl at more than one offensive line position during his career, joining Bruce Matthews (guard/center) and Chris Hinton (guard/tackle), Allen also joined William Roaf (New Orleans) and Randall McDaniel (Tampa Bay) as the only members of the NFC and AFC offensive lines on the 2000 Pro Bowl squad to be making his sixth straight appearance. Allen has played all but one position along the offensive line in his seven seasons in Dallas, moving between right tackle (1994), right guard (1995-97), left tackle (1997-98) and left guard (1999-00). During that time, he has been part of a group that has allowed just 174 sacks in 112 games (1.6 per game), fewest in the NFL during that time (Miami is second with 195 sacks allowed). He has also been a member of an offensive unit that has posted the four lowest sacks allowed totals in club history with 18 in 1995, 19 in 1996 and 1998, and 20 in 1994.

2000: For the sixth consecutive season, Allen was selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad and garnered consensus All-Pro and All-NFC honors for his work on the Dallas offensive line. He was part of an offensive line that allowed just 35 sacks in 480 pass plays during the year, and six times during the season oppo-



nents were held to one sack or less. On the ground, Dallas averaged 4.2 yards-per-carry, a mark the club has topped just twice in the last 12 seasons. Only four NFC clubs posted a better yards-per-carry average in 2000. Despite suffering a fractured right hand in practice on July 20 and missing the first three preseason games. Allen returned to action by the end of preseason and started all 16 games. Against Arizona (9/10), Allen's blocking helped limit the Cardinals to one sack while protecting Randall Cunningham as he completed 24-of-34 passes for 243 yards and three touchdowns. The next week at Washington (9/18), he was a key part of an offensive line that helped Dallas rush for 153 yards on 31 carries (4.9 avg.) and allowed just one sack in 24 pass plays. Emmitt Smith posted his first 100-yard rushing effort of the season at Carolina (10/1), picking up 132 yards on 24 carries (5.5 avg.), and as a team the Cowboys rushed for 173 yards on the ground. Allen's blocking against Arizona (10/22) keyed the offense as it picked up 347 yards of total offense, including 200 yards rushing - 112 by Smith - and allowed just one sack. For the second straight week, Smith topped the century mark running the ball with 102 yards on 24 carries against Jacksonville (10/29), and he posted his third straight 100-yard game as the Cowboys ran for 204 yards against the league's 10th ranked defense at Philadelphia (11/5). In the Eagles' game, Allen opened a gaping hole that Smith walked through for a second guarter touchdown. Not content to merely run block, the line did not allow a sack in 37 pass attempts against Cincinnati (11/12) or in 43 pass attempts against Minnesota (11/23). In addition, Smith ran for 100 yards on 12 carries against the Vikings before suffering a third quarter concussion. At Tampa Bay (12/3) against the league's sixth ranked defense in sacks-per-pass play, Allen and the line helped limit the Buccaneers to two sacks in 35 pass plays and led the way for 113 rushing yards. Personally, Allen helped limit Warren Sapp to two tackles on the day and the entire Tampa Bay starting defensive line to six tackles. Smith rushed for 150 yards and a touchdown against Washington (12/10) and the NFL's fourth ranked defense. In all, the Cowboys ran for 242 yards against the Redskins, the most by a Dallas offense since recording 271 yards on the ground at Philadelphia on Oct. 31, 1993.

1999: Despite starting in his third line position in as many years and missing five games due to injury, Allen was selected to his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl while earning consensus All-Pro honors. He earned this recognition as part of an offensive line that allowed the second fewest sacks (24) in the NFL (Indianapolis - 14) and one or fewer sacks in nine-of-16 games. The Dallas offensive line also led the way for Smith to rush for 1,397 yards. In Allen's first career start at left guard in the season opener at Washington (9/12), he helped lead the way as the Cowboys gained 541 total yards while surrendering only one sack in 50 pass plays. The offensive output against the Redskins was Dallas' highest yardage total since gaining 554 yards on Sept. 15, 1985 against Detroit. Against Atlanta (9/20), he helped lead the way as Smith (109 yards) became just the third player in the last 29 games to rush for over 100 yards against the Falcons. His blocking helped the Cowboys line allow only one sack in 40 pass plays at Philadelphia (10/10), and he helped limit the Redskins (10/24) to no sacks in 32 pass plays. At Minnesota (11/8), Allen's blocking helped spring Smith to 140 rushing yards and two touchdowns in the first half as the Dallas offense rolled up 205 rushing yards for the game. While helping the Cowboys ground game accumulate 149 yards against Green Bay (11/14), Allen sprained the medial collateral ligament in his right knee during the third quarter and did not return. He missed the first game of his career at Arizona (11/21), snapping strings of 97 consecutive games played and 90 consecutive starts. His knee sprain caused him to miss the next four games as well. He returned to the starting lineup at New Orleans (12/24) and helped the Dallas line surrender no sacks on 39 pass plays while helping Smith rush for his eighth 100-yard game of the season. In the season finale against the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00), Smith recorded his ninth 100-yard game of the year and the line did not allow a sack in 33 pass plays. The Cowboys offensive line closed the regular season by not allowing a sack on the final 94 pass plays of the season. The line again surrendered only one sack in 39 pass plays in an NFC Wild Card Playoff Game at Minnesota (1/9/00) while helping Smith rush for 99 yards, including a Dallas postseason record 65-yarder. Allen underwent arthroscopic surgery on Jan. 18, 2000 to remove loose bodies from his right knee

1998: After starting the final three games of 1997 at left tackle, Allen was penciled into the position from day one of the 1998 season. In his first full season guarding Troy Aikman's blindside, he earned consensus All-Pro and All-NFC honors. When Allen's peers voted him to the NFC Pro Bowl squad at tackle, he became just the third player in league history to be selected to the Pro Bowl at more than one offensive line position during his career. Allen earned that recognition as a vital cog in an offensive line that allowed just 19 sacks for 110 yards in 493 pass plays for the season - fewest in the NFL. His blocking also helped Smith to seven 100-yard rushing days and 1,332 yards. In the season opener against Arizona (9/6), Allen debuted at his new position and helped Dallas amass 444 total yards (188 rushing) - both totals were the highest since 1996. In addition, the offensive line did not allow a sack of Aikman in 32 pass plays. In an October match-up at Washington (10/4), Allen helped lead the way as Dallas had two running backs top the 100-yard mark for just the third time in club history. Smith finished with 120 yards and one touchdown while Chris Warren added 104 yards and two touchdowns. The next week against Carolina (10/11), Allen helped Dallas roll up 428 yards of total offense (151 rushing and 277 passing). In November, Allen faced four of the NFC's top defensive ends in Hugh Douglas (fifth in the NFC with 12.5 sacks in 1998), Chad Bratzke (ninth with 11.0), Simeon Rice (tied for 11th with 10.0) and John Randle (10th with 10.5). His streak started at Philadelphia (11/2) when he limited Douglas to one tackle and no sacks. The next week against Bratzke and the N.Y. Giants (11/8), his blocking helped Smith rush for 163 yards on 29 carries (5.6 avg.), and the Dallas offensive line allowed no sacks to a Giants defense that led the NFL in sacks in 1998. At Arizona (11/15), Allen, while limiting Rice to one tackle, was part of a line that allowed no sacks to the Cards defense and helped lead Smith to 118 yards and three touchdowns. Seattle brought the AFC's top sacking defense of 1998 into Dallas (11/22) and came away with just one sack (on an Aikman fumble), while the Cowboys ran for 173 yards on the day. Allen closed out his dominating month against John Randle and the Minnesota Vikings (11/26), limiting him to one tackle and no sacks in 81 offensive plays. In addition, Allen helped set a new club record for pass attempts in a game without a sack (57) and led the way as

Smith rushed for three touchdowns to tie Marcus Allen's NFL record of 123 career rushing scores. In the regular season finale against Washington (12/27), Allen was part of a blocking unit that saw Smith run for

two more touchdowns to break the NFL's all-time rushing touchdown record.

1997: After spending part of training camp working at left tackle, Allen returned to his right guard spot for the first 13 games of the season. He started his third season at right guard at Pittsburgh (8/31) and helped Dallas gain 380 total yards, including 295 yards passing while not allowing a sack. This kind of play kept Aikman healthy and in the starting lineup for every game for the third straight season. In a win over Philadelphia (9/15), Allen suffered a strained left hamstring in the second quarter and did not return to action. Following the bye week, he returned to the starting lineup against Chicago (9/28) but was forced out of the game in the second quarter when he did not have the strength in his left leg to effectively block. Allen was back in the starting lineup for good the next week at the N.Y. Giants (10/5). After the loss of Mark Tuinei at left tackle at Washington (10/13), Allen slid out to left tackle in third down passing situations against Philadelphia (10/26) and Washington (11/16). In the Redskins game, the line allowed just one sack in 46 pass plays. Allen became the full-time starter at left tackle against Carolina (12/8) and remained there the final three weeks of the season. Despite moving between guard and tackle during the season, Allen was selected to his third straight Pro Bowl at guard and earned first-team All-Pro honors.

1996: Allen earned his second consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl, along with consensus All-Pro and All-NFC honors, while the Dallas offensive line led the NFL by allowing just 19 sacks on the season, one shy of the club record set in 1995. In a win at Miami (10/27), Aikman was sacked just once while completing a season-high 33-of-41 (80.5%) pass attempts for 363 yards and three touchdowns. For the third straight year behind Allen, Smith ran for over 1,200 yards while topping 100 yards on the ground four times, including a season-high 155 yards and three touchdowns against Washington (11/28). In the first round of the playoffs, Allen's blocking helped lead the Dallas running game to 255 rushing yards against Minnesota (12/28), the second best postseason total in club history. Smith's 6.8 yards-per-carry average in that game

was the third best mark in club history.

1995: Allen made his first NFL start at right guard in the season opener at the N.Y. Giants (9/4), helping the Dallas offense roll up 459 yards, including 230 rushing yards – the most by the Cowboys since a 271-yard rushing performance at Philadelphia on Oct. 31, 1993. It wasn't until the third game of the season that the Dallas front five allowed a sack, and six times in 1995, Allen and the rest of the line held an opponent sackless. For the season, Dallas finished second in the NFL in fewest sacks allowed with a club record 18. In addition, Aikman was healthy and able to start every game for just the second time in his career, helping Allen earn All-Pro honors. In the regular-season finale at Arizona (12/25), Allen's work with the line enabled Dallas to roll up 474 yards of total offense, the most yardage by a Dallas team since Sept. 15. 1985. The Cowboys finished the season ranked fifth in the NFL in total offense, while Smith gained a club record 1,773 yards rushing, captured his fourth NFL rushing title in five years and scored a NFL record 25 rushing touchdowns. Following the season, Allen, who was in just his first year as a starting guard, was one of a club-record four Dallas offensive linemen to be selected to the Pro Bowl, joining Ray Donaldson, Nate Newton and Mark Tuinei.

1994: Allen was forced into the lineup four games into his rookie campaign when Tuinei suffered back spasms at Washington (10/2). He received a game ball for his play, which held the Redskins sackless on the day. The next week against the Cardinals (10/9), Allen earned his first NFL start, at left tackle for Tuinei, and held Clyde Simmons to five tackles and no sacks while the offensive line did not allow a sack in 28 pass attempts. It was the first time a rookie offensive lineman had started for Dallas since Nov. 24, 1991 when Williams started at right tackle against Washington. Allen returned to spot duty the next two weeks, but early in the morning on Oct. 24, Williams was injured in an automobile accident and lost for the season. Allen moved into the starting lineup at Williams' right tackle spot for good at Cincinnati (10/30). The following week, he was part of an offensive line that helped Dallas amass 450 total yards against the N.Y. Giants (11/7). Both he and Tuinei received game balls for helping hold the Saints without a sack in the Monday night victory at New Orleans (12/19). With 10 regular season starts, Allen tied Burton Lawless (1975) and Kevin Gogan (1987) for the most starts on the offensive line as a rookie in club history. On his way to garnering consensus all-rookie honors, Allen helped Dallas establish a then team record by allowing just 20 sacks - for losses totaling just 93 yards (fewest yards in the NFL). Smith finished the year third in the NFL rushing race with 1,484 yards, and the Cowboys were fifth in the NFL in rushing yards-per-game. In the playoffs, Allen received a game ball against Green Bay (1/8/95) when the Dallas offense picked up 450 total yards and Alkman completed 23-of-30 passes for 337 yards. Allen sprained his left ankle in that game, but returned to action. In the NFC Championship Game at San Francisco (1/15/95), he struggled through three quarters on the injured ankle before leaving the game. Allen was the 10th offensive lineman selected in the NFL Draft and the first player ever drafted from Sonoma State. Taken in the second round (46th overall), it marked the first time since 1981 Dallas had taken an offensive lineman that high

COLLEGE: Allen began his college career at Butte Junior College in Oroville, CA (1989-90). After a year off, he enrolled at Sonoma State, a Division II school 45 miles north of San Francisco. In two years with the Cossacks, Allen gave up just one sack. During his senior year, Sonoma State set a mark with 334 yards rushing against Cal-State Hayward. A two-time All-America selection, Allen participated in the East-West Shrine Game and the Senior Bowl. In 1992, the Cossacks were primarily a passing team and established 10 new school records – including most yards gained, most touchdown passes, best gain-per-completion

and highest passing efficiency.

PERSONAL: A native of Los Angeles, Allen attended a different high school each of his four years of school, finishing at Vintage High School in Napa, CA. He lettered in football as a freshman at Centennial School in Compton, CA. For the past two seasons, Allen has participated in the offensive line's support of The RISE School in Dallas with the "First Downs for Down Syndrome" project. Larry and wife Janelle have two daughters, Jayla (12/15/94) and Loriana (4/20/00), and a son, Larry, Jr. (7/21/96).

PRO: John Avery signed with Dallas on April 30 after a stint in the XFL,

where he led the league in rushing with 800 yards in nine games. In addition to his skills as a running back and receiver out of the backfield, Avery is a dangerous kickoff return man, averaging 24.6 yards-per-return for his NFL career. In Dallas, he will be given an opportunity to compliment Emmitt Smith in the running game while providing Joe Avezzano's special teams units an explosive weapon in the return game. After bouncing between teams and leagues in his first three years as a professional, Avery, who originally entered the NFL in 1998 as the Dolphins' first-round draft choice (29th overall), has hopefully found a new home in Dallas.

2001: Avery spent the spring with the Chicago Enforcers of the XFL, where he led the league in rushing with 800 yards on 150 carries, finishing 245 yards ahead of the league's runner-up. His 5.3 yards-percarry average was also a league-high. He also recorded 17 receptions for 297 yards (17.5 avg.) and two touchdowns. With five rushing touchdowns, Avery tied for third in the league in that category, and his seven total touchdowns (five rushing, two receiving) was the second best total on the year. Avery saw action in nine games, collecting three 100-yard rushing games. He opened the season with 157 yards and a touchdown on 25 carries against Orlando while adding three receptions for 93 yards, including a 68-yard touchdown grab. He also went over the 100-yard mark against San Francisco, 23 carries for 110-yards, and Birmingham, 20 carries for 180 yards and two touchdowns.

2000: Avery went to camp with Denver but was released Aug. 22.

1999: Avery played in six games for the Broncos after being acquired from Miami Sept. 21 in exchange for wide receiver Marcus Nash. He was inactive for seven games and was active but did not play in one other. As a Bronco, Avery rushed five times for 21 yards (4.3) with a long of 11, and caught four passes for 24 yards (6.0). For the season, he returned nine kickoffs for 192 yards (21.3) with a long of 33, combining his Denver and Miami numbers. He played for the Dolphins in the season-opener at Denver (9/13) and returned two kickoffs for 55 yards (27.5) with a long of 33. He was inactive for the Dolphins when they took on Arizona (9/19) the next week. Following the trade, Avery was inactive for his first two games as a Bronco. In his first Broncos appearance, Avery played only on special teams at Oakland (10/10). He then saw action on offense in each of the next two games against Green Bay (10/17) and at New England (10/24), recording a career-high three receptions against the Patriots. He was inactive against Minnesota (10/31), but played on offense again at San Diego (11/7) and Seattle (11/14). Avery was inactive for four of the final five games, seeing action on special teams at Detroit (12/25).

1998: Avery was drafted by Miami in the first round (29th overall) of the NFL Draft and played in all 16 games as a rookie. He finished second on the team with 503 rushing yards and two touchdowns on 143 carries (3.5) and had 10 catches for 67 yards (6.7) and one touchdown. Avery led the team in rushing on six occasions, and for the year ranked third among NFL rookie running backs, with his yardage total also figuring seventh in club history for a rookie. He also excelled on special teams, averaging 25.2 yards – fifth in the AFC, eighth in the NFL – on 43 kickoff returns (1.085 yards). The yardage figure ranked second on Miami's single-season list, while his number of returns tied for third. Overall, Avery set a Dolphins single-season record for combined yardage (rushing, receiving, returns) with 1,655, eclipsing the old mark of 1,603 yards set by Tony Nathan in 1979. His first NFL touchdown came on a 19-yard reception from Dan Marino against St. Louis (10/18), and his first rushing score came at Buffalo (11/1), Avery added his second career touchdown receiving against Indianapolis (11/8). In the postseason, Avery played in both games in a reserve role, rushing once for three yards and returning eight kickoffs for 186 yards (23.3-yard average). In the AFC Divisional Playoff loss at Denver (1/9), he returned five kickoffs for a 24.2-yard average with a long of 35.


COLLÉGE: Avery played his final two years of college ball at Mississippi after transferring from Northwest (MS) Community College. Although he played only two years for the Rebels, Avery ranks fifth on the school's all-time chart with 1,650 yards rushing and 12 touchdowns on 347 carries. He also caught 35 passes for 212 yards and returned 30 kickoffs for a 26.3-yard average, including three touchdowns. Avery was a second-team All-Southeastern Conference choice as a running back and return specialist as a senior when he rushed for 862 yards and seven touchdowns on 166 attempts, caught 19 passes for 113 yards and returned 13 kickoffs for a 24.2-yard average and one touchdown. He compiled 150 yards rushing and two scores on 24 attempts, including a school-record 97-yard scoring run against Arkansas his senior year, and tied his own school record with a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Alabama. Avery was a first-team All-SEC selection as a return specialist his junior season when he field-ed 17 kickoffs for a 27.8-yard average with two touchdowns, including a 97-yarder against Arkansas State. He also rushed for 788 yards and five touchdowns on 181 attempts, and caught 16 passes for 99



yards that year. Avery posted his career high against Arkansas with 155 yards rushing, and returned a kickoff 100 yards for a score against LSU. He was named a two-time all-state and all-region pick at Northwest (MS) Community College, tallying 2,236 yards and 25 touchdowns on 404 carries in his two seasons. Avery added six kickoff returns for a 32.8-yard average with one touchdown.

PERSONAL: Avery was named all-state, all-conference and Western North Carolina Player of the Year at Asheville, NC, High School. He earned three letters in football and four letters in track while also lettering on the school's basketball team. He amassed 4,380 yards rushing with 68 touchdowns during his prep career, including 1,871 yards and 32 touchdowns his senior season. John Edward Avery, Jr., who majored in social work, has a son, John E. Avery III (1/22/97).

PRO: The Cowboys tabbed Tony Banks as their new quarterback on March 28. Banks, who has 61 starts under his belt in five NFL seasons, is familiar with the Cowboys offensive system, having played under Dallas offensive coordinator Jack Reilly as a rookie in 1996 when Reilly was the St. Louis Rams' offensive coordinator. Banks is a strong-armed quarterback with the ability to throw the ball down field and stretch defenses. He has also proven to thrive down the stretch, posting a 10-4 career record as a starter in regular season games during December and January. His .714 winning percentage in those games is tied for the second highest winning percentage among active quarterbacks (minimum 10 starts) during the last month of the season. It's these attributes the Cowboys are looking for from Banks as he takes the reins of Dallas' offense. Banks was originally drafted by St. Louis in the second round (42nd overall) of the 1996 NFL Draft. After three seasons with the Rams, he was traded to Baltimore in 1999.

2000: Banks opened the season as Baltimore's starting quarterback and completed 18-of-32 passes for 199 yards, including a 53-yard scoring strike to Qadry Ismail, in the Ravens victory at Pittsburgh (9/3). Banks' scoring toss was his fourth 53-plus yard touchdown pass against the Steelers in two games. The following week against Jacksonville (9/10), he led Baltimore to the greatest comeback in team history as he brought them back from a 17-0 first quarter deficit to a 39-36 victory. He earned AFC Offensive Player of the Week and Miller Lite NFL Player of the Week honors after completing 23-of-40 passes for 262 yards, two interceptions and a career-high five touchdown passes - including the game winner with 0:41 remaining - against the Jaguars. His five scoring tosses set a franchise record for the most touchdown passes in a game. He threw for 189 yards and an interception on 19-of-31 passing at Miami (9/17). In a 37-0 win against Cincinnati (9/24), he completed 20-of-36 passes for 196 yards and two touchdowns. At Cleveland (10/1), Banks completed 18-of-34 passes for 169 yards and an interception and directed second half drives of 19 and 17 plays to preserve the Ravens' 12-0 shutout victory. He finished 17-of-39 for 154 yards in a 15-10 victory at Jacksonville (10/8) and 16-of-27 for 135 yards and an interception at Washington (10/15). He passed for 229 yards and three interceptions on 17-of-32 passing against Tennessee (10/22)

before being replaced by Trent Dilfer in the fourth quarter. After losing his starting job, Banks saw second half action against Cleveland (11/26) and completed two-of-three passes for 45 yards. In the season finale against the N.Y. Jets (12/24), he started the second half for Dilfer (injured wrist) but suffered a separated shoulder on a two-yard rush and did not return to the game. Banks finished the regular season 150-of-274 for 1,578 yards, eight touchdowns and eight interceptions. In Baltimore's Wild Card Playoff Game against Denver (12/31), he led a third quarter series in place of Dilfer (concussion) and threw one incomplete pass. The following week at Tennessee (1/7/01), Banks saw brief third quarter action for Dilfer (rib injury) and threw an incomplete pass before Dilfer returned. Banks did not see any playing time in the AFC Championship Game at Oakland (1/14/01) or in Super Bowl XXXV against the N.Y. Giants (1/28/01).

1999: Banks was traded from St. Louis to Baltimore on April 17 for Baltimore's fifth-round choice in the 1999 NFL Draft and seventh-round choice in the 2000 draft. Despite beginning the season as the Ravens' third quarterback, he finished the year with a career-high 17 touchdown passes and a career-low eight interceptions. He finished the season 169-of-320 for 2,136 yards and his 81.2 quarterback rating ranked sixth in the AFC. His 5.3 touchdown percentage led the AFC and was the fourth highest in the NFL. After being deactivated as the third quarterback the first two weeks of the season and not seeing any playing time the next three weeks as the second quarterback, Banks saw his first action against Kansas City (10/21), completing eight-of-14 passes for 69 yards in fourth quarter action. He took over the Ravens starting job the next week against Buffalo (10/31) and completed 13-of-34 passes for 129 yards, a touchdown and an interception. At Cleveland (11/7), he threw for 129 yards and a touchdown on 14-of-25 passing, and two weeks later at Cincinnati (11/21), he passed for 274 yards, two touchdowns and an interception on a season-high 24-of-40 passing. He completed 17-of-34 passes for 214 yards, two touchdowns and an interception against Jacksonville (11/28) before directing the Ravens to 447 total yards of offense against Tennessee (12/5), including a season-high 322 passing yards (18-of-31) and a then career-high four touchdowns. His performance earned him Miller Lite NFL Player of the Week honors, while Baltimore's offensive performance against the Titans was the fifth best yardage total in franchise history. Despite completing only eight-of-26 passes at Pittsburgh (12/12), Banks accounted for 268 passing yards and touchdown passes of 54-, 59- and 76-yards to Ismail, all within a nine minute span in the third quarter. Against New Orleans (12/19), Banks tied his season-high by completing 24-of-36 passes for 298 yards and three touchdowns, marking his third consecutive game with at least three touchdown tosses and his fifth straight game with at least two scoring passes. He passed for 187 yards, a touchdown and an interception on 20-of-37 passing against Cincinnati (12/26), helping him close the month of December with a 4-0 record. In those four games, he posted a 96.8 quarterback rating on 65-of-126 passing for 1,085 yards, 11 touchdowns and four interceptions. Banks closed the season 18-of-26 for 163 yards and an interception in the season finale at New England (1/2/00).

1998: Banks finished his third NFL season by completing 241-of-408 passes for 2,535 yards, seven touchdowns and 14 interceptions. In a season opening loss to New Orleans (9/6), he threw for a season-high 298 yards with a touchdown and an interception on a career-high 29-of-44 passing. He attempted a season-high 45 passes, completing 25 for 283 yards, including a career-long 80-yard touchdown toss to Isaac Bruce, the following week against Minnesota (9/13). At Buffalo (9/20), he scored the game-winning touchdown on a two-yard run with 0:11 remaining. Beginning against the Bills, Banks established a career-high with 92 consecutive pass attempts without an interception, spanning games against Arizona (9/27), the N.Y. Jets (10/11) and finished the game 18-of-24 (75.0%) for 171 yards and a touchdown. At Chicago (11/8), he completed a career-high 77.4% of his passes (24-of-31) while throwing for 202 yards and a touchdown. He passed for 255 yards on 22-of-37 passing at Philadelphia (12/3) before suffering a sprained PCL in his left knee the following week against New England (12/13). He was placed on Reserve/Injured and missed the final two games of the season at Carolina (12/20) and at San Francisco (12/27).

1997: In starting 16 games in only his second professional season, Banks recorded career-highs in attempts (487), completions (252) and passing yards (3.254) while throwing for 14 touchdowns and 13 interceptions. He also finished third on the Rams rushing chart with 186 yards. His 3,254 passing yards ranked fourth in the NFC – behind Brett Favre (3,867), Scott Mitchell (3,484) and Troy Aikman (3,283) – and allowed him to become the Rams' first quarterback to throw for over 3,000 yards since Jim Everett threw for 3,323 yards in 1992. He threw a career-high 49 passes at Oakland (9/28), completing 24 for 255 yards, two touchdowns and three interceptions. At Atlanta (11/2), Banks completed 23-of-34 passes for a career-high 401 yards and two touchdowns, marking the sixth best passing yardage total in club history and the most by a Ram since Jim Everett threw for 454 yards against New Orleans in 1989. Banks' 401 passing yards was the highest yardage total by a NFC quarterback in 1997. He passed for 298 yards and a touchdown on 19-of-38 passing at Washington (11/30) and 267 yards, three touchdowns and an interception on 22-of-41 passing at New Orleans (12/7).

1996: Banks finished his rookie campaign with 2,535 yards – the fourth most passing yards by a rookie in NFL history at the time. He completed 241-of-408 passes with 15 touchdowns and 15 interceptions to earn consensus All-Rookie honors. In his second career start, Banks threw three touchdown passes at Arizona (9/29) on 10-of-17 passing. At Baltimore (10/27), he threw for a season-high 353 yards with a touchdown and two interceptions on 26-of-40 passing. He again passed for three scores at Atlanta (12/15) on 11-of-16 passing for 304 yards, the second 300-yard passing day of his rookie season. Banks was originally the Rams first of two second round draft choices (42nd Overall) in the 1996 NFL Draft.

COLLEGE: Banks left Michigan State at the top of several Spartan passing charts, finishing his collegiate career ranked third with a 60.7 pass completion percentage, fourth with 4,129 career passing yards and fifth with 301 career completions. He passed for more than 200 yards 11 times during his Spartan career and completed at least 60% of his passes in 13-of-19 games. He transferred to Michigan State after a standout career at Mesa Community College (1992-93) in San Diego.

VETERANS BANKS

PERSONAL: Anthony Lamar Banks lettered in football, basketball and baseball at Hoover High School in San Diego, CA. Following graduation, he played right field for the Minnesota Twins Class A Fort Myers, FL team before enrolling at Mesa Community College. During his time in Baltimore, Banks was involved with the Toys For Tots kickoff celebration and made a special guest appearance at the Cystic Fibrosis Annual fundraising auction, where he was the highest bidder on an authentic Johnny Unitas jersey. Banks also modeled in a fashion show fundraiser for The Living Classrooms Foundation, which is a learn-by-doing educational program that targets at-risk youth. Tony, a telecommunication major, is married to the former Yolanda Porter

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys will be counting on Joe Bowden to once again bring veteran leadership and quality competition to the linebacker position. A hard-nosed player with natural instincts and good mobility, Bowden has the skill and experience to play both inside and outside linebacker. After joining the club as an unrestricted free agent on May 3, 2000, he provided depth and versatility to the Cowboys linebacker corps in his first year in Dallas, replacing injured teammates on the outside and filling the role of middle linebacker in some nickel situations. Originally drafted in the fifth round (133rd overall) of the 1992 NFL Draft, Bowden has started 84 games, including 65 straight from 1995-99, during his eight-year career. Also a durable player, Bowden has missed just five of a possible 144 games in his career due to injury. A five-year starter for Tennessee (MLB – 1998; OLB – 1995-97 and 1999), he played a major role in the evolution of the Titans from a .500 ball-club in the mid-1990s to the AFC Champions in 1999.

2000: Bowden spent most of his inaugural season in Dallas at middle linebacker in the club's nickel packages, recording 46 tackles on the year - tops among players without a starting appearance. His first appearance in a Cowboys' uniform came when he filled in for Darren Hambrick at strongside linebacker in the second half of the season opener against Philadelphia (9/3), recording three tackles. He also tied for second on the team with two special teams stops, his first special teams tackles since 1997. He again spelled Hambrick (sprained left knee) on the strong side at Arizona (9/10) and recorded one tackle. Over the next three weeks, Bowden saw most of his work at middle linebacker in the club's nickel package, recording three tackles at Washington (9/18), four stops against San Francisco (9/24) and four more at Carolina (10/1). He was slowed by a strained groin early in the fourth quarter at the N.Y. Giants (10/15), but rebounded the next week against Arizona (10/22) to record a season-high five tackles, including one for a three yard loss. Again working primarily in nickel packages, he helped limit the Cardinals to two-of-10 third down conversions. Against Cincinnati (11/12), Bowden recorded two tackles, including the 500th stop of his career, while helping limit the Bengals to 195 yards of total offense. Bowden picked up steam over the final five games of the season, recording 17 tackles and twice matching his season-high with five stops in a game. The streak started against Minnesota (11/23) on Thanksgiving Day when he tied for third on the team with five tackles. He followed that with four tackles and a tackle for a loss at Tampa Bay (12/3). He then logged three tackles against the N.Y. Giants (12/17) while helping to limit them to 225 total yards. In a homecoming of sorts in the season finale at Tennessee (12/25), Bowden tied his season-high for the third time with five tackles.

1999: After one season at middle linebacker, Bowden returned to the outside and started 15 games for the Titans, recording 81 tackles, in addition to career-high totals in sacks (3.5) and fumble recoveries (three). He also forced three fumbles, recorded one interception, defensed three passes and recorded five tackles for losses. Bowden sacked Tim Couch in the Titans' win over Cleveland (9/19) and led all linebackers with 10 tackles at Jacksonville (9/26). Inactive at San Francisco (10/3) with a strained left quad, Bowden saw his streak of 65 consecutive games started snapped, but he bounced back to recover a Billy Joe Tolliver fumble in the win at New Orleans (10/17) before being forced to leave the game because of a strained hamstring. He returned for the next game and forced a Kurt Warner fumble and recovered a Marshall Faulk fumble in the Tennessee victory over St. Louis (10/31). He paced all linebackers with nine tackles at Cincinnati (11/14) and forced a career-best two fumbles and recovered another against Atlanta (12/19). In the regular season finale at Pittsburgh (1/2/00), Bowden intercepted a Mike Tomczak pass in the Titans' win. In the team's run to Super Bowl XXXIV, he recorded 15 tackles, placing him fifth on the team.

1998: With the acquisition of Eddie Robinson before the start of the 1998 season, Bowden shifted from the outside to middle linebacker and went on to start all 16 games. From his MLB position, Bowden led the team with a career-high 145 tackles, surpassing his previous career-best mark (84) by 61 stops. Seven times during the season he registered double-digit tackle efforts. He also added 1.5 sacks, three passes defensed, two fumble recoveries and one interception. Twice during the year, Bowden found the end zone for the first two touchdowns of his career. The first came on a 12-yard fumble return against Cincinnati (10/18) and the other on a momentum-seizing, one-yard interception return at Tampa Bay (11/8). Bowden opened the season in style, racking up a career-high 19 tackles in a win at Cincinnati (9/6). He had 10 tackles the next week against San Diego (9/13) and led the team with 11 stops to go along with his touchdown against Cincinnati (10/18). He posted 12 tackles against Chicago (10/25) and collected 10 stops against the N.Y. Jets (11/22). Bowden recovered a fumble at Seattle (11/29), and he closed out the season with 10 tackles at Jacksonville (12/13) and at Green Bay (12/20).

1997: A starter in all 16 games at LLB, Bowden ranked second on the team with 84 tackles. He record-



ed six stops, a sack and forced a fumble in the season opener against Oakland (8/31). Three times during the season he registered eight tackles in a game – at Miami (9/7), at Arizona (10/26) and against Jacksonville (11/2). In addition, he added sacks at Seattle (10/5) and Jacksonville (11/16). Bowden recorded his first career interception in the season finale against Pittsburgh (12/21) before leaving the game in the second quarter after suffering a broken left fibula.

1996: In his second season as a starter, Bowden moved to LLB and finished fifth on the team with 73 tackles, three sacks and six passes defensed. His three sacks topped his four-year career total coming into the season. He recorded his first sack of the year in the season opener against Kansas City (9/1). He posted five tackles against both Atlanta (10/13) and San Francisco (10/27) before adding to his sack total with quarterback drops against Seattle (11/3) and Miami (11/17). Bowden registered a season-high nine tackles and forced a fumble against Jacksonville (12/8).

1995: Bowden recorded 51 tackles while starting the final 14 games of the season at RLB after Michael Barrow moved to MLB in place of an injured Al Smith. He led the team with a career-best four forced fumbles. He tied for the team lead with a season-high six tackles against Cleveland (9/17). Later in the season at Cleveland (11/5), he recorded five tackles and forced a fumble that was recovered by Blaine Bishop to set up an Oilers' touchdown. He wrapped up the season by recording his second career sack at Buffalo (12/24)

1994: After missing the first two games of the season with a preseason quadricep injury suffered against Buffalo (8/20), Bowden went on to see action in the final 14 games, totaling 13 tackles. With Eddie Robinson out of the lineup with an ankle injury, Michael Barrow moved to LLB and Bowden earned his only start of the year at RLB against Cincinnati (9/25). In that game, Bowden recorded a season-high five tack-

les and a pass defensed. He forced his first career fumble against Pittsburgh (11/6).

1993: Bowden saw action in all 16 games, replacing an injured Wilber Marshall for six games at RLB, and finished the season with 28 tackles. He also added seven special team tackles, a sack, a fumble recovery and a pass defensed. In his first career start – the season-opener at New Orleans (9/5) – Bowden recorded four stops. He recorded the first sack of his career when he brought down Jay Schroeder in a 28-12 victory over Cincinnati (10/24). He went on to total four tackles in wins over Kansas City (9/12), New England (10/17) and Seattle (11/7). In the postseason loss to Kansas City (1/16/94), he contributed a special teams tackle.

1992: Bowden played in 14 games as a rookie, exclusively on special teams, and ranked seventh on team in special teams tackles with nine. He was a contributor to the Oilers' kickoff coverage unit that ranked first in the NFL by allowing just 15.7 yards-per-return. He was deactivated for two games after suffering an ankle sprain in a 26-10 win over Cincinnati (10/25).

COLLEGE: Bowden finished his three year career at Oklahorna with 286 tackles (168 solo), two sacks, three interceptions, six passes defensed, three fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles. An Associated Press and Football News All-America selection and the Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year as a senior, Bowden led the team with a career-best 127 tackles and also had two interceptions (both returned for touchdowns) and two sacks. He was a first-team All-Big Eight and honorable mention All-America selection as junior after finishing with a team-best 116 tackles.

PERSONAL: Bowden was a first-team all-state and *Parade* All-America selection as senior at North Mesquite, TX, High School, a Dallas suburb, lettering in football. A communications major at Oklahoma, Joseph Tarrod Bowden donates time to the Sickle Cell Anemia Foundation. Joe and wife Malika have a son, Jaylon, and a daughter, Sydney.

PRO: With his size, speed and leaping ability, Chris Brazzell is a good compliment to the Cowboys speed receivers. While his size gives him the ability to venture over the middle of the field, his speed makes defenders respect him as a deep ball threat. During his two seasons with the Cowboys, Brazzell has averaged 18.0 yards on seven receptions and has proven to be a key special teams contributor, posting 10 special team stops in 2000. Dallas coaches are counting on him to provide even greater contributions in 2001.

2000: Despite catching only two passes on the year, Brazzell saw plenty of playing time as he tied for seventh on the team with 10 special teams tackles. He led the team with two special team stops in his first game action at Arizona (9/10). At Washington (9/18), he tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles to help limit Deion Sanders to zero yards on three punt returns. Brazzell again tied for the team lead with two special teams stops against San Francisco (9/24). In four receiver sets against the 49ers, he drew a critical pass interference call in the end zone to set up a one-yard Emmitt Smith touchdown. Brazzell saw considerable action at Carolina (10/1) after Raghib Ismail left the game with a bruised calf but did not record a reception. After being inactive for four games, Brazzell returned to the field against Cincinnati (11/12) and contributed two special teams tackles. He posted his first catch of the season against Minnesota (11/23) with a two-yard grab before catching a 10-yard pass from Anthony Wright at Tampa Bay (12/3), marking Wright's first career completion. Brazzell also had a key special teams tackle at Tampa to pin the Bucs at their own seven-yard line following a kickoff. He suffered a strained right shoulder after tallying a special teams stop against Washington (12/10) and missed the second half of the game. His shoulder injury forced him to miss the final two games of the season.

1999: Brazzell went to camp with the N.Y. Jets but was waived Sept. 5. He was claimed by Dallas on Sept. 6 and saw special teams action in the Cowboys season opener at Washington (9/12). He was deactivated the next three games before being released and signed to Dallas' practice squad, where he remained for the next eight games. With a rash of late season injuries to the receiving corps, the Cowboys activated Brazzell from the practice squad on Dec. 10. In his first game back on the active roster, he recorded his first NFL reception with a 12-yard grab on third-and-nine in the third quarter to keep a drive alive against Philadelphia (12/12). The following week against his former N.Y. Jets (12/19) teammates, Brazzell recorded two receptions for a team-high 62 yards, including a career-best 53-yard catch. Because of his play in the first half of that game, he saw considerable action in place on Jason Tucker in standard sets in the second half. Brazzell finished out the regular season with a reception at New Orleans (12/24) (21 yards) and against the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00) (19 yards). In the NFC Wild Card Game at Minnesota (1/9/00), Brazzell earned his first NFL start when the Cowboys opened in a three wide receiver set. He went on to record two receptions for 12 yards.


1998: Brazzell was a sixth round draft choice (174th overall) of the N.Y. Jets in the 1998 NFL Draft. He was released before the season began and signed to the Jets practice squad, where he spent the remainder of the year.

COLLÉGE: Brazzell earned All-Lone Star Conference honors as a senior after totaling 47 catches for 1,091 yards (23.3 avg.) and 13 touchdowns. He led the conference by averaging 109.1 receiving yards-per-game. He caught 11 passes for 216 yards and three touchdowns against Northeastern State, earning conference Player of the Week honors. He is only the second player in school history to record over 1,000 yards receiving in a season. He finished ninth on ASU's all-time receiving list, with 1,565 yards in just two seasons. As a junior, he was a second-team all-conference selection after catching 34 passes for 474 yards and five touchdowns. Brazzell tied the school record for receptions in a game with 11 against Tarleton State. He played two seasons at Blinn Junior College before transferring to Angelo State.

PERSONAL: Brazzell earned all-state, South Texas MVP and district MVP honors as a senior at Alice, TX, High School. The education major holds the Texas high school single-season record with 75 catches for 1,971 yards and a 26.0 yards-per-catch average, including a career-high 309 yards receiving in a single game.

PRO: Despite being considered an undersized linebacker from a small college, Dexter Coakley has made a lasting impression on the National Football League. After earning the starting weakside linebacker job as a rookie third-round draft choice, Coakley has strung together four impressive seasons – finishing in the top three on the team in tackles each year. He became just the second Dallas linebacker in the last 17 years and only the seventh linebacker in club history to be selected to the Pro Bowl when he earned a spot on the NFC squad following the 1999 season. But none of his accomplishments, including earning All-Pro honors in 1999, came as a surprise to Coakley, who has been exceeding expectations throughout his entire athletic career with his quickness, speed and intensity. His enthusiasm for the game, aggressive nature and determination to succeed are perhaps the best package of attributes that any Dallas player has brought to the organization in recent history.

2000: Coakley again performed at his expected high level, posting a career-high 144 tackles to finish second on the team while tying for the team lead with seven tackles behind the line of scrimmage. Six times during the 2000 season, he led or tied for the team lead in tackles in a game. He opened the season against Philadelphia (9/3) by leading all linebackers with 10 tackles. He posted seven stops to help limit the Cardinals to 3.0 yards-per-carry at Arizona (9/10) before helping limit the Redskins to 3.7 yards-per-carry at Washington (9/18) by tallying 10 tackles. He again recorded 10 stops against San Francisco (9/24), and he led the team with a season-high 13 tackles, including a career-best eight solo stops, at Carolina (10/1). At the N.Y. Giants (10/15), Coakley led the team with 11 tackles while adding a stop behind the line of scrimmage. He registered another tackle for a loss among his eight stops against Arizona (10/22) in helping limit the Cardinals to 99 total yards through the first three quarters before leaving the 48-7 win. He posted his sixth double-digit tackle game when he tallied 10 stops against Jacksonville (10/29). At Philadelphia (11/5), Coakley helped limit four Eagles running backs to 77 rushing yards on 25 carries (3.1 avg.) while recording 12 tackles. For the third time this season, he led the team in tackles, recording 12 stops against Cincinnati (11/12) while helping limit the Bengals to 195 total yards of offense. He recorded seven stops at Baltimore (11/19), including the 500th tackle of his career. He tied for the team lead with six tackles against Minnesota (11/23) before helping hold the Redskins to 79 rushing yards with three stops against Washington (12/10). He also recovered a Stephen Davis fumble to set up a Dallas touchdown early in the third period. He again led the team with 11 tackles against the N.Y. Giants (12/17), including two stops for losses, to help limit the Giants to 3.2 rushing yards-per-carry. In the season finale at Tennessee (12/25) on Christmas night, Coakley led the team with 11 tackles, including one behind the line of scrimmage, and forced a fumble. Coakley posted double digit tackle totals 10 times during the season, bringing his four-year career total to 24 double digit games.

1999: Coakley turned in another phenomenal season, leading the team with four interceptions, tying for the team lead with six tackles for a loss, finishing second with 131 tackles, tying for third with nine passes defensed and finishing fifth with 12 special teams tackles. His four interceptions were the most by a Dallas linebacker since Lee Roy Jordan totaled six in 1975, and he was the first linebacker to lead the team in interceptions since Eugene Lockhart in 1989. Coakley's performance throughout the season earned him his first Pro Bowl selection, the first Dallas linebacker to earn a Pro Bowl spot since Ken Norton in 1993. He also earned first-team All-Pro honors from Sports Illustrated and second-team All-Pro honors from College & Pro Football Newsweekly and Football Digest. He opened the season at Washington (9/12) tying for the team lead with nine tackles, including a tackle for a loss on third down that led to a Redskins punt with 3:01 remaining in the game, setting Dallas up for its game tying touchdown drive. Against Atlanta (9/20), he finished with five tackles after intercepting a Tony Graziani pass on the Falcons opening drive and returning it 43 yards to set up a Dallas field goal. His five stops against Arizona (10/3) helped limit the Cardinals to 208 total yards before leading the team with 11 tackles at Philadelphia (10/10). At the N.Y. Giants (10/18), he posted a season-high 12 tackles while helping limit the Giants to 228 yards of offense. Against Washington (10/24), Coakley posted eight tackles while helping limit the Redskins to 61 yards rushing, and he registered six stops while forcing a fumble at Indianapolis (10/31). He tied for the team lead with eight tackles at Minnesota (11/8) before tying for the team lead with 11 stops and helping hold Green Bay (11/14) to 40 yards rushing. At Arizona (11/21), he helped limit the Cardinals to 207 total yards by leading the team with 10 tackles while recording two tackles for losses and a sack. In the Thanksgiving Day battle against Miami (11/25), Coakley recorded the first multi-interception game of his career, picking off Dan Marino twice, returning the first pick 46 yards for the game's first score. He also finished with 10 tackles, a career-high three passes defensed and two special teams stops against the Dolphins to earn Phil Simms' Iron Man Award and NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors. Coakley totaled eight tackles, a career-high tying three passes defensed and an interception the next week at New England (12/5). He

recorded nine stops and helped limit Philadelphia (12/12) to 233 total yards before posting five tackles against the N.Y. Jets (12/19). He totaled seven stops and a tackle for a loss at New Orleans (12/24), and he helped limit the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00) to 74 rushing yards with seven tackles, including one for a loss. Coakley recorded eight tackles in the NFC Wild Card Playoff Game at Minnesota (1/9/00).

1998: Coakley followed a stellar rookie campaign with a solid sophomore season, finishing second on the team with 127 tackles. He closed the year with eight passes defensed, tying the third highest total on the team. Coakley was a big part of limiting the Cardinals to 45 rushing yards and 205 total yards by recording three tackles and two passes defensed against Arizona (9/6). At Denver (9/13), he led the team with 11 tackles. The next week at the N.Y. Giants (9/21), he finished with six tackles and two passes defensed as the Dallas defense limited the Giants to 56 yards. He posted nine tackles against Oakland (9/27) and seven stops at Washington (10/4). The next week, Coakley registered eight tackles while helping the defense hold Carolina (10/11) to 37 yards rushing on 21 carries (1.8 avg.). At Chicago (10/18), he led the team with a career-high 15 tackles while also recording a first quarter sack and picking off a third quarter pass to set up a Dallas touchdown. When the Cowboys limited the Eagles to 200 yards of total offense (96 rushing, 104 passing) at Philadelphia (11/2), Coakley led the team with eight tackles and added his second sack of the season. He was second on the team the next week with eight tackles against the N.Y. Giants (11/8). Coakley tackled Ricky Watters for a two-yard loss and helped limit the Seahawks (11/22) to 66 yards rushing with his five-tackle performance. His eight tackles against Minnesota (11/26) on Thanksgiving Day tied him for the team lead. Over the final four games of the regular season, at New Orleans (12/6), at Kansas City (12/13), against Philadelphia (12/20) and Washington (12/27), Coakley recorded nine tackles a game. In the Eagles contest, he also led the team with two special team tackles, giving him 10 for the season - sixth best on the team. In the season finale, his nine stops helped limit the Redskins to 80 yards rushing in the game and 82 total yards in the second half. In the first postseason action of his career, Coakley recorded five tackles and a special teams stop against Arizona (1/2/99).

1997: Coakley was awarded the starting job at weakside linebacker in training camp and never relinquished the position. By season's end, Coakley was the NFL's leader among all rookies in tackles with a Cowboys rookie record 136 stops - a total that was third on the Cowboys defensive list. He was named to All Rookie teams selected by Pro Football Weekly and Football News. His 2.5 sacks were the most by a Dallas rookie since Russell Maryland registered 4.5 in 1991, and his sack total was good for seventh place among all NFL rookie defenders. Coakley was the club leader with 10 stops for losses. He was named the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Month for October after tallying 31 tackles, one tackle for a loss and a fumble return for a touchdown. Coakley became the first rookie to start a season opener for Dallas since Robert Jones in 1992 when he started at Pittsburgh (8/31). Coakley led the team with eight tackles and added his first career interception in his first NFL game, making him the first rookie linebacker to record an interception for Dallas since Dixon Edwards had one against Cincinnati on Oct. 13, 1991. The next week at Arizona (9/7), he totaled eight stops, two tackles for losses, two quarterback pressures and a pass deflection. He also had a sack in overtime that forced a Kent Graham fumble that Dallas recovered. Coakley finished second on the team with 11 tackles at Washington (10/13). He also picked up a Redskins fumble and returned it 16 yards for his first career touchdown, making him the first rookie defender to record a touchdown for Dallas since Edwards scored against Cincinnati. It was also the first fumble return for a touchdown by a Dallas rookie since Larry Cole ran one back 21 yards at Washington on Nov. 17, 1968. He registered a season-high 12 tackles at Green Bay (11/23) while tying the club record with four tackles for a loss. He also registered a sack in the Packers game and went over the 100-tackle mark for the season. Four days later, he posted a season-high tying 12-tackle performance against Tennessee (11/27). In the process, he broke Robert Jones' single-season record for tackles by a rookie. He recorded his sixth double digit tackle game of the season with 10 stops against Carolina (12/8) before again totaling 10 stops in the season finale against the N.Y. Giants (12/21) while adding his 10th tackle for a loss

COLLEGE: Coakley recorded a school record 616 tackles and 13 forced fumbles at Appalachian State, totaling double figure tackles in 37 games and at least 20 stops in seven games. Coakley was a first-team Division I-AA All-America and the Southern Conference Defensive Player of the Year as a sophomore, junior and senior, and, in his first year at ASU, he was named the conference's Defensive Freshman of the Year. In 1995, he was named the inaugural recipient of the Buck Buchanan Award, which honor's the nation's best Division I-AA defensive player, and he went on to bring home the same award following his senior season. Coakley was also named the Southern Conference's Athlete of the Year as a junior and senior, marking just the seventh time in conference history that one individual had earned that distinction in consecutive years. As a senior, he accumulated a career-high 166 tackles and was named the league's Defensive Player of the Week after having 20-tackle performances against Wake Forest, East Tennessee State and Furman. As a junior, he averaged 13.6 tackles-per-game in 11 regular season outings (150 total). Coakley was the defensive spark behind a Mountaineer team that went undefeated in the regular season and finished the year 12-1 after losing to Stephen F. Austin in a second round playoft game.

PERSONAL: A native of Mt. Pleasant, SC, Coakley graduated from Wando High School, where he earned four letters in football. He was the team's Most Valuable Player twice and was twice named all-conference as a defensive back. Coakley posted 295 tackles in his final two years of prep football and was named his school's athlete of the year as a senior. He also lettered in wrestling. Coakley earned a degree in communications and advertising at Appalachian State and worked in the school's sports information office. Dexter annually serves as a celebrity escort in the Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show, which raises funds for pediatric oncology research. In 1999 and 2000, he was a guest football coach at the club's Let Us Play! Sports Camp for Girls, a camp for girls ages 12-15 that are selected from various




non-profit agencies in the D/FW metroplex. Dexter also served as a speaker for "Babe's Best," a program created by former Cowboys quarterback and current Dallas CBS affiliate sports anchor Babe Laufenberg to recognize outstanding high school athletes for their efforts on and off the field.

Collins has shown strong physical and mental capabilities during his offseason work, and he will be given the opportunity to deep snap as well as back up at tight end.

2001: Collins played for the NY/NJ Hitmen in the XFL during the spring and finished the season with three receptions for 38 yards.

2000: Collins went to camp with the Baltimore Ravens but was cut before the season began. He spent the remainder of the season out of football.

1999: Collins signed with the Cleveland Browns on Feb. 23 and was on the active roster through the first three weeks but did not play. Cleveland waived Collins on Sept. 27 and the Baltimore Ravens signed him to their roster on Dec. 3. He saw his first NFL action against Tennessee (12/5) but did not record a catch. He made his first NFL start the next week at Pittsburgh (12/12). Collins registered his first NFL reception, good for 21 yards, against New Orleans (12/19). 

PRO: Damon Dunn, a multi-dimensional wide receiver who can be used on the outside or in the slot, has good hands and is an intelligent receiver. Signed May 3 following the conclusion of the XFL season, Dunn impressed Cowboys' coaches with his speed and versatility, both as a receiver and return specialist. He will be looking to make his mark on special teams while contributing as a receiver when called upon.

2001: Dunn was a member of the XFL champion Los Angeles Xtreme, where he was a wide receiver and returned both punts and kickoffs. He finished the season with 10 catches for 63 yards and one touchdown, while also returning four kickoffs for 105 yards (26.3 avg.) and six punts for 67 yards (11.2 avg.).

2000: Dunn was allocated to the Berlin Thunder of NFL Europe by Cleveland, where he led the team and finished third in the league with 41 receptions for 794 yards (19.4 average) and six touchdowns. He returned to the Browns but was cut at the end of camp. The N.Y. Jets picked him up, and he played against New England (9/11) but did not record a catch. He was waived by the Jets on Sept. 20 and resigned by Cleveland Oct. 18. He played in three games for the Browns against Cincinnati (10/29), the N.Y. Giants (11/5) and New England (11/12), where he registered one catch for six yards against the Patriots. Cleveland released him Nov. 23.

1999: Dunn returned with the Jaguars but was waived at the end of camp. He then signed to the Cleveland Browns' practice squad on Nov. 16. He was signed to the active roster on Dec. 14, and saw his first action against Jacksonville (12/19), but did not register a catch.

1998: Dunn was signed by the Jacksonville Jaguars as a rookie free agent on April 23 but was released at the end of camp. He re-signed to the Jaguars' practice squad, where he remained for the season.

COLLEGE: Dunn finished his collegiate campaign as Stanford's all-time leader in kickoff returns and kickoff return touchdowns, totaling 1,950 yards (26.7 average) and three touchdowns. As a senior starter, Dunn finished the year with 1,161 all-purpose yards (578 receiving, 566 on kickoff returns and 17 rushing) and four touchdowns. As a junior, he was named All-Pac-10 and Academic All-Pac-10 as he finished the year with 35 receptions for 452 yards and two touchdowns. During his sophomore season, he led the Pac-10 with 19 kickoff returns for 539 yards (28.4 avg.) and returned his first kickoff of the season 91 yards for a touchdown. Dunn returned 17 kickoffs for 412 yards (24.2 average) including one for 100 yards and a touchdown against Arizona State. As a member of the track team, Dunn recorded his personal best in the 100 meters (10.64) and 200 meters (21.54) as a junior.

PERSONAL: Damon Jerrel Dunn, an ordained Baptist minister from Arlington, TX, received his degree in public policy from Stanford. He returned to school in 1999 and is working towards a master's degree in Philosophy. Dunn lettered in track and was named all-state and all-southwest as a wide receiver at Sam Houston High School in Arlington, TX. Dunn was also a SuperPrep and Blue Chip Illustrated All-America selection. As a Cowboy, Dunn jumped right into donating time to the community, attending and supporting participants at the Plano Komen Race for the Cure and speaking to student athletes at the St. Philips School Annual Sports Banquet. His father, former UT-Austin fullback, Mike Lockett, led the way for Heisman running back Earl Campbell.

PRO: In an effort to infuse the defensive secondary with young talent last season, Dallas selected three cornerbacks in the 2000 NFL Draft. The

third of those players, Mario Edwards, was taken in the sixth-round (180th overall) and immediately turned heads with his attitude and hard work. A productive player who achieved at the highest level of collegiate competition, his aggressive style of play had him set to earn significant playing time before a preseason hamstring injury limited him the second half of training camp and into the first month of the regular season. Once healthy, Edwards became a special teams standout and even bigger things are expected of

him during his sophomore campaign.

2000: Despite suffering a strained left hamstring in a preseason game against Oakland (8/13) - an injury that forced him to miss the final two preseason games and kept him on the club's inactive list the first four weeks of the regular season - Edwards tied for fourth on the team with 11 special teams tackles. For the season, Edwards recorded a special teams tackle in eight of the 11 games he played and was a key member of a kickoff coverage unit that finished the year ranked third in the league in opponents average starting position following kickoffs. His NFL debut came on special teams at Carolina (10/1), and he responded with one tackle. With the return of Charlie Williams (staph infection) to the lineup, Edwards was a game day deactivation at the N.Y. Giants (10/15). He returned to action the following week against Arizona (10/22) and tied for second on the team with two special teams tackles. At Philadelphia (11/5) he recorded a special teams tackle and helped limit Brian Mitchell to one punt return for two yards and two fair catches. Edwards recorded a special teams tackle against Minnesota (11/23) and helped limit the Vikings to an 18.0 average on three kickoff returns. As proof of his improvement as the season progressed. Edwards recorded five special teams tackles over the season's final three games. He tied for second on the team with two special teams tackles against Washington (12/10) as Deion Sanders was limited to one return for 11 yards on three punts and the Redskins were limited to a 17.9 vard average on eight kickoff returns. The following week, he tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles against the N.Y. Giants (12/17). In the season finale at Tennessee (12/25), Edwards earned his first NFL start, lining up at left cornerback while Phillippi Sparks moved to safety. He recorded three tackles and broke up a pass while helping limit the Titans to a 10.8 yards-per-catch average.


COLLEGE: Edwards started two national championship games in his final two seasons at Florida State and played for Seminole teams that finished the 1995, 1996, 1998 and 1999 seasons ranked No. 4, 3, 3 and 1 in the nation, respectively. As a senior, he helped the Seminoles to the national title with a win over Virginia Tech in the Sugar Bowl and earned All-ACC honors at left cornerback. After redshirting during his third year at Florida State, Edwards ranked eighth in the nation in interceptions with six as a junior and earned second-team All-ACC honors. He helped the Seminoles lead the nation in pass defense, starting at left corner. Edwards led the team with 11 pass deflections and closed the year with 20 tackles. He set a school record, and tied the conference record, by registering four interceptions in one game against Wake Forest. He played in every game as a sophomore reserve and was one of only six true freshmen to earn a varsity letter. In his first season in Tallahassee, Edwards contributed on special teams with a blocked

punt that he caught and returned 24 yards for a score against North Carolina.

PERSONAL: A social sciences major at Florida State, Edwards attended Pascagoula, MS, High School – the same school that produced former Florida State All-America corner Terrell Buckley. Edwards, a high school All-America choice, was one of the most highly regarded high school players in the country in 1995. He finished his high school career with a senior season that included 61 tackles, four interceptions and 14 pass deflections.

PRO: With two NFL seasons under his belt, Ebenezer Ekuban is poised to become a vital cog along the Cowboys defensive line. His outstanding size, speed and quickness make him a pass rusher that can create havoc in opponent's backfields, as witnessed by his team leading 6.5 sacks in 2000. Originally a tight end who was converted to the defensive line at the mid-point of his collegiate career, Ekuban's desire and work ethic have contributed to his rapid development at defensive end. His intelligence and enthusiasm to learn the intricacies of the game round out a very promising package.

2000: Despite moving from a starting role to a reserve capacity early in the season, Ekuban led the team with 6.5 sacks and tied for the team lead with two forced fumbles while posting 25 tackles, seven quarterback pressures and four stops behind the line of scrimmage. In his first start in a non-injury replacement role, he recorded two tackles and a pressure in the season opener against Philadelphia (9/3). The following week at Arizona (9/10), he teamed with Leon Lett to register his first half sack of the season while also recording five stops while helping limit the Cardinals to 3.0 yards-per-rush on 33 carries. He moved into a reserve capacity at Washington (9/18) and came off the bench to post two tackles, a sack and a tackle for an 18-yard loss to help limit the Redskins to 3.7 yards-per-carry. Ekuban dislocated his right great toe early in the game against San Francisco (9/24), causing him to miss the remainder of the 49ers game, as well as the next four games. He returned to action at Philadelphia (11/5) and tallied two stops before posting two tackles against Cincinnati (11/12). Ekuban recorded one of Dallas' biggest plays against the Bengals when he sacked Akili Smith, forced a fumble on the play and recovered the fumble. It marked the first forced fumble and fumble recovery of his career. Ekuban recorded a tackle, a sack and a forced fumble against Minnesota (11/23) on Thanksgiving Day. He posted two sacks against Washington (12/10) while also recording a career-high four quarterback pressures. Ekuban also saw action at tight end in goal-line situations against the Redskins. Against the N.Y. Giants (12/17), he tallied two stops, including one for a loss, two pressures and a sack before being ejected from the game early in the third quarter for kicking the Giants Lomas Brown. In his limited playing time, he helped hold New York to 126 net yards passing, and he pressured Kerry Collins into throwing an interception in the Dallas end zone. In the Christmas night season finale at Tennessee (12/25), Ekuban registered four tackles, including his fourth stop behind the line of scrimmage


1999: Ekuban saw consistent action throughout his rookie season, playing in every game while starting the final two games of the year after Greg Ellis was felled with a broken leg. His performance and development enabled Ekuban to earn All-Rookie honors from Pro Football Weekly and The Football News. Used primarily as a pass rusher in spot situations, he finished the season with 33 tackles and 2.5 sacks. While opening his professional career in Washington D.C., where he attended high school, Ekuban tied for the team lead with two quarterback pressures in the overtime win over the Redskins (9/12). The following week, he displayed his versatility by playing on both sides of the ball against Atlanta (9/20). While registering one tackle on defense against the Falcons. Ekuban also saw goal-line action at tight end, providing a key block that enabled Emmitt Smith to score the Cowboys' first touchdown. After Ellis suffered a broken leg in the win over Philadelphia (12/12), Ekuban went from part-time player to starter for the remainder of the year. He responded in the win over Philadelphia by recording his first career sack. He ended the day with 1.5 sacks, which marked the most in a game by a Dallas rookie since Nov. 28, 1991. The following week against the N.Y. Jets (12/19), Ekuban saw his most extensive playing time of the season and responded with five tackles. He then earned his first career start on Christmas Eve in New Orleans (12/24), leading the team with a career-high nine tackles while lining up across from Pro Bowl tackle Willie Roaf. He also added a sack and a tackle for a loss as the defensive front helped limit Ricky Williams to 61 yards on 23 carries (2.7 average). The following week in a playoff clinching win over the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00), he led all defensive linemen with five tackles and tied for the team lead with three quarterback pressures as the Dallas defense limited New York to 74 yards rushing. In the playoff loss at Minnesota (1/9/00), Ekuban recorded four tackles before suffering a sprained left knee in the second quarter that severely limited his effectiveness for the rest of the game.

COLLEGE: Ekúban capped his collegiate career by being named first team All-America by *The Sporting News* while also earning All-ACC honors as a senior. Although it was his first season as a full-time starter, Ekuban collected 96 tackles and led the Tar Heels with seven sacks. He also set a school record with 23 stops for losses totaling 98 yards. Lawrence Taylor and William Fuller, both of whom had 22, shared the previous school record. He earned ACC Player of the Week honors against Clemson, collecting a career-high 16 tackles, four tackles for losses, two sacks and a forced fumbled. As a junior, in his first season as a defensive end, Ekuban played in 10 regular season games and had starting assign-

ments in two of those. Prior to that, he played tight end as a sophomore and freshman, catching six passes for 66 yards and a touchdown.

PERSONAL: In his two-plus years with the Cowboys, Ekuban has made a very visible contribution to the Dallas-Fort Worth community. This past spring, he served as the Dallas celebrity bedtime story reader on behalf of the National Center for Family Literacy to kickoff National Bedtime Story Month (April). He also served as keynote speaker at the 18th Annual Boys & Girls Club of Arlington Banquet and local ABC sports anchor Dale Hansen's Scholar Athlete Awards Banquet, emphasizing the importance of education and making smart choices in life. He participated as a "Grim Reaper" in the Fatal Choices/Shattered Dreams program, demonstrating the devastating effects of drinking and driving. He also participated in a school book cover program to teach children the importance of dialing 911. He has become actively involved with the United Way, participating in the NFL's First Annual Hometown Huddle and serving as Co-Master of Ceremonies for the "Run the Runway" annual fundraiser for United Way of Dallas and Tarrant County, and The Salvation Army, participating in The Salvation Army Angel Tree program. Ebenezer, who has participated in the NFL Flag Football Program at school assemblies, annually serves as a celebrity escort for the Children's Cancer Fund of Dallas Fashion Show. He also serves as an annual guest coach for the Cowboys Let Us Play! Camp for Girls, coaching girls from several metroplex non-profit agencies. In September of 2000, Ekuban served as Honorary Chairman for the annual fundraiser benefiting Crossroads Interfaith Housing Program, where he regularly spends time with the children living there. At North Carolina, he was actively involved in the Carolina Outreach Community Service Program, and was involved in helping to raise \$6,000 for juvenile diabetes research in September of 1998. As a senior at UNC, he made the Dean's List during his final football season, and he was named the 1998 winner of the Jim Tatum Award, which honors the ACC's top student athlete on the football field. Ekuban earned his degree in exercise and sports science. He was a collegiate teammate of Cowboys defensive end Ellis. Ekuban is a native of Ghana, Africa, and he did not participate in football until his junior year of high school in Maryland. He graduated from Bladensburgh High School in Riverdale, MD, where he was a two-way standout as a senior tight end and defensive end. In his final prep season, he caught 28 passes for 546 yards and five touchdowns while also recording 76 tackles and 11 sacks.

PRO: Having already overcome the pressure and expectations of being the Cowboys highest draft pick (eighth overall) since Russell Maryland was taken with the first overall pick in 1991, Greg Ellis faced and conquered an even more daunting task in 2000. Having had his 1999 season cut short when he fractured the tibia and fibula in his left leg, Ellis fought through the pain and rehabilitation that accompanied having a titanium rod inserted into the leg during the 2000 season. By the end of the year he had re-emerged as one of the top young defensive ends in the game, proving his worth to the club both on and off the field. On the field he led the club's defensive linemen with a career-high 77 tackles and off the field he was named by teammates as the recipient of the Ed Block courage award for overcoming his injuries. With a season under his belt following the devastating injury. Ellis has regained his place as the cornerstone of the defensive line for the next generation.

2000: After two years patrolling the left end of the Dallas defensive line, Ellis switched to the right side in 2000 to take pressure off his injured left leg. He went on to lead all defensive linemen with a careerhigh 77 tackles, while tying for the team lead with seven tackles for losses and two fumble recoveries. He

also finished second on the team with 13 quarterback pressures. After working into camp slowly, Ellis returned to full action for the final two preseason games. In the season opener against Philadelphia (9/3), he led all defensive linemen with eight tackles and a tackle for a loss in his first regular season action since suffering the leg fracture. He recovered a fumble at Arizona (9/10), and then at Washington (9/18). he recorded his first sack of the season on the game's final play to preserve the Cowboys Monday night win. He also recovered a Redskins fumble in the second quarter to set up a Dallas touchdown. Ellis led all defensive linemen and was third on the team with a career-high 11 tackles against San Francisco (9/24). It was the highest tackle total by a Dallas defensive lineman since Chad Hennings recorded 11 stops against the N.Y. Giants on Dec. 21, 1997. Ellis then recorded four tackles and broke up a pass against Arizona (10/22) while helping limit the Cardinals running backs to 3.5 yards-per-running attempt. Facing perennial All-Pro Tony Boselli, Ellis put together an admirable day against Jacksonville (10/29) with five tackles, a tackle for a loss and a quarterback pressure. He also forced Boselli into two illegal procedure penalties. On special teams, Ellis blocked his first career field goal, getting his hand on a 49-yard fourth quarter attempt by Mike Hollis. Ellis was second among defensive linemen with nine tackles, including two behind the line, at Philadelphia (11/5) while helping limit the Eagles running backs to 25 carries for 77 yards (3.1 avg.). His seven tackles against Cincinnati (11/12) led all defensive linemen, and he recorded his second sack of the season with a takedown of Akili Smith as the Bengals were limited to 195 total yards. Ellis again led all defensive linemen in tackles and was third on the team with nine stops at Baltimore (11/19). His five tackles against Minnesota (11/23) tied him for second on the team. With four tackles, a sack and two quarterback pressures against Washington (12/10) Ellis helped limit the Redskins to just 79 rushing yards on the day, a season low for the Dallas defense. Ellis wrapped up his comeback season with an all-around game at Tennessee (12/25), recording three tackles, two quarterback pressures and a tackle for a loss.

1999: Despite missing the final three regular season games because of a fractured left tibia and fibula, Ellis led the team with 7.5 sacks, the highest sack total by a Dallas player since Tony Tolbert had 12.0 in 1996. Before the injury, he was eighth in the NFC in sacks and was also tied for the team lead with 17 quarterback pressures. He finished the season with 59 tackles, four passes defensed and two forced fumbles. Ellis set the tone for the season early, recording five tackles and a career-best two sacks at Washington (9/12) in the season opener. The first sack came with the Redskins at the Dallas four-yard line and forced a fumble that George Teague recovered to end a potential scoring drive. The second sack came on third and three on the Redskins opening possession in overtime and forced them to punt. Dallas then took the ball and drove 95-yards for the game-winning score. The next week on Monday Night Football, he recorded his first career interception and touchdown when he picked off a Danny Kanell pass and raced 87-yards for a score against Atlanta (9/20). It was the longest touchdown return of any kind by a defensive lineman in club history until the next game. He also led all defensive linemen with six tackles on the evening. Ellis closed out his season opening burst of big plays against Arizona (10/3) by returning a Jake Plummer fumble 98 yards for a touchdown, the longest fumble return in Cowboys history. In doing so, he became the first Cowboys defensive player since Ray Horton in 1991 (vs. N.Y. Giants, 9/29 and at Green Bay, 10/6) to score a touchdown in back-to-back weeks. Ellis logged four tackles at Philadelphia (10/10) before adding seven tackles and a sack in helping limit the N.Y. Giants (10/18) to 2.5 yards-percarry average. His four tackles against Washington (10/24) helped limit the NFL's top ranked offense to 272 total yards, including just 61 rushing. Ellis was third on the team, tops among linemen, with seven tackles at Indianapolis (10/31) while also adding a tackle for a loss and a forced fumble. For the second time in 1999, Ellis recorded a career-high two sacks in a game while also leading all defensive linemen with five tackles at Minnesota (11/8). With three tackles and a team-high three quarterback pressures against Green Bay (11/14), he helped limit Brett Favre to a 57.1 QB rating and the Packers to 40 yards rushing, including 31 yards on 15 attempts (2.1 avg.) by Dorsey Levens. He then logged a season-high eight tackles at Arizona (11/21) to finish second on the team, while adding a sack and three quarterback pressures as the Cardinals were limited to 207 total yards. On Thanksgiving Day against Miami (11/25), pressure from the defensive front was instrumental in forcing Dan Marino into a career-worst five interceptions. Ellis recorded his final sack of the season at New England (12/5) while adding four tackles, but his season came to an abrupt end the next week against Philadelphia (12/12) when he fractured the tibia and fibula in his left leg in the first quarter. He underwent surgery that night to have a titanium rod inserted into the leg and was placed on injured reserve on Dec. 15. Following the season, he also underwent surgery on Feb. 10, 2000 to have a bone chip removed from his right wrist

1998: Ellis finished his rookle campaign leading the team with 22 quarterback pressures and all defensive linemen with 63 tackles. He also closed the year with five tackles for losses, five passes defensed and three sacks. Since tackle records began being kept in 1979, Ellis became the Cowboys first rookie to lead all defensive linemen on the team in tackles. This effort earned him all-rookie honors from Football News and Football Digest. Against Arizona (9/6), he became the first rookie to start a season opener at defensive end for Dallas since Bob Lilly in 1961. He finished with two tackles and two quarterback pressures against the Cardinals. He registered five tackles at Denver (9/13) before totaling three tackles and two quarterback pressures the next week at the N.Y. Giants (9/21). He also forced his first career fumble in the fourth quarter and helped limit the Giants to 56 yards rushing. He recorded his first career sack while adding three tackles against Oakland (9/27). He totaled five stops at Washington (10/4), and he registered a season-high nine tackles and 1.5 sacks against Carolina (10/11) while helping limit the Panthers to 37 yards rushing on 21 carries (1.8 avg.). He had three tackles and helped limit the Bears to 2.5 yards-per-rush at Chicago (10/18). He recorded four tackles and half a sack against the Giants (11/8) before recording two tackles and two pressures while helping limit the Cardinals to 32 rushing yards at Arizona (11/15). The next week against Seattle (11/22), he totaled two tackles and deflected his first NFL pass. Four days later against Minnesota (11/26) on Thanksgiving Day, he led all defensive line-




men with four tackles while adding two pressures and two passes defensed. He added six tackles and his first career fumble recovery at New Orleans (12/6). He led all defensive linemen with seven tackles and a career-high four quarterback pressures against Philadelphia (12/20), and he registered four tackles and two tackles for losses in the season finale against Washington (12/27). In his first postseason action against Arizona (1/2/99), he led all defensive linemen with eight tackles.

COLLEGE: Ellis teamed with Cowboys 1999 first round draft choice Ebenezer Ekuban on the defensive line at North Carolina. With 32.5 career sacks, Ellis left North Carolina as the school's all-time sack leader, the same school that produced NFL Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor. As a senior, Ellis earned All-America honors, was a finalist for the Lombardi Award and an All-ACC selection for the third straight season after collecting 87 tackles, nine sacks and 32 quarterback pressures. As a junior, Ellis was named second-team All-America by The Sporting News and first-team All-ACC after closing the season with 62 tackles, a school record 38 quarterback pressures and 12.5 sacks, the second most sacks in a season behind Taylor's 16 in 1979. In 1995, Ellis became the first North Carolina sophomore to be named first-team All-ACC since Reuben Davis in 1985. Ellis was also named honorable mention All-America by UPI while recording 71 tackles and seven sacks. As a back-up defensive end during his redshirt freshman year, Ellis ranked second on the team with four sacks.

PERSONAL: Gregory Lemont Ellis was an all-state selection as a tight end and defensive end at East Wake High School in Wendell, NC. During his high school career, he intercepted five passes and returned all of them for touchdowns. He also blocked four punts and returned two of them for scores. An outstanding basketball player, Ellis was selected to play in the North Carolina East/West Shrine Game. The Greensboro News and Observer voted him the Male High School Athlete of the Year in 1993. Ellis enjoys spending time with the children at Happy Hill Farm and supporting their program that houses and educates abused and neglected children. He also participated in a special program hosted by Head Coach Dave Campo for the Arlington Stars, a group of mentally challenged adults, and served as a celebrity model escort for the annual Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show. Ellis received his degree in communications studies at UNC, where he was also a member of the junior varsity basketball team as a sophomore. Ellis' wife, Tangie, was his high school sweetheart. The couple has a daughter, Tyann (1/17/00).

Falcons practice squad. Fields was tabbed for the assignment after having spent training camp with Dallas as a rookie free agent. As an athletic but raw defensive end, Fields had impressed coaches during training camp and was one of the last players Dallas released before the start of the regular season. With just two years of college play under his belt, a rookie year of seasoning should allow Fields to contribute even more to the defensive line rotation in 2001.

2000: Fields signed as a rookie free agent with the Cowboys on April 19. He saw action in all five preseason games, recording five tackles and a fumble recovery before being released Aug. 27. He immediately signed to the Atlanta practice squad, where he spent the first 11 weeks of the season. He was signed by Dallas off the Falcons practice squad on Nov. 8 after Chad Hennings was lost for the season



with a nerve irritation in his neck. Fields was deactivated his first three weeks on the roster before seeing his first NFL action at Tampa Bay (12/3). He went on to suit up against Washington (12/10) and the N.Y. Giants (12/17) but did not record a tackle. He was deactivated in the season finale at Tennessee (12/25).

COLLEGE: Fields earned All-Southland Conference honors as a senior, recording 54 tackles, 21 quarterback pressures, 14 tackles behind the line of scrimmage and seven sacks. He led or tied for the team lead in sacks three times during the season. In his first season of varsity football, Fields saw action as a reserve along the defensive line as a junior, posting seven tackles and one sack. Fields was a member of the Troy State squad as a freshman and sophomore but did not see any game action.

PERSONAL: Fields was a standout football and basketball player at Notasulga, AL, High School. He earned four letters in football as a tight end, wide receiver and linebacker and three letters in basketball.

He earned all-area honors in both sports as a senior.

PRO: When the Dallas Cowboys signed Chris Fontenot late last year, the team was in need of a big, healthy blocking tight end to close out the season. Now the Cowboys are hoping that he can use his size and limited NFL experience to help fortify a position weakened by injuries from day one last year. Fontenot's blocking skill is coupled with ability as a down field receiver, having caught eight passes for an 11.3 yard average in his five professional games. His dual ability to block and catch will be beneficial as he tries to work his way onto Dallas' tight end depth chart.

2000: Fontenot signed with the Oakland Raiders March 7 and registered three receptions for 29 yards in three preseason games. He was waived Aug. 22 and claimed by Dallas Aug. 23. The Cowboys released him Aug. 27, and he signed with New England Aug. 28. He was inactive against Tampa Bay (9/3) before being released Sept. 9. He signed to the Patriots practice squad Sept. 20 but was released Oct. 9. He signed to the Chicago Bears practice squad Nov. 29 and remained there until Dallas signed him to the active roster Dec. 19. He was active but did not play in the season finale at Tennessee (12/25).

1999: In four preseason games with Philadelphia, Fontenot tallied three receptions for 47 yards before being released Sept. 5. He spent the remainder of the season out of football.

1998: Fontenot signed with the Miami Dolphins as a rookie free agent on April 23 and was released Aug. 30. He signed immediately to the Kansas City Chiefs practice squad, where he remained until the Philadelphia Eagles signed him to their active roster Oct. 29. He saw action in each of the last five games of the season, starting three and catching eight passes for 90 yards. His best game came against Arizona (12/13) when he recorded four receptions for 47 yards.

COLLEGE: Fontenot closed his collegiate career at McNeese State with 88 receptions for 1,277 yards and seven touchdowns. He earned second-team All-Southland Conference honors as a senior after posting 33 catches for 457 yards and a career-high four touchdowns. As a junior, he caught a career-high 35 passes for a career-high 563 yards and two touchdowns to earn second-team All-Southland Conference accolades. He caught nine passes for 175 yards and a touchdown after moving to tight end from fullback prior to his sophomore campaign. As a freshman fullback, he rushed for 57 yards on 12 carries while catching 11 passes for 82 yards.

PERSONAL: Christopher Dwight Fontenot was an all-state selection in football as a two-way performer for lota, LA, High School. He also received all-district honors as a forward/center on the basketball team while participating on the track team. He is the cousin of former New Orleans Saints running back Buford Jordan. Chris has a daughter, Christian (3/10/92).

PRO: After bouncing between teams and leagues for the last two years, Ben Fricke found himself a home in Dallas in 2000. After originally signing with Dallas during the club's 1999 training camp as injuries depleted the Cowboys depth at guard and center, Fricke stepped in and showed coaches the ability to control blocks at the line of scrimmage and the versatility to play guard and center. This flexibility has earned Fricke a spot on the roster the last two seasons and eventually thrust him into the starting lineup when a sprained knee sidelined center Mark Stepnoski the final five weeks of the 2000 season.

2000: Fricke earned a spot on the active roster but did not play in seven of the first nine games of the season. He saw his first action of the year against San Francisco (9/24), replacing Stepnoski at center in the fourth quarter after Stepnoski was forced from the game with a strained groin. He also saw fourth quarter time at center against Arizona (10/29) on the club's final two possessions of the Cowboys 48-7 win. Fricke's real season began at Baltimore (11/19) when he took over in the third quarter at center after Stepnoski sprained the MCL in his left knee. From that moment on, Fricke was thrust into action as the starting center. He earned his first NFL start on Thanksgiving Day against Minnesota (11/23). In that game, the line did not allow a sack in 43 pass attempts and Emmitt Smith rushed for 100 yards on 12 carries before suffering a third quarter concussion. The following week at Tampa Bay (12/3), Fricke helped limit the Buccaneers, the league's third ranked defense in sacks-per-pass play, to two sacks in 35 pass plays and led the way for 113 rushing yards. Working on the inside against Warren Sapp, he helped limit the All-Pro to two tackles and the entire Tampa Bay starting defensive line to six tackles on the day. Fricke's blocking against Washington (12/10) helped Smith rush for 150 yards and a touchdown against the NFL's third ranked defense. In all, the Cowboys ran for 242 yards against the Redskins, the most by the Dallas offense since recording 271 yards on the ground at Philadelphia on Oct. 31, 1993.

1999: Fricke spent the spring playing for the Amsterdam Admirals after being drafted in the 11th round of the NFL Europe Draft. He led the way for running back David Thompson to finish fourth in the league with 503 rushing yards while the Admirals averaged 115.1 rushing yards-per-game. He signed with Dallas on Aug. 2 after the Cowboys lost offensive line depth due to training camp injuries. He saw his first NFL action against Atlanta (9/20), stepping in at right guard for Everett McIver (strained hamstring) in the second quarter. Fricke helped Smith rush for 109 yards, becoming only the third person in 29 games to rush for over 100 yards against the Falcons. Fricke was released Sept. 22 and re-signed Oct. 5. In his first game back, he took over at center for Stepnoski (back contusion) at Philadelphia (10/10), helping Smith record his third 100-yard game of the season. He was inactive the next two weeks before being released Oct. 27. He signed to the Cowboys practice squad Oct. 28, and was then activated from the practice squad Nov. 19. Due to injuries along the offensive line, Fricke saw action at center at New England (12/5) before being deactivated for the final two regular season games and the playoffs.

1998: Fricke was a seventh round draft choice (213th overall) of the N.Y. Giants in the 1998 NFL Draft, but was released at the end of training camp and out of football for the fall.

COLLEGE: Fricke became the first player since 1989 to earn All-America honors for the Houston Cougars when he was named All-America by the Football Writer's Association of America following his senior season. He also earned All-Conference USA honors that year. He did not allow a sack as a senior while helping the Cougar offense eclipse the 400-yard mark in total offense three times. He received the 1996 Tony Wilson Iron Man award following his junior season. Fricke was a four-year starter for the Cougars, including as a true freshman in 1994.

PERSONAL: The bio-medical technology major was an all-district selection on both offense and defense at Anderson High School in Austin, TX, as a sophomore and junior. He moved to center as a senior. He also served as the team's punter and lettered in track. Fricke participates in the offensive line's support of The RISE School in Dallas with the "First Downs for Down Syndrome" annual fundraising project.

PRO: On Feb. 12, 2000, the Cowboys finalized a trade with the Seattle Seahawks to bring wide receiver Joey Galloway to Dallas in exchange for first round draft choices in the 2000 and 2001 drafts. While his first year in Dallas was cut short because of injury, the 2001 season should see Galloway return as one of the league's most explosive offensive threats. Teamed with Raghib Ismail, Dallas boasts one of the fastest receiving tandems in the NFL. Originally the eighth overall pick of the 1995 NFL Draft, Galloway went on to start 67-of-71 games during his Seattle career and was an AFC Pro Bowl alternate in both 1997 and 1998. Only Cris Carter (52) and Carl Pickens (39) recorded more touchdown receptions between 1995-98 than Galloway's 36. He led the Seahawks in receiving yards and touchdowns in each of his first four seasons and led the club in receptions from 1996-98 after finishing second on the team as a rookie in 1995. His 12 100-yard receiving games are the third-best total in Seahawks history. In addition to his 37 receiving touchdowns, Galloway has one touchdown rushing and four touchdowns on punt returns. With 5,752 all-purpose yards in 72 games, he has averaged 79.9 yards-per-game and has caught a pass in all 72 games of his six-year career. Between receptions, rushes, punt and kickoff returns, Galloway averages 13.9 yards every time he touches the football and a touchdown every 7.6 receptions.

2000: In the season opener against Philadelphia (9/3), Galloway displayed a glimpse of the ability that first attracted the Cowboys to him. He led the team with four receptions for 62 yards and a touchdown. All four of his receptions gave Dallas a first down, including two on third down. He also added a two-yard punt return. But just as quickly as he burst upon the scene in the first three quarters of the game, his season came screeching to a halt in the fourth quarter when he tore the ACL in his left knee. He was placed

on injured reserve Sept. 8 and underwent reconstructive surgery on Oct. 5.

1999: Galloway was activated to the 53-man roster on Nov. 13 after an eight-week contract dispute. Although he didn't start against the Broncos (11/14) in his first game back, Galloway caught four passes for 88 yards, including a key 39-yard reception in the third quarter. He had his largest impact of the season at Oakland (12/5) when he recorded four receptions for a team-high 68 yards and a touchdown. The score, his only touchdown of the season, was from 31-yards out. He led the team again the following week with six receptions for 85 yards against the San Diego Chargers (12/12). For the season, he had 22 recep-

tions for 335 yards (15.2 avg.) and one touchdown.

1998: A playmaker all year for the Seahawks, Galloway led the team in receptions and touchdowns for the third consecutive season while being named first alternate for the AFC Pro Bowl squad. He tied for the AFC lead with 10 receiving touchdowns and tied for third with 12 total touchdowns, tying his career-high set in 1997. He finished the season ranked eighth in the AFC with 1,047 yards receiving, the third 1,000-yard season of his career. His punt return average of 10.0 was seventh in the AFC. Galloway led the team with 65 receptions and four 100-yard games on the year. In the season opening victory at Philadelphia (9/6), he posted his ninth career 100-yard game with a career-high 142 yards on six receptions, including touchdown catches of 35 and 25 yards. He scored another touchdown among his two receptions against Arizona (9/13). Galloway's 10th career 100-yard game came at Pittsburgh (9/27) with a 139-yard outburst on a season-high seven receptions. John Friesz connected with Galloway on a career-long 81-yard touchdown pass at San Diego (10/25) and later connected on a 41-yard pass to the one-yard line to set up the game-winning touchdown. Galloway finished the game with four catches for 130 yards. The 81-yard catch was the second longest in Seahawks history. He also returned a punt 74 yards for his third career punt return touchdown. Galloway returned a punt 56 yards for a score against Oakland (11/15), and caught four passes for 71 yards, including a 44-yard touchdown pass from Warren Moon. In a 20-18 win over Tennessee (11/29), he caught a seven-yard touchdown pass before posting his fourth 100-yard receiving day of the season with 127 yards and two touchdowns on two receptions at the N.Y. Jets (12/6). The touchdowns against the Jets were from 70 and 57 yards out and marked his seventh-career multi-touchdown game. He tied a season-high with seven receptions against San Diego (12/13), including a touchdown, and then led the team in receptions against Indianapolis (12/20) with five, including a three-yard touchdown pass. He presented the ball to a Make-A-Wish child, Sterling Grover, following the touchdown.

1997: Galloway started 15 games, missing only the Tennessee game (10/5) because of an ankle sprain he suffered the previous week at Kansas City (9/27), an injury suffered on a first quarter touchdown reception which kept him out the remainder of that game as well. The Tennessee game marked the first missed game of his career. For the season, Galloway led the team in receptions, yards, and touchdowns for the second consecutive year and set single-season bests with 72 receptions, 1,049 receiving yards, and 12 touchdowns – averaging 28.6 yards on each of his scores. His touchdown total was the most by



a Seahawks player since Steve Largent had 12 in 1985 and was one off the club record by Daryl Turner in 1984. Galloway's 12 touchdowns tied for the AFC lead and was the third best total touchdown figure. Twice during the season, Galloway tied his single-game high with eight catches at St. Louis (10/19) and again at Denver (11/2), in addition he had at least five receptions in eight games. In a 45-34 win over Oakland (10/26), he had seven receptions for 117 yards and three touchdowns. He scored all three touchdowns in the second half, including the game-clincher with 2:24 left. The Oakland game was one of three 100-yard efforts on the year for Galloway. He caught five passes for 106 yards against San Diego (9/21) and six for 101 with two touchdowns against San Francisco (12/21). He totaled 98 yards receiving at Denver (11/2). In a 37-31 win at San Diego (11/9), Galloway scored the game-winning touchdown on a 40-yard reception with 2:20 remaining. He was a first alternate to the AFC Pro Bowl squad.

1996: Galloway just missed becoming only the fourth receiver in league history to have back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons in his first two years, finishing the season leading the team in receptions (57), yards (987), and touchdowns (7). He posted two 100-yard games, topped by a season-best 137 yards on five receptions, including touchdowns of 51 and 65 yards in a 22-15 win over the Dolphins in Miami (10/6). He also caught five balls for 108 yards, with a 43-yarder to set up a touchdown, at Denver (12/1). Galloway opened the season with a 60-yard reception at San Diego (9/1) before tallying his second career punt return touchdown with an 88-yarder against Denver (9/8). He had a single-game high eight receptions in back-to-back midseason games against Houston (11/3) and Minnesota (11/10). In the Oilers' contest, he had 94 yards receiving and the game-tying touchdown reception with 3:30 left. His eight catches against the Vikings were good for 91 yards and one score. In a late season AFC West showdown with Oakland (11/24), Galloway had three receptions for 99 yards, with receptions of 40 and 42 yards to set up touchdowns. Through the first seven games of the season, he averaged 11.8 yards on 12 punt returns to rank fourth in the AFC before relinquishing those duties to concentrate on offense.

1995: Galloway was the first rookie wide receiver to start every game for Seattle and the first since 1976 to start the opener. Along the way he was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by College and Pro Football Newsweekly and was a consensus All-Rookie choice. He caught 67 passes for 1,039 yards and seven touchdowns, becoming the 10th rookie in NFL history to surpass 1,000 yards, and the first since 1986. Galloway combined with Brian Blades to form the first duo with 1,000 yards in the same season in Seattle history. He also added 154 yards rushing and a touchdown while returning 36 punts for a 10.0-yard average, and one touchdown. Along the way he set franchise season records for receptions, yards, and 100-yard games (three) by a rookie, totals that also led all NFL rookies - as did his seven touchdown receptions. The first record to fall was Daryl Turner's for yardage (715 in 1984) 11 games into the season, and in Week 14, he broke Steve Largent's record for rookie receptions (54 in 1976). Prior to Galloway's arrival, the franchise had seen only five 100-yard games by a rookie, but he almost matched that himself, posting a franchise rookie best three 100-yard games: five receptions for 102 yards and one touchdown at Buffalo (10/15); five receptions for 114 yards and two scores at Jacksonville (11/12); and five catches for 108 yards against Oakland (10/08). In that Jaguars game, Galloway established a franchise record for the longest run from scrimmage with an 86-yard touchdown dash. Accounting for 200 yards from scrimmage in the game, Galloway earned AFC Offensive Player of the Week honors for his performance. A club-record 89-yard punt return for a touchdown against the N.Y. Giants (11/5) started Galloway on his way to AFC Special Teams Player of the Month honors for November, a month he returned 13 punts for a 13.2 yard average and one touchdown. Both the 89-yard punt return and the 86-yard run were the longest such plays in the NFL in 1995. For the season, Galloway averaged 48.0 yards on each of his nine touchdowns (7 receiving, 1 rushing, 1 punt return) and was one of two players in the NFL (San Francisco's Jerry Rice) to score three different ways.

COLLEGE: Galloway finished his college career ranked second in Ohio State history in touchdown receptions with 19 - trailing only Cris Carter's 27 - and had two games with three touchdowns. He finished fourth in both career receptions, 108, and receiving yards, 1,894. He also added 20 kickoff returns for a 25.0 yard average and one score and 34 punt returns for a 7.8 average. Galloway earned first-team All-Big Ten Conference honors as a junior and second-team accolades as a senior while leading the team in receiving both years. As a senior, he recorded 44 receptions for 669 yards and seven touchdowns. He also returned 18 kickoffs for 462 yards (25.7-yard average), and one touchdown, and 16 punts for a 10.6 average. Galloway finished his senior season catching eight passes for 146 yards and two touchdowns in the Citrus Bowl against Alabama, including a career-best 69-yard reception. As a junior, Galloway caught 47 passes for 946 yards and a school record equaling (Carter - 1986) 11 touchdowns. His yardage total ranked third for a single-season in school history trailing Carter's 1,127 in 1986 and 950 in 1985. Galloway posted four 100-yard games, including 186 (third best single-game total in school history) on nine receptions with three touchdowns against Michigan State. As a sophomore, he saw action in the first two games of the season before injuring his knee and missing the remainder of the season. He caught 14 passes in 11 games as a redshirt freshman. Galloway was a National Football Foundation Scholar Athlete and National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Scholarship recipient

PERSONAL: Galloway caught 32 passes for 608 yards and eight touchdowns, averaged 26.9 yards on kickoff returns and 15.2 on punt returns as a senior at Bellaire, Ohio, High School. He was also an All-Ohio choice in basketball and lettered in track. Despite his injury, Galloway joined in with the rest of the Cowboys wide receiver corps in 2000 in distributing 500 Hams for the Holidays with the Salvation Army. He was also a big hit with the toddlers at the Gene & Jerry Jones Family Center for Children. During his Seahawks career, he sponsored a group of students, the Galloway Express, at each Seattle home game. During the 1996 season, Galloway appeared on Wheel of Fortune with proceeds from his spins benefiting the Make-A-Wish Foundation. He earned his degree in Business/Marketing from Ohio State.

PRO: Kelvin Garmon, who had been away from the football field for almost two years rehabilitating a fractured right tibia suffered during his final collegiate campaign, returned to the playing field and full-time football work in 2000. With his return, he showed coaches the potential they saw when they drafted him in the seventh round (243rd overall) of the 1999 NFL Draft. His size and strength give him the versatility to play anywhere along the offensive line, but his ability to run and his quickness make him a naturally gifted pulling guard. These attributes will be vital to Garmon as he battles for the starting right guard position.


2000: After an almost two year hiatus from the playing field, Garmon returned to action in the Cowboys five preseason games, including three starts at left guard for Larry Allen (fractured right hand). His high level of play during the preseason earned him a spot on Dallas' 53-man roster, but he was deactivated for each of the first 15 games. He was part of the Cowboys active roster for the season finale at Tennessee (12/25) but did not see any playing time.

1999: Garmon was placed on the Reserve/Non-Football Injury on Aug.31 following a training camp and preseason where he saw no on-field action. He spent the entire off-season, training camp and regular season fulfilling the requirements of rehabilitating the fractured right tibia that he suffered as a senior at Baylor.

COLLEGE: A powerful performer while at Baylor, Garmon's versatility was documented during his senior year when he played every position, except center, on the Bears offensive line. He was enjoying a solid season before his fractured leg brought an abrupt halt to his collegiate career after four games. Prior to his injury, he had registered 17 knockdown blocks. In starting every game as a junior, Garmon displayed his versatility throughout the year. He started the first five games at strong tackle before switching to strong guard for the remaining six outings. For the year, he accounted for 58 knockdowns, including a season-high 15 against Oklahoma State. While he was expected to spend his sophomore season as a reserve, Garmon broke through in summer training camp and earned a starting job for the Bears, earning five starts at right guard and six starts at left tackle.

PERSONAL: Garmon, a physical therapy major, attended Haltom, TX, High School, where he was a standout on both the offensive and defensive lines. As a senior, he recorded 80 tackles on defense, including 10 sacks. Garmon earned all-district and all-state honors in his final prep campaign. He also earned varsity letters in basketball and track. Garmon has participated in the offensive line's support of The RISE School in Dallas with the "First Downs for Down Syndrome" project. He was a guest coach for the club's 1999 Dallas Cowboys/Gatorade Junior Training Camp football clinic for 200 youth from The Salvation Army, and he attended and showed support at the 2001 Komen Race for the Cure in Plano, TX.

PRO: Dwayne Goodrich is a big, physical corner that came to Dallas with a championship pedigree, having won the national championship as

a junior at Tennessee. His size is not his only outstanding attribute, as he is a natural athlete that has good speed and an uncanny nose for the ball that allows him to make plays all over the field. He closed his collegiate campaign ranked eighth on the Volunteers all-time interception list, picking off 12 career passes playing in the pass oriented Southeastern Conference. After a tough rookie campaign, he will battle for a starting cornerback spot this season.

2000: Goodrich suffered a left hamstring strain in preseason action against Atlanta (8/5) and missed the final three preseason games. He returned to practice on Sept. 13 but was deactivated for the next six games. He saw his first NFL action on special teams at Philadelphia (11/5). Goodrich was a game-day deactivation against Cincinnati (11/12) and at Baltimore (11/19). Against Minnesota (11/23), he led the team with two special teams tackles, helping limit the Viking's kick return team to an 18.0 average on three kickoff returns. Goodrich saw his only action on defense in the season finale at Tennessee (12/25).

COLLEGE: Goodrich earned All-SEC honors as a senior after finishing the year with 34 tackles, six passes defensed and three interceptions. As a junior, he was selected second-team All-SEC after leading the national champion Volunteers with 10 passes defensed while finishing second with three interceptions and 41 tackles. In the national championship game against Florida State, Goodrich returned an interception 54 yards for a touchdown to earn most valuable defensive player honors for the game. He finished his sophomore campaign with a career-high 45 tackles and four interceptions. Playing as a reserve cornerback as a true freshman, Goodrich finished his initial collegiate campaign with 17 tackles, a team-high four fumble recoveries and two interceptions.

PERSONAL: Dwayne Lewis Goodrich finished his senior season at H.L. Richards High School in Oak Lawn, IL, with 41 tackles, 18 passes defensed and six interceptions to earn Parade All-America, USA Today All-America and Prep Football Report National Defensive Player of the Year accolades. Also a twoyear starter at tailback, he rushed for 563 yards on 61 carries as a senior. His two-way play helped lead Richards High to 22 victories in his final 25 games, Goodrich competed on the Volunteer track team as a freshman and sophomore, posting career-best times of 10.5 in the 100 meters and 21.7 in the 200 meters. Goodrich and other members of the Cowboys' secondary participated in the second annual Dallas Cowboys/United Way Hometown Huddle. The group spent time at the Salvation Army Carr P. Collins Social Service Center serving lunch to the homeless and visiting with children.

PRO: The selection of Orantes Grant by Dallas in the 2000 NFL Draft was a homecoming of sorts for the linebacker as his old position coach at

Georgia in 1997, George Edwards, became his current position coach in Dallas. An active and aggressive linebacker who never shied away from contact, Grant became a major player on the club's special teams units as a rookie. In his sophomore campaign, he will be counted on even more to provide depth and dependability at the weakside linebacker position.

2000: Grant's rookie season got off to a slow start backing up Dexter Coakley at weakside linebacker, but he took advantage of every opportunity on special teams and ended the year tied for the club lead with two fumble recoveries and finished in a tie for fourth with 11 special teams tackles. Grant was deactivated the first two weeks of the season before making his NFL debut on Monday Night Football at Washington (9/18). In the game, he tied for the team lead with two special teams stops. He recorded a special teams tackle at Carolina (10/1) while helping limit Michael Bates to 22.3 yards-per-kickoff return.






After being deactivated at the N.Y. Giants (10/15), Grant tied for second on the team with two special teams tackles and saw extensive second half action at weakside linebacker against Arizona (10/22). He recorded a special teams tackle at Philadelphia (11/5) while helping limit Brian Mitchell to one punt return for two yards and two fair catches. On six kickoff returns, Cincinnati (11/12) was able to muster just 19.7 yards a return thanks to the work of Grant and the Cowboys kickoff coverage unit. Twice in December he recovered muffed punts to give Dallas great field position. Against Tampa Bay (12/3), he recovered his first muffed punt and recorded a special teams tackle as the Bucs were limited to a 12.0 yard average on two kickoff returns. In the season finale at Tennessee (12/25), he recovered his second muffed punt to set Dallas up at the Tennessee 45 yard-line. He also saw fourth quarter action at linebacker, recording one tackle and a tackle for a loss.

COLLEGE: A two-time All-Southeastern Conference selection, Grant was a starter his final three years at Georgia and team captain his senior year. His 312 career tackles rank 13th and his 190 career solo tackles rank seventh in the Bulldogs' record books. The only senior on the Georgia team to see action in all 44 games of his collegiate career, Grant proved to be a durable workhorse. During his three years as a starter, Georgia posted a 27-9 record, won three consecutive bowl games and was a fixture in the Associated Press Top 20. Grant finished second on the team with 69 tackles as a senior after leading the Bulldogs with 120 tackles as a junior. No other Georgia player had more than 100 tackles, and Grant had more unassisted tackles (80) than all but two of his teammates had total tackles. In his first year as a starter, Grant finished second on the team with 81 tackles from his weakside linebacker position as a sophomore.

PERSONAL: A first team all-state linebacker at Dunwoody High School in Atlanta, GA, Orantes Laquay Grant was named to the Top 50 in Georgia list by the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*. He also earned the DeKalb County Defensive Player of the Year award for recording 130 tackles as a senior linebacker. He also carried the ball 78 times for 570 yards as a tailback. He was a three-year starter, including one season at tight end on the 1993 undefeated state championship team. Grant majored in child and family development at Georgia, where he worked under Cowboys' linebackers coach George Edwards in 1997.

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys uncovered a productive starter late in the NFL Draft when they selected Darren Hambrick with the first of two fifth round choices (130th overall) in

NFL Draft when they selected Darren Hambrick with the first of two fifth round choices (130th overall) in 1998. Hambrick, an athletic linebacker with size and range, has quickly moved from a special teams player to a starting linebacker to the team's leading tackler. After seeing most of his playing time on special teams as a rookie, Hambrick used his speed, tenacity and aggressive style of play to move into the starting strong-side linebacker spot prior to his second season. In his third year, he posted a career-high and team leading 154 tackles. His rise has proven what a valuable asset he is to the Cowboys defensive scheme and how much more will be expected of him in 2001.

2000: In just his second season as a starter, Hambrick led the team with 154 tackles, shattering his previous career-best of 62 stops in 1999 by 92 tackles. His 154 stops were the most by a Dallas defender since Brock Marion recorded 158 in 1997. Hambrick also established a new career-high with three tackles behind the line of scrimmage. He posted eight stops and a tackle for a loss against Philadelphia (9/3) in the season opener. He finished second on the team with 10 tackles at Arizona (9/10) despite suffering a sprained left knee in the first quarter. The Cardinals game marked the first time in his young career he posted double-digit tackles. He again finished second on the team with 11 stops at Washington (9/18) before topping that figure with 12 tackles against San Francisco (9/24). He registered nine tackles at Carolina (10/1) and nine more stops, along with a sack, at the N.Y. Giants (10/15). He tallied eight stops against Arizona (10/22) to raise his season total to 67 in just seven games, eclipsing his previous careerhigh of 62 tackles in a season. He posted a career-high 14 tackles against Jacksonville (10/29). At Philadelphia (11/5), he was second on the team with 13 tackles to help hold the Eagles' running backs to

77 yards on 25 carries (3.1 avg.). He recorded seven stops and broke up a pass in helping limit Cincinnati (11/12) to 195 total yards. He tied his career-high with a team leading 14 stops at Baltimore (11/19) and was second on the squad with five tackles against Minnesota (11/23). Hambrick again tied his career-high with 14 tackles at Tampa Bay (12/3), including a stop behind the line of scrimmage. He helped limit Washington's (12/10) Stephen Davis, the NFC's third-leading rusher, to 57 rushing yards with two tackles. Against the N.Y. Giants (12/17), Hambrick tied for the team lead with 11 tackles, his eighth double-digit tackle game of the season, to help hold the Giants to 3.2 rushing yards-per-carry. He closed the season at Tennessee (12/25) with seven stops, a pressure and a pass defensed.

1999: While facing the daunting task of becoming a starter in only his second NFL season, Hambrick responded by finishing the year eighth on the team with 62 tackles. He also contributed 2.5 sacks, three quarterback pressures, two interceptions and a forced fumble. Officially, Hambrick started 12 of the Cowboys 16 regular season games, but he was held out of the first play of the other four games as the Dallas defense opened the game with its 45 package. Hambrick earned his first career start at Washington (9/12) and responded with seven tackles. Two weeks later, in the win over Arizona (10/3), Hambrick turned in one of his most productive career outings, while also accomplishing two key milestones. In addition to registering six tackles in the Cowboys win over the Cardinals, Hambrick picked up his first career sack and his first career interception. He returned the fourth guarter interception 25 yards. Two weeks later at New York (10/18), he recorded his second sack of the season. In the Cowboys 27-13 win over Green Bay (11/14), Hambrick had two tackles and a tackle for a loss in helping limit the Packers to 40 yards rushing. In the big Thanksgiving Day win over Miami (11/25), Hambrick recorded three tackles as the Cowboys shutout Miami and limited the Dolphins 69 yards rushing. He recorded a season-high eight tackles at New England (12/5) before posting his second career interception against Philadelphia (12/12). He did not start the next week against the N.Y. Jets (12/19) because Dallas opened the game with its 45 package, but he came on to record seven tackles. On Christmas Eve at New Orleans (12/24), Hambrick recorded four tackles, two quarterback pressures and a sack as the Dallas defense limited Ricky Williams to 61 yards rushing on 23 carries (2.7 avg.). In the playoff loss at Minnesota (1/9/00), he tied for second on the team, and was the leader among linebackers, with a then career-high 10 tackles.

1998: Hambrick excelled on the Cowboys special teams units during his rookie campaign, finishing second on the team with 18 special teams tackles. His play helped Dallas lead the NFL in kickoff coverage (18.5 yards-per-return) and finish third in punt coverage (6.2). In the season opener against Arizona (9/6), he broke-up his first NFL pass. At Chicago (10/18), Hambrick led the team with three special teams tackles and forced a fumble on a first quarter kickoff that was recovered at the Bears 29-yard line to set up a Dallas field goal. He totaled two special teams stops at Philadelphia (11/2) while breaking up a fourth quarter pass from the strongside linebacker position. He led the team with our special teams tackles and a forced fumble against Minnesota (11/26). He tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles against Philadelphia (12/20), and he closed the season against Washington (12/27) by tying for the team lead with three special teams stops and helping limit Brian Mitchell to an 11.4 average on five kickoff returns. In his first postseason action against Arizona (1/2/99), Hambrick registered a season-high four defensive tackles and broke up a pass.

COLLEGE: Hambrick opened his senior season at South Carolina as the starting weakside line-backer before fracturing his left fibula in the season opener. He missed the next seven games before returning for the final three games. After sitting out 1995 under NCAA transfer rules, Hambrick earned second-team All-SEC honors as a junior at South Carolina after posting 83 tackles, four tackles for losses and 1.5 sacks. As a sophomore at the University of Florida in 1994, Hambrick saw action in every game and recorded 59 tackles and two interceptions. Hambrick was the only true freshman to start a game on defense for the Gators when he started three games in 1993. He saw action in all 13 games and earned third-team Freshman All-America and SEC All-Freshman honors after totaling 46 tackles and two interceptions. Hambrick also competed in the high jump and long jump for the Florida track team in 1993 and 1994.

PERSONAL: Hambrick earned prep All-America, all-state and area defensive MVP honors after totaling 140 tackles as a senior at Pasco, FL, High School. As a junior, he led the team to the class AAA state title. As a member of the track team, he became the first athlete in Florida history to qualify for five events at the state track meet, and he high jumped 7'1 3/4" as a senior. Hambrick's brother, Troy, is a running back on the Cowboys roster and his uncle, Jim "Mudcat" Grant, is a former major league pitcher.



PRO: The Dallas Cowboys saw a big, physical running back with deceptive speed in the open field when they signed Troy Hambrick as a

rookie free agent in 2000. Hambrick, who saw time as a fullback and tailback during his first training camp and while on the practice squad last year, has been a productive back since the beginning of his collegiate career. In four college seasons and his first NFL season, he has averaged 5.7 yards-per-rush on 491 carries. This type of production, along with his size and ability to play both backfield positions have Dallas coaches excited about his future.

2000: Hambrick signed with Dallas as a rookie free agent on June 1 and rushed for 67 yards on 20 carries in five preseason games while catching five passes for 19 yards. He was released Aug. 27 and signed to the Cowboys practice squad Aug. 29. He remained on the practice squad for the first 14 weeks of the season before being moved to Dallas' active roster Dec. 8. He recorded a special teams tackle in his first professional game against Washington (12/10). Two weeks later in the season finale at Tennessee (12/25), he led the team in rushing with 28 yards on six carries (4.7 avg.) after replacing Emmitt Smith in the fourth quarter. Hambrick also led the team with two special teams tackles against the Titans.

COLLEGE: Hambrick transferred from South Carolina to Savannah State as a senior in 1999 and proceeded to lead the Southern Intercollegiate Athletics Conference in scoring (116 points) while finishing third in rushing (1,189 yards on 183 carries - 6.5 avg.). He finished the year with 18 touchdowns while catching 14 passes for 111 yards and a touchdown. He left South Carolina after rushing for 1,526 yards over his three years as a Gamecock to rank 18th on the school's all-time rushing list. In Hambrick's final season at USC, he led the team with 701 rushing yards and four touchdowns on 144 carries (4.9 avg.) while catching 22 passes for 166 yards. As a sophomore, he rushed for 604 yards and five scores on 115 carries (5.3 avg.) to lead the team while posting 18 receptions for 143 yards. While carrying the ball 43 times for 281 yards (6.5 avg.) and five touchdowns as a freshman, Hambrick became the first freshman in South Carolina history to rush for more than 100-yards in consecutive games.

PERSONAL: After rushing for 1,731 yards and 36 touchdowns as a senior at Pasco, FL, High School, Hambrick was named all-state, to the Florida Super 24 Senior Team and Tampa Tribune Player of the Year. He was also named Sunshine Athletic Conference Player of the Year and played in the Florida-Georgia All-Star Game. Troy's brother is Cowboys linebacker Darren Hambrick, and his uncle is former major league pitcher Jim "Mudcat" Grant

PRO: Entering his 12th NFL season, Jackie Harris brings invaluable veteran experience, leadership and pass catching ability to the tight end position for Dallas. Harris's smooth route running ability and reliable hands give Dallas a solid tandem at tight end where he joins David LaFleur, one of the game's more physical players at the position. A former All-Pro in Green Bay (1992), Harris is regarded as one of the NFL's finest pass-catching tight ends, and he has finished near the top of the tight ends' receptions list several

times throughout his career. With stops in Green Bay, Tampa Bay and Tennessee, he has amassed 378 receptions for 4,186 yards and 23 touchdowns over his 11-year career. He was a member of the 1999 AFC Champion Tennessee team that lost to St. Louis in Super Bowl XXXIV.

2000: Harris made a visible impact in his first year in Dallas by leading the team with a career-high five touchdown catches while ranking second on the club with 39 receptions and third with 302 receiving yards. Harris finished the year third in the NFC among tight ends in receptions. His yardage totals were good for eighth in the NFC among tight ends. In the loss to Arizona (9/10), Harris led all Dallas receivers with seven receptions for 56 yards, including his first touchdown as a Cowboy on a one-yard pass from Randall Cunningham. His seven catches in that game, four of which were good for a first down, were the most by a Dallas tight end since Eric Bjornson had seven at the N.Y. Giants on Oct. 5, 1997. The following week at Washington (9/18), Harris had two receptions for 28 yards and scored the game winning points on a 16yard touchdown pass from Cunningham. In the loss to the 49ers (9/24), Harris registered the first multipletouchdown game of his career with scoring receptions of 16 and 11 yards. In the overtime win at Carolina (10/1), Harris had three receptions for 20 yards and moved past the 4,000 career receiving yard mark. He also hauled in a critical two-point conversion reception from Troy Aikman that gave Dallas a 10-7 lead. Harris picked up his fifth scoring catch of the year in the overtime loss to Jacksonville (10/29) on a 13-yard pass from Aikman on the game's opening drive. In the overtime loss at Philadelphia (11/5), he missed some second half action as the result of tendinitis in his right ankle. On Thanksgiving Day against the Vikings (11/23), Harris had two catches for 21 yards before being knocked out of the game with a sprained left knee in the fourth quarter. He returned to action the following week at Tampa Bay (12/3), and then against Washington (11/23) he recorded two receptions for 20 yards. Harris had three receptions for 28 yards against the N.Y. Giants (12/17) before tying for the team lead with two receptions at Tennessee (12/25).

1999: Harris finished his second season in Tennessee with 26 receptions for 297 yards and a touch-down. He missed the season opener against Cincinnati (9/12) recovering from broken ribs. Against Cleveland (9/19), he caught two passes for 16 yards. He missed the next three games with a strained hamstring. He returned against St. Louis (10/31) and caught a team-high three passes for 44 yards. He again led the Titans at Miami (11/7) with five receptions for 32 yards, earning him a start at Cincinnati (11/14), where he posted three grabs for 21 yards. He caught three passes for 16 yards the next week against Pittsburgh (11/21) and three passes for a team-high 44 yards at Cleveland (11/28). At Baltimore (12/5), he started and made four catches for 52 yards. Against Jacksonville (12/26). Harris caught three passes for 72 yards, including a 62-yard touchdown reception. In Tennessee's AFC Wild Card Playoff Game against Buffalo (1/8/00), he tied for the team lead with four receptions for 20 yards. Two weeks later at Jacksonville (1/23/00) in the AFC Championship Game, Harris started in a two tight end formation and tied for the team high with three receptions for 33 yards. He started again in a two tight end formation in Super Bowl XXXIV against St. Louis (1/30/00) and led the Titans with seven catches for 64 yards. With 14 postseason catches for a team-high 117 yards, Harris tied for the team lead in postseason receptions.

1998: After signing with the Oilers on March 11, Harris proceeded to close his first season in Tennessee second on the team with 43 receptions for 412 yards and two touchdowns while starting 16 games for only the second time in his career. He opened the season with two catches for 27 yards at Cincinnati (9/6) before posting three catches for 37 yards, including a reception on a fake punt, against San Diego (9/13). The next week at New England (9/20), he grabbed a season-high six passes for 35 yards, and he caught three passes for 17 yards against Jacksonville (9/27). Harris then led the team with four receptions for 45 yards at Baltimore (10/11). He caught an 18-yard halfback option pass for a touchdown against Cincinnati (10/18), and he led the Titans with six catches for 53 yards against Chicago (10/25). Against Pittsburgh (11/15), he totaled two receptions for 29 yards before catching three passes for 29 yards, including the 300th reception of his career, against the N.Y. Jets (11/22). At Jacksonville (12/13), Harris totaled 17 yards on four catches, including a four-yard touchdown. He then paced the team with four catches for a season-high 83 yards, including a season-long 32 yarder, in the season finale against Minnesota (12/26).

1997: Harris saw action in 12 games for Tampa Bay while battling a groin injury for most of the season. He tallied his lone touchdown of the year, a five-yarder, at Minnesota (9/14). Against Minnesota (10/26), he left the game in the first quarter with a pulled groin and did not return to action. He missed games at Indianapolis (11/2) and Atlanta (11/9) due to the groin injury. He returned to action against New England (11/6) and caught three passes for 51 yards, including a 25-yarder. He totaled a season-best 54 yards, including a season-long 39-yard grab, on three receptions at Chicago (11/23). Following the game against Green Bay (12/7), Harris underwent surgery to repair a hernia and missed the last two games of the regular season. He returned to start a wild card playoff game against Detroit (12/28), recording his first career postseason reception for four yards. He was placed on injured reserve prior to the divisional playoff game at Green Bay (11/4/99) due to complications from the hernia surgery.

1996: Despite missing three games due to injury, Harris finished fourth among Buc receivers with 30 receptions for 349 yards and a touchdown. At Detroit (9/8), he caught four passes for 31 yards before totaling a season-high five receptions for a team-best 96 yards at Denver (9/15), including a 36-yard grab on third-and-19. He suffered a cervical strain on the second play of the Seattle (9/22) game and did not return. He re-aggravated the strain in the fourth quarter against Detroit (9/29). He returned to action against Minnesota (10/13) and tied for the team lead with five catches before suffering a sprained MCL in his left knee at Arizona (10/20). He missed the next three games due to the sprain. He returned to action against New Orleans (11/24) and caught four passes for 63 yards before totaling four grabs for 52 yards at Carolina (12/1). He recorded his only touchdown of the year and a two-point conversion against Washington (12/8).

1995: While starting all 16 games for the first time in his career, Harris posted career bests with 62 receptions and 751 yards to lead Tampa Bay in receiving. His 62 catches was the highest total ever recorded by a Buc tight end, and it tied Jay Novacek of Dallas for the most catches by a tight end in the NFC. His 751 receiving yards led all NFC tight ends. At Cleveland (9/10), Harris totaled a game-high eight catch-



es for 95 yards. He registered the most prolific day by a Buccaneer tight end in seven years at Carolina (10/1) when he totaled 108 yards on five catches. He sprained an ankle in the second quarter against Jacksonville (11/19) and did not return. The next week, Harris established a new Buc's single game record for receptions by a tight end with 10 catches for 122 yards – second highest yardage total of his career – at Green Bay (11/26).

1994: Harris received an offer sheet from Tampa Bay on June 15 and signed with the Bucs as a restricted free agent on June 22 after Green Bay chose not to match the Bucs offer. He finished the year with 26 receptions for 337 yards and three touchdowns. He totaled four grabs for a season-best 96 yards, including a 48-yarder, against Indianapolis (9/11) before scoring Tampa Bay's only touchdown against New Orleans (9/18). He registered a season-high six receptions for 58 yards and a touchdown at Atlanta (10/9). He scored a two-point conversion at San Francisco (10/23) before suffering a shoulder subluxation against Chicago (11/6). He was inactive the next two weeks before undergoing surgery and being placed on injured reserve Nov. 22. At the time of his injury, he was second in catches among NFC tight ends.

1993: Harris started 12 games for Green Bay, totaling 42 catches for 604 yards (14.4 avg. – careerhigh) and four touchdowns to rank third on the team. He opened the season with five catches for 92 yards against the L.A. Rams (9/5). He was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week after grabbing five passes for 128 yards, including a career-long 66-yard touchdown, against Denver (10/10). His 128 receiving yards established a Packer single-game receiving yardage record for tight ends, and his 66-yarder was the Packers' longest reception of the season. He then caught a 51-yard pass at Tampa Bay (10/24) two weeks later. Harris underwent arthroscopic surgery on Nov. 18 to repair a meniscus tear in his left knee. He returned to action at Chicago (12/5) and registered six receptions for 72 yards. He missed the last two regular season games and two playoff games due to his knee injury.

1992: Harris totaled 55 receptions for 595 yards and two touchdowns to finish second on the team and second in receptions among NFL tight ends (Jay Novacek – 68). Harris and wide receiver Shannon Sharpe led all NFL receiving duos with a combined 2,056 receiving yards. His efforts earned Harris All-Pro honors. He tied the Packers' single-game record for receptions by a tight end at the N.Y. Giants (11/8), totaling nine catches for 87 yards. He totaled eight receptions for 98 yards one week later against Philadelphia (11/15). He recorded a 40-yard reception at Chicago (11/22) and against Tampa Bay (11/29), he scored the winning touchdown on a nine-yard, fourth quarter catch.

1991: Harris finished fourth on the team with 24 catches for 264 yards and three touchdowns while playing in 16 games, including six starts in two tight end formations. He was also Green Bay's second leading special teams tackler with 14. Against Tampa Bay (9/15), he downed a Packer punt at the Bucs' two-yard line to set up a Green Bay safety, which provided the winning margin in a 15-13 victory. He totaled four receptions at the L.A. Rams (9/29) before registering touchdown catches against Buffalo (11/10) – his career first – and Minnesota (11/17). He caught four passes at Atlanta (12/1) and scored his third touchdown of the year at Chicago (12/8).


1990: Harris played in all 16 games as a rookie, starting three in two tight end formations. He registered 12 receptions for 157 yards while leading the Green Bay special teams with 22 tackles. He caught a season-high three passes for 43 yards against Seattle (12/9). He was drafted in the fourth round (102nd overall) of the NFL Draft by the Packers.

COLLEGE: Harris was a three-year starter at Northeast Louisiana, leaving as the school's all-time leading receiver with 147 catches for 2,107 yards and 14 touchdowns. He earned All-America and All-Southland Conference honors after catching 54 passes for 661 yards and seven touchdowns as a senior in 1989. Despite missing half of his junior season with a knee injury, he managed to catch 43 passes for 512 yards and two scores, including registering a school and conference single-game record 16 receptions against Lamar. He earned second-team all-conference honors as a sophomore and was on the receiving end of Stan Humphries' 48-yard, game-winning touchdown pass against Northwestern (LA) State. He was one of only three true freshmen to play for Northeast Louisiana in 1986.

PERSONAL: Jackie Bernard Harris lettered in football, basketball and track at Dollarway High School in Pine Bluff, AR. He played wide receiver and defensive back while leading the team to the state finals as a senior, earning all-state honors. The criminal justice major has donated extensive time to working with underprivileged youth in Arkansas. Harris has his Arkansas real estate license and owns and operates three Christian radio stations in Pine Bluff. Jackie and wife Letrece have two sons, Jackie, Jr. (4/27/94) and Joshua (12/4/95).

PRO: After returning from the Scottish Claymores of NFL Europe, Duane (pronounced DUH-wann) Hawthorne joined the Cowboys at their 2000 training camp. After playing a full season of NFL football in 1999 and a full spring of NFL Europe, he was slowed a bit by fatigue, but managed to show coaches he still had the ability to deliver big-play dividends. Hawthorne originally signed as a rookie free agent and impressed the coaching staff from day one. Filling in for fallen teammates throughout his rookie season, Hawthorne posted three interceptions, the most by a Dallas rookie since another former rookie free agent, Everson Walls (11 in 1981), Hawthorne provides Dallas with an

aggressive, quick corner that has two years of NFL experience under his belt.

2000: Hawthorne spent the spring starting at cornerback for the Scottish Claymores in NFL Europe, where he earned co-defensive MVP honors and tied for the league lead with four interceptions. He was a key part of a Claymores defense that led the league in pass defense and limited opponents to 178 yards passing-per-game on their way to a 6-4 regular season record and a berth in the World Bowl. He returned to the Cowboys and saw limited playing time in 14 games. At Arizona (9/10), Hawthorne forced a fumble on a Cardinals' kickoff return. He tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles while helping limit Michael Bates to 22.3 yards-per-kickoff return at Carolina (10/1). He was deactivated against Jacksonville (10/29) and at Philadelphia (11/5), but he returned to the field against Cincinnati (11/12) and saw fourth quarter action in dime packages while recording two special teams tackles on kickoff coverage units. Against Washington (12/10), he recorded a special teams tackle and helped limit the Redskins to a 17.9 yard average on eight kickoff returns. He broke up a third down pass to force a punt and added a special teams tackle against the N.Y. Giants (12/17).

1999: The only rookie free agent to make the Cowboys roster coming out of training camp. Hawthorne went on to tie for second on the team with three interceptions. His three interceptions were the most by a Dallas rookie since 1981 when Everson Walls recorded 11 and Michael Downs had 7. Playing primarily in the Cowboys nickel and dime packages, Hawthorne recorded 27 tackles and broke up seven passes. The season started slowly for Hawthorne, who saw his first NFL action in the season opener at Washington (9/12), recording a special teams tackle. Hawthorne would make a name for himself off the Arizona Cardinals before the year was over. In the first meeting with Arizona (10/3), Hawthorne recorded his first career interception by picking off a Jake Plummer pass in the third guarter while also adding three tackles on the day. After watching from the sidelines the next two weeks as a game-day deactivation, Hawthorne found his way onto the field at Indianapolis (10/31) in the nickel package and recorded one tackle. Against Green Bay (11/14), he recorded two special teams tackles and helped limit the Packers to two punt returns for no yards and four kickoff returns for a 16.0-yard average. Hawthorne fed off the Cardinals again in November when Dallas traveled to Arizona (11/21), seeing considerable action at cornerback when Kevin Smith was forced from the game with a hamstring injury. He responded with his second interception of the season, along with three tackles and a game-high three passes defensed as the Cardinals were limited to 105 yards passing and 207 total yards. With Smith still out of the lineup on Thanksgiving Day, Hawthorne saw time at cornerback against Miami (11/25) and recorded his third interception of the season, picking off a Dan Marino delivery, along with three tackles. Hawthorne took over in the nickel defense against Philadelphia (12/12) when Kevin Mathis was lost in the first guarter with a sprained knee and went on to record three tackles - helping limit the Eagles to 143 yards passing. With Smith and Mathis out with injuries, Hawthorne recorded a season-high five tackles at New Orleans (12/24). In the season finale against the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00), he recorded four tackles and helped limit the Giants starting wide receivers, Amani Toomer and Ike Hilliard, to seven receptions for 72 yards on the

COLLEGE: Hawthorne finished his career at Northern Illinois with nine interceptions. As a senior, he was the team's fifth leading tackler with 65, while adding 10 passes defensed and four interceptions. As a junior, Hawthorne earned All-MAC honors after leading the team with three interceptions and five passes defensed. He was nominated for MAC Player of the Week honors after registering two interceptions and five tackles against North Carolina State. As a sophomore, Hawthorne was second on the team with two interceptions and seven pass deflections while recording 40 tackles. As a freshman, Hawthorne totaled eight tackles, forced a fumble and deflected a pass in only eight snaps against the third ranked

Florida Gators.

PERSONAL: A physical education major, Hawthorne was the team MVP, all-Suburban East Conference, all-district and all-metro as a senior at Ladue High School in St. Louis, MO. A two-way star, he completed 44-of-91 passes for 811 yards and six touchdowns and rushed for 748 yards and four touchdowns on 64 carries as a quarterback while totaling 102 tackles, seven passes defensed and five

interceptions as a cornerback his senior season. He lettered three times in football, twice in track and once in basketball while winning the conference 400-meters and running on the 4x400 relay team. Hawthorne joined several members of the Cowboys' secondary for the Second Annual Dallas Cowboys/United Way Hometown Huddle. The group of players went to the Salvation Army, Carr P. Collins Social Services Center and served lunch to the homeless and visited with children in the daycare.

PRO: Damon Hodge took full advantage of his opportunity as a rookie free agent in 2000 to make a name for himself. A good sized receiver

that impressed coaches with his strong work habits and ability to learn, Hodge earned a spot on the Cowboys practice squad after turning heads with his field awareness and hands during training camp. He will be counted on to continue his development and become an even bigger contributor in 2001.

2000: Hodge signed with the Cowboys on April 19 as a rookie free agent. He recorded five receptions for 58 yards in five preseason games but was released Aug. 27. He was then signed to the Cowboys practice squad. Following a string of injuries that left the club thin at receiver, Hodge was moved to the active roster on Oct. 11. He made his NFL debut at the N.Y. Giants (10/15) and recorded three receptions for 52 yards (17.3 yard average) seeing action as the club's number two receiver in place of James McKnight (bruised shoulder). Hodge saw limited playing time over the next eight weeks but did record his first career special teams tackle against Jacksonville (10/29). At Tampa Bay (12/3) he added his fourth reception of the season with an eight-yard grab. Hodge was a game-day deactivation for the season finale at Tennessee (12/25).

COLLEGE: Hodge earned Black College All-America honors for recording a school record 83 receptions for 1,023 yards as a junior at Alabama State. As a senior, he closed his final collegiate season second on the Alabama State receiving list with 38 catches for 428 yards and three touchdowns. He finished his career as the school's career-receptions leader with 176 catches during his four-year stint at ASU. His 2,280 career receiving yards are the second highest total in school history, and his 134 career points – 21 touchdowns and four two-point conversions – rank sixth on the Hornets' all-time scoring list. Hodge first emerged as Alabama State's big-play receiver during his sophomore campaign, totaling 53 receptions for 737 yards and nine touchdowns. He also posted a team-high 58 points – nine touchdown catches and two two-point conversions.

PERSONAL: The physical education major was a trombone playing member of the A.L. Johnson High School band in Thomaston, AL, before joining the football team as a senior. In his only year of prep football, Hodge earned Bluechip All-America honors. He was also a three-year letterman for the Johnson basketball team. Hodge joined several members of the Cowboys wide receiver corps for the Hormel Hams for the Holidays program. The group of players visited the Salvation Army Irving Corp and distributed 500 hams to families in need during November. The group also spent time with the toddlers at the Gene & Jerry Jones Family Center for Children. Damon has a son, Damon, Jr.

PRO: As one of the Cowboys biggest free agent signs, Raghib "Rocket" Ismail (Rah-GIBB ISS-my-ell) came to Dallas with high expectations and immediately showed the game breaking ability that earned him his nickname. Signed as an unrestricted free agent on April 15, 1999, he immediately filled a void at speed receiver for the Dallas offense. In 2000, the Cowboys traded for Joey Galloway, creating, arguably, the fastest tandem of starting receivers in the NFL. After both receivers suffered season-ending knee injuries during the 2000 season, the 2001 season should be the NFL's first true glimpse of this game breaking tandem. Ismail has shown consistent improvement since coming into his own with Carolina in 1997, posting career-high figures for receptions and yardage for three consecutive years: 36 receptions for 419 yards in 1997, 69 for 1,024 in 1998 and 80 for 1,097 in 1999. Ismail has not only shown an ability to stretch defenses in the passing game, but he has also shown a knack for creating a big-play carrying the ball. His explosiveness forces defenses to account for his ability to go the distance from any spot on the field.

2000: Ismail was off to another productive season, posting 25 receptions for 350 yards and a touchdown while carrying the ball eight times for 73 yards, before his season came to an abrupt end in Week 10 when he tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee. He opened the season against Philadelphia (9/3) by catching two passes for 36 yards while posting the longest rush of his career, a 37yarder on an end around. He registered five receptions for 69 yards at Arizona (9/10), and he tied for the team lead with three catches for 65 yards at Washington (9/18), including receptions of 44 and 15 yards on the Cowboys fourth quarter, game-winning touchdown drive. He also carried the ball twice for 30 yards against the Redskins. He caught two passes for 38 yards against San Francisco (9/24) before leaving the game with a sprained left ankle in the second half. The next week at Carolina (10/1), he posted three receptions for 25 yards, including the 300th reception of his career, before leaving the game in the third quarter with a right calf contusion. He tallied two catches for 14 yards at the N.Y. Giants (10/15), and he posted his only touchdown catch of the season on a 24-yard grab against Arizona (10/22). He finished the Cardinals game with two receptions for 46 yards and one rush for 11 yards, with all three touches resulting in first downs. He tied his season-high with five receptions for 57 yards against Jacksonville (10/29), with four of his catches giving Dallas a first down. Ismail saw his streak of consecutive games with a reception snapped at 53 at Philadelphia (10/29) when he tore the ACL in his right knee while blocking for Emmitt Smith on a first quarter run. Ismail underwent reconstructive surgery to repair the knee on Nov. 7 and was placed on reserve/injured on Nov. 8.

1999: In the spring of 1999, Ismail joined the Dallas Cowboys and finished the year as the team's leader in receptions and yardage with career-best totals of 80 catches - eighth best in the NFC - for 1,097 vards - 11th in the NFC. In compiling those numbers, he became the first person other than Michael Irvin to lead the team in receiving since Kelvin Martin in 1990. In addition to his receiving milestones, Ismail also had career-highs in rushing with 13 carries for 110 yards. He led, or tied for the team lead, in receptions in 13-of-17 games, including eight consecutive games at mid-season, tying Michael Irvin's club record. He was also second on the team with six touchdown receptions, trailing only David LaFleur (seven). Ismail tied for seventh in the NFC, 12th in the NFL, with 25 receptions on third down, 12 of which gave Dallas a first down - leading the team in third down conversion receptions. In his first game as a Dallas Cowboy, Ismail provided the game-winning 76-yard touchdown reception in overtime at Washington (9/12). The touchdown reception from Troy Aikman capped a Dallas comeback that saw the Cowboys erase a 35-14 fourth quarter deficit and was a career-long catch for Ismail. The game winning score marked the second longest overtime touchdown pass and the fifth longest overtime scoring play in NFL history. Ismail led the team with career-highs of eight receptions and 149 yards while adding a 15yard run on an end around against the Redskins. The following week against Atlanta (9/20), he hauled in a game-long 38-yard reception in the first quarter on third-and-13 to set up an Emmitt Smith touchdown run. Ismail suffered a sprained left shoulder on the play, but he returned to action in the second half. Against Arizona (10/3), Ismail recorded his second 100-yard receiving game of the season with four receptions for 101 yards, including a 63-yard touchdown catch. He also had two carries on end arounds. good for 14 yards. In the Cowboys first loss of the season, at Philadelphia (10/10), he led the team with seven receptions for 88 yards, including a game-long 25-yard catch. He also picked up a first down with a 17-yard end around run. In a Monday night loss at the N.Y. Giants (10/18), three of Ismail's four catches gave Dallas a first down, including two on third down. He ended the night with 74 yards on four catches. Against Washington (10/24), he once again led the team with six receptions for 76 yards, including a 13-yard touchdown catch on the game's opening possession. He also had a 19-yard run on an end



around. In a Monday night loss at Minnesota (11/8), Ismail led the team with seven receptions for 63 yards, including a 24-yard grab. The following week against Green Bay (11/14), he scored on a 37-yard touchdown reception from Jason Garrett, while leading the team with six receptions for 86 yards. In the Thanksqiving Day win over Miami (11/25), Ismail provided the game breaking play with a 65-yard touchdown pass from Aikman that gave Dallas a 17-0 lead midway through the fourth quarter. He also had a 51-vard catch in the fourth quarter to finish the game with five receptions for 125 yards. All of his Thanksgiving Day heroics came after suffering a first quarter concussion that forced him to miss the entire second quarter. Ismail tied his career-high with eight catches for 58 yards at New England (12/5). The following week against Philadelphia (12/12), he tied for the team lead in catches with four for a game-high 52 yards, tying Michael Irvin's club record for leading or tying for the team lead in receptions for eight straight games. Against the N.Y. Jets (12/19), Ismail registered his first rushing touchdown since 1996 with a season-long 27-yard scamper for a score on an end around. The Jets went on to hold Ismail to just one reception, ending his club-record tying streak of eight consecutive games where he led or tied for the team lead in receptions. His one catch against the Jets gave him a career best total of 70 receptions for the season while also putting him over the 1,000 yard receiving barrier for the year. In the playoff clinching win over the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00), Ismail led the team with seven receptions for 62 yards, including his sixth touchdown catch of the season. He capped his most productive career year by providing an outstanding performance in the Cowboys wild card playoff loss at Minnesota (1/9/00), tying his careerbest figure for receptions with eight while accounting for a career-high 163 yards (20.4 avg.). In the loss, Ismail posted catches of 45, 30, 25 and 24 yards, and seven of his eight catches gave Dallas a first down, including four on third down. His 163 yards was the second best receiving yardage total in Dallas postseason history, and the eight receptions tied for the fifth best total in the club's postseason history.

1998: Ismail was the Panthers leading receiver with 69 catches for 1,024 yards (14.8 average) and eight touchdowns. He also had three rushes for 42 yards. His totals established then team single-season records for receptions and receiving yards, surpassing records previously held by Muhsin Muhammad (68 in 1998) and Mark Carrier (1,002 yards in 1995), while his eight touchdown catches ranked as the second-highest total in team history. Ismail led the team in catches in seven games and tied for the lead in two others while posting three 100-yard receiving games. In the season opener against Atlanta (9/6), Ismail provided a glimpse of what the 1998 season would hold when he caught a team-high six passes for 119 yards, including a 56-yarder for a touchdown. The next week at New Orleans (9/13), he moved into the starting lineup for the injured Rae Carruth (foot) and caught two passes for 12 yards. Against Green Bay (9/27), Ismail led the team with six catches for 71 yards, including a five-yard touchdown. He came back the next week to tie for team-high honors with six catches for 82 yards at Atlanta (10/4). When the Panthers traveled to Dallas (10/11), Ismail led the team with six catches for 117 yards and two touchdowns, marking his second 100-yard receiving contest of the season. His two touchdowns matched his personal best for touchdowns in a game. Ismail caught five passes for 62 yards at Tampa Bay (10/18) and four for 49 yards against Buffalo (10/25). He also added his first carry of the season against the Bills, picking up one yard. With 45 yards receiving against New Orleans (11/1), Ismail surpassed his previous career-high for receiving yards in a season of 513 set in 1994 with Oakland. He finished the day with two receptions, including a 33-yard catch. At San Francisco (11/8), Ismail posted what was then a singlegame career-high seven catches for 83 yards, including a 20-yard touchdown reception. He then posted games with five catches for 50 yards against Miami (11/15) and a team-high six catches for 58 yards at Št. Louis (11/22). His only catch at the N.Y. Jets (11/29) went for a team season-long 62 yards and set up the Panthers first touchdown. Against the 49ers (12/6), Ismail put on a big-play performance, recording a 40-yard touchdown catch - his longest scoring play of the season - to bring the Panthers back into the game at 28-21 and a career-long 36-yard reverse that set up the game-tying touchdown. After injuring his knee in the fourth quarter after a one catch (16 yards), one carry (five yards) game against Washington (12/13), Ismail returned to the lineup with a team-high five catches for 42 yards against St. Louis (12/20). In the season finale at Indianapolis (12/27), Ismail led the team and matched his career-high with seven catches for 109 yards, including a five-yard touchdown that gave Carolina a 27-19 victory.

1997: Ismail recorded a then career best 36 receptions for 419 yards and two touchdowns in addition to registering four rushes for 32 yards. He began the season as a reserve, recording two receptions for 17 yards against Washington (8/31) and two for 25 at Atlanta (9/7), before logging two receptions for 21 yards and an 11-yard reverse in his first start of the season, at San Diego (9/14). Moving back into a reserve role, he posted one catch for 12 yards against Kansas City (9/21), four for 19 yards, including an eight-yard touchdown, against San Francisco (9/29), two for 21 yards at Minnesota (10/12) and one for seven at New Orleans (10/19). Ismail tallied two catches for 24 yards against Atlanta (10/26) and five receptions for 43 yards, including three third-down conversions, against Oakland (11/2). At St. Louis (11/23), Ismail recorded a 59-yard touchdown catch among five receptions for 93 yards before moving up with 102 yards on six receptions against New Orleans (11/30) in his second start of the year. Included in that Saints contest was a critical 36-yard reception on fourth down and an 18-yard reverse. He left the contest in the fourth quarter with a right SC joint sprain, however, and was inactive for the season's final

three games.

1996: Joining the Panthers via a trade with Oakland on Aug. 25 (for a 1997 fifth-round draft choice), Ismail displayed his big-play capability, notching a 35-yard touchdown on a reverse against the Giants (11/10) and totaling 108 yards receiving at Atlanta (11/3). Ismail gained 214 yards on 12 catches for the season to lead the team in average yards-per-catch with 17.8, and posted 80 yards and a touchdown on eight rushes. Inactive with a left ankle sprain against Atlanta (9/1) and at New Orleans (9/8), Ismail saw his first action as a Panther against San Francisco (9/22), notching one catch for 12 yards. He played as a reserve at Jacksonville (9/29), posted no yards on a kickoff return reverse at Minnesota (10/6) and had a 17-yard run against St. Louis (10/13). He did not play against New Orleans (10/20), and saw substitute

action without a reception at Philadelphia (10/27). He moved into the starting lineup at Atlanta (11/3) in a three-wideout set and posted 108 yards on five receptions. The following week against the Giants (11/10), he recorded one reception for 30 yards, and his 35-yard reverse for a touchdown notched the Panthers initial score. His 35-yard touchdown gallop was the longest rush from scrimmage by a Panther all season, and it was the longest touchdown run in the NFL by a wide receiver in 1996. At St. Louis (11/17), he started at wide receiver and ran a career-high three times for 24 yards, had one reception for nine yards and subbed at kick returner, collecting one return for 16 yards. At Houston (11/24), he started and returned three kickoffs for 70 yards. Ismail gained seven yards on a reverse and returned one kickoff 14 yards in substitute action against Tampa Bay (12/1) before collecting two receptions for 40 yards and one rush for one yard as a starter at San Francisco (12/8). He was a reserve against Baltimore (12/15), with one catch for nine yards and started against Pittsburgh (12/22), collecting one reception for six yards. In substitute action in both Panthers playoff games, Ismail had one reverse for seven yards against Dallas (1/5/97) and a 24-yard reception at Green Bay (1/12/97) in the NFC Championship Game.

1995: Ismail played in all 16 games with 15 starts for the Oakland Raiders, leading the team in kickoff returns with 36 for 706 yards in addition to 28 catches for 491 yards and three touchdowns. He also rushed six times for 29 yards. He caught a season-high five passes for 71 yards at Washington (9/10) and posted a then career-best 125 yards on three receptions, two for touchdowns, including a season-long

73-varder against Indianapolis (10/22).

1994: Ismail played in all 16 games for the L.A. Raiders, ranking third on the team with 34 catches for 513 yards and five touchdowns. He was the Raiders leading kickoff returner with 43 returns for 923 yards in addition to four rushes for 31 yards. He caught a season-high six passes for 77 yards against Seattle (9/11) and caught two touchdowns at San Diego (12/5).

1993: In his first NFL season, Ismail led the AFC in kickoff returns with a 24.2-yard average on 25 attempts for 605 yards, including a 66-yard return at Cincinnati (11/28), the longest return in the AFC all season. He was fifth on the team in receiving yards with 353 on 26 receptions. His first NFL touchdown came at Kansas City (10/3), a 43-yard reception among four catches for 75 yards, Ismail signed with the

Raiders on August 30 after two seasons with the CFL's Toronto Argonauts.

1992: In his second season in the CFL, Ismail posted his second all-star performance for the Toronto Argonauts, placing first in the league in kickoff returns with 1,139 yards on 43 returns (26.5 avg.). He ranked second in the CFL with 2,767 total yards, including 36 receptions for 651 yards and four touchdowns and 154 yards and three touchdowns on 34 rushing attempts. He also had 614 yards on 59 punt.

returns (10.4 avg.).

1991: In his first season as a professional, Ismail earned all-star honors as a kick returner and All-CFL honors as a receiver after becoming just the second player in CFL history to post over 3,000 combined yards. He accumulated the total on: 64 receptions for 1,300 yards (20.3 avg.) and nine touchdowns; 36 rushing attempts for 271 yards and three touchdowns; 48 punt returns for 602 yards (12.5) and one touchdown; and 31 kickoff returns for 786 yards (25.4). He posted a season-high 87-yard touchdown catch against Hamilton and had six 100-yard receiving efforts. Leading his team to the CFL Championship, Ismail scored in each of two postseason contests – on a 75-yard punt return in the conference final against Winnipeg and on an 87-yard kickoff return in the Grey Cup against Calgary en route to Championship Game MVP honors. Ismail was originally a 1991 fourth-round selection (100th overall) by the Los Angeles Raiders.

COLLEGE: One of the most recognized players in college football, Ismail was an All-America selection his sophomore and junior seasons at Notre Dame and finished second in the 1990 Heisman Trophy balloting following his junior year. During his college career, he averaged 15.3 yards from scrimmage, 27.6 yards on kickoff returns and 61.8 yards-per-touchdown play. His career average of 22.0 yards-perreception set a school record while his five career kickoff returns for touchdowns ranked one shy of the NCAA record. He returned kickoffs for touchdowns of 89 and 92 yards against Michigan in 1989 as a sophomore and had two kickoff returns for touchdowns against Rice as a freshman to become the first player in NCAA history to return two kickoffs for touchdowns in two separate games. As a junior, Ismail ranked ninth in the nation, averaging 156.9 all-purpose yards and led the Irish with 32 receptions for 699 yards and two touchdowns in addition to ranking third in rushing with 537 yards and three touchdowns on 67 carries. He had two games with over 170 yards receiving in addition to crossing the 100-yard rushing mark in two contests. As a sophomore, Ismail averaged 135.7 all-purpose yards with 27 receptions for 535 yards and 478 rushing yards on 64 carries. He was named MVP of the Orange Bowl after rushing for 108 yards, including a 35-yard touchdown, against Colorado in a 21-6 win. As a freshman, Ismail was part of a Fighting Irish national championship team, leading the nation in kickoff return average with a 36.1-yard average on 12 returns with two touchdowns. Ismail was also a standout sprinter on the Notre Dame track team, winning the conference indoor title in the 55-meters in 1989 and placing second in the men's 200-meter outdoor event

PERSONAL: Born Raghib Ramadian Ismail in Elizabeth, NJ, he was a graduate of Myers High School in Wilkes Barre, PA, where he played running back, defensive back and kick returner. He was a *Parade* High School All-America in football as a senior after rushing for 2,112 yards and accounting for 3,144 all-purpose yards and 33 touchdowns. He posted 25 touchdowns and 2,416 all-purpose yards as a junior. He also lettered three times in track, leading his team to two state titles as a sprinter and long jumper, winning individual state titles in the 100-meters, long jump and as anchor of the 400-meter relay team. He also won state titles in the long jump and the indoor 55-meters as a junior. He also lettered twice in basketball. Ismail's brother Qadry is also a NFL receiver, playing for the Super Bowl champion Baltimore Ravens in 2000. Ismail earned a degree in American Studies while at Notre Dame. Ismail has twice appeared on the *Wheel of Fortune* NFL Players Week, donating all money won to charity. Raghib and wife

Melani have a son, Noe, and two daughters, Imani and Kianna.

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys landed a quality, young offensive lineman when they signed Alcender Jackson following the 2000 NFL Draft. His

tenacity and versatility so impressed coaches during preseason that he was the only rookie free agent to make the squad straight out of training camp. While he saw limited playing time as a rookie, he gained valuable experience working alongside Mark Stepnoski on a daily basis in practice. In 2001 he will be given the opportunity to battle for the starting spot at right guard as Solomon Page moves to right tackle.

2000: After seeing action at both right and left guard in preseason, Jackson was deactivated the first 10 weeks of the season. He was active but did not play against Minnesota (11/23) and then deactivated again at Tampa Bay (12/3). Jackson saw his first NFL action when he moved into the lineup at right guard for Solomon Page - who moved to right tackle when Erik Williams suffered a neck strain - against Washington (12/10). Jackson played the entire second half as Emmitt Smith rushed for 150 yards and a touchdown against the NFL's third ranked defense. In all, the Cowboys ran for 242 yards on the day, the most by the Dallas offense since recording 271 yards on the ground at Philadelphia on Oct. 31, 1993. Jackson also saw action at right tackle on the game's final drive at Tennessee (12/25).

COLLEGE: A three-year starter at LSU, Jackson spent his final two seasons at left guard after a sophomore season at tackle. As a senior, Jackson helped the Tigers average over 300 yards-per-game on offense. He started his junior season at left guard but missed the final four games with a sprained knee. During his play, he helped Kevin Faulk rush for 1,279 yards and 12 touchdowns while quarterback Herb Tyler compiled a 147.2 passer rating. Jackson moved into the starting lineup at left tackle his sophomore season, and his blocking led the way for Faulk to rush for 1,144 yards and 15 touchdowns. Jackson's work helped LSU average 410.6 total yards-per-game while recording a 9-3 record to end the year ranked No. 13 in the final Associated Press and USA Today polls.

Originally signed as a rookie free agent on April 27, 2000, Key was turning heads with his play in training camp before he suffered the season-ending injury in the preseason opener against Pittsburgh (7/30/00). After a season of rehabilitation and weight lifting, he is once again showing his understanding of how offenses attack and the responsibilities of a safety.

2000: Key suffered a fractured tibia and fibula in his right leg in the preseason opener against Pittsburgh (7/30). Following surgery to insert a rod in the leg, he was placed on injured reserve Aug. 1.

COLLEGE: Key closed out his senior season at Florida State with 47 tackles, two interceptions, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Despite not starting a game, he finished his junior campaign with 52 stops, the second highest total by a Seminoles defensive back. He also totaled three tackles for losses, three passes defensed, two interceptions and two forced fumbles. He was redshirted in 1997 after registering 33 tackles, three pass deflections and a tackle for a loss as a sophomore. He was one of six true freshmen to see playing time in 1995, totaling 13 tackles while seeing action in eight games as a reserve.

PRO: After being out of football for three years, Micah Knorr made his NFL debut in 2000 and proved to be one of the top rookie punters in

Cowboys history. Knorr's strong leg led him to a franchise rookie record of 42.8 gross yards-per-punt. His superior hang time on his punts allowed Dallas' coverage teams to get down field and help him post a 35.8 net average – the fourth highest net punting average for a rookie in club history. He also handled kickoff duties, finishing his rookie campaign with the second highest percentage of touchbacks in the NFL – 17.5%, 10-of-57. With his offseason work and his desire to improve, Dallas coaches and fans will be expecting even greater results from him during his sophomore campaign.

2000: Knorr burst onto the NFL scene as a rookie, finishing fourth in the NFC, 11th in the NFL, with a club rookie record 42.8 gross punting average. Only one other rookie in the league posted a higher average in 2000 - Shane Lechler, 45.9. Knorr's net punting average of 35.8 - fourth highest rookie mark in club history - was the fifth best net average in the NFC and tied for 14th in the NFL. While handling kickoff duties, he placed 18-of-57 kickoffs into the end zone, posting 10 touchbacks. His 17.5 touchback percentage was the second highest percentage in the NFL (Jeff Wilkins - 22.7%). He made his professional debut against Philadelphia (9/3) and averaged 44.6 yards on seven punts while helping to limit Brian Mitchell to a 5.0 average on four returns. At Arizona (9/10), Knorr averaged 57.0 yards on two punts, with both punts pinning the Cardinals inside their 20-yard line. He punted five times for a 46.4 average at Washington (9/18) to help limit Deion Sanders to three returns for zero yards. Knorr averaged 45.3 yards on three punts, including a career-long 60-yarder, against San Francisco (9/24). He had two punts downed inside the 20-yard line at Carolina (10/1) while averaging 44.0 yards-per-punt, and he posted a 43.3-yard average on three punts at the N.Y. Giants (10/15). Against Arizona (10/22), he posted a careerhigh eight kickoffs. At Philadelphia (11/5), he pinned the Eagles inside their 25-yard line four times in five punts, including twice inside their 10-yard line in the fourth quarter. Knorr suffered a hairline fracture of the tibial plateau in his left knee while being run into on his only punt against Cincinnati (11/12). The punt, however, was called back due to a roughing the punter penalty. Dallas did not have to punt again against





the Bengals, marking the fourth time in club history that Dallas has not registered a punt in a game. Knorr's knee injury forced him to miss games at Baltimore (11/19) and against Minnesota (11/23). He returned to action at Tampa Bay (12/3) by averaging 41.6 yards on five punts. The next week against Washington (12/10), he punted three times for a 45.0 average to help limit Sanders to one return for 11 yards. His booming kickoffs against the Redskins helped hold them to a 17.9-yard average on eight kick-off returns. Knorr posted a 36.2 average on five punts against the N.Y. Giants (12/17), including two that were downed inside the Giants' 20-yard line. In the season finale against Tennessee (12/25), he recorded a career-high 10 punts, the most by a Dallas punter since Mike Saxon had 10 against Chicago on Nov. 17, 1985. It also tied the mark for the second most punts in a game in club history. Knorr averaged 39.8 yards on those 10 kicks against the Titans, including a 53-yarder. He also closed his initial pro campaign with two special team stops, one at Arizona (9/10) and one against the N.Y. Giants (12/17)

1999: Knorr was out of football coaching kickers for Irvine, CA, High School while working at a gym

and day spa.


1997-98: Knorr was out of football managing a sports retail store in California.

COLLEGE: As a senior at Utah State in 1996, Knorr earned second-team All-Big West honors after connecting on 12-of-21 field goals and 36-of-47 extra points to lead the Aggies in scoring with 72 points. He finished his collegiate career with a school record 39 field goals made. As a junior, he earned firstteam All-Big West honors after tying for the league lead in field goals, connecting on 12-of-19 with four of the misses coming from beyond 50 yards. He also finished second on the team in scoring with 61 points. Knorr registered 17 touchbacks while handling kickoff duties for USU. He led Utah State as a sophomore with 63 points on 15-of-20 field goals and 18-of-18 PATs while averaging 37.3 yards on 10 punts and posting 14 touchbacks on kickoffs. Knorr saw action in 11 games as a true freshman in 1993, averaging 38.6 yards on 33 punts.

PERSONAL: Knorr earned first-team All-CIF honors as both a junior and senior at Orange, CA, High School, where he averaged 42-yards-per-punt as a senior. He participated in the Orange County North-South All-Star Game following his senior campaign. The history major finished his prep career with 81 career points on 42-of-47 PATs and 13-of-27 field goals. This past offseason, Knorr served as a celebrity escort while supporting the Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show. He also donated time at the Ninth Annual Komen Tarrant County Race for the Cure, signing autographs, firing the start pistol and assisting

with the awards ceremony.

PRO: Dallas coaches were looking for the prototypical tight end,

somebody who could open holes for the running game and catch passes in traffic, when they drafted David LaFleur in 1997. LaFleur proved to be just what the coaches were looking for at the position, moving into the starting lineup in his second NFL season and continuing to progress through his fourth campaign. In four years, he has logged 85 receptions for 729 yards and 12 touchdowns as a receiver and has helped lead the way as Emmitt Smith topped the 1,000-yard rushing mark all four years. With his size, at 6-7 no player on the team is taller and at 272-pounds he outweighs all non-linemen on the Cowboys roster, LaFleur can be an imposing target on pass plays and a powerful blocker in the running game.

2000: A preseason plagued by a nagging groin injury limited LaFleur throughout training camp and kept him out of all five Cowboys' preseason games. The injury was something that stayed with LaFleur throughout the season, and forced the fourth-year veteran to play in pain the entire year. He closed the season with 12 catches for 109 yards and one touchdown. LaFleur made his presence known at Carolina (10/1) by helping Smith gain 132 yards rushing as the Cowboys racked up 173 yards on the ground. In the loss at the N.Y. Giants (10/15), LaFleur's 19-yard reception set up a 13-yard Smith touchdown run. LaFleur's

blocking once again led the way for another strong Dallas offensive display in the win over Arizona (10/22). The Cowboys amassed 347 yards in total offense, 200 on the ground, with Smith collecting 112 rushing yards in the 48-7 win. LaFleur played a part in Smith surpassing the 100-yard rushing mark in each of the next two weeks' overtime losses to Jacksonville (10/22) and at Philadelphia (10/29). In the Thanksgiving Day loss to Minnesota (11/23), LaFleur tied for the team lead in receptions with a career-high six for a career-best 45 yards. He also scored his only touchdown of the season with a six-yard grab from Aikman in the fourth quarter. Four of his catches against the Vikings went for a first down, including one on third down. LaFleur sat out the entire week of practice prior to the win over Washington (12/10) with swelling in his right knee, but he still started the game and helped lead the way as Smith rushed for 150 yards and a touchdown. In all, the Cowboys ran for 242 yards against the Redskins, the most by the Dallas offense since recording 271 yards on the ground at Philadelphia on Oct. 31, 1993. He missed the final game of the season at Tennessee (12/25) as the result of swelling on his knee.

1999: Despite a rough off-season that saw LaFleur suffer a broken right ankle in workouts on May 11 and undergo a microscopic lumbar discectomy to repair a herniated disc between the L-5 and S-1 vertebrae on May 19, LaFleur had a breakout season in 1999. Because of the injuries, he missed the first half of training camp, returning to limited work on Aug. 11. These problems did little to slow LaFleur once the regular season started as he went on to lead the team with seven touchdown receptions, becoming just the second Dallas tight end to record seven touchdown catches in a season (Billy Joe DuPree - nine in 1978 and seven in 1980). LaFleur also posted career-highs for receptions (35) - placing him second on the team - and receiving yards (322) in a season. Four times during the season, LaFleur posted four reception games, tying his career-high, and twice he topped his previous single-game receiving yardage total of 39 yards in a game. In the season-opening, come-from-behind win at Washington (9/12), LaFleur had a career day with four receptions for 41 yards and two first half touchdowns. It was the second time in his career he recorded two touchdowns in a game (at Cincinnati, 12/14/97). In the fourth quarter, he suffered an ankle contusion and did not return. He returned to action against Atlanta (9/20) and helped lead the way as Smith (109 yards) became just the third player in the previous 29 games to rush for over 100 yards against the Falcons. He turned in a three catch, 22 yard performance at Philadelphia (10/10) before again tying his season-high with four receptions, including one for a touchdown, against Washington (10/24). He hauled in a 22-yard catch at Indianapolis (10/31) and had two receptions, including one for a touchdown, against Green Bay (11/14). LaFleur opened the scoring at Arizona (11/21) when he hauled in an 11-yard touchdown pass from Jason Garrett. It was his only reception of the day, but he helped lead the way as Dallas rushed for 156 yards, including 127 by Smith. Facing the Eagles (12/12) for the second time, LaFleur again tied his season-best with four receptions for a season-high 44 yards, including a career-long 25-yard catch. He also hauled in his sixth touchdown of the season and had a key block on Chris Warren's first half scoring run in the 20-10 win. Playing close to his hometown of Westlake, LA, LaFleur posted his seventh touchdown catch of the season as part of another four-catch (for 30 yards) outburst at New Orleans (12/24). He then closed out the regular season with three receptions for 17 yards against the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00). LaFleur recorded the first postseason receptions of his career with three catches for 22 yards at Minnesota (1/9/00).

1998: After seeing most of his action as a reserve during his rookie season, LaFleur moved into the starting lineup and finished fifth on the team with 20 receptions for 176 yards and two touchdowns. He opened the season against Arizona (9/6) with two receptions for eight yards. The next week at Denver (9/13), he recorded a 12-yard kickoff return at the end of the first half on a squib kick. It was the first kickoff return of his career. LaFleur led the team and tied a career-high with four receptions for 29 yards at Washington (10/4). His performance included a leaping eight-yard grab that set up Chris Warren's third quarter touchdown run. His only catch of the day at Chicago (10/18) was a one-yard touchdown grab from Garrett that put the Cowboys ahead 12-7 in the third quarter. For the second consecutive game, he hauled in a touchdown catch when he came down with a nine-yard grab from Troy Aikman at Philadelphia (11/2). LaFleur tied for the team lead with three receptions for 33 yards at Arizona (11/15) before posting a season-high 39 receiving yards on three receptions, including a season-long 24-yard catch, against Seattle (11/22). He then came back against Minnesota (11/26) on Thanksgiving Day and added three more receptions for 30 yards. LaFleur had one reception for 12 yards at New Orleans (12/6) before suffering a sprained PCL in his right knee in the second quarter. The injury kept him out of the lineup the rest of that game, and he was deactivated for the final three regular season contests. Regaining his health, LaFleur returned to the starting lineup in the NFC Wild Card Playoff Game against Arizona (1/2/99), seeing his first career postseason action, but did not record a reception.

1997: After spending most of his rookie season blocking for the Cowboys running game, LaFleur flourished down the stretch, registering 11 catches for 71 yards and two touchdowns while starting three of the final four games of the season. He opened his NFL career by helping the Dallas offense roll up 380 yards of offense in the season opening win at Pittsburgh (8/31). He recorded his first NFL reception, a six-yard grab, against Chicago (9/28) before adding a 14-yard catch at the N.Y. Giants (10/5) and a 13-yard reception at Washington (10/13). Against Arizona (11/9), LaFleur converted a 10-yard, third down catch into a first down and helped Dallas record two rushing touchdowns. He totaled three receptions against Washington (11/16), and he had a five-yard catch against Tennessee (11/27). He led the team with a season-high four receptions for 26 yards against Carolina (12/8), with three of the catches coming in the second half after starting tight end Eric Bjornson fractured his left fibula. LaFleur started the next week at Cincinnati (12/14) and registered three receptions for 29 yards, including two touchdown catches. His effort marked the first time a Dallas tight end had recorded multiple touchdown catches in a game since Jay Novacek scored twice at Washington on Dec. 13, 1992. LaFleur closed out the season against the N.Y. Giants (12/21) by finishing second on the team with three catches. His 18 receptions for the season was the second highest reception total by a rookie tight end in Cowboys history (Billy Joe DuPree, 29 in



1973). Only two rookie tight ends (DuPree - five and Mike Ditka - three) have recorded more than the two touchdown catches LaFleur notched. He was the first LSU Tiger to be drafted by Dallas and only the

fourth Tiger to ever play for the Cowboys.

COLLEGE: LaFleur was a consensus All-SEC selection and a member of the Walter Camp All-America Team as a senior after becoming the first tight end to lead LSU in receiving – 30 catches for 439 yards and three touchdowns – since 1980. As a junior, he finished with 12 receptions for 120 yards while missing three games with a knee injury. LaFleur was a sophomore All-America pick by *The Gridiron Report* and a consensus All-SEC selection in 1994 after totaling 21 receptions for 263 yards and two touchdowns. He played in every game as a redshirt freshman in 1993, tallying eight catches for 59 yards.

PERSONAL: LaFleur was a Parade and USA Today All-America selection and the Gatorade Circle of Champions Louisiana Player of the Year at Westlake, LA, High School as a senior. He was also the winner of the Bobby Dodd National High School Lineman of the Year Award given by the Atlanta Touchdown Club, LaFleur, who also played defensive end, totaled 81 receptions for 1,758 yards (21.7 avg.) and 18 touchdowns during his three-year high school career. He lettered three times in football and basketball and four times in track at Westlake. LaFleur has served as a celebrity escort in the annual Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show, which raised nearly \$400,000 in 2000 for pediatric oncology research. David, who earned his degree in kinesiology, and wife Melody reside in Flower Mound, TX with their son Jake (6/3/00).

PRO: Kareem Larrimore experienced a trial by fire as a rookie. The club's fourth-round draft choice in 2000, Larrimore was expected to con-

tribute in the nickel package and help on special teams as a rookie. Two weeks into his first training camp, he was thrust into the starting lineup after Kevin Smith's sudden retirement and a rash of injuries to his mates in the secondary. He responded well and fought through his rookie campaign and should do nothing but improve during his second go-round. A well-built pass defender, Larrimore can flat out fly. With a 4.34 timing, he had the third fastest 40-yard dash time at the 2000 NFL Scouting Combine. Speed isn't his only game, as Larrimore is a very effective tackler who will take on blocks and get involved in run support.


2000: Larrimore hit the ground running as a rookie, moving into the starting lineup for the final three preseason games at left cornerback after the retirement of Kevin Smith. In the season opener against Philadelphia (9/3), Larrimore became just the second rookie (Ron Francis in 1987) in club history to start at cornerback in a season opener. He recorded three tackles and helped limit the Eagles to 130 yards through the air on 16 catches (8.1 yards-per-catch). In addition, the Eagles starting wide receivers were limited to two receptions for six yards. Larrimore earned his second start of the season and recorded three tackles before giving way to Phillippi Sparks in the second quarter at Arizona (9/10). Back in the starting lineup at Washington (9/18), he helped shut down the Redskins big-play passing attack by helping limit their four wide receivers to 12 receptions for 97 yards (8.1 yards-per-catch), including a long of 14 yards. He also recorded four tackles. Larrimore lost his starting job to Sparks for good at Carolina (10/1), but still contributed two special teams tackles. After being deactivated against Arizona (10/22), he contributed a big special teams play at Philadelphia (11/5), downing a Micah Knorr punt at the Eagles three-yard line in the fourth quarter. Over the next month, Larrimore saw most of his action in the club's dime packages, recording tackles against Cincinnati (11/12) and Minnesota (11/23). He led the club with three special teams tackles against Washington (12/10) as the Redskins were limited to a 17.9-yard average on eight kickoff returns. He also added three tackles and a quarterback pressure covering the slot in the Dallas nickel defense. When Greg Myers went down with an MCL sprain in his left knee against the N.Y. Giants (12/17), Larrimore took over at left cornerback while Sparks moved to safety, Larrimore went on to record two tackles as the Giants were limited to 126 net yards passing in the game, Larrimore was the Cowboys fourth-round draft choice (109th overall) in 2000 out of West Texas A&M.

VETERANS LARRIMORE

COLLEGE: Larrimore earned Little All-America selection and was an All-Lone Star Conference choice after recording 32 tackles, 10 passes defensed and five interceptions as a senior at West Texas A&M (Division II school in Canyon, TX). He returned those five picks for 109 yards, including a 74-yarder for a touchdown. Following the season, Larrimore returned a kickoff 99-yards for a touchdown in the Blue-Gray all-star game, the first such touchdown in the 62-year history of the game. Larrimore earned All-Lone Star Conference honors as a junior. He recorded two interceptions, including one he returned 67 yards for a score. As a kickoff returner, he averaged 26.6 yards a return and took one back 100-yards for a touchdown. Larrimore spent two seasons at Cerritos, CA, Junior College, where he earned All-America honors as a sophomore.

PERSONAL: A standout defensive back and returner at Alain Locke High School in Los Angeles, CA, Kareem Maktrel Larrimore has four brothers and sisters.

PRO: After making significant contributions to Dallas' offense as a rookie, Mike Lucky missed out on his follow-up campaign after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee in the 2000 preseason opener. The Cowboys are hoping Lucky, through his rehabilitation regimen, can re-establish the strength and toughness in the trenches that helped Dallas finish his rookie season with the sixth ranked rushing offense in the NFL. Although mostly noted for his bruising style of play as a blocker, he has displayed flashes as a receiver when given the opportunity. These attributes are the reason Lucky gives Dallas valuable depth at tight end.

2000: Lucky's second season never got underway as he tore the ACL in his right knee during the preseason opener against Pittsburgh (7/30). He underwent reconstructive surgery to repair the ligaments in

his knee on Aug. 1 and was placed on injured reserve.

1999: Lucky's productive rookie season got off to a very tenuous start as he suffered a stress fracture in his left foot on Aug. 27 and was forced to miss five weeks, including the opener at Washington (9/12) and the following week against Atlanta (9/20). The open date (9/26) gave Lucky extra time for healing, and he quickly settled into his role as the team's backup tight end, especially blocking for short yardage and goal line situations. Against Arizona (10/3), Lucky earned his first NFL start in his very first NFL game when Dallas opened in a two-tight end formation. He later went on to record his first career reception with a two-yard grab on third-and-two to keep a Cowboys touchdown drive alive against the Cardinals. Lucky earned his second career start (three tight end set) in his first appearance on Monday Night Football in the Cowboys 13-10 loss at the N.Y. Giants (10/18). One week later against Washington (10/24), Lucky recorded his second catch of the season with a five-yard reception. He started the next week's game at Indianapolis (10/31) as the Cowboys once again opened in a short yardage formation. In the Thanksgiving Day win over Miami (11/25), he recorded two catches for 15 yards, marking his first career multiple catch game. He added a three-yard reception in the season finale against the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00). His contributions in the running game enabled the Cowboys to average 128.3 yards-per-game on the ground (sixth in the NFL), while Emmitt Smith enjoyed his finest season since 1995 (1,397). He was selected by the Cowboys in the seventh round (229th overall) of the 1999 NFL Draft.

COLLEGE: Lucky started 35 of the final 36 games of his college career, catching 43 career passes for 563 yards and four touchdowns. As a senior, he finished fourth on the team with 11 receptions for 142 yards. He also added 40 knockdown blocks and was a punishing part of a Wildcats' running game that averaged 213 yards-per-game (14th in the nation). In the regular season finale, Lucky's blocking was a critical part of an Arizona offense that rolled up 607 total yards against Arizona State, including a school-record 288 yards rushing by Trung Canidate. Arizona finished the season 12-1 and ranked fourth in the final Associated Press poll. As a junior starter on the Insight.com Bowl champion Wildcats, Lucky finished fourth on the team with 13 receptions for 154 yards and two touchdowns.

PERSONAL: Michael Thomas Lucky left Antioch, CA, High School rated the 15th best tight end in the country by SuperPrep magazine. As a senior, he served as team captain and caught 36 passes for 650



were seeking a shifty receiver with dependable hands and big-play ability. McGarity has proven his worth in both capacities - especially as a punt return man - rapidly surfacing as one of the game's most talented punt return specialists. As a second-year pro in 2000, he averaged 10.7 yards for every one of the 61 times he touched the ball on returns, receptions or runs from scrimmage. He has proven to be a valuable receiver out of the slot who can make things happen after catching the ball.



returns of 59 and 64 yards. He was the NFC's third leading punt returner (eighth in the NFL) with an 11.8yard average, and he was one of only two NFL players to return a pair of punts for touchdowns for the year, becoming the fifth man in team history to accomplish that feat. In addition, with both of his scores on returns coming against the Cardinals (in separate games), he became just the third player in NFL history to return a punt for a touchdown against the same opponent in separate games during the same season. Billy "White Shoes" Johnson (vs. Cleveland, 1977) and Eric Metcalf (vs. Cincinnati, 1994) are the others. When he wasn't establishing himself as one of the game's brightest young return men, McGarity saw extended time as a slot receiver in the Cowboys multiple receiver sets, finishing the year tied for fourth on the squad with 25 catches for 250 yards. McGarity made his presence known at Arizona (9/10), when he returned a first quarter punt 64 yards for a touchdown. The following week at Washington (9/18), he sprained his right ankle on his first punt return attempt and missed the remainder of the Cowboys Monday night win over the Redskins. The ankle injury forced him to the sidelines for the next two games. He then returned three punts for 22 yards, including a 16-yarder, at the N.Y. Giants (10/15). In the Cowboys win over Arizona (10/22), McGarity recorded his second punt return for a touchdown, taking a first quarter punt 59-yards up the middle for the score. He finished the day with four returns for 68 yards. In the following week's overtime loss to Jacksonville (10/29), he averaged 11.5 yards on two punt returns, including an 18-yarder that helped kick-start the Cowboys game-tying touchdown drive in the forth quarter. After Raghib Ismail sustained a torn ACL in the overtime loss to Philadelphia (11/5), McGarity saw extended time at wide receiver. He responded with three receptions for 19 yards, including a third down reception in overtime to convert a first down against the Eagles, while averaging 12.3 yards on three punt returns. In the win over Cincinnati (11/12), McGarity was second on the team with four receptions for 51 yards, including a career-long 25-yard grab. He also recorded the first two rushing attempts of his career, gaining 15 yards. He finished the day against the Bengals by touching the ball six times from scrimmage and picking up 66 yards and three first downs, including two on third down. At Baltimore (11/19), he led the team with a career-high six receptions that covered 40 yards. The following week against Minnesota (11/23) on Thanksgiving Day, McGarity posted five receptions for 54 yards while adding two punts returns for 20 yards. At Tampa Bay (12/3), he led the team with a career-high 59 receiving yards on four receptions. In the Cowboys win over Washington (12/10), McGarity had a huge impact on all 12 of Dallas' first half points. He returned the Redskins first two punts 33 and 27 yards to set Dallas up at the 'Skins 25and 30-yard lines. Both possessions ended in Tim Seder field goals. In the second quarter, he registered his first career offensive touchdown with a 22-yard end around run to put Dallas ahead for good at 12-7.

1999: McGarity, who missed half the season due to injuries, saw his first NFL action in the season opener at Washington (9/12), playing in four receiver sets and fair catching a punt. He returned three punts for 16 yards the next week against Atlanta (9/20) before being inactive against Arizona (10/3) and at Philadelphia (10/10). Following Michael Irvin's neck injury in the Philadelphia game, McGarity returned



to the lineup at the N.Y. Giants (10/18) and posted his first professional receptions, catching three passes for 36 yards. He dislocated his right shoulder in the second quarter against the Giants and missed the next four games. He returned to practice on Nov. 17, but was inactive at Arizona (11/21). He returned to action on Thanksgiving Day against Miami (11/25) and registered one catch for three yards. He made his first career start at New England (12/5) for an injured Ernie Mills, making McGarity the first rookie to start at wide receiver for Dallas since Kevin Williams on Dec. 18, 1993. McGarity posted three receptions for 31 yards against the Patriots. He fractured the ring finger on his right hand in practice on Dec. 8, underwent surgery on Dec. 9 to insert screws and was placed on injured reserve.

COLLEGE: McGarity overcame two major knee operations during college to leave Texas ranked sixth on the school's career receptions list (95) and third in receiving yards (1,687) and touchdowns (14). He also posted the longest reception in Longhorn history (97 yards) and scored eight touchdowns of 30 yards or longer. He earned All-Big 12 honors as a senior after setting then school records with 58 receptions for 1,087 yards (18.7 avg.) and nine touchdowns, the second highest touchdown total in school history. He also set the single-game touchdown record with four scores at Texas Tech. As a junior, McGarity caught 10 passes for 169 yards before tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the third game of the season. He grabbed 18 passes for 318 yards (17.7) and four touchdowns, including the Big 12 Championship Game-winning touchdown, as a sophomore. McGarity totaled 112 yards and three touchdowns on 26 carries and 113 yards on nine receptions as a reserve tailback during his redshirt freshman campaign. McGarity was redshirted in 1994 after tearing the ACL in his right knee on the first day of preseason drills.

PERSONAL: Wane Keith McGarity rushed for 1,606 yards and 22 touchdowns on 233 carries as a senior at Clark High School in San Antonio, TX, after rushing for 890 yards as a junior. He was also a three-time district champion in the 100-meters, twice qualifying for the state finals. In 1992, McGarity had reconstructive surgery to repair a torn ACL in his right knee. The Sports Management major regularly visited Children's Hospital of Austin during his stay at the University of Texas. After arriving in Dallas, McGarity participated as a celebrity coach for a Dallas Cowboys Gatorade Football Clinic for children from The



PRO: Since the day the Cowboys drafted Michael Myers in the fourth round of the 1998 NFL Draft, coaches believed they were getting a quality prospect who just needed time to develop. After displaying flashes of that promise in his first two seasons, injuries landed him the playing time he needed in 2000, and he responded with the best season of his young career. Myers proved over the second half of the season that he had matured into a solid NFL defensive lineman. He has the ability to create havoc along the line of scrimmage while at the same time consistently finding a way into opponents' backfield. His four tackles for a loss in seven starts last season are a testament to the athletic ability that gives him the versatility to play tackle and end.

2000: When given an opportunity after Chad Hennings (neck) and Leon Lett (knee) were forced to the sidelines with season ending injuries at mid-season, Myers had a career-year in just a few short weeks. He finished with 46 stops, topping his career total through his first two seasons combined (34 tackles). He also contributed four tackles for a loss – good for fourth on the team – and a career-high six quarterback pressures. He was able to post these totals despite earning just seven starts in 13 games. After sitting out the first three weeks as a game-day deactivation, Myers took advantage of his first action of the season to



record five tackles against San Francisco (9/24). The following week at Carolina (10/1), he saw considerable playing time at defensive tackle when Leon Lett was limited with a strained right hamstring. While he recorded two tackles and a quarterback pressure at the N.Y. Giants (10/15) on defense, Myers's biggest contribution may have been as a blocking tight end in goal line formations when he came in motion behind center and helped lead Emmitt Smith into the end zone for a three-yard touchdown. Myers contributed a big-play on defense against Arizona (10/22) when he tackled Michael Pittman and forced a fumble that the Cardinals recovered but that set them up with second-and-22. The Cardinals were unable to convert that into a first down, and Wane McGarity returned the ensuing punt for a touchdown. Myers also saw action for the second straight week at tight end in goal line situations with Smith scoring again behind his blocking. After Lett suffered a season ending knee sprain in practice on Nov. 8, Myers moved into the starting lineup for the final seven weeks. He earned his first career start at defensive tackle against Cincinnati (11/12), and his play helped limit the Bengals to 195 total yards of offense. He then recorded six tackles, including two behind the line of scrimmage, at Baltimore (11/19). Against Minnesota (11/23), Myers tied for third on the team with five tackles and added a tackle for a six-yard loss on a screen pass. He was then second among defensive linemen with four tackles at Tampa Bay (12/3). Myers posted the biggest game of his career against Washington (12/10) when he led the team with a career-high eight tackles. Along the way he helped limit Stephen Davis, the NFC's third-leading rusher, to 57 yards. Myers closed out his breakthrough season with seven tackles at Tennessee (12/25). He also recovered the first fumble of his career, falling on a Frank Wycheck loose ball at midfield in the first quarter.

1999: Myers saw action in six games, recording 11 tackles, two quarterback pressures and one tackle for lost yardage. He was inactive for Dallas' other 10 regular season games. In the Cowboys win over Arizona (10/3), he saw action at defensive tackle and recorded four tackles while helping limit the Cardinals to 208 yards of offense. At Philadelphia (10/10), he saw reserve action at defensive tackle and recorded two tackles while helping limit the Eagles to 244 yards of offense. In the Monday night loss at Minnesota (11/8), Myers recorded one tackle that resulted in a three-yard loss for Leroy Hoard. In the season ending win over the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00), he picked up his two quarterback pressures for the year. The following week in the playoff loss at Minnesota (1/9/00), Myers was pressed into duty because of injuries on the Dallas defensive line and responded with two sacks and a season-high six tackles.


1998: After spending most of his first training camp working at defensive tackle, Myers began the season as the top back-up behind Kavika Pittman at rush defensive end. Myers opened his rookie campaign with three tackles at Denver (9/13). The next week at the N.Y. Giants (9/21), he again recorded three tackles and batted down a pass. He tallied two tackles at Washington (10/4) before registering a tackle and a quarterback pressure while helping limit Carolina (10/11) to 35 rushing yards on 21 carries (1.7 avg.). At Chicago (10/18), he helped limit the Bears to 2.5 yards-per-rushing attempt with two tackles. He logged his first career sack with a second quarter take down of Bobby Hoying at Philadelphia (11/2). He then recorded a season-high six tackles and his second sack at Arizona (11/15) while helping limit the Cardinals to 32 rushing yards on 21 carries. He contributed two tackles and a pressure on Thanksgiving Day against Minnesota (11/26) before registering three tackles, a pass defensed and a quarterback pressure at New Orleans (12/6). Myers saw considerable second half action against Philadelphia (12/20) after Pittman suffered a strained hamstring. Myers earned his first NFL start the next week against Washington (12/27) in place of Pittman, teaming with Greg Ellis to become the first pair of rookie defensive linemen to start at the same time in club history. He recorded his third sack of the season against the Redskins. He started his first postseason contest against Arizona (1/2/99) in a wild card playoff game and tallied a tackle and a quarterback pressure. Myers, a fourth round draft choice (100th overall), was just the second Crimson Tide defensive player ever selected by Dallas.

COLLEGE: Myers was a preseason All-America and All-SEC selection as a senior at Álabama. He started the season with five tackles and half a sack against Vanderbilt but missed the remainder of the season following an NCAA suspension. Myers made the jump from junior college to Division I football by earning All-America honors from *The Sporting News* and consensus All-SEC accolades after recording 66 tackles, 24 quarterback pressures and 13 sacks in his first season at Alabama. His 13 sacks rank third in school history behind Derrick Thomas' 18 in 1987 and 27 in 1988. He was a two-time JUCO All-America at Hinds, MS, Junior College, where he established a school record with 20 sacks as a freshman.

PERSONAL: The Human Performance major was an all-state and all-region selection as a senior at Vicksburg, MS, High School, where he also was a member of the basketball team. Myers participated in the Dallas Cowboys/Junior Cattle Baron's "Our Heroes are All Kinds of Cowboys" party, hosted at Texas Stadium for 500 children suffering from cancer.

PRO: Dat Nguyen (pronounced WIN) has been overcoming long odds his entire life. The son of Vietnamese immigrants, Nguyen has battled the perception that he was too small to play football for as long as he has been involved in the game. He began proving critics wrong at an early age, and he proceeded to leave Texas A&M as the Aggies career record holder with 51 consecutive starts, 517 career tackles and a 10.7 tackles-per-game average. Despite such an illustrious collegiate career, the "undersized" criticism was still heard from NFL personnel. The Cowboys overlooked that criticism and drafted the most productive linebacker in Texas A&M history in the third round (85th overall) of the 1999 NFL Draft. Nguyen made an impact with the Cowboys from the very beginning, leading the team in special teams stops as a rookie and becoming Dallas' starting middle linebacker in his second professional season. Nguyen's keen football instincts give him an uncanny ability to be around the ball, while his speed and quickness allow him to string plays wide while plugging up holes and creases. Coaches are looking forward to seeing him play a full 16 game schedule at middle linebacker after injuries forced him to miss six games in 2000.

2000: Nguyen opened the season as the Cowboys starting middle linebacker, and despite missing six games due to injury, finished the year with 64 tackles, four stops behind the line of scrimmage, four passes defensed and two interceptions. In his first professional start, he posted eight tackles and intercepted a pass, which he returned 24 yards, against Philadelphia (9/3). At Arizona (9/10), he led the team with a career-high 12 tackles, including one for a loss, despite being slowed and missing playing time with a sprained MCL in his left knee. His knee sprain forced him to miss games at Washington (9/18), against San Francisco (9/24) and at Carolina (10/1). He returned to action at the N.Y. Giants (10/15) and tallied seven stops, one behind the line of scrimmage, before suffering a strained neck in the fourth guarter that forced him from the game. He missed the next three games due to the neck strain, returning to action against Cincinnati (11/12). He saw action against the Bengals at middle linebacker in passing situations and recorded his second interception of the season. Nguyen posted four stops in spot play at Baltimore (11/19) before finishing fifth on the team with eight tackles at Tampa Bay (12/3) despite not starting. He was second on the team with seven tackles against Washington (12/10) while seeing considerable playing time off the bench. His effort against the Redskins helped limit Stephen Davis, the NFC's second-leading rusher, to 57 yards. He returned to the starting lineup at middle linebacker against the N.Y. Giants (12/17) and tied for third on the team with 10 stops. He closed out the season at Tennessee (12/25) tying for third on the club with seven stops in his second consecutive start.

1999: Nguyen led the team with 41 tackles and 2.5 sacks in the preseason, setting the stage for an outstanding rookie season. He made an immediate impact with his stellar special teams play and solid performance as a nickel middle linebacker. He finished the season as the Cowboy's leading special teams tackler with 18 stops, recording at least one special teams tackle in 12-of-17 games (including postseason) and earning all-rookie honors from the Football Digest for his special teams play. On defense, he had 34 tackles, five tackles for lost vardage (tied for third on the team), one sack, one interception and a forced fumble. In his first professional game, at Washington (9/12), Nguyen led the Cowboys with three special teams tackles. He also recovered a key fourth quarter on-side kick that helped the Cowboys overcome a 21 point deficit in a game that was won by Dallas in overtime. The following week against Atlanta (9/20), he recorded his first career tackle at middle linebacker in a nickel passing situation. Against Arizona (10/3), Nguyen tied for the team lead among linebackers with a season-high five tackles, including one for a three-yard loss on a screen pass. He also recorded his first career interception with a fourth quarter pick of Jake Plummer. Two weeks later at the N.Y. Giants (10/18), he equaled his season-high with five tackles and had a tackle for a loss while playing middle linebacker in nickel situations. Nguyen recorded his first career sack at Indianapolis (10/31) when he brought down Peyton Manning for a 13yard loss on first-and-goal from the Dallas three-yard line. He also tied for the team lead with three special teams stops against the Colts. In the Monday night loss at Minnesota (11/8), Nguyen tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles while also forcing a fumble on a second quarter kickoff return that Charlie Williams recovered at the Vikings 24-yard line to set up the second Dallas touchdown. Playing mostly in the nickel defense, he recorded four tackles against the Vikings. At Arizona (11/21), he tied for the team lead with two special teams stops and added two tackles at middle linebacker in Dallas' nickel defense. At New Orleans (12/24), he recorded four tackles and had a tackle for a 12-yard loss. In the season finale against the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00), Nguyen took over at middle linebacker in the second half for Randall Godfrey (back stiffness) and went on to tie his season-high tackle total with five while helping limit the Giants to 74 yards rushing. In the playoff loss at Minnesota (1/9/00), Nguyen broke up two passes and recorded three tackles.

COLLEGE: Following his senior season, Nguyen was one of the nation's most decorated collegiate players, earning All-America honors from Walter Camp, The Sports Network, The Sporting News, Burger King/AFCA, Football News & College Football News. The National and Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year, he also won the Lombardi Trophy and Chuck Bednarik Award, while being a finalist for the Dick Butkus and Sullivan Awards, Nguyen was also named the Dallas Morning News Big 12 Male Athlete of the Year. He finished his senior season with a career-high 147 tackles, becoming the first player in school history to lead Texas A&M in tackles four straight seasons. He also added 20 tackles for losses, four sacks, four forced fumbles and two interceptions. He closed his collegiate career with A&M records for consecutive starts (51), tackles (517) and tackles-per-game (10.7). As a junior, he was an All-Big 12 first-team selection and the team MVP. He was also an All-Big 12 first-team selection as a sophomore. In 1995, Nguyen was named Southwest Conference Defensive Newcomer of the Year as a redshirt freshman.

PERSONAL: Nguyen was a consensus Texas Top 100 linebacker following his prep career at Rockport-Fulton High School in Rockport, TX. He earned district 30-3A Defensive Player of the Year honors as a senior after tallying 188 tackles. He also earned Class 3A second-team all-state honors as a punter. Nguyen graduated from Texas A&M with a degree in Agricultural Development in Aug. 1998 and took post-graduate classes during his senior football season. He has taken an active role in the Dallas community, participating in programs that include the Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show and the Dallas Race for the Cure benefiting the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation for Research. Dat and wife Becky were married this past spring. Dat also served as a guest flag-football coach in the Cowboys annual Let Us Play! Sports Camp for girls from various non-profit agencies in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Coach Nguyen lead his group to the mock "Super Bowl" victory in 2001.

PRO: An NFL Europe success story, Brandon Noble originally signed with Dallas in February of 1999 and spent the spring of that year guiding Barcelona to the World Bowl game in NFL Europe. A tenacious competitor who overcompensates for any physical shortcomings with a non-stop desire to make plays, Noble quickly found a spot in the Cowboys defensive tackle rotation in his first year with the club. Last season, as injuries felled his tackle linemates, Noble stood tall as the only defensive tackle to see action in all 16 games for Dallas, starting nine contests. With the added playing time, he responded by finishing second among all defensive linemen with 69 tackles and was third in quarterback pressures with 10. Noble's journey to the top has been long, having originally signed with San Francisco as a rookie free agent in 1997, he was waived during training camp. In between brief stops on the 49ers practice squad in 1997 and 1998, he spent the first of two very successful NFL Europe campaigns with Barcelona in 1998

2000: As injuries claimed the season of players all around him on the defensive line. Noble answered the call with a breakthrough season, finishing second among the club's defensive linemen with a careerhigh 69 tackles. He was also third on the team with 10 quarterback pressures. After seeing action mostly as a reserve the first half of the season, Noble moved into the starting lineup for Chad Hennings (neck nerve irritation) the final eight games of the season and recorded 45 tackles (5.6 per game) in his new role. As a member of the defensive tackle rotation, Noble came off the bench to add five tackles in the season opener against Philadelphia (9/3). He earned his first NFL start when he replaced Leon Lett in the lineup at Carolina (10/1). In that game Noble recorded four tackles and a career-high four quarterback



pressures. He also forced Steve Beuerlein into an intentional grounding penalty at the Panthers one-yard line that led to a Dallas safety. Returning to a reserve role, he logged two tackles at the N.Y. Giants (10/15) and three stops against Arizona (10/22). Noble led all defensive linemen and was fourth on the team with eight tackles against Jacksonville (10/29). One week later, he improved on that performance when he took over the starting right tackle spot for Hennings and led the defensive line with a career-high 10 stops at Philadelphia (11/5). It was the second highest tackle total by a Dallas defensive lineman in 2000 and the tops by a defensive tackle. His play helped limit four Philadelphia running backs to 25 carries for 77 yards (3.1 avg.). Noble was second among defensive linemen with six tackles and recorded his first sack of the season when he forced Akili Smith out of bounds on the opening possession against Cincinnati (11/12). He also batted down his first pass of the year and helped hold the Bengals to 195 total yards. In the ensuing weeks, Noble remained among the defensive leaders in tackles with eight stops at Baltimore (11/19) and five against Minnesota (11/23). He then led all defensive linemen with five tackles at Tampa Bay (12/3). Against Washgington (12/10), Noble forced the first fumble of his career and helped limit Stephen Davis, the NFC's third-leading rusher, to 57 yards. In a season of firsts for Noble, he added another against the N.Y. Giants (12/17) when he blocked a Brad Daluiso field goal attempt for his first career block. Noble closed out the season finishing second among defensive linemen with six tackles at Tennessee (12/25) in the season finale.

1999: A participant in all 17 regular season and postseason games, Noble finished the year second on the team for tackles among non-starters with 36 stops. He tied for fourth on the squad in sacks with three, and he also added five guarterback pressures, one fumble recovery and a pair of tackles for lost yardage. In his first NFL regular season game action, at Washington (9/12), Noble was a part of the defensive tackle rotation, logging one tackle and a guarterback pressure that helped set up a Greg Ellis sack in overtime. In the Cowboys 35-7 win over Arizona (10/3), he recorded three tackles and helped limit the Cardinals to 208 total yards. Two weeks later in the Monday night loss at the N.Y. Giants (10/18), he recorded a season-high four tackles while helping limit the Giants to 75 yards rushing on 30 carries (2.5 avg.). The following week in the 38-20 win over Washington (10/24), Noble recorded his first career sack with a takedown of Brad Johnson in the fourth quarter. He also added two tackles. At Minnesota (11/8), he registered his second sack of the season with a takedown of Jeff George, while tying his season-high with four tackles. In the nationally televised Thanksgiving Day win over Miami (11/25), Noble turned in one of his most productive outings of the season. He picked up his third sack of the year with a take-down of Dan Marino and recorded three tackles and a tackle for a loss as Dallas shutout the Dolphins and limited them to just 69 yards rushing. In the win over Philadelphia (12/12), he recovered his first career fumble. The following week against the N.Y. Jets (12/19), he again tied his season-high tackle total of four while adding a quarterback pressure. Noble spent the spring with the Barcelona Dragons of NFL Europe. He finished fifth in the league with five sacks while placing fourth on the Dragons tackle chart with 27. His effort helped lead Barcelona to the World Bowl.

1998: Noble signed with San Francisco on Jan. 13 and was allocated to the Barcelona Dragons of NFL Europe. He was named NFL Europe Defensive Player of the Week after recovering two fumbles, returning one 34 yards for a touchdown, against Frankfurt. Noble went to training camp with the 49ers but was released at the end of camp. He signed onto the 49ers' practice squad on Dec. 3 and was released following the season.

1997: Noble signed with San Francisco as a rookie free agent but was waived during camp. He was igned to the 49ers' practice squad Nov. 12, but was waived a week later.




PRO: After center Mark Stepnoski sprained the medial collateral ligament in his left knee at Baltimore last season, the Cowboys signed Craig Page off the Tennessee Titans practice squad on Nov. 22 to provide depth at the center position. Page is big, physical player that has spent the last two seasons on the Titans practice squad learning the professional game. With Stepnoski's return, Page will be fighting with Ben Fricke for the reserve center position in 2001.

2000: Page went to camp with the Titans but was released on the final cut-down day (Aug. 26). He signed to Tennessee's practice squad on Aug. 30, where he spent the first 12 weeks of the season before Dallas signed him to their active roster on Nov. 22. Page was a game day deactivation against Minnesota (11/23) and was active but did not play at Tampa Bay (12/3) and against the N.Y. Giants (12/17). In the season finale at Tennessee (12/25), Page saw fourth quarter action at center.

1999: Page signed with the Tennessee Titans as a rookie free agent on April 21 but was released at the end of camp on Aug. 25. He signed to the Titans practice squad Sept. 7, where he spent the regular season. Page was then moved to the active roster on Jan. 14 for Tennessee's final three playoff games but was deactivated on game days.

COLLEGE: Page was a three-year starter for Georgia Tech, earning All-America honors as a senior. He became the first Yellow Jacket to earn consensus All-America honors since 1992. Following his senior campaign, he also won the Jacobs Blocking Trophy as the top blocker in the Atlantic Coast Conference while helping Georgia Tech lead the ACC with 35.5 points-per-game. As a junior, he helped lead the Yellow Jackets to the third best rushing offense in the conference. During his sophomore campaign, he started all 11 games, playing every snap in nine of those contests. PRO: When Solomon Page was still available in the second round of the 1999 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys saw an opportunity to add a big, aggressive lineman with outstanding athletic ability to the roster. Page lived up to his billing and was immediately thrust into the responsibility of playing on a regular basis as a rookie – seeing action in 14 games with six starts. In his second NFL season, Page started every game at right guard and displayed continual improvement as the season progressed. A versatile athlete, who has spent most of his NFL snaps at guard, Page will have the opportunity to return to his more natural position, tackle, in 2001. The departure of longtime starter Erik Williams at right tackle has created a void that Page should capably handle. A left tackle in college, he made the adjustment to left guard as a rookie, starting five games for an injured Larry Allen. He then started at right guard throughout 2000. Page is capable of playing at either guard or tackle on both sides of the line.

2000: Page opened the season as the starting right guard and was part of an offensive line that surrendered 35 sacks – only 12 teams allowed fewer in 2000. He displayed his versatility in the opener against Philadelphia (9/3), where he started the game at right guard but was shifted out to right tackle after Williams was ejected. At Arizona (9/10), Page's blocking helped limit the Cardinals to one sack while

protecting Randall Cunningham as he completed 24-of-34 passes for 243 yards and three touchdowns. Page suffered a strained hamstring in the game but did not miss any playing time. The following week at Washington (9/18), he was a key part of an offensive line that helped Dallas rush for 153 yards on 31 carries (4.9 avg.) and allowed just one sack in 24 pass plays. At Carolina (10/1), Page helped lead Emmitt Smith to 132 yards rushing on 24 carries (5.5 avg.), his first 100-yard effort of the season. As a team, the Cowboys gained 173 yards on the ground in the overtime win over the Panthers. In the Cowboys convincing 48-7 win over Arizona (10/22), the Dallas offensive line keyed the offense to 347 total yards, including 200 yards rushing - 112 by Smith - and allowed just one sack. The line then cleared the way for Smith to top the 100-yard barrier in each of the next two games - overtime losses to Jacksonville (10/29) and at Philadelphia (11/5). In the Thanksgiving Day loss to Minnesota (11/23), the Dallas line did not allow a sack in 43 pass attempts and Smith rushed for 100 yards on 12 carries before suffering a third quarter concussion. At Tampa Bay (12/3), Page helped limit the Buccaneers, the league's third ranked defense in sacks-per-pass play, to two sacks in 35 pass plays and led the way for 113 rushing yards. He also helped limit Warren Sapp to two tackles on the day and the Tampa Bay starting defensive line to six tackles. The following week against Washington (12/10), Page started at guard but moved to right tackle following a neck injury to Williams early in the second half. The Dallas line didn't miss a beat as Smith rushed for 150 yards and a touchdown against the NFL's third ranked defense. In all, the Cowboys ran for 242 yards against the Redskins, the most by the Dallas offense since recording 271 yards on the ground at Philadelphia on Oct. 31, 1993. Down the stretch in 2000, Page was part of a unit the allowed just four sacks of Troy Aikman in his last 172 career passing attempts.


1999: Page was a key part of an offensive line that allowed just 24 sacks, the second fewest in the NFL, while allowing one or fewer sacks in nine-of-16 games. In addition, he helped Emmitt Smith to his highest single season rushing total (1.397) since 1995. After being inactive the first two weeks of the season, Page earned his first NFL playing time against Arizona (10/3) in his first professional start. Filling in at right tackle for Williams, Page helped hold the Cardinals without a sack in 21 pass plays. With the game at Arizona (11/21), Page began a string of five consecutive starts at left guard for Allen (sprained knee). At Arizona, Page, who also saw fourth quarter action at right tackle when Williams left the game with a blow to the head, helped the running game amass 156 yards. On Thanksgiving Day against Miami (11/25), he helped lead Smith to 103 rushing yards while helping the line surrender just one sack in 30 pass plays. He started at left guard at New England (12/5) but also saw time at left tackle for Flozell Adams. Page and the offensive line helped Troy Aikman pass for 242 yards against Philadelphia (12/12) while allowing only one sack in 41 passing plays. Against the N.Y. Jets (12/19), his blocking was a key part of a Dallas running attack that gained 195 yards while surrendering only one sack in 29 passing plays. He returned to reserve duty at New Orleans (12/24) as Allen returned to the lineup. Page was the

Cowboys second-round (55th overall) draft choice in the 1999 NFL Draft.

COLLEGE: A three-year starter at left tackle, Page helped anchor an offensive line at West Virginia that produced at least 300 total yards in each of his final 21 games. He helped All-America running back Amos Zereoue become the school's and Big East's all-time leading rusher (4,054 yards) and quarterback Marc Bulger become WVU's career passing yards leader (5,995). An All-Big East selection as a junior, Page graded out at 89% consistency for an offense that generated 5,546 total yards. He earned All-Big East honors as a sophomore after grading out at 87% consistency for an offense that amassed 4,602 yards. As a redshirt freshman, Page graded out at 84% consistency, becoming just the 11th freshman since 1980 to earn a spot in the exclusive Mountaineer Club for players who grade at least 80 percent at their position in at least eight games. Page was redshirted his first year at WVU after attending Hargrave Military Academy for one year.

PERSONAL: An all-city selection at Brashear High School in Pittsburgh, PA, Page was rated the 34th best defensive tackle prospect in the country by Prep Football Report. He was an athletic coaching education major at West Virginia. Page has participated in the Cowboys offensive line's support of The RISE

School in Dallas with the "First Downs for Down Syndrome" project.

PRO: After joining the Cowboys as a sixth-round draft choice in 1998, Izell Reese has developed into a multi-purpose defensive back who has the right mix of natural athletic ability and versatility to have a productive NFL career. He has started at both strong and free safety and has the speed and coverage ability to be given consideration for playing time at cornerback. He has also proven himself as one of the Cowboys most capable coverage men on special teams, where he led all Dallas players with 22 tackles in 2000 and has now led the club in that category in two of the last three





seasons. Reese is now considered one of the most valuable cogs in the Dallas secondary because of his ability to play any position. He has 11 career starts to his credit, and he has intercepted six passes in 40 career games. As a second-year pro in 1999, he was leading the team in interceptions with three when his season was cut short due to a herniated disc in his neck midway through the schedule. He underwent fusion of the C2-C3 vertebrae on Jan. 4, 2000 and returned to play in all 16 games last year.

2000: Reese overcame his largest career hurdle to date by completely recovering from off-season disc surgery and returning to full speed action for the start of the season. With a clean bill of health, Reese responded with the best season of his career. While seeing extended playing time in the secondary. including seven starts due to injured comrads - he ranked second on the team in interceptions (two) and eighth in tackles with a career-high 72. He also led all Dallas special teams players with 22 tackles in the kicking game. In the season opener against Philadelphia (9/3), Reese saw most of his action in multiple defensive back sets, and picked up his first interception of the season. He returned the theft 14 yards to set up a Dallas field goal. At Washington (9/18), Reese made perhaps the biggest defensive play of his young career with a fourth quarter interception of Brad Johnson that ended all hopes of a Washington comeback. He returned the interception 46 yards to set up a final Dallas field goal to ice the win. On special teams, he tied for the team lead with two stops and helped shut down punt returner Deion Sanders. In the loss to San Francisco (9/24), Reese recorded five tackles, one shy of his career-high and took over at strong safety for Darren Woodson in the fourth quarter following his ejection. In the Cowboys overtime win at Carolina (10/1). Reese tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles and added another tackle in the nickel package as the Dallas secondary limited the Panthers wide receivers to eight receptions for 73 yards (9.1 avg.). In Dallas' 48-7 win over Arizona (10/22), Reese recorded four tackles and helped limit Cardinal wide receivers to five receptions for 51 yards through the first three quarters. In the overtime loss at Philadelphia (11/5), he took over in the fourth quarter for George Teague, who broke his right foot. Reese registered four tackles and broke up one pass against the Eagles. He also led the team with three special teams tackles and helped limit Brian Mitchell to one punt return for two yards. He earned his first start of the year the following week against Cincinnati (11/12), taking over at free safety for Teague. Reese responded with a then career-high 10 tackles as the Dallas defense limited the Bengals to 195 total yards, including just 56 net yards passing. One week later at Baltimore (11/19), he turned in a second straight career-high tackle total, finishing second on the team with 11. In the Thanksgiving Day loss to Minnesota (11/23), he recorded four tackles and helped limit the Vikings to 192 net yards passing. At Tampa Bay (12/3), he tied for second on the team with nine tackles and helped limit the Bucs to 51 net yards passing, the lowest output by a Dallas opponent since the N.Y. Giants gained 42 on Sept. 8, 1996. In the Cowboys final victory of the year - against Washington (12/10) - Reese recorded four tackles as the NFL's seventh ranked passing offense was limited to 191 net yards passing. He was also second on the team with two special teams tackles as the Redskins were limited to a 17.9 yard average on eight kick-

1999: Despite missing the final eight games of the season with a herniated disc in his neck, Reese tied for second on the team with three interceptions while totaling 28 tackles, five passes defensed, two quarterback pressures and six special team tackles. Against Atlanta (9/20), he posted two tackles and a fourth quarter interception he returned 24 yards. He earned his first NFL start at Philadelphia (10/10). Playing strong safety for Woodson (sprained ankle), Reese logged six tackles and an interception against the Eagles. He again posted six stops at the N.Y. Giants (10/18) before leaving the game in the fourth quarter with a neck strain. He started at free safety for Teague (strained neck) against Washington (10/24) and totaled five tackles and a pass defensed, while helping limit the Redskins top ranked offense to 272 total yards. He again started for Teague at Indianapolis (10/31) and registered four tackles and two special teams stops. At Minnesota (11/8), Reese earned his fourth start of the season as Dallas opened in its "45" package. He posted five tackles against the Vikings while intercepting his third pass of the season. He was deactivated against Green Bay (11/14) and placed on injured reserve Nov. 19 with a herniated disc in his neck.


1998: Not expected to make a huge impact as a rookie, Reese surprised many by contributing in the Dallas "45" and nickel defenses and emerging into a leader on special teams. Based heavily on the play of Reese - who led the Cowboys in special teams tackles with 21 - the Dallas coverage units led the NFL in kickoff coverage (18.5) and finished third in punt coverage (6.2). In addition, the Cowboys kickoff coverage teams led the NFL in opponents starting field position after receiving a kickoff (22.4yard line). His 21 tackle performance on special teams was the second best figure among all NFL rookies (Hines Ward, Pittsburgh - 28). His play earned him NFL Special Teams Coverage Player of the Year as selected by the Dallas Morning News. Reese started his NFL career off with a bang by tying for the team lead with two special teams tackles in the season opener against Arizona (9/6). He came into his own the second half of the season, recording 16 special teams stops over the final nine games of the regular season. He began that stretch by leading the team with three stops at Philadelphia (11/2). The next week against the N.Y. Giants (11/8), he was second on the team with two special teams tackles and followed that with a team-high three special teams stops at Arizona (11/15). Against Seattle (11/22), he led the team with two special teams tackles, while adding a tackle playing safety in the Dallas nickel defense. While playing safety in the nickel defense against Minnesota (11/26), Reese recorded his first career interception with a third quarter pick of Randall Cunningham. He was also second on the team with two special teams tackles. Continuing to show promise in the secondary, Reese had two tackles at Kansas City (12/13). He recorded two more tackles and a quarterback pressure against Philadelphia (12/20), and then closed out the regular season with two special teams tackles against Washington (12/27), helping limit Brian Mitchell to an 11.4 average on five kickoff returns. He also added two tackles on defense. He made his first career postseason appearance against Arizona (1/2/99), recording three tackles in passing down situations.



COLLEGE: Reese finished his four years at UAB ranked second in career tackles with 276. His eight career interceptions ranked him fourth in school history, and his 135 career interception return yards set a school record. Reese also established a school mark by appearing in 44-of-44 games as a Blazer. As a senior, he recorded a career-high 83 tackles from his strong safety position. He closed out his collegiate career with a school-record 85-yard interception return for a touchdown in a win over Arkansas State, he finished second on the team with 69 tackles his junior year after registering 70 tackles and an interception as a sophomore. He posted a career-high 18 stops – the third best single-game total in school history – against Western Kentucky during his sophomore campaign. As a true freshman, Reese had a career-high four interceptions. Reese was the second player in the UAB program's seven-year history to be selected in the NFL Draft, joining cornerback Dainon Sidney (third round by Tennessee in 1998).

PERSONAL: A three-year letterman at Northview High School in Dothan, AL, Reese led the team with five interceptions as a senior. He also lettered in basketball. Reese, a physical education major, has served as a celebrity football coach in the annual Dallas Cowboys Let Us Play! Sports Camp for girls, working with girls from non-profit agencies in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area, and he served as a celebrity escort in the 2001 Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show, which raised \$450,000 for pediatric oncology research. Izell also joined fellow secondary teammates last fall in the Second Annual NFL/United Way Hometown Huddle, serving lunch to the homeless and visiting with children at The Salvation Army, Carr P. Collins Social Services Center.

He earned his first shot in the season finale at Tennessee (12/25/00) and then spent the spring polishing his skills in NFL Europe with the Scottish Claymores.

2001: The Cowboys allocated Riley to the Scottish Claymores of NFL Europe, where he finished the spring with 27 tackles, seven pass deflections, and one interception.

2000: Riley originally signed with the Kansas City Chiefs as a rookie free agent in April but was released at the end of camp. He then signed with Dallas as a member of the club's practice squad on Nov. 4. On Dec. 15, he was added to the club's active roster and saw limited action in the season finale at Tennessee (12/25) at safety and on special teams.

COLLEGE: As a senior at Washington State, Riley finished his collegiate campaign with 100 tackles, 10 tackles for a loss, three sacks and three interceptions. Scarlett, a strong, physical defensive tackle, brings a solid work ethic to Dallas' defensive front and will be competing for a spot in the Cowboys' defensive tackle rotation.

2000: Scarlett signed with the New England Patriots on Jan. 5, and was allocated to the Scottish Claymores of NFL Europe. After posting 20 tackles and 2.5 sacks for a defense that gave up only 76.3 rushing yards-per-game, Scarlett returned to camp with New England but was released Aug. 2. He signed with Miami on Aug. 3 but was released Aug. 14 and signed to the Kansas City Chiefs' practice squad Oct. 25. Dallas signed him off of the Chiefs' practice squad Dec. 15. Scarlett saw limited action at defensive tackle in the fourth quarter of the season finale at Tennessee (12/25) but did not post a tackle.

1999: Scarlett was drafted by Minnesota in the seventh round (236th overall) of the 1999 NFL Draft. Minnesota released him at the end of camp, and he signed to the New England Patriots' practice squad Dec. 22.

COLLEGE: As a senior at Langston, Scarlett led the team with a career high 9.5 sacks and nine tackles for a loss. He again earned All-Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference Honorable Mention honors as a junior after totaling 40 tackles and six sacks. quickly and easily made the transition from the fields of Ashland High School to the turf at Texas Stadium as a rookie. Despite not having kicked competitively for more than two years, Seder outlasted Rian Lindell, Jon Hilbert, Cedric Oglesby and Jaret Greaser during a preseason in which he hit seven-of-nine field goals, becoming the eighth Dallas kicker since the 1989 season — Roger Ruzek (1989), Luis Zendejas (1989), Ken Willis (1990-91), Lin Elliott (1992-93), Eddie Murray (1993, 1999), Chris Boniol (1994-96) and Richie Cunningham (1997-99). After a rookie campaign that saw him challenge a number of the club's rookie records, Seder should continue to improve in 2001 and provide Dallas with the consistent accuracy Cowboys coaches and fans have become accustom to in the kicking game.

2000: In his first year of professional football, Seder finished sixth in the NFC, 12th in NFL, in scoring among kickers with 108 points, a total that was second among rookies. His 108 points was the third highest total ever by a Dallas rookie, and he set a club record for field goals made in a season by a rookie with 25, breaking Lin Elliott's mark of 24. For the year, Seder hit 25-of-33 field goals for a 75.8 percent success rate, the second best field goal percentage by a rookie in club history behind Chris Boniol's club mark of 75.9 percent. Showing no sign of rookie jitters, Seder opened his career by hitting his first seven field goal attempts. In his NFL debut, he hit both field goal attempts (34 and 38 yarders) against Philadelphia (9/3). He then connected on a 44-yard field goal and all four extra points at Arizona (9/10). With 1:46 remaining at Washington (9/18), Seder hit a 38-yard field goal to help seal a 27-21 win for Dallas. In a day filled with ups and downs at Carolina (10/1), Seder ended his day on a high when he connected on a 24-yard game-winning field goal in overtime to give Dallas a 16-13 victory. In the first half against the Panthers, he connected on a 27-yard kick. Then with 1:00 remaining, he was wide left from

45-yards out on a kick that would have given Dallas the win in regulation. It was the first miss of his Dallas career. He redeemed himself with the overtime connection. Seder logged a season-high six extra points against Arizona (10/22). At Philadelphia (11/5), he hit a career-long 48-yard field goal in the third quarter and added a go-ahead 27-yard field goal with 1:55 remaining in the fourth quarter to put Dallas up 13-10. Seder scored all 16 of the Cowboys second half points in a 23-6 win over Cincinnati (11/12). In doing so, he became the first kicker in club history to score a touchdown when he took a handoff on a fake field goal and rushed one yard up the middle for a score in the third quarter. That performance was named the NFL's DirecTV NFL Play of the Week. As a kicker, he struggled some from the field as he went threeof-six on field goal attempts in the rain, hitting from 35, 42 and 43 yards out but missing 39, 44 and 51vard attempts. Seder finished the day with career-highs for points (17) and field goal attempts (6) - one attempt shy of the club record for field goal attempts in a game. In addition, he took over the kickoff duties in the second half after Micah Knorr suffered a hyperextended left knee. Seder was short on his only field goal attempt, a 46-yarder in third guarter into a stiff breeze, at Baltimore (11/19). Against Minnesota (11/23), he hit three field goals (in four attempts). With 86 points for the season after 12 weeks, Seder moved past Ken Willis (80 points) into third on the club's rookie scoring list. His only field goal attempt at Tampa Bay (12/3) was partially blocked at the line. Seder logged 14 points and was successful on a career-best four field goals (in five attempts) against Washington (12/10). He then helped take Dallas to a 13-0 halftime lead against the N.Y. Giants (12/17) with 47 and 43 yard field goals. That action would prove to be his last of the season as he never took the field in a 31-0 loss at Tennessee (12/25) to close out the season

1998-99: Seder did not play football but instead coached football, baseball and freshman basketball while teaching health and physical education at Lucas High School in Ashland, OH.

COLLEGE: Seder led Ashland University in scoring in each of his final three seasons and finished his career with a school-record 41 field goals. He left Ashland with 204 career points, to rank fourth in Ashland football scoring annals. As a senior he totaled 64 points, connecting on 14-of-19 field goals and 22-of-24 extra points attempts. His 14 field goals on the season was the second highest field goal total in school history and his performance, which led the league, earned him All-Midwest Intercollegiate Football Conference honors. His last game at Ashland was against Slippery Rock (11/22/97) in the NCAA Division II Playoffs, and his last made field goal came against the University of Indianapolis (11/8/97), a 33-yarder. Seder also earned second-team All-MIFC honors as a center fielder on Ashland's baseball team. He led the football team in scoring during both his sophomore (38 points on 8-of-13 field goals and 14-of-15 PATs) and junior (54 points on 13-of-20 field goals and 15-of-16 PATs) years. Seder handled Ashland's kicking duties as a freshman, making 28-of-29 extra point tries and six-of-12 field goal attempts for 46 points. He booted a collegiate career-long 48-yard field goal against Hillsdale.

PERSONAL: The physical education major, upon graduating from Ashland, took his degree and became a health and physical education teacher and coach at Lucas High School in Ashland, OH. His students encouraged him to follow through on his tryout with the Cowboys. Seder has become active in the Dallas/Ft. Worth community since joining the Cowboys, supporting the Komen Tarrant County Race for the Cure and participating in a water safety video for children produced by the Red Cross. He is also active in FCA, speaking to area youth groups and has served as a celebrity escort in the annual Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show. In the spring of 2001 Tim served as a volunteer assistant high school boys' basketball coach at Trinity Christian Academy in the Dallas suburb of Addison, TX. His wife, Melissa, was

also a teacher at Lucas High School. The couple has a son, Tyler Ryan (5/22/01).

(15/15, 1/1), 2000 (16/16), Total - 171/169, 17/17 PRO: In 11 seasons, Emmitt Smith has made an impact on the NFL that few players can match at any position or in any era. As the third-ranked rusher in NFL history, Smith has also won four NFL rushing titles, three Super Bowl titles and a league (1993) and Super Bowl (XXVIII) MVP award. When looking at Smith's career numbers, it's easy to see why he will be remembered as one of the greatest NFL players of all-time. His career rushing total of 15,166 yards has him trailing only Walter Payton (16,726) and Barry Sanders (15,269). Smith is the NFL's career rushing touchdowns leader with 145 and stands second in league annals in total touchdowns with 156, trailing the all-time leader, Jerry Rice, by 31. Already the first player in NFL history with five straight seasons with over 1,400 yards rushing. Smith and Jim Brown are the only players with seven straight 10-touchdown seasons to start their career. With 1,203 yards rushing in 2000, Smith became just the second player in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in 10 consecutive seasons (Barry Sanders) and only the third player in NFL history to post 10 1,000 yard rushing seasons in his career (Payton, Sanders). He is also second on the NFL's all-time rushing attempts list with 3,537. trailing only Payton (3,838). With an NFL record 25 touchdowns in 1995, Smith scored 100 career touchdowns in just six seasons, the fastest anyone in league history has reached that mark (he tied Brown's NFL record by scoring 100 touchdowns in just 93 career games). His 145 career rushing touchdowns in 171 games gives him a 0.85 touchdown-per-game scoring average, second behind Brown's 0.90 for tops among the all-time rushing touchdown scorers (John Riggins 0.59 and Walter Payton 0.58 are next on the list). Smith is one of only three players in Dallas history with three career 100 point seasons, and he is the only non-kicker to accomplish the feat. His value to the Cowboys' success can be seen in the club's 92-23 mark (including playoffs) when he carries the ball 20-or-more times a game and 60-17 record (including playoffs) when he rushes for 100 yards. The century mark has become a big number in Smith's career, having rushed for 100 yards in 147-of-271 games dating back to high school (45-of-49 at Escambia High School, 25-of-34 at Florida and 77-of-188 at Dallas, including playoffs). Included in Smith's club-record 70 regular season 100-yard rushing games are 11 of the top 15 performances in team history and 18 days with over 150 yards (the fifth highest total of 150-yard games in NFL history). In NFL annals, Smith's 70 100-yard rushing games rank third all-time behind Payton (77) and Sanders (76). One reason Smith has become such a workhorse in the Dallas offense over the years has been his ability to answer the bell at gametime, starting 186 of a potential 188 games with Dallas - including playoffs. The only two missed starts of his career due to injury came in the season finale at the N.Y. Giants on Dec. 24, 1994 and in a Nov. 14, 1999 game at Texas Stadium against Green Bay. That durability has enabled Smith to lead the Cowboys in rushing in 154 of his 171 career regular season games. It has also allowed Smith to rush for 3,392 yards since the start of the 1998 season - the third highest yardage total in the NFL over that time span. Smith has accumulated a number of NFL postseason records, including rushing touchdowns (19), consecutive games with a rushing touchdown (nine) and 100-yard rushing games (seven). His 1,586 yards rushing is also tops on the NFL postseason chart, and he shares the total playoff touchdown mark of 21 with Thurman Thomas. Not limited to rushing and scoring, Smith is fourth on the Cowboys all-time reception list with 453 career catches. He trails No. 3 Tony Hill (479) on that list by 26 receptions. He is one of only three NFL players who have amassed over 10,000 career-rushing yards and 400 career receptions. He is also sixth on the NFL's all-time combined yardage list with a club record 17,973 yards. With 668 combined yards in 2001, he will move into third on the NFL's all-time list. Smith is also the Cowbovs all-time leading scorer with 938 points.

2000: Smith continued his trek through league and club record books for the 11th straight season. For the 10th consecutive season, he rushed for over 1,000 yards (1,203), becoming only the second player in NFL history to accomplish that feat (Sanders) and only the third player in history to total 10 career 1,000 vard seasons (Sanders, Payton). His rushing effort ranked fourth in the NFC and 13th in the NFL for the season. Following the season, he was selected to his ninth Pro Bowl (missed due to a left ankle injury), the most of any Cowboy in franchise history other than Bob Lilly (11 appearances) and Mel Renfro (10). Among NFL running backs, only Sanders (10) has been selected to the Pro Bowl more times than Smith. Smith started the season slowly, totaling 29 yards on seven carries in limited playing time due to a lop-sided score against Philadelphia (9/3) and 59 yards on 16 carries at Arizona (9/10). With a three-yard carry early in the Cardinals game, he became only the third running back in NFL history to top the 14,000career rushing yard mark. At Washington (9/18), he led the team with 83 yards and a touchdown on 24 carries. He was limited to 11 carries for 31 yards and a touchdown against San Francisco (9/24) before erupting for 132 yards and a touchdown - the 150th overall touchdown of his career - on 24 carries at

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Carolina (10/1). Smith toted the ball 19 times for 61 yards and a touchdown at the N.Y. Giants (10/15), and he tallied 112 yards and a score on 24 carries against Arizona (10/22), marking his fifth consecutive game with a rushing touchdown. Against Jacksonville (10/29), he rushed for 102 yards on 24 carries to mark his first career 100-yard game against the Jaguars. Smith recorded his third consecutive 100-yard rushing game when he ran for 134 yards and a touchdown on 26 carries at Philadelphia (11/5) while also catching a pass for 15 yards, his 450th career reception. The Eagles game marked Smith's fourth straight 100yard game at Veterans Stadium and the 12th 100-yard game of his career against Philadelphia, the most 100-yard games by a player against a single opponent in league history. Against Cincinnati (11/12), Smith recorded just 16 yards on 17 carries, the second lowest yardage total in a game he started and did not leave due to injury in his career. He totaled 48 yards on 11 carries against the NFL's top defense at Baltimore (11/19) before scampering for 100 yards on 12 carries (8.3 avg.), including a season-long 52yarder, against Minnesota (11/23) before suffering a concussion early in the third quarter and leaving the game. This effort marked his fourth 100-yard performance in five regular season games against the Vikings. Smith carried the ball 20 times for 80 yards and a touchdown at Tampa Bay (12/3) before exploding for 150 yards and a score on 23 carries (6.5 avg.) against Washington (12/10). The Redskins game not only marked his 70th career 100-yard game and sixth 100-yard day of the season but allowed him to move past the 15,000 career rushing yard mark, becoming the third player in NFL history to reach that milestone (Payton and Sanders). His effort against the Redskins also allowed him to eclipse the 1,000yard mark for the season, the 10th consecutive time he has done so. He closed the year with 46 yards and a touchdown on 24 carries against the N.Y. Giants (12/17) and 20 yards on 12 carries at Tennessee

1999: Smith finished second in the NFC, fourth in the NFL, in rushing with 1,397 yards. His rushing numbers marked his best season since the 1995 Super Bowl XXX year when he led the NFL with 1,773 yards. He also registered more 100-yard rushing games, nine, than in any other year other than 1995 when he recorded a club record 11. His 11 rushing touchdowns were the fourth best total in the NFL for 1999, and he had a touchdown in each of the first eight games of the season and nine consecutive dating to 1998 – a stretch that tied the third longest streak in club history. Overall, his 13 touchdowns tied for third in the NFL in total touchdowns. He was selected to his eighth NFC Pro Bowl squad, giving him more Pro Bowl appearances that any other offensive player in Cowboys' history. Smith opened the season at Washington (9/12) with 109 yards on 23 carries and one touchdown. The following against Atlanta (9/20). he produced his second consecutive 100-yard rushing game with a 109-yard performance. It was just the third time in 29 games that an opposing player had rushed for over 100 yards against the Falcons. He also had two rushing touchdowns in the game, the second coming on a seven-yard run in the third quarter that moved Smith past Tony Dorsett (12,739 yards) into fourth place on the NFL's all-time career rushing list. In the Cowboys 35-7 win over Arizona (10/3), he picked up 77 yards on 22 carries and scored his fourth touchdown of the season. In the loss at Philadelphia (10/10), Smith recorded his 3,000th career carry, becoming just the fourth player in NFL history to reach that mark. For the day, he had 30 carries for 114 yards and posted a season-high five receptions for 31 yards, giving him 145 combined net yards and moving him past Tony Dorsett (15,501) into first on the Cowboys all-time combined net yardage list. The following week at New York (10/18), he became the fourth player in NFL history to top the 13,000-yard mark for career rushing yards with his 26 yards against the Giants. He also scored in his sixth consecutive game. Against Washington (10/24), he tallied 24 carries for 80 yards and a touchdown, moving him past Sanders (3,062) into second on the NFL's all-time career carry list with 3,064. The following week at Indianapolis (10/31), Smith scored two touchdowns for the second time in 1999 en route to a 22 carry, 93 yard rushing day. In the Cowboys loss at Minnesota (11/8), Smith electrified the Monday night national television audience by rushing for 140 yards and two touchdowns on 13 carries in the game's first 24 minutes. He then left the game with a fractured fourth metacarpal in his right hand. It was his best rushing total in a half in his career, and his 10.8 yards-per-carry average was a career-high. Included in his first half totals were 63 and 24-yard touchdown runs on back-to-back carries just 18 seconds apart, the fastest anyone has scored back-to-back touchdowns in league history. His 63-yard run was the third longest of his career and it gave him the yardage necessary to move past Eric Dickerson (13,259 yards) into third on the NFL's all-time rushing list. He suffered the fracture on that run, but came back to run 24 yards for a score on his next carry before leaving the game. That 24-yard score tied Marcus Allen for second alltime on the NFL's touchdown list with 145. On Nov. 9, Dr. Hugh Frederick performed surgery to place a plate and six screws in his fractured right hand. The broken bone in his hand forced Smith to miss only the second start due to an injury of his career in the Cowboys win over Green Bay (11/14). The next week at Arizona (11/21), while playing with a padded glove on his fractured right hand. Smith recorded the 60th regular season 100-yard rushing day of his career with 127 yards on 29 carries (4.4 avg.). In the Cowboys' 20-0 Thanksgiving Day win over Miami (11/25), he led the team in rushing with 103 yards on a seasonhigh 31 carries, it was his third consecutive 100-yard rushing game and the 61st of his career. At New England (12/5), he had his string of three 100-yard rushing games snapped with a 75 yard game (19 carries). In the loss to the Patriots, he went over the 1,000 yard mark for the season, marking his ninth consecutive 1,000-yard season. In the Cowboys' win over Philadelphia (12/12), he recorded one carry for two yards before leaving the game in the first quarter with a strained groin. The following week in the loss to the N.Y. Jets (12/19), he returned to the starting lineup and recorded his seventh 100-yard rushing game of the season with 19 carries for 110 yards (5.8 avg.). He also had a season-high 36 yards receiving, including a 14-yard touchdown grab from Aikman. That scoring catch was his 146th career touchdown, moving him into sole possession of second place on the NFL's all-time touchdown list. The score also made him the club record-holder for career points (878), breaking the mark of 874 set by Rafael Septien. On Christmas Eve at New Orleans (12/24), Smith posted his eighth 100-yard rushing game of the season with 110 yards on 23 carries (4.8 avg.). He also scored his 11th rushing touchdown of the year. In the



playoff clinching win over the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00), he posted a 100-yard game for the third straight week – and the ninth time on the season – with a 22 carry, 122 yard outing. That performance, which included a 45-yard run, marked the 64th 100-yard rushing game of his career, tying Eric Dickerson for the third most in NFL history. He closed another historic season in the playoff loss at Minnesota (1/9/00) by rushing for 99 yards and a touchdown on 15 carries. In the first quarter, he recorded a 65-yard run to set up a Dallas field goal. It was the longest postseason run in Cowboys history. When the day ended, he became the NFL's all-time leader in career postseason rushing yards (1,586) and rushing touchdowns (19), He also tied the NFL postseason career touchdown record – 21 by Thurman Thomas.

1998: With a resurgence that saw him rush for more yards and touchdowns than he's had in a season since 1995, Smith continued his movement through NFL and Cowboys record books. With 1,332 yards rushing, he finished fourth in the NFC, fifth in the NFL, in rushing. He finished second in the NFC, fourth in the NFL, with 13 rushing touchdowns, giving him a NFL record 125 career-rushing touchdowns. With his seventh Pro Bowl selection, he became the only offensive player in club history to be invited to Hawaii that many times. Smith opened the year against Arizona (9/6) with a season-high 29 carries for 124 yards, moving past O.J. Simpson and John Riggins into ninth on the NFL's all-time rushing yards list. At the N.Y. Giants (9/21), Smith totaled 21 yards on seven carries before suffering a strained groin in the second quarter. His strained groin limited him the next week against Oakland (9/27) as he rushed for 59 yards and a touchdown on 21 carries. He registered the 50th 100-yard rushing day of his career when the Cowboys traveled to Washington (10/4), totaling 120 yards and a touchdown on 28 carries. For the first time in backto-back games since December of 1995, Smith again posted a 100-yard game, totaling 112 yards on 21 carries against Carolina (10/11). He joined the Michael Irvin (146 yards receiving)/Ernie Mills (110) tandem against the Panthers to become the third trio in club history to top the 100-yard mark in the same game (one rushing and two receiving). Smith gained 101 yards on 23 carries at Philadelphia (11/2) to surpass Tony Dorsett's club record for career carries (2,755), finishing the game with 2,760. Smith broke Dorsett's club record for career rushing yards the next week against the N.Y. Giants (11/8) with a season-high 163 yards on 29 carries. He passed Dorsett (12,036) on a season-long tying 32-yard run in the second quarter. He also led the team in receiving against the Giants with five catches, putting him over the 400-career reception plateau. At Arizona (11/15), he totaled 118 yards and three touchdowns on 26 carries to move past Franco Harris into seventh place on the NFL's all-time rushing list. The Cardinals game also marked the first time since 1995 that Smith recorded three consecutive 100-yard rushing days. He registered 74 yards on 17 carries against Seattle (11/22), moving him past 1,000 rushing yards for the eighth consecutive season and past Marcus Allen into sixth place on the NFL's all-time rushing list. Four days later on Thanksgiving Day against Minnesota (11/26), he registered his second three touchdown day of the month, No. 121, 122 and 123 of his career, tying Marcus Allen's NFL record for career rushing touchdowns (123). His 44 rushing yards moved him past Jim Brown into fifth on the NFL's all-time list. After posting a careerlow 0.4 average on 15 carries at New Orleans (12/6) and totaling 42 yards on 14 rushes at Kansas City (12/13), Smith rebounded against Philadelphia (12/20) with his seventh 100-yard game of the season. He carried the ball 25 times for 110 yards against the Eagles to become the 12th player in NFL history to top the 15,000 total yard mark in a career. In only one half of action against Washington (12/27) in the season finale, he totaled 67 yards and two touchdowns on 10 carries. Smith's two scores, career touchdowns 124 and 125, broke Marcus Allen's NFL career rushing touchdowns record (123). Against Arizona (1/2/99) in the postseason, Smith totaled 74 yards on 16 carries.

1997: Smith's assault on the Dallas Cowboys and NFL record books continued at a hectic pace. With 1,074 yards rushing, he finished the year fifth in the NFC, 12th in the NFL, in rushing yards. His 1,308 total yards from scrimmage marked the eighth straight season he has topped the 1,000 yard mark in that category. Returning from offseason ankle surgery, Smith opened the season with 26 carries for 69 yards and three receptions for 25 yards in the 37-7 win at Pittsburgh (8/31). He had a season-high 132 yards rushing, including a season-long 44-yard carry, at Arizona (9/7) the following week. He did that despite missing part of the fourth quarter and overtime after suffering bruised ribs. The 44-yard run was his longest since a 60-yard touchdown run in the 1995 season opener at the N.Y. Giants. Early in the season against NFC East foes, Smith posted a season-high 27 carries for 91 yards against Philadelphia (9/15) on Monday Night Football and had a season-high six receptions and 91 yards rushing on 19 carries at the N.Y. Giants (10/5). With two receptions for 23 yards at Washington (10/13), Smith moved past Bob Hayes (365) into fifth place on the team's all-time reception list with 366 career catches. In a 26-22 come-from-behind win over Jacksonville (10/19), he ran 24 times for 75 yards and scored on a one-yard run, his first touchdown of the season. For the second time in 1997, Smith topped the 100-yard mark with 126 yards on 25 carries at Philadelphia (10/26), while also leading the team in receptions with five for 36 yards. He totaled 31 yards on seven carries at San Francisco (11/2) before leaving the game early in the second quarter after straining his left groin. He returned the following week against Arizona (11/9) and rushed 15 times for 64 yards and a touchdown. It was his 117th career touchdown, moving him past John Riggins and into fifth place on the NFL's all-time touchdown list. With 99 yards on 21 carries against Washington (11/16), Smith moved past the 11,000-yard mark for career rushing yards, becoming the 11th player in NFL history to pass that milestone. He also added four receptions for 31 yards, tying him with Tony Dorsett for fourth on the Cowboys all-time reception list with 382 career catches. Smith broke loose on a 21-yard touchdown run at Green Bay (11/23) and finished the day with 11 carries for 59 yards. Smith picked up 22 yards on 10 carries and three receptions for 20 yards against Tennessee (11/27) before leaving the game with a bruised left shoulder early in the third quarter. He started against Carolina (12/8) but re-aggravated the shoulder on the first drive and did not return, finishing the day with two carries for three yards. While battling the flu at Cincinnati (12/14), Smith ran 12 times for a team-high 68 yards, pushing his season rushing total over the 1,000-yard mark for the seventh consecutive season.

1996: Despite battling numerous injuries, Smith was able to rush for over 1,200 (1,204) yards for the

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sixth consecutive season, finishing fourth in the NFC and eighth in the NFL. He tied for third in the NFL with 15 touchdowns - including 12 rushing, which was good for fifth in the NFL - while his 327 rushing attempts were the fifth most in the league. Smith's injury problems started in the preseason when he suffered a sprained left knee and right ankle against Denver (8/17). In that game, Smith aggravated bone fragments in his right ankle that would require surgery following the season. In the season opener at Chicago (9/2), Smith was able to run for 70 yards on 18 carries before suffering a bruised neck and back while diving over the pile in the fourth quarter. Against the Bears, he became the 13th player in NFL history to top the 9,000 yard mark for career rushing yards, doing so in his 94th career game, tying the third fewest games needed to reach that mark in league history. In the home opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/8), he picked up 82 yards on 24 carries and hauled in a five yard scoring grab, his first touchdown reception since Dec. 10, 1994 against Cleveland. He scored his first rushing touchdown of the season the next week against Indianapolis (9/15) while adding his first 100-yard rushing day of the season with 101 yards on 26 carries. His 25 yards on 15 carries at Buffalo (9/22) was his lowest rushing total since Oct. 9, 1994 against Arizona, and he suffered bruised ribs in the game. Smith topped the 2,000-yard receiving mark for his career at Philadelphia (9/30) when he had three receptions for 30 yards. He also added 92 yards and a touchdown on 22 carries while nursing sore ribs. With 112 yards rushing against Arizona (10/13), Smith recorded his 44th career 100-yard rushing day and topped Dorsett's club-record of 43. Included in his 21 carries were career rushing scores No. 100 and 101, making him the fifth player in NFL history to rush for 100 touchdowns. He recorded three more touchdowns against Atlanta (10/20), two rushing and one receiving, while leading the team in rushing for the 33rd consecutive game - breaking his club mark of 32 set from 1990-92. At Miami (10/27), Smith had a season-high seven receptions, including one for a score, his third receiving touchdown of the season after having four receiving touchdowns in his first six seasons combined. Smith had his third 100-yard rushing day of the season with 113 yards and two touchdowns on 24 carries against Philadelphia (11/3). A game-long 16-yard run in overtime at San Francisco (11/10) set up the game-winning field goal at the 49ers 12-yard line. Smith recorded season-highs of 155 yards, three touchdowns and 29 carries against Washington (11/28). Included in his 155 yards was a season-long 42-yard run. The 155 yards put him over the 1,000-yard mark for the sixth consecutive season, and he became the 12th player in NFL history to top the 10,000-yard mark for a career. He also moved past Jim Brown (106) into third on the NFL's all-time rushing touchdown list with 108. Smith recorded a season-high 55 yards receiving, on five receptions, and another 85 rushing on 27 carries against New England (12/15). Smith's club-record streak of consecutive games leading the team in rushing (which dated to Oct. 9, 1994 when Lincoln Coleman led the team against Arizona) was snapped at 41 when he was inactive in the season finale at Washington (12/22). In the Cowboys wild card playoff win over Minnesota (12/28), he rushed for 116 yards on 17 carries, giving him a 6.8 yardsper-carry average, which was a postseason career-high and the third best in team history. He picked up two touchdowns, giving him a NFL record 18 postseason rushing scores, and he tied the then NFL mark for career postseason touchdowns with 20. He also scored in his eighth consecutive postseason game and logged his seventh career 100-yard rushing day, both NFL postseason records. Following the season, Smith had surgery to remove three bone fragments from his right ankle.

1995: The 1995 season was a record breaking year for Smith as he established a NFL mark for touch-downs in a season with 25, topping John Riggins' mark of 24 set in 1983. Smith became only the fourth player to lead the NFL in touchdowns for three-or-more seasons in his career, joining Don Hutson (eight seasons). Jim Brown and Lance Alworth (three). In recording his fifth-straight 1,000 yard season, Smith led the NFL in rushing with 1,773 yards, the 10th best rushing season in NFL history at the time, and the fourth time in five years he had captured the league's rushing crown. He also led the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (2,148), rushing attempts (377) and scoring (150 points) – the first non-kicker to lead the league in scoring since Jerry Rice in 1987 (he became the first non-kicker to ever lead Dallas in scoring in back-to-back seasons). All these on-field contributions earned Smith consensus All-Pro honors for the fourth straight season (first Dallas offensive player chosen four straight times since Ralph Neely from 1966-69) and his sixth consecutive Pro Bowl selection, joining Mel Renfro as the only Dallas players selected in each of their first six seasons in the league. Also included in Smith's assault on the record

books were the following Cowboys single-season records:

Smith opened the season by taking his first carry 60 yards for a touchdown at the N.Y. Giants (9/4) and earning NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors. In that game, he rushed for 163 yards and four touchdowns, tying the club record for touchdowns in a game, and he broke Dorsett's club record of 72 career rushing scores by logging touchdowns number 72, 73, 74 and 75. Smith came back the next week against Denver (9/10) to run for 114 yards and record his 80th career touchdown, reaching that mark in his 79th career game, faster than Brown's NFL record of 81 games. A touchdown was again Smith's calling card at Minnesota (9/17) when he reached the end zone in the fourth quarter to put Dallas ahead 17-10 and again in overtime with the game-winning score on a 31-yard run. On the day, he had 150 yards, including 123 yards and both touchdowns on 12 second half carries, and earned NFC Offensive Player



of the Week honors, Smith rounded out September, a month in which he would earn NFC Offensive Player of the Month honors, with his fourth-consecutive 100-yard day, a 116 yard effort against Arizona (9/24). In posting four-straight 100-yard days, Smith tied Dorsett's club record, and with two rushing touchdowns, he extended his club record by scoring in his 11th consecutive game (tying Lenny Moore of the Colts for the third longest streak in NFL history). Late in the Cardinals game, he suffered a bruised ulnar nerve and ruptured bursa sac in his left elbow, but he bounced back at Washington (10/1) to rush for 95 yards and led the team with a season-high eight receptions. He had a season-high 31 carries for 106 yards and two touchdowns against Green Bay (10/8) before establishing a new club record with his 87th and 88th career touchdowns at San Diego (10/15). When the Cowboys traveled to Atlanta (10/29), Smith became the 20th player in NFL history to surpass the 8,000 yard mark for his career when he rushed for a season-high 167 yards. He recorded his second-consecutive 150-yard rushing day, fourth of the season, with 158 yards and two scores on 27 carries against Philadelphia (11/6). When the Cowboys visited Oakland (11/19), Smith visited the end zone three times while adding 110 yards rushing, his ninth 100-yard rushing day of the season - tying Dorsett's club record for 100-yard games in a season. Smith left the Thanksgiving Day game against Kansas City (11/23) in the third quarter with a sprained left knee, but not before scoring his 21st rushing touchdown of the season to tie his club record. He bounced back from the sprain the following week to set a club record with his 22nd touchdown of the season while gaining 91 yards on 21 carries against Washington (12/3). With 108 yards and a touchdown at Philadelphia (12/10), Smith logged his 10th 100-yard rushing day of the season to set a new club record, while also scoring his 23rd touchdown of the year and 138th point, also club records. The next week against the N.Y. Giants (12/17), Smith tied the NFL record with his 24th touchdown of the season, and his 103 yards rushing gave him his 11th 100-yard day of the season, extending his club record and tying the second most in a season in NFL history. The final record-breaking touchdown of the regular-season came on Christmas night at Arizona (12/25) when Smith logged his 25th rushing touchdown of the season, tying his club record with a touchdown in his 11th consecutive game. In the postseason opener against Philadelphia (1/7/96), Smith rushed for 99 yards and a touchdown to become the fifth player in NFL history to accumulate 1,000 postseason rushing yards in a career. In the NFC Championship Game against Green Bay (1/14/96), Smith tied a career-high and set a Dallas postseason record with 35 carries, and he set a new club record with three touchdowns, including two key fourth guarter scores to give Dallas the lead and the win. He ran for 150 yards and recorded a club-record with 37 combined rushing/receiving attempts. When Dallas captured the Super Bowl XXX title with a win over the Pittsburgh Steelers (1/28/96), Smith capped the season with

two second half touchdowns to give Dallas a 27-17 win. 1994; Smith had one of the league's best scoring seasons in 1994, accumulating an NFL high 22 touchdowns and tying for second in scoring (132 points), and along the way, he became the first nonkicker to lead Dallas in scoring since Bob Hayes and Dan Reeves tied for the team lead in 1967. His 22 total touchdowns, 21 rushing touchdowns and 132 points were all Dallas single-season club-records at the time, and his 22 total touchdowns tied the fourth highest single-season mark in league history. He also ground out the third-highest rushing total in the league at 1,484 yards on a league-high 368 carries. Despite touching the football 449 times on carries and catches, Smith did not lose a fumble all year. He also finished third in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage with 1,825, accomplishing all these feats despite struggling with hamstring injuries that kept him out of all or part of five games during the season. Smith opened the season with a bang at Pittsburgh (9/4), recording a season-high 171 yards rushing and one touchdown on 31 carries against a Steelers' defense that would finish second in the NFL in total defense. In just his 65th career game, Smith passed the 6,000-career yard mark with 143 yards against Detroit (9/19). It was the fastest a Dallas runner had ever reached that mark (Dorsett in 73 games was the previous mark). Smith also added a season-high seven receptions against Detroit to lead the team. In back-to-back games at Washington (10/2) and against Arizona (10/9), Smith notched two first-half rushing touchdowns, despite pulling a hamstring in the first half against the Redskins that limited him to nine carries and 22 yards against the Cardinals. Smith moved past Don Perkins (6,217 yards) and into second place on the Cowboys all-time rushing list with 106 yards against Philadelphia (10/16) - his fifth straight 100-yard game against the Eagles and a club record for consecutive 100-yard games against one opponent. When the Cowboys traveled to Cincinnati (10/30), Smith had a nine game touchdown streak and seven game rushing touchdown streak stopped when he was held out of the end zone, despite rushing for 92 yards. Smith established a club-record with 35 carries against the N.Y. Giants (11/7), while scoring two touchdowns and picking up 163 yards. The next week at San Francisco (11/13), Smith moved into second on the club's all-time carry list, passing the 1,500 career carry mark in his 72nd career game. Smith moved past the 1,000 yard mark for the fourth consecutive season with 85 yards and two touchdowns against Washington (11/20), and four days later on Thanksgiving Day against Green Bay (11/24), Smith amassed 208 total yards (113-rushing, 95-receiving) on 38 carries and catches while scoring twice. His 95 yards receiving were a season-high and included a season-long 68-yard catch. When Smith reached the end zone twice at Philadelphia (12/4), it gave him 19 touchdowns for the season, breaking the single-season club-record. The following week against Cleveland (12/10), Smith became the first back to top the 100-yard rushing barrier against the Browns in 1994 when he picked up 112 yards and a touchdown. He also added his first receiving score of the year, marking the sixth consecutive week he had posted two scores. Smith picked up 74 yards and his 22nd touchdown of the season at New Orleans (12/19) before pulling his left hamstring late in the third quarter. Smith missed the first start of his career due to injury in the season finale at the N.Y. Giants (12/24), but he returned to action in the Cowboys playoff win over Green Bay (1/8/95), picking up 44 yards on seven first quarter carries (6.3 avg.) before reaggravating his left hamstring. Nursing that sore hamstring, Smith picked up 74 yards and two touchdowns on 20 carries at San Francisco (1/15/95) in the NFC Championship Game before pulling his right hamstring in the fourth quarter. An All-Pro for the third straight year, that injury kept Smith from playing in

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his fifth-consecutive Pro Bowl, despite being selected.

1993: The list of honors and awards for Smith from 1993 goes on and on following one of the most outstanding performances by a running back in league history. Recipient of the NFL MVP Award from: Associated Press, The Sporting News, Pro Football Writers of America, Miller Lite, the ESPN "ESPY" Awards, Pro Football Weekly and Pro Football Digest. United Press International, Pro Football Weekly and College & Pro Football Newsweekly named him NFL Offensive Player of the Year. Smith also received the Bert Bell Award from the Maxwell Club as the Player of the Year; consensus All-Pro honors; NFL Alumni Running Back of the Year recognition and the Super Bowl XXVIII MVP award. Smith became only the fourth player to win three straight league rushing titles and the first since Earl Campbell turned the trick from 1978-80 (Jim Brown 1957-61 and 1963-65 and Steve Van Buren 1947-49). Smith also led the NFL in total yards from scrimmage with 1.900 (1,486 rushing/414 receiving), outdistancing runner-up Thurman Thomas of Buffalo (1.702) by almost 200 yards, and with a 5.3 yards-per-carry average, the highest average by a Dallas running back since Duane Thomas posted a 5.3 average in 1970. Second on the team with 57 receptions, Smith finished fourth in the NFC in catches among running backs. He missed the first two regular season games and three starts because of contract negotiations, signing his contract on Sept. 16 and seeing limited action at Phoenix (9/19). Smith returned to the starting line-up against Green Bay (10/3) and, in his 50th career game, became only the fifth Dallas running back to reach the 1,000 career carry mark - the fastest to that point of any running back in team history. Smith recorded his first 100-yard rushing day of the season with 104 yards on 25 carries at Indianapolis (10/10). He established a new club-record with 237 yards rushing (on 30 carries) at Philadelphia (10/31) to nab NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors and post the highest rushing total in the NFL in 1993. That day in Philadelphia, he eclipsed Dorsett's club mark of 206 yards set against the Eagles (12/4/77) and tied Jim Brown for the sixth best single-game rushing performance in NFL history. It was also the highest single-game rushing total in the NFL since Walter Payton ran for 275 yards against Minnesota on Nov. 20, 1977. His 62-yard touchdown run to finish the game was the Cowboys' longest run of the season. The next week when Aikman went down with a pulled hamstring against the Giants (11/7), the Cowboys offense turned to Smith to carry the load. He responded with 182 yards of total offense against Phoenix (11/14) (24 carries, 80 yards, one touchdown and four receptions for 102 yards), including a career-long 86-yard catch from Bernie Kosar, It was his second career 100-yard receiving day. Things didn't go as well the following week when he suffered a bruised right quadricep at Atlanta (11/21) in the second quarter and missed the remainder of game. He finished with a career-low one carry for one yard. Despite the injury, he ran for 51 yards on 16 carries and added 46 yards on nine receptions four days later against Miami (11/25) on Thanksgiving Day. In that game, he moved past the 5,000-yard barrier in his 57th career game - the fastest ever by a Dallas back. Smith went on to garner the NFC Offensive Player of the Month award for December, the third consecutive December he had won the award. During Dallas' final five game march to the playoffs, Smith amassed 115 carries for 688 yards (6.0 average) and two touchdowns to go along with 24 receptions for 142 yards and a touchdown. He started the streak by recording the second highest rushing total ever by a Cowboy at Texas Stadium with 172 yards on 24 carries against Philadelphia (12/6). For the season, Smith logged 409 yards rushing in two games against Philadelphia to join O.J. Simpson (469 yards rushing against New England in 1973) as the only players to record over 400 yards rushing against one opponent in the same season. Including that game against Philadelphia, Smith would record three days with over 150 yards rushing in the final five weeks. The second of those came against the Redskins (12/26) when he ran for 153 yards, and the third came in one of the most memorable games in Cowboys history when Smith carried Dallas to the NFC East title in a 16-13 overtime win at the N.Y. Giants (1/2/94). Despite separating his right shoulder late in the second quarter - an injury that required surgery March 1, 1994 - Smith ran for 168 yards and caught 10 passes for another 61 yards to establish a club record for rushing-receiving attempts in a game at 42. Smith gained 78 yards on 17 carries/catches after the injury, including 41 yards on nine runs/receptions in Dallas' 12-play, 52-yard drive to the game winning field goal in overtime. In the two playoff games leading up to Super Bowl XXVIII, Smith struggled with his injury, but still managed 148 yards against Green Bay (1/16/94) and San Francisco (1/23/94). It was in Super Bowl XXVIII against Buffalo (1/30/94) where Smith capped his storybook season, capturing MVP honors for leading Dallas to its second consecutive NFL title. For the second consecutive year, he topped the 100-yard rushing mark in the Super Bowl, gaining 132 yards – 91 yards and two touchdowns in the second half as Dallas scored 24 unanswered points. It was the 100th 100-yard rushing day of Smith's football career (high school, college, pro). Following the season, Smith was selected to his fourth consecutive Pro Bowl.

1992: Smith first set Dallas records with 1,713 rushing yards, 18 rushing touchdowns and 19 total touchdowns, while leading the league in all three categories. Smith posted the 11th best rushing season in NFL history at the time and was the first NFL player since Walter Payton in 1984-85 with consecutive 1,500-yard rushing seasons. Not to limit his heroics to the ground, Smith also posted 59 receptions, tops in the NFC and third in the NFL among running backs, for 335 yards. Smith's 2,048 yards from scrimmage set a new Dallas record, led the NFC and was second in the NFL. Smith also established a Dallas mark for rushing attempts with 373 and rushing/receiving attempts with 422. Smith opened the season with 140 yards on the ground in a Monday night win over the defending Super Bowl champion Redskins (9/7), earning NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors and becoming the first player to rush for over 100 yards rushing at Texas Stadium snapped against Seattle (10/11). Smith had surpassed the previous club mark of four straight 100-yard rushing performances at home against Phoenix (9/20). After bruising his hip in the third quarter against the Raiders (10/25), he missed two plays but returned to rush for 79 yards and two touchdowns, giving him 152 yards and three touchdowns on the day. His three touchdowns at the Raiders, which he would match two weeks later at Detroit (11/8), tied for the NFC-high in 1992 and



earned him NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors. Smith started November, a month in which he would earn NFC Offensive Player of the Month honors, facing a tough Philadelphia defense (11/1) which was ranked first in the NFL in yards allowed going into the game. Smith broke loose for 163 yards, becoming the first 100-yard rusher against the Eagles in 53 games, a streak that dated back to Sept. 17, 1989. Smith had his team-record 34-game streak of leading the team in rushing yards end against the Lions (11/8). Against the Rams (11/15), Smith matched Dorsett's 1981 record by reaching 1,000 yards rushing in a season in 10 games, the fewest in team history. A week later, Smith demonstrated his versatility when he hauled in a career-high 12 passes at Phoenix (11/22), which were the second most in team history. On Thanksgiving Day against the Giants (11/26), Smith recorded a season-long 68-yard touchdown run and a season-long 26-yard touchdown catch. With Denver Head Coach Dan Reeves watching from across the field, Smith tied the single-season touchdown mark Reeves had established in 1966 by popping into the end zone with 2:47 remaining to give the Cowboys a 31-27 come-from-behind win over the Broncos (12/6). Smith wrapped up the regular season with 174 yards rushing at Atlanta (12/21), a NFC-high for 1992, and 131 yards against Chicago (12/27), earning NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors and claiming the league rushing title. For his late season display, he was named NFC Offensive Player of the Month for December, making him the first NFL player to earn the honor in consecutive months. He strung together three 100-yard rushing games in the playoffs (114 against the Eagles, 114 against the 49ers and 108 against Buffalo). His three straight postseason 100-yard rushing days established a club record and tied for the third longest postseason streak in league history. With his performance against Buffalo in Super Bowl XXVII (1/31/93), Smith became the first Dallas player to rush for 100 yards in a Super Bowl. After the season, Smith earned consensus All-Pro and All-NFC honors.

1991: Smith first led the NFL in rushing in 1991 when he gained 1.563 yards, becoming the first Cowboys player to lead the league in rushing. At 22 years and seven months of age, he became the youngest player in league history and 28th overall to rush for over 1,500 yards in a season, and that performance helped earn him a starting spot in the Pro Bowl. He led the NFL with 365 carries, the third youngest player to reach the 500 carry plateau, joining Walter Payton and Barry Sanders as the only players to do so before their 23rd birthday. His eight 100-yard rushing games in 1991 were the second most in team history. Smith scored on a career-long 75-yard dash, the longest run in the NFC in 1991, and averaged a career-high 10.2 yards-per-carry in posting a 112 yard rushing game against Washington (9/9). Slowed by a stomach virus most of the game, he was still able to come off the bench to record a teamhigh eight receptions, including his first career touchdown catch. Against Phoenix (9/22), Smith earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors by putting together the fourth best rushing day in Cowboys history with 182 yards rushing and two touchdowns, including a 60-yard touchdown run, With his 75 and 60yard runs. Smith became the second player in team history to have more than one 60-yarder in the same season (Dorsett had an 84 and 77-yard run in 1977). Smith played five games against the top three run defenses in the league (No. 1 - Philadelphia, No. 2 - New Orleans and No. 3 - Washington), but against the Redskins (11/24), Smith rushed for 132 yards on 34 carries, his second 100-yard game against the Redskins in 1991 and the only two 100-yard games allowed by the Super Bowl Champions. Four days later, he gained 109 yards against Pittsburgh (11/28), and the following week, he became the only player to gain 100 yards rushing against the Saints (12/8) by picking up 112 yards. With three straight 100yard rushing games, Smith matched the second longest streak in team history. Smith's 160 yards and two touchdowns rushing against Atlanta (12/22) allowed him to surpass Sanders and Thomas to win the league rushing title. Smith also finished second in the NFC (third in the NFL) in yards from scrimmage, second in the NFL in touchdowns (13) and rushing touchdowns (12). For all his late season heroics in the Cowboys playoff drive, Smith was named NFC Offensive Player of the Month for December. He opened the playoffs in Chicago (12/29) with 105 yards against a Bears' team that had never allowed a running back to go over the century mark in postseason play, a record dating back to 1932 and spanning 27 games

1990: Despite missing training camp and the preseason in 1990, Smith finished fifth in the NFC and 10th in the NFL with 937 rushing yards, tops among rookies. In addition, his 11 rushing touchdowns led NFL rookies, placed third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL. Smith earned his first professional start against the Giants (9/16) after little more than a week with the club, and the following week at Washington (9/23), he scored his first NFL touchdown. Smith's 241 carries broke Dorsett's rookie club record of 208 carries set in 1977, and his three 100-yard rushing games were the second most ever by a Cowboys' rookie. A vital part of the Cowboys four-game win streak late in the season, Smith caught four passes for a career-high 117 yards against the Rams (11/18) in game one of the streak. Four days later, he scored on a 48-yard scamper on his way to a season-high 132 yards rushing against Washington (11/22). Facing Phoenix (12/16), Smith rushed for 103 yards and a career-high four touchdowns to tie the club record for rushing and total touchdowns in a game. The first rookie halfback to start for the Cowboys since Ron Springs in the 1979 season opener, Smith was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by AP, Football News, Pro Football Weekly and Pro Set Trading Cards and was a consensus All-Rookie selection. He also became the first Cowboys player to participate in the Pro Bowl since Herschel Walker in 1988.

COLLEGE: An All-America and three time All-SEC selection at Florida, Smith established 58 school records in three seasons, including a career rushing mark of 3,928 yards. He surpassed the 1,000-yard rushing mark in his seventh game, earlier than any player in college football history. He also became the second freshman to finish in the top 10 in the Heisman Trophy balloting (Herschel Walker was the other) and earned Freshman of the Year honors from UPI and *The Sporting News.* In 1989, he set a school single-game rushing mark with 316 yards against New Mexico on his way to a school-record 1,599 yards rushing for the season. In three seasons, he became the fifth leading all-time rusher in SEC history and led the Gators in receiving two-of-the-three seasons.

PERSONAL: Emmitt J. Smith, III was a consensus All-America running back and prep Player of the



Year by Parade Magazine and USA Today as a senior at Escambia, FL, High School, He posted the third highest career rushing and scoring totals in national high school history with 8,804 yards and 106 touchdowns. He also averaged 7.8 yards-per-carry, ran for over 100 yards 45 times and recorded only six fumbles. In 1986, he represented the nation's prep football players at the White House as part of the "Just Say No" anti-drug campaign. He was the Cowboys' United Way spokesman in 1994-95. Smith has supported 100 Black Men of Pensacola, Pensacola Family Care, Boys Clubs of Pensacola, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, The Kidney Foundation, Oak Cliff, TX, Little League, Buckner Children's Home of Texas and The Theater Arts for Youth. From 1992-98, the Emmitt Smith Charity Golf Tournament was played each spring in Pensacola. He was a Miller Lite NFL Player of the Year finalist in 1991, 1992, 1994 and 1995 and the 1993 winner, donating all money received through the awards to the Sickle Cell Anemia Foundation. One of Smith's main focuses off the field is working with and aiding youth and children. Smith recently founded the Open Doors Foundation, which focuses on today's youth through - among other things - motivational talks, providing schools with needed equipment and supplies and providing students with study aids. He also works with children through the Make-A-Wish Foundation, hosting many visits with children at the club's Valley Ranch practice facility during the season. Smith also works with the Salvation Army, American Lung Association, the Battered and Abused Children's Foundation and B.A.D. (Boxers Against Drugs). His annual Feed The Children holiday food drive supports over 3,000 families in the Dallas/Fort Worth and Pensacola areas. The national spokesman for the Starter/JCPenney "Take A Player to School Program," Smith also makes numerous speaking engagements at schools in the Dallas/Fort Worth area and in Pensacola. He was also the ambassador for the NFL's F.A.C.T. trading card program and the 1996 spokesman for the Texas War on Drugs. In May, 1994, a celebrity 25th birthday party was held for Emmitt with proceeds from a fundraising auction given to the "I Have a Dream" Foundation. Emmitt has three brothers - Erik, Emory and Emil - and two sisters - Marsha and Connie. Emory, a fullback, was a member of the Cowboys practice squad in 1997. Emmitt received his degree in Public Recreation from the University of Florida in May, 1996. He and wife Pat live in Addison, TX, with their daughters Rheagen and Jasmine.



PRO: After a four year visit to the AFC, Mark Stepnoski made a solid and successful return to his NFL origins in 1999, rejoining many of his former teammates in Dallas. He brought back a very high level of play at his position and quickly re-established himself as one of the NFC's premier centers. Throughout his career. Stepnoski has displayed intelligence, outstanding technique and a desire to excel at one of the NFL's more demanding offensive line positions. He spent his first six NFL seasons with the Cowboys and was a member of two Cowboys Super Bowl championship teams (XXVII, XXVIII). During that time, he started a string of five consecutive Pro Bowl appearances (three with the Cowboys, 1993-95 and two with the Oilers, 1996-97). He was only the second center in Cowboys' history to earn a spot in the Pro Bowl, and he was the first to make more than one trip to Hawaii. Stepnoski was originally drafted by the Cowboys in the third round (57th overall) in 1989, and he later signed with the Oilers as an unrestricted free agent on March 23, 1995. In seven of his 11 NFL seasons, he has helped a running back crack the top five in NFL rushing yards. He was a member of the Cowboys 1989 draft that provided the cornerstones for the Super Bowl success that made Dallas the team of the 90's. That draft produced Troy Aikman (first round), Daryl Johnston (second), Stepnoski (third) and Tony Tolbert (fourth). That quartet collected a combined total of 15 Super Bowl rings and 14 Pro Bowl appearances. Stepnoski was selected to the NFL's All-Decade team for the 1990s at center.

2000: Stepnoski enjoyed another productive year of consistent play before a sprained MCL in his left knee at Baltimore (11/19) forced him to miss the final five games of the season. He was placed on injured reserve on Dec. 12 with the injury. His overall effort in 2000 helped Emmitt Smith surpass the 1,000-yard rushing barrier for the 10th time in his career, while the Cowboys runner moved into the No. 3 slot on the all-time NFL rushing list. At Arizona (9/10), Stepnoski's blocking helped limit the Cardinals to one sack while protecting Randall Cunningham as he completed 24-of-34 passes for 243 yards and three touchdowns. In the following week's win at Washington (9/18), he was a key part of an offensive line that helped Dallas rush for 153 yards on 31 carries (4.9 avg.) and allowed just one sack in 24 pass plays. At Carolina (10/1), he helped lead Smith to 132 yards on 24 carries (5.5 avg.), his first 100-yard effort of the season. As a team, the Cowboys gained 173 yards on the ground in the overtime win over the Panthers. In the Cowboys convincing 48-7 win over Arizona (10/22), the Dallas line keyed the offense as it amassed 347 yards of total offense, including 200 yards rushing - 112 by Smith - and allowed just one sack. The line then cleared the way for Smith to top the 100-yard barrier in each of the next two games - overtime losses to Jacksonville (10/29) and at Philadelphia (11/5). In the Eagles game, Dallas managed to rush for 204 yards as a team. In Stepnoski's last full game of the season, the line held Cincinnati (11/12) without a sack in 37 pass attempts.

1999: Stepnoski's return to Dallas marked the reemergence of the Cowboys' running attack as one of the game's most productive. Stepnoski played a key role in helping Smith to his highest single season rushing total (1,397) since 1995, while also enabling the Pro Bowl running back to collect more 100-yard rushing games (nine) than in any season in his career other than 1995. The Cowboys finished the season sixth in the NFL in rushing with an average of 128.2 yards-per-game. From a pass protection standpoint. Stepnoski was a key part of an offensive line that allowed just 24 sacks in 531 pass plays (one every 22.1 pass plays), the second fewest sacks allowed in the NFL. The Dallas line also allowed one sack or less in nine regular season games, including five of the final six games. Stepnoski earned second-team All-Pro honors from Football Digest for his performance. In his first game since rejoining the Cowboys, at Washington (9/12), Stepnoski helped lead the way for a Dallas offense that gained 541 total yards (186 rushing, 355 passing), the highest offensive output by Dallas since Sept. 15, 1985 when the team gained 554 yards against Detroit. In addition, Aikman was sacked just one time in 50 pass plays in the overtime win. The following week, the Dallas line led the way for Smith to gain 109 yards in a win over Atlanta (9/20), marking just the third time in 29 games that the Falcon defense had allowed a 100-yard rusher. In the loss at Philadelphia (10/10), he suffered a low back contusion in the second quarter and did not return to the game. He was back in the lineup the following week at the N.Y. Giants (10/18). In the win over Green Bay (11/14), Stepnoski and Co. provided run blocking that helped spring Dallas' ground game to 149 yards despite Smith missing the entire game with a broken hand. In the Thanksgiving Day win over Miami (11/25), the Cowboys offensive line permitted just one sack in 30 passing plays and helped lead Smith to 103 yards rushing against what was the NFL's sixth ranked defense going into the game. Stepnoski suffered a strained calf early in the fourth quarter and did not return. He missed the following week's game, at New England (12/5), because of the calf injury. Stepnoski again left the Philadelphia (12/12) game in



the fourth quarter when he began losing strength in his calf. In the following week's loss to the N.Y. Jets

(12/19), he returned to action and was a key part of a Dallas running attack that gained 195 yards on the ground and allowed just one sack in 29 passing plays.

1998: Stepnoski had a streak of 48 consecutive starts at center, dating back to day one of his Oilers' career, snapped when he missed the first three games of the season with a knee injury. After starting all preseason, he underwent arthroscopic surgery on his right knee and was placed on the inactive list for the Oilers first three games. He returned to the lineup against Jacksonville (9/27) and started the final 13 contests. Along the way, he helped anchor an offensive line that jump-started the NFL's ninth-best rushing attack (123.1 yards-per-game). Beginning with his second week back in the lineup, the Oilers put together a string of seven consecutive games with over 110 yards on the ground. Eddie George had five consecutive games with over 100-yards during that stretch, including 153 yards at Pittsburgh (11/1).

1997: Stepnoski started all 16 games at center and blocked for a line that guided the Oilers to the fourth-highest rushing total (2,414 yards) in franchise history, a mark that was also third-best in the league in 1997. His work with the line aided George to eight 100-plus-yard performances, including a 216-yard game against Oakland (8/31) that tied the club's all-time single game rushing total. Three times in 1997 the line did not allow a sack (at Miami, 9/7, at Jacksonville, 11/16 and at Dallas, 11/27). Against Dallas (11/27), he was part of a line that controlled the line of scrimmage during a 21-play drive that consumed

13:27 in a 27-14 win. 1996: Stepnoski earned his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl selection after earning 16 starts at center for the Oilers. In addition, he earned second-team All-Pro honors from Associated Press and Football Digest. He was also a second team All-AFC selection by UPI. He centered a line that helped George gather Rookie-of-the-Year honors while rushing for 1,368 yards. Overall, the Oilers' ground attack finished sixth in the NFL and gained 1,950 yards (eighth-highest in team history). He was part of an offensive line that paved the way for George's 143 yards rushing at Jacksonville (9/8). In an overtime win at Cincinnati (10/6), Stepnoski recorded the 100th start of his NFL career. He had a key block on George's 37-yard run in the fourth quarter at Atlanta (10/13). He started at New Orleans (11/10) but left the game in the fourth quarter with a sore hamstring. He then helped the Oilers rush for 243 yards on 48 carries (5.1 avg.) at the N.Y. Jets (12/1), marking the most yards on the ground by the Oilers since the team rushed for 257 yards at Green Bay (12/14/80).

1995: Stepnoski agreed to terms with the Oilers as an unrestricted free agent on March 11 and went on to start all 16 games, centering a line that cut its sack total in half from the previous season (65 in 1994 to 32 in 1995). In his first game as an Oiler - at Jacksonville (9/3) - he had key blocks on both Gary Brown's 21-yard run and Rodney Thomas' 32-yard scamper. He was part of an offensive line at Cincinnati (9/24) that helped the Oilers gain 487 yards of offense, the team's highest output since a 583-yard performance against the Cowboys (11/10/91). He helped the offense piece together three nine-minute drives against the Buccaneers (10/29), and he played in his 100th NFL game at the Browns (11/5). At Kansas City (11/19), he was part of an offensive line that did not allow a sack to a Chiefs' defense that was averaging 3.3 sacks-per-game.

1994: Stepnoski returned to All-Pro form after missing the preseason while recovering from surgery on a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee. He started all season and was selected as the starting center in the Pro Bowl for the NFC (third consecutive Pro Bowl, first as a starter). Other honors included first-team All-Pro choice by Sports Illustrated (Dr. Z's), second-team All-Pro accolades from AP and Football Digest, and first-team All-NFC selection by UPI and Football News. He anchored a Cowboys line that established a then team record by allowing just 20 sacks (93 yards in losses), surpassing the previous best of 23 set in 1992. The team also led the NFL in allowing the fewest yards in QB sacks, while ranking fourth in total sacks against. In a 26-9 win over the Steelers (9/4), Stepnoski earned a game ball in his first regular season action since suffering the knee injury against the Vikings in 1993. He suffered a sprained ankle in the third quarter against Philadelphia (10/16) and did not return to action. Despite the ankle injury, he started and played the entire game the following week at Arizona (10/23).

1993: Despite having his season cut short by a right knee injury, Stepnoski was selected to his second straight Pro Bowl. He also gained second-team All-Pro recognition from College and Pro Football Newsweekly, as well as first-team All-NFC honors from UPI and Football News. He anchored the middle of a line that helped Smith earn his third straight rushing title and rank second in the NFL in rushing offense (135.1 yards-per-game). In addition to outstanding run blocking, the offensive line allowed the lowest number of sacks in the NFL (29). Stepnoski was given a game ball in the Vikings' game (12/12) despite leaving with a torn ACL (right knee). He underwent surgery on Jan. 4, 1994

1992: Stepnoski anchored a line that helped the team to victory in Super Bowl XXVII. He was selected to his first Pro Bowl, while gathering second-team All-Pro honors from AP. He also received All-NFC recognition from UPI and Football News. He was part of a line that allowed just 23 sacks (second lowest in the NFL) for 112 yards in losses (lowest in the NFL). The offensive front registered 11 regular season games of permitting one sack or less, and he also helped pave the way for Smith's second straight rushing title (1,713 rushing yards). Stepnoski was not on the active roster against the Redskins (9/7) and at the Giants (9/13) in the aftermath of a contract holdout. His blocking against Philadelphia (11/1) allowed Smith to become the first back to rush for over 100 yards (163 on 30 carries) against the vaunted Eagles defense in over 50 games.

1991: Stepnoski started all season at center and was a key figure on an offensive line that helped Smith gain a league-leading 1,563 yards. He centered a line that allowed two-sacks-or-less in 11 of the 16 regular season games, while surrendering one sack or less in eight games.


1990: In just his second NFL season, Stepnoski became a full-time starter for the Cowboys.

1989: Stepnoski saw action in all 16 games as a rookie, starting the final four games at center. He became the first rookie to start at center for the Cowboys since Robert Shaw in 1979.

VETERANS STEPNOSKI

COLLEGE: A four-year starter at the University of Pittsburgh, Stepnoski earned All-America honors as a senior and was an Outland Trophy finalist and Lombardi Award semifinalist. In addition to recognition on the field, he was a two-time Academic All-America and one of 11 National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame scholar-athletes. Slowed by an ankle injury as a junior, Stepnoski missed the only game of his collegiate career. He received third-team All-America notice and made the Football News Sophomore All-America Team in 1986. He became the starting guard for the Panthers in the third game of his freshman year.

PERSONAL: Mark Matthew Stepnoski attended Cathedral Prep High School in Erie. PA, lettering in football. He was named All-America by USA Today and Parade Magazine as a senior. His father, Marty, was a teammate of Hall-of-Fame receiver Fred Biletnikoff on Erie Tech's 1960 high school football team. Mark, a communications major at Pitt, was born on Jan. 20, 1967 in Erie, PA. Since rejoining the Cowboys, Stepnoski has participated in the offensive line's support of the RISE School in Dallas with the "First Downs for Down Syndrome" project and taped a PSA for the cause. Stepnoski has served as a celebrity escort in the annual Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show, which raises funds for pediatric oncology research.

PRO: The Cowboys gave Clint Stoerner (pronounced STERN-er) a chance to play in the NFL when they signed him as a rookie free agent in

2000. Stoerner took the opportunity and showed coaches during preseason action that he has an ability to make things happen when he is on the field. The University of Arkansas' most prolific passer led five Cowboy quarterbacks with 513 passing yards on 42-of-75 passing during 2000 preseason action, then spent the season moving between Dallas' practice squad and active roster. During the spring, he was at the helm of the Scottish Claymores in NFL Europe. This experience, combined with his year of NFL experience, should prepare him for the battle he faces with Quincy Carter and Anthony Wright for a roster spot with the Cowboys in 2001.

2001: Stoerner spent the spring playing for the Scottish Claymores of NFL Europe. He closed the spring season 171-of-307 for 1,866 yards, 10 touchdowns and 8 interceptions. He was the fifth-ranked

passer in NFL Europe with a 73.8 rating.


2000: Stoerner was signed by Dallas as a rookie free agent on May 5 and proceeded to finish the preseason 42-of-75 for 513 yards, three interceptions and two touchdowns before being released on Aug. 27. He was immediately signed to Dallas' practice squad, where he spent the first week of the season. After Troy Aikman suffered a concussion in the season opener, Stoerner was moved to the Cowboy' active roster on Sept. 8 but did not see any playing time at Arizona (9/10) and at Washington (9/18). He saw his first NFL action against San Francisco (9/24), completing three-of-five passes for 53 yards and a touchdown. He was inactive as the third quarterback at Carolina (10/1) before being waived Oct. 10 and immediately re-signed to the Cowboys practice squad. Following Aikman's back injury against Jacksonville (10/29), Stoerner was again moved to the active roster on Nov. 1. He was inactive at Philadelphia (11/5), against Cincinnati (11/12) and at Baltimore (11/19) before being released Nov. 21 and re-signed to the practice squad Nov. 27. He was again moved to the active roster Dec. 13 following Aikman's second concussion of the season, but was deactivated as the third quarterback against the N.Y. Giants (12/17) and at Tennessee (12/25).

COLLEGE: Stoerner completed 177-of-317 passes for 2,293 yards and 19 touchdowns as a senior at Arkansas. His completion and attempt totals were the second highest in school history, and his yardage and touchdown totals were third best in Arkansas annals. He also ranked fourth in the Razorbacks' record books with 2,233 total yards of offense. As a junior, Stoerner earned second-team All-SEC honors after completing 167-of-312 passes for 2,629 yards, 26 touchdowns and eight interceptions. His passing yards, touchdowns and total offensive yards (2,572) established school records. During his junior campaign, he passed for 334 yards against LSU to become the first Razorback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in three different games (against Auburn and LSU in 1997). As a sophomore, Stoerner set then school records for passing yards in a season (2,347) and in a game (387 against LSU). He finished the year 173-of-357 for 2,347 yards and 12 touchdowns. Playing as the backup quarterback as a true freshman, Stoerner completed 11-of-37 passes for 153 yards.

PERSONAL: Stoerner earned all-district and honorable mention all-state honors after completing 148-of-247 passes for 2,416 yards and 28 touchdowns as a senior at Lee High School in Baytown, TX. He took over quarterbacking duties following his junior season, when he caught 50 passes for 670 yards as a receiver. He also earned all-district honors as a punter following his junior season. The small business management major also earned all-district honors after batting .450 as a junior for the Baytown

baseball team. Stoerner, along with fellow Cowboys Darren Woodson and Ebenezer Ekuban, volunteered at The Salvation Army Christmas Distribution Center during the 2000 holiday season and helped distribute gifts to families in need.

PRO: When George Teague returned to the Cowboys secondary in 1998, it was anticipated that he would compete for playing time and provide solid special teams play. In the three seasons since, Teague has become a stalwart in Dallas' defensive backfield, establishing single-season career-highs for tackles (102 in 1999) and sacks (two in 1998). In addition to this high level of production, he has continued to show his knack for the big play, returning two of his three interceptions in 1999 for touchdowns, including a regular-season career-long 95-yard return. Teague will again be expected to produce at this high level in 2001 while providing veteran leadership to a young, inexperienced secondary.

2000: Despite missing the final seven games of the season with a fractured right foot, Teague finished the year with 71 tackles, the third highest total of his career. He was on pace to register a career-best 127 stops when he suffered his injury. He opened the season with a bang, tying for the team lead with a career-high 13 tackles against Philadelphia (9/3). He tallied eight stops at Arizona (9/10) before totaling 10 tackles at Washington (9/18) while helping limit the Redskins four wide receivers to 8.1 yards-percatch. Against San Francisco (9/24), Teague recorded eight tackles and tied for the team lead with two special team stops before being ejected with 4:00 remaining in the game for unsportsmanlike conduct. He returned to action the next week at Carolina (10/1) and helped limit the Panthers to 153 net yards passing while registering eight tackles. He finished second on the team with 10 tackles, including a stop behind the line of scrimmage, at the N.Y. Giants (10/15), helping limit New York to 108 net yards passing. He posted four stops against Arizona (10/22) in three quarters worth of action and helped limit Cardinal wide receivers to five receptions for 51 yards, including three for 17 yards by starters David Boston and Frank Sanders. Teague tallied five tackles against Jacksonville (10/29) before recording five more stops and a forced fumble at Philadelphia (11/5). He helped limit Eagle wide receivers to four receptions for 49 yards before suffering a fractured right foot on a fourth quarter interception play that was nullified by a penalty. He was deactivated the next week against Cincinnati (11/12) before being placed on reserve/injured Nov. 14 with the foot fracture

1999: In his third season with the Cowboys, Teague finally got the opportunity to start from day one and responded with a career-high 102 tackles, good for fourth on the team. Teaque made his presence felt from the beginning, playing a key role in two second quarter takeaways in the season opener at Washington (9/12). Both takeaways thwarted Redskins scoring opportunities. First, he forced a Stephen Davis fumble at the Dallas one-yard line and then two possessions later recovered a Brad Johnson fumble at the Dallas nine-yard line. For the day, Teague totaled eight tackles. The next week against Atlanta (9/20), he finished third on the team with 10 tackles. Teague scored the first regular-season touchdown of his career when he returned a Jake Plummer pass 32-yards for a score on the game's third play against Arizona (10/3). It was also his first interception since Nov. 17, 1997 against Buffalo as a member of the Dolphins. With seven tackles at Philadelphia (10/10), he tied for third on the team. Teague accounted for eight tackles at the N.Y. Giants (10/18) before suffering a strained neck late in the second quarter that kept him from returning. The neck injury kept him out the next two weeks, but he returned to the starting lineup and tied for third on the team with seven tackles at Minnesota (11/8). For the second time in four games, he returned an interception for a touchdown when he took a Brett Favre pass back 95-yards for a score in the closing seconds to seal the win against Green Bay (11/14). It was the third-longest interception return in club history. Teague recorded four tackles but missed some second half action after suffering a finger laceration on his left hand in the third quarter at Arizona (11/21). He returned in the fourth quarter and helped limit the Cardinals to 207 yards of offense and 13 points. He was fourth on the team with eight tackles against Miami (11/25), helping shut out the Dolphins. Teague posted a season-high 11 tackles at New England (12/5) as the Patriots were limited to 176 passing yards. Teague was second on

the team with nine tackles against the N.Y. Jets (12/19) and eight stops at New Orleans (12/24). Against the Saints, he also broke up a pass and recorded a tackle for a loss. With a postseason berth on the line against the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00), Teague logged his third interception of the season with a second quarter pick off Kerry Collins. In addition, he recorded four tackles, giving him 102 for the season, the first 100tackle season of his career. In the wild card playoff game at Minnesota (1/9/00), Teague tied for second on the team with 10 tackles while helping limit the Vikings to 199 yards passing, 50 yards below their season average

1998: Teague signed with Dallas on May 6 after being released by the Dolphins and started the season in a reserve capacity, contributing in nickel situations, before winning the starting free safety job in Week 11. Teague finished the season 10th on the team with 52 tackles, while also registering the first two sacks of his career and contributing nine special teams tackles. He earned his first start of the season in the win over Seattle (11/22). He played, but did not start, the following week against Minnesota (11/26), and then started the remaining four games of the season at free safety. In his second start, at New Orleans (12/6), Teague responded with eight tackles and the first two sacks of his career. The next week at Kansas City (12/13), he added six tackles and a special teams stop. In the division-clinching win over Philadelphia (12/20), he tied for the team lead with a season-high 10 tackles. He matched that 10 tackle total the fol-

lowing week against the Redskins (12/27), while also breaking up a season-high three passes

1997: Following a successful 1996 season with Dallas, Teague accepted a free agent offer from Miami on March 20. He made his Dolphins debut against Indianapolis (8/31), recording one tackle. He suffered a left ankle sprain the next week against Tennessee (9/7), causing him to miss the remainder of the Oilers game and to be inactive at Green Bay (9/14). In his first start of the season, Teague totaled four tackles against Baltimore (10/19) before recording a season-high 11 tackles and a forced fumble against Chicago (10/27). Teague preserved Miami's 24-17 victory over the N.Y. Jets (11/9) when he intercepted a Glenn Foley pass with 1:15 remaining in the game. He also registered five tackles and two passes defensed against the Jets. Against Buffalo (11/17), Teague tallied four stops and an interception before totaling four tackles against Detroit (12/7). He closed out the year with two tackles against New England (12/22) in the season finale. He totaled two more tackles at New England (12/28) the next week in a wild

card playoff game

1996: Teague was traded from Green Bay to Atlanta on July 16 and was then released by the Falcons on Aug. 17. He signed with Dallas on Aug. 23 and went on to record 70 tackles, the second highest tackle total of his career at that time. Teaque also established a career-high with four interceptions to finish second on the team. He recorded a tackle in his Dallas debut at Chicago (9/2) before sealing the Cowboys victory at Philadelphia (9/30) by intercepting a Ty Detmer pass at the Cowboys eight-yard line with 1:58 remaining. He started his first game for Dallas against Atlanta's (10/20) run-and-shoot offense and recorded 10 tackles and two special teams stops. He registered five stops at San Francisco (11/10), and he took over the starting free safety job against Green Bay (11/18) after Brock Marion fractured a scapula in the 49ers game. He totaled five tackles against the Packers and at the N.Y. Giants (11/24), helping limit the Giants to 104 net passing yards. Against Washington (11/28), he totaled four tackles and an interception, and he finished with nine tackles, two passes defensed, a tackle for a loss and an interception at Arizona (12/8). Teague closed the season with a season-high 12 tackles at Washington (12/22) while picking off his fourth pass of the year. Against Minnesota (12/28) in a wild card playoff game, Teague earned NFL Defensive Player of the Week honors. He forced an Amp Lee fumble that rolled out of the end zone for a touchback to prevent a touchdown, and on the next Vikings play, he forced a Leroy Hoard fumble that set up a Dallas touchdown. Three plays later, Teague intercepted a Brad Johnson pass and returned the ball 29 yards for a touchdown. Teague's touchdown was the first interception return for a score in the postseason by Dallas since Dennis Thurman on Jan. 16, 1983.

1995: Teague started 15 games for Green Bay, missing only the Tampa Bay contest (12/10) with a nagging toe injury. Before the Tampa Bay game, he had started 41 consecutive games at free safety. Teaque tied for sixth on the team with 72 tackles, while equaling his career best with 13 passes defensed. He also registered two interceptions and a fumble recovery. He intercepted a tipped Scott Mitchell pass at the Green Bay 38-yard line with 1:28 left in the game, clinching a 30-21 win over Detroit (10/15). At Minnesota (11/5), he recorded five tackles, a pass defensed and a fumble recovery. He started against Tampa Bay (11/26) despite missing the entire week of practice due to a broken big toe suffered one week earlier at Cleveland (11/19). Against Cincinnati (12/3), he intercepted a pass and returned it 74 yards to the Bengals' four-yard line. Teague totaled a then career-high 12 tackles at New Orleans (12/16). He started in all three postseason games, where he finished as the team's third-leading tackler with 21 stops. He

recorded 11 tackles at Dallas (1/14/96) in the NFC Championship Game.

1994: Teague started all 16 games for the first time in his career, although he had never fully recovered from a thyroid problem that plagued him prior to the season. He finished third on the team with a career-high 13 passes defensed, while tallying 53 tackles and tying for second on the team with three interceptions. He practiced on a limited basis early in training camp due to a thyroid condition, which initially produced dramatic weight loss and later hampered his conditioning. He began practicing on a fulltime basis Aug. 4. In the season-opening win over Minnesota (9/4), he intercepted two Warren Moon passes, but also suffered a fractured thumb. He was forced to play with a cast on one hand for much of the first half of the season. Teague made a season-high eight tackles against the N.Y. Jets (11/13), and he forced a fumble in a Thanksgiving Day loss at Dallas (11/24). He intercepted a Craig Erickson pass in the season finale at Tampa Bay (12/24) before contributing eight postseason tackles.

1993: Teague played in all 16 games, starting the final 12 and both postseason contests. He made one of the more memorable plays in Packers' playoff history at Detroit (1/8/94). With the Lions driving, he intercepted an Erik Kramer pass one-yard deep in the end zone and returned it 101 yards for a touchdown. His 101-yard return was the longest postseason interception return in NFL history, and along with



his four solo tackles, helped earn him the NFL's Defensive Player of the Week award. He was chosen to the all-rookie teams of *Pro Football WeeklyPro* Football Writers of America, *Football Digest* and *Pro Football Newsweekly*. He finished the year with 36 tackles, while contributing nine tackles in the playoffs. He started his first NFL game against Denver (10/10), recording four tackles and forcing Glyn Milburn to fumble a kickoff, which he recovered himself. At New Orleans (11/14), Teague had four tackles and one fumble recovery. He recorded two passes defensed, including his first NFL interception, against the L.A. Raiders (12/26). In a playoff loss to Dallas (1/16/94), he made a season-high five solo tackles. Teague was the second of two first-round draft choices (29th overall) by Green Bay in 1993.


COLLEGE: A second-team All-America selection as a senior for Álabama's 1992 national title team, he also earned first-team All-Southeastern Conference honors as he was a major factor in the Tide's top-ranked defense. In the national title clinching win over Miami (Fla.) in the Sugar Bowl, he intercepted two passes, including one which he returned for a touchdown. In a play that was called back in the same game, he chased down Hurricanes receiver Lamar Thomas from behind and stripped the ball from him. An All-SEC second-team selection as a junior, he led the conference with six interceptions and had career highs for total tackles (54) and passes broken up (11). Teague started at free safety as a junior after making the switch from cornerback, where he started as a sophomore. He was one of only two true freshmen

to play for Alabama in 1989.

PERSONAL: George Theo Teague was a first-team, class 6A all-state selection as a defensive back at Jefferson Davis High School in Montgomery, AL, while earning academic all-state honors and winning three letters in track. At Alabama, he worked with the local YMCA and Boys & Girls Club, and while with the Packers, he established a foundation called 'Teague's League' to further benefit Children's Hospital of Wisconsin. Through his foundation, he took 40 kids (consisting of Special Olympians and needy children) to two 1995 games, where they sat in a special 'Teague's League' section. George has hosted the 'George Teague Celebrity Softball Challenge,' where he and other celebrities faced national recording artist Michael Bolton and his team in a softball game. All proceeds from the event went to Children's Hospital and the Michael Bolton Foundation. While in Dallas, Teague has served as a celebrity football coach for the Dallas Cowboys Let Us Play! Sports Camp for girls from various non-profit agencies. He has also served as a 1999 PSA spokesperson for the Wichita Falls Komen Race For The Cure and UT Southwestern Medical Center Heart Disease Prevention Project. An accounting major, George and wife Consuela have one son, James Teague II (7/14/93), and a daughter, Jada Anissa (12/13/99).

PRO: Robert Thomas has not only overcome making a name for him-

self as a rookie free agent with small school experience, but he has also survived a major career change, moving from linebacker to fullback. In a very short period of time, he has gone from a reserve middle linebacker to the lead blocker for Emmitt Smith as the Cowboys starting fullback. As a rookie free agent, he provided Dallas with not only a solid special teams player, but also a reserve middle linebacker that could be counted on to produce in spot playing time. Thomas then spent the spring of 1999 playing linebacker in NFL Europe, but when he returned for training camp, a glut of linebackers awaited him. With coaches hoping to find a roster spot for this hardworking player. Thomas was moved to fullback on Aug. 24, 1999 to back up Daryl Johnston. When Johnston went down with a neck injury the first week of the season, Thomas was thrust into the fire. Learning and improving each and every week at his new position, he was finally rewarded with the starting role on Oct. 27. In 2000, he enjoyed a solid season as the team's starting fullback, and he appears to have a firm grip on the position for the long term future.

2000: In his first full season as the starting fullback, Thomas proved to be a very capable blocker and a much improved pass receiver and ball carrier. He finished the year with 51 rushing yards on 15 carries. Three of his rushing attempts came on third downs during the season, and on each try he covered the necessary yardage for a Dallas first down. He also finished with 23 catches for 117 yards and two touchdowns. In his primary role as the lead blocker for Smith, Thomas helped pave the way for the future Hall of Famer's 10th consecutive 1,000 yard rushing season. At Arizona (9/10), he recorded two receptions for eight yards. In the following week's win at Washington (9/18), he registered two special teams tackles and helped limit Deion Sanders to 0 yards on three punt returns. Against San Francisco (9/24), Thomas posted three receptions for a career-high 28 yards, including a career-long catch of 14 yards. The following week, in the overtime win at Carolina (10/1), he recorded his first carries of the season with three rushes for 12 yards, including two carries on third down that gave Dallas a first down. In Dallas' 19-14 loss to the eventual NFC Champion N.Y. Giants (10/15), he recorded a career-high five receptions for 24 yards and his first career touchdown - on a one yard toss from Troy Aikman, Against Arizona (10/22), Thomas had three carries for 14 yards while adding two receptions for nine yards, including a two-yard touchdown grab from Aikman in the fourth quarter - his second consecutive game with a touchdown reception. In the overtime loss at Philadelphia (11/5), he registered three receptions for 14 yards, including one on third down to convert a first down. In the following week's victory over Cincinnati (11/12), he had two carries for seven yards and two receptions for nine yards. The next week, he had three receptions for 12 yards at Baltimore (11/19). Against Washington (12/10), Thomas helped lead the way as Smith rushed for 150 yards and a touchdown. In all, the Cowboys ran for 242 yards against the Redskins, the most by the Dallas offense since recording 271 yards on the ground at Philadelphia on Oct. 31, 1993.

1999: Thomas spent the spring playing linebacker for the Rhein Fire in NFL Europe, finishing fourth on the team with 40 tackles while also recording a forced fumble and four special teams tackles. Upon returning for training camp, Thomas was caught up in a numbers game at linebacker. Because the coaching staff was eager to find him a roster spot, Thomas was given a trial run at fullback over the final two weeks of the preseason. He passed the test and earned a spot on the final roster backing up Johnston as Smith's lead blocker. By season's end, he had posted eight carries for 35 yards and 10 receptions for 64 yards. Along the way, he also helped open holes that allowed Smith to rush for 1,397 yards and 11 touchdowns, his best numbers since 1995. Smith was also able to top the 100-yard rushing mark in nine games, the second highest total in club history. Thomas saw his first NFL action at fullback in the fourth quarter at Washington (9/12) and helped spring Chris Warren on a 23-yard run as the Cowboys climbed out of a 35-14 hole to win in overtime. Following the game, Johnston was diagnosed with a herniated disk in his neck and was done for the year. With Thomas just one week into his NFL career at fullback, the Cowboys immediately added veteran Tim Lester to the roster to take Johnston's spot in the starting lineup. Against Arizona (10/3), Thomas recorded his first career receptions with two grabs for 19 yards, including a season-long 13-yard catch. Both of his receptions came during the Cowboys' touchdown drive to open the third quarter when he was filling in for Lester (dehydration). Through all this, Thomas still remained a threat on special teams as well, tying for second on the team at the N.Y. Giants (10/18) with two special teams tackles. He provided a key block on Smith's one-yard touchdown run against Washington (10/24), and the following week, he was rewarded with the starting job when Lester was released. At Indianapolis (10/31) in his first NFL start, Thomas recorded a nine-yard reception. He also contributed two receptions at Arizona (11/21), against Miami (11/25) and Philadelphia (12/12), Against the N.Y. Jets (12/19), he recorded his first career rushes, logging four carries for 22 yards - including a 10-yard burst. It was the first time a Dallas fullback had carried the ball all season and the most carries by a Dallas fullback since Johnston

recorded five on Nov. 23, 1995 against Kansas City. In addition, his 22 yards rushing were the most by a Dallas fullback since Johnston picked up 23 at Atlanta on Oct. 29, 1995. Finally, his 10-yard run was the longest by a Dallas fullback since Johnston went 11-yards with a carry on Oct. 8, 1995 against Green Bay. In his first career postseason action, he recorded two receptions at Minnesota (1/9/00).

1998: After signing with Dallas on Feb. 24 and making the team as a rookie free agent, Thomas began to immediately show that he belonged in the NFL by finishing tied for fifth on the team with 10 special teams tackles. He saw his first NFL action in the season opener against Arizona (9/6) before leading the team with two special teams tackles at Denver (9/13). He recorded two more special teams tackles the next week at the N.Y. Giants (9/21), and he registered his first defensive tackle at Washington (10/4) while working in a four linebacker set against the Redskins "heavy" packages. Thomas had two stops and a pass defensed in fourth quarter action at Philadelphia (11/2), and he recorded a third quarter tackle at Arizona (11/15) in Dallas' goal line defense. He tallied a special teams tackle against Minnesota (11/26) on Thanksqiving Day before suffering a concussion that knocked him out of the game. He returned to action at New Orleans (12/6), replacing middle linebacker Fred Strickland for a few first guarter plays after Strickland suffered a sprained knee. At Kansas City (12/13), Thomas totaled two tackles and a tackle for a three yard loss while relieving Strickland, who was still bothered by the sprained knee. Thomas also finished second on the team with two special teams tackles against the Chiefs. He totaled one special teams tackle against Arizona (1/2/99) in a wild card playoff game

1997: Thomas went to training camp with the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League

and contributed two tackles in his only preseason action before being released.

COLLEGE: Thomas finished his four-year career at Henderson State as the school's all-time leading tackler with 388 tackles. As a senior, he registered 120 tackles, including a single-game team record 18 against Texas A&M, and earned All-America honors and an invitation to the Snow Bowl following the season. As a junior, he established a Henderson State single season record with 129 tackles and was named All-Gulf Conference Defensive Player of the Week three times and earned All-Gulf South honors. Thomas totaled 116 tackles as a sophomore in 1994 after recording 23 tackles in a reserve capacity as a freshman the previous year.

PERSONAL: Born Dec. 1, 1974, Thomas played prep football for Jacksonville, AR, High School. Robert served as a celebrity football coach in the Fifth Annual Dallas Cowboys Let Us Play! Sports Camp

for girls, working with girls from non-profit agencies in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area.

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys signed Jason Tucker on Jan. 7, 1999 with the long-shot expectation of him providing depth to the Cowboys receiving corps. After impressing coaches with his play in NFL Europe during the spring of 1999, Tucker became one of four NFL Europe veterans to make the active roster the following fall. As the 1999 season unfolded, Tucker quickly became a rags-to-riches story, going from a game-day deactivation in the season opener to the NFC Special Teams Player of the Month for December. By the time the dust had settled on his first NFL season, Tucker had finished second in the NFL in kickoff return average and broken a number of club records. He underwent off-season surgery on both of his big toes following the season and a thorough rehabilitation process that extended into the 2000 training camp. As a second year player, he fought through toe and groin ailments that, at times, hampered his development as a receiver and returner. He currently has 73 career



kickoff returns during his two-year Cowboys career, two shy of the 75 returns necessary to qualify for the club's all-time career return list. With a current career average of 23.5 yards-per-return. Tucker should soon enter the club's record book with the fourth highest return average in club history. He is expected to add experience to the Cowboys young receiving and special teams units in 2001

2000: Tucker established a club record with 51 kickoff returns for the year, eclipsing the previous mark that was held by Herschel Walker (50 in 1997). His 1,099 kickoff return yards were 82 shy of James Dixon's club record of 1,181 kickoff return yards in a season (1989). Tucker closed the season with 13 catches for 126 yards. He got off to a quick start in the season opener against Philadelphia (9/3), averaging 23.6 yards on five kickoff returns. The following week at Arizona (9/10), he tied his career-high with six kickoff returns. In the Monday night win at Washington (9/18), Tucker took over Wane McGarity's slot receiver and punt return duties after McGarity suffered a sprained ankle on his first punt return of the game. Tucker returned three punts for 13 yards. Against San Francisco (9/24), he handled punt return and kickoff return duties while recording one reception working in the slot as the club's third wide receiver. In the overtime win at Carolina (10/1), he recorded a four-yard reception and handled all the return duties, including four kickoff returns for 60 yards. At the N.Y. Giants (10/15), he showed some of his 1999 form by returning five kickoffs for 205 yards (41.0 avg), including a 90-yard return to the Giants two-yard line. The 205 yards broke his own club-record for single-game kickoff return yards, and his 90-yard return tied for the eighth longest return in club history. It was the longest return by Dallas since Alexander Wright went 102 yards against Atlanta on Dec. 22, 1991. Tucker also added two receptions for 26 yards against the Giants, and both catches gave Dallas a first down. In the overtime loss at Philadelphia (11/5), he recorded two kickoff returns for 70 yards, including a 47-yard return. He also saw considerable action at wide receiver when Ismail suffered a season-ending knee injury. Against Cincinnati (11/12), Tucker earned his first start of the season replacing Raghib Ismail (knee) and recorded one reception for 14 yards. In the Thanksgiving Day loss to Minnesota (11/23), Tucker led the team with season-highs of six receptions for 57 yards and returned five kickoffs for 91 yards. Tucker recorded his first career rushing touchdown in the win over Washington (12/10) with a 17-yard end around in the fourth quarter. He also

picked up 12 yards on an earlier run to finish with two carries for 29 yards

1999: Tucker spent the spring of 1999 playing for the Rhein Fire of NFL Europe, where he finished second on the team with 26 receptions for 454 yards and three touchdowns. His 17.5 yards-per-catch average was the fourth highest average in the league. After sneaking onto the team in one of the club's final roster spots, Tucker began helping anywhere he could find work and everywhere his injured teammates were falling. Despite finishing his collegiate career with six career kickoff returns, Tucker took over that role at mid-season and went on to finish second in the NFL with a 27.9 yard average, the fifth best average in club history. He also tied for sixth on the team with 10 special teams tackles despite seeing limited playing time on the coverage units during the second half of the season as his wide receiver role expanded. Things started slowly for Tucker, who was a game-day deactivation in the season opener at Washington (9/12). He saw his first NFL action on both offense and special teams against Atlanta (9/20), recording one carry for eight yards on an end around. Against Arizona (10/3), he tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles. With Michael Irvin down with a neck injury in the first half at Philadelphia (10/10), Tucker stepped in and recorded his first career reception with a six-yard grab on third-and-five. Injury again landed Tucker on the field at the N.Y. Giants (10/18), where he recorded two catches for 25 yards after taking over for Wane McGarity (shoulder dislocation) in the three and four wide receiver sets. Tucker posed a double threat against Washington (10/24) when he led the team with three special teams tackles - helping limit Brian Mitchell to a 4.0 yard average on three punt returns and a 19.3 yard average on six kickoff returns - and hauled in a 52-yard pass from Troy Aikman. With kickoff return man Kevin Mathis sidelined with a hamstring injury, Tucker found a new career at Indianapolis (10/31), finishing the day with four kickoff returns for 114 yards – including a 50-yarder on his second career return. With Dallas opening the game in a three-receiver set at Minnesota (11/8), he earned his first NFL start. Against Green Bay (11/14), Tucker provided an all-around contribution. He had one reception for 11 yards to convert a third down, recorded a special teams tackle and two kickoff returns for 39 yards against the Packers. In addition, he also saw his first duty as the team's punt returner and responded with two returns, including one of 41 yards. At Arizona (11/21), he had two punt returns for 11 yards and three kickoff returns for 54 yards before suffering a sprained great toe on his left foot. He bounced back four days later on Thanksgiving Day against Miami (11/25) to record two receptions for 35 yards (17.5 avg.). Both of his catches gave Dallas a first down, including one on third down. Tucker earned his second NFL start against Philadelphia (12/12), this time in place of Ernie Mills (quad), and responded with three receptions for 37 yards. Tucker's final breakthrough took place over the final two weeks of the regular season. Beginning at New Orleans (12/24), he recorded career-bests with seven receptions for 128 yards (18.3 avg.) and his first career touchdown. On special teams, he had six kickoff returns for a then club record 203 yards, breaking the mark of 198 yards set by Herschel Walker on Oct. 20, 1996 against Atlanta. His total of 331 combined net yards also broke Kevin Williams' mark of 307 yards set at Arizona on Dec. 25, 1995. The 331 yards tied Detroit's Wally Triplett for the ninth most yards ever recorded in an NFL game. The very next week with a postseason berth on the line against the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00), he recorded his second consecutive 100-yard receiving game with 122 yards on four catches, including a career-best 90vard touchdown catch-and-run - the third longest pass play in club history and tied for the longest pass play in the NFL in 1999. He also had two kickoff returns for 93 yards (46.5 avg.), including a 79-yard effort on the game's opening kickoff to set up a Dallas field goal. His work as a kickoff return man earned him NFC Special Teams Player of the Month honors for December, a month in which he averaged 32.1 yards on 12 kickoff returns. Seven of his 12 returns went for 30 yards or more. Tucker saw his first NFL postseason action at Minnesota (1/9/00) and finished second on the team with four receptions for 67 yards. On Feb. 9, 2000, Tucker underwent surgery to remove bone spurs from the big toe of both feet.



1998: Tucker was a sixth-round draft pick (167th overall) of the Cincinnati Bengals in the NFL Draft. After suffering a pulled left hamstring in training camp, the Bengals released him with an injury settlement on Aug. 19. He then signed onto Green Bay's practice squad on Oct. 28 and was waived on Dec. 16.

COLLEGE: Before missing his senior season at TCU due to suspension, Tucker caught 39 passes for 692 yards (17.7 avg.) and four touchdowns as a junior. He played in nine games as a sophomore, catching 31 passes for 433 yards and a touchdown. As a freshman, he caught eight passes for 72 yards while


playing in every game.

PERSONAL: Tucker was a two-time all-state selection at Robinson, TX, High School. He closed his three-year career with 81 receptions for 1,771 yards and 25 touchdowns. Tucker was one of Texas' top prep long jumpers while lettering in track, and he also lettered in baseball. He graduated from TCU in May, 2000 with a degree in psychology after taking his final courses in the spring. Tucker has become active in the Dallas-Ft. Worth community, supporting the Ft. Worth Komen Race For the Cure and the Dallas Cowboys NFL Flag Football Program. Along with his fellow wide receivers, Jason supported the Hormel Hams for the Holidays Program last fall, visiting The Salvation Army Irving Corps prior to Thanksgiving to distribute 500 Hormel hams, sign autographs and spend time with the children at the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Center for Children. He is also a regular supporter of the Ft. Worth Postal Council Toys for Tots holiday gift drive.



PRO: The Cowboys signed Dimitrius Underwood on March 10, 2000 with the hopes that he would be able to return to the level of play that

earned him selection in the first round of the 1999 NFL Draft. In Dallas, he joins a stable of talented young defensive linemen, including Greg Ellis, Ebenezer Ekuban and Peppi Zellner. After moving to defensive tackle during the season, Underwood showed flashes of promise in his opportunities on the field. A gifted pass rusher at end, he combined that ability with his natural strength and size to become a talented performer at tackle. He has exceptional speed (4.84 40-yard dash) and quickness for a player of his physical stature. Underwood was originally a first round draft choice of the Minnesota Vikings (29th overall) in 1999.

2000: Despite seeing limited action in the first half of the season, Underwood finished the year as the team's leader in quarterback pressures with 14 – primarily coming out of the defensive tackle slot. He also added four sacks, which were the most by a Dallas rookie since Russell Maryland registered 4.5 in 1991. Underwood closed the year with 23 tackles while seeing action in 15 of the Cowboys 16 regular season games. Over the last seven games of the year, he amassed three sacks, 11 quarterback pressures and two forced fumbles. He made an immediate impact in his very first NFL game, contributing three tackles, a tackle for a loss and two quarterback pressures against Philadelphia (9/3). It was his first true game action since his junior season at Michigan State in 1997. Against San Francisco (9/24), Underwood recorded three tackles while subbing at left defensive end for Ebenezer Ekuban who suffered a sprained toe. The following week at Carolina (10/1), he recorded two tackles, and he registered his first career sack

the team with three pressures.

1999: Underwood was originally a first round draft choice of the Minnesota Vikings. He was the first Michigan State player to be chosen in the first round since 1994 when linebacker Rob Fredrickson went to the L.A. Raiders as the 27th pick, Underwood signed with the Vikings on Aug. 1 but then left camp on Aug. 2 and was released on Aug. 13. The Miami Dolphins claimed Underwood off waivers on Aug. 16, and he began working out with the team the final week of preseason. He saw action in the preseason finale at Green Bay (9/2) but suffered a dislocated left shoulder. He earned a spot on the club's active roster coming out of camp but was deactivated for the first two games of the season due to the shoulder injury. Following the Dolphins bye (9/26), Underwood was placed on the club's reserve/non-football injury.


list on Sept. 28. The Dolphins then released him on Dec. 17.

COLLEGE: Underwood missed his entire senior season at Michigan State with a sprained right ankle. In 23 collegiate starts over his sophomore and junior seasons, Underwood recorded 94 tackles, 13 sacks and 19.5 tackles for a loss. He was an honorable mention All-Big Ten selection and was presented the Spartans' Iron Man Award for his dedication in the weight room as a junior. He started all season at left defensive end and was second among linemen with 57 tackles. He was also second on the team in tackles for a loss (12 for -66 yards) and sacks (eight for -56 yards). In his best game of the season, he collected a season-high nine tackles, two sacks for 18 yards in losses and three tackles behind the line of scrimmage against Indiana. He closed out the season with seven tackles, including a sack of quarter-back Brock Huard, and forced two fumbles in the Aloha Bowl against Washington. As a sophomore, Underwood started every game at left defensive end and recorded 37 tackles along with five sacks (for -40 yards) and eight tackles for a loss. He had a pair of stops behind the line of scrimmage and returned a fumble 33 yards for a touchdown against Louisville. As a true freshman, Underwood appeared in 11 games, finishing with nine tackles.

PERSONAL: Underwood earned honorable mention all-state and all-Cape Fear Region honors at E.E. Smith High School in Fayetteville, NC. As a senior, he recorded 87 tackles and 10 sacks. An outstanding wrestler, Underwood finished second in his weight class at the 1993 state meet. He has twins, a girl and

a boy, Jada Ester and Dimitrius Paul (4/20/98).

PRO: In an effort to provide depth at tight end while getting a chance to observe a young player in NFL game situations, the Dallas Cowboys

moved James Whalen from their practice squad to the active roster on Dec. 5, 2000. An excellent passcatching tight end, Whalen established an NCAA single-season record for receptions by a tight end with 90 as a senior. He possesses a good ability to read coverages and find holes in defenses.

2001: Whalen spent the spring playing for the Scottish Claymores of NFL Europe, where he led the league with 66 catches for 691 yards – second-best in NFLE – and three touchdowns, while garnering All-NFLE honors. He was also fourth in the league with 691 total yards from scrimmage.

2000: Whalen was drafted by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the fifth round (157th overall) of the NFL Draft but was released Aug. 27. He signed to the Cowboys practice squad on Aug. 30, where he




remained until being moved to the active roster on Dec. 5. He saw special teams action against Washington (12/10) and the N.Y. Giants (12/17), and he saw his first playing time on offense at Tennessee (12/25) but did not record a reception.

COLLEGE: Whalen earned All-America and All-SEC honors after leading all collegiate tight ends with 90 receptions, 1,019 receiving yards and 10 touchdowns as a senior. His 90 receptions established an NCAA record for tight ends and set a new school record at Kentucky. He earned Compaq's Best Hustle Play of the Week in College Football following a 57-yard catch-and-run play against Louisville. Whalen made the transition from wide receiver to tight end during spring drills prior to his junior year and finished the season with 23 catches for 239 yards and three touchdowns. He was named the UK Walk-on of the Year as chosen by the Louisville chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame. As a sophomore transfer, Whalen saw action in 11 games as a wide receiver and on special teams for the Wildcats recording seven catches for 66 yards. He spent his freshman season at Shasta Junior College in Redding, CA as a wide receiver catching 19 passes for 154 yards and a touchdown.

PERSONAL: James Patrick Whalen, Jr. was a four-year letterman and three-year starter at LaSalle High School in Portland, OR. He was named all-state and Tri-Valley League Player of the Year after catching 68 passes for 1,502 yards and 18 touchdowns to help lead his team to the league championship as a senior. He posted approximately 75 receptions for 1,300 yards and 25 touchdowns as a sophomore and junior, combined, to earn all-league honors each season. The marketing major was also named league player of the year as a senior third baseman/pitcher on the LaSalle baseball team while earning second-

team all-state honors as a forward on the basketball team.

PRO: After suffering several injuries along their defensive line, the Cowboys signed defensive end Chris White on Dec. 14, 2000. White is a versatile lineman that has the ability to move inside to tackle, where he saw action during his collegiate career. While spending most of the past two seasons on practice squads, he saw playing time during the middle of the 2000 season with the Falcons. He will provide Dallas with young, quality depth along the defensive front.

2000: White went to training camp with Jacksonville but was released on the final cut-down day (Aug. 27). He signed to the Atlanta Falcons practice squad Sept 19 and then immediately moved to the Falcons active roster. He saw his first professional action against St. Louis (9/24) due to the season-ending knee injury to Shane Dronnett but did not record a tackle. He saw action the next five weeks but did not register any tackles. He was inactive against Tampa Bay (11/5) and at Detroit (11/12) before being released Nov. 14. He immediately re-signed to Atlanta's practice squad Nov. 15, where he remained until the Falcons released him Dec. 1. The Cowboys signed him Dec. 14, and he was inactive for the final two games of the season.

1999: White was drafted in the seventh round (246th overall) of the NFL Draft by the Jacksonville Jaguars. He saw action in all four preseason games, totaling two tackles, before being released Sept. 5. He signed to Jacksonville's practice squad Sept. 6 and remained there until being moved to the active roster Nov. 29. He was inactive for the last five games of the regular season and both playoff games.

COLLEGE: As a senior at Southern, White posted 38 tackles, six stops behind the line of scrimmage, four sacks and a pass defensed. Playing left defensive tackle as a junior, he registered 22 tackles, five tackles for losses and three sacks. PRO: Michael Wiley is an all-purpose player who has demonstrated the ability to fill the role of a third down back with his solid pass receiving

skills. After being drafted in the fifth round out of Ohio State in 2000, Wiley was initially scheduled to be evaluated at both running back and receiver, but he soon found a niche in the backfield. As a ball carrier, he has excellent vision and burst, and he also has the ability to set up his blocks effectively. A solid route runner with good hands and 4.45 speed in the 40-yard dash, Wiley will be given the opportunity to see extended playing time as a nickel pass receiver out of the backfield in 2001

2000: While using his rookie season as a learning experience, Wiley's limited action in the early part of the year grew into an expanded third down back role following the release of Chris Warren in December. Wiley closed the year with 14 receptions for 72 yards. His rushing attempts also increased by the end of the year, and in the last four games of the season, he had 23 carries for 87 yards. Wiley also saw action on Dallas special teams, averaging 23.3 yards on 13 kickoff returns while making seven special teams tackles. In his first NFL game, he led the team with three special teams tackles against Philadelphia (9/3) while also adding a 10-yard reception. At Arizona (9/10), Wiley scored his first NFL touchdown by plucking a tipped pass from Randall Cunningham out of the air and taking it 15 yards for the score. He finished the night with three receptions for 23 yards replacing Chris Warren (neck strain) on third downs. In the Monday night win at Washington (9/18), he took over the kickoff return duties and fielded four kicks for 89 yards. Against San Francisco (9/24), he averaged 21.3 yards on three kickoff returns before giving way to Jason Tucker. In that game, Wiley also recorded his first career rushing attempt (a one-yard gain). After suffering a sprained right knee in practice on Oct. 11, Wiley worked through a six-game period where he was a game-day deactivation. He returned to the field on Thanksgiving Day against Minnesota (11/23) and contributed an eight-yard reception. At Tampa Bay (12/3) in his first extensive offensive action, Wiley replaced Chris Warren in third down and multiple wide receiver sets and responded with six carries for 32 yards (5.3 avg.) and three receptions for 13 yards. In the win over Washington (12/10), he was second on the team with 11 carries for 38 yards spelling Emmitt Smith. The following week against the N.Y Giants (12/17), Wiley led the Cowboys with four receptions. In the season's final game at Tennessee (12/25), he opened the game by recovering an onside kick attempt by Dallas. He went on to add five carries for 17 yards and a reception for a four yard loss (due to a fumble) as the team's third down back.

COLLEGE: Wiley came to the Cowboys after one of the most productive careers as a playmaker in the history of Ohio State football. In four years in Columbus, Wiley had a hand in 35 touchdowns in the following fashion: rushing (27), receiving (five), passing (two) and kickoff returns (one). Although he started just two seasons for the Buckeyes, Wiley left Ohio State ranked seventh on the school's all-purpose vardage list with 4,194 yards. His career totals include 2,951 rushing yards, good for seventh on the OSU all-time ground list. A jack of all trades while in Columbus, Wiley completed an incredible 10-of-11 career passing attempts for 225 yards and two touchdowns while averaging 21.9 yards-per-kickoff return with a careerlong 100-yard touchdown effort. He finished his days at Ohio State with career averages of 5.8 yards-perrush and 11.3 yards-per-reception. Wiley averaged 7.7 yards every time he touched the ball in college. He was a second-team All-Big Ten Conference selection after a senior season in which he led the Buckeyes in rushing with 952 yards and 10 touchdowns on 183 carries (5.2 avg.). In 1998, Wiley enjoyed his finest season as a collegiate player. A first team All-Big Ten selection, he led the Buckeyes in rushing and was second in the conference, with a career-high 1,258 yards on 198 carries (6.2 avg.) and 10 touchdowns.

PERSONAL: A consensus high school All-America at Monte Vista High School in San Diego, CA, Wiley ran for 3,417 career yards and 38 touchdowns. As a senior, he tallied 1,901 yards and 23 touchdowns on the ground en route to being ranked as the country's No. 2 running back prospect by Bluechip Illustrated. He earned four letters in football and track and three in basketball. Wiley was a National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Scholar athlete at Ohio State, where he majored in sociology.

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys were looking for size and strength to fill holes left at defensive tackle when they signed Ben Williams on April 10,

2001. Williams, a quick, explosive and powerful tackle, plays with consistent enthusiasm, something the Cowboys are hoping to revive in their defensive unit. Williams has been a playmaker everywhere he has played and brings experience to the young talent along the Cowboys' defensive line.

2000: Williams went to training camp with the Chicago Bears but was waived Aug. 28 and remained out of football for the season.

1999: Williams went to camp with Minnesota but was released Sept. 6. He signed to the Philadelphia Eagles' practice squad on Oct. 19 and moved to the active roster Nov. 17. He saw limited action in three

games with the Eagles but was released Dec. 18.

1998: He spent the spring with the England Monarchs of NFL Europe, where he recorded 31 tackles, 5.5 sacks and nine passes defensed. Williams was signed by Minnesota on June 15 and waived at the end of training camp. Minnesota signed him to their practice squad, where he remained until he was moved to the active roster on Dec. 8. Williams was inactive at Baltimore (12/13) and against Jacksonville (12/20) and saw his first NFL action at Tennessee (12/26), where he recorded two quarterback pressures and a special teams tackle. He was inactive for both the Divisional Playoff Game and the NFC Championship Game.

1997: Williams signed with Arizona on July 24 but was waived on Aug. 30. The London Monarchs selected Williams as the first pick in the inaugural NFL Europe draft. After the 1997 NFL Europe season, Williams was protected by the Monarchs after recording 42 tackles, 3.5 sacks and one forced fumble.

1996: Williams signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on July 30, but he was waived at the end of training camp and did not play football for the season.

1995: Williams was re-signed by the Shreveport Pirates and played in 18 games, recording 61 tackles, eight sacks and two fumble recoveries.



PRO: Through nine NFL seasons, Darren Woodson has clearly established himself as one of the NFL's premier strong safeties. His consistency, athleticism, aggressiveness and ability to perform in the big





game have put him in the elite level of performers in the NFL. And his versatility at playing both the run and pass at an extremely productive level have separated Woodson from the rest of the strong safety field. In nine NFL seasons, he has been selected to five Pro Bowls, been named first team All-Pro four times and played in three Super Bowls. A converted college linebacker, Woodson is the complete NFL package at safety. He combines size (6-1, 219) and speed (4.4 in the 40-yard dash) with great football instincts and hitting ability. In 2000, he registered his 1,000th career tackle and moved into third place on the Cowboys all-time tackle list with 1,047 - ranking behind Lee Roy Jordan (1,236 tackles) and Randy White (1,104). He has maintained the aggressive nature that he displayed as a college linebacker, but has used his quickness and speed to make a very smooth transition to the secondary. Woodson has finished first or second on the team in tackles in five of the last eight seasons (1993-96, 1998), finishing out of the hunt only in years when he missed games due to injuries. He also went over the 100 tackle mark in four consecutive seasons (1993-96), becoming the first Dallas player to accomplish that feat since Michael Downs (1983-86). In 1995, he became the first Dallas defensive back to lead the team in tackles (144) since Bill Bates in 1988 and duplicating the feat in 1998. In 1993, he established a Dallas single-season record for tackles by a defensive back (155). A very strong and sure tackler, Woodson has 38 double-figure tackle games in his career. In the Cowboys base defensive alignment, Woodson lines up at strong safety, but he has also shown great production when lining up at outside linebacker in certain nickel pass defenses often covering a slot receiver. His versatility and aggressive attitude makes him a very valuable special teams performer, posting a combined total of 61 special teams tackles in the past four seasons. Woodson's next selection as an All-Pro will enable him to earn that honor more times (five) than any other Dallas safety. He is currently tied with Mel Renfro (1965, 1967, 1969 and 1971) and Cliff Harris (1975-1978), who were each named All-Pro four times during their Dallas careers. Renfro earned a fifth All-Pro selection as a cornerback in 1973. Woodson is one of the team's hardest workers, and his character and

leadership ability make him a very valuable asset within the framework of the team. 2000: Woodson was enjoying another stellar campaign at strong safety, leading the team in tackles with 123 stops before a fractured forearm at Baltimore (11/19) brought a premature end to his season. Although he missed the remaining five games of the year and was placed on injured reserve Dec. 14, he still finished the year as the team's third leading tackler and was fourth in special teams tackles with 11. In the season opener against Philadelphia (9/3), Woodson tied for the team lead with 13 tackles. The following week at Arizona (9/10), he was third on the team with nine tackles. He also added a tackle for a loss and a pass defensed while helping limit the Cardinals to 3.0 yards-per-rushing attempt. In the Monday night win at Washington (9/18), he led the team with 13 tackles and assisted in shutting down the Redskins big-play passing attack by limiting their four wide receivers to 12 catches for 97 yards (8.1 yards-percatch) with a long of 14 yards. In the loss to San Francisco (9/24), he recorded a team-high 15 tackles, his best performance since recording 17 stops against Atlanta on Oct. 20, 1996. In the overtime win at Carolina (10/1), he led the secondary with 10 tackles while adding a tackle for a loss, forcing a fumble and breaking up two passes - including a key fourth-down pass from Steve Beuerlein that ended a Panthers potential scoring drive in the fourth quarter. At the N.Y. Giants (10/15), he recorded eight tackles and helped limit the Giants to 108 yards passing. In the Cowboys 48-7 win over Arizona (10/22), Woodson led the team with nine tackles and recorded his first interception of 2000 with a third quarter pick of Jake Plummer to set up a Dallas touchdown. He also helped limit Cardinal wide receivers to five receptions for 51 yards through three quarters, including three receptions for 17 yards by starters Boston and Sanders. In addition, Woodson led Dallas with four special teams tackles, tying his single-game career-high. It was the highest special teams tackle total by a Dallas defender since Darren Hambrick recorded four against Minnesota on Nov. 26, 1998. Against Jacksonville (10/29), he recorded his 1,000th career tackle, becoming just the fourth player in club history to reach the 1,000 tackle mark, joining Lee Roy Jordan, Randy White and Ed Jones. He finished that game with 13 stops - second best on the team. The following week at Philadelphia (11/5), Woodson led the team with 16 tackles, the highest single-game tackle total by a Cowboys defender for 2000. He also recorded his second interception of the season with a second quarter pick of McNabb and helped limit the Eagles running backs to 77 yards on 25 carries (3.1 avg.) and their wide receivers to four receptions for 49 yards. In the win over Cincinnati (11/12), Woodson posted eight tackles as the Bengals were limited to 195 total yards and just 56 net yards passing. In that game, he also moved past Ed Jones (1,032 career tackles) into third place on the club's all-time tackle list. Woodson's season came to an abrupt end at Baltimore (11/19) when he suffered a fractured forearm in the second quarter. He returned to action in the second half and registered nine tackles, but the injury eventually forced him to miss the remaining five games of the year.

1999: Although not receiving public accolades, Woodson still performed at a level Cowboys coaches, players and fans have come to expect. Despite missing the game at Philadelphia (10/10) with a sprained left ankle, he finished third on the team with 128 tackles while recording a career-high seven quarterback pressures, eight passes defensed, three tackles behind the line of scrimmage, two interceptions and a sack. While registering five double-digit tackle games during the season, he also finished fourth on the team with 13 special team stops. Woodson opened the season trying for the team lead with nine tackles at Washington (9/12) while also trying for the team lead with three special teams tackles despite suffering a bruised biceps midway through the game. Against Atlanta (9/20), he tied for the team lead with 11 tackles while leading the team with a career-high four quarterback pressures and adding his only sack of the season. He posted six tackles, a tackle for a loss and a pass defensed against Arizona (10/3) before missing the game at Philadelphia (10/10) after suffering a sprained left ankle in practice the Thursday before the game. He returned to the starting lineup at the N.Y. Giants (10/18) and registered nine stops. Woodson was second on the team with eight tackles against Washington (10/24) while helping limit the Redskins' top ranked offense to 272 total yards. He led the team with 12 tackles and forced a fumble at Indianapolis (10/31) before trying for the team lead with eight tackles at Minnesota (11/8). Against Green



Bay (11/14), Woodson tied for the team lead with 11 tackles to help limit the Packers to 40 yards rushing. He posted five stops at Arizona (11/21), and on Thanksgiving Day, he registered 10 tackles to help shut out Miami (11/25). At New England (12/5), he posted seven tackles and recorded his first interception of the season when he picked off Drew Bledsoe in the end zone to end a Patriots second quarter scoring threat. Woodson also recorded the 100th special teams tackle of his career against the Pats. He registered six tackles against Philadelphia (12/12) and a week later, he recorded a season-high 13 stops against the N.Y. Jets (12/19). He tied his career-high with three passes defensed, including his second interception of the year, at New Orleans (12/24) while tallying six tackles in helping hold Ricky Williams to 61 yards on 23 carries (2.7 avg.). He finished with seven tackles in the season finale against the N.Y. Giants (1/2/00). In Dallas' NFC Wild Card Playoff Game at Minnesota (1/9/00), Woodson recorded a post-season career-high 13 tackles while adding a tackle for a loss and a pass defensed.

1998: Back to full health, Woodson regained his spot at the top of the Dallas tackle chart, leading the team with 136 stops - the third best performance of his career. His three sacks tied his career-high, and he posted six double figure tackle games. He was also second on the team with 11 passes defensed, the second best total of his career. This high productivity level earned him All-Pro selection by The Sporting News, It was the fourth time in his career he has been named All-Pro, tying Mel Renfro and Cliff Harris as the most decorated safeties in club history. Following the season, Woodson made his fifth consecutive trip to Hawaii as a member of the NFC Pro Bowl squad. The honor that may have meant the most to Woodson was the Ed Block Courage Award, an honor voted on by his Dallas teammates and given to the player who has overcome injuries to return to the field. He opened the season against Arizona (9/6) by finishing third on the team with five tackles and helped limit the Cardinals to 205 total yards. He was second on the team with nine tackles at Denver (9/13) before leading the squad with a season-high 12 tackles at the N.Y. Giants (9/21). In the Giants game, the Dallas defense limited New York to 56 yards rushing. Woodson came right back the next week against Oakland (9/27) and tied his season-high with another 12-tackle performance. He again led the team with 11 stops at Washington (10/4) while helping limit the Redskins to 164 yards on 13-of-29 passing (44.8%). His eight-tackle game at Chicago (10/18) helped limit the Bears to 79 yards rushing on 31 carries. Woodson logged his only interception of the season at Philadelphia (11/2) while deflecting two other passes to help limit the Eagles to 104 passing yards, including six receptions for 38 yards from their wide receivers (6.8 avg.). Against the N.Y. Giants (11/8), Woodson recorded the first multi-sack game of his career while leading the team with 11 tackles and three special teams tackles. He again led the team in tackles with 11 at Arizona (11/15) and nine against Seattle (11/22). He also added his third sack of the season against Seattle - which forced a Warren Moon fumble that led to the first Dallas touchdown of the day. For the fourth straight game, Woodson was at the top of the tackle chart, tying for the team lead with eight stops against Minnesota (11/26) while adding a team-high two tackles for a loss. He was second on the team with 10 tackles at New Orleans (12/6), posting his sixth double digit tackle game of the season. His three passes defensed at Kansas City (12/13) led the team and tied his single-game career-best. He also totaled eight tackles on the day. Woodson closed out the season with six tackles and a forced fumble against Philadelphia (12/20) and seven-tackles against Washington (12/27). In the wild card playoff game against Arizona (1/2/99), he led the team with three passes defensed, including a fourth quarter interception that stopped a Cardinals drive at the Dallas 16-yard line.

1997: Although Woodson's season was affected by injuries, causing him to miss two regular season starts for the first time since becoming a full-time starter in 1993, he was still recognized as the game's best strong safety, earning his fourth consecutive spot on the NFC Pro Bowl squad. From Week Two of 1993 through Week Seven of 1997, Woodson had started 80 straight games (including playoffs), but that streak came to an end when he was forced to miss the game at Philadelphia (10/26) with a hyperextended right knee. It was the first time he had not suited up for a game in his career (100 consecutive games). He also missed the Thanksgiving Day game against Tennessee with a sprained right shoulder. Woodson's ability to play through injuries earned him the Dallas Cowboys Unsung Hero Award from the NFL Players Association. Despite the two missed games, he still finished the year fifth on the team with 97 tackles, while also leading the team with three forced fumbles. He tied for the team lead in fumble recoveries with two. In the loss at Arizona (9/7), he had a career-high two forced fumbles and logged seven tackles. His second quarter sack and forced fumble came on a blitz of Cardinals QB Kent Graham, and the fumble was returned four yards for a touchdown by Chad Hennings. The next week, he led the team with 11 tackles against Philadelphia (9/15) as the Dallas defense limited the Eagles to 5.8 yards-per-pass play. Two weeks later, Woodson recorded his first interception of the season to set up a Dallas field goal against Chicago (9/28) while adding six tackles. At Washington (10/13), Woodson tied for fourth on the team with eight tackles despite suffering a hyperextended right knee in practice the Thursday before the game. He also forced a Redskins fumble that Dexter Coakley returned 16 yards for a touchdown. In the victory over Jacksonville (10/19), he registered four tackles before re-aggravating his hyperextended right knee early in the third quarter and leaving the game. After sitting out the Eagles game (10/26) the next week, Woodson returned to the starting lineup at San Francisco (11/2) and was second on the team with a season-high tying 11 tackles. He also led the team with two special teams tackles and recovered a fumble at the Cowboys 17 vard-line to end a 49ers threat late in the first half. At Green Bay (11/23), he logged five tackles despite suffering a strained right shoulder in the second quarter. He returned to the game midway through the fourth quarter, but the shoulder injury kept him out of the Thanksgiving Day game with Tennessee (11/27) four days later. At the conclusion of the season, Woodson underwent an exploratory arthroscopic debridement of his right shoulder by Dr. James Andrews on Jan. 14, 1998 in Birmingham, AL.

1996: Woodson capped another stellar season with his second consecutive All-Pro selection and his third straight Pro Bowl appearance. For the second time in his career, he tied for the team lead in interceptions (five, with Kevin Smith), matching the career-high number of interceptions he collected in 1994. He was also second on the team in tackles with 118 stops, topping the 100-tackle mark for the fourth con-

secutive season to become the first Dallas player to accomplish that feat since Michael Downs (1983-1986). He finished the year second on the team in special teams tackles (18) and passes defensed (10). Woodson also compiled a career-high three sacks - marking the most sacks by a Dallas defensive back since Kenny Gant had three in 1992. In the season opener at Chicago (9/2), Woodson tied for the team lead among defensive backs with eight tackles, while also recovering a fumble to set up Dallas' first field goal. In the loss at Buffalo (9/22), Woodson picked up his first interception of the year while helping limit the Bills to just 89 yards passing. The next week at Philadelphia (9/30), he led the team with 11 tackles while recording his first sack of the year. In the Cowboys win over Atlanta (10/20), Woodson led the team with a season-high 17 tackles. He received a game ball for his performance against the Falcons after also recording two passes defensed and a tackle for lost yardage. Woodson was the team leader in tackles with eight stops at San Francisco (11/10) while registering a sack and intercepting a third quarter pass to set up a Dallas field goal. In the Monday night victory over Green Bay (11/18), Woodson intercepted Brett Favre's two-point conversion pass attempt in the fourth quarter. Woodson recorded his third interception of the year with a fourth quarter theft at Arizona (12/8) that set up a Dallas field goal. The following week, he picked off two Drew Bledsoe passes against New England (12/15), marking the second time in his career he has had a multiple interception game (vs. Arizona, 10/9/94). In the win over the Patriots, he also led the team with nine tackles and forced a Curtis Martin fumble on third-and-one from the Dallas 16-yard line to stop a second quarter scoring drive. Later in the third quarter, he returned an interception 21 yards to the Patriots four-yard line to set up a Dallas field goal. His fourth quarter interception ended the Patriots chances with 2:22 remaining. In the playoff loss at Carolina (1/5/97), Woodson picked up his second career postseason interception on the Panther's opening drive of the game to set up a Dallas field goal.

1995: Darren Woodson's fourth NFL season was somewhat of a "dream season," as he closed the year in his hometown of Phoenix, playing in Super Bowl XXX in the same Sun Devil Stadium where he starred at Arizona State. Along the way to the Super Bowl, Woodson was a consensus All-Pro selection for the second consecutive year, and he earned his second straight starting berth in the Pro Bowl. In doing so, Woodson became the first Dallas defensive back to earn consecutive All-Pro honors since Everson Walls (1982-83) and the first Dallas safety to make back-to-back Pro Bowl trips since Cliff Harris (1978-79). Woodson led the Cowboys with 144 tackles, and became the first defensive back to top the team tackle list since Bill Bates in 1988. He enjoyed his most productive all-around day in the loss at Washington (10/1), leading the team with 15 tackles and returning an interception 37 yards for a touchdown, marking his second career interception return for a score. He also forced a fumble and had a tackle for a loss. In the Cowboys win over the Raiders in Oakland (11/19), Woodson recorded a season-high 16 tackles, including a career-high tying 11 solo stops. He also had two passes defensed and a key interception at the Raiders four-yard line that stopped a fourth quarter drive. His other top tackling performances came in the following regular season games: at Minnesota (12 stops on 9/17), San Francisco (10 on 11/12), at Philadelphia (14 on 12/10) and against the New York Giants (12 on 12/17). In addition to leading the team in tackles during the regular season, Woodson also led the team with 23 postseason tackles, including a team-high 11 stops against Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XXX (1/28/96). In the divisional playoff win over Philadelphia (1/7/96), his hit on Eagles quarterback Rodney Peete forced Peete to leave the game with a concussion.

1994: Woodson's rapid climb to the top level of NFL safeties reached the summit in 1994 - his third year in the NFL and second year as a starter. He was a consensus All-Pro, and he tied for the Cowboys' team lead in interceptions while becoming the first Dallas defensive back to be selected as a Pro Bowl starter since Everson Walls (1985). Woodson's five interceptions ranked fifth in the NFC and 10th in the NFL and were the most by a Dallas safety since Michael Downs had six in 1986. Woodson recorded his second straight 100-plus-tackle season by finishing the year second on the club with 113 stops while tying for third on the team in passes defensed with 12. Woodson got off to a blazing start by earning game balls in six of the Cowboys first seven games. Those games and his performances are as follows: at Pittsburgh (9/4) - in the season opener, Woodson received a game ball after his seven tackles helped hold the Steelers to 126 yards in total offense. Against Houston (9/11) - he picked up a game ball after recording 13 tackles. He also picked up his first career regular season interception against Houston. At Washington (10/2) - he earned a special teams game ball by forcing a fumble on the opening kickoff and tying for the team lead in special teams tackles with two. Against Arizona (10/9), he led the team in tackles with seven and recorded two interceptions that led to Dallas touchdowns. It was the first multiple interception game of Woodson's career. Against Philadelphia (10/16) - while leading all Dallas defensive backs with six tackles, he also returned a third quarter interception 26 yards to set up a Cowboys touchdown. At Arizona (10/23) - Woodson registered a season-high 15 tackles. He was named the NFC's Defensive Player of the Week at Philadelphia (12/4) after recording nine tackles and stepping in front of a fourth quarter Randall Cunningham pass and racing 94 yards for a touchdown to ensure the Cowboys 31-19 victory. It was the third longest interception return in club history at the time. He recovered his only fumble of the year at Cincinnati (10/30). Despite earning All-Pro honors at safety. Woodson remained one of the Cowboys top special teams performers, tying for third on the team with 23 special team stops.

1993: As a second-year player, Woodson earned a starting job at strong safety in training camp and then nearly won the team's individual tackle title by collecting 155 stops - just four shy of team leader Ken Norton. Woodson's 155 tackles were the most ever by a Dallas defensive back. Moreover, with eight double-digit tackle games in 1993, he joined Eugene Lockhart (16 in 1989) as only the second Dallas player to register at least seven double-figure tackle games in a season (since game-by-game records were kept in 1984). He led the Cowboys in fumble recoveries with three (while forcing another) and contributed four tackles for lost yardage totaling 13 yards. He enjoyed an all-time game in the regular season finale at Giants Stadium (1/2/94) - collecting a career-best 19 tackles (the most ever by a Dallas defensive back in a single game) and one fumble recovery. His 19 tackles against the Giants fied him for second on the Cowboys all-time single-game tackle list. For the regular season, Woodson averaged 9.7 tackles-per*

game, but over the course of the last nine games, he contributed 11.8 tackles-per-game. That stretch included the Cowboys' four games in the month of November where Woodson turned in double figure tackle totals in all four games and 48 total stops. He closed the month of November with 15 tackles against Miami on Thanksgiving Day (11/25). He was the team's leading tackler in the playoffs with 27 stops. He also registered his first professional interception in the playoffs against Green Bay (1/16/94), and he recovered a fumble in Super Bowl XXVIII against the Bills (1/30/94). Woodson missed the opener at Washington

(9/6) as he was still recovering from a fractured right forearm.

1992: Although Woodson was a second-round draft choice of the Cowboys, his play in the nickel pass defense caught almost everyone by surprise. It was thought that moving from linebacker at Arizona State to strong safety in the NFL would take a longer adjustment period. Instead, he quickly became the club's draft surprise. Woodson became a major contributor to the defense while leading the special teams with 19 tackles. In 16 games, he recorded 33 tackles (28 solo), second among Dallas' rookies. Included was a season-high six stops in a start against the Run-and-Shoot offense at Atlanta (12/21). His first NFL start came in a pass situation defense at Detroit (11/8). Two weeks later at Phoenix (11/22), he had a season-high five solo tackles. Against Chicago (12/27). Woodson's first NFL sack forced a first-quarter fumble at Chicago's 30-yard line, but the Bear's recovered. Against Philadelphia (1/10/93) in the playoffs, he forced a fumble at the Eagles' 25-yard line to set up a Dallas field goal at the end of the first half. His standout

play on special teams included a game ball for the 27-0 win over Seattle (10/11).

COLLEGE: An All-PAC Ten second-team selection as a senior and honorable mention All-America as a junior, Woodson played linebacker at Arizona State. Coming out of high school, he didn't have the grades to accept a football scholarship from ASU, so he started his career as a walk-on and quickly developed a reputation for being one of the fiercest hitters in the country. As a sophomore in 1989, he had a career-high 16 tackles against Stanford en route to his single-season high of 122 tackles (79 solo). Of his

five career interceptions, three came in his senior season.

PERSONAL: Darren Ray Woodson was an All-Metro Division AAA and all-city linebacker and running back at Maryvale High School in Phoenix, AZ. Darren ran for a career-high 225 yards and six touchdowns against Kofa High in Yuma, AZ, tying a Phoenix Metro game record and setting a school mark. He earned three letters in football and served as team captain his senior year. He received his degree in criminal justice at Arizona State. In 1996, Woodson served as the Dallas Cowboys spokesman in a nationally televised NFL United Way public service announcement. During the 1999-2000 school year, Woodson headed the Dallas Cowboys/Darren Woodson "Prepare to Pass" Challenge, which encouraged 10th grade students at five Dallas high schools to pass all sections of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test. In 2000, Woodson received the Children's Medical Center Athlete Role Model Award presented by the Dallas All-Sports Association. Woodson and fellow members of the Cowboys' secondary participated in the second annual NFL/United Way Hometown Huddle in October 2000. The secondary served lunch to the homeless and visited with children at the Carr P. Collins Social Service Center. He is also a regular participant in the Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show, serving as a celebrity escort to children suffering with cancer but who serve as fashion models for the day. During the Cowboys annual Let Us Play! Sports Camp for Girls, Woodson served as a guest flag-football coach - teaching girls from local non-profit agencies in Dallas-Ft. Worth basic football drills.



GAMES/STARTS: 1999 (0/0-Pitt.), 2000 (4/2), Total - 4/2. PRO: A bright, young talent who was thrust into one of the most visible jobs in sports at the conclusion of the 2000 season. Anthony Wright accept-

ed the challenge with the poise and confidence of a seasoned veteran. After Troy Aikman was sidelined in the Week 13 win over Washington, Wright directed the Dallas offense with an unusually steady hand for a player of his youth and inexperience. Possessing a strong arm, fine athletic ability and solid instincts, Wright closed out the Washington win and nearly directed an upset of the eventual NFC Champion New York Giants the following week in his first start. Wright will be in the heat of competition for the quarterbacking duties this fall as he squares off with the newly acquired Tony Banks and youngsters Quincy Carter and Clint Stoerner. A student of the game, Wright has excellent work habits and an ability to elude pressure and make plays on the run. He entered the NFL as a rookie free agent with Pittsburgh in 1999 and earned a spot on the Steelers 53-man roster.

2000: After joining the Cowboys practice squad on Aug. 30 after being released by Pittsburgh, Wright was moved up to the active roster Nov. 21. He was the third quarterback in the Thanksgiving Day loss to Minnesota (11/23), and then saw his first splash of NFL regular season action at Tampa Bay (12/3). In limited fourth quarter action against the Bucs, Wright completed one-of-three passes for 10 yards during the only drive he led. After a concussion forced Aikman out the following week against Washington (12/10), Wright took over late in the first quarter and led the Cowboys to a 32-13 victory. He completed three-of-five passes for 73 yards, including a 46-yard toss to James McKnight over Deion Sanders on his first attempt of the game. Wright calmly directed the Cowboys to three touchdowns and three field goal attempts in his 11 possessions against the Redskins (two other drives ended in kneel downs to end the half and game). His poised play and natural leadership ability helped Dallas claim its seventh straight victory over its chief NFC East rival. Wright's challenges rapidly became more difficult as the remaining two games featured nationally televised outings against the NFC Champion N.Y. Giants and the defending AFC Champion Tennessee Titans. In his first professional start, Wright was 13-of-25 for 119 yards and one interception against New York (12/17). He also ran four times for 26 yards, including a 19-yard gain. He paced Dallas to a 13-0 halftime lead, but ultimately New York was able to pull out a 17-13 division clinching victory. The final game of the season had Wright making his first road start at Tennessee (12/25) in front of a Monday Night Football audience on Christmas. In facing the NFL's top ranked defense, Wright managed to complete five-of-20 passes for 35 yards while suffering two interceptions. He also ran three times for nine yards, including one third down scramble to pick up a first down.

1999: After signing with Pittsburgh as a rookie free agent, Wright completed eight-of-19 passes for 70 yards while rushing for 34 yards on four carries in preseason. He impressed Steelers coaches enough to earn a spot on the active roster as the fourth quarterback. He was inactive for the first 11 games of the season before being declared Pittsburgh's third quarterback at Jacksonville (12/2). He was promoted to the second quarterback spot for the season finale against Tennessee (1/2/00) but did not see any playing time.

COLLEGE: Wright posted a 116.3 quarterback rating as a senior on 145-of-273 passing for 1,899 yards, 10 touchdowns and 10 interceptions despite overcoming major knee surgery during his junior campaign. He led the Gamecocks in total offense (1,955 total yards) while ranking sixth on the team with 18 points during his final season. He completed 139-of-252 passes for 18 touchdowns and five interceptions as a junior before tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee against Tennessee and missing the final two games of the season. He ranked seventh in the Southeastern Conference in total offensive yards-per-game (193.4) as a junior. As a first-year starter as a sophomore, Wright completed 131-of-244 passes for 1,850 yards, eight touchdowns and six interceptions. He threw for two touchdowns and an interception on 17-of-27 passing as a redshirt freshman in 1995.

PERSONAL: Anthony Wright was named All-America by SuperPrep magazine as a senior at West Craven High School in Vanceboro, NC. The Gatorade Player-of-the-Year was rated as the seventh-best quarterback prospect in the nation by SuperPrep following his senior campaign. During his prep career, he passed for 4,890 yards, 44 touchdowns and 15 interceptions. Wright is the cousin of former NFL defensive back Jesse Campbell.

to get separation from defensive backs, Yamini is still a raw talent. Blessed with world class speed, he has only two years of collegiate playing experience under his belt, leaving him with tremendous up-side once given the chance to learn the position.

2000: Yamini originally signed as a rookie free agent with the Denver Broncos on April 20. He was released by the Broncos on Aug. 27 and signed by Tennessee. He saw action in five games but did not record a catch before being released on Nov. 9. He immediately joined the Titans practice squad, where he finished the 2000 season.

COLLEGE: Yamini only played football his final two seasons at lowa, recording 57 receptions for 665 yards and one touchdown. He was a track star at lowa, earning All-America honors on the school's 4x400meter relay team which finished fourth at the 1999 NCAA Outdoor Championships, During that same year, at the Big 10 Championships, Yamini won the 200-meter dash for the second consecutive year and anchored the 4x200-meter relay and the 4x400-meter relay teams that won conference titles. He also placed sixth in the long jump.

PERSONAL: Bashir Yamini, born Sept. 10, 1977 in Bolton, IL, was an all-conference football player at Thornridge, IL, High School. He was also the Illinois state long jump and high jump champion and a two-time all-state performer. Yamini was a two-time team MVP in basketball.





PRO: Although a raw talent with little big-time experience coming out of Fort Valley State, Peppi Zellner showed enough of his natural pass rushing ability in college to have Cowboys coaches excited about his potential. Blessed with exceptional quickness and strength for a player of his size, Zellner has worked primarily as an outside pass rusher. As a rookie, Zellner displayed flashes of that potential at end while also becoming a valuable contributor on special teams, a rarity for a defensive end. He suffered a torn ACL in his left knee in practice on Nov. 27, 2000, forcing him to miss the remainder of the season. Zellner was just the second player ever drafted out of Georgia's Fort Valley State by the Cowboys, joining six-time Pro Bowl tackle Rayfield Wright, who was selected in the seventh round of the 1967 NFL Draft.

2000: Prior to his season ending knee injury on Nov. 27, Zellner had played in all 12 of Dallas' games as a reserve defensive end and collected 16 tackles, two sacks and three quarterback pressures. Despite missing the final four games of the year, Zellner was the Cowboys second leading tackler on special

teams with 13 stops. In the season's second game at Arizona (9/10), he recorded his first sack of the season with a takedown of Jake Plummer. Two weeks later against San Francisco (9/24), he saw considerable playing time at defensive end after Ebenezer Ekuban was injured. Zellner went on to record a careerbest four tackles. He picked up his second sack of the season in the following week's overtime win at Carolina (10/1). In the Cowboys win over Arizona (10/22), he tied for second on the team with two special teams tackles. The next week against Jacksonville (10/29), he tied his career-high with four tackles. In the overtime loss at Philadelphia (11/5), he recorded two quarterback pressures and a special teams tackle as the Dallas punt coverage unit limited Brian Mitchell to one return for two yards and forced two fair catches. In the win over Cincinnati (11/12), he tied for the team lead with three special teams tackles as the Bengals were limited to 19.7 yards-per-kickoff return. In the loss at Baltimore (11/19), he led the team with three special teams tackles. Zellner was placed on reserve/injured on Dec. 12 following his successful knee surgery.

1999: Zellner hit the ground running as a rookie, tying for sixth on the team with 10 special teams tackles and earning All-Rookie honors from College & Pro Football Newsweekly. He started off hot, recording his first career sack with a six-yard take down of Danny Kannell in the fourth quarter against Atlanta (9/20) while adding two tackles and a quarterback pressure. He was inactive for three of the next four games but returned to action against Green Bay (11/14), logging a tackle and a special teams stop. On Thanksgiving Day, he tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles against Miami (11/25) and helped limit Brock Marion – who entered the game ranked second in the NFL with a 26.4 yard average—to an 18.4 yard average on five kickoff returns. When Greg Ellis suffered a fractured tibia in the first quarter against Philadelphia (12/12), Zellner saw considerable action at defensive end and recorded a season-high three tackles. He also tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles as the Eagles started eight-of-10 drives following punts or kickoffs at or inside their own 20. Over the next two weeks, Zellner saw a rise in his playing time with Ellis out action and recorded two tackles against both the N.Y. Jets (12/19) and at New Orleans (12/24). In the wild card playoff game at Minnesota (1/9/00), Zellner's playing time continued to increase when Ebenezer Ekuban (sprained knee) went down. Zellner responded with a season-high tying three tackles.

COLLEGE: As a senior, Zellner earned All-America and All-Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference honors at defensive end. He was third on the team, tops among defensive linemen, with 60 tackles and three sacks. His 14 tackles behind the line of scrimmage led the team. He accomplished all this after taking the 1997 season off to concentrate on basketball, where he starred at forward for Fort Valley State's hoops team, starting 17-of-26 games and averaging 10.3 points and 9.1 rebounds-pergame as the Wildcats earned their first SIAC basketball title since 1969. Zellner played in just three games due to transfer eligibility problems in his first year on the Fort Valley State football team (1996), but he recorded 18 tackles and four tackles behind the line of scrimmage. A two-year letterman in football at Georgia Military Institute (1994-95), Zellner collected 15 sacks, 33 tackles behind the line of scrimmage and 129 tackles in his two junior college seasons.

PERSONAL: An all-area, all-district and Prep Football Report All-Dixie selection at May Persons High School in Forsythe, GA, Hunndens Guiseppi Zellner was selected to participate in the Florida-Georgia All-Star Game. He also played in the North-South All-Star hoops tournament as an all-area selection in basketball. Zellner was a physical education major at Fort Valley State and served as a football coach at the Cowboys Let Us Play! Sports Camp for Girls. He also helped coach at the Dallas Cowboys/Gatorade Training Camp for Kids. He has a daughter, Tanjanyika (2/22/92).

When the Dallas Cowboys selected Quincy Carter with their top pick (53rd overall) in the NFL Draft, it marked the first time in 10 years the Cowboys had drafted a quarterback. In Carter, who started every game in which he played (29) at the University of Georgia, the Cowboys felt they

were getting a young quarterback that had proven he could successfully lead a storied program week in and week out against top competition. Carter, who lead the Bulldogs to a 20-9 record, left Georgia as one of the top quarterbacks in school history, finishing his three-year career second in school annals in completions (483), pass attempts (853) and passing yards (6,447) and third in career touchdown passes (35). He is a versatile quarterback that can make his reads in the pocket or while on the move and has a strong arm that allows him to get the ball down field. He also has a keen field awareness that allows him to make quick decisions on where to deliver the ball or whether to tuck it and run. While Cowboy coaches are excited with what Carter brings to the team, he will be expected to spend his rookie campaign learning Dallas' offensive system and adjusting to the National Football League.

2000: Carter finished his final collegiate campaign 91-of-183 for 1,250 yards, 10 interceptions and six touchdowns despite missing four games due to injury. He opened his junior season 16-of-27 for 203 yards, two touchdowns and an interception against Georgia Southern while also scoring on an 11-yard run. The next week at South Carolina, he threw for 108 yards and a career-high five interceptions on 10-of-24 passing. He completed 12-of-23 passes for 182 yards, one score and an interception against New Mexico State before throwing for 168 yards and a touchdown on 13-of-22 passing at Arkansas. In hosting Tennessee, Carter completed only eight-of-18 passes for 134 yards, but led Georgia to a 21-10 victory, giving the Bulldogs their first win over the Vols since 1988. He suffered a left shoulder contusion against Vanderbilt, completing 12-of-20 passes for 215 yards and a touchdown, and missed the game at Kentucky due to the shoulder. He returned against Florida to throw for 240 yards, three interceptions and a touchdown on 20-of-39 passing. Carter strained ligaments in his right thumb early in the game against the Gators but remained in the game although the injury forced him to miss the final three games of the season.
1999: Carter earned second team All-SEC honors as a sophomore after completing 216-of-380 pass-

es for 2,713 yards, 17 touchdowns and six interceptions while leading the Bulldogs offense to 416 yardsper-game - second in the SEC. His 2,713 passing yards - including five 300 yard passing performances in 11 starts - set Georgia's sophomore record, breaking Eric Zeier's mark of 2,248 (1992). His interception percentage of 1.58 (six picks in 380 pass attempts) was a school record and the second lowest percentage in SEC history. He also compiled the third longest streak in SEC history after throwing 170 consecutive passes without an interception. Carter was one-of-five recipients of the Award of Distinction presented by the Touchdown Club of Columbus (OH). He opened the season 24-of-35 (73.5%) for 320 yards, two scores and an interception against Utah State while rushing for 58 yards and a touchdown on five carries. Carter threw for 251 yards and a touchdown on 21-of-38 passing against South Carolina before completing 20-of-36 passes for 219 yards and two touchdowns against Central Florida. He threw for 228 yards and two scores on 20-of-34 passing at Tennessee. The next week at Vanderbilt, Carter was 16-of-25 for 192 yards, two touchdowns and a pick, his first interception in 170 straight pass attempts. Against Kentucky, he passed for 304 yards, two scores and an interception on 16-of-28 passing and completed 26-of-37 passes (70.3%) for 319 yards and two scores against Auburn. He earned SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors at Mississippi after passing for 349 yards and a touchdown on 26-of-41 passing. At Georgia Tech, Carter led the Bulldogs to 51 points, completing 29-of-55 passes for 345 yards and two touchdowns while also rushing for a score. His 55 attempts were a career-high. Georgia finished the season with a 7-4 record, ranked 14th in the final AP poll. In the Outback Bowl against Purdue, Carter threw for 243 yards and a touchdown on 20-of-33 passing while running for 21 yards and a score to lead the Bulldogs to the biggest come-from-behind victory in school history. Georgia claimed a 28-25 overtime victory after trailing the Boilermakers 25-0.

1998: Carter's freshman year was a record setting season, establishing school freshman marks for attempts (290), completions (176), passing yards (2,484) and touchdowns (12) while throwing for 300 yards or more four times in 11 starts. His performance earned him SEC Freshman of the Year honors. When he opened the season against Kent State, he became the first freshman quarterback to start a season-opener since Johnny Rauch in 1945. He threw for 235 yards and a career-high three touchdowns on 12-of-16 (75.0%) passing against Kent. He followed up that performance by completing 21-of-34 passes for a career-high 368 yards and an interception while running for two touchdowns at South Carolina. Against Wyoming, Carter was 18-of-25 for 271 yards and a score. He was named SEC Offensive Player of the Week and Visa ESPN Player of the Game after completing 27-of-34 passes (79.4% – career high)



for 318 yards and two scores at LSU. He was named Amoco Jefferson Pilot Player of the Game after completing 10-of-14 (71.4%) passes for 147 yards, two touchdowns and an interception while rushing for 114 yards and a 49-yard score on 14 carries at Kentucky. Against Florida, he completed a career-high 33-of-49 (67.3%) passes for a career-high tying 368 yards and two picks. He came back the next week to throw for 351 yards three interceptions and two touchdowns on 23-of-37 passing at Auburn. Carter was 11-of-23 for 179 yards with a rushing touchdown against Mississippi and 16-of-31 for 225 yards against Georgia Tech. In the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl against Virginia, Carter threw for 222 yards, three interceptions and two scores on 18-of-33 passing to lead Georgia from a 21-0 deficit to a 35-33 victory. Carter led the Bulldogs to a 9-3 record and a No. 16 ranking in the final AP poll.

PERSONAL: Quincy Carter was named Georgia Player of the Year by USA Today, Parade All-America and first-team all-state following his senior season at Southwest DeKalb High School in Decatur, GA, where he was also a standout baseball player. During his prep football career, he passed for 4,450 yards and 37 touchdowns while rushing for 1,489 yards and 32 scores. The Sports Studies major was drafted by Major League Baseball's Chicago Cubs in the second round of the 1996 amateur draft and spent two seasons in the Cubs farm system. Carter batted .215 in his first professional season (1996), playing for Ft. Myers (FL) in rookie league ball and Daytona (FL) at the Class A level. He hit .211 for Class A Rockford

(IL) in 1997.

Tony Dixon

Safety 6'1" * 213 * 6/18/79 Alabama D-2b for '01 (56th overall)



A three-year starter at safety for the Crimson Tide, Tony Dixon should immediately step into the Cowboys lineup and contribute to the Nickel defense. He displayed the versatility to move between both strong and free safety at Alabama and still rank near the top of the team in tackles

each season. Built from the same mold as the club's hard-hitting Darren Woodson, Dixon should help shore up the team's defense against both the pass and run. He has shown a willingness to fill the holes and play aggressively near the line of scrimmage, charging hard and delivering crunching tackles, finishing his Alabama career with 252 stops. Not limited to being a tough tackling run-stuffer. Dixon has also displayed good instincts in the passing game to go with the speed to cover ground in the secondary. On top of the physical package, Dixon also has the smarts to handle the added pressure of the pro game, having excelled in the classroom and graduated from Alabama in just three and a half years.

2000: Dixon started all season at free safety and played a major role in stopping both the run and pass in the Tide secondary, finishing third on the team with 90 tackles and adding two interceptions to go with his six pass deflections. He also recorded a sack and forced a fumble. Dixon opened the year with six tackles and a sack against Vanderbilt. Six times over the final nine games of the season Dixon reached double figures in tackles. He started the streak with 11 stops and a pass deflection against Southern Mississippi and added 10 more tackles the next week at Arkansas. He slowed to nine tackles against South Carolina but was back to his old self with 10 stops against Ole Miss. He also intercepted a pass and deflected another against the Rebels. Against Tennessee, Dixon logged a career-high 17 tackles. He returned his second interception of the season 12 yards against Central Florida before closing out the season with 10 tackles at Mississippi State and another 11 stops against Auburn.



1999: Dixon split time between strong and free safety during his junior campaign, starting the first five games of the year at free safety before moving to strong safety. He went on to finish the year second on the team with 65 tackles, along with a pair of stops behind the line of scrimmage for an Alabama team that went 10-3 and captured the SEC title. Dixon opened the season with six tackles and a pass breakup at Vanderbilt. He continued the trend with six tackles in consecutive games against Houston, Louisiana Tech and Arkansas. In his first game after making the switch back to strong safety, Dixon came up with a seven-tackle performance against Ole Miss. Dixon saved his best for last when he forced a fumble and contributed a season-high 13 tackles against Florida in Alabama's 34-7 SEC title game win.

1998: Dixon came into his own as a sophomore, moving into the starting lineup at strong safety. He led the secondary and was third on the team with 75 tackles, including two stops for losses. He also picked off a pass against East Carolina. Over the final three games of the regular season, Dixon accounted for 32 tackles, including an 11-stop performance against Louisiana State and a season-high 14 tackles showing against Mississippi State. He was in on seven tackles against Virginia Tech in the Music City


Bowl. In his last eight games, Dixon had 65 tackles, an average of 8.1 stops-per-game.

1997: One of eight true freshmen to earn a letter, Dixon saw action in every game, earning his first career start at free safety against Tennessee. He finished the year with 22 tackles, two tackles for a loss

and a sack. Dixon registered a season-high six tackles against Auburn.

PERSONAL: Dixon graduated from Alabama with a degree in business management in December, 2000. As a junior at Alabama, he was one of 300 student-athletes from around the nation selected to participate in the third annual NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference in Lake Buena Vista, FL. Dixon was a four-year starter, lettering in football, basketball and baseball at Pickens County High School in Reform, AL., earning All-State gridiron honors as a senior. He played both ways for the Tornadoes, rushing for 1,450 yards and 18 touchdowns, passing for two touchdowns and catching another score as a receiver. On defense, he had six sacks, four interceptions and two fumble recoveries. As a junior, he rushed for 1,286 yards and 17 touchdowns while recording 115 tackles and six interceptions on defense - three of which he returned for touchdowns. Dixon earned an advanced diploma and finished fourth in his graduating class. He also became the first athlete from Pickens County High School to sign a Division I scholarship. Off the field, Dixon was the school's Boys' State representative and also served as president and vice president of the student council.

After injuries depleted the Cowboys at defensive tackle in 2000, Dallas was looking to add big, young bodies to that rotation when they drafted willie Blade in the third round (93rd overall) of the NFL Draft. Blade is a late bloomer that has seen his talents grow each year since stepping onto

the Northwest Community College football field in 1997. He is a physical player that plays the run well from either the nose tackle or defensive tackle position, and his leg drive gives him the ability to gain leverage on blockers while maintaining his position in the trenches. Cowboys coaches are expecting Blade to continue his upward trend and battle for a spot in the defensive tackle rotation.

2000: A semifinalist for the Outland Trophy – given annually to the nation's top down lineman – Blade earned conference and national accolades following a standout senior season in which he started nine of 11 games. He closed out the season with 51 tackles, 13 quarterback pressures (second on the team), nine stops for a loss (third on the team) and team-highs with four sacks and two fumble recoveries. He opened his senior season at Memphis with six stops, two sacks and a fumble recovery. He did not start at South Carolina but posted a tackle behind the line of scrimmage. He returned to the starting lineup one week later against Florida and was named Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Week and Bronco Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week after recording five tackles, two sacks and a pair of pressures in the Bulldogs 47-35 upset of the Gators. He totaled four stops, including one for a loss,

against Auburn to help limit the Tigers to 18 rushing yards on 19 carries. Blade registered eight stops, including one behind the line of scrimmage, at Louisiana State before tallying four stops against Middle Tennessee. At Kentucky, he recorded two tackles, four pressures and a fumble recovery, and he led all defensive linemen with a regular season career-high nine stops against Alabama. He posted six tackles, including one for a loss, and a pair of pressures against Arkansas before finishing the regular season with five stops and a tackle for a loss at Mississippi. He closed his collegiate career against Texas A&M in the Independence Bowl by earning Defensive MVP honors after posting a career-high 16 tackles, including four behind the line of scrimmage, in the Bulldogs overtime victory. 
1999: In his first season with the Bulldogs after transferring from Butler County, KS, Community College, Blade totaled 28 tackles, six quarterback pressures, four stops behind the line of scrimmage and a sack as a reserve defensive tackle. He began his Division I career by registering three stops and a sack in the season opener against Middle Tennessee. He then posted three tackles, including one for a loss, the next week against Memphis before receiving his first start against Oklahoma State when nose guard Alvin McKinley was slowed by a thumb injury. Blade totaled four stops and two pressures against the Cowboys. He returned to a reserve capacity and recorded two tackles against South Carolina and at Vanderbilt. He registered the best game of his junior season against LSU, tallying five stops, three tackles for a loss, a quarterback pressure and a pass defensed. Blade followed his LSU performance with three tackles, two pressures and a fumble recovery against Kentucky, while also blocking a Wildcats extra point attempt to preserve an early Bulldog lead. Against Clemson in the Peach Bowl, Blade registered two stops and a pass defensed.

1998: In his only season at Butler Community College, Blade earned All-Jayhawk Conference honors after posting 42 tackles, 12 stops behind the line of scrimmage and six sacks in helping lead Butler to the National Junior College championship. He was considered one of the top junior college defensive

linemen in the country by Prep Star following the completion of his JUCO career.

1997: Blade spent his freshman collegiate campaign playing for Northwest, MS, Community College. PERSONAL: Blade was named to the Peach State Top 40 by the Augusta Chronicle following his senior season at Warner Robins, GA, High School. The educational psychology major was born in Landstuel, Germany.

An outstanding competitor with solid football instincts, Steele proved to be a dependable player against the run and in pass defense throughout his collegiate playing days. Blessed with 4.53 speed and a 35.5-inch vertical leap, he has the type of speed and athletic skills necessary to fit

into the Dallas defensive philosophy. An aggressive player against the run, he also has the tenacity to be an effective pass rusher, collecting 16 sacks during his collegiate career. His exceptional read-and-react ability also allows him to be effective covering backs and tight ends on pass routes. Steele has the versatility to play both outside linebacker positions, but will be asked to concentrate on the strongside spot in Dallas. He should also compete for playing time as a member of the Cowboys special teams units.

2000: An All-Pac-10 Conference honorable mention selection, Steele finished the year third on the team in tackles with 61. While playing primarily at weakside linebacker, he had three sacks and 17 stops behind the line of scrimmage. He opened his senior campaign with nine stops and two sacks against Colorado before posting his top tackle performance of the year with 12 stops against San Jose State, including four behind the line of scrimmage. At Oregon State, Steele delivered seven tackles, including one for a loss, and recovered a fumble. Against Arizona, he posted five tackles, four stops behind the line of scrimmage and a pass deflection. He tallied nine stops, including three behind the line of scrimmage, against Oregon, and he registered seven tackles, with one for a loss, at Stanford. He recorded another solid effort against California, tallying seven stops, two tackles for losses and a sack.



1999: Steele received honorable mention All-America recognition from Football News while also gaining All-Pac-10 honorable mention honors as a junior. He finished the year ranked second on the Trojans with 91 tackles (62 solos). He also had 12 tackles behind the line of scrimmage, six passes defensed, three sacks, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. At Hawaii in his first game in a Trojans uniform, Steele totaled four stops, including one for a loss, and recovered a fumble, which he returned 46 yards for a touchdown. He posted nine stops – including two behind the line of scrimmage – an interception, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery against San Diego State. Steele registered a career-high 16 tackles, along with a tackle for a loss and a forced fumble in the Trojans meeting with Oregon. He totaled 14 stops, including two behind the line of scrimmage, the next week at Arizona before tallying 12 tackles, two stops for losses and a forced fumble at Notre Dame. He recorded four stops against Stanford and seven tackles, three stops for losses and a deflected pass at California. Against Arizona State, he registered nine tackles and a pass defensed, and he totaled six stops against UCLA.

1998: Steele earned J.C. Grid-Wire All-America and J.C. Athletic Bureau All America Defensive Most Valuable Player honors as a sophomore at Long Beach City College after amassing 93 tackles, including 17 behind the line of scrimmage, eight sacks, three forced fumbles, two blocked kicks, a fumble recovery and an interception. He also carried the ball four times for 39 yards (9.8 avg.) in leading Long Beach

City to a No. 6 national ranking with a 10-1 record.

Matt Lehr

Guard/Center 6'2" * 292 * 4/25/79 Virginia Tech D-5 for '01 (137th overall)



The Dallas Cowboys have shown a knack in recent years for drafting offensive linemen that quickly develop into starters – Flozell Adams, 1998 and Solomon Page, 1999. In continuing their efforts to add quality, young linemen to their stable of veterans, the Cowboys selected Matt Lehr (pro-

nounced LAIR) with the 137th overall pick in the NFL Draft. Lehr combines good athleticism with excellent technique to dominate his man at the line of scrimmage. His quickness and strength were big reasons Virginia Tech was able to establish Big East rushing records during his junior and senior campaigns. While establishing these conference records, his Virginia Tech teams compiled a 22-2 record (.917 winning percentage), and the Hokies posted a 37-10 record (.787) during his four-year career. A three-year starter at guard for the Hokies, Lehr will work at guard and center during his first professional season to provide the Cowboys with a more versatile reserve lineman.

2000: Lehr earned second-team All-Big East and All-America honors following a senior season where he allowed only half a sack and five quarterback pressures while leading the team with 57 knockdown blocks. His performance throughout the season also earned him selection to play in the Hula Bowl. Lehr averaged over 60 snaps-per-game during his senior campaign, and he was voted MVP by the coaching staff for his performances against Miami and West Virginia. As a team, the Hokies offense averaged 426.4 yards-per-game, including 270.5 rushing yards-per-game to break the Big East rushing record established by the same group the previous season. Lehr helped lead tailback Lee Suggs to a team-high 1,207 yards on the ground, while quarterback Michael Vick added another 617 rushing yards. All four Hokies that carried the ball at least 40 times averaged over five yards-per-carry. Lehr's work in the trenches also allowed Vick to complete 87-of-161 passes for 1,234 yards, eight touchdowns and six interceptions.

1999: Lehr started all 12 games at left guard for Virginia Tech after winning the George Preas Award as the most valuable offensive player during spring practice. He averaged 60 plays-per-game for the

highest scoring offense in Division I football (37.9 points-per-game), helping lead the Hokies to the BCS National Championship game. For the season, he surrendered only one sack and allowed just three quarterback pressures while leading the team with 57 knockdown blocks to earn second-team All-Big East honors. He posted a team-high six knockdown blocks against Miami and another six knockdowns against Boston College. His performance allowed Vick to finish third in Heisman Trophy voting after completing 90-of-152 passes for 1,840 yards, 12 scores and five interceptions and totaling 585 rushing yards. Lehr and his line mates allowed Vick to post the second-highest passing efficiency rating of all time while leading the nation with a 180.4 rating. Tailback Shyrone Stith led Tech with 1,119 yards on the ground, while Andre Kendrick averaged 6.3 yards-per-carry in accumulating 645 rushing yards on 103 carries. As a team, Virginia Tech averaged a then Big-East record 253.9 rushing yards-per-game.

1998: After seeing practice time at guard and tackle during spring workouts, Lehr injured his ankle during preseason practice and missed Tech's first two games – against East Carolina and Clemson. He saw his first action of the season at guard at Miami and moved into the starting lineup against Rutgers. He posted five knockdowns in 65 plays against Virginia. His blocking allowed the Hokies to average 178.4 yards-per-game on the ground, led by Ricky Hall's 745 yards and seven touchdowns on 178 carries and

Stith's 699 yards and three scores on 133 carries.

1997: Lehr opened practice prior to his freshman campaign at right guard and was moved to left guard before the season started. He played as a reserve in Tech's season opener at Rutgers and against Arkansas State. He saw action in two more games in helping the Hokies to 362.2 total yards-per-game. Lehr's limited work helped Ken Oxendine rush for 904 yards and Al Clark pass for 1,476 yards on 110-of-192 passing. Virginia Tech's ground game averaged 215.3 yards-per-game behind Lehr and his line mates

PERSONAL: Matthew Steven Lehr played offensive guard and defensive end for Woodbridge, VA. High School. The three-time all-district and all-region selection earned Group AAA all-state honors for his work on the offensive line during his final prep season. He contributed 40 tackles and six sacks on defense while averaging 20 pancake blocks-per-game to garner All-America honors from PrepStar. The finance major averaged 12 pancake blocks a game as a junior to earn second-team all-state accolades. He also garnered all-state honors as a member of the Woodbridge track team in the shot put.



Daleroy Stewart

Defensive Tackle 6'4" * 309 * 11/1/78 Southern Mississippi D6 for '01 (171st overall)



In the NFL, coaches and scouts are in a never-ending search for defensive line talent. In the 2001 NFL Draft, the Cowboys believe they have landed a defensive tackle in Daleroy (pronounced DALE-roy) Stewart who has the size and athletic ability to excel at defensive tackle. Having

experienced success at the collegiate level - in Stewart's four years at Southern Mississippi the club garnered two Conference USA titles and appeared in three bowl games - he brings a winning attitude to the NFL. He will count on his quickness and explosive first step to beat defenders and help shore up the Cowboys defensive front.

2000: Stewart was a key component of a Golden Eagles defense that finished the year ranked second in the nation in total defense, allowing just 268 yards-per-game. On their way to an 8-4 season and a win over Texas Christian in the Mobile Alabama Bowl, the Southern Miss defense ranked 21st in the country in run defense, allowing just 2.8 yards-per-carry, and fourth in pass defense. As a member of this group, Stewart saw action in every game as a senior with two starts. He was 10th on the Southern Miss tackle chart with 38 stops along with eight tackles behind the line of scrimmage. He also contributed four sacks for 32 yards in losses. In the season-opener at Tennessee, he recorded five tackles and a tackle for a loss. Stewart posted season-highs with six tackles against both Alabama-Birmingham and East Carolina. His three tackles against TCU in the Mobile Alabama Bowl helped hold Heisman Trophy finalist LaDainian Tomlinson, who averaged 196 rushing yards-per-game and 5.9 yards-per-carry during the regular season, to 118 yards on 28 carries (4.2 avg.).

1999: As a junior, Stewart started the year as a back-up to fellow Cowboys draft choice John Nix, but when Nix suffered a foot injury early in the year Stewart moved into the starting lineup and excelled. He finished the year with 47 tackles and 11 tackles behind the line as Southern Miss put together a 9-3 record and captured a share of the Conference USA title. In his first start, he recorded eight tackles in the Golden Eagles 20-13 loss at Nebraska. He followed that with nine tackles the next week at Texas A&M, including two behind the line of scrimmage. He also blocked an Aggie field goal attempt. In his next start, Stewart recorded three of his five tackles behind the line of scrimmage and added a sack against East Carolina. He led Southern Miss with a career-high tying eight tackles in their 23-17 win over Colorado State in the Liberty Bowl

1998: A back-up most of the season, Stewart was limited late in the year with an ankle injury but still finished with 26 tackles. He posted a career-high eight stops against Army and had two stops in the



Golden Eagles Humanitarian Bowl appearance against Idaho.

1997: Stewart saw action in eight games as a reserve defensive lineman his freshman season, record-

g 10 tackles. He posted a season-high three stops against Louisville.

PERSONAL: A business administration major, Daleroy Andrew Stewart was an all-state selection after recording 95 tackles, including 13 for losses and seven sacks, during his senior year at Vero Beach, FL, High School. He was a member of the CompUSA Super Senior team and was selected to play in the Georgia/Florida All-Star game. He helped his high school team to a 23-3 record over his final two seasons and ranked among the best in the state in the discus and shot.

Colston Weatherington

Defensive End 6'5" * 289 * 10/29/77 Central Missouri State D-7a for '01 (207th overall)

A physical, athletic defensive end with a good motor, Colston Weatherington is a raw talent the Cowboys hope to polish into a gem. With a quick, explosive first move off the line of scrimmage, he was able to make plays against both the run and pass at Central Missouri. After an all-

state career in high school, Weatherington sat out two seasons of football while attending junior college before resuming his career on the gridiron in 1998. In one year of junior college football and two years at Central Missouri, he flashed the potential to be an impact player. In his first year at the division II level, he earned All-America honors and was the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletic Association Defensive Player of the Year. He has shown the skills necessary to develop into a special player with hard work and time on the practice field and in the weight room.

2000: In leading the Mules' defense as a junior, Weatherington recorded 32 tackles and 22 tackles behind the line of scrimmage for 108 yards in losses. He also added seven sacks and batted down seven passes to earn All-MIAA conference honors. He was also a third-team Division II All-America selection.

1999: Weatherington made an immediate impact in moving from one year of junior college football to the division II level, earning All-America and MIAA Defensive MVP honors. He led the team with 12.0 sacks and recorded another 19 tackles behind the line of scrimmage. He totaled 52 stops on the year and recovered two fumbles. In the Mules' win over Washburn, he earned MIAA defensive player of the week honors with five sacks and a forced fumble. Against Emporia State, Weatherington recorded a season-high eight tackles.

1998: After sitting out the 1996 and 1997 seasons while enrolled at Northwest Mississippi Community College, Weatherington began his college career in 1998 and recorded 68 tackles with 18 tackles behind the line of scrimmage for NMCC. He went on to earn all-state and all-region honors before transferring to Central Missouri State. A force in the passing game, Weatherington recorded 13 sacks and batted down three passes, including one he intercepted. He also forced five fumbles and recovered three others.

PERSONAL: Weatherington earned all-state honors and helped lead Graceville, FL, High School to one state title and a runner-up finish. He majored in physical education at Central Missouri. In 1999, Weatherington also played on the Central Missouri basketball team, averaging 1.3 points and 1.5 rebounds in 17 games.

John Nix

Defensive Tackle 6'1" * 313 * 11/24/76 Southern Mississippi D-7 for '01 (240th overall)



Finding defensive tackles who are solid at plugging the middle and stopping the run is a constant pursuit in the NFL, and that is why the Cowboys spent a seventh-round draft choice on John Nix in 2001. His stout physical stature, quickness and athletic ability make him a difficult

player to move in close quarters. He also has good natural strength and the toughness necessary to compete for playing time in the NFL. Nix comes to Dallas after being a key member of a Southern Mississippi defensive unit that was one of the nation's best in 2000. The departures of Chad Hennings (retirement) and Leon Lett (free agency) will make for a wide-open competition at defensive tackle as training camp opens in 2001.

2000: Nix received Conference USA first team all-conference recognition as selected by *The Sporting News* after serving as a dominant force in the middle of the Southern Mississippi defensive line. He played a total of 506 snaps and racked up 33 tackles, including seven tackles for losses totaling 30 yards. He also contributed four sacks for losses of 24 yards. Nix was a key component of a Golden Eagles defense that finished the year ranked second in the nation in total defense, allowing just 268 yards-pergame. On their way to an 8-4 season and a win over Texas Christian in the Mobile Alabama Bowl, the Southern Miss defense ranked 21st in the country in run defense, allowing just 2.8 yards-per-carry, and fourth in pass defense.



Nix also excelled in track and field, finishing third in the state in the shot put. At Southern Miss, Nix was a teammate of fellow Cowboys' 2001 draft pick Delroy Stewart. That tandem helped form one of the nation's most powerful collegiate defensive lines. Nix was a sports administration major at USM.

With a huge frame and solid body control, Dorsey has the aggressiveness and toughness to compete as an NFL offensive lineman. A converted defensive lineman, Dorsey was able to incorporate that aggressive attitude, learned as a defensive lineman, to his play on Florida State's

offensive line the last two seasons. While growing in the highly explosive Seminole offensive system, he developed as a productive pass protector for 2000 Heisman Trophy winning quarterback Chris Weinke.

The departure of Erik Williams has created a need for depth at the offensive tackle position in Dallas, and Dorsey will be given every opportunity to step into a backup role behind Solomon Page at right tackle.

The 2000 Season At A Glance

Philadelphia 41, Dallas 14 At Dallas, Sept. 3, 2000

The Dallas Cowboys opened the 2000 season by falling 41-14 to the Philadelphia Eagles at Texas Stadium. Following an onside opening kickoff, the Eagles got on the Following an onside opening kickoff, the Eagles got on the scoreboard first with a one-yard Donovan McNabb pass to Jeff Thomason. Duce Staley upped Philadelphia's advantage with a one-yard touchdown run at the end of the first quarter before Jeremiah Trotter returned a Troy Aikman interception 27 yards for a touchdown early in the second period to give the Eagles a 21-0 advantage. Philadelphia made it 24-0 on a 33-yard David Akers field goal midway through the second before Tim Seder got the Cowboys on the board with a 34-yard field goal late in the quarter. Seder consisted again from 38-yards as the first half expired. connected again from 38-yards as the first half expired to cut the Dallas deficit to 27-6. Akers added a 37-yard field goal midway through the third quarter before McNabb scored on a three-yard run early in the final frame. Brian Mitchell added a six-yard touchdown two and a half minutes later for a 41-6 Philadelphia advantage. Joey Galloway closed out the scoring midway through the fourth when he caught a four-yard touchdown pass from Randall Cunningham. Cunningham then hooked up with Raghib Ismail on the two-point conversion for the final 41-14 score. Cunningham replaced Aikman in the second quarter after Aikman suffered a concussion and did not return to the game. Galloway left the game late in the fourth quarter after game. Galloway left trie game late in the rourn quarter after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee. Kareem Larrimore became the first rookie to start a season-opener at cornerback for Dallas since Ron Francis opened the 1987 season at corner. The Eagles' 306 rushing yards was the most gained by a Dallas opponent in club history (289 – Philadelphia, 10/22/61).

Arizona 32, Dallas 31 At Arizona, Sept. 10, 2000

The Dallas Cowboys saw their record fall to 0-2 after a 2-31 defeat at the hands of the Arizona Cardinals at Sun Devil Stadium. Arizona opened the scoring on the game's first possession when Cary Blanchard connected on a 19yard field goal. Dallas answered late in the quarter when Wane McGarity returned a punt 64 yards for a touchdown, his first NFL score. The Cardinals regained the lead early in the second period as Michael Pittman scored on a one yard run. The Cowboys responded with a 47-yard Randall Cunningham-to-James McKnight touchdown pass, and then increased their lead to 21-10 when Cunningham found Jackie Harris for a one-yard touchdown. Blanchard cut Arizona's halftime deficit to 21-13 with a 54-yard field goal as the first half expired. Tim Seder added to Dallas' lead with a 44-yard field goal midway through the third quarter before Jake Plummer found Frank Sanders for a our-yard touchdown late in the quarter. Blanchard made his third field goal of the game, from 35-yards out, late in the period to cut the Cardinals' deficit to 24-23. Midway through the final frame, Cunningham hooked up with Michael Wiley on a 15-yard touchdown Wiley first period. Michael Wiley on a 15-yard touchdown, Wiley's first career score, giving the Cowboys a 31-23 advantage. Arizona answered with a 51-yard Blanchard field goal before Plummer found Sanders for a 17-yard touchdown (two Prummer round sanders for a 17-yard fouchdown (two point attempt failed) to close out the scoring. The Dallas Cowboys won their first game of the 2000 season and the first game of Dave Campo's head coaching career when they defeated the Washington Redskins 27-2 at FedEx Field on Monday Night Football. The Redskins got on the scoreboard first as Stephen Davis scored on a seven-yard run midway through the opening quarter. Baltimore 27, Dallas 0 At Baltimore, Nov. 19, 2000

The Dallas Cowboys suffered their first shut out defeat since 1991 at the hands of the Baltimore Ravens, 27-0, at PSINet Stadium. The Ravens opened the scoring on their first possession of the game when Trent Dilfer connected with Qadry Ismail on a 40-yard touchdown pass. On Baltimore's next possession, the Ravens upped their

advantage to 10-0 with a 25-yard Matt Stover field goal. Baltimore took a 17-0 lead into halftime when Differ connected with Shannon Sharpe on a 59-yard touchdown late in the second quarter. Following a scoreless third period, Stover connected on his second field goal of the day mid-way through the final frame, this time from 19 yards out. Priest Holmes scored on a five-vard touchdown run late in the game to close out the scoring. The shut out was the first suffered by the Cowboys since Philadelphia defeated them 24-0 on Sept. 15, 1991, a span of 168 consecutive games with a score. Cornerback Phillippi Sparks picked off two Dilfer passes on the day, marking the first multi-interception game for Dallas since Dexter Coakley and Deion Sanders each recorded two interceptions against Miami on Thanksgiving Day, 1999. Wane McGarity posted a career-high six receptions for 40 yards on the day. Dallas suffered only its 11th loss in 33 games immediately preceeding its Thanksgiving Day game. The Cowboys defense surren-dered 479 yards of offense to the Ravens, the most given up by Dallas since Washington gained 504 total yards in the 1999 season opener (9/12/99).

Minnesota 27, Dallas 15 At Dallas, Nov. 23, 2000

The Dallas Cowboys lost their second consecutive game with a 27-15 defeat at the hands of the Minnesota likings at Texas Stadium on Thanksgiving Day Cowboys opened the scoring on their first possession when Tim Seder connected on a 37-yard field goal. Early in the second period, Seder gave Dallas a 6-0 lead with a 43-yard field goal before the Vikings responded with a 49-yard Gary Anderson field goal. Late in the half, Robert Smith scored on a 15 yard run, and then as the half expired, Seder cut Dallas' deficit to 10-9 with a 36-yard field goal. On Minnesota's first possession of the second half, Daunte Culpepper connected with Randy Moss on a seven-yard touchdown strike. Midway through the quarter, Anderson upped the Vikings advantage to 20-9 with a 29-yard field goal before Culpepper found Moss on a 36-yard touchdown pass just before the quarter ended. Late in the game, David LaFleur caught a six-yard pass from Troy Alkman for the touchdown to close out the scoring (the two point attempt failed). Emmitt Smith rushed for 100 yards on 12 carries before leaving the game early in the third period with a concussion. Smith's 108 combined yards - 100 rush-



ing, eight receiving - gave him 17,666 career combined net yards, moving him past Marcus Allen (17,648) into sixth place in NFL history. Aikman finished the day 30-ol-43 for 276 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Tampa Bay 27, Dallas 7 At Tampa, Dec. 3, 2000

The Dallas Cowboys suffered their first loss in franchise history to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 27-7, at Raymond James Stadium. After the Cowboys fumbled the opening kickoff, Tampa Bay opened the scoring with a 28-yard Martin Gramatica field goal just over a minute into the game. On the first play of their next possession, the Bucs' Warrick Dunn scampered 70 yards for the touchdown and a 10-0 Buccaneers lead. Late in the opening guarter, Brian Kelly returned a Troy Aikman interception nine yards for a 17-0 Tampa advantage. Early in the second period, Gramatica connected on his second field goal of the day, this time from 25 yards out. Midway through the third quarter, the Cowboys finally got on the scoreboard when Emmitt Smith scored on a four-yard run. Following a Smith fumble at the Tampa 12-yard line, the Bucs drove the field to a Dunn four-yard touchdown run to close out the scor ing midway through the final frame. First-year quarterback Anthony Wright saw his first professional action late in the fourth quarter, connecting on one-of-three passes for 10 yards. With 30 passing attempts on the day - 16 completions - Aikman moved ahead of John Hadl (4,687) into 16th place on the NFL's career passing attempts list with 4,712. Aikman's 158 passing yards also allowed him to move past Ken Anderson (32,838) into 19th place on the NFL's career passing yards list with 32,926. The Dallas

Dallas 32, Washington 13 At Dallas, Dec. 10, 2000

The Dallas Cowboys defeated the Washington Redskins 32-13 to claim their seventh consecutive victory over the Redskins, the first time in the 41-year series either team has had a seven game win streak. The Cowboys opened the scoring early in the first quarter when Tim Seder connected on a 33-yard field goal. Midway through the period, Seder connected from 19-yards out to stake Dallas to a 6-0 lead. The Redskins claimed a 7-6 advantage on a one-yard Stephen Davis run midway through the second quarter. The Cowboys reclaimed the lead two minutes later when Wane McGarity scored the first offensive touchdown of his career on a 22-yard reverse (two point attempt failed). Early in the third quarter, Emmitt Smith scored from two yards out before Seder added a 20-yard field goal late in the period to give Dallas a 22-7 lead. Midway through the final frame, Jason Tucker scored his first career rushing touchdown on a 17-yard reverse to up the Cowboys advantage to 29-7. Irving Fryar hauled in a 32-yard touchdown pass from Jeff George three and a half minutes later (two point attempt failed). Seder closed out the scoring with a 43-yard field goal with just under two minutes remaining in the game. Smith finished the day with 150 rushing yards on 23 carries, pushing him over 1,000 yards for the season. He is the second player in NFL history with 10 consecutive 1,000 yards rushing season (Barry Sanders), and is one of only three players in league history to reguster 10 1,000-yard seasons in a career (Sanders, Walter Payton). Smith also pushed his career rushing total over 15,000 yards, becoming only the third player in NFL history to rush for over 15,000 career yards. (Payton, Sanders). Seder's 14 points on the day gave him 101 points for the season, becoming the third rookie kicker in club history to reach the 100-point plateau in a season. The Cowboys defense sacked George five times on the day, marking the most sacks by a Dallas defense since recording five at the N.Y. Giants on Oct. 18, 1999. The defense also allowed only 79 rushing yards on the day. their lowest total of the year. The Cowboys offense rushed

for 242 yards in the game, the most by Dallas since recording 271 yards at Philadelphia on Oct. 31, 1993. Anthony Wright took over for Aikman – who suffered a concussion late in the first quarter - and completed three-offive passes for 73 yards. Dallas quarterbacks (Aikman, Wright) attempted only eight passes on the day, the fewest attempts in a game in Cowboys history. Their five completions tied the second lowest completion total in club histo-

The Dallas Cowboys closed out the 2000 season with a 31-0 defeat at the hands of the Tennessee Titans at Adelphia Coliseum on Christmas night. Despite Dallas recovering its onside kick on the opening kickoff, the Titans opened the scoring midway through the first quarter when Steve McNair hooked up with Derrick Mason on a 17-yard scoring toss. Following an Anthony Wright fumble on the second play of the third quarter, Eddie George scored on an 11-yard run to give Tennessee a 14-0 advantage. On Dallas' next possession, Henry Ford returned another Wright fumble 30 yards for the touchdown and a 21-0 Titans advantage. Midway through the period, Keith Bulluck intercepted a Wright pass intended for Emmitt Smith and returned it eight yards for a touchdown. With less than a minute remaining in the third period, Al Del Greco closed out the scoring with a 21-yard field goal. The Cowboys established team records for fewest first downs in a game (six) and most fumbles in a game (eight), while posting the second fewest passing first downs (two) in a game, total yards from scrimmage (95) in a game and passing yards (nine) in a game in club history. 
Ring of Honor

The Cowboys honor former players and coaches who made outstanding contributions to the club by inducting them into the Ring of Honor at Texas Stadium. Their names and the years of service are prominently displayed in silver on the wall above the Cowboys' bench at Texas Stadium. Members of the Cowboys' Ring of Honor:

2001 INDUCTEE ★ BOB HAYES



Wide receiver, 1965-74. Bob Haves led the Cowbovs in receptions three times and accumulated 365 receptions for 7,295 receiving yards during his 10-year career. His 71 career touchdown receptions remains the Cowboys club record. Haves also registered remarkable career numbers for average yards-per-catch (20.0) and average yards-perpunt return (11.1). He was a three-time Pro Bowl selection (1965-1967), while earning All-Pro recognition four times (1965-1968). In 1965, he became the only Dallas rookie to ever lead the team in receptions (46) and yards (1,003) while becoming the first player in franchise history to collect more than 1,000 receiving yards in a season. He capped a brilliant All-Pro rookie season by leading the NFL in yards-per-catch (21.8) and touchdown catches (12). In 1966, he set a club standard for receiving yards (1,232) that stood until 1991 and his 64 receptions that year also represented a team record that stood until 1983. Hayes was a member of Cowboys teams that played in two Super Bowls, helping the franchise to its first World Championship with a win over Miami in Super Bowl VI. One of the greatest sprinters in the history of international track and field, Hayes joined the Cowboys with the title of "World's Fastest Human" after winning the Olympic gold medal in the 100 meters in Tokyo in 1964.




* TONY DORSETT ***

Running back, 1977-87. Tony Dorsett finished his career as the second leading rusher in NFL history and played in five NFC Championship Games, two Super Bowls and four Pro Bowls. After guiding the University of Pittsburgh to the 1976 national title and claiming the Heisman Trophy, Dorsett captured rookie of the year honors in 1977. He also holds the NFL record with a 99-yard touchdown run. Inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1994, Dorsett was also elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994.

* CHUCK HOWLEY *

Llinebacker, 1961-73. When Chuck Howley retired in 1973, Tom Landry said "I don't know that I've seen anybody better at linebacker than Howley." A six-time All-Pro, Howley was the most valuable player in Super Bowl V. The Cowboys traded for Howley, who was drafted by Chicago in 1958. He was an All-America center at West Virginia. A six-time Pro Bowl selection, Howley was added to the Ring of Honor in 1977.







★ LEE ROY JORDAN ★

Linebacker, 1963-76. The inspirational leader of the Cowboys' first championship teams was Lee Roy Jordan. The Cowboys' first-round draft choice in 1963 following an All-America career at Alabama, Jordan anchored the "Doomsday Defense" from his middle linebacker position for 14 years. He was named to the Pro Bowl five times and All-Pro twice. Jordan was inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1989.

★ TOM LANDRY ★

Head Coach, 1960-88. The first head coach of the Cowboys, Tom Landry led Dallas to two Super Bowl wins and five NFC titles in his 29 years at the Cowboys helm. He compiled a career record of 270-178-6, the third most wins in NFL history, and was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1990. Landry was inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1993.






* BOB LILLY *

Defensive tackle, 1961-74. Nicknamed "Mr. Cowboy," Bob Lilly was the franchise's first draft choice in 1961, the first name in the Ring of Honor in 1975 and its first inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1980. A seven-time All-Pro, Lilly was named to a club-record 11 Pro Bowls. He was a two-time All-SWC pick and an All-America at Texas Christian University before being drafted by Dallas.

★ DON MEREDITH ★

Quarterback, 1960-68. Don Meredith led the Cowboys to their first winning season and their first NFL Championship Game in 1966. Signed by Clint Murchison, Jr. before Dallas was granted its NFL franchise, "Dandy Don" played in two Pro Bowls and was named NFL Player of the Year in 1966. A two-time All-America at SMU, Don's name was added to the Cowboys' Ring of Honor in 1976.









* DON PERKINS *

Running back, 1961-68. Don Perkins was the first Cowboys player to rush for more than 6,000 yards. A six-time Pro Bowl selection, Perkins finished among the top 10 NFL rushers in each of his eight seasons. He was named NFL Rookie of the Year in 1961 and All-Pro in 1962. Perkins was signed before Dallas was granted its NFL franchise. A three-time All-Skyline pick at New Mexico, he was inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1976.

★ MEL RENFRO ★

Defensive back, 1964-77. Mel Renfro was named to the Pro Bowl his first 10 seasons in the NFL. He is the club's all-time interceptor with 52 and kickoff returner with a 26.4-yard career average. Renfro was drafted in the second round in 1964 after a career as an All-America halfback and world class sprinter at Oregon. A five-time All-Pro, Renfro was inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1981. In 1996 Renfro was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.






* ROGER STAUBACH *

Quarterback, 1969-79. Roger Staubach led the Cowboys to six NFC Championship Games, four Super Bowls and two Super Bowl titles. A great clutch performer, Staubach led Dallas to comeback victories 23 times, 14 in the last two minutes or overtime. A five-time Pro Bowler, he was drafted by Dallas in 1964 after winning the Heisman Trophy and Maxwell Award at the Naval Academy. Inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1983, Roger was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1985.

★ RANDY WHITE ★

Defensive tackle, 1975-88. A nine-time Pro Bowler during his 14 years with Dallas, Randy White established a club-record with eight straight All-Pro selections. White was co-MVP (with teammate Harvey Martin) in the Cowboys' Super Bowl XII victory over Denver. A consensus All-America defensive end for Maryland in 1974, White won both the Outland Trophy and the Vince Lombardi Awards. Inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1994, Randy was also elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994.





Cowboys in the Hall of Fame


Seven members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, have been elected based on their accomplishments with the Cowboys-Bob Lilly in 1980, Roger Staubach in 1985, Tom Landry in 1990, Tex Schramm in 1991, Tony Dorsett and Randy White in 1994 and Mel Renfro in 1996.



Bob Lilly

Lilly, the first college player ever drafted by the Cowboys, was selected to play in the Pro Bowl 11 times while playing for Dallas from 1961 to 1974. Lilly came to the Cowboys after a collegiate career at Texas Christian University.

Staubach, known as "Captain Comeback" to Dallas fans, quarterbacked the Cowboys to four NFC Championships and victories in Super Bowl VI and XII. Staubach, a native of Cincinnati and a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, played for Dallas from 1969 to

Tom Landry compiled an overall record of 270-178-6 with two World Championships as the head coach of the Cowboys from 1960 to 1988. Landry helped build the Cowboys into "America's Team" along with Tex Schramm, who served as the team's president and general manager from 1960 to 1989.

Dorsett, the Cowboys second all-time rusher, stands fourth all-time on the NFL's career rushing list with 12,739 yards. Dorsett, the 1976 Heisman Trophy winner from the University of Pittsburgh, played with Dallas from 1977 to 1987.

White, a nine-time Pro Bowler during his 14 year career with Dallas, was co-MVP of Super Bowl XII in the Cowboys 27-10 win over Denver. White joined the Cowboys as a first-round draft choice in 1975 and played for Dallas from 1975 to 1988.

Renfro, a Pro Bowler in each of his first 10 seasons in the NFL, is the club's all-time interceptor with 52. He also holds the club record for career kickoff return average at 26.4 yards. Renfro joined the Cowboys as a second-round draft choice in 1964 and played for Dallas

from 1964 to 1977.

Historical Highlights

1960

LANDRY HIRED – Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne sign N.Y. Giants defensive assistant Tom Landry to a personal services contract on Dec. 27, 1959, with the intention of naming him head coach once they are awarded an expansion franchise by the NFL.

NFL FRANCHISE – Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during the first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28).

COWBOYS STOCKED – A player pool was set up in the league meeting in Los Angeles, with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

TRAINING STARTS - Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME – The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 16-10 preseason game to San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME – In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club preseason game, the Cowboys led the world champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 62-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19).

FIRST VICTORY – In a preseason game at Louisville, KY, the Cowboys beat the New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes for 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith) (August 27).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME – In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth-period Steelers rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED - Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

1961

TRAINING STARTS - Rookies launch training at new campsite - St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN – Scoring 10 points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 spectators (Sept. 17).

1962

TRAINING STARTS - Team begins training at new campsite - Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13).

PENALTY HISTORY – For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were holding in the end zone on a 99-yd. TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

100-YARD FIRSTS – Cowboys' Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth-quarter TDs in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).

1963

SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY - The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE - The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

HOWTON SETS RECORD – Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's all-time receiving mark with a 14-yard catch at Washington. Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

1964

LANDRY CONTRACT – With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a 10-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).



FIRST SELLOUT – An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

1966

PLAYOFF BOWL – After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15).

MERGER – Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys General Manager Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, merging the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

SCHRAMM ELEVATED – Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by Owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

NEELY CASE SOLVED – Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth round picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17).

THE CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys won their first championship, capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

1967

TEXAS STADIUM – On Dec. 23, Owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000.

SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP – Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

1968

WIN CAPITOL – For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on Dec. 21. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

1969

TEXAS STADIUM – Ground was broken for Texas Stadium in suburban Irving on January 25, and on June 29 Bert Rose was named general manager of the stadium.

ORIGINALS RETIRE – An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

REPEAT CAPITOL WINS – Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl.

1970

FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS – The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

FIRST NFC TITLE – The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11-year history on Jan. 3, 1971 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

1971

TEXAS STADIUM – The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving, Tex., home with a 44-21 victory over the New England Patriots on Oct. 24. Duane Thomas scored the first touchdown in the new stadium, a 56-yard run just two minutes and 16 seconds after the opening kickoff. Attendance was 65,708.

SIX STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS – The Cowboys won their last seven games to finish 11-3, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the sixth year in a row. They defeated Minnesota, 20-12, in the opening round.

SECOND NFC TITLE – For the second consecutive year, the Cowboys met the San Francisco 49ers in the National Conference showdown. This time Dallas won 14-13, to qualify for its second straight Super Bowl.

FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP - The Cowboys downed the Miami Dolphins, 24-3, to win Super Bowl VI in New Orleans on Jan. 16. It was the 10th victory in a row for Dallas as Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.



FIRST 1,000-YARD BACK – Calvin Hill became the first Dallas player to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 111 on Dec. 9 against the Washington Redskins in Texas Stadium. Hill wound up with 1,036 yards for the season on a record 245 carries.

SEVEN STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS – The Cowboys qualified for the NFL playoffs a record seventh consecutive year, their 10-4 record earning them the National Conference Wild Card berth. Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns in the last 1:30 to give the Cowboys a 30-28 victory at San Francisco in the first round. Then, at Washington on New Year's Eve, Dallas was foiled in its bid for a third straight NFL title with the Redskins win, 16-3.

1973

100 VICTORIES – The Cowboys and Coach Tom Landry recorded their 100th victory with a 40-3 Texas Stadium win over the New Orleans Saints on Sept. 24. Landry ended the season with a career mark of 108-80-6 to rank ninth on the list of the NFL's all-time winningest coaches.

EIGHT STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS – The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division title with a 10-4 record and broke their own NFL record by reaching the playoffs for the eighth year in a row. Dallas defeated the Western Division champion Los Angeles Rams in the first round, 27-16, but fell to Central Division winner Minnesota in the NFC Championship Game, 27-10.

1974

FIRST TOP DRAFT CHOICE – For the first time in their history, the Cowboys had the very first choice in the NFL Draft. The No. 1 pick came to Dallas from Houston in exchange for Tody Smith and Billy Parks, The Cowboys selected Ed "Too Tall" Jones, a 6-9, 260-pound defensive end from Tennessee State.

PLAYOFFS MISSED – The Cowboys' record breaking string of eight straight years in the NFL playoffs was broken when the club's 8-6 record failed to qualify.

1975

LILLY HONORED - "Mr. Cowboy" was honored on Bob Lilly Day at Texas Stadium at halftime of the Philadelphia game on Nov. 23. It was first such recognition ever given to a Dallas player. Lilly never missed a game in 14 years with the Cowboys, earning All-Pro honors seven times at defensive tackle before retiring prior to the '75 season.

TEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys' 10-4 record earned them the NFC Wild Card berth in the playoffs. The composite record over 10 straight winning seasons was 101-37-2.

THIRD NFC TITLE – After shocking Minnesota in the first round, 17-14, on Roger Staubach's 50-yard "Hail Mary" pass to Drew Pearson, the Cowboys traveled to Los Angeles for the NFC showdown. Staubach threw four touchdown passes, three to Preston Pearson, and Dallas won, 37-7. Pittsburgh won Super Bowl X on Jan, 18 in Miami, 21-17.

1976

MEREDITH, PERKINS HONORED – Former Cowboys greats Don Meredith and Don Perkins joined Bob Lilly in the Ring of Honor at Texas Stadium during halftime ceremonies at the New York Giants game on Nov. 7.

ELEVEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys won the NFC Eastern Division title with their 11-3 record, giving them their 11th straight winning season and 10th playoff berth in that period. A 14-12 first round loss to Los Angeles – the first time Dallas had lost in the first round under the current playoff setup – ended the season.

1977

HOWLEY HONORED – Former All-Pro linebacker Chuck Howley, a Cowboy from 1961 through 1973, became the fourth member of the Ring of Honor, Howley was honored during ceremonies at halftime of the Detroit Lions game on Oct. 30.

TWELVE STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – Getting off to an 8-0 start, their best ever, the Cowboys rolled to a 12-2 record, the championship of the NFC East, and their 12th consecutive winning season. They opened their 11th visit to the playoffs in those 12 years with a 37-7 first-round victory over the Chicago Bears at Texas Stadium.

FOURTH NFC TITLE – Dallas crushed the Minnesota Vikings at Texas Stadium, 23-6, for National Conference crown No. 4 and the right to meet the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XII.

SECOND WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys stopped the Denver Broncos, 27-10, to win Super Bowl XII in New Orleans on Jan. 15, 1978. In the process, Dallas tied Minnesota for most Super Bowl appearances (four) and Green Bay, Miami and Pittsburgh for most Super Bowl victories (two). Defensive linemen Harvey Martin and Randy White were named co-MVPs in the game.



THIRTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – After a mediocre 6-4 start, the Cowboys won six straight games to finish the expanded regular season with a 12-4 record and their 10th division crown. It marked the Cowboys' 13th consecutive winning season and 12th trip to the playoffs in that span. Dallas rallied to beat Atlanta 27-20 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium, sending the Cowboys to their seventh NFC championship game in the past nine years.

FIFTH NFC TITLE – Dallas shut out the Rams in Los Angeles 28-0 in the National Conference title game to advance to the Super Bowl a record fifth time, including three of the last four. In the first Super Bowl rematch, Pittsburgh edged the Cowboys 35-31 for the NFL championship on Jan. 21 in Miami's Orange Bowl.

1979

TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY – The Cowboys celebrated their 20th anniversary season at halftime of the St. Louis Cardinals game at Texas Stadium on Oct. 21. Stars from each of those 20 seasons plus Coach Tom Landry were introduced during the halftime ceremonies.

FOURTH STRAIGHT NFC EAST TITLE – The Cowboys won their final three regular season games to finish with an 11-5 record, their 11th division championship, including the past four NFC East titles, and 14th consecutive winning season. The Cowboys made their 13th trip to the playoffs in those 14 years, but were eliminated by Los Angeles 21-19 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium.

1980

STAUBACH RETIRES – At a press conference at Texas Stadium on March 31, quarterback Roger Staubach announced his retirement after 11 record-breaking years with the Cowboys. Staubach held all major Cowboys' passing records and was the all-time leading NFL passer.

LILLY ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Bob Lilly, a seven-time All-Pro defensive tackle in his 14-year career with the Cowboys from 1961-74, became the first Cowboys' player to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Enshrined along with Lilly on Aug. 2 at Canton, Ohio, were Herb Adderley, who played for the Cowboys from 1970-71, Jim Otto and Deacon Jones.

FIFTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – Behind new starting quarterback Danny White, the Cowboys rolled to their 15th consecutive winning season with a surprising 12-4 record, tied for best in the league with Philadelphia and Atlanta. The Cowboys lost the NFC East title to Philadelphia on a tie-breaker, but entered the playoffs for the 14th time in 15 years, this time as a wild card team. The Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game and rallied past the Falcons at Atlanta 30-27 to advance to the NFC Championship Game at Philadelphia. But the Cowboys lost 20-7 in their bid for a sixth Super Bowl appearance.

LANDRY'S 200th VICTORY – Tom Landry joined George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only coaches with 200 NFL victories when the Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 on Dec. 28 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game, raising Landry's record to 200-119-6, counting regular season and playoff games.

1981

RENFRO HONORED – Former All-Pro defensive back Mel Renfro, the Cowboys' all-time leading pass interceptor, became the fifth member of the Cowboys' Ring of Honor. Renfro, who played for Dallas from 1964 through 1977, was honored during halftime ceremonies of the Cowboys-Miami Dolphins game at Texas Stadium on Oct. 25.

TWELFTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division Championship, their 12th division title since 1966, with a 12-4 record and tied Oakland's NFL mark of 16 consecutive winning seasons. Entering the playoffs for the 15th time in that span, the Cowboys advanced to the NFC Championship Game for the ninth time in 12 years by routing Tampa Bay 38-0 at Texas Stadium. But for the second year in a row Dallas lost the conference title game. San Francisco scored a last-minute touchdown at Candlestick Park to edge the Cowboys 28-27 for a berth in Super Bowl XVI.

1982

200TH REGULAR-SEASON VICTORY – The Cowboys beat Washington 24-10 at RFK Stadium on Dec. 5 for the club's and Coach Tom Landry's 200th regular season victory.

SEVENTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys finished the strike-shortened regular season 6-3 to establish an NFL record of 17 consecutive winning seasons. Entering the playoffs for a record-tying eighth straight year and for the 16th time in 17 years, the Cowboys beat Tampa Bay 30-17 and Green Bay 37-26, both at Texas Stadium, to advance to the NFC Championship Game for the third year in a row. But again the Cowboys come up short, losing 31-17 at Washington.



STAUBACH HONORED – Former quarterback Roger Staubach, who led the Cowboys to four Super Bowls, became the sixth member of the Ring of Honor during halftime ceremonies of the Cowboys-Tampa Bay game on Oct. 9.

NEW HEADQUARTERS – Ground was broken on Nov. 29 for the Cowboys' new headquarters and training facility at The Valley Ranch in northwest Dallas County.

EIGHTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys extended their NFL record to 18 consecutive winning seasons with a 12-4 finish. The club also set a league record with its ninth straight playoff appearance, qualifying as a wild card entry. The L. A. Rams eliminated Dallas from the playoffs, however, with a 24-17 upset victory at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game on Dec. 26.

1984

SILVER SEASON – The Cowboys kicked off their 25th anniversary with a news conference at Texas Stadium on Jan. 27. President Tex Schramm announced the Cowboys would celebrate their 25th anniversary during 1984 under the theme "Silver Season."

OWNERSHIP CHANGES HANDS – The sale of the Cowboys from the Murchison family to an 11-member limited partnership headed by Dallas businessman H.R. "Bum" Bright was approved by NFL owners on March 19 at the league's annual meeting in Honolulu, The sale was completed on May 18.

NINETEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys defeated the Eagles 26-10 in Philadelphia to extend their NFL record to 19 consecutive winning seasons. The Cowboys finished 9-7 and missed the playoffs for the first time in 10 years and only the second time in 19 years.

1985

STAUBACH ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Roger Staubach, the master of the comeback victory during his 11year career as a Cowboys quarterback, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. Enshrined with Staubach on Aug. 3 at Canton, Ohio, were Pete Rozelle, Joe Namath, O.J. Simpson and Frank Gatski. Staubach joined Bob Lilly as the only players who spent their entire career with the Cowboys to be elected to the Hall of Fame.

TEXAS STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS – Texas Stadium unveiled a new look when the Cowboys opened their preseason schedule against Green Bay on Aug. 10. The stadium became the first to have two DiamondVision color scoreboards, and the addition of 118 Crown Suites gave Texas Stadium more private suites, 296, than any stadium in the nation:

COWBOYS RANCH OPENS – Cowboys players and coaches reported on Aug. 27 to the team's new headquarters and training facility at Cowboys Center in Valley Ranch.

DORSETT PASSES 10,000 YARDS – On a 19-yard sweep around left end, Tony Dorsett, became the sixth player in NFL history to rush for 10,000 yards. Dorsett's feat highlighted a 27-13 victory over Pittsburgh at Texas Stadium on Oct. 13.

THIRTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys edged the New York Giants 28-21 on Dec. 15 at Texas Stadium to capture the NFC Eastern Division championship for the first time since 1981. Picked in most season previews to finish third or fourth in the division, the Cowboys rallied for their NFL record 20th consecutive winning season, a 13th division title in 20 years and a playoff berth for the 18th time in that span. But in their NFL record 36th playoff game appearance, the Cowboys fell 20-0 to the Los Angeles Rams in Anaheim Stadium on Jan. 4.

1986

COWBOYS GO TO LONDON – The Cowboys began preparations for their first trip to a foreign country when the NFL announced on March 12 that the Cowboys would play the Super Bowl champion Chicago Bears in a preseason game at London's Wembley Stadium on Aug. 3.

100TH WIN AT TEXAS STADIUM - Dallas defeated St. Louis 37-6 for the club's 100th victory at Texas Stadium. Since the facility opened in 1971 the Cowboys have compiled a 100-25 (.800) record.

STREAK BROKEN – The Cowboys' streak of 20 consecutive winning seasons from 1966 through 1985, third longest in professional sports history, came to an end when the club finished with a 7-9 record after losing seven of its last eight games. Only baseball's New York Yankees (39 straight winning seasons, 1926-64) and hockey's Montreal Canadiens (32 from 1951-52 through 1982-83) surpassed the Cowboys' accomplishments.

1987

FOUNDER DIES – Cowboys founder Clint Murchison, Jr., died March 30 after a long illness. Murchison, 63, who owned the club until 1984, acquired the expansion Dallas franchise in the NFL in 1960. He hired Tex Schramm as general manager, gave Tom Landry a 10-year contract when his coaching career was in doubt in 1964 and was instrumental in the building of Texas Stadium.



DORSETT GETS 12,000 YARDS – Tony Dorsett became the fourth rusher in NFL history to gain more than 12,000 yards when he registered 52 yards against the Rams on Dec. 21 for a career total of 12,036. The only runners ahead of Dorsett were Walter Payton, Jim Brown and Franco Harris.

1988

LANDRY TIES LAMBEAU – Dallas opened the 1988 season against Pittsburgh on Sept. 12 and Tom Landry tied an NFL record held by Curly Lambeau by coaching in his 29th consecutive season with the same team. Lambeau led the Green Bay Packers from 1921-49.

1989

JONES ACQUIRES COWBOYS, NAMED JOHNSON COACH – Jerry Jones reached an agreement to purchase the Cowboys from Burn Bright on Feb. 25 and announced that University of Miami Coach Jimmy Johnson would replace Tom Landry.

SALE APPROVED, SCHRAMM RESIGNS – The sale of the Cowboys to Jerry Jones was unanimously approved by NFL owners on April 18 at a special meeting in New York. At the same meeting, Tex Schramm was named president of the new World League of American Football. He announced his resignation as president and general manager of the Cowboys after 29 years with the club.

AIKMAN SIGNED – The Cowboys, holding the No. 1 pick in the NFL Draft for only the second time in their history, announced the signing of quarterback Troy Aikman to a six-year contract on April 20.

JORDAN HONORED - Former All-Pro linebacker Lee Roy Jordan, a Cowboy from 1963-76, became the seventh member of the Ring of Honor, Jordan was honored during ceremonies at halftime of the Phoenix Cardinals game on Oct. 29.

1990

AUSTIN TRAINING CAMP – Beginning on July 18, nearly 100,000 fans visit the Cowboys' first ever in-state training camp at St. Edward's University in Austin, Tex.

LANDRY ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Tom Landry, who led the Cowboys to five Super Bowls and 20 consecutive winning seasons as the Cowboys head coach from 1960-88, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. Enshrined on Aug. 4 at Canton, Ohio, Landry joined former Dallas players Bob Lilly and Roger Staubach as the only Hall of Fame members who built their achievements with the Cowboys.

SMITH ROOKIE OF THE YEAR, JOHNSON COACH OF THE YEAR – Following a dramatic turn-around season where the team posted a 7-9 record and missed the playoffs by one game, Jimmy Johnson was named the NFL Coach of the Year by the Associated Press. Running backs Emmitt Smith, who led all NFL rookie running backs in rushing yardage and touchdowns, was named the A.P.'s NFC Offensive Rookie of the Year.

1991

RECORD DRAFT HAUL INCLUDES MARYLAND AS NO. 1 OVERALL PICK – After a pre-draft trade with the New England Patriots, the Cowboys used the No. 1 overall selection in the NFL Draft for only the third time in franchise history. Dallas chose Outland Trophy winner Russell Maryland (DT) with the top pick. The Cowboys went on to acquire 16 more choices, setting a club record for most selections in a 12-round draft with 17 overall.

SCHRAMM ENTERS HALL OF FAME – One of the NFL's true innovators, and the guiding force behind the development of America's Team, Tex Schramm was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 27, 1991. Schramm, who served as the President and General Manager of the Dallas Cowboys from the team's inception in 1960 until his retirement in 1989, joined Staubach, Lilly and Landry with his enshrinement in Canton, Ohio.

RETURN TO THE PLAYOFFS – After winning the final five games of the season, Dallas finished with an 11-5 record – the team's best mark since the 1983 season. The initial spark to the winning streak was a 24-21 win over the eventual World Champion Washington Redskins on Nov. 24. The win, at Washington's RFK Stadium, ended the Redskins' bid for a perfect regular season after 11 straight wins. Dallas finished second in the NFC East and qualified as the NFC's No. 2 Wild Card Playoff entry, marking the club's first postseason trip since 1985. Dallas traveled to Chicago and defeated the Bears 17-13 in the opening round Wild Card Game before dropping a 38-6 decision at Detroit the following week.

SMITH AND IRVIN LEAD NFL – Emmitt Smith and Michael Irvin became the first two players from the same team to lead the NFL in rushing yardage and receiving yardage in the same season. Smith had 1,563 yards rushing, while Irvin set single-season club records for receptions (93) and receiving yardage (1,523). Both players were named to the NFC Pro Bowl squad along with tight end Jay Novacek and quarterback Troy Aikman. The Cowboys sent four offensive players to the Pro Bowl for the first time since 1979, and Irvin was named the MVP of the Pro Bowl Game.



1992

JONES NAMED TO COMPETITION COMMITTEE - On May 1, Jerry Jones, was appointed to the NFL's Competition Committee by Commissioner Paul Tagliabue. Jones became the first owner to serve on the prestigious committee since the death of Cincinnati's Paul Brown.

FOURTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – Before a national television audience on ABC's Monday Night Football, the Cowboys defeated the Atlanta Falcons (41-17) at the Georgia Dome to claim the NFC Eastern Division Championship. The victory marked the Cowboys' first divisional title since 1985.

RECORD NUMBER OF OFFENSIVE PRO BOWL SELECTIONS – Six players from the Cowboys offense were selected to play in the Pro Bowl: RB Emmitt Smith, TE Jay Novacek, QB Troy Aikman, WR Michael Irvin, G Nate Newton and C Mark Stepnoski. The six players establish a Dallas Cowboys' record for most offensive players selected to the Pro Bowl.

CLUB RECORD FOR VICTORIES/SMITH EARNS SECOND RUSHING TITLE - On Dec. 27, Dallas defeated Chicago by a 17-14 score at Texas Stadium. The victory was the 13th of the year for Dallas, establishing a new club record for victories in a season. Emmitt Smith finished the season with 1,713 rushing yards, enabling Smith to become the first player to win back-to-back NFL rushing titles since Eric Dickerson (1983-84).

ROAD ATTENDANCE RECORD SET – The Cowboys set a new team record for road attendance by averaging 72,523 fans-per-road game in 1992. The team also played before a sold-out stadium in all 16 regular season games for the first time since the 1981 season.

SIXTH NFC TITLE – On January 17, 1993, the Cowboys defeated the San Francisco 49ers by a 30-20 score at Candlestick Park. The victory sends Dallas to Super Bowl XXVII in Pasadena, marking the Cowboys first NFC title, and Super Bowl trip, since 1978.

THIRD WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP – While making an NFL record sixth Super Bowl appearance, the Cowboys defeated Buffalo 52-17 in Super Bowl XXVII at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena on Jan. 31, 1993. The victory enabled the Cowboys to become the only franchise in NFL history to win more than one Super Bowl under two different ownerships. The Super Bowl crowd of 98,374 was the largest crowd to ever witness a Dallas Cowboys game. The game was also witnessed by 133.4 million television viewers, making Super Bowl XXVII the most watched event in television history.

1993

WHITE HOUSE VISIT—The Super Bowl Champion Dallas Cowboys became the first athletic team to visit the White House under the Clinton administration. The Cowboys team visit to the White House was the first in club history. (March 5).

LANDRY HONORED – Former Head Coach Tom Landry, who led Dallas to two Super Bowl wins and five NFC titles in his 29 years at the Cowboys helm, became the eighth member of the Ring of Honor during half-time ceremonies of the Cowboys-New York Giants game on Nov. 7.

RECORD NUMBER OF PRO BOWL SELECTIONS – An NFC-record 11 Dallas players were selected to the Pro Bowl, including a club-record eight offensive selections (seven Pro Bowl starters).

FIFTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – In the final game of the regular season, the Cowboys defeat the New York Giants 16-13 in overtime at Giants Stadium to claim their 15th division crown and their second consecutive NFC East title (Jan. 2).

SMITH EARNS THIRD RUSHING TITLE – Emmitt Smith finishes the season with 1,486 yards to earn his third straight NFL rushing crown. He becomes just the fourth man in NFL history to win three consecutive rushing titles.

SEVENTH NFC TITLE – Dallas defeats San Francisco 38-21 in the NFC Championship Game at Texas Stadium. The victory gives the Cowboys an NFL-record seventh conference championship in the first conference title game to be played at Texas Stadium since Jan. 1, 1978 (a 23-6 win over Minnesota).

FOURTH WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP – Dallas becomes one of just three NFL teams to win four Super Bowls by defeating Buffalo (30-13) in Super Bowl XXVIII. The game, played at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, featured two rushing touchdowns by Super Bowl MVP Emmitt Smith. Dallas raised its NFL record number of Super Bowl appearances to seven (one fourth of all the Super Bowl games played).

1994

SWITZER NAMED HEAD COACH – Barry Switzer is named the new head coach of the Dallas Cowboys – and the third head coach in team history – on March 30. Switzer replaces Jimmy Johnson, who stepped down as the Cowboys' head coach the previous day.

DORSETT AND WHITE ENTER HALL OF FAME – Tony Dorsett, the Cowboys all-time leading rusher in his 11-year career with the Cowboys from 1977-87, and Randy White, a nine-time Pro Bowl defensive tackle in his 14-year career with the Cowboys from 1975-78, are both inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in their first year of eligibility. Enshrined on July 30 at Canton, Ohio, both men join former Dallas players Bob Lilly and Roger Staubach as well as Tom Landry and Tex Schramm in the Hall of Fame.



NFL RECORD CROWD IN MEXICO CITY – The Cowboys travel to Mexico City to play the Houston Oilers in a preseason game in front of 112,376 fans, the largest crowd to ever witness an NFL game (Aug. 15).

DORSETT AND WHITE HONORED – Former All-Pros, running back Tony Dorsett and defensive tackle Randy White, became the ninth and tenth members of the Ring of Honor. They were honored during ceremonies at halftime of the Arizona Cardinals game on Oct. 9.

SIXTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys clinched the NFC Eastern Division Crown in the first week of December with a 31-19 victory over the Eagles in Philadelphia (Dec. 4).

RECORD NUMBER OF PRO BOWL SELECTIONS – AGAIN – For the second straight year, the Cowboys send 11 players to the Pro Bowl, tying the NFC record that Dallas established in 1993.

NFL RECORD FOR TITLE GAME APPEARANCES – While making an NFL record 13th NFC Championship Game appearance, the Cowboys become the only team in NFL history to advance to at least two championship games in every decade of the team's existence. Dallas fell short of its third straight Super Bowl with a 38-28 loss to the San Francisco 49ers at Candlestick Park on Jan. 15, 1995.

1995

SEVENTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – On Dec. 24, Dallas wrapped up its fourth straight NFC Eastern Division title – a feat that no other NFC East team has accomplished other than the Cowboys teams from 1976 to 1979.

SMITH WINS FOURTH RUSHING CROWN – Emmitt Smith closes the season with a team-record 1,773 rushing yards and an NFL record 25 touchdowns. Smith led the NFL in rushing for the fourth time in five years, becoming just the fifth player in NFL history to win at least four rushing titles.

TEN PRO BOWLERS SELECTED – Ten Cowboys are selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad. Since 1993, Dallas has earned 32 Pro Bowl selections – the most ever by one team over a three year period of time.

EIGHTH NFC TITLE – The Cowboys win an NFL record eighth conference championship game by defeating the Green Bay Packers 38-27 at Texas Stadium on Jan. 14, 1996. The victory marked the Cowboys third NFC title in four years.

THREE SUPER BOWL TITLES IN FOUR YEARS – Dallas becomes the first team in NFL history to win three Super Bowls in a four year period by defeating the Pittsburgh Steelers 27-17 in Super Bowl XXX at Sun Devil Stadium in Tempe, AZ. The game, played on Jan. 28, 1996, is witnessed by 138.4 million television viewers, making Super Bowl XXX the most watched event in television history. The victory enables Dallas to earn its fifth Super Bowl title – joining the San Francisco 49ers as the only NFL franchises to win five Super Bowls. The Cowboys have now appeared in an NFL record eight Super Bowls – three more than any other team.

1996

SMITH PASSES 10,000 YARDS – On a six-yard dash up the middle against Washington on Thanksgiving Day, Emmitt Smith became the 12th player in NFL history to rush for 10,000 yards. Smith's feat highlighted a 21-10 win over the Redskins at Texas Stadium on Nov. 28.

NINE PRO BOWLERS SELECTED – A NFL-high nine players are selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad, the fourth straight year Dallas has led the NFL in Pro Bowl selections. Over the past four seasons, Dallas has sent 41 players to Hawaii, the most ever in the NFL in a four-year period. The next highest total was posted by the 1971-74 Miami Dolphins with 38.

EIGHTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – On Dec. 15, Dallas wrapped up its fifth straight NFC Eastern Division title – a feat never before achieved in the NFC East – and the eighteenth division title in team history with a 12-6 win over New England at Texas Stadium. The Carolina Panthers eliminated the Cowboys from the playoffs in a divisional playoff loss at Carolina.

1997

IRVIN TOPS 10,000 YARDS – On a 14-yard touchdown reception at Washington on Oct. 13, Michael Irvin became the 14th player in NFL history to record over 10,000 yards receiving.

PLAYOFF STREAK SNAPPED - The Cowboys close the 1997 season with a 6-10 record, marking the team's first non-playoff season since 1990.

1998

GAILEY NAMED HEAD COACH – Jerry Jones named Chan Gailey as the fourth head coach in the history of the Dallas Cowboys franchise on Feb. 12. Gailey, who had previously served as the Pittsburgh Steelers offensive coordinator, replaced Barry Switzer, who resigned from his position on January 9th.

TRAINING CAMP OPENS IN WICHITA FALLS – The Cowboys open training camp at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas on July 15. Attendance figures for the four-week camp exceed 100,000.



SANDERS SETS RETURN MARK – On Sept. 21, Deion Sanders returned a punt 59 yards for a touchdown in the first half at the New York Giants and then ran back an interception 71 yards for a score in the fourth quarter. It was the first time in club history that one player had scored two touchdowns on returns of any kind in the same game.

SMITH BECOMES CLUB'S ALL-TIME RUSHER – With 163 yards on 29 carries in a 16-6 win over the New York Giants on Nov. 8, Emmitt Smith becomes the Dallas Cowboys all-time leading rusher. Smith's performance pushes him past Tony Dorsett (12,036) and into the Cowboys top spot.

NINETEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – After a one-year absence from postseason play, the Cowboys clinch their sixth NFC Eastern Division title in the last seven years with a 13-9 win over Philadelphia at Texas Stadium on Dec. 20. The 1998 division crown is the 19th division championship (15th NFC East title) in the club's 39-year history.

SMITH BECOMES NFL'S ALL-TIME RUSHING TOUCHDOWN LEADER – After scoring a first-half touchdown on a one-yard run against the Redskins at Texas Stadium, Emmitt Smith becomes the NFL's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns, moving ahead of Marcus Allen (123). Smith later added a 26-yard TD run to bring his record total to 125 rushing touchdowns by season's end.

COWBOYS POST 10 WINS AND SWEEP NFC EAST – The Cowboys closed the year with a 23-7 victory over Washington and a 10-6 record, marking the 23rd season in which Dallas recorded at least 10 wins – a NFL record. The win over the Redskins also enabled Dallas to become the first team in the history of the NFC East to post an 8-0 record in division play.

COWBOYS EXTEND NFL-RECORD WITH 25TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – The Cowboys extended their NFL record for postseason appearances to 25 with a 20-7 loss to Arizona in a NFC Wild Card Playoff Game at Texas Stadium on Jan. 2, 1999.

1999

COWBOYS COMEBACK – The Cowboys overcome a 21 point fourth quarter deficit and pull out an overtime win over the Washington Redskins in the season opener on Sept. 12. After the team scored 21 points in the fourth quarter to tie the game – tying the largest deficit overcome to win a game – Troy Aikman connected with Raghib Ismail on a 76-yard bomb in overtime to provide the final margin of victory.

IRVIN RECORDS FINAL CATCH – On Oct. 10 at Veterans Stadium in Philadelphia, wide receiver Michael Irvin went across the middle and hauled in an eight-yard reception for the 750th catch of his career. The catch would be the last of his career as he suffered neck and back injuries on the play and was never able to return to the playing field. Irvin finished his career tied for 10th on the NFL's all-time reception list and was ninth all-time in receiving yards.

SELLOUT STREAK ENDS – The Dallas Cowboys NFL-record of consecutive games in front of sold out stadiums comes to an end on Dec. 24, 1999 in a Christmas Eve game against the New Orleans Saints in the Louisiana Superdome. The streak, which included home and away games, came to a halt after 160 games. It began on December 23, 1990 at Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium and included 79 straight sellouts at Texas Stadium (including playoffs) and 81 straight sell-outs on the road (including playoffs).

AIKMAN NFL'S WINNINGEST QUARTERBACK – With eight wins in 1999, Troy Aikman became the winningest starting quarterback of any decade in NFL history with 90 wins in the 1990s, He broke the mark of 86 wins set by Joe Montana in the 1980s

TEAM OF THE 90'S – The Cowboys close the century as the NFL's most successful team in the decade of the 1990s. From 1990 to 1999, Dallas qualified for the playoffs eight times, won six division titles, made four trips to the conference championship game and won three Super Bowls.

SMITH BECOMES NFL'S ALL-TIME LEADING POSTSEASON RUSHER – Emmitt Smith ran for 99 yards in a 27-10 loss at Minnesota in an NFC Wild Card Playoff Game on Jan. 9, 1999. The total gave Smith the NFL record with 1,586 career postseason rushing yards, moving him past Franco Harris (1,556).

2000

CAMPO NAMED HEAD COACH – Jerry Jones named Cowboys defensive coordinator Dave Campo as the fifth head coach in franchise history on Jan. 26. Campo spent the previous 11 seasons as an assistant coach in Dallas and was the defensive coordinator for the 1995 team that won Super Bowl XXX. He replaced Chan Gailey, who was fired on Jan. 11.

SMITH ECLIPSES 15,000 YARDS – With 150 yards rushing against Washington on Dec. 10, running back Emmitt Smith became just the third player in NFL history to rush for over 15,000 career yards, joining Walter Payton and Barry Sanders. Smith's effort also pushed him past the 1,000-yard mark for the season, marking the 10th consecutive season he has done so. Barry Sanders is the only other player to have accomlished this feat.

2001

AIKMAN RETIRES – At a press conference at Texas Stadium on April 9, quarterback Troy Aikman announced his retirement after 12 seasons with the Cowboys. Aikman departed holding or tied for 47 separate club passing records.



The glittering showcase of Cowboys football is Texas Stadium, a state-of-the-art modern football facility built at a cost of \$35 million in 1971. The Cowboys opened their facility on Oct. 24, 1971 with a 44-21 victory over New England. Since then, the Cowboys have posted a 174-74 record (.702) overall, including a 16-5 (.762) mark in postseason, at home. Prior to moving to Texas Stadium the Cowboys spent the 1960-71 seasons at the Cotton Bowl, where they posted a 45-33-4 record, including a 2-2 mark in postseason.

Located in the Dallas suburb of Irving, Texas Stadium has a seating capacity of 65,639 and features two DiamondVision color replay screens, 381 luxury suites, three sports bars, 52 concession stands, 40 specialty stands, 86 restrooms, 115 drinking fountains and 130 acres of parking. Texas Stadium's most unique feature is the partial roof which covers fans from inclement weather, but leaves the game outdoors. Texas Stadium also boasts the luxurious Stadium Club, one of Dallas' premier locations for private parties, banquets and convention gatherings.

The Corral, outside Gate 8, features food, beverage, entertainment and large screen televisions for fan hospitality before, during and after all Cowboys home games and special events.

Complete banquet, catering and special event services are available for private groups at Texas Stadium. Information on hosting an event can be obtained by calling 972-785-4000.

Tours of Texas Stadium are available hourly Monday through Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., and Sundays, when no events are scheduled, from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Call 972-785-4780 for more information.

After eight years in Austin, the Cowboys shifted to Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, where the team has been for each of the past three summers.

GENE AND JERRY JONES FAMILY DALLAS COWBOYS CHARITIES

For the past 12 years, Jerry Jones and his family have owned and operated the Dallas Cowboys with a management style that places just as much emphasis on community leadership as it does on the goal of winning the Super Bowl. The dominant theme which underscores the Cowboys role in the community is to maximize the visibility, energy and celebrity of the world's most recognizable sports franchise and use those dynamic forces as a powerful means to help others.

The results on the field have brought championships to

Dallas. The results away from the field have touched the lives of thousands.

THE MISSION

"In the area of community service, our organization's mission is built upon an overall philosophy of helping those who don't have the strength, the resources or the means to help themselves," says Jones. "As a sports entity that has enjoyed unprecedented success and recognition for more than four decades, we feel a very strong obligation to transfer that championship tradition and the magic that it creates toward the bigger purpose of making a difference."

Jones enlists the talents, skills and resources of his entire family, all of the Cowboys players and every member of the organization to provide a cutting edge approach to community outreach. 'Any personal contact with an individual member of our organization can provide help for hundreds of people in need,' adds Jones. "The star on the helmet can move mountains."

THE ARMY AND THE STAR

The Jones family's dynamic association with the Salvation Army is a visible example of the creative and innovative manner in which the Cowboys can make a difference in the world.

For the past four seasons, the Jones family has dedicated the Cowboys annual Thanksgiving Day halftime show as a national showcase to kickoff the Salvation Army's annual Kettle Drive. The team's association with network television has spawned a donation of \$20 million worth of airtime to present nationally televised entertainment extravaganzas that have created a new holiday tradition.

Under the direction of Charlotte Jones Anderson, the Cowboys have produced the annual halftime event and welcomed nationally renowned entertainers Reba McEntire, Randy Travis, Clint Black

and Billy Gilman & Jessica Simpson to highlight each of the four Kettle Kickoff celebrations. The efforts have resulted in increases of over \$20 million, for the Army, from the previous year's total while

reaching over 180 million people nation-wide.

On the local Salvation Army front, The Gene and Jerry Jones Family Center for Children opened in November of 1998 in conjunction with the Army. The center offers low-income families accessibility to affordable childcare programs that meet the needs of quality care and intellectual development. In each of the last eight years, Gene and Jerry Jones Family Dallas Cowboys Charities has served as host, and underwritten the costs, for the Super Lunch, a fundraising event for The Salvation Army Irving Corps Community Center and its special projects including the Family Center for Children. This annual event has raised nearly \$1 million since its inception, including \$200,000 in 2000.


Gene and Jerry are members of the Salvation Army's Dallas County Board and the National Advisory Board, respectively. The family was presented the Army's Partner of the Year Award in 1997 and in 1999 received the Evangeline Booth Award, one of the Army's highest national community service awards. Annually, the entire Cowboys organization supports the Army's Corporate Angel Tree Program, helping those in need during the holiday season. Individuals in the organization, including front office staff and players adopt angels to provide gifts and volunteer at the distribution center.

MAGIC BY ASSOCIATION

Maximizing the 'magic' of the Dallas Cowboys celebrity, and using that influence to assist others through community service, is the backbone of the organization's mission away from the field of competition. Each year, the team fulfills thousands of requests for ticket packages and autographed memorabilia items that can produce proceeds that range from \$100 to tens of thousands of dollars per donation. Non-profit player appearances for charity, and 'Make-A-Wish' visits are a staple item in every Cowboys player contract. In addition, the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Dallas Cowboys

Charities is the active philanthropic arm of the organization that annually makes significant contributions to organizations on both the local and national levels. In April of 1999, Gene and Jerry Jones made a \$1 million gift to the Library of Congress for the purpose of promoting education on the national and international levels. In their continuing desire to enhance education and support young people in the community, the Jones family served as underwriting sponsor for The Dallas Cowboys/Gene and Jerry Jones Family - Dallas Morning News All-State Scholar-Athlete Team. The program honors and provides scholarships for 12 college-bound student-athletes from across the State of Texas who have distinguished themselves through academic and athletic excellence.

A wide variety of recent charitable efforts highlight the Jones family's continued activity in the local community. Some of those events include: 'First Downs for Down Syndrome,' a program in which the Cowboys' offensive production on the playing field produced corporate funding for down syndrome; a record setting celebrity roast of Jerry Jones for St. Philips School in Dallas, a facility where the team had previously funded a new playground; the Ticket Art Program, which featured the artwork of regional children's hospital patients on Dallas Cowboys season tickets in 1997 and raised money for the children's respective hospitals; the annual Cystic Fibrosis Sports Challenge hosted at Texas Stadium; in 2001, participation in and support of the Mayor's Summer Reading Program with player spokesperson Ebenezer

Ekuban encouraging children to read; in 1998-99, the "Be Cool, Go To School" program, which rewarded Dallas city elementary schools who boasted the best attendance with a visit from a Cowboys player and team mascot Rowdy; in 1999-2000, the "Prepare to Pass" program, an incentive program where Cowboys' spokesperson Darren Woodson encouraged 10th grade students in Dallas to pass the mandatory TAAS test; and with the guidance of special teams coach Joe Avezzano, the Cowboys have been major supporters of the Special Olympics effort in North Texas for nearly a decade.

Jerry Jones' passion for helping those who have been hit with adversity has inspired him to enlist the assistance of his players on several goodwill missions that have touched the hearts of those in need. The organization's presence in these areas often extends far beyond the boundaries of the Dallas-Fort Worth area. In the spring of 1997, Jones joined Cowboys Troy Aikman, Herschel Walker and Charles Haley on a relief trip to the tornado-ravaged state of Arkansas. Three years earlier, the entire World Champion Cowboys team went to the Oklahoma City bombing site within two weeks of the tragedy. For years, Gene and Jerry Jones have been avid supporters of the Susan G. Komen Foundation and Race for the Cure for Breast Cancer. Annually, the Cowboys participate in the Fort Worth, Plano and Dallas Race for the Cure events. Additionally, the Dallas Cowboys honored the Komen Foundation and 450 breast cancer survivors in a special halftime tribute at Texas Stadium on Oct. 24, 1999.

The Cowboys are also very active in raising a large portion of the annual funds for the Happy Hill Farm and Academy. The Dallas Cowboys Family Cookbook and the team's annual Kickoff Luncheon serve as major revenue producers for the local academy that houses and educates abused and neglected children. The academy is also home to the Dallas Cowboys Courage House.

Under the enthusiastic guidance of Gene Jones, who serves as a member of the board of trustees for Children's Medical Center of Dallas, the entire Cowboys team has conducted annual Christmas visits to local children's hospitals in each of the past 12 years. The holiday visitation program, which involves not only every player, but also the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders, now extends to five different hospitals throughout Dallas and Ft. Worth.

Each year, the Cowboys underwrite and produce the annual 'Dallas Cowboys Let Us Play! Sports Camp for Girls,' a three-day camp for inner-city girls between the ages of 12 to 15 which encourages involvement in athletics for women with a focus on building character and self-esteem in at-risk youths. The team also sponsors a free coaching clin-

ic for regional youth league and middle school coaches, from seven states, who spend a day with head coach Dave Campo and the entire Cowboys coaching staff at Texas Stadium.

AMBASSADORS OF GOOD CHEER

The world famous Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders organization is completely subsidized by the club for the primary purpose of providing goodwill and a sense of caring on a local, national and international platform. Aside from their obvious presence on game days and their diligent work in local hospitals and homes for the elderly, the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders have now made more U.S.O. visits to U.S. troops stationed oversees than the legendary Bob Hope.

POWERFUL PARTNERSHIP WITH THE NEL

Through national public service announcements, local promotional events and their association with the NFL, the Cowboys are responsible for \$1 million in annual support of the United Way each year. The inaugural NFL & United Way Hometown Huddle took place on October 19, 1999 when the Dallas Cowboys and NFL players nationwide showed support in their communities. In 2000, the Second Annual Hometown Huddle on October 17th involved the Dallas Cowboys secondary serving lunch to the homeless and visiting with children at The Salvation Army, Carr P. Collins Social Service Center.

In addition, the Cowboys and the entire NFL have formed a partnership that will designate \$1 million of annual support to the development of youth football programs throughout the country. In conjunction with that effort, the Cowboys will present a \$100,000 grant to the St. Philips School and Community Center in South Dallas. The grant will help fund a new \$750,000 recreation center that will include a football field. In 1998, the Cowboys presented Dallas Moorland YMCA with the funding to build new football fields to support their growing youth football program.

The Cowboys participated in the first annual Dallas Cowboys Community Quarterback Award, a league-wide volunteer recognition program that donated nearly \$1 million to community organizations served by outstanding volunteers. The 2000 Dallas Cowboys Community Quarterback Award was awarded to Coach Robert Green—nominated for her volunteer work at St. Philip's School & Community Center in Dallas, Taxas. Coach Green received a \$11,000 grant from the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Dallas Cowboys Charities donated in her name to St. Philip's. The runners-up, each receiving a \$3,500 grant, were Percy Borbin of Happy Hill Farm and Academy and Nancy Underwood Ippolito of The Salvation Army.

A FAMILY PASSION

The operation of the Dallas Cowboys is a very visible family passion for Gene and Jerry Jones and their three children. Jerry Jones serves as the club's owner and general manager, while Stephen Jones (player personnel), Charlotte Jones Anderson (marketing, special events and community relations) and Jerry Jones, Jr. (legal operations) are all actively involved with the daily management of the club as vice presidents. Their shared dedication to community involvement has been a family source of pride for several years, and it extends far beyond the realm of the athletic world.

Gene Jones is also a current member of the advisory board for the Meadows School for the Arts at Southern Methodist University, the board of directors for the John G. Tower Center for Political Studies at SMU, the advisory board for Family Gateway and the Children's Education Fund advisory board. She has previously served on the advisory board for the March of Dimes, the executive board of TACA and the executive board of the Mental Health Center. She has also been a member of the Dallas Symphony League and the Associates of the Dallas Museum of Art. In addition, she has been a past honorary chairman for major fund-raising events that benefited Neurofibromatosis and the Easter Seals Society.

In the spring of 1998, the Jones' hosted a celebrity fundraiser at their home with Lauren Bacall as the featured guest. On that one evening, for the benefit of SMU's Meadows Foundation, the fam-

ily helped produce the single largest fund raising event in University history. As a result of her efforts, the University established the Gene Jones Scholarship in her honor.

Jerry Jones has a lifetime association with the Boys and Girls Clubs of America. In 2001, the Joneses were awarded Chairman's Award by The Boys and Girls Clubs of America. This award is given to recognize individuals who made a positive difference in people's lives - particularly in the lives of children. The Chairman's Dinner, chaired by daughter, Charlotte Anderson, raised \$1.9 million for The Boys and Girls Clubs. Jerry currently serves as a national trustee for the Southwest region of the organization and was previously named the Man of the Year by the Boys and Girls Clubs of Little Rock, Arkansas.
